Robert Badalotti aims for 'most sustainable retail development in Australia'

Electric vehicle charging facilities, grey-water systems and solar panels are just a few of the proposed features for Byron Bay's Jonson Street cinema and shopping complex redevelopment.

It's a major turn-around for Azzura International Constructions, headed by QLD-based developer Robert Badalotti. Residents, with the help of some councillors, previously fought off plans for a large-scale Dan Murphy's and a KFC on his property, located at the southern end of the Woolies plaza.

And the last plans submitted for the redevelopment of the entire site also caused concerns for not keeping with the town's character.

But project manager Julie Nutting says they are now aiming to create 'the most environmentally sustainable retail development in Australia.'

'We have consulted extensively with Byron Council and the Northern Rivers Design Advisory Panel members to develop a design that we hope Byron can embrace,' Ms Nutting said. 'It has been a great experience and the input from the Design Advisory Panel has been integral to the development of plans that can truly reflect the Byron Bay character,' she said.

While Council's public submissions recently closed for the Mercato on Byron proposal, Ms Nutting says community feedback is still welcome at www.mercatoonbyron.com.au and they are keen to engage with the community on the development.

The proposal would see a major facelift for the area, and includes

eight cinemas, a bowling alley, a 180m2 central art gallery, a 'park style' external meeting place and visual/performing arts area, 324 undercover car parks over two levels and 104 bicycle parking spaces.

A subtropical design is a complete overhaul of an earlier scheme for the site, says Ms Nutting, and 'comes in response to community feedback and extensive consultation, including a full-day design charette.'

Ms Nutting says they are aiming for a 'family friendly community recreation venue, not just a retail space.' The street frontage will receive 'a significant makeover,' she says, 'with plans for 50 new trees and new planter boxes creating a green boulevard and entry park.'

'The planting and planned public art will make a significant improvement to Jonson Street's amenity and we are seeking further community feedback in relation to the art opportunities,' Ms Nutting said.

Ms Nutting says Azzura would be commissioning local artists to create artwork 'across the development which reflects the Byron Bay culture, creating a sense of vibrancy, fun, relaxation and understated coastal coolness.'

'We're looking for works to be integrated into seats, pavements and feature walls, and for a feature piece on the Jonson Street frontage,' she said. While parking will be metered, it will be free for the first two hours, she says. 'This is designed to limit long-term parking and ensure there are convenient spaces for visitors to the centre and broader precinct.'

All north coast councils now reject gas mining

Richmond Valley Council Shire (RVC) has now joined every other north coast council in opposing unconventional gas mining and fracking in their region.

Applause erupted from a packed gallery at last week's RVC meeting after councillors passed the motion (mayor Ernie Bennett and Cr Col Sullivan voted against).

The turnaround in Council's stand on gas mining is significant, given Richmond Council previously threatened Bentley blockade protesters with illegal camping.

Much of the push against protesters came from RVC's general manager John Walker. But a June meeting saw unanimous support for Council to review the policy.

Recently the community of Codrington celebrated a survey which saw 93 per cent vote to remain gasfield free.

In related news, the state government is reportedly negotiating with Metgasco over a possible compensation payout following the suspension of Metgasco's Bentley drilling licence, near Lismore. Also, Tweed Shire Councillors voted last week 5–1 (Cr Youngblutt against) to install CSG-Free signs on existing entry and locality signs around Tweed. And this Sunday, residents of Hayters Hill, Coopers Shoot and surrounds will gather to celebrate their gasfield survey completion. This will mark the completion of all gasfield free surveys in the Byron Shire.

Mullumbimby sculpture walk plans up before Council

The creation of permanent public art sculpture walk at Brunswick Terrace, Mullumbimby, is on Council's agenda for the upcoming August 28 meeting.

An entry sculpture is proposed next to the scout hall comprising telegraph poles painted in various colours, which would then lead onto 12 further sculptures along 450 metres of the pathways. Malcolm Price from Creative Mullumbimby is one of the team that is pushing the idea, and says the art would provide ecological, cultural and historic references to Mullumbimby. 'In Mullum, we have a number of stories that we tell about ourselves; one is that we are a creative community and another is that we have a rich history. Yet in recent times, there hasn't been a lot of direct evidence of this creative culture in the public realm?

Councils 'shortchanged' by fed grants

While local governments are looking at having their operating budgets slashed by the federal government, Page MP Kevin Hogan (Lismore-based Nationals) has attempted to spruik annual grants to councils as 'committed to supporting local communities?

But Hogan's upbeat press release fails to mention that CPI to Financial Assistance Grants (FAGs) has been suspended. FAGs are no-stringsattached funding for councils to spend 'according to local priorities, including on infra-

structure, health, recreation, environment, employment and roads projects.'

> The CPI freeze will 'cut \$925 million in revenue to local government by 2017-18, according to The Australian Local Government Association (AGLA), and they have demanded it be reinstated immediately. Locally, mayor Simon Richardson confirmed that Council will have a budget shortfall, 'as we budgeted for the usual rise in accordance with CPI. With a freeze, in real terms we will get less,' he

told The Echo. He says that assuming everything else remains the same, Council will be down \$28,000 in 2014/2015.

'Over the next four years this impact will compound and it is estimated to cost Council \$264,200, Cr Richardson said.

When asked how cuts to NSW council budgets is committing 'to supporting local communities,' Mr Hogan's media spokesperson replied that councils are receiving no less than they did under the former Labor government.

Plans for Bangalow motel and townhouse

Plans for a significant development next to the Bangalow Bowling Club are underway, which would include an 18unit two-storey motel, a twostorey manager's residence and four townhouses also two storeys in height.

But for the development to gain approval on the vacant land, Council's Byron Local Environmental Plan 2014 (LEP) would need to be amended and the land rezoned; currently the land is zoned RE2 Private Recrea-

tion, according to Council's upcoming agenda.

That decision will come before councillors this Thursday, and while Council staff recommend the LEP amendment and rezoning, they say the council should also forward the planning proposal to the NSW government for a 'Gateway' determination.

A similar gateway decision is expected soon from the NSW Department of Planning and Infrastructure on the land that surrounds the pro-

posed Byron Central Hospital.

Staff claim the development would fall under the Bangalow Settlement Strategy 2003 requirements, as the strategy 'acknowledges tourism as an increasing contributor to the Bangalow village.'

Staff support

The staff report also states, 'The subject site is of low environmental value given that it is largely clear of native vegetation and formerly used as netball courts?

understanding that you cannot lie to watchdogs, such as the PIC and ICAC, without consequences.

'The only promise that is required for them [at the PIC or ICAC] is that they tell the truth.' People would continue lying to commissions, she said, unless there was a 'large stick' hanging over them and they knew if they got caught they would go to jail.

It comes after Diehm, 49, was hauled before the PIC in October 2011 to answer questions about a drugfuelled boys' weekend on Queensland's Gold Coast the year before. Diehm initially denied ever consuming drugs but eventually admitted he had. He pleaded guilty to two counts of giving false information in relation to this.

However, he claimed he did not lie to the PIC when he claimed he 'didn't remember' seeing other former and serving cops use drugs that weekend. Ms Skinner rejected this, saying there was no medical evidence to explain his selective memory failure.

Fluoride dosing plants move closer Luis Feliu

Fluoridation of the water supply to Lismore and Ballina moved a step closer last week after the award of the tender to build four dosing plants was accepted.

Rous Water announced that four plants are planned for Clunes, Corndale, Dorrougby and Knockrow, with the state health department to cover the initial cost of around \$2.7 million. The vote by Rous Water councillors to award the tender was carried 4-3. Chair of Rous Water, Cr Sue Meehan, told ABC North Coast the project was costly due to Byron Shire Council's decision to opt out of the plan.

Anti-fluoride campaigner Al Oshlack meanwhile told ABC North Coast he would continue to fight the plans.

He said the argument by pro-fluoride supporters was that it was given as a therapy to stop tooth cavities.

If that was the case, he argued, then fluoride would be a medicine requiring a licence from the Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA).

NSW Business Chamber not informed over govt's plans for 'two votes for business' bill

The NSW Business Chamber joins the state's peak body representing local government (LGNSW) in being left in the dark by the NSW Shooters & Fishers Party and the coalition over Sydney's CBD voting reforms.

The City of Sydney Amendment (Elections) Bill 2014 has been widely criticised for advocating that businesses receive two votes, giving them a greater say in local elections. Typically such a move is considered to be a gerrymander.

'Giving business a voice' is the catchphrase, and supporters such as local MP Don Page (Nationals) say that it would remove 'significant bureaucratic barriers' and allow businesses to remain enrolled.

The legislation includes provisions for the scheme to be rolled out state-wide, and has the full support of the NSW Business Chamber.

But the Chamber's policy manager Luke Aitken confirmed with The Echo that the legislation came as a surprise to his organisation. He backed calls by executive director of the Sydney Business Chamber, Patricia Forsythe, saying the government needs to justify the 'two vote' proposal.

'The Local Government Act has always provided a mechanism for non-residents to vote in council elections,' he said. 'The principle behind this, however, is one person one vote. If you live in the city of Sydney and also have a business in the city, you can only vote as a resident.

'If your business is in the city of Sydney and you live in Bondi (ie Waverley LGA), you can vote in the city of Sydney as a non-resident business owner and in Waverley as a resident.' When asked how such a program would work

across regional areas, he said that it's a 'little too soon to say exactly how things would roll out across the state, but simplifying the enrolment process for non-residents (who are currently required to re-enrol at each local government election) by implementing a permanent roll (so they enrol once and stay on the roll like other electors) would need to be a feature?

But the Bill is also mired in politically motivated; ICAC recently heard disgraced Liberal MP Chris Hartcher explain that his former staffer Tim Koelma was preparing 'a local government strategy in relationship to the City of Sydney?

Mayor opposed

Meanwhile, Byron Shire mayor Simon Richardon will seek councillor support at Thursday's meeting to oppose the bill. He is calling for Council to 'commit to the basic democratic principle of "one-person one-vote" in local government elections, and if supported, he will express Council's concerns to government heads and parliamentary representatives.

Match economic growth with social equity: Swan

Of course Wayne thinks there is no 'budget emergency'.

A real budget emergency was during the 2008 global economic collapse, when he was federal treasurer.

It's Sunday and there's a small crowd gathered in the Community Centre to hear Labor stalwart Wayne Swan talk - it was also the launch of his new book, The Good Fight, a memoir of his six years in perhaps the second most important job in Australia.

As expected, there was much ridicule of the current Abbott government.

'It's absurd that this government is out there with this language of "lifters and leaners," he told the audience.

'It's straight out of an Ayn Rand novel! They are lunatics.'

Wayne's main narrative of course centres around the measures implemented to stave off the 2008 global crash: guaranteed bank deposits and the stimulus packages to name a few.

Whatever was done, it worked because we were virtually unscathed while other western countries dipped into recession. Was Wayne just really, really lucky? While the mining boom could have been mentioned, Wyane reckons it was the first stimulus package that did it.

He briefly touches on his unwavering belief in Keynesian economic theory. 'We went into deficit not because of the stimulus spending, but because of revenue write downs,' he said. 'You go into deficit; you spend and you restore confidence. Jobs come back, the economy starts to stabilise and then grow again.'

Of all the developed countries in the last 100 years, he said, 'we have done a better job of matching economic growth with social equity.

'The attack that came upon us [in government from Murdoch and big business] is about dismantling that.

'It's about shifting the tax burden from the big corporates onto the average people. And in the middle of all that there's not enough room to spend money on quality edu-

Question time on steroids

It's that time of year again which political junkies love and state politicians in power hate: the annual NSW budget estimates.

Before the eyes glaze over, it's worth pointing out that it's a rare opportunity to witness our elected ministers and unelected senior public servants squirm under questioning from their political opponents, away from the noise of parliament.

The setting is intimate – they sit opposite each other over tables in a small room – and it's all streamed live, online.

Expenditure, performance and departmental effectiveness are all on the table. Awkward? You bet. And yes, incredibly boring at times due to incredibly boring MPs and bureaucrats.

It requires great stamina to persevere, as those with a dull tone may in fact be attempting to deflect all manner of inadequacies and questionable conduct.

Take Treasury's inquiry on Friday, starring 40-year old newbie Andrew Constance (Liberal) and his bureaucratic sidekick.

Treasurer Constance sat mostly with chin in in hand, staring with pure contempt and disdain at Labor and Greens MPs as they asked him questions. Didn't everyone know who he thought he was?

And in the background, Liberal MP and Lennox Head local, Catherine Cusack, continually interjected with shrill indignation at the questions. She was told to 'shut up' on more than one occasion.

Besides mindless politicking – did we learn anything?

Shadow minister for the environment Luke Foley seized on comments by NSW environment minister Rob Stokes, who apparently flubbed his government's policy on meeting a declared target of 20 per cent renewable energy by 2020.

'The minister was confused as to whether the state even has a 20 per cent renewable energy target or whether only the Commonwealth's target applies,' Foley said. 'The *NSW Liberals & Nationals Plans to Boost Renewable Energy* policy, released before the 2011 NSW election, clearly states their intention to 'provide a blueprint to increase the proportion of energy from seven per cent to meet the target of 20 per cent renewable energy consumption by 2020.'

Meanwhile there were no surprises that health minister Jillian Skinner (Liberal) supports the federal government's \$7 GP co-payment policy, which has been roundly criticised by doctors, nurses and the Australian Medical Association. Shadow health minister Dr Andrew McDonald claims Ms Skinner has not commissioned economic modelling on its impact.

And proposed large-scale Crown lands legislation which would give state bureaucrats almost total control of public lands seems to be on indefinite hold, after minister for lands, Kevin Humphries, told the committee that there was 'a lot of interest in it.'

'There will need to be a focused response from certain sectors of the community that have a significant stakeholding in Crown land. We have received 650 submissions... we might have to go back to some of those sectors for more consultation.'

And lastly – not included in budget estimates – was the bizarre revelation that minister for primary Industries, Katrina Hodgkinson (Nationals), read a joint AGL/Dairy Connect press release to answer a question about the ability of coal seam gas to coexist with the dairy industry. Greens Jeremy Buckingham, who asked the question, called her an industry mouthpiece. In typical tit-fortat schoolyard fashion, Buckingham was then labelled by the minister as 'anti-mining, anti-agriculture and anti-development.'

Yes, the political tide is at an incredibly low ebb – thankfully

Islam's silent majority drowned out

This take on Islamic perspectives was published in TheConversation.com on August 22

Stretching from north Africa to east Asia, many Muslims are engaged in a life-and-death tussle with extremists who are bent on extinguishing the diversity of opinions within the Muslim community.

Atrocities perpetrated by so-called Islamists grab the headlines: Boko Haram and slavery markets, the genocide of minorities and videotaped executions of westerners by Islamic State (IS) militants.

In addition to these atrocities, more mundane human rights violations are routinely carried out by theocratic regimes in Saudi Arabia and Iran. But what about the rest of

the Islamic community? Why have their voices remained unheard?

Incorrect generalisations and minimisation of Muslims are offered up in explanation of every new terrorist atrocity.

However, the reality is different from this perception: there exists more than one Islamic faith.

Islam is an umbrella term, which covers multiple differences within the religion.

While Muslims hold similar beliefs concerning Allah, the prophet Muhammad, and the holy Quran, a wide diversity exists when it comes to the details and interpretation of religious doctrines. Tunisian Muslim scholar Abdul Majid al-Sharafi described this phenomenon as the 'municipality of Islam'.

Diversity of opinion is not a recent feature of Islam; evidence of broad shades of opinion can be traced back to its origins. But today the global Salafist movement, funded greatly by the Saudi regime and other sources, has great mosques, institutes, universities and schools. Its strong organisation and powerful media outlets enable them to publicly occupy most of the Muslim world and parts of Muslim communities in the west.

The Quran is typically cited as the ultimate source of terrorism and extremism among Muslims. This inaccuracy is based on cherry-picking selected verses; favourable words are accentuated while contradictory verses are ignored.

The reality is that the Quran

- like the Bible and many other sacred books – uses religious language that is open to multiple interpretations. Many verses that could be seen as motivating violence can also be found in the Bible.

Muslims, like Jews and Christians, have a variety of interpretations of these texts.

The word *jihad*, for example, is understood by Sufist Muslims as an esoteric term for fighting the evil instincts inside the human soul to gain ethical virtue.

Muslim scholars are also not in agreement on the authority of the holy text. Salafists claim that the apparent meaning of the Quran must be followed. Other schools of thought believe that this very simplistic view collides with the long historical distance between the revelation of the Quran and today, which makes the interpretation of the Quran difficult and requiring great expertise. Many Muslim scholars, such as Nasr Hamid Abu Zaid, Muhammad Arkoun, Abdol Karim Soroush and Mujtahid Shabistari, believe that the Quran is not the words of Allah directly, but rather is the expression of Muhammad from his spiritual experience.

For Muslims, this opinion opens the door for criticism of holy text and allows them to not obey parts of the Quran that are considered historical and not belonging to the core of Islam.

The same situation exists

in dealing with Islamic history and tradition. For example, many Muslims do not consider the Islamic conquests that occurred after Muhammad as a religious action and criticise them strongly.

When people hear the term *sharia law*, what springs to mind are images of beheading, stoning, lashing and amputations in the name of Islam.

While these do form a small part of sharia, again there exists a wide diversity of interpretations of sharia law among Muslims. Sharia law includes the religious lifestyle of Muslims in both personal and social spheres. A significant part of it is acts of worship, personal status law and other regulations, including dietary restrictions concerning food and drink.

Sharia's most controversial element is the Islamic punishment law, which not all Muslims agree on. Some Muslim sects such as Ismailism believe that sharia law is no longer valid.

For them, sharia is just the ethical principles of Islam, which are mostly the same as other religions.

Many other scholars, not just today but even in the first centuries of Islam, believe that wide sections of sharia are not essential parts of Islam and can be disregarded – just as happened with the Jewish Torah, which is not dissimilar to its Islamic equivalent.

The traditional Shi'ite opinion is that their imams have banned the political and juridical parts of sharia, and noone has the authority to revive these laws today.

What is agreed is that an overwhelming majority of the Muslim population has nothing to do with terrorism.

However, they are under pressure from small but powerful extremist groups and religious regimes. The silent majority of Muslims therefore shouldn't be blamed for these people; they are instead victims of radical Islam themselves.

Islam should not be considered from the perspective of fundamentalism as, in the end, this will strengthen the extremists' position. Rather, it should be understood by opening a dialogue, supporting and co-operating with the moderates who offer a different understanding of Islam.

The AHS identifies large areas of Council-owned land around Mullum as worth investigating for that. Much of it is floodprone, however, and not so suitable for caravan parks, but cabins raised above the flood level would

In MHEs the dwellings have to be mostly made off site. Fortunately, the strategy identified as potentially available for affordable housing the Council works depot in Coolamon Scenic Drive, with sheds probably big enough to build them in. Given that Council owns the land, that could be of great benefit to the whole community and Council. Perhaps we could also do a professionally supervised fair work-for-thedole project to produce them. Of course it's all way more complicated than that, but... Jed Stuart

■ I don't know why Hans Lovejoy suggested in relation to the Butler Street bypass last week that Council may not have given 'proper' consideration to a cost-benefit analysis of the proposal. Quite clearly Council has undertaken no consideration of the analysis whatsoever; the GM has indeed made it clear that even he hasn't seen one.

Mr Gainger is being evasive when he suggests that 'Council does not currently have the financial resources to build the... bypass. Accordingly it has put a proposition to the government that it should fund the bypass.' This might give readers the idea that because it is the government's money which will build the bypass, it is up to the government to do the cost-benefit analysis, nothing to do with Council.

The problem for Mr Gainger here is twofold. Firstly, Council has already collected \$2.75 million in bypass levies, which it clearly must spend on the bypass. Secondly, governments never give grants for 100 per cent of any project.

Mr Gainger's press release also suggests that there is no problem with failing to put any kind of cost-benefit analysis to the elected councillors before they voted. Nice try, Ken. The fact is that you have left Council open to a legal challenge. Your off-therecord admission that Council never properly considered the railway option only serves to increase Council's legal vulnerability (duh).

I will withhold any legal challenge until we know whether Roads & Maritime Services agrees to release its analysis, whether that document is then made available for wider scrutiny, and whether Council then agrees to reconsider its position. I'm not holding my breath; Mr Gainger has already floated two reasons why the document might not be made available: it is a 'ministerial briefing' document and it 'belongs' to the RMS. I may have to obtain it via the subpoena process.

Regardless of what is or is not done with that particular document, in my opinion Mr Gainger had and has fiduciary responsibility to give councillors such an analysis, even if Council has to prepare one itself. Meanwhile I will file a Code of Conduct complaint against the GM for not giving councillors sufficient information to perform their functions.

This will of course meet with the same response as the last one I filed against him over Splendour noise issues: denial, obfuscation, assertions that, 'it was all a misunderstanding', etc.

The current private appropriation of a public good is reinforced by the Bank of International Settlements (BIS) in Geneva, which decrees all European states must borrow privately and cannot exceed three per cent deficit, effectively consigning weaker

This damage caused by the dumping of slurry will result, in among other things, turbid water, killing of coral (needs light to photosynthesise and feed), dugongs, turtles, fish and other marine species. It will further contribute to acidification of ocean and more greenhouse gases.

Along with this the Great Barrier Reef has already significantly declined, according to scientists, in the last five years, quite possibly due to a similar port at Hay Point, near Gladstone.

It may be over the border, but it would be great if we could muster as much momentum to this potentially tragic issue as we have seen in this area regarding objection to coal seam gas mining.

I urge anyone concerned to act to stop this. Sign petitions, write to the minister for environment Greg Hunt and the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Authority. Do whatever you can to put a halt to this flabbergasting madness.

Writing the wrongs

Over the years I've been asked about the process of critique, I've had people curious as to how I sum up a dish, a restaurant or an experience in a few fleeting words.

Translating an experience of any kind can be a difficult task at times; for example I watched our own Russell Crowe in his latest role in *Noah* last night... Perhaps I should have been working instead; the story was not engrossing, the direction was dated at best and the subject matter was treated like a cross between Transformers and a Bible class. See – that wasn't hard, was it? Probably, though I'm not sure, the consensus would have my opinions in its corner; however, what about the director and our very own Russ? Do you think they'd love this review? I dare say they wouldn't.

Most people may think it, some people may speak it and a few folks are entrusted to judge it; in the case of *Noah* – movie critics and a load of home critics too. These days everyone's a critic. Every Joe and Mary thinks it can be their comment that leads a fellow consumer to righteousness and the way forward – and they'd be right. Just take a look around: Trip Advisor, Urban Spoon and the list goes on. What the home critic may not realise though, is that sometimes you can't really critique fairly based on a momentary experience. Perhaps there should be a balance? Anyhow, the reality is that the online world feeds on passing comments. Those writing the comments are directing some folk away from, or into, a business without perhaps thinking that, if their comment were actually taken seriously, it may add a destructive punch that can break those businesses.

Here's my checklist if you're a critique enthusiast.

No 1: Give credit where credit's due

Don't slam people and businesses unnecessarily. They (or you) may be having a bad day. Unforeseen circumstances are abundant in the world of business so if you don't know the place well, breathe and hold off seeking revenge online. Next time you're doing an online review, remember that sometimes you can black-mark a place that is, nine times out of ten, okay. Often you have to look to your own mood first and check that you're not acting-out. In my first eatery, we'd compete to turn nasty customers around; the first to do it received a bonus of \$20. It nearly always worked. I'm not suggesting that a customer should have to turn their waiter around; I'm just counselling a little temperance. Hold it 'til you have another try or have a look at the positive aspects, if there are none and the place is full of people then leave them to their own demise.

No 2: If it's that bad don't bother

I've had a firm policy throughout my years as a critic – if it's that bad, I don't write it. If I'm feeling generous I'll let the owner know what went wrong through an anonymous email. If I'm looking for a story, I'll return on a different day/night and try it again. If still predominantly bad, I won't waste my money or time again. The standard review gets a few constructive comments that I feel may serve them if they were shared. Sometimes you won't win either way – I've had the most generous reviews slammed by the business owners, simply because they don't accept any honesty in regards to their business. Remember that it's fair and reasonable to expect people to be too close to their own



baby. What's provided by the internet is a sense of anonymity and access to instant revenge – use it humanely and, if you can, with balance, and remember your comments can have consequences for you as well.

No 3: Go to where the action is

Ask around if you're not familiar with an area or cuisine. Locals provide an endless list of off-mainstream and favourite spots. That way you'll have a better chance at starting off on the right foot, in an experience sense.

Leaving it up to the gods can lead us back to Noah and his questionable judgments.

Stop the train, I want to get off.

I make it no secret that Japanese cuisine is one of my favourites. It's a food that's mostly light, it's generally made with energy, veneration and a respect that's inherent in the Japanese culture.

When I came to this area, I started an eating affair with

the local Japanese food outlets; Sushi Wave was the first, the 'mother', the original if you like, then O-Sushi restaurant came to Byron Bay. These eateries held my attention with a consistency and quality that I appreciated (and missed) after leaving the big smoke. Now years on, I consider the fact that many of the new Japanese

from these sushi stops. Chefs from O-Sushi have set up their own places, while other familiar faces pop up all over the place: some working, some operating and others planning to. The Japanese community is rapidly growing in the Byron Shire along with our taste for their cuisine and I suppose

restaurants have been spawned after working many years to produce successful outlets for others, you'd want to stop the train and get off into your own obsession. This is a tip of the hat to the folks that thought it a good idea all those years ago, and a nod to the new Japanese eateries. Here's a selection to try if you haven't already.

-Sushi: making waves with big changes

For those who aren't yet in the know, this Japanese tour de force is one of three restaurants owned by two very smart local women. Karni Shai and Chaya Regev are those two. Karni opened the doors of O-Sushi in July 2004 with Chaya's late husband, Danny, as the original partner. After enjoying the Japanese food served in the first and original sushi in Byron Bay, 'Sushi Wave, Karni saw an opportunity to provide more of a good thing to us all. The rest is history. On Danny's early passing last year, his wife Chaya continued the partnership with Karni in the businesses. Sushi Wave later moved and

became Kinoko Sushi Bar and Restaurant, now operating on Jonson St in Byron Bay near the first roundabout.

'O-Sushi came together in 2004 and was blessed with four amazing chefs. Takayuki and Takashi, now of Doma Cafe in Federal, and also Taka Fumi and Kane now of Izakaya Yu in Mullumbimby, all worked for seven and a half years with us, Karni told me. 'They then went on their own way, firstly doing the markets and Bluesfest, then their own restaurants?

The recent renovations here were completed from start to finish in an amazing 2.5 weeks. 'It was challeng-

oma

ing and intense, Karni says. The project was designed by Mariko Miyagishima from Sydney: 'She started drawing and the plans were laid, Karni told me, 'Chaya and I, with Zuika Aloni as project manager, worked non-stop to complete the renovations in the shortest time possible'. It may have been fast, but the subtle and clean atmosphere they've created here is a credit to all involved. A fitting Japanese fitting.

The menu hasn't changed. Teriyaki with the optional base of bio-dynamic, organic local brown rice. The train pulls out plated with all the nigiri and nori you could



want. O-Sushi supports local businesses where possible - Bay Seafood supplies the fish and they themselves try to get as much local fish as possible, so occasionally you may find tuna missing from the train. Sarah Wheeler from Pure Melt Chocolate

does custom-made organic sugar-free chocolates. Max Brenner chocolates are coming too. There's a good wine selection and some serious graded sake. O-Sushi definitely looks to be on track with their latest changes.

Now, reality denotes that if something is popular and without an overly big staffing, then service may be a little slow at times. At these times, just remember that good old saying 'good things come to those who wait'. This is not to say that you'll die of old age waiting for your tucker either. A coffee from Moonshine Roasters along with good and reasonable cafe fare has the West covered. The East is well represented with temaki (nori cones) their speciality, and Japanese staples like nigiri, sashimi, and the family dish of katsudon. This dish is made normally with a schnitzel of pork atop rice. Doma has anglicised it and turned it upside down with a schnitzel of chicken on the bottom and rice on top with egg. Week-

I'm constantly hearing the 'Takas' and their team receiving warm accolades from locals. I'm sure they'd be embarrassed by such positive appraisals. I've met unassuming Japanese folk like Tetsuya Wakuda of Tetsuya's restaurant fame. He started his career washing dirty dishes in Surry Hills for another restaurateur, then opened his own place - now he's one of the world's top chefs.

are and enjoy the casual concept, hence the name Doma. I can't see a fireplace anywhere (common in a doma) but this place is connecting the community in a nice way.

Pop into this unique eastmeets-west eat-in takeaway

and you'll be confused as to whether it's going to be a hamburger day, a chook katsudon day, or perhaps the right time for some freshly sliced sashimi. This is a truly free-ranging menu.

Takashi Yaguchi and Takayuki Kuramoto are the owners, originally both from O-Sushi and both still held

in high regard by the owners of that restaurant. This early relationship inadvertently created a Japanese Eden for the local community. What exceptional choice we now enjoy in the northern rivers. Gorgeous landscapes minutes from the beaches and some of the world's best are cooking lunches and dinners right un-

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Wabi-Sabi

'It is difficult to study the universe if you only study one planet' - Miyamoto Musashi. These words are written above the drinks fridge as you walk into the Sabi restaurant in Ocean Shores. When it comes to its people, traditions and way of life, Japan is a small 'planet' that can seem a universe away from the Aussie culture. Many Japanese are now making Australia their home though, and cleverly some have chosen this neck of the woods.

This small Japanese diner is the best thing that could have come to this otherwise typical Aussie shopping centre. Japanese people have an aesthetic eye; beauty and grace sit in their culture in about the same measure as the meat pie and footy sit in ours. This sushi diner has been built and designed as its name suggests, with an uncomplicated and tasteful style in mind. They're not trying to be fancy, it's practical and accessible dining

Apart from its philosophical billboarding, Sabi has an unusual speciality and it's not a Japanese creation. Here they house an espresso machine and serve a coffee that's surprisingly good. Allpress comes complete with coffee art and a proud barista to make it for you – go figure! I've been known to wait at the door for a cup in the morning.

Sabi, like O-Sushi, has plenty of parking. It's not a bad thing to exist on the edge of a carpark after all and, like O-Sushi in Byron Bay, they flank a major grocer too. So, you can go shopping for dinner and end up taking dinner home instead. I've snacked here too, instead of the alter-

natives for an afternoon lull, healthy Japanese sushi and a miso soup will get you going again (it's a blessing for my toddler when his blood sugars are running low).

Skilled staff and recognisable faces, some former O-Sushi stalwarts, hand make the fare. All forms of good Japanese food are available here, from the standards on the train - salmon, scallops, prawn nigiri, nori rolls and seared salmon (fresh fish daily comes in from Bay Seafood) to the popular salmon nori roll, deep-fried with a tempura batter. Here you'll find an unusual version of agedashi tofu with shredded daikon radish and ginger flavours hidden under the tofu, sitting with other popular choices from the kitchen: teriyaki, seared salmon and tempura all a la carte and available throughout the day and night.

Wabi-Sabi refers to an ancient Japanese aesthetic – an appreciation of beauty that's imperfect and comes with age. And, like I have, this nondescript shopfront has waited years for the right people to come and create a simple, elegant restaurant... now it's a beauty.

Tapas is not an uncommon concept. Practically every culture has a version of it. Izakaya is the Japanese equivalent and as a style it seems to work for this petite Mullumbimby restaurant. Izakaya Yu is the polar opposite of the newly sized-up O-Sushi, yet the atmosphere remains comfortable and makes a diner feel as though it's roomier than it actually is.

You get the sense that the two owner-chefs Takafumi and Kane decided on the name and concept for this little diner as a standard to pursue, and a statement to all who entered, rather than just tagging it. The *Yu* in Izakaya Yu is Japanese for pleasure and I'm sure these founding chefs from O-Sushi restaurant take pleasure in the fact that they now own a well-patronised and loved local eatery.

The restaurant's location itself is strangely magnetic. Not the kind of attraction you'd have to a beachfront or mountain retreat; rather this goes to the primordial in us

all – it's mostly out of sight, and a cosy cave.

People love tripping down side streets to reveal to their friends a hidden gem. It's a buzz for the new diner to suddenly stumble upon it, though during lunches and dinners it's a packed cavern. Don't try to walk in here without booking between 6 and 8 any night it's open; you'll be waiting a while if you do. Again, this is not sizable dining and only sits a modest amount of diners.

The Japanese are a consistent people. The menu here is as good as any I've tried in the neighbourhood and has all the goodies that we've come to expect. Seared salmon and the well-liked agedashi tofu come perfectly plated. Nigiri, nori and glistening sashimi are less than a metre from your mouth. Of course when in an Izakaya diner try some sake. Super premium sakes are available or try a Yu cocktail: Sake Mojito with sake and fresh mint. Hai!

Izakaya Yu has two Japanese chefs at the helm committed to pleasing through their food. They too joined O-Sushi in 2004 and contributed to the popularity of that restaurant for years. This is now their culinary expression and one that has easily won the approval of the Shire folk since it opened two years ago.

A superb chocolate fondant floated onto the table and I went off into a chocolaty coma (I hoped the drool wasn't apparent). All that was left on the plate was the reflection of my smile.

The tapas concept is found in every cuisine if you look. This isn't a cheap eat to accompany a drink as would probably be the case in Spain but, keeping this in mind, a few glasses of good

Lou Bradley breaks on through to *The Other Side*

With a guitar in her hand and a song in her heart, Lou Bradley launches her third studio album *The Other Side* at Wilsons Creek Hall this Saturday.

The girl is the quintessential quiet achiever. Since her courageous/opposite lifestyle move with her family of five from Sydney's northern beaches to Huonbrook in the hills of Mullumbimby in 2000, she has forsaken city life for mountain country, something reflected in her music.

'I remember writing my first few songs and deciding that I wanted to make a professional recording. I was so excited about what I recorded that I remember seeing John Butler in the streets of Mullum and had to give him my little EP. It was shortly after that I received the inaugural John Butler seed grant. It was then that I decided take my career seriously,' says Lou.

'Although the local music scene is fruitful, I always knew that if I were going to get anywhere with my music, then I would have to step up and beyond it. So I did.

'I set myself a task to learn about this mountain music that I was apparently writing. After I realised that mountain music actually came from the mountains and had a very long history, dating way back to the early 1900s, I felt comfy in what I was writing. So I went to the best country music producer in Australia – Rod Mc McCormack. I sent him my demos for a full-length album, thinking that he would at least brush me aside, but he didn't. We made an album. It was ARIA nominated. Nobody knew who I was. It was brilliant. It really helped me believe that the 'system' may not be rigged after all!

'So then the roller-coaster began. I got bounced around like a pinball a bit. Signed a record deal for my next album with none other than EMI! I always secretly dreamt of doing that. Little did I realise that the economy was crashing. I took my eye off the ball, lost my farm in Huonbrook, EMI died... It was a total dead end!'

Tough times, but after all, ain't this the stuff of the best country songs?

'After losing everything, I decided to pack it in. Then one day I was waiting for my youngest daughter to finish her netball training and I was in



the car where I was in my PJs reflecting on all the heartache and loss that had come before, when I thought once again about the music industry and whether or not it was worth my while. Distant thoughts of my children telling me in the toughest times, even once we had lost our family home, not to give up, came to me and tempted me to give this one last try. So I took out my iPhone and safaried local producers. I thought WTF. Maybe I should try local again. Full circle. I've heard we have world-class producers. Whatever. The first name I came up with was Anthony Lysenko. Apart from my checking him out and deciding he was pretty hot, I looked at his accolades: George Martin (The Beatles), Elvis Costello, Pete Murray, Busby Marou. So I emailed him from my phone, introduced myself and said I had about \$5 if he was interested in making an album! He wrote back pretty much straight away saying that it was one of the best emails he'd ever had and wanted to meet me straightaway! So we met and started making an album. And what a journey it has been!

I was pretty bitter about the music industry and damaged still from losing our home, so I knew this album would be very different from the others but I was determined *not* to conform.

'The album took me two years to make. I had to save every penny including busking and pumping petrol to pay for it, and it actually evolved as I did, and by the end of it I felt like I'd reached the 'other side' of whatever the hell I was going through. Hence the title I guess!'

McHugh channelling the wisdom of the mammies

Local troubadour Mick McHugh has shown himself to be both a prolific writer of songs and player of gigs. He launches his new CD *Choose Who You Wanna Be* at the Rails on Sunday.

What was the inspiration for the new album?

To write positive inspirational lyrics with an upbeat feel – drums, bass and adding whatever melodic instruments we felt best suited the songs – so from banjo, mandolin, electric guitar, harmonica, fiddle, Irish uilleann pipes, even hammer dulcimer.

How has your style changed or evolved since you first started?

When I started out, I wrote more slower tempo ballads. But from playing live so much to pub- and festival-goers, it has influenced me in writing more uptempo songs. I still write and love a slow ballad but it's not always easy in a pub delivering a heartfelt message about anti-CSG mining and the effects it has on our water and environment... and what about the children! So with this CD, I've written songs with a strong Celtic beat behind them, but still with a big emphasis to deliver inspirational messages.

What are the major hurdles you have overcome to be a working and recording musician?

My mental health, especially with lack of sleep from late-night gigs and travelling, and then you're up the next day working on the recordings, and also the business side of things. Anxiety about getting enough gigs, and depression, creep into my head when I'm tired, keeping the family fed, roof over our head and the car going... are the songs good enough, how

will I get everything done... I get overwhelmed. But the flame never burns out, and so my positivity picks up and I ride into the night again.

Who are the people who have been instrumental in your music career?

Damien Dempsey (Ireland) – for his socially conscious lyrics. Ralph McTell (UK) – he had a huge hit with *The Streets of London* in the early 70s. I loved his song growing up and I have been lucky enough to tour and get to know him. He has become an industry mentor for me. U₂ – their live shows are so inspirational and moving. And so many other people on different levels.

What advice would you give to young musicians starting out?



Be yourself, do your own thing, and be prepared to work hard. Just do it! No-one will come looking for you. If you've something to say, something to share, get out there and start learning your trade. And enjoy the journey as much as possible.

Can you tell me the story of one of the songs on the album perhaps?

Song #4: *Ready or Not* – I was on the phone to my mam (who's in Ireland) for an hour, and I never said a word! She's reeling out all her sayings and expressions that she's been saying forever like, 'I see says the blind man a hole in the wall. You're a liar says the deaf man, you can not see at all'. I put her on loudspeaker and make myself some tea and toast. She's still talking so I started writing down her sayings and put them into a song. There's so much under lying wisdom in the mammies that I wanted to capture hers.

What should we expect for the launch at the Rails?

Fun. I have a brilliant trio – an amazing fiddle player, Sallie Campbell, who has toured with the likes of Kate Miller-Heike. And Will Swan, a kickarse piano-accordion and whistle player from Sydney who is heavily influenced by The Pogues.

Mick McHugh Trio play The Rails, 6.30pm this Sunday.

Today I had an interview with Cheryl 'Salt' James, one half of the American hip-hop duo Salt-N-Pepa, who are headlining Falls Festival this year. Actually I guess they are not strictly a duo; it's just that with Sandra Pepa Denton and Cheryl Salt James are on stage noone really took too much notice of Deidra Roper, aka DJ Spinderella, but she be the sister who lays down the beats.

I interview a lot of people, and generally I don't fuss too much, but these girls are solid 1985 hip-hop hall of fame contenders; they have five Grammy awards and they were on MTV for 10 years! And well, I will admit it, I even chose *Push It* as the song I delivered my first child to. It was very encouraging and I have always felt that the video that I made could have been a contender for MTV as well.

I have to admit when it comes to interviewing people, sometimes I have to pretend to know who they are. I can't possibly know who everyone is. Usually you get away with it, but occasionally it backfires, like the time I asked Lloyd from The Necks about how he wrote his lyrics and he said 'All our songs are instrumental. In 11 albums there's never been one lyric.' And then I say, 'Oh really? Because I could have sworn you were saying something.' Awkward!

I mean, a woman aggressively talking about sex, forcing a bloke to have a very uncomfortable conversation *about* sex, and namely their less-than-impressive performance in the bedroom. The girls insisted, *Let's talk about sex baby, Let's talk about you and me, Let's talk about all the good things and the bad things that may be, Let's talk about sex... it keeps coming up anyhow, don't decoy, avoid, or make void the topic, cause that ain't gonna stop it.*

So I had my questions ready. I was gonna talk about sex, about women being bitches; I was going to ask the big questions of the girls, like can there be romance without the finance? I'll admit, I was a bit excited, nervous even. I should have known when the woman from the conferencing centre kept insisting I was a man that it was a bad omen. 'Hello, I am calling to speak to Mandy Nolan to connect her to Miss Cheryl James.' It's coming in from Malaysia somewhere and clearly women aren't quite as butch as I over there. 'I am Mandy'. Now she's getting confused. 'I am sorry sir, I am wondering if Mandy Nolan is there please.

I try to change my voice but make it worse. 'I am a woman,'I croak. Any woman that has ever said that will have experienced the same mild feeling of offence. I feel all Hilary Swank. I am not having much luck convincing the woman at the conferencing centre, who seems very confused about this annoying bloke who keeps saying he's a woman and won't get off the phone. After almost a minute of this gender crisis I start doubting myself. Maybe I'm not a woman. God, don't tell me my balls have finally dropped. I have secretly suspected there was something mannish about me. Hence the name... Man—Dy.

Finally the woman accepts that the man on the phone is a woman, or at least she no longer cares. Phone patches through, and I hear her, for a moment caught off guard talking to her son: 'The pizza is in the oven. You'll have to cut it yourself. I'm doing interviews...' Cheryl realises she's been connected to her next interview, some woman from Australia who sounds like a man; she laughs. 'Kids don't care if you are a superstar! You are just Mumma Mumma! Actually, they do like it when they want your Instagram followers.'

Then nothing. A dead line. I say, 'Hello?' about 20 times. But that's it. Clearly she didn't like me. So that was my big interview for the week down the gurgler. I don't care. It was exciting to hear her giving her son instructions on serving his own pizza. That's my kind of Mumma.

Singing till you're horse

it was during his final year of university that **Cheynne Murphy** found three chords on his guitar and, in the process, the truth. He dropped the corporate marketing career and walked into the spotlight. Murphy has just released *A Horse Called Freedom*, his latest – and very impressive – musical offering.

Tell me about recording this album. What was your inspiration? What feel were you going for?

One day driving back from work I heard the lyric *Burnished Gold* in a poem and it felt timeless and evoked American Indian imagery, which in turn inspired other songs on the album. This imagery, which seeps through some of the lyrics, was supported sonically by the guitarist Toby, who was playing a lot of deep baritone, giving it a Wild West feel. Ultimately though it's a folk rock record aided very much by the deft engineering and producing skills of Paul Pilsneniks, ex-301 engineer who's worked with Pete Murray, Angus Stone, Powderfinger and Jeff Martin to name a few.

Can you tell me about who played on A Horse Called Freedom?

I had been playing for the past year or so in a 3-piece band featuring Mat Akehurst (Walrus and the Carpenter) on drums and Toby Andrews (my neighbour across the road when I moved up here) on electric guitars. We got Matt Bone to fill on bass on the recording but he was busy with Starboard Cannons commitments so we contacted Maurice

What are the challenges that you face as a musician?

Well one of the themes in the record is the warrior. We don't have painted faces these days but hell, one week of balancing a blended family of six, five jobs, 150 students as a teacher, and a masters degree, you need to be a warrior just to cope. Combine that with the pipe dream of an aspiring music career and all the DIY tasks it requires, especially online; it's no surprise some days I don't know who I am! I am actually doing some research around the whole process of conceiving an album idea through to its online delivery.

What do you think are the strengths of your songwriting?

My strengths I think are vocalising human emotions we all feel and somehow turning the struggles we face into some form of cathartic inspiration. I write more poetically than literally. I'm not trying to be ground breaking in the progressiveness of this music but I like melody, harmonies, and I pay a lot of attention to song arrangement. The song *Burnished Gold*, for example, had 13 drafts. I am also rather fond of my Maton 12-string, which frames a lot of the songs.

Tell me the story of A Horse Called Freedom.

For the title I think I subconsciously drew on the Richard Harris movie I watched as a young boy with my dad. It was called *A Man Called*

ENTERTAINMENT The Voice of Mullum

Three years ago Byron Shire's most famous brother-and-sister duo, **Gabe and Cecelia Brandolini**, found themselves selected for the Mullum Music Festival's Youth Mentorship with Lucie Thorne. This year saw them hit screens nationwide with mentorship from Will.i.am on *The Voice*. With a sell-out return show a few weeks back Gabe and Cecelia are looking forward to playing Mullum Music Festival, this time as a headline. It's amazing how far these two have come in such a short time!

Seven spoke with Gabe about the Brandolini star, which seems to have an infinite capacity to rise!

How would you describe the last 12 months?

Otherworldly. I think we surpassed our own expectations time and time again, which just made it incredibly exciting and shocking at the same time. It's been utopia and it's been torturous, and if there was one way we could describe our experience it would be that we pushed both ends of the emotional spectrum to places we didn't know it could go.

Have the last twelve months, being on *The Voice*, having all that national attention, changed anything in the way you approach your music?

No, not really. That's what we sort of had to fight for while on *The Voice* – the integrity to play how we want to play. If anything it helped us establish a bit of an identity to our style because we finally had to own and defend it. The national attention can change a lot of things. But the way we work creatively and the way we write and play music hasn't been changed. If anything it's just been identified. How do you two complement each other?

In terms of complementing each other creatively... While we were on *The Voice* we had to have a kind of rushed system (given only one day to create a rendition of a song to then record for the iTunes sales). I would do the sketch of the song and Cecilia would colour it in. I am better at creating interesting rhythms and progressions where as Cecilia is stronger at creating powerful melodies and deciding on harmonies. So under pressure we operated by both concentrating on what we were strongest at to make up for each other's weaknesses.

What are your achilles heels when it comes to making music?

Cecilia: Taking a long time to finish a song. Gabriel: Struggling to feel original.

What did you get out of the mentorship last year with Mullum Music?

A great enjoyable experience where we got to hang out with Lucie Thorne. She really



helped us focus on the performance aspect of things, which was something we were really, really shy about paying attention to. So character building ultimately.

What advice would you have for other young artists about finding their feet in the industry?

We're still finding our feet in the industry so we're by no means the experts. There're 100s of different things that are forever changing in terms of marketing promotion and trending so we can't really answer the business side of that question. We just got on *The Voice* roller-coaster. As for the artistic side, we might be able to shed some light! Don't entertain other people's ideas about rules, regulations and formatting that they believe to be acceptable or normal. Celebrate your imagination and create something no-one's ever heard of before.

How important are events like Mullum Music Festival in helping to nurture talent?

Crucial in the sense that you need to get that experience edge, but also it can be done in a local supportive and encouraging environment. Along with all the programs they run for emerging artists there doesn't come a festival more relevant and nurturing.



That was the most wonderful gig we had ever played. It topped any of our *Voice* performances because of the intimacy of the relationship we had with the people who came. These were all people who had to come to see us. Not Ricky Martin. Not a television concept. Not someone who would play after us... US.

How does it change how you play, if at all?

We both play better when we feel comfortable. Basically every *Voice* performance we were affected negatively by the nerves, and so without that stress hanging around and when there is so much encouragement and support in the room, we are able to focus on how we play and actively consciously be aware of what were playing and singing.

What should we expect for your Mullum music show?

We will be playing all the songs from both of our CDs, plus many in the works and a few antiques, as well as all our *Voice* performances! We hope that we can show people something they've never seen before, a new form of artistry but also still relevant enough for people to enjoy.

Gabriel and Cecilia are one of the featured headlines at Mullum Music Festival this year and are a shining example of the talent that has been nurtured over the past seven events. Stay tuned next week for Youth Mentorship program announcement, application dates, categories, and of course mentors!

CHARLIE'S COUNTRY

Director Rolf de Heer and actor David Gulpilil were co-writers of this sometimes confronting, often heartbreaking (in part thanks to Graham Tardif's haunting score), but mostly dull and essentially negative movie. As such, it is intriguing to guess who was responsible for which pieces of dialogue. After Charlie is shaved of his wiry, tangled locks and incarcerated in Darwin, he is visited by his mate Black Pete (Peter Djigir). The pair sit in silence for a long time before Pete says 'it's hard to talk to you when you don't look like you.' It is a beautifully simple sentence, loaded with poetry and metaphor. Earlier, with Charlie lying in a hospital bed, being treated for exposure and malnutrition, the duty doctor glibly asks, "do you mind if I call you Charlie? I have difficulty with foreign names." I could not accept the veracity of the latter utterance and decided that, heavyhanded and tendentious in the extreme, it must have come from de Heer, who is not afraid to press hard on the white guilt button. The former line, I am equally sure, would have been contributed by Gulpilil, whose physical grace and wrecked beauty dominate throughout. Charlie's community has been subjected to the Federal Government's policy of intervention. The money that his people can no longer squander on grog is spent on over-priced processed foods and Charlie yearns for the old ways - it is, after all, his ancestral land. But the Law makes it virtually impossible for him to fulfill this longing - the spear that he makes to go hunting with is confiscated by the police as a dangerous weapon. The film is a weary lament from the same school as Samson And Delilah and, wallowing in victimhood, is a million dispiriting miles from the vigorous, uplifting and positive Mad Bastards. Most frustrating, it perpetuates the deep-rooted and for some reason sanctified notion that indigenous Australians are so attached to the area in which they were born that they are incapable of adaptation, of moving on.

THE INBETWEENERS 2

Every now and then the only thing you can do is let your guard down and go with the flow. After the unending, unspeakable ugliness of the nightly news, I have to confess (a little shamefacedly) that I had tears of laughter streaming down my face during this gross-out movie's fantastic poo scene. It was cathartic, which is the last thing I expected to be writing about what is basically a tsunami of crudity. Will, Jay, Neil and Simon (Simon Bird, James Buckley, Blake Harrison and Joe Thomas) are back and looking rather too old to be continuing on as the teenage prats whom we first encountered on holiday in Crete in in 2011. But the group's history of collaboration, beginning with the British TV series (2008–10), has made of them an accomplished comedic unit. The story is set in Oz, where Jay has been spending part of his gap year and letting on to his mates that he is shagging himself silly. The others fly out to join him and the truth is exposed – Jay is working in a toilet and living in a tent pitched on the front lawn of his Australian uncle's suburban guarteracre (David Field, in blokey overdrive). Fired by romantic ambitions,

Will follows the beautiful Katie (Emily Berrington) to Byron Bay and the gang all check into the Arts Factory. Katie, however, is also being courted by the muscular, dreadlocked Ben (Freddie Stroma), and it is Will's clashes with Ben that introduce at least a modicum of clever and biting satire to proceedings – at one point they are involved in a drumming/healing session inside a tent that takes a delicious bite out of the Bay's 'spiritual' mumbo-jumbo. The narrative tends to fizzle out when they head to Birdsville (the whole is little more than a series of gag set-ups), but the boys are such hopeless nongs that it is impossible not to become swept along in their follies. Wildlife alerts

Echidnas are breeding early time the magpie is nesting. this year and puggles may now be 'in pouch', says WIRES Northern Rivers. If you spot an apparently injured echidna, chances are great that a young one or puggle is not far away as the muscle holding the puggle automatically releases on impact. Please take a few moments to search the immediate area to find puggles: they will be rolled into a ball and may look like a clump of clay. Because of their spines, it is difficult to handle or assist adult echidnas yourself. Call WIRES right away and our hotline will give you advice.

A swooping magpie is protecting the nest at breeding time. Not all magpies swoop, only those that perceive an intrusion to their territory. Avoid the area for the short how you can help.

You could carry an open umbrella or wear a hat. Do not try to interact with the magpie as this will make it more aggressive. The nest is the most dangerous place for a juvenile bird, as predators can easily find them, so the parent birds will encourage the young to leave as soon as possible. They will leave the nest before being able to fly and will flutter from bush to bush being fed by the parents

We have experienced gale-force winds, an influx of cornflake weed on Main Beach, buckets of rain and a very unpredictable swell.

This swell has now turned easterly making it extremely dangerous for anyone even thinking about heading offshore. I would strongly advise against rock fishing around Broken Head and Cape Byron for the remainder of the week as the swell is looking like it will hit close to four metres

ever, exposed beaches such as Tallows all the way up to Cosy Corner will be dangerous for all. I know the surfers will be excited by this; however, please exercise due caution and give the ocean the respect it deserves.

The deluges that we are experiencing will end up flushing the rivers and pushing mullet and prawns down towards the river mouths. A focus on eddies near breakwalls will find hungry mulloway feeding as this smorgasbord is directed

will find success casting large soft plastics and hard-bodied minnow lures into these eddies on the ebb tide.

A mulloway weighing more than 30kg was taken from a breakwall this last week, so they are there!

The rivers are brown from the rain, and if you are chasing bream I suggest using a more pungent bait to assist the fish in finding your hook.

Try mullet or chicken gut on a 1/0 or 2/0 hook with as little weight as possible. If

Please exercise caution when navigating in the rivers as there will be a lot of debris floating down from the rain that will pose a safety hazard. Finally, the powerful surf conditions will create a new array of gutters and channels along the beaches so find a nice vantage point at low tide, identify these areas, and come back and fish these spots on the high and you will be rewarded.

While on the subject of contempt: Vatican City has been described as the 'smallest internationally recognised independent state in the world'. If its representatives keep abusing citizens of our own sovereign state, isn't it about time we imposed sanctions against it, or at least gave its leaders here a severe talkingto? Oh that's right, most of our senior federal politicians are in thrall to the magical thinking coming out of that state.

In related news, Cardinal George Pell has publicly insulted every truck driver in Australia, the chair of the



Australian Trucking Association, Noelene Watson, said last week. She was responding to Cardinal Pell's comments to the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse, when he stated that the Catholic Church was no more responsible for priests who abuse children than a trucking company would be if they employed a driver who molested women. 'These comments are a desperate attempt to deflect attention from the Royal Commission being faced by the Catholic Church and other institutions that deal with children,' Ms Watson said. 'Cardinal Pell must realise that he cannot solve these problems by insulting Australia's hardworking truck drivers, who deliver the goods we use every day.' Unfortunately Pell is hardly of a mindset to realise anything.

'Never pick a fight with someone who buys ink by the barrel', Mark Twain once said of newspaper proprietors. But what would Mr Twain say to Clive Palmer's ambition to start a national daily in opposition to Murdoch? The everyman billionaire helping to ruin our atmosphere has registered the *Australasian Times*, and it's fairly obvious that it's an attempt to create an alternative voice to everyman billionaires like Murdoch who are also helping to ruin our atmosphere. Meanwhile Murdoch's News Corp – Australia's biggest and most influential media company – is acting like a baby without its dummy. It threatened online media outlet Crikey

with legal action after it leaked confidential information detailing its declining print performance. That's despite News Corp gleefully publishing confidential details on Fairfax and the ABC. It's a tough gig, newspapers. Perhaps it's time to again mention a big thanks to our advertisers who make the job of reporting possible. Unlike Murdoch, The Echo does not side with corporations and governments that are ruining our atmosphere.
