Federal attorney-general George Brandis, who recently couldn't explain the term 'metadata', has gained Labor's support to fast-track sweeping new terrorism laws through the federal senate.

They are laws that could have severe consequences for whistleblowers and internet users, but more importantly provide less security agency oversight, according to academics, lawyers, The Greens and a handful of independents.

The National Security Legislation Amendment Bill (No. 1) 2014 is expected to be passed in the lower house and become law this week.

It will enable ASIO - with one warrant - to monitor, access, modify, copy and delete information on any computer. Tough ten-year sentences could also affect journal-

ists or whistleblowers who report or disclose sensitive information, even if it is in the public interest.

A recent case where these new laws could see a journalist possibly jailed was the reporting of the December 2013 ASIO raid, approved by Brandis, on the legal counsel to East Timor in Canberra.

East Timor case

ABC reported at the time that 'East Timor is attempting to have a \$40 billion oil and gas treaty it signed with Australia quashed in The Hague. It alleges Australia had the advantage in negotiations because the Australian Secret Intelligence Service (ASIS) spied on the Timorese cabinet in Dili, during the negotiation process in 2004.'

'Theoretical maximum' explains our housing figures: West Byron

A 'theoretical maximum' of 1,100 houses is how West Byron developers have sought to explain their calculations on the predicted size of their proposed development, located just west of Byron Bay.

It comes after last week's letter to The Echo by project manager Stuart Murray, where he criticised The Echo for reporting the 1,100 figure, despite that number being published on the West Byron website.

The 108-hectare parcel which includes wetlands and protected koalas would see the largest development in the Shire in at least a generation. And along with the NSW planning department and minster, the developers have come under intense public scrutiny with

questionable reports and population estimations. The state planning minister is expected to decide on it shortly.

A group of eight developers - some local own the land and have been attempting to rezone it since 1997. Through a PR agent, the developers say they contributed nearly \$200K to a Council study at the time, 'which found that the land was suitable for urban development.

Sydney-based developer Terry Agnew of Tower Holdings is the latest to buy in to the project after Crighton Holdings became insolvent earlier this year. The Australian (News Ltd) reported at the time that Mr Agnew acquired nearly 80 of the 108ha in a \$7.7 million deal, making him by far the largest shareholder.

While the developers won't comment on the figure Tower Holdings paid for the Crighton land or the size acquired, the PR agent said that they think 'it's salient that Terry Agnew has owned personal property in Byron for more than six years.' Agnew's developement aspirations include a \$2b luxury resort for Great Keppel Island, which is also mired in controversy.

In response to pressure from residents, the homepage of www.westbyronproject.com. au now includes an explanation of expected housing figures. It starts with a question: 'I've seen reports of more than 1,100 dwellings on West Byron - it's on your website and yet you say it's incorrect?'

While the developers explain the number, 'will be significantly lower than this', they claim that 'None of this can be accurately defined until the detailed design phase.'

'Under our rezoning application, we have

asked for 52.06 hectares [of the 108 hectares] to be available for low or medium density housing. [This includes] 41 hectares for 'low density' (550m² to 1000m² lots) and 11.06 hectares for 'medium density' (250m² to 500m² lots).

'There is also the reality of market preference and what lot sizes will actually appeal to the market and therefore sell.

Flabbergasted

But local environmentalist Dailan Pugh says he's 'flabbergasted by the latest misinformation'. He told The Echo that additional dwellings are allowed in the business and industrial zones, 'so the numbers are actually higher.'

'These figures bear no resemblance to what the current rezoning and Development Con-

Byron Central Hospital works begin shortly

Construction company Brookfield Multiplex have been awarded the tender by Health Infrastructure to start 'early works' on the new Byron Central Hospital.

Health Minister Jillian Skinner and Ballina MP Don Page welcomed the news last week, which is anticipated to be valued at more than \$80 million.

Mr Page said the NSW

government committed \$1.5 million in the 2014/15 Budget for planning and early works to commence on the new hospital.

Private providers sought for surgery

'I could not be more pleased to see work about to start on the new Byron Central Hospital,' Mr Page said. The Byron Central Hospital project team say they are undertaking a market sounding process to determine whether there is interest from private providers to deliver surgical services at the facility.

They added Byron District and Mullumbimby hospitals will remain fully operational until Byron Central Hospital opens in mid-2016.

Burn the ALP, Liberal-Nationals machine: Hartley to contest NSW 2015 election

The spectrum for next year's state election expanded considerably last week after Byron Bay resident Matthew Hartley announced his intention to stand – wheelchair and all – for the seat of Ballina.

Hartley, who also contested the previous federal election, says his goal is a statewide coalition of independents which would focus on delivering 'The Reset Agenda', based on a four point agenda.

Not another cent for Sydney

That includes: 'eliminating political corruption, returning planning powers to local communities, direct democratic involvement and not another cent for Sydney – cancelling all public spend-

ing plans for Sydney and reallocating money to small projects in every local area.' 'I stand for honest govern-

ment and direct democracy,' he says.

'Our state and country are unduly influenced by crooks. 'This is hardly big news,

but it is the big problem. Corruption costs us a fortune and ruins everything. Possibly every bad decision can be traced back to a corrupt deal.

'Direct public participation, via assemblies and citizens referenda, are the answer.

'Giving local areas the power to say yes or no to exploitation proposals, and local populations real political power, will energise communities and promote regional identity.'

Hartley says the regions of NSW are the future, not Sydney. 'Sydney must shrink, shed a million people, and cease to be a pit for taxpayers' money.

'We need small local infrastructure projects, not "hero" schemes to tunnel under Sydney and "coincidentally" pay millions to crook mates in the process. Burn the ALP, Liberal, Nationals machine.

'Burn them all.'

The Echo asked both Local federal MP Justine Elliot (Labor) and Matthew Fraser (Nationals hopeful) about the law's effect on whistleblowers and journalists, and both dodged an explanation.

Terror rhetoric

Mrs Elliot instead jumped onto the terror rhetoric, telling The Echo she will support the Bill and recognises 'how important it is to act in relation to our country's national security.' But Mrs Elliot did say it wasn't a 'blank cheque' to the Abbott government, as 'Labor insisted that the Bill be referred to the Parliamentary Joint Committee on Intelligence and Security (PJCIS) for public consultation and review.

The population prediction figures presented by the department have been criticised by the Byron Residents Group. They claim there is no housing shortage, but an oversupply of dwellings relative to population growth.

The case for saving rail from trails

Following from last week's article where rail trail advocate Geoff Meers espoused the benefits of rail trails, Byron councillor and TOOT (Trains On Our Tracks) spokesperson Basil Cameron puts forward the case for rail's return.

Cr Cameron believes that 'within the community, there is a high level of anger and frustration with the current government for the way in which the rail issue has been mishandled.

'We could have saved \$2 million on the rail study [The Casino to Murwillumbah Transport Study] if local National politicians had been more honest about why they have broken their promises to the community.

Privatisation by stealth

'The rail study was a red herring to disguise the fact that politically, local Nationals have been done over by city-based Liberals.

'It's time for a proper assessment for rail from a community perspective that includes tourism, public transport and benefits to councils and community.

'Leave the rail trail for where it is best suited - in declining rural areas.

'To restrict the benefits of public infrastructure to the interests of a small group in the community is nothing more than privatisation by stealth.

'Railways are the most direct link for eight of the ten largest population centres in the region.

'In fact the shortest route between most towns is the rail line, as stations are lo-

cated in the centre of these communities.

'Because the line has been in place so long, population growth has tended to be within the rail corridor.

'For example, 86 per cent of the population live within 5km of the line in Byron and Lismore Shires.

'Both TOOT and our council strongly put the view that there are many benefits of a regional rail system that helps to move tourist visitors in and out of the region as well as moving around the region while they are here.

Report excluded tourist numbers

'The rail study completely excludes the considerable tourist numbers from the patronage models put forward in the report.

'Acknowledging tourist visitors would change the economic model substantially and have significant benefits for Council and community.

'By comparison the rail trail report acknowledges the tourism numbers, yet fails to deal with the increased traffic that these "adventure" tourists will add to the roads when entering the region.'

One of the facts usually overlooked by rail trail enthusiasts, says Cr Cameron, is that Byron Shire is located within a key national transport corridor.

Overlooked facts

'In fact, the Pacific Highway/north coast rail corridor - the Pacific Coast corridor is the second busiest in the country and will become the busiest in the next few years.

'Road freight is increasing twice as fast within this corridor compared to others around the country.

'Like it or not, we are in a region that has strong economic and social links with the Brisbane/Gold Coast corridor.

'The Gold Coast Airport, located at Coolangatta, has grown rapidly in recent years to be the fourth busiest airport in the country and now has passenger movements of around five million annually.

'About half of these passenger movements are within the Pacific Coast corridor.

'In Byron Shire we have around 1.5 million tourist visitors a year and many more across the region.

'In this context, the proposal for a rail trail is ill-considered.

'Such infrastructure is well suited to declining rural areas to attract tourists, but not in nationally important transport corridors.'

But comparing us to QLD appears to support rail trail advocate Geoff Meers's position that more people equals more need.

'I think [it's] less a "comparison" with QLD and more of an acknowledgement that Byron and the northern rivers have significant movements of people moving to and from QLD.

'A closer inspection of Geoff's position is that more resident "population" and "density" is required.

'As I have tried to demonstrate in this part of the world, resident population is not the issue and in fact population density is centred along the line.

'We have plenty of people due to tourism, links to SE Qld and location within a major national transport corridor.'

So how can reclaiming the railways move forward? Does TOOT have a chance?

'The case for rail is compelling in a regional context and from a public transport development perspective.

'The TOOT campaign has flushed out a variety of potential rail operators including the North Byron Shuttle, light rail trams, rail bikes and others. Many of these are existing commercial operators who believe that rail is a profitable venture on the line.

'TOOT retains a vision for regular commuter trains on the whole of the line and a connection to Coolangatta Airport. However, we believe the immediate future is to allow access to sections of the line for these rail-based uses. 'This will keep the corridor safe and begin using and maintaining the existing rail infrastructure. 'Right now we believe that \$75 million would be better spent facilitating these types of rail services instead of using the money to rip up the rails. 'The benefits from tourism alone would far outstrip those from a rail trail.

Locals angered at plans to cut Rainbow Temple seeks neighbour down Bruns memorial trees

Brunswick Heads residents are outraged at the latest plans by crown-park managers to chop down six historic cypress trees at The Terrace public reserve.

The move comes in the wake of an ugly incident two weeks ago when an old tuckeroo tree in another of the town's parks was cut down with no notice given to locals.

That sparked an angry confrontation between some locals and the tree-removal contractors during which police were called. Locals say the historically-significant coastal cypress trees in The Terrace reserve, used by the trust as a camping overflow area, have been slowly and systematically damaged over time by deliberate heavy pruning of lower branches to accommodate large camper vans to the point they could no longer survive.

Byron Shire Council is also concerned about the cypress trees and is set to oppose the plans by the NSW Crown Holiday Parks Trust (NSW-CHPT), which controls the town's three caravan parks and a number of popular waterfront reserves.

The residents have long fought encroachments of public parks, reserves, roadways and waterfront access by the holiday parks since the holiday parks and crown reserves were controversially taken over by the state government eight years ago, and with it the revenue transferred to state coffers.

This week, locals sent an SOS to the Returned Services League (RSL) in a bid to enlist the organisation for the latest fight to protect the town's historic cypress trees, planted after World War 1 in memory of the young service men and women killed in that conflict.

A NSWCHPT spokesperson told *The Echo* that six coastal cypress in The Terrace reserve had been recommended for removal after their contracted arborist deemed them to have 'a variety of defects ranging from cracking, wounds, decay, and defects that affect their structural integrity'.

The trust says it would offset impacts of removal or lopping of the six cypress or other vegetation 'for safety reasons' by 'seed collection, compensatory planting and bush regeneration activities', adding it had planted 150 trees in three reserves in December 2013 and 'the Trust has 250 Coastal Cypress seedlings grown from locally collected seed available for additional compensatory planting'.

Poor management

But local activists in the Foreshore Protection Group (FPG) say all the trees remaining in Terrace Reserve are now 'seriously vulnerable as a direct response to poor park management'.

They say the trees are ailing because of the direct result of works undertaken by North Coast Holiday Parks (NCHP), which is run by the trust, 'including the removal of all lower limbs to enable large caravans to access an area previously used only for occasional primitive camping' and compaction of the root system around the trees by an increasing number of vehicles.

A newly formed not-forprofit organisation called The Youth Training Station will be launched next week, which offers career advice and lifestyle information for local teens.


It's part of the The Mullum Music Festival, and aims to build on the strengths and success of the festival's long

Having consulted our crystal balls...

The Australian Labor Party (ALP) has voted at its annual conference to disband, following the disastrous federal election campaign in which it lost the few seats that remained from the previous disastrous federal election campaign.

Bill Shorten, a focus group organiser appointed to oversee the party's dissolution, was asked how he felt about the demise of a political institution over a hundred years old.

He replied, 'Our research was showing that for some reason the public could not distinguish the ALP from the LNP.'

In a prepared statement, prime minister Tony Abbott welcomed the end of the Labor Party, saying that confusing and contradictory voices only serve to weaken the national resolve that society needs to face the challenges of terrorism, unionism, environmentalism, illegal refugees and single mothers.

At a press conference held in parliament's Secure Bunker One yesterday, the Minister for the Interior was presented with a prearranged list of questions by Year 12 cadets from News Corp Ltd.

In his replies, Mr Brandis strongly defended his role in the abolition of the Australian Broadcasting Corporation.

Details of the asset sales to Rupert Murdoch are secret under a commercial in confidence clause, but the shell of the national broadcaster will be based overseas for tax purposes and renamed the Fox Universal Cartel Korea.

In local news, the internal passport checkpoint in Ewingsdale Road has been upgraded to permanent status.

Pending the installation of x-ray machines under the government's five-year plan, all citizens passing through the checkpoint are required to carry their possessions in transparent plastic bags. Council has approved the development of a plastics factory in the West Byron estate which will create dozens of new jobs.

Also upgraded this week is the checkpoint on Main Arm Road, where the joint AFP-ASIO sniffer dog training camp will be established. Citizens unwilling to use the checkpoint are encouraged to gather at the Showground near the Muslim Containment Facility where their concerns will be addressed.

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Beating the drums of jingoism

he minor earth tremor you detected around Bathurst cemetery last week was Ben Chifley turning in his grave as Tony Abbott invoked his memory (though not his name).

Abbott appropriated Labor's most memorable image, the light on the hill, in Labor's most respected venue, the United Nations General Assembly, to celebrate his pawing at the ground to Washington to give the okay for Australian war planes to bomb Iraq.

The man has no shame.

It was only two days ago in the same city that our prime minister publicly gave his finger to most of the world by very publicly rejecting the invitation to participate in the World Climate Change Forum. His office, he said, was too busy attending to affairs in Canberra, presumably to do with preparations for the Great Humanitarian War.

Well, hang on a minute.

The previous week he was happy, indeed insouciant, to go to Arnhem Land while dealing with the same matters of state, apparently managing to both walk and chew gum without overdue exhaustion. And of course such dilettantes as Barack Obama and David Cameron, among numerous other leaders, considered the meeting of sufficient importance to interrupt their schedules.

In any case, Abbott had been asked to attend long before ISIS had even appeared on the radar, and then decided to come to New York at very short notice anyway. It was hardly a matter of dropping out at the last minute.

And it was not a trivial issue; UN secretary general Ban Ki-Moon said flatly that it was the defining issue of the age, and Obama said that from all the immediate threats such as ISIS and the Ebola epidemic, climate change was the one that would shape the contours of the century. And he implored the world, and particularly both the emerging giants and the developed nations, to act. Abbott was presumably included in his absence.

But Australia did not leave an empty chair; the indefatigable Julie Bishop filled in, if only as a cheerio call. She did reiterate that of course Australia was concerned and was doing something.

She did not mention Abbott's triumph in becoming the first country in the world to abolish putting a price on carbon but she was adamant that Australia was definitely doing something. Especially it was talking about economic growth and competitive-

ness, presumably meaning coal. As if on cue, Industry Min-

ister Ian Macfarlane appeared in Canberra with a fantastic (literally) report which apparently foreshadowed a Utopian dream of supplies of cheap coal - he almost added, as did Abbott quoting Chifley, for the general betterment of mankind.

The message of Australia's dismissal of climate change as a problem could hardly have been more blatant.

But Abbott's deliberate snubbing of Ban Ki-moon and Obama, not to mention the other 120-odd leaders of the New York meeting, egregious as it was, should not be excused as an aberration. Both his critics and his supporters have been demanding that he produce a narrative for his muddled government, and the signs are that he is finally preparing one and here it is: stop the world, I want to get off. Or, in more active mode: up you Jack. In spite of his fervent devotion to what he called 'like minded countries' (by which he really means the United States) his government is turning determinedly isolationist – or as he might see it, sturdily independent. Not only do we no longer need to observe accepted international standards of behaviour, we now glory in rejecting them. And who to exemplify the new

paradigm than the man most ambitious to succeed Abbott, at least according to his growing coterie of boosters, better than Generalissimo Scott Morrison.

Morrison does not go into nuance: he has spelt his credo out in stentorian terms: the Aus-

tralian parliament will be the one and only arbiter and other authorities need not apply: 'We are a sovereign country. We get to decide what our rules are and what our obligations are.'

Echoes, as the long suffering noted, of John Howard's defiant: 'We will decide who comes into this country and the circumstances in which they come.'

In the past, successive governments have at least pretended to follow the International Convention on Refugees; however much they worked through it and around it, they insisted that they were not actually breaching it they bowed to international law.

Morrison is happy to tear it up, although he still claims, absurdly, to follow the letter while ignoring the spirit, let alone the various recommendations.

He has, effectively, placed (or displaced) asylum seekers outside the pale.

Christmas Island will be wound up: many of the hapless



These victims will, of course, be volunteers - take it or leave it, since the rest will presumably be left to Nauru and Manus Island or whatever other hellhole Morrison can conjure up to rot, and who cares what they, and the rest of the world, thinks. Up you Jack. Not a lot of light on the hill here.

And so the pattern is starting to develop: we'll take part in the wars, at least when they're America's, but that's it - the rest is jingoism. The spirit of Chifley, the humble visionary whose optimistic belief in both domestic and international peace and goodwill was a beacon of hope, is to be cynically stolen by the present reality of a man who thrives on conflict and aggression in defiance of the United Nations and their ideals.

But if he is serious about channelling his much-loved predecessor, it would behave him to study the history: Chifley's 'light on the hill speech' was made, not on a moment of bravado, but on the eve of the 1949 election.

It resulted in Labor's disastrous defeat and consigned it to 23 years of opposition. Perhaps, after all, there is hope.

Ratepayers cop it

Chris Dobney's article in last week's Echo, Byron 'dodges a bullet' with Telstra site sale, misses a central point, that is, far from dodging the bullet the ratepayers of Byron Shire have copped it fair between

the eyes in relation to the whole exercise concerning this parcel of land.

Firstly, on a \$507K purchase you would be up for \$20K minimum in legals and stamp duty. On the sale you would be up for minimum legals of \$1K and estate agent's commission of probably \$15K. Then there are the holding costs on \$500K loan at say five per cent amounting to \$25K a year times five years or \$125K. That's a \$151K loss off the top of my head.

But it gets worse, a lot worse. When was the land found to be polluted? Before or after purchase? And what is the pollution anyway? It is accepted that beyond the puff the land was actually purchased as part of Council's campaign to stop the Woolworths DA. So, if you look at the court case and Council's

costs and Woolworth's costs which would have had to be paid by Council because they lost the case, then the loss to the ratepayers in respect of this parcel of land would be a minimum half a million dollars. Beautiful.

What should be happening is that aspiring local politicians (of which I am not one) should be scouring Council records to ascertain who actually precipitated this financial disaster and exposing them so we can have it as part of our ruminations for the next election.

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

Learning the sometimes unnerving ways of sharks

Tracking large sharks sounds good on paper, but what's required for the sake of beachgoers, to stalk these marine predators and report their whereabouts?


Queensland's surf lifesavers on the beaches of North Stradbroke Island are testing small unmanned aircraft (drones) to collect such information. In New South Wales, the Department of Primary Industries is also running experiments.

But in 2012, the same department published a study testing the usefulness of aerial beach patrols done by pilots in helicopters or small planes. Such patrols spot very few sharks, about one per hundred square kilometres. This is most likely a serious underestimate. Can mechanical observers, peering through the same murky water and to varying depths, do any better? Before speeding along with some technological fix, let's take an ecological reconnaissance of white, bull and tiger sharks.

Australian great white sharks (Carcharodon carch-

arias) are not common and in decline. Marine biologist Berry Bruce tagged 500 individuals in southern Australia around Neptune Islands. A decade of monitoring reveals that these great whites often make great annual migrations. In the winter they travel along the coast up to south-east Queensland and then return south during September/October. This tracks the migration route used by humpbacks who hug the coastal shallows to protect vulnerable young against shark attacks.

As great whites attack from below, they start at depth and accelerate vertically to ram and stun their prey. If they are only curious and exploring an object in the sea, they swim up to it sideways to 'mouth' and 'taste' it. That's why specialists say people in shallows are not the usual prey of great whites. Unfortunately the animals are too strong for such investigations to be harmless. In one behaviour study, great whites will taste and then eat a fat, highfood-value pig but taste and refuse leaner sheep, who, like people, carry much less fat.

In Hawaiian lagoons and beaches, traditional shark keepers knew the territories and movements of their local and migratory sharks. They fed and petted them.

Bull sharks (*Carcharhi-nus leucas*) are classified as 'near threatened'. But it is more often seen because the adults tend to patrol shallow coastal waters often near the mouths of estuaries and

rivers. The young use the upstream waters. They are ambush hunters of murky waters, whose strategy is 'bump and bite'. They scavenge through cloudy waters chasing contrasting colours, which could be something edible. They are also territorial. These devices are expensive, complicated and invasive for the sharks themselves. Some

Tiger sharks (*Galeocerdo cuvier*) are another 'near threatened' species, who live in the same zone as bull sharks but travel further and range deeper. They are solitary hunters who also 'bump and bite', coming inshore at night.

These three sharks are not attacking more people now than before. There are simply many more people in the water. Sensible precautions are to avoid murky water, especially a day or two after rain. Avoid the water at dawn, dusk or dark. Swim or surf as part of a group. Avoid the water where seabirds or dolphins are feeding. Sharks often join them. If you see a dangerous shark, keep watching and quietly get to shore. Some specialists, including Australian filmmaker Val Taylor, report that punching back at sharks that bump you is so surprising to these top predators that they back off. They don't expect a challenge.

Much of this ecological information comes from research using tags, either acoustic, satellite or 'pop up' devices. These devices are expensive, complicated and invasive for the sharks themselves. Some tagging interferes with the shark's survival skills. Interestingly, some types of tagging projects improve when they include the sightings of divers, fishers and other observers with firsthand experience of a marine place.

Knowing a place, much as knowing a person, offers unexpected relationships. In Hawaiian lagoons and beaches, traditional shark keepers knew the territories and movements of their local and migratory sharks. They fed and petted them. They fed and petted them. They swam with or rode on them. They felt recognition and respect was mutual. They also expected help with fishing from these, their local gods.

Technology offers great data, within sharp limits. But what more could we know and be if we deeply engaged with our marine places? What more than fearsome is part of the personality of a shark?

Who are the real terrorists? Could they be us?

It was Mick Keelty, former Australian Federal Police commissioner, who famously said that Australia's involvement in the Iraq war would increase the threat of terrorism in this country.

This was in response to the Madrid bombings in 2004. Replying to a question by veteran journalist Laurie Oakes to whether Madridstyle bombings could occur in Australia, Keelty said: 'The reality is, if this turns out to be Islamic extremists responsible for the bombing in Spain, it's more likely to be linked to the position that Spain and other allies took on issues such as Iraq.'

For this statement he was loudly and roundly reprimanded by Australian PM John Howard and chastised by right-wing shock jocks in typical shoot-the-messenger fashion. Never mind that his assessment was backed up by the FBI's executive assistant director of counterterrorism John Pistole, who happened to be in Sydney at that time.

Here is Keelty again, from an article in the Sydney Morning Herald in 2006: 'If you understand the reasons they have committed the crime, you have a better chance of solving the crime.' The SMH article goes on to say: 'In the context of terrorism, that means combatting the "radicalisation" of young

Muslims. Note it is Keelty who is advocating what he calls the "deprogramming" of Islamic extremists if they are placed under house arrest under controversial new powers?

Context is important

Whether one accepts 'deprogramming' as a realistic law-and-order option, Keelty was raising the all-important question of context: what was the context in which the terrorist offence was taking place? In other words, while responding to a terrorist threat was a police matter, it would indeed be very useful for police, politicians and policy makers to explore what was causing people to slide down the slippery path to terrorism.

No-one bothered to listen to what Australia's top cop was saying.

Now, ten years on, with another arch-conservative PM at the helm and yet another war in Iraq looming on the horizon, no-one is listening again.

Abbott has announced this country's participation in yet another attack on Iraq, ostensibly to fight the threat of Islamic extremism in the form of ISIS. And he has raised the terrorism threat level from 'medium' to 'high', followed by massive police actions in some metros leading to the arrest of alleged terrorists, one death, and the call for the ratcheting up of police powers.

The rise of ISIS

Again, no-one seems interested in asking what caused the birth and the rise of ISIS. Or what has been the role of the West - including the US and their sheriff, Australia – in supporting Islamist extremists like ISIS, first in Syria and now in Iraq. Or why young folk in Australia are being driven to join the ranks of these 'Takfiris'.

Perhaps due to the fact that these are inconvenient questions, leading to uncomfortable truths. Truths that point too close to home.

For example: what is Aus-

that Saddam Hussein's 'terrorism' was used to justify 'mass murder'.

asking: who supports and finances ISIS? Surprise, surprise: it's the same folks who support 'terrorism' in the Middle East and elsewhere. Don't take my word for it. Here is a quote: 'Saudi Arabia

remains a critical financial support base for al-Qaeda, the Taliban, LeT [Lashkar-e-Taiba in Pakistan] and other terrorist groups.' - ex-secretary of state Hillary Clinton, in a secret cable released by WikiLeaks.

Is playing the terror card dirty politics or bad policing or both?

Australia's human rights commissioner, Tim Wilson, has warned that 'governments must be wary of trading away liberties for security'.


And Greens senator Scott Ludlam told the ABC he had a 'fundamental problem with the idea that to protect our freedoms we need to abolish them'.

It's arguable that angry white males - from Timothy McVeigh to George Bush have been responsible for more deaths via their brand of 'jihad' than all the hooded Islamist extremists taken together.

Hand in glove

It's also arguable that, if beheadings are a crime in Iraq and Syria under ISIS rule, they are also a crime in Saudi Arabia, where judicial beheadings have accounted for 46 deaths this year, with 19 in August alone. Yet we western powers – including Australia – are hand-in-glove with the Saudi regime and thus culpable in what goes down in Deera Square in Riyadh, known by locals as 'Chop Chop Square.'

Terrorism is beginning to look far more problematic than made out by the mandarins advising our political masters who frame our laws, including any especially bad ones. The best we can say is terrorism is a political fact and a political issue requiring a political response - not just

Robots to rescue rainforests from purple plague

Australia's rare and precious in remote and difficult terrainforests, like the iconic Daintree, could have an unexpected aerial ally in the battle against weeds - autonomous helicopters. Two Project ResQu helicopters developed by CSIRO completed trial flights near Cairns, locating weeds like the dreaded 'purple plague', Miconia calvescens, faster and more reliably than ever.

Developed by robotics researchers at CSIRO, in partnership with Biosecurity Queensland, the unmanned helicopters found weeds using sophisticated imaging technology. The helicopters are safer and a more convenient way of mapping weeds rain.

CSIRO Biosecurity Flagship Science director, Dr Gary Fitt, said access to dense rainforests was difficult for people but all too easy for weeds which get carried in by animals or blown in from gardens or farms.

'Miconia is among the worst of a number of weeds that pose a significant threat to Australia's precious rainforest remnants,' Dr Fitt said. 'Unless detected and eradicated early, they can cause irreversible damage to our native plant and animal populations.

'In biosecurity, effective surveillance is critical. We

need to be able to detect incursions quickly and accurately. Technologies like the autonomous helicopter or other autonomous platforms provide us with another tool in the fight against these biological invasions.'

The unmanned Project

ResQu helicopters surveyed rainforests at El Arish, near Cairns, and found not only miconia but several other weed species. The helicopters can navigate obstacles without human control while recording locations and images for biosecurity staff to scan

for evidence of weeds.

According to robotics researcher Dr Torsten Merz the helicopters are small enough to fit in the back of a van, are easy to use and operate under controlled conditions with failsafe mechanisms built in.

'They performed better than expected, finding miconia plants in dense rainforest that hadn't been spotted before' Dr Merz said.

Queensland science minister Ian Walker said the robotic helicopter played a key role in protecting native flora from weeds and was a good example of using new technology to provide better outcomes. 'They allow the team to review footage when they need to rather than take to the skies and eyeball weeds

on the go from full-sized manned helicopters, which can also be expensive and time consuming,' Mr Walker said.

'This not only saves money but also means we can boost our biosecurity by carrying out more effective mapping?

■ Project ResQu is a twoyear, \$7m project led by the Australian Research Centre for Aerospace Automation (ARCAA) in a collaborative project between the Queensland University of Technology (QUT), CSIRO, Boeing and Insitu Pacific with the support of the Queensland State Government Department of Science, Information Technology, Innovation and the Arts.

a police matter.

Let's be clear: local 'jihadists' need to be confronted and challenged - and, according to experts, the police have adequate powers to do this job and don't need any more.

They certainly don't need special powers to monitor 'any activity that is politically motivated, in the words of Western Australian acting commissioner Steve Brown, talking about the increased police powers to meet the increased terrorist threat level, quoted in Civil Liberties Australia (CLA).

Dystopia

Some would say the war on terrorism is looking suspiciously like a war against the Australian people, a reflection of the Orwellian dystopia of Tony Abbott's Police State Australia, where it's not just jihadists who are spied on but peace activists and environmental protesters.

This is not to say that police don't need to keep a watch for 'Takfiri jihadists' returning from Syria and Iraq. They do. Takfiris see everyone who does not belong to their exclusive Salafist-Wahabi theological club as 'kaffirs', 'infidels.' This happens to include large sections of those who go by the name 'Muslim'. If we are serious about challenging terrorism, it's going to require some soulsearching, not kneejerk reactions. And commitment from politicians and the community to deal with the underlying causes, which include bombing distant countries without cause. And it's going to require engagement with hith-

erto disillusioned sections of our society, especially youth, some of them Muslim, who feel disconnected from Tony Abbott's Australia and all that it stands for.

It's going to require engagement of the old-fashioned kind, of the sort Mick Keelty, an 'old school' cop, was talking about. Keelty's record is not spotless, most glaringly so in the case of the Bali Nine and Gold Coast Dr Mohamed Haneef. But he was spot on when he said: 'I think there is great credit in trying to develop a very tolerant society and a very understanding society. It can be our competitive difference over the rest of the world.

Reasons to be alarmed

What should we be truly alarmed about? Is it the hooded, flag-waving jihadist of any variety? Or the governments that cause them to be born, fund their deadly deeds and exploit them for their own narrow political ends, whether to wage more illegal wars in distant countries for dubious gain, or to win votes from an increasingly disenfranchised and disunited public at home, who are whipped into a racist frenzy and held hostage by blanket surveillance and draconian laws and fear? Where even a playful doodle on a flight depicting the word 'Terrorismadeup" can get a cartoonist offloaded and an interview with the Australian Federal Police. Who should we, Mick Keelty's 'tolerant society,' fear most?

Double Dip-ping

It's that time of the year again, I know because I bead-up with sweat at 6am and need no thermometer to tell me that heavy pasta is on its last days. Get the Aerogard out or, for some, the neem bush (whatever floats your boat), and join the mozzies and blood-sucking midges for a fiesta of doubledipping with friends gathered on the patio.



I for one have an OCD hobby of olive-oil infusions. It's a passion of mine. We are spoilt (I know I over use this word though it's my descriptor to reference the incredible choice we have daily in our grocers) here in Australia. Just the other day I picked up two Italian hitchhikers, Massimo and Juliana. They spent the entire journey telling me how amazing our olive oils are here in Australia and how inexpensive. So, don't take my word for it, take it from a duo from the country that knows a thing or two about olive oils. Personally, I put fresh garlic and whole chilli, dill and capers, lemon zest and cajun spice thoughtfully into my olive oils. I gather up strong-flavoured ingredients to steep in oils in small glass cruets. They look stunning and make impressive additions to any charcuterie or antipasto platter. Buy a few tiny dishes for individual oil tasters, fleck

the oil with some balsamic and crushed sea salt - voila! If you're lazy or time poor, then our countryside has others making the oils for you. Summerland Olives produces a smoky olive oil that's award winning. We're hearing a lot about 'The Farm' in Ewingsdale recently. Apart from all the foodie delights coming soon from this new venture, these guys sell oils for dipping and if you're quick they're running a school holiday pop-up stall at their site at 11 Ewingsdale Road, Ewingsdale, for some free trials of cheeses and their other products. Cobram is another really good Australian producer that has developed a readily available range of oils including a garlic, chilli, onion, and a lemon- infused oil perfect for pan-frying fish or eggplant.

We all know that whipping up a dip can be as easy as Philly cheese and a packet of good ol' Cupa-Soup, but I'm not going to let you do that this time. I've gathered in some good and clever folk to share their inspired, if not culturally intact, blend-ups and combines.



Taramosalata (Greek cod roe dip)

Recipe by Dino Georgakopoulos

Meraki is a Greek word that means soul, creativity, passion. It's the essence one puts into one's work. 'We apply this to everything we do from the ingredients we source to the food we prepare and the way we look after our customers at the bistro,' Dino told me. 'Simple flavours working in perfect harmony: this is the essence of Greek cooking,' he added.

Ingredients

45g crustless white bread 60g cod roe paste 1¹/₂ tbsp finely chopped onion 30ml lemon juice 330ml mild-tasting olive oil Salt and pepper - Oso perni (Greek measure meaning as much as you need!)

Method

Immerse white bread in water and allow to soak for five minutes. Strain bread by firmly squeezing by hand, removing most of the water. Add bread, together with cod roe paste, onion and lemon juice to blender. Blend to combine. Slowly drizzle olive oil in a steady stream while blending until the mixture is smooth and completely combined. Season to taste and add another squeeze of lemon if you think it needs it!



Risshun Yakinasu (Japanese eggplant dip)

Recipe by Tomo san

Tomo san was born in Osaka, Japan. He studied and taught macrobiotic cooking and is eminently skilled in traditional Japanese, Raman, Korean and Chinese cooking.

Ingredients

Japanese or Lebanese egg plants 20ml light soy sauce 5g minced ginger 1 chopped spring onion

Method

Cut 2 or 3 lines into eggplant skin from top to bottom (to make it easy to peel) Grill eggplants until the skin is burnt and it is soft inside then place into cold water. Take the skin off the eggplant. Place everything, except the spring onion, into a blender and blend. Place in a serving bowl and garnish liberally with spring onion.

Beetroot & Mint dip

Recipe by Anthea Amore

Anthea has been a vegan and a passionate gluten-free and vegan cook for the past 26 years. She and her hubby Casper run Byron Bay's only 100 per cent organic, vegan catering company, Organic Passion Catering. Here's her take on a popular staple at gatherings.

Ingredients

Makes about 300g

- ³/₄ cup cashews, soaked in ¹/₄ cup of water for 10 minutes
- 2 medium beetroot, grated (approx 2 cups)
- ¹/₂ bunch fresh mint
- ¹/₄ cup lime (or lemon) juice
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 1¹/₂ tsp good salt
- 3 dsp tamari
- 1 tbs balsamic vinegar

Black or white sesame seeds, to garnish Freshly cracked pepper, to garnish

Directions

Soak the cashews in a blender with the 1/4 cup of water. While they are soaking, prepare all the ingredients.

Footloose and wi-fi free



Brunswick Heads is crowded with good coffee and fare. I say this after chomping down a falafel pocket from Yami's, then, moving to the right and down the lane, I sidled into Footbridge for my after-coffee. This is the after-party for my much-talked-about caffeine addiction spoken of both in these very editorials and by the folks who live close by my house (the lights pop on quite early).

The Footbridge is the epitome of friendliness. It's one of those rare places that appear to source their staff from fairy kingdoms. I put this down to magic powers - it's got to be, it's no easy task hiring and keeping hospitality folk that care and smile all in the same shift. Having said this, I came in at 8am the other day. A friend of mine had been waiting for a macchiato for 45 minutes. It doesn't take much time to figure out that Paul (my friend) is, like me, a coffee junkie. The first signs are the puffy eye-bags (don't tell him I said); yes, I have them too. They usually subside after the first four coffees. I can't imagine the twisted suffering he was experiencing after no drug for this time. Suffice to say, he wasn't happy. He could no longer wait, he told me irritatingly. He called the waitress over and rightly gave her a telling-off. He told her that things were awry and that he couldn't wait any longer. She was gentle and calm in her reply; she apologised and explained how things



had gotten 'away from them'. It was extremely busy, and she added that they were 'waiting on the 9am person to arrive'. We did move on, reluctantly, though the moral of this story is simple: 'nice' staff will leave the door open regardless



and some of them are expert espresso producers too. The dab-handed Aaron makes the boiler sing with my sorta tunes. Haley floats deftly by with a smile from ear to ear, the only thing missing the little cartoon bluebirds fluttering around her good-natured head.

That's the staff, now for the decor. Homely, Melburnesque and comfy. A wall is designed like the fascia of a house beneath an arty mural; it's all for the little folk. A small table and chairs with toys and the stuff for a relaxed or hyperactive Johnny, Jack or Jilly to mull over.

This is the place to come a bit early for brekkie. It's now popular so perhaps try to mix it up a bit, maybe around 11.30am or 6.30am or 2.30pm; I won't be responsible for any other hours should you stumble in. I haven't yet tried lunch but gauging from the brilliant breakfast and the stunning fresh-baked afternoon cakes I've tried thus far, it's not a stretch to imagine the food at lunch to be also good. I've tried eggs here and pancakes with stewed apple, maple and cream. The pannies were buttermilk made with treacle and currants and maple. Great, though the addition of brown sugar to the cream was alarming to my delicate bloodwork. Eggs - perfect and nicely plated, delivered with a smile of course, and avocado, haloumi, sautéed spinach and a great tomato relish all on sourdough. Coffee here never fails to please, though I've only been here when barista Aaron's starring.

I'm a writer often on deadlines, so I do look for wi-fi just for odd stuff - there is none here. It's unplugged just like the

service. They want to interact with humans I think and thankfully there are still people who do. If you find yourself footloose and fancy free in Brunswick Heads, turn off eve-

rything and come build a bridge to get over yourself - humanity and tastebuds only!



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BLUE TILL THE END

After 13 years of broken bones, broken hearts, sore heads, passive aggression, regular aggression, several arrests, questionable skin infections, and a busload of infuriated tour managers, Bluejuice are calling it quits. For Jake Stone, who has been at the helm since early 2001, this is very much the end of an era.



'There is a lot of sadness and excitement. This final tour is sure to go well but none of us really knows what is going to happen after that.'

So why is one of Australia's most loved indie rock acts calling it a day? According to Jake it's as much about growing up, moving on, and people's lives changing as it is about anything.

'Stav has two kids and he doesn't want to keep going.'

There is a certain grief in ending any relationship, let alone the creative partnership of young men forged on the Aussie rock circuit.

'I think losing the band is going to be very very hard. I don't really know what I am going to do and having had a terrible break-up in my life before (romantically) I imagine it will be a bit like that. I have never had a relationship that has lasted 13 years so it's a bit scary letting this go. I don't know what will happen and also I suspect that if we didn't do it now, we wouldn't be getting the attention we are getting for *I'll Go Crazy*.

'It's a really good song and it's getting traction, but as you get older in the industry people perceive you to be a certain age at a certain time, and they start to perceive also that people have heard you so they don't want you around. It's kind of a problem in Australia because it's such a small market. In a bigger market you would be afforded a greater longevity; any band with a platinum record like we have overseas has enough money and enough audience to carry on.

'In fact you would end up with millions of people who want to see you. It's harder here because there's just not the numbers to support your career once you've gone off the Triple J radar.'

Stone doesn't believe that Triple J's new Double J, the digital 'older groovy listener' radio, is doing anything for artists or acts such as his.

'I actually think it's a bad thing; it pushes the people who would be having a continuing career on Triple J into a format that they are comfortable with – off regular rotation and in the company of all the other new music that's out there. Double J has just created a ghetto that takes older people off the radio – while at the same time placating them because they are still 'having radio play' – it just means you are in a format no-one listens to!'

Bluejuice have always pushed the limits, forging their own brand of punk hop and ska-tinged pounding disco for their loyal followers.

As for the Bluejuice career highlights, Stone admits there are too many to list, although going to the US to film the video clip for *I'll Go Crazy* was definitely one of them. After their timid entry onto the music scene as an instrumental act, Bluejuice are determined to go out with a bang. *Retrospectable* is a retrospective album that pulls together the best of their playlist and is being backed up with Retrospectable: The Farewell Tour.

THE SKINNY ON TUBA The members of Tuba Skinny return

The members of Tuba Skinny return to Oz for their fourth Australian tour with a return show in Mullumbimby.

Where are you all from? Members of the band come from all over the United States. Some of us hail from upstate NY, Chicago, California. I come from the Seattle area originally.

Tell me how you met? Most members of the band met right before and right after Hurricane Katrina struck New Orleans, while some came to the city later in the years post-deluge. Most of us met through busking in the French Quarter and in other cities around the US. What happens with a lot of nomadic street performers and bands is that they are a part of a greater web of projects, and performers will be a part of lots of different groups over time, depending on what region they're travelling through. Tuba Skinny comes from a mix of projects that culminated into the one it is today, involving members from the Drunken Catfish Ramblers and the Hokum High-Rollers, two great jug and country-blues bands that began in New Orleans.

How do you think your time busking on the street has added to your onstage repertoire? We practise all of our music on the street first. The street is where we come from as a group, with street dynamics and sensibility. Our repertoire of music comes from the individual research we make on our own time and then bring to the band later, either during busking or at a get-together at one of our homes.

What was the attraction of New Orleans for you? Tell me about how the place has informed your music. I came to New Orleans for inspiration. I was travelling around the country looking for stories to write and found them in New Orleans. I was already performing in ragtime and roots bands, but when I came through New Orleans I met so many other people my age doing the same thing; it was very inspiring. Also, the history of music is so filthy rich in New Orleans; the words *tradition* and *traditional music* are a part of everyday conversation.

New Orleans is all about its roots and so are the people, who will let you know who they are and where they come from. Sometimes living in New Orleans feels like the college any young musician could only dream of. The way musicians, of every age and colour, share ideas and history about their work as well as that of others happens nowhere else. New Orleans is music. Every morning, the first thing I do is turn on the radio, and listen to trad jazz or funk or some old blues. Around every corner, any time of day or night, you'll hear folk practising their instruments. When I bike around town, I almost always have a new melody to whistle.

Tell me about your latest album *Owl Call Blues*. The band is very excited about Owl Call as it is our latest lineup of musicians and our first recording with Greg, Jason and my old friend Craig Flory from Seattle. It is also the first recording we've made from home that we're all really proud of. Our friend, Max Bien-Khan, recorded us in Shaye and Erika's home in the fall and winter of 2013/2014. The name of the album is in tradition with our last, where the name of the album is that of an original tune. In this case, the song is Owl Call Blues, which was composed by Shaye with lyrics by Erika. The album was just a lot of fun to make, despite some of us getting winter colds throughout its creation. I am particularly excited about the songs Greg sings on the album, and the instrumentals Cannonball Blues and Willie the Weeper. Very proud of those tunes.

Born and raised in Northcote, Melbourne, multi-instrumentalist Cat Canteri is best known as the singer/songwriter and drummer in alt-country group The Stillsons.

This year Canteri swaps drums for a guitar and launches her debut solo album *When We Were Young*, performing at the Rails.

Cat, why did you decide to start your album tour for When We Were Young in Yackandandah and Beechworth? Do they have a special significance for you? No particular significance other than that there's a big appreciation for live music there. Justin (The Stillsons) and I have played many acoustic shows in Yack and Beechworth over the years, and we've always really enjoyed ourselves. Friendly country venues, familiar faces... it was a wonderful way to begin the tour.

How has being part of the Stillsons informed your musical journey? The Stillsons have worked hard over the past six years... Three studio albums, countless national tours, and one tour of the UK. I've learnt lots of skills, both musical and non-musical, being part of the band. It's given me lots of confidence and reassurance about my worth as a both a musician and songwriter; and pretty much brought me out of my shell... A LOT!

Who are the players that you most resonate with in the studio or on stage? That's a tricky question, I can't really pick favourites. There are different things I love about so many different musicians. It's impossible to pick just a few.



What did you want to achieve with When We Were Young?

When We Were Young was originally going to be called *Gentle Giant*. It was going to be a concept album with songs about my family. The title changed, but the themes are still centred around my family and my personal relationships. I suppose the ultimate goal was to create a record that I'd enjoy putting on at home, or in my car, and letting it run from start to finish.

What is it like stepping out from behind the drums? Heaps of fun! It's great being at the front of the stage, and get to jam with everyone in the band properly!

What should we expect for your Mullumbimby show? The show at St Martin's Hall will be unique, as I've heard it is a really beautiful acoustic space. We're planning to keep the show as intimate as possible, and focus on sharing stories with the music. People can bring in their own food and drinks, and chill out while they watch the music.

Justin Bernasconi from The Stillsons is going to be opening the show with a solo set on acoustic guitar. He's an absolutely gorgeous fingerpicker; I'm really looking forward to hearing him. Cat Canteri plays the **Rails** in Byron on

Thursday.

What is it about the music of the 1920s big bands that drew you in?

I suppose we're inspired by the utmost imagination that groups like Jelly Roll's Hot Peppers and Big Joe King Oliver's bands had. What these band leaders composed, as well as what the players improvised, is absolutely stunning. What captivates us is the sense of ensemble and group innovation these players share.

We're also highly inspired by the country-blues and ensemble abilities of the Memphis Jug Band and Dallas String Band. So much of the 'Dixieland' music people are always harping on about doesn't have these qualities of playing together and creating a space that is meant for dancing and shaking till long past midnight. Earlier, turn of the century, rural- and ragtime-inspired musicians found group ensemble a must.

How do you set about to contemporise a sound that is almost 100 years old?

We have no intention of making this music contemporary. There is already so much contemporary music all over the airwaves and showing on the internet; this music is just fine live and downbeat on the street. A lot of groups, since the time this music was originally performed, have sought to capture it the way it was, and I think that makes sense, as we like the way the old guys and gals played. No problem, let's keep it real.

What should we expect for your return show to Mullumbimby?

What you can expect are a lot of new tunes, some that both Greg and Erika will sing together; others that we'll sing as a band, and a lot of fun instrumentals. I look forward to seeing all the old familiar faces there. We had such a fun time shaking the last time we were in town that I expect we will again – if not more.

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



Reviews

THE GIVER

Once upon a time, the future dawned clear and bright. Mankind was presented with endless possibilities - progress meant that things could only keep getting better. Not any more. Pessimism, paranoia and the scurvy dog of cynicism have it that Tomorrow will be awful. There is, admittedly, not a lot happening Today to dissuade us of that notion, especially with our myopic leadership. So veteran Australian director Phillip Noyce's latest effort, though deferring initially to the prevailing negativity, manages to work as a tonic by suggesting that humanity's flaws and foibles might necessarily be co-habitants with our more angelic impulses.

The apocalypse has come and gone and, in its wake, communities have evolved that are harmonious and peaceful but rigidly controlled by a 'thought police', which is represented by Meryl Streep in a Mary Travers wig (I couldn't decide if I liked it or not, but it's certainly very kinky). As in so many of these scenarios, youngsters are assigned a station in life upon reaching a certain age. In this instance, Jonas (Brenton Thwaites) is told that he will become the heir of the Giver (Jeff Bridges), who will impart to him, by grasping his forearms, all knowledge and memory of the past. Jonas's enlightenment only makes him acutely aware of the barren nature of his brave new world, so he strikes out to rediscover and revive all that has been proscribed.

After starting in B/W, most scenes are filmed with a bland, pastel palette, but in the pre-apocalyptic flashbacks through which the Giver exposes Jonas to what has been lost, we see Yesterday's world in vivacious, high-saturation colour. It is a technique that introduces moments of awe and wonder, of unexpected beauty and heartbreak -

peasants dancing, a buoyant Nelson Mandela, that heroic protester in front of the tank in Tianenmen Square - it brings reality to the tale. Notwithstanding the needless religiosity of the final scene (the Baby Jesus reference was beyond the pale), I was uplifted and encouraged to think that maybe all is not lost after all.

THE EOUALIZER

A current theory among anthropologists speaks of the 'survival of the nicest'. It argues that before the bull goose loony could seize power over the tribe he needed first to charm it with his 'people skills'. It makes sense; populism and the jackboot are a potent mix - countless war cemeteries the world over testify to that. As one of Hollywood's 'nicest' and most marketable commodities, Denzel Washington epitomises the type like no other actor. We loved him as an alcoholic, cocaine snorting pilot in 'Flight' and would probably turn a blind eye if he were to throttle Bambi. In this he is Robert McCall, a humble employee of Home Mart, living alone in a modest but fastidiously kept flat overlooking Boston's docks. An insomniac, he recycles tea-bags while reading Hemingway at 2am in an Edward Hopper diner (on Chestnut St!).

After another night owl, hooker Teri (Chloë Grace Moretz) is beaten to a pulp by her pimp, a foul-mouthed arrogant Russian with bad skin, McCall draws on his skills as a retired CIA operative to right the wrong. The Ruskie, rest assured, was asking for a bullet in the throat. It's that type of movie, with director Antoine Fugua taking unseemly pleasure in graphic, blood-splattered violence. A Mr. Big among Moscow's burgeoning clan of top-shelf crims sends his most callous henchman, a sociopath who makes Liberty Valance look like Tiny Tim, to

deal with McCall and it is one brutal slaying after another from then on.

The story is rudimentary, with McCall the cool, calm and collected vigilante sending crooks to their maker without raising a sweat. Washington is good, of course, as are those who play the repugnant villains and bent cops, while Mauro Fiore's cinematography, particularly his nocturnal shots, is high-gloss seductive and Harry Greason-Williams's score complements each scene with the perfect aural tone. As an unabashed advocate that might is right, the film is an uply reflection of the temper of the times - and I'm sorry to say I enjoyed it heaps.

LUCY

On the morning before I saw this film I received an image on my Facebook newsfeed. It was of Gaza. An old Arab man, wailing in despair, was holding something aloft for the camera to capture - for the world to see. It was the corpse of a child, charred black from an explosion. Her legs had been blown off. It reminded me of the photograph of that little Vietnamese girl running naked from her village - terrified and uncomprehending - after it had been scorched and obliterated by napalm.

Tears welled in my eyes. When will it ever end? A few hours later, sitting joyless and bored beyond salvation among an audience that cheerily guzzled jumbo Cokes and stuffed their faces with popcorn as Scarlett Johansson ever so sexily blasted the brains and guts out of the bad guys in yet another sci-fi blockbuster, I could not help but wonder ... what has caused the disconnect between the reality of carnage and the mindless consumption of it as entertainment? Scarlett plays Lucy (she's back to being a blonde) who, after an abduction scene that involves a display of panting and whimpering that is embarrassing even by amateur theatre standards, is forced to be a drug mule for a really nasty Oriental crook.

The contraband chemical (it resembles the blue meth that Jessie and Walt manufactured in Breaking Bad) turns her into a super-powered, omnipotent, timetravelling, god-like hornbag.

Morgan Freeman is in the mix doing his usual wise-old-codger thing and Amr Waked, as the tough detective, is a sort of French Jason Statham (you can't go wrong with a stubbled stereotype). There is probably meant to be a reference in the title to the Beatles' classic song from Sgt Pepper's, but if that is the case it's only a desperate act of self-glorification.

As for director Luc Besson's pretentiousness and insistence on tarting up psycho-babble as profundity, his lamentable movie is in the same league as Terrence Malick's risible The Tree of Life.
