Steamrolled

Byron Shire Council's general manager Ken Gainger has refused to explain why a chemical-free steam-weeding trial – operated by a contractor – is not being given the opportunity to produce the best outcomes.

Contractor and garden maintenance operator Paul Sommers says despite 'repeated' advice that best results would be achieved by another treatment within a few weeks, he was instead instructed by staff to undertake sporadic sprays.

Questions put to the GM by *The Echo* were instead answered by Council's infrastructure services director, Phil Holloway. He now backs steamweeding, despite questioning its effectiveness recently to *Echonetdaily*.

Mr Holloway said, 'We are convinced that this weed-control method should be embedded into Council's ongoing weed-control program, so we are currently investigating the purchasing of our own equipment and the licensing and training of our own operators.' 'We are confident that the elected Council will support this initiative and provide us with the budget required to do this effectively,' Mr Holloway said. He added the outcomes of the trial will be reported to Council in February.

Bewildered

Mr Sommers told *The Echo* he is 'bewildered' why Council staff would first ignore his advice on producing a best trial outcome, downplay the effectiveness of chemicalfree spraying and then announce intentions to invest in the machinery themselves.

The technology used is manufactured by Australian company Weedtechnics, who claim there are currently over 80 chemical-free weed control projects in place across the country. The invention steams weeds with a patented nozzle, and has been taken up by councils across Australia to achieve chemical-free open spaces and parks.

Rail costings revealed by free market

The cost to establish a privately owned diesel rail shuttle service from the Arts and Industry Estate into Byron Bay has put the credibility of a \$2m government-funded rail study into question.

At around \$300,000 per kilometre, the 3.4 km railway project planned by the North Byron Beach Resort will come in just under \$1m, according to manager Jeremy Holmes.

He told *The Echo* that only one in seven sleepers need replacing, along with repairs to the Belongil Creek bridge, platform construction and upgrades to level crossings at Kendall

and Shirley Streets. And a 100-seater twocar currently being restored is, 'Technically not light rail, but is regarded as lighter than normal rail,' he said. Ongoing costs would be subsidised by a passenger fare in the order of \$3 for a one-way journey, according to the resort's website.

No government analysis

So what does the 2013 government-funded *Casino to Murwillumbah Transport Study* say about railcar shuttle costings and viability?

While no detailed analysis of light rail or rail shuttle was undertaken, consultants Arup claimed that the estimated construction cost to 'reinstate rail line to a level suitable for XPT services' from Mullumbimby to Byron Bay would be \$202,326,700.

Light rail and rail shuttle costings were not analysed, according to the report, because, 'It has also been recognised that a rail commuter service (either light or heavy rail) would not be viable without a significant level of ongoing government subsidy' [page 8]. Additionally the report concluded, 'Light rail provides fewer transport benefits than heavy rail' [page 67].

But those comments are at odds with findings from a 2004 Tweed Shire Council study which compared XPT (heavy rail) and railcar shuttle. Included in the Arup report, it claimed railcar shuttle could be 'implemented with little or no impact to current main line services.'

Overall, the Tweed Council report found it provides a 'good rail service at frequencies that are relevant to customers', despite the assets 'being in poor condition'.

The Echo asked MP Don Page (Nationals) if he was concerned with the lack of costing analysis for rail shuttle in the rail report, and whether it could result in skewing poor public transport outcomes.

He replied that the section of rail between town and the North Byron Resort is in fairly good shape.

Calls to protect World War I trees, planted by locals, from govcorp

The gaffe-prone NSW Crown and claimed current opera-Holiday Parks Trust (NCHP) that run all three caravan parks and some reserves in Brunswick Heads has again infuriated locals.

This time, it's the alleged mismanagement and the possible planned removal of endangered cypress trees that were planted nearly 100 years ago by locals in memory of World War I soldiers.

Many descendents of those who planted and maintained the trees still live locally.

An urgency motion by Cr Di Woods at last Thursday's Council meeting saw a unanimous vote to ask NSW minister for the environment Rob Stokes to intervene and place an interim heritage order within the Terrace Caravan Park, formerly known as the Brunswick Heads World War I Memorial Park.

The motion will also see, 'Council work with community members to identify and map the tree line to provide to the minister.'

The National Trust was in support, Ms Woods said, tors of the park, NCHP, were neglecting the trees and removing branches.

'This is appalling management by NCHP, she told councillors.

Earlier in the day, Bangalow RSL secretary Col Draper spoke in favour of the interim heritage order and confirmed longtime local Darcy O'Meara's research.

The plantings were recorded in the Mullumbimby Star and Northern Star circa 1918, 1919, and 1930.

Ms Woods said that those tasked with maintaining the trees back in 1918, 'travelled in the back of trucks, on horseback and on foot to plant, water and nurture the seedlings.'

A number of these men fought at Gallipoli and on the western front, she added.

NCHP plans

The 200-page plan of management for the Terrace Caravan Park from April 2014 claims that the trees and others like it 'are being lost as they become old and dangerous, but there is no recruitment of new trees to replace them.'

While NCHP's plans for the trees are fairly vague, their root systems at least appear to be within their sights.

With the park 'surveyed and mapped', areas will be identified, 'where the presence of coastal cypress root systems are significant constraints to developments such as installation of in-ground services and construction of buildings and infrastructure in the holiday park.'

Evans Head park residents evicted

Meanwhile, plans by NCHP are going ahead to evict holiday vans and their owners from the Silver Sands Park in Evans Head.

ABC reported on December 10 that Richmond Valley mayor, Ernie Bennett, says the state government ignored community concerns when it took over control of the site from the council. 'The local community, [in] a low-socioeconomic area, could afford to go there in the past and had their vans and stuff there.'

New road upgrade thanks to council partnership, resident fundraisers

After four years of working with Council, the Skinners Shoot Road upgrade and sealing was completed last week.

It ends years of constant complaints and grievances from residents about the poor condition of the rutted road and the increasing concerns associated with the fine white billowing dust which some residents claim was causing health problems.


Representatives for the group, Terry and Christine Ahern, said that what started out in 2007 as a petition to Council for a road upgrade has now ended in a councilcommunity partnership and an excellent outcome.

Fundraising

They say residents raised \$100,000 for the road contributions to upgrade the last 750 metres of Skinners Shoot Road south of Yagers Lane.

Mr Ahern said, 'The Skinners Shoot residents wish to acknowledge the unerring support of councillors and, in particular, mayor Simon Richardson, who organised meetings between the residents and Council staff, helped facilitate flexibility in resident contributions and kept track of the process to its completion.

In addition, he thanked Council staffer Phil Holloway and John Bashforth from

Bashforth's road constructions in processing the works to completion.

'Initially, Council staff's standard recommendation was that the cost be attributed by length of road frontage, estimated to be around \$200,000. After Tony Pangallo and Christine Ahern spoke at Council's open access on three occasions to request a different approach, a Council resolution was made to obtain road engineering specifications.

'The resolution also questioned the requirement for kerb and guttering, and engaged a private contractor to quote and allow residents to make their own arrangements as far as contributions were concerned, especially when four of the landowners chose not to contribute.

'This allowed others to cover the shortfall. In all, resi-

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

'It's much better than in other places including through the Tyagarah area, which is in very bad shape.

'The costings in the transport study were only one factor which led to the conclusion that any combination of trains, regardless of cost, would not meet the public transport needs of the northern rivers region.

'Rail not being able to serve two of the three largest populated centres (Ballina and Tweed) was a major reason trains were ruled out, as was likely patronage levels.

'The original transport study was not skewed towards a rail trail. The rail trail proposal was subject to a separate study later on which said if trains aren't viable at this point in time, rail trail is a good option.'

Council's position

concept plan and design for the rail trail, considerations of multiple uses such as that already approved for the North Beach development [should] be incorporated.'

Investment

Cr Ibrahim told The Echo the motion was about 'securing regional investment', referring to the promise of \$75m from the government and the recent rail trail study.

'I had it on good advice that the northern rivers was in a good position to secure a massive investment in regional tourism, the precise sort of tourism that our own strategy is aiming for.

'I campaigned for the rail trail and many people I spoke to during the campaign told me that the rail trail was a nobrainer, and that trains would never come back for the simple reason that hardly anyone solution for the good of all the community.

'When thinking about the most important piece of infrastructure we have in the shire, isn't it rational to do our due diligence and look at all the options, cost and design them, and then choose the best option?

'I applaud the efforts of NRRT to turn a disused piece of infrastructure into something that may be used by ten per cent of residents and ten per cent of visitors. Ten per cent is better than zero per cent. But is that the best Byron can get?

'Shouldn't we expect that costings be provided about services that may be used by the other 90 per cent?'

'With some of the TOOT leadership not wanting to have a trackless transport service costed even if it meant a light rail service would be costed also, and the NRRT leadership not wanting their stated belief of a rail-based service alongside a rail trail to be costed either, the opportunity to get out of the trenches and to shake hands rather than fists, for the good of all the community, has been lost.' The mayor added the only winners would be the state government, as they could 'finally kill the albatross of broken public transport promises that has been hanging around their necks.'

Local governance end-of-year finale show

Decisions, declarations, diatribes and debate were aplenty at last Thursday's Council meeting, which was the last for the year and the last for retiring planning director Ray Darney.

Well done Ray, you made it! And thus, in no particular order, here are some highlights: Telstra's plans to plonk a tower 50 metres next to the Ocean Shores school on council land were deferred, despite some morning lobbying by representatives assuring us soothingly that there is nothing at all to worry with electromagnetic radiation.

Councillors voted unanimously to delay a decision

until they had the opportunity to inspect the Ocean Shores site in the new year.

Resident Ray Musgrave told Council during public access that, in the initial plan, the tower would have been, 'right in front of my living room, no joke'. Mr Musgrave said that after some talk, Telstra reps came back to suggest moving the tower 15 metres. Despite the concession, Mr Musgrave says Telstra is still not complying with NSW telecom guidelines.

Broken Head estate refused

Moving on, a highly contentious development proposal to turn a former sand quarry at Broken Head into a community-title housing development of around 40 blocks was knocked back.

Councillors also voted against a staff recommendation that the developers be given the opportunity to reconsider the proposal.

But they agreed to require the property owners demonstrate that they were adhering to the terms of their existing DA by remediating the former quarry and regenerating the ecologically endangered vegetation at the site. Mayor Simon Richardson said, 'Byron is the third most bio-diverse region in Australia and Broken Head is our jewel in the crown.

'If ever a precautionary principle should apply it is in

Broken Head.' Cr Chris Cubis was alone in not supporting the council resolution.

Mayor harangued

The late withdrawal of a motion by the mayor over the multi-use of the disused railways caused some awkward moments.

Butler Street resident Paul Jones and fellow residents were upset that he wasn't given the opportunity to speak on the mayor's Collaboratively Preparing A Rail Corridor Project That Responds To Byron's Needs.

Along with fellow residents, Mr Jones is facing the prosepect of an unwanted bypass and is hoping Council would consider their Grab The Rail proposal. It's made even more awkward by the fact that the current bypass option is unlikely to even address any long-term solutions.

Mr Jones expressed his disgust and then left the chamber. Later he told The Echo, 'All along the mayor has sided with Council management to ram this bypass through?


'He is prepared to sacrifice not only his own community's heritage neighbourhood and culture but a huge swath of SEPP 14 wetlands at the end of Butler Street known to contain a large diversity of plants and animals when there is a proven and far superior alternative.

'We could build a firstclass bus transit centre alongside town, with perfect convenience and safety for travellers and utilise the old railway station?

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Community colleges wrapped in new government red tape

A new coalition policy for vocational funded programs has added more layers of bureaucracy for the Byron Community College, director Richard Vinycomb has told *The Echo*.

Known as Smart and *Skilled*, the NSW government will overhaul Vocational Education and Training (VET) from next year, and the government claims students will, 'have more choice when selecting courses and training providers?

But it's come under intense criticism; according to the NSW Teachers Federation, it will see a significant rise in student fees and debt and has followed TAFE teacher redundancies.

And The Australian's (News Corp) John Ross reported recently, 'Public servants have rechristened the program "Dumb and Dumber". He reported that under the new scheme, 'places will be contracted out centrally from the Education Department's Sydney headquarters. And there's little to no

transparency: 'The government has refused to discuss the process, and contracts,' he writes.

But Mr Vinycomb says he is confident Byron Community College will provide the same level of education, despite 'government restrictions and very restrictive funding limitations.'

'Our successful short courses and full-fee-paying qualifications will continue in 2015, he says, 'but there is now an emphasis on funding community colleges in NSW for sets of accredited units, especially for disadvantaged learners.

'This is fine for some students, and we will offer these, but we have currently lost the opportunity to have any significant places in funded full certificates, such as muchneeded children's services.

Ad hoc allocations

'Also there is a concern that there have been some strange decisions with ad hoc allocations all over NSW to education providers who do not have any track record in a

particular region. It's good to have healthy competition and deregulation, but some flyin-fly-out organisations are even asking local community colleges if they can use their training rooms or hire their staff. This outside contracting may work out well for large providers expanding, but there is a need to be vigilant on quality training?

Mr Vinycomb warned potential students that 'If you or anyone you know or see deals being promoted in vocational training, look into the detail beyond the fees. Who is providing this training, where are they from and what sort of personal face-to-face training support will you get?'

As for local representation, retiring MP Don Page (Nationals) told The Echo. 'I've always had a good relationship with Richard Vinycomb, who I regard as an excellent advocate for community colleges.'

'Richard and I have discussed the new Smart and Skilled contract arrangements and I have made both

written and verbal representations to the minister for education in relation to his and my concerns.'

Meanwhile NSW Labor has vowed to scrap Smart and Skilled if elected next year, and the coalition say they will review it after one year.

Mr Vinycomb says, 'For funded courses, which attract low income learners for skill gaps, we are in danger of heading deeper into an uncaring, bums-on-seats, drip-fed, centralised funding approach?

'This can lead to singleminded vocational adult learning where the notion of individual attention, life enhancement, sustainability and community networks are completely sacrificed.

'One thing community colleges in NSW and Victoria have generally done very well is caring about every student's learning journey and helping them achieve their desired goals. We are the major deliverer of vocational training and life-enhancing education in the Byron Shire for over 21 years.

Don't drown, okay?

That august institution, Surf Life Saving Australia, launched its annual National Coastal Safety Report on the weekend.

Life savers had the pleasure of the prime minister's company for the launch in Sydney at the Queenscliff club, Mr Abbott's turf (or sand). Fortunately for all concerned the prime minister resisted the lure of Speedos and remained fully clothed throughout the ceremony.

It was a good year for drownings, in that there were less of them. Thanks to the good work of Surf Life Saving volunteers and lifeguards, there were no drownings between the red and yellow flags, or more exactly, in the water out from the flags.

In his keen grasp of the bleeding obvious, Mr Abbott remarked, 'If you swim between the flags you can be very confident you will be looked after and you will be safe.

It's one of the great Australian services which no whacky piece of legislation has been able to undermine as yet.

'Beach patrols, surveillance and emergency response measures combined to help reduce the number of coastal drowning deaths by almost a third in 2013-14,' notes the report. Nevertheless 84 people drowned at the beach.

Of those, 89 per cent were male. Among the blokes most of them were aged 60 to 64, of which 91 per cent died while boating, fanging about on jetskis, rock fishing or diving.

Libs run a blitzkrieg on healthcare

ne of the more irritating aspects of our frequently exasperating prime minister is that even when he does a backflip, he doesn't do it properly.

There is never an apology, or a retraction: he was always right and now he's still right.

It was a good policy, now it's a better policy. You should have been happy before, and now you ought to be delirious.

But the punters are not convinced

Of course, there are times when Tony Abbott won't admit there is even an issue in spite of overwhelming evidence.

Take, for instance, the ludicrous and hypocritical suggestion that the problems in his office stem not from the obsessive and dictatorial arrogance of his chief of staff, but from the sexism and misogyny of his colleagues. Those of them who have had a gutful of Abbott's enforcer, whether her name is Peta, Peter, Lucrezia Borgia or Genghis Khan, are not impressed.

And even when he moves to assuage or counter public criticism, he can't bring himself to offer more than a token.

Julie Bishop's belated announcement of the \$200 million to the World Climate Fund - the despised Bob Brown Bank, masquerading as environmentalism under the guise of socialism is better than nothing, but not much. Even Abbott's fellow recalcitrant, Canadian Stephen Harper, has kicked in half as much again, while Japan's contribution was a full billion and without strings attached: Australia will pay its instalments over four years, if it makes the payments.

And it will not be new money anyway: Abbott will raid the already depleted foreign aid budget, something Bishop had vowed never to do. Another public slap down from the prime minister to his loyal deputy.

But by far the important tergiversation of the week is the apparent ditching of the \$7 GP tax in favour and of its replacement. This is not only serious, but downright sinister.

The headline good news is that pensioners, children and concession card holders will be spared, which comes as a welcome relief to much of the neediest section of the population.

But the far more ominous bad news is that the changes will, if passed, be the most determined and far-reaching attack on the Medicare system ever contemplated other than

downright abolition. To explain, we need to go back to the long and fraught history of our much-loved uni-

versal health-care scheme. When, nearly fifty years ago, doctors Richard Scotton and John Deeble provided Gough Whitlam with what was then Medibank, their peculiar genius

was the idea of bulk billing. The determinedly independent body of Australian medicos would not submit to any concept of what they called socialised medicine, so they did not get it: they were allowed to continue to set their own fees at their own levels.

But there was a sweetener; after consulting the profession, Medibank set up a schedule which would determine the Commonwealth governmentfunded rebates which would apply for the appointments and procedures.

The individual doctors could charge what they liked, but any



gaps they demanded they would have to bill for themselves, involving their own bookkeeping.

But if they chose to stick with the rebates, there was virtually no paperwork: patients would sign a form assigning their payments to Medibank and Medibank would send the proceeds to the medicos' accounts - a big saving in time and money.

The specialists were not interested; they demanded real money, and much of their income came not from the Commonwealth but from the states, through the public hospital networks.



welcome bonus, but that was all. But a great many GPs, after some initial resistance, came round to the idea of a guaranteed minimum income without the need to burden a secretary or a receptionist to double up as an accountant.

And so bulk billing became the core of Medibank, and, when it was reformed and rejigged by the government of Bob Hawke, of Medicare.

As time went on the Medicare levy of 1.5 per cent rose to 2 per cent (with a surcharge for high income earners without private health insurance) but it was not sufficient to secure the rising health budget.

Hawke tinkered with the idea of a co-payment, but was rebuffed by his colleagues and by the GPs themselves, who had settled very comfortably into the longstanding regime. It took another generation for Abbott to revive the idea.

Obviously it was wildly unpopular with the public, and it was attacked by Labor and many others as an attack on the whole idea of universal Medicare. It was, but at least the copayment was up front: the patients had to cough up their \$7, which the medicos then handed over to consolidated revenue under the guise of a research fund. It would be expensive and time-consuming, but it was, in its own way, straightforward.

However the new version, even though the amount of the impost is to be reduced, is underhand, mean and sneaky. Instead of a co-payment from the patient, there is to be a deduction in the rebate from the doctor.

The government is still to get the loot, but the doctor is faced with the choice of collecting it from the patient, or simply forgoing the income. Thus the GP will have to select whom and when to charge the \$5 (or a part of it) and go through the unpleasant task of getting it, processing it, and banking it him- or herself.

The frustration and resentment will fester on both sides. And in the end, a lot of doctors will decide that it simply isn't worth it: they may as well forget bulk billing altogether and go back to a system of user pays, where they can charge their own fees, which will, because of the extra expense involved, inevitably go up.

The Liberals have never liked the idea of Medicare and public health; now they have devised, under the façade of a compromise, an insidious and possibly fatal attack on it.

This is not barnacle removable - it is blitzkrieg. It is to be hoped that the senate will have the perspicacity and determination to hold the line and protect what has been acknowledged as the Whitlam government's greatest and most enduring legacy.

The state of play in Council

■ Last Thursday, Council's true state of play revealed! First Mayor Richardson moved that Council adopt the new Community Charter for Good Planning. The charter expands community participation in government decision-making. It received wide support from NSW communities, including Suffolk Park, Byron Bay and Ewingsdale. Cr Rose Wanchap, who before elections championed public consultation, voted against the motion.

Next up was Wanchap's motion directing Council staff to spend up to \$15,000 on a design making Ewingsdale Road three permanent lanes: one outbound and two inbound funnelling through the Jonson Street North carpark to Bay Street along Main Beach.

Mayor Simon Richardson explained that planning for Byron town centre fell within the scope of Byron Bay Master Plan Group, noting the group report that an overwhelming majority of 1,500+ submissions so far had one theme: get cars out of our town centre. He said that across Australia, councils are moving traffic away from beachfronts.

Ignoring the mayor's sound arguments, the motion was passed by the Gang of Five (Wanchap, Ibraham, Woods, Cubis and Hunter). The impact? The slowest point of our present traffic jam, at the roundabout, might move a dozen carlengths closer to Main Beach.

Sweeping generalisations about weed management are not serving the community or the environment well. Could we please separate the discussion into different, though related, areas?

1. Urban parks and public space. This is a focus for many participants in discussion, and the results of trials of the steamweeder will be of great interest.

2. Rural roadsides. Decades ago, the slasher and its side arm were introduced as an alternative to wholesale roadside spraying. The results are beautiful in many circumstances, but the machinery also spreads serious environmental weeds such as Morning Glory, Madeira Vine and, topically, Jumpseed. The side arm smashes Coral Tree into fragments, all of which are capable of growing into new trees. Now we find ourselves needing herbicide to control weeds that spread from the roadside to adjacent private land. We're possibly not imagining the steamweeder getting around our whole rural road network and dealing with the terrain?

3. Bush regeneration in na-

tive vegetation. Skilled bush regenerators efficiently remove competitive exotic vegetation using small quantities of low-toxicity herbicide. Hand weeding can produce excellent results in some circumstances, depending on the weed species, though sometimes herbicides can be more appropriate (avoiding soil disturbance and enabling translocation through a whole plant from stem injection) as well as more efficient. Herbicide toxicity?

Please check your sources. Read about 'predatory open access publishing' in Wikipedia and refer to lists of pseudo-scientific, pseudopeer-reviewed journals.

4. Industrial-scale agriculture, based on GMO crops, with poor regulatory oversight, driven by unscrupulous multinational companies. Truly terrible, but no-one is doing this in Byron Shire.

Weed management is complex and it will be helpful to recognise that what works for parks and gardens may not be appropriate for other situations. In addition, everyone can work together to prevent some of the weed

problems, for instance by will obviously reduce the preventing the dumping of garden refuse in the bush and ensuring that invasive plants are not bought, sold and planted.

Strategies that prevent the spread of weeds, or perhaps eradicate them completely,

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

Cycling the shire: perils and triumphs

My name is Josh, and you may have seen me pedalling through town over the last ten years on my 'Bent' bike (RecumBent that is).

During this time I have been a regular weekday cycle commuter between my home in Bruns and my work at Shearwater school at the back of Mullumbimby.

This week, with some cycling friends, I am celebrating a 'milestone' because all of my small rides in the Shire have added up to the distance around the world! Getting to that distance has not seemed all that hard to me, because as Paul Kelly so eloquently puts it: 'from little things, big things grow'. Small regular rides do add up over time. The scary thing is how many times we drive our cars also adds up to many times 'around' the world without anyone realising it.

Beginning

When I was in high school I biked to school, locking my bike in the 'cage' with all of the hundreds of other kids' bikes each morning. Of course once I got my P plates my poor bike was left in the garage to rust. Fast forward 25 years and my doctor is telling me that if I didn't lose weight fast my knees would start to give out. I bought a bike, and my partner and I culled the family car fleet from two down to one, and we never looked back.

At first I was a bit scared of traffic and worried about how long riding would take. Interestingly I have since found that a trip that appears difficult, dangerous and long when viewed from inside a car is often quite the opposite on a bike. There is a profound perspective change, and some

Einsteinian time dilation going on, I'm sure. The rational part of me has pondered the odds of injury and premature death from riding, and worked out that while I may have a slightly higher risk of a crash, there is a much larger counterbalancing reduction of my risk of heart disease and cancer, so overall the odds are well in the cyclist's favour. To help keep the balance in my favour I choose to never drink and ride, I wear a helmet, I have bright front and rear lights for night riding, and also I never wear earphones so I can always hear the traffic.

Good drivers

For ten years people have said to me, 'What about all the dangerous drivers on the road?' My experience is that nearly all the drivers I have shared the road with have been careful and courteous, and I appreciate that sometimes people do have to wait a little when there is no room to pass.

Only once in ten years did one car cut me off, and even that was at low speed.

Three cheers for the bus

years when some tubing was laid between Uncle Tom's and Mullumbimby. It has a generous cycling lane with a clearly marked white line on the edge, and minimal pothole action. I heard a rumour that a previous councillor, Peter Westheimer, was responsible for the inclusion of this excellent bit of bikeway. Hopefully our current and future leaders will also seek glory and a measure of immortality through this means! It is my personal dream that all of the main connecting roads between towns and schools in the Shire could be upgraded to this standard, and I hope that the political will can be found to do this.

Be prepared

Regular cycling in the Shire is very doable. Getting rained on, for instance: I reckon that I only get seriously wet about four times a year. Often we have a pattern where rain will blow in quickly, but by waiting for 10 minutes or so a fine patch often appears and then I can get home without getting wet.

As well as this, some preplanning is required so as to have changes of clothes and

Yes, to do a regular cycle requires buying some extra stuff: pump, puncture kit, tyre levers, rain coat, chain lube, waterproof bag and new tyres now and then.

This can add up to a few hundred dollars a year, which seems a lot but is actually an absolute bargain compared to the cost of owning a second car.

Not only that, but instead of putting \$ into petrochemicals you can give them to the very cycle-friendly Jay or Dave at True Wheel Cycles instead and feel a warm inner glow about that! (If you count each week's rides as a substitute for a gym membership fee then it looks even better!)


Slower pace

After I started commuting, I grew confident enough to ride socially. I don't go fast enough to keep up with the serious lycra heads (MAM-ILS) but there are plenty of other riders who love a slower pace and enjoy sharing the many wonderful back roads and countryside that we are blessed with.

Trust me, it is fabulous out there, and you will see and experience the journey at least ten times better in the open air on a bike, than you possibly could from the confines of a motor vehicle. All good roads eventually come to an end, and so I am off to Melbourne with my bike for a sabbatical year. I hear they have some seriously long bike paths and some very well patronised rail trails there. I'll start my next 'circumnavigation' while I check them out to see if they stack up to the Shire. Happy riding!

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Why I want to see the North Coast CSG Free

"I think locals deserve to hear the real story about risky coal seam gas from independent experts rather than just being bombarded with industry spin from the CSG aligned National Party politicians and lobbyists."

There is no life without water...

Independent research by the National Water Commission has found many potential dangers associated with coal seam gas developments and its impact on our precious water systems.

Out of the many risks identified by the commission, let me briefly touch on three standout threats that underpin my drive to see the North Coast declared CSG Free.

- 1. The commission warns that CSG drilling may cause reductions in surface water flows that could affect surface water systems, ecosystems, irrigation and grazing lands. It has the potential to also lead to land subsidence over large areas of ground;
- 2. CSG production requires large volumes of waste water to be treated. Should this water make its way into other surface water systems it could alter natural flow patterns and have significant impacts on water quality, and on river and wetland health; and
- 3. The practice of hydraulic fracturing, or fracking, involves injecting water, sand, and chemicals into underground rock to free reserves of gas. Fracking has the potential to damage the quality of groundwater and result in cross-contamination between aquifers.

On the issue of water alone, I believe that CSG presents itself as just too great a poisonous risk to residents, the environment, farms, valleys, communities, and to our general prosperity.

Our region has already embraced renewable energy technologies like solar. Renewables need to be our focus as our entire economy transitions

The 1960s saw beards, music, poetry and sex all freely available. At the time I was just a toddler; however, my full-sized bro was into it big time. Acid, dope and the familiar psychedelic posters lit with UV black lights, King Crimson, Uriah Heap, Sergeant Peppers, Stones, all albums spinning on my brother's homemade turntable blaring out across the valley.

It was an indelible period for either working corthose who were there. At the time it seemed like the beautiful people all lived in my brother's flat under my parent's house. I was a tot but I drank in the dulcet tones of Woodstock folk and rock with all of its depth and truth. These eccentric people with their alien colours and textures are now









ing all three decades. To me it doesn't matter what era is being emulated, it's just heartening to see people squeezing the colour back into our lives again even if it's just in a fashion sense. I swear I saw Joan Baez in the corner of my eye – certainly the costume was down pat. The experience here is kind of caring, childlike and soft (now I really sound drugged).

This is a feelgood place. It's open, but small; it's friendly but not imposing; the staff are chatty yet not too familiar; and the menu's uncluttered and simple with nothing over \$14. They serve down-to-earth food where you can taste every element - it embodies my metaphor – the 60s; it's either that, or they've slipped something in my chai. Anything negative, I hear you say? Only trivial stuff really. Everywhere in this region appears to be built on or near a paddock and flies in summer love to suss the folk sitting plump in their domains, so perhaps put sugar in lidded bowls (in fact Sugar Man was playing at the time - weird right?). Wait - an update, just in: I returned for a morning coffee (BTW: this was very

well made, soft milk and a rich blend - not bitter) and found the sugar in pourers, hooray, they listen to advice too; what next, eh! Two young women had the floor and were very nice and accommodating, relaxed and not in the least uptight or self-conscious, like some hipster joints I've visited. A turntable was playing tunes in the corner, Rodriguez's Cold Fact was going on in the background with his timeless romantic protests. And finally, the rumours that this cafe is somehow the love child of Top Shop and Roadhouse is poppycock. The owners here are very much a couple of individuals, entrepreneurs recently returned from a three-and-ahalf-year stint in Melbourne - cool and really quite happy looking too. They apparently packed up their kombi and drove from Melbourne until the horizon was azure and gorgeous. Folk appears to be the result of a trip and for me I'll be taking a trip here more than once.

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A booming Australian organic market

Since I co-authored the first Australian Organic Market Report in 2008, the latest research shows that the organic market in Australia has been growing at 15 per cent per year and is still growing.

Now worth an estimated \$1.72 billion it is very encouraging to see that the rate of growth is significant especially when compared to the growth rate of the conventional or chemically grown food market, which has only grown at 3.5 per cent from 2012–14.

This shows that our nation is starting to put more of an emphasis on a healthy diet and to seek food that is grown without pesticides, herbicides, growth hormones and GM ingredients. Perhaps consumers are also starting to join up some of the dots, realising that organic farming also provides positive envivoronmental benefits, can help sequester

carbon in the soil – thus potentially mitigating climate change – and has the highest levels of animal welfare.

Although the market is growing it should be noted that the organic market still only accounts for about 1.25 per cent of total food sales in Australia. So while we're on the right track there is still a long way to go before organic food and farming becomes the norm and anywhere close to some of the more progressive Scandinavian countries, where organic food consumption accounts for about 15 per cent of overall food purchases.

After a closer read of the report it is also clear that Australia exports a large quantity of its organic food (mainly beef and grain) and that although Australia boasts the largest number of certified organically farmed hectares in the world, 22.69 million; this is owing to a few large-scale and extensive organic cattle farms in the Northern Territory. Unfortunately there has been virtually no increase in new organic farmers taking to the land – probably owing to the fact that farming is still seen as a physical job with a low income and is not truly recognised as a profession, basically all the things that drive young people to go to work in the cities.

This either means existing organic farmers are going to have to get bigger to feed the ever-increasing demand for organic food, or we're going to have to start importing organic food, or we're going to have to offer better opportunities to train and make organic farming more attractive to the next generation. The latter is my preference and we have recently launched a crowd-funding campaign to do just that. If you'd like to know more visit: www.chuffed.org/project/ munchcrunchorganics.

Preparing duck

Whole ducks – 4 Salt – 420gm Sugar – 65gm Duck fat – 2kg

Using knife, take legs and breasts off whole duck (breasts can be used for something else). Mix salt and sugar, spread over legs like seasoning (maybe not all the mix!). Refrigerate for a few hours. Put on a baking tray or in a pot, cover with duck fat, cover with lid or foil. Place in oven for 12 hours at 90°C.

Remaining duck carcass Onions – 150gm Carrots – 150gm

Garlic - 1 bulb Celery – 50gm Leek – 50gm Bay leaves - 2 Thyme – 1 branch Rosemary - 1 branch Tomatoes – 5 Honey – 50gm Black pepper – 20gm Juniper – 6 Clove – 8 Star anise – 8 Coriander – 20gm Cinnamon stick – 2 Red wine (Shiraz) – 500ml Cognac (brandy) - 50ml

In oven at 220°C, roast the duck bones until golden then add all ingredients (except the wine and cognac); keep roasting until dark and caramelised.

Place all in a pot, deglaze (this lifts all the good stuff stuck on the pan) and clean the tray on heat with wine and water, add into pot and

fill with cold water to cover the bones. Place on a really slow burner for 6–12 hours. Strain and reduce till rich and glazed. Add cognac, correcting flavours (maybe a bit of Balsamic vinegar!). When you've tried cook-

ing this dish, compare it with the real thing at La Table Restaurant.



PASSING THE STARLIGHT TO A NEW GENERATION

TWICE A YEAR THE BANGALOW A&I HALL WELCOMES THE STARLIGHT FESTIVAL, AN EXPO THAT SHOWCASES NEW-AGE AND ESOTERIC HEALERS, PSYCHICS AND ALTERNATIVE-HEALTH PRACTITIONERS IN OUR REGION.

It's the brainchild of Raym Richards, and this year Mr Richards passes the 'crystal' baton to his daughter Rosie, who will take on directorship of this popular event.

Raym, tell me why you have decided to step down as director of The Starlight Festival?

It has been 18 fun years and the event has been a large part of my life, but over that past few years I have been feeling the need to spend more time on promoting my own healing modality and writing. I have reached the stage now with Crystal Dreaming where I am teaching teachers.

The method is growing in popularity and receiving mainstream recognition as powerful tool for positive self-transformation. In 2015 I will be taking the modality overseas, where the first of my two upcoming courses in New York is almost sold out. My books are very popular as ebooks and I am working on a fourth, which is more of a novel than a collection of stories or a guidebook. I also find myself returning to my origins as a fine artist as I am writing poetry again. My dilemma was who I could possibly hand the event over to who could maintain the ethics of sharing and peace associated with the Starlight Festival. When my daughter Rosie offered to take it over I was thrilled – she is the perfect person to continue the Starlight tradition.

What was the original idea – how long have you been running it – and how has it grown since then?

When I moved to the region around 20 years ago and I could see a wealth of world-class talent here in Byron that most people were not aware of. With my background in the arts as a creative individual, performer and festival organiser it seemed obvious to me that a festival that truly celebrated the abilities of local practitioners was a must. I visited all the local practitioners I could and suggested they participate. Fortunately for me they could see I was coming from the heart so they got on board and the first event happened at the Byron Surf Club some 18 years ago.

GOOD LORD IT'S SHEPPARD!

BRISBANE'S SHEPPARD HAVE BEEN ON A STELLAR JOURNEY WITH 2014 SEEING THEM ACHIEVE MILESTONES SUCH AS THE HIGHEST-SELLING AUSTRALIAN SINGLE WITH *GERONIMO*, SOLD-OUT HEADLINE PERFORMANCES AT LONDON'S BARFLY, NEW YORK'S WEBSTER HALL AND LA'S THE LYRIC STUDIO.

The modest Brissie crew also chalked up a performance on *The Ellen DeGeneres Show*. So how does a group only together for a few short years manage such a coup? George Sheppard, one of the three siblings who provide the genetic and creative core for Sheppard, filled in the gaps. 'Our manager in the US is Scooter Brawn. He has a few contacts, and Ellen is a big fan of his, and when he proposed to put us on the show she heard our song and was really keen. You could see our numbers go up pretty instantly and there were a lot more people commenting on social media.'

For the sibs who grew up in Port Moresby it wasn't until they'd left school that their musical inclinations directed them to their creative calling.

'Amy was studying music at TAFE and had to write a song, and she thought it sounded bland and walked past the shower when I was singing and had a lightbulb moment when she heard me. She asked me to sing harmonies on the song, and it worked well so we decided to do stuff together as a duo. I guess we were more like Angus and Julia Stone in style; that was for two years and it was as a bit of a hobby but started getting more serious as we added more members. We brought Jason Bambino up to play bass guitar for us and he started to play acoustic guitar one night and we realised we could write songs together.'

When it came to recording the super-successful Bombs Away, the band's debut album, it was basically a process of paring back what the crew had been throwing together over the years. 'We just wrote a bunch of pop songs over three years; we never really went in with the idea of a specific album.

We'd write a song and go in and record it and by the end we had 30 tracks to choose from. Choosing was hard. We had to decide what kind of band we were and what we wanted to release.

Because we weren't really a band we hadn't had that clear objective from the beginning, and the music itself is quite eclectic.





The Starlight outgrew the Surf Club pretty quickly and with assistance from the Bangalow Chamber of Commerce we moved it to the A&I Hall, where it has been ever since. It is a venue that suits the energy of the Festival perfectly.

How does the community embrace the Starlight Festival – how do you think it provides a showcase for healers and practitioners?

The community support for this event has been fantastic from day one. The twice-yearly celebration quickly became a fixture in locals' calendars, and they bring friends and family back year after year. The healathon idea (people queue for free sessions) came from locals suggesting they would like to contribute without having to have a stand at the show. This has become a well-loved feature. Participating therapists understand that I have never been driven by profit so they really get involved, helping set up and pull down the event. We are also supported by a great network of volunteers; without them the whole show could not run so smoothly.

Tell me about Rosie, your daughter, and what you think she'll bring to your event.

Rosie is a 35-year-old successful businesswoman with a background in sales and event management. She runs her own annual international sporting event and has worked as an event organiser for a national wellbeing magazine. She also owns her own boutique in Kingscliff. She has a lifetime of experience in events as she has grown up with and helped at every event I have ever created. She is also an alternative therapist and Reiki master with a passion for heath and wellbeing.

FOR CRYING OUT LOUD

Something weird has happened to me – I can't read the paper or listen to the news without crying. I'm putting this down to being peri-menopausal, that I'm some sort of hormonal nut bag set off by the endless sea of injustice, horror, sadness and just plain bad luck.

This morning I grabbed a copy of The Australian and sat down for my morning latte. It's not unusual for The Australian to make me cry - anything that far up Abbott's rectum is sure to bring a tear to the eye, but today I read the front page and it featured a picture of Australian cricket captain Michael Clarke with his bat and cap raised in a kind of sad gesture as he held back the tears, his innings of 128 from 163 deliveries achieved in defiance of a back injury, honouring his pledge to honour the memory of batsman Phillip Hughes and play on.

Of course this had me crying before I'd even read the story and I don't even like cricket. Why am I so moved by a sport that I'm not interested in? I decide to turn the page. Next story I read is about a two-yearold boy who has drowned in a lake somewhere in Perth. Tradies left the door open and he slipped out unnoticed and walked 700 metres to the water. Oh my God. That's awful. Unthinkable. I am starting to sob quietly. I notice other people reading the paper aren't crying.

I get in the car and turn on the news; there's a report on the death of the asylum seeker on Manus Island who died of septis after cutting his foot. The slow wait for a visa to allow him to be flown to a hospital that could provide proper treatment killed him. He died from a cut on the foot and systemic failure to provide adequate care. I tear up again. Fancy travelling all that way by sea, seeking asylum from your own country and then dying from a cut on the foot because Australia doesn't have the compassion to let you in. Then there's the sentencing of someone in the Northern Territory for bashing his girlfriend's baby to death while she went out to get a light for her cigarette. News needs to come with a bloody content warning.

I'm hysterical now. Another story tells me a baby has died in Victoria after being hit by a forklift in a car workshop operated by his father. An Islamic group in Iraq and Syria posted photographs of appearing to show jihadists throwing a man off a building for allegedly being gay. Another doctor dies in West Africa of Ebola and family members of great grandmother Helen Dawson ask why the lawnbowls-loving 75-year-old was executed at point-blank range when she answered a knock at her front door

And wait, there's more. A child died and four have fallen ill from gastroenteritis after drinking contaminated raw cow milk being sold as 'bath milk' in Victorian health food stores. Another little girl in the US died after her father and stepmother forced her to drink more than two litres of grape soda and water over two hours, making her brain to swell, resulting in her death.

I can't stand it. I finally get that Wim Wenders film Wings of Desire and the unseen angels who hold us in our sad desperation and moments of desolation. How does the average human being live with this constant bombardment of horror and not be outraged? Innocents dying in awful circumstances. One awful and completely preventable circumstance listed after the other in a factual tone by the newsreader. The newsreader must be made of concrete. Either that or they're on the verge of emotional collapse as well




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FEELING LIKE A TOSCA

Reviews inema By John Campbell

PADDINGTON

I don't know what it is about teddy bears, but I am one of the scores of adults who remain susceptible to their vulnerable charm. As a child, Michael Bond's story of how the homeless bear was befriended at Paddington Station by the Browns and taken to their home was the first book I ever read. I was enchanted by it - just as I have been by Paul King's new screen adaptation of it. It begins in grainy B&W with the back-story describing how Paddington's aunt and uncle were discovered in Peru by a British geographer, who named them Lucy and Pastuzo, 'after an exotic wrestler that I met in a bar'. We then skip to the luxurious CGI of the bears' idyllic life in the jungle, which was brought to a tragic end by an earthquake. From there it is to England, where Lucy has sent Paddington to hopefully find the explorer who first made contact with them. Essential in any such movie that has real people acting with fantasy characters is the suspension of disbelief - if you can't accept that Paddington is a true being then the race is lost before it's properly begun. I had no problem at all in seeing the three-foot-six, golden-haired creature as a living thing.

Assisting greatly in the necessity of self-deception is the beautiful picture-book art direction by Steven Lawrence, who manages to create a London that is simultaneously olde-worlde and twentyfirst century. Playing the wicked taxidermist who would have her horrible way with Paddington, Nicole Kidman is probably the main drawcard for Australian viewers, but it is Sally Hawkins - petite and spirited - who steals the show as the mother of the Brown household. Paddington himself is easy to love and his misadventures are great fun - the calamitous sequence of events that pile up after he first enters the Browns' bathroom is hilarious. This is an adorable film with a message of acceptance that should be heeded by everyone - young and old.

HORRIBLE BOSSES 2

You know the three girls in the white dresses? (I think the blonde is my favourite - she looks so sincere.) They have a jolly little picnic then, that night, turn up at a swank A-list party still decked out in the same frocks. All the while they are flogging some brand of sparkling booze, but to save my life I couldn't tell you what it is. There are a lot of movies that are like that - shiny and gassy, but when the end credits are rolling you suddenly realise that you've not taken a skerrick of notice.

This is one of those movies. It is generally agreed upon that sequels are rarely the equal of the original, but in this case any comparison, negative or otherwise, is difficult to make because, to be perfectly frank, Horrible Bosses 1 was equally forgettable. The three leads are back - Jason Bateman, Jason Sudeikis and Jason Day - and this time out, as business partners, they are involved in a hare-brained plan to have the son of the retail magnate who has dudded them (Christoph Waltz) kidnapped in order to recover the money that they have lost. Being a run-of-the-mill buddy flick, the guys prove to be totally incompetent and chaos and cheap gags ensue.

A stellar support cast includes Kevin Spacey slumming it for a paycheque, Jennifer Aniston, who worked with more conviction in Friends, and Jamie Foxx, now specialising as a dial-a-gangsta comic.

The jokes are occasionally okay, but Bateman, Sudeikis and Day aren't up to making more of them - Bateman in particular, whose stock in trade is blandness with a suppressed angst, appears uninspired to the point where he is struggling not to yawn. What is odd about the whole scenario is that there are no horrible bosses to be vanquished. If we get a rainy day and the beach is out of the question, you might find some pleasure in its slickness and harmless - indeed, effortless - stupidity.



• Understand that it is common for people to feel stressed at this time of year.


• Try not to expect too much - aiming for the 'perfect' Christmas or assuming that everyone will be on their best behaviour may not be realistic.

· Look after yourself physically. If you look after your body, your mind will feel better too.



According to the latest TravelMag survey, Byron Bay has been ranked the most expensive destination in Australia. The rates for the average cost per night were compared using a hotel comparison system called Kayak. Prices for the top three were Byron Bay \$176, Sydney \$136 and Hobart \$131.
