Council Notices

If you saw the recent *Four Corners* story on the chemical 2,4-D and were wondering if Byron Shire Council used the chemical, the answer is 'no'.

Council's team leader natural environment, Angus Underwood, said it is not used as part of the bush regeneration programs. Council's parks superintendent, Andy Erskine, also confirmed that it is not used on roadside vegetation, nor sporting fields and parks.

When required, Council staff will use the chemical glyphosate for weed management and are licensed to use the chemical in areas of threatened or endangered ecological communities. Melsulfuron methyl is also used for certain weeds and other chemicals for selective control of turf weeds among lawn surfaces.

Mr Underwood said Council has a roadside vegetation management plan which outlines how vegetation, including weeds, on road reserves should be managed.

Mr Underwood also reminded people that Council maintains a register for Chemical Sensitive Residents and Organic Growers.

Residents sensitive to chemical herbicide, and certified organic growers, who wish to be placed on the register, should apply to Council in writing (official application form). Residents can also contact Council on 6685 9319 about the register.

At the next Council meeting on August 8, mayor Simon Richardson put a notice of motion to discuss stopping chemical use on Councilowned and -managed land within the next twelve months.

The North Byron Parklands got its first trial run as a festival site last weekend when Splendour in the Grass hosted daily capacity crowds of 25,000 at its 13th annual event. With over 80 national and international acts playing the ten venues across the newly established site, music lovers were treated to the likes of Mumford and Sons (closing Friday's Supertop), Cloud Control, Empire of the Sun, The National and the kaftanloving Polyphonic Spree presenting their version of *The Rocky Horror Picture Show*.

With headline act Frank Ocean cancelling on the first day of the festival, organisers were left scrambling to fill the bill, with some punter confusion when acts at the Supertop were moved

forward. However the standouts were Airbourne, reminiscent of Aussie rock lords ACDC, Alt-Passion Pit and the audience which sang along to Alt-J's Breezeblocks, even though no-one really seemed to know the words.

Teething problems

Perhaps 13 wasn't such a lucky number for this year's organisers, who were plagued with some significant teething problems at the Yelgun site, causing the *Sydney Morning Herald* to declare this year's event 'shambolic'. Many festival goers complained that the name 'North Byron Parklands' was misleading as the event was 30 kilometres north of the Bay.

The site's location and the movement of large numbers of festival goers to and from the venue proved to be one of the most obvious challenges. Friday's massive surge of arrivals saw major disruptions to flow of traffic for local residents and festival goers alike.

One Yelgun resident told *The Echo* that she was unable to get to the bus that takes her kindergarten child from Crabbes Creek Public School. When confronted with traffic delays she was advised to travel by foot. 'It ended up taking a lot longer than I had expected and the bus had already arrived and the driver had been frantically trying to get in contact with me as they had my 5-year-old on board and no-one to pick her up.'

Some festival attendees complained that it took up to six hours to make it on to the site and receive their armbands to enter the festival. **continued on page 2** \rightarrow

> continued from page 1 Others were unhappy with the 1.5 kilometre walk from the carpark to the entrance.

Byron mayor Simon Richardson attended Splendour and believes the organisers will learn from the experience.

'I think the event itself satisfied the vast majority of patrons. There was great music and the site was used really well and it allowed people to celebrate with their friends,' Cr Richardson said.

'From an infrastructure point of view there were teething problems. On Friday from 1pm to 4pm traffic management failed and both getting into the site via Tweed Valley Way and coming from Byron and contemporary practices style flipping

from across the globe.' And coming from across the globe are some intriguing performers reflecting other first cultures. Canadian band Digging Roots blend indigenous influences, hiphop, folk, reggae, and blues and roots to create their own sound. Also from that country hails dance troupe Tsuu T'ina & Anishnaabe, bringing to Boomerang traditional plains and hoop dance traditions combined with 'parkour

The mayor believes light rail could be the solution for traffic management.

'This is clearly an impetus for light rail to connect Writers Festival, Tyagarah and the North Byron Parklands.'

Ian Alexander, owner of Byron Taxis, was philosophical about the traffic challenges. 'We understood with everyone getting in on Friday that it was going to be difficult, but once it got rolling, it was okay. Saturday it went like a dream and today [Sunday] it's rolling along quite well'.

Although Splendour enjoyed fine weather, the light rain on Thursday evening made for muddy conditions on site and resulted in 'gumboot injuries' (blisters) being 82 per cent of the presentations to the onsite 24-hour medical centre. Per-capita injury rates were fewer in 2013 compared to previous years and patients requiring ambulance transports to hospital were also fewer than in previous years. Local businesses in the

Village Shopping Centre had nearly 11,000 door movements recorded on Saturday alone, so many that they thought the counting system had gone berserk!'

Byron United president Paul Waters is also positive about the event and its longterm economic benefits. 'We don't really know what effect Splendour has had on general business until the data comes in.

'I know from this business [The Balcony] we had huge days and quiet nights, very similar to Schoolies.'

With over 15,000 campers on site there were also some problems in providing adequate facilities for such large numbers, with many complaining of lack of access to toilets, showers and drinking

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were blocked.

'It also took far too long to get a wrist band, so clearly Friday afternoon took the organisers by surprise and that has to be looked at and addressed for next year.'

While buses were available, services to and from Byron were far from adequate.

'I walked out of Mumford and Sons,' said Mayor Richardson, 'and there were hundreds of people in the Byron bus queue, and the bus line for Coolangatta/Tweed was empty'. Local businesses in the region experienced positive results for festival impacts on their businesses with Tina Petroff, president of Ocean Shores Tidy Towns Committee, reporting, 'The Ocean Although Splendour enjoyed capacity crowds, great food, impressive and unique creative initiatives and forums, excellent music and fine weather, there is a general consensus that North Byron Parklands and event organisers need to ensure there is a little more Splendour in the infrastructure before we invite thousands more to the Falls Festival planned at the site from New Years Eve until January 3, 2014.

Paying your coffee forward

Many years ago in Naples, a tradition was born. Espresso Sospeso, or 'suspended coffee'. This is how it works: someone goes into a cafe and pre-purchases coffee or food. This becomes a 'suspended coffee' and then someone in need can go to the business and ask for that suspended coffee (or food), thus being provided with warmth and nourishment at no cost to themselves. It's a small act of humanity and goodwill that can be delivered with a simple \$3.50 contribution.

One of Mullumbimby's longest running cafes, Lulu's, will be introducing Suspended Coffee from Monday.

Embracing

Business owner Linda Rutledge, pictured, and her late husband Peter have been the heart and soul of Lulu's for the past 13 years.

'It's a 12-hours-a-day job, six days a week', says Linda, who believes that 'part of Lulu's philosophy is to embrace everybody and to provide a safe and sustaining place for our local community.

Lulu's boasts a diverse cus-



tomer group. In fact, it's the colour that Mullumbimby is so famous for. 'When I moved from Sydney,' says Linda, 'we didn't know where we were going to live, but we really liked Mullum because it was real and because it was a combination of old farming families and hippies and somehow they all found a way to get on together really well.'


One of Linda's great joys as a proprietor is exposing unsuspecting customers to just how delicious vegetarian food can be.

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Consultation on draft Regulation

Protection of the Environment Operations (General) Amendment (Native Forest Bio-material) Regulation 2013

The Environment Protection Authority (EPA) is seeking comments on the proposed amendment to the draft Protection of the Environment Operations (General) Amendment (Native Forest Bio-material) Regulation 2013.

The draft Regulation will amend the Protection of the Environment Operations (General) Regulation 2009 to exclude two additional types of native forest bio-material from the definition of native forest bio-material in order to permit the burning of such material in any electricity generating work with the capacity to generate more than 200 kilowatts:

- invasive native species that have been cleared in accordance with a property vegetation plan, within the meaning of the Native Vegetation Act 2003;
- certain material resulting from forestry operations carried out on land to which an Integrated Forestry Operations Approval (IFOA) applies under Part 5B of the Forestry Act 2012, or debris resulting from clearing carried out in accordance with a private native forestry property vegetation plan.

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Pasta maker buys cookie company

The future of iconic Byron Bay Cookies - and the jobs that go with them - is now assured following the company's purchase by Australian food company Rinoldi.

Receiver and manager, PwC partner Derrick Vickers, announced the sale. It should be completed within a week and includes all trademarks and the Byron Bay plant and equipment.

The sale is good news not only for biscuit lovers but also for the more than 60 people who have continued to work for Byron Bay Cookie Company following a major round of redundancies when it first went into administration back in March this year.

Locals kept

Mr Vickers assured Echonetdaily that baking will continue in Byron Bay and no further jobs will be lost in the transition to new ownership.

The Melbourne-based Rinoldi has been around since 1878. It is Australia's oldest, and one of our largest, pasta makers. It also produces a range of snack foods for the local and export markets.

Mr Vickers said he was pleased that the business will be sold as a going concern to an established Australian food manufacturer and said it would not have been possible without the ongoing loyalty of the company's customers and suppliers.

To the shock of locals, the Byron Bay Cookie Company was placed in receivership in March by the Australian Tax Office, which was owed around \$1.3 million in back taxes. A further 170 businesses were owed a total of \$2.7 million.

Extra patrols for dog beaches

If you are out exercising your dog, please keep to the offleash areas and do not let your pet chase birds or disturb nests, says Byron Shire Council.

Byron Shire rangers will be increasing their beach patrols over the coming weeks to remind pet owners to stay within the correct areas.

Governance manager Ralph James urged pet owners to check the signs before going onto the beach.

Dogs are not permitted off the leash outside the designated dog exercise areas.

'Even when in the offleash areas,' said Mr James, 'it's good training to not let or encourage your dogs to chase birds.

'Estuaries, dunes and beaches provide essential nesting sites for shorebirds including threatened species such as the Pied Oyster-

catcher. Dogs don't know the boundaries and all birds look the same. It's up to pet owners to be responsible and to have control of your dog at all times,' Mr James said.

Council's team leader of natural environment, Angus Underwood, agreed.

'Most dogs naturally see shorebirds as a fun thing to chase when they are on the beach; however, disturbance to feeding and nesting shorebirds can lead to eggs failing to hatch, and chicks starving or being preyed on in the ab-

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Hapkiyusul master to teach on north coast


One of the world's leading martial artists and master of the art of Hapkiyusul, Kim Yun Sang, will visit the north coast this week.

Kim Yun Sang is the Dojunim, the figurehead known as the 'caretaker of the way' of this training method. This position was handed down to him from the previous Dojunim Choi Yong Sul under whom Kim Yun Sang studied until Choi's death in 1986.

In secret

Until recently Hapkiyusul had been practised secretly, available to only a limited number of Koreans, but Kim Yun Sang Dojunim realised that to ensure the future of the art it must be made available to everyone. Hence, in 2002, two Australians were invited to commence training.

One of these men is local man Jarrod Taylor, who is one of Hapkiyusul's leading exponents. Jarrod, a former Richmond River High School student, has been living in South Korea and training with Kim

for the past 11 years.

Jarrod says he was immediately impressed by both the art form and Kim Yun Sang when he was first introduced Hapkiyusul.

'Unique ability'

'When I met Kim Yun Sang Dojunim, I was impressed that he was 70 years old and he was still doing all the exercises that everyone else did', says Jarrod.

'He seemed to have some unique ability; he could still throw round and have complete control over people. He says that this ability comes from this training method.

'When I saw this and heard him talk about his philosophy, it really attracted me.'

Jarrod is now a resident in Guemsam in South Korea and trains daily with the Dojunim but both men will be in the area this week.

Dojunim Kim will be training with local martial artists to celebrate the tenth anniversary of Hapkiyusul in Australia, and will give a free public demonstration of his skills at the Lennox Head Community Centre from 6.30pm this Wednesday August 7.




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

Book camp builds brains

A healthy body is not much use if you can't remember where you left your car keys - or your car - or how to put on your shoes.

Mental fitness is just as important as physical fitness, and new research suggests that mental agility can be kept up with a mind workout.

Published in the online journal Neurology.org, the study by Robert S Wilson PhD suggests that exercising your brain by taking part in activities such as reading and writing 'across a person's lifetime, from childhood through old age, is important for brain health in old age'. So as with physical fitness, the mind training has to be kept up week after week.

The study found that the rate of decline was reduced by 32 per cent in people with frequent mental activity in late life, compared to people with average mental activity, while the rate of decline of those with infrequent activity was 48 per cent faster than those with average activity. That's a good incentive to start training now.

Fortunately there's a book camp this weekend called the Byron Bay Writers' Festival where you can exercise your antidementia muscles and have a lot of fun in the process.

You might feel a bit winded after the first few challenging ideas but keep going and you'll break through the wall. The festival offers options for both sprinters and long-distance thinkers and there's plenty to laugh at as well, and surely neurologists would suggest that's also good for your mental fitness - see www.medscape.com/viewarticle/437544.

And if your budget doesn't run to attending a brain gym, take on a simple workout in the home involving a book from the library, a piece of paper and a pen.

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Hockey wimps out on costings

or many months now ◀ Tony Abbott has been warning his colleagues not to take the voters for granted; the coalition might be a long way ahead in the polls but things were bound to get closer as election day approached.

And indeed they have - a lot closer than Abbott anticipated. The return of Kevin Rudd has meant this is not a time for arrogance or hubris. But apparently his shadow treasurer Joe Hockey has not got the message: not only has he decided to treat the punters like mugs, but he has apparently forgotten that just three years ago he tried the same trick, and it ended in disaster. The problem is once again the costing of opposition promises. To date Hockey has released very few figures, and most of those are little better than guesstimates; he has, he said repeatedly, been waiting for PEFO before submitting everything to Treasury, as required by Peter Costello's Charter of Budget Honesty.

The unlovely acronym PEFO is another Costello innovation: The Pre-election Economic and Fiscal Outlook. It was introduced to prevent incoming governments claiming that they had been dudded by their predecessors; in 1983 Bob Hawke purported to discover a huge shortfall in the books relinquished by Malcolm Fraser, and in 1996 John Howard did the same, christening it Beazley's black hole after the former finance minister, now turned opposition leader.

PEFO is there to provide an up-to-date set of figures as close to polling day as possible; oppositions can no longer say they have been kept in the dark by a tricky and devious government.

The independents jacked up: they wanted proper costings and insisted Abbott submit his proposals to Treasury after all. Cornered, Abbott did so; and the answer came back that there appeared to have been questionable assumptions and double counting which added up to a Hockey black hole of nearly \$11 billion.

In the Financial Review, Laura Tingle wrote that it proved that the whole gang of them were liars and clunkheads, not fit to govern. Hockey, rather sheepishly, admitted that there was, it appeared, a difference of opinion. It wasn't the only factor that propelled Tony Windsor, Rob Oakeshott and Andrew Wilkie into Julia Gillard's camp, but it was certainly a significant one.

And the icing on the cake, from Labor's point of view, came when the Institute of Chartered Accountants found that the Horwath effort was not, as it purported to be, either an audit or a review, but simply an exercise in basic arithmetic, and as a consequence reprimanded and fined the fifth biggest firm in Australia. This time Hockey's comment was somewhat more terse: 'I'm not getting into it, mate.'

Those who forget history are doomed to repeat it. Okay, this time Hockey plans not to go just to one firm, but to spread the burden of costing between the Parliamentary Budget Office, some friendly state treasurers, and a variety of private companies. But the fact remains that none of these agencies, however objective or well-intentioned they are, will have the same access and resources as does the federal treasury; after all, evaluating both the broad picture and all the details is what it's there for. And of course there is unlikely to be a hung parliament this time, with independents needing to be brought on side. But there just might be; and in any case, the electorate, having been badly stung three years ago, is likely to be a bit more sceptical of Hockey's and Abbott's claims to have found truly honest, transparent and believable endorsement this time around.

Still, they will have their defenders. While most of the media reported Hockey's announcement with some incredulity (one obvious comment was that if he did not trust or believe Treasury, he might have some difficulty administering the portfolio) The Australian ran a small story on page 2 by its economics editor David Uren, under the heading: 'Hockey weeds out rubbery figures.' Now there's one institution the coalition can always rely on.

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

Parents fear for young 'Houdini'

'I'm going to lose him. I just know I am? Heart-wrenching words from a mother who just wants safe, affordable housing to bring up her child.

Sandy and Phil Leadbeatter live with their two children, aged six and four, in Huonbrook. Their youngest son Sam appeared to be your average 18-month-old when things suddenly took a giant step backwards and it wasn't long before he was diagnosed as being severely autistic.

Best life

About six months before the diagnosis, Sandy and Phil had moved further up into the hills from Wilsons Creek, and in their new home in Huonbrook they set about creating the best life they could for their son. 'He hadn't been diagnosed when we moved here,' says Sandy. 'If we had known we would have moved into town then.

One of their many problems arose when it was discovered that Sam had Houdini skills but not the comprehension to understand the associated dan-



gers. He has no perception of height and, no matter how diligent the family are, Sam still manages to escape and explore the big world.

Wandering off

He has wandered off three times in the last six weeks, and twice before that when he was found by his mum and dad. They had search and rescue, the Westpac Helicopter and neighbours and family searching for him just four weeks ago.

'He is severely autistic and has Global Developmental Delay (GDD),' says Sandy. 'He is non-verbal. He doesn't get much of what's going on. He doesn't come back, he doesn't answer.

MORTALITY by Christopher Hitchens, **Twelve Books**, hardcover \$22.99



Christopher Hitchens, dead of oesophageal cancer at age 62 in 2011, was one of the fine minds of this and the previous century. He wrote beautifully, talked persuasively, reasoned brilliantly - a triple threat to the hawkers of humbug he excoriated in his works. And, according to his friends, he was a nice guy to know. Shame about his support for the invasion of Iraq.

Call him courageous as well. This is evident in Mortality, a short book of essays on his approaching death. He also flung himself into war zones - as he flung himself into everything - and in one story for Vanity Fair subjected himself to waterboarding, providing Americans with yet more evidence that the 'technique' is torture.

Mortality is a remarkable achievement in the face of surgery, radiation, chemotherapy, self-doubts and the promise of hellfire offered up to him by the more moronic of 'believers'. Hitchens eschews all wishes of a heaven or hell awaiting him: '... the religion which treats its flock as a credulous plaything offers one of the cruelest spectacles that can be imagined: a human being in fear and doubt who is openly exploited to believe in the impossible'.

Aside from the notion that he gave offence to someone's god, the cause of Hitchens's cancer might lie in his heavy living, chiefly cigarettes and whisky, and his father suffered the same fate. Naturally Hitchens is offered plenty of 'alternative' therapies, and prayers from non-atheists; he declines them with good wit and a certain amount of empathy. He details without self-pity the gradual diminution and loss of his skills, particularly his voice, which he sees as 'an amputation of part of the personality'. He even finds time to offer advice to young writers: 'Avoid stock expressions (like the plague, as William Safire used to say)

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Besides the nasty bizarre experiments, Elephants On Acid offers the reader sensory overloads for humans (including acoustics for cocktail parties), investigations into sleep and dreams, fart studies and the potential for individuals to behave like psychopaths, to mention a few.

Boese's style is sceptical and jokey but he also has a sincere desire to inform. If his sense of humour gets readers more interested in the significant role science plays in all our lives, then all the better. - Michael McDonald

Jammy bastard or not, Cox must be credited with a remarkable intellect, able



in books and on TV to clearly synthesise a series of complex scientific ideas and bring them to a satisfying conclusion. Not since Carl Sagan has science been explained so poetically, and the great David Attenborough has described Cox as his successor in nature science presentation – very big shoes to fill.

For the reader, Cox offers Wonders Of Life and how they are governed by the laws of physics, Wonders Of The Universe, a journey through 13.7 billion years with an accompanying explanation of the laws of light, gravity, time, matter and energy, and The Quantum Universe, for those who really want to bend their brains on the 'inescapable strangeness' of the subatomic world. Publisher Collins in its Shorts series (collinsshorts.com) presents How The Universe Will End - find out in 50 pages or so how it is that after trillions of years only black holes and white dwarfs will be left.

There is no easy way in to the pointy end of modern science. It takes effort to understand a fraction of it. Cox is a first-rate guide to the discoveries which form the basis for all our technology and which demonstrate that the universe is, in J B S Haldane's words, 'queerer than we can suppose'.

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

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

Where do you draw inspiration? As we've never limited ourselves to a particular genre of music, we have the freedom to draw inspiration from everything we hear. Everyone in the band has very different musical tastes, which allows us to be quite eclectic in our compositional choices. Lyrically I draw a lot of inspiration from the literature of the 18th century, specifically Dickens and Dumas, blended with the dialogue from old *Carry On* films.

Where do you get your fabulous costumes from? Do you have a stylist? I usually find my favourite clothes, discarded, and buried beneath piles of leaves in alleyways; they always seem to fit better! Certainly the ladies in the group spend a lot more time on their costumes, which is why they always look so fabulous. We are all our own personal stylists,

for better or worse. I do have a moustache stylist; he's a tiny dormouse called Horatio.

Why vaudeville? We've always been interested in the variety of performance involved in vaudeville. I'd love to get a dancing and juggling dog. Vaudeville to me is the epitome of entertainment without restraints. It developed in the late 1800s in America, as part of travelling medicine shows, freak shows, dime museums, and burlesque shows in saloons, and would have earlier roots in the music halls of England.

What do you think is so seductive about Rapskallion? Apart from the general aroma, and the often-minuscule outfit choices, there is a wild orgiastic Dionysian atmosphere whenever we take to the stage, adorned with swashbuckling romance that has proved most stimulating in the past.

How does your cabaret show differ from your other shows? We collaborate a lot with the magnificent Miss Friby, who are one of Melbourne's foremost exponents of cabaret and vaudevillean extravagances, so our cabaret show is a blend of our musical input and their alluringly comedic songand-dance numbers.

What should we expect for your show at the Byron Community Centre? A night of wild musical abandonment, whimsical humour, death-defying dance routines, a face full of confetti, exploding accordions, and a band brimming with rock 'n' roll joie de vivre and Splendour afterglow.

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

We women are at war, but this time the battlefield is not a province or a country, it is not the workplace or the home; this war is personal and it will be fought on our faces, our bodies and our minds. This is the ultimate war of identity and authenticity.

And sadly, my dear sweet sisters, we are losing. Every year the multi-billion-dollar plastic-surgery industry grows more Stepford Wives. powerful, delivering pervasive social messages that women are not beautiful. The plastic propaganda machine feeds us the catchy slogan 'it's your personal choice'. See, it's okay. We have a right not to love ourselves. hope to the 'afflicted', is not big business. It will not generate billions. The great business opportunity, the growing cash market, is in providing surgery and associated procedures to normal women who don't need it. Women whose breasts have drooped since childbirth, who have never liked their nose, who have lost weight, women who are ageing.

These women, or 'us' as I like to call them, are persistently bombarded with images of women far more attractive than they ever were, or they'll ever be. Or women who have been photoshopped. And it's the same sort of woman, the same regular features, the same super whitened teeth, the same pert breasts, the same taut skin. And we, the women who claim to desire diversity, to celebrate difference, line up for the procedures that remove our difference, and make us all



We can see the sisters who have fallen, in cafes, in shops, taking the kids to school, lining the pavements and homes of our everyday life, the walking dead, zombie women with frozen foreheads and the faces puffed so full of Restylane it becomes less like a face and more like a swollen knee. It is not just age that has been outlawed. Expression is gone too.

The other day a woman commented to a friend of mine, 'My husband has left me. I am devastated, but I can't show it because they've done such a good job with the Botox.' This is not personal choice. This is mass hysteria, this is fear, this is desperation, this is self-loathing; and this is big business. It

Tell me about the music department at Shearwater and how you came to be involved. Shearwater was the reason we moved from Kangaroo Valley on the south coast - we wanted our two sons to have that creative education. I did an interview with The Echo about my own music and from that I started teaching local students including the daughter of one of the school's directors. Things flowed from there but I always remember The Echo being very generous to me as a newcomer to the shire.

Why are you raising money for the music department?

When I was at school we had one broken violin, one woefully out-of-tune piano and seventeen sad looking descant recorders... we want to create a richer environment for our kids.

Who are the kids that you have taught at Shearwater that have most inspired you? The ones who overcome their fear (many people say they'd rather die than stand up and talk or sing in front of others), find their voice and get amazed by it and then go out and do good with the gift.

plastic surgery which fulfils its highest good, that is to restore cosmetic surgery for non-medical reasons had a mental illness. Plastic surgery is the beauty industry's equivalent to ethnic cleansing, where aberration is removed.

> Imagine a future where physical imperfection is eliminated. It would be like living at Barbie and Ken's house, forever. Is there no room for the plain? For the unconventional? For the ugly? Must we all have the industry-approved stamp of mainstream beautiful? I guess in this Brave New World of big business surgery and medically enhanced beauty, only the poor and the socially disadvantaged will be ugly.

Sadly, the starving third world and the financially challenged won't be able to access this remarkable thing called 'personal choice', as it's not just personal. It's an economic choice. And this isn't about just about us. And that is why it is a war. We are losing territory for the women who come after us. Every the same. It is the modern-day production line pumping out time we say Yes to a plastic surgery, or Botox, or fillers, we are re-defining beauty and attractiveness at a societal level. We have outlawed aberration.

> We have not just sent a message, we have sent a directive to our daughters, and our daughter's daughters, that this is how women should look. That ageing is bad. That wrinkles are wrong. That sagging flesh must be cut or filled. We have created a new mythology of self, because that story is created by us, by what we do, now. So I implore you all, my beautiful sagging, drooping, wrinkling, ageing sisters. Stay strong. Have the courage to age with pride, and instead of augmenting your body, send a message to the women who follow, and make the change where it counts. Augment your mind. They don't call it 'plastic' surgery for no reason, girls. Don't just go for organic food. Get an organic head. And can I ask one more question: If this is a personal choice, then why aren't men doing it?



The whole island of Niu Guinea, from Sorong to Samarai, is the only place you will find the


Birds of Paradise. They are possibly the most beautiful birds in the world. And these birds are represented in the dances and songs of our people. These birds flying above lands where massacres have taken place. There is over 500,000 West Papuan deaths under the military of Indonesia, that's half a million stories to be told.

What about urban Papua New Guinea - how does that influence your music? Most of the crew in my band live in Moresby, Markham, Dadiigii, Paluai Sook Sook, so what you see on stage is urban PNG. I grew up in the city, pretty much between Darwin and PNG. Many stories there have inspired my music, like the Pagahill Art Resistance, where a settlement resisted eviction and takeover by a major real estate company. They used art to spread awareness about it and to engage and unite the young people. Moresby is one of the best places you can visit if you have the time to meet people. Once you get over the fear factor about 'rascals' and actually connect with real people and places you will find it's one of the most beautiful and fascinating places, and a pretty successful multicultural city. The settlements are not just breeding grounds for crime, but some like Pagahill are more like urban villages, with their own system of family and community, from which some of our region's most talented and creative minds are emerging

What should we expect for your performance at Boomerang? Penis gourds and phallic dances, headhunters and cannibals. Ha-ha, not really. PNG: they call it Land of the Unexpected.

Something in the Airileke



LIVING IN MELBOURNE, BUT A MORESBY BOY AT HEART, PNG-BORN AIRILEKE BRINGS HIS MIX OF TRADITIONAL MUSIC AND RHYTHMS, HIGH-END PRODUCTION AND EVERYTHING IN BETWEEN TO BOOMERANG THIS OCTOBER LONG WEEKEND.

Airileke, could you tell me a little about your cultural heritage? My family come from Gabagaba village in Central Province PNG. Gabagaba village itself goes back about 18 generations. Our ancestral people are the Koiari from the foothills of the Kokoda Track. Gabagaba literally means 'Drum Drum' – our people were drummers and dancers and the village became the grounds for ceremonies and big dances in Tok Pisin called 'Sing Sing'.

Can you tell me how that influences the music that you produce? I have many influences ... from traditional music to reggae, hip-hop, electronic, krump, orchestral, Indian, whatever. But for my own music everything stems from the roots. The drum from my village is called Gaba. It's like the kick drum in a band... it holds everything together, the heartbeat, which keeps all the other parts of the body working in synchronisation and connected in the one flow.

I am also influenced by traditional music from other parts of PNG and the Pacific, like Garamut from Manus Province and Sepik Province, the Kwakumba flutes of the highlands, and chants from Markham Valley. I grew up with all of these musics and have been playing them pretty much my whole life. Unfortunately the traditional music of my own village of Gabagaba is close to extinction now; not many of my generation know how to dance the old traditional ways. The peroveta style of Sing Sing – which was introduced by Polynesian missionaries – and string band music pretty much took over from the old traditional Gabagaba dances in the past 50 years or so. So I am really inspired by people like my Bubu Billy, who are some of the last songmen of the old precolonial era. Bubu Billy taught me traditional music, and his music and the spirit of our ancestry is an influence on the way I think

about music and relate to other music.

All log drumming of the Pacific inspires me. While growing up I was fascinated by the stories of how the log drums have travelled around the Pacific over the centuries. I lived in Rarotonga for a little while and learnt about Cook Island drumming, then I learnt about Tahitian drumming while I was in Hawaii.

What are the sounds or beats that you keep going back to? Heavy beats, usually.

Garamut drums, 808 kicks, Kundu, Warups, all the sounds of Melanesia mixed with MPC, basically. I like rootsy sounds that have some kind of story to them. I don't usually sample much vinyl anymore; I usually sample recordings I've made myself in the islands and use them in the MPC so the samples themselves are part of the story.

Is it possible to tell the story of a region like West Papua with a soundscape? Yes, and we need to tell that story. But there are so many stories to be told. There are so many sides to West Papua. It is such a complex, beautiful yet violent, and unique place that you could never give the full story with a soundscape. But perhaps you can communicate a feeling, a sense of beauty clashing with

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Review: The Local Wildlife by Robert Drewe

This delightful assortment of short stories captures unerringly the diversity of the northern rivers region and its inhabitants. It is a perfect bedside table collection as each of the stories is a racy three to four pages and each encapsulates perfectly the character of the particular form of wildlife it seeks to portray.

Robert Drewe strikes a gently satirical tone as he depicts the offbeat behaviour and habits of the human inhabitants of this corner of New South Wales. We can delight in his encounters as he describes such events as the dinner party at which he learns that the former occupant of his house had run a tantric brothel and had greeted dinner guests recumbent on her table naked but for a coating of chocolatedotted strawberries. We are fascinated and appalled by his visitors from the south: one sporting rampant pubic hair, henceforth hilariously named by his family as Priscilla, and another favouring budgie smugglers, silver neck chains and a 'pierced 50-year-old male nipple."


Drewe continues to surprise the reader as an endless variety of quirky characters are revealed in the most unexpected of circumstances.

Reading the stories is like viewing a series of highly apt cartoons whose details depict subtleties and, at times, a poignancy belied by the light tone. I could not resist, having read stories titled Brendan's Bride (1) and Brendan's Bride (2), sneaking a peek at Brendan's Bride (3) and (4) just to check that all was well with Brendan. Drewe is unerring in his portrayal of the wide range of people who have settled and who continue to be drawn to this area.

The reader can delight in all manner of hilarious encounters with people



from all walks of life from hippy sculptors to professional beach wormers: a veritable passing parade of eccentricity appearing in one anecdote after another. Drewe's deftness and apparent ease in depicting his subjects and their conversation at times provoked spontaneous outbursts of laughter in this reader. As a fellow North Coaster I recognised in his sketches behaviour and situations familiar to locals.



It is not only the human inhabitants Drewe paints so vividly but the wildlife from ants and dung beetles and toads to a neighbour's pet camel about which the said neighbour is mysteriously reticent. All are depicted with a fascinating selection of offbeat detail and even at times scientific analysis.

The festivals, pastimes and customs peculiar to the area receive attention also. A devotee of the inevitably rain-sodden blues and roots festival may be surprised to learn that Casino Beef Week, the Bangalow Show and a local rodeo also rate as highlights on the northern rivers calendar. Drewe describes their features and the participants with equal accuracy and perceptiveness. He does so with what seems to this reader to be a

genuine warmth and empathy for his subjects and a cheerful acceptance, if puzzlement, at their odd choices and habits.

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A further appealing aspect of this collection is Drewe's small revelations about his own family life. His interactions with his daughter as they discuss the possible origins of the names for Ladyfinger and Cavendish bananas; their shared observation of Eddie the echidna and his attempts to break 'Hollywood's stranglehold on his daughter's entertainment' are delivered in the same entertaining manner.

Drewe is not shy of directing the spotlight on his own moments of bemusement and even discomfort in the face of some situations. Even occasions such as those described in 'Thespian Activity' and 'Australia Day' which could provoke intense irritation in others appears to treat with a wry shrug and self-deprecating humour.

His own personality and approach to writing this particular light-hearted collection weaves its way

through all his encounters and has contributed to creating what is not merely a selection of anecdotes about 'characters I have met' but a most entertaining and insightful representation of life in this region. A thoroughly enjoyable read for locals and visitors alike.



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



Mr Wigg

Mr Wigg is an enchanting new novel by Queensland author Inga Simpson. Set in 1971, the story takes place on Mr Wigg's farm in southwest NSW. Here he grows a range of stone fruit, listens to the cricket on the radio, bakes with his grandchildren, reminisces about his life and works hard on a secret project.

'Mr Wigg had squandered his life', reads the first line of the book. And for some it might seem so. He has led a quiet life on the farm with his wife, Mrs Wigg, who died a few years ago. He has no great achievements to show for himself, just his orchard and his family. His son thinks it's time he moved into town.

But Mr Wigg has a special relationship with all the fruit trees in his orchard and each has its own personality and quirky ways. The younger trees, the peaches and nectarines, tend

A much darker tale comes from the pen of Christie Thompson. Endorsed by *The Slap* author Christos Tsolkias, *Snake Bite* takes

place over a a blazing hot summer in Canberra's outer suburbs. It's a Canberra few are familiar with, outside the city. *Think Puberty Blues* 2013 style, but grittier, more sinister and vastly more dangerous. This is impressive writing

from a young urban dweller: muscular, fierce and confident. Christie lives in Canberra where she teaches Creative Writing at the Canberra Institute of Technology. She knows that of which she speaks! The star of the story is Jez,

She tells the story in Gen Z lingo, but while the setting and life is bleak, the humour is startling and brilliant, the observations fresh. This is a coming-of-age story with a difference and heralds the arrival on the scene of a strong clear voice. Fledgling writers, take note. Christie participates in marquee sessions on Saturday.

Long immersed in the creative writing scene is Inga Simpson, whose book *Mr Wigg* is reviewed

towards silliness, while the older trees are wiser but sometimes impatient. Rhubarb, meanwhile, is characterised by a lack of manners. 'Rhubarb's speech was crude, and muted by soil.'


Things even get a bit saucy in spring, when the pears and apples get taunted by the trees which don't need cross-pollination. 'His books didn't have much to say on the sexuality of fruit trees. Mr Wigg figured it was best to keep quiet until the storm of pollen had settled.' Who knew that life on an orchard could be so intriguing?

Simpson tells us the story of an ordinary man in an extraordinary way, casting a light on the little events that make up a life. Whether it is meeting Mrs Wigg at a dance, making strawberry tarts with the children or telling mythical and magical tales about fruit, each moment is beautifully rendered. The outside world intrudes from time to time; his neighbour's son is drafted for the here. The book celebrates the small, simple things and is set in rural NSW in the summer of 1971. Inga has a PhD in Creative Writing and a Masters in Australian Literature. *Mr Wigg* is, quite simply, beautiful. It chronicles the last year of life for Mr Wigg, living out his days on what's left of his family farm. The seeming simplicity of the work belies the great craft that has gone into its creation. This is a hymn to the natural world and an uncomplicated way of life. Listen to Inga discuss its creation on Saturday and Sunday.

Finally, it would be impossible to be a fiction reader in Australia this year and not have heard of or encountered the remarkable Hannah Kent. Subject of a gripping ABC TV's Australian Story recently, Hannah and her debut novel Burial Rites have together taken the book world by storm with what would appear to be an unlikely topic: the story of the last person to be executed in Iceland, in 1830. The novel won the inaugural Australian Unpublished Manuscript Award and Hannah was subsequently mentored by Geraldine Brooks. The result is stupendously good writing and compelling narrative. Said Jeni Caffin, 'Burial Rites genuinely took my breath away. I am keenly looking forward to welcoming Hannah to Byron Bay. I guarantee it won't be her last visit to the Festival'. Hear her story on Friday and Sunday.

Play-offs loom for hot and cold Devils after derby victory

With thirty seconds remaining in Sunday's NRRRL clash between Byron Bay and Mullumbimby, the PA announced that the Red Devils' prop, Michael Lambert, could return to the field. He'd been binned for giving the ref lip. To nobody's surprise, Lambert declined the invitation. Like the rest of us, he just wanted to go home. It was that sort of game.

As local derbies go, the anticipated blood and thunder was minimal. Neither was the outcome at any time in serious doubt. Despite the urgings from the disgruntled mob on the eastern hill, it ended not with a bang but a whimper.

Under a cloudy sky and before an estimated 4,411 partisans, Byron ran out winners by 34–10, leaving them precariousl perched on the edge of the top five, but with their

fate in their own hands. Mullum's season was gone before kick-off and their performance, though never disinterested, betrayed a creeping futility. Neither side was at full strength, which also detracted from the occasion.

But any thought of a comeback was dispelled when the Devils produced the try of the match.

Chris 'the Soul Man' Coleman charged into the ruck like a man who knows he has only one burst left in him before he calls for the nurse. King was on his shoulder to take an exquisite off-load and take the cross-country route to the distant corner. He got there with brilliant speed and evasiveness.

Young winger Rex Sheavils was rewarded with a fourpointer before King grubbered and re-gathered to close the book on a game of only sporadic hostilities.

Housing policy 'must be election priority'

In the lead-up to the federal election, the Urban Development Institute of Australia (UDIA) is calling on all major political parties to detail how they intend to make housing more affordable for all Australians. UDIA national president Julie Katz said Australia was facing a severe shortage of affordable housing because of sustained low levels of housing production. 'The situation is critical,' she said.

'Constrained greenfield land supply, poor planning, inadequate investment in infrastructure, and a number of unfair and inequitable taxes are suppressing activity in the housing industry, and are all contributing to the affordability problem.

'But this can be solved through better planning, smarter regulation, more infrastructure funding, and a fairer tax system. This will relieve the stress on household budgets, improve economic growth and productivity, and provide a brighter future for our kids.

As highlighted in the recent CommSec State of the States Report and also outlined in recent RBA minutes, a vibrant housing sector will be vital for the on-going growth of Australian economy, particularly as the mining boom winds down.

UDIA has identified four key actions that the incoming federal government must undertake as a matter of priority.

- Deliver infrastructure to support our growing population;
- Deliver affordable housing now, for

present and future generations;

- Create a stronger economy and more jobs through a fairer taxation system; • Cut red tape.
- According to UDIA, the quality of life in Australia's cities and towns is 'under threat'.
- 'For many, the great Australian dream is fleeting, as the ever-increasing cost of housing locks them out of home ownership forever. Others are struggling to access housing altogether, putting family budgets under stress, and people's futures at risk. But it doesn't have to be this way. The association suggests government take action by.
- Exploring new ways to finance infrastructure at the local level by leveraging funding with private-sector investment, and establishing a National Infrastructure Fund (as outlined in the Urban Coalition's 'New Deal for Urban Australia':

- Establishing an inter-governmental agreement on local infrastructure charges to ensure that developer costs are benchmarked around the country and made public

· Encouraging state and territory govern-

ments to phase out stamp duty on property purchases over a 5-year period;

• Broadening the base of the GST, which

- will assist states to phase out stamp duties;
- Including developer levies in GST cost base calculations to improve housing

affordability;

• Directing the Productivity Commission to undertake a national benchmarking project to identify development bottlenecks in state and territory planning systems.

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Backlash



In a further move to ensure Byron Bay's library patrons have access to the works of visiting authors, Writers' Festival director Jeni Caffin has donated a large collection of the titles that will be under the microscope at the festival. Friends of the Library (FOL) will supplement the collection in an attempt at having all writers represented. FOL will also be raffling a threeday festival pass to the 2014 festival at this year's fest and at the farmers market on Thursday.

As with state election lawand-order auctions, the asylum seeker 'debate' has ramped up into a sick-making contest as to who can appear the 'toughest' at protecting our borders. At least former PM Malcolm Fraser has shown compassion for refugees and suggested a regional processing centre in Indonesia, before people consider getting into dodgy boats, run by both Australia and the UN. It would probably entail throwing a lot of money and diplomacy at the Indonesian government, but it's certainly better than throwing individuals - charged with no criminal offences, mind you - into

indefinite detention in hastily-assembled bush camps in countries ill-equipped to deal with their own economic problems.

A court ruling in Melbourne has cast doubt on police powers to randomly pull over motorists. Magistrate Duncan Reynolds ruled that 'there is no common law power vested in police giving them the unfettered right to stop or detain a person and seek identification details'. This does not apply to random breath testing, however, and it might be some time before the ruling has any effect on the NSW constabulary unless some arrested person tests it in court.

At least Byron Shire Council hasn't had to contend with loud dinosaurs - unless youcount some property developers - but on the Sunshine Coast Clive Palmer's application to install animated dinsoaur models in his resort got the go-ahead despite residents' objections, including concerns about noise from roaring dinosaurs. One of the conditions of approval is limiting noise emissions to five decibels above the background noise level.
