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# rejected by council

The push to protect private properties at the expense of the natural environment and public amenity continues

An offer by scientists and economists to help Council manage the Shire's pristine coastline was ignored by Cr Sol Ibrahim and his fellow councillors at last week's Council meeting.

Instead, they have decided to 'go it alone, which could see the potential erosion of Belongil Beach, one of Australia's most iconic surfing beaches.

And with the support of Crs Wanchap, Cubis, Woods and Hunter, Cr Ibrahim also rejected an offer by the NSW Office Of Environment And Heritage (OEH) to redo a cost benefit analysis for the planned Belongil rockwall.

As reported in The Echo previously, the Belongil rock wall project aims to protect high-priced sanddune real estate, specifically three private properties and some Council managed land.

But it's over budget, has been kept secret, is close to losing state funding and has been criticised by expert scientists who deal with coastal planning.

Additionally, no contribution offer has been publicly announced by the landowners, making the cost to ratepayers unknown.

Nearly \$22,000 of public money was splashed at the project last week, earmarked for lawyers and consultants. That adds to the estimated \$142,500 already spent since January. Apart from funding the project, there are expected upkeep costs of 'nourishing' the beach with imported sand to prevent depletion.

As for the offer of help from the OEH, Cr Ibrahim claims that the department is trying to take 'control of the process'.

He told The Echo, 'The OEH steering committee excludes all stakeholders and councillors. Only staff are invited, and that is mainly so that property information could be provided at the early stages of the process.' He also claims that Council staff are 'frustrated with the OEH and confused with the inconsistent advice provided.

'The advice from the OEH has been heeded, and will inform the revision of our cost benefit analysis by the consultants, he said.

# Beach to be 'accessible 95 per cent of the year'

As while the plans are still unfolding, Cr Ibrahim claims that 'Our expert engineering advice is that techniques [such as engineered protection works, groynes and sand nourishment systems] in combination will provide an accessible beach for 95 per cent of the year.

In reply to whether the rockwall will result in beach erosion, he said, 'This could not reasonably be said to be a "loss" of the beach."

As for who pays, he says, 'The Coastal Protection Act 1979 requires that any approval for permanent protection works must include a credible plan for maintenance and repair by private property owners as a condition of consent.'

But Brunswick Heads residents are fighting to preserve a stand of WWI memorial trees which honour

past locals who died or served in that conflict. Last month, the trees in The Terrace reserve were listed on the National Trust of Australia register, a month after then-heritage minister Rob Stokes knocked back a bid by Byron Shire Council to have the trees protected under a state

Interim Heritage Order (IHO).

Mr Stokes told Council that in his view there was 'no imminent threat' to the stand of trees but that it was 'desirable' that their 'heritage values be managed' and called for a comprehensive assessment to be

# New highway service centre set for Tweed

Tweed Shire Council has approved the building of a major highway service centre at a prominent gateway entry site to the Tweed Valley at Chinderah.

Construction of the ser-

vice centre, truck stop and food outlet complex on former sugarcane land next to Melaleuca Station is likely to start later this year after Council gave the final green light to the plan, albeit with more than 140 conditions.

The proposed Shell ser-

vice centre will cater for northbound traffic on the Pacific Highway and will sit on 3.9 hectares.

It will also include an outdoor dining area and playground, truckers lounge, public amenities and parking spaces for over 100 cars, 25 trucks and five caravans or buses. A minority of councillors failed to defer the decision in order to try to have the developer improve the plans to 'achieve better outcomes' in the look of the building, landscaping and use of water and energy.

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# **Protesters** blockade Lismore fluoride plant

Police arrived at a protest at the entrance of a proposed fluoride dosing plant at Corndale near Lismore on Monday morning.

About 20 people blocked the entrance to the Corndale site, intent on stopping a crane from entering.

They believed a truck carrying material for the dosing plant is due to arrive at 11am.

Group spokesman Peter Lehner said fluoride opponents wanted their human rights respected.

'We do not want mass medication in our community, and we want pharmaceutical-grade fluoride pills not industrial grade HFSA (hydrofluorosilicic acid) which is really industrial waste including varying amounts of toxic heavy metals, including uranium,' he said.

Council says it is looking at including the assessment in a work program, subject to funding.

The minister also urged Council to consult with the NSW Crown Holiday Parks Trust (CHPT), the managers of the Terrace Reserve Holiday Park, to work out a management plan for the trees 'including measures for tree replacement should this become necessary with age.

The trust, through its North Coast Holiday Parks agency, which manages the town's foreshore parks, has been blamed by community groups for the deterioration of the trees in the reserve.

They say lower limbs of the Coastal Cypress Pines have been 'savaged' over time to make way for large mobile homes and caravans increasingly using the park, and illegal structures built around the stand of trees.

Mr Stokes also urged Council and the trust to consider 'appropriate interpretive measures that will educate future users of the caravan park of the significance of the trees.

'With education, it is hoped that visitors to the park will grant due respect to the trees and to those that are memorialised by the stand of trees, being those who served in World War I,' he told Council.

Patricia Warren, a longtime Brunswick Heads resident and campaigner for heritage listing the trees, said the Coastal Cypress Pines were planted as a memorial to those who served in WWI by volunteer locals from surrounding areas, working on a roster system from 1920 onwards.

Ms Warren told The Echo that 'it was a mammoth task requiring planting in sandy soil and nurturing the seedlings to sustainability, work which continued through

'In the late 1990s, park management acted illegally and put in overflow unpowered camp sites during the Christmas period into the area within 100 metres of the newly constructed amenities block near Nana Street, putting them into the area dominated by the Coastal Cypress Pines, she said.

'In 2006 Byron Shire Council was dismissed as the manager of the caravan parks in Brunswick Heads and North Coast Holiday Parks and North Coast Accommodation Trust (NCHP/NCAT) took over.

'They extended the illegal encroachment by putting in a mobile amenity shed at the southern end of the caravan park. The lower limbs of the Coastal Cypress Pines were savaged to make way for large mobile homes and caravans.

'Power and water were made available to many sites. The whole of the southern area was marketed for 24/7 use.

'NCHP/NCAT showed the Coastal Cypress Pines no mercy. Root systems continued to be systematically mowed, soil compacted with heavy vehicles, herbicides sprayed and waste water regularly discharged against the pines etc.

'And all of this continued despite clear evidence in an environmental consultant's 2010 report which gave direction to an appropriate tree management strategy.

'The content of that report was echoed again in the consultant's 2011 report. Both of these appear as Appendices in the 2014 Plan of Management (POM) for the Terrace Holiday Park. And what did NCHP/NCAT do? Nothing!

'Worse, the mowing over root systems and camping within a five-metre radius of the trunks of these pines continues unabated by current park management.

'In preparation of the 2014 POM, due diligence was ignored and no European Cultural Heritage report was done.

'Instead, those now approved POMs intend to develop the entire area for short term sites and campsites. Within those plans is leverage to remove any tree on the grounds of "safety".

'Unless there is a dramatic change in management's attitude, one can readily speculate how that leverage will be used,' she said.

Ms Warren said that in January this year, the memorial pines were 'ground truthed' and that '103 extant trees and three trunks were identified'.

She said the minister's recommended tree-management plan should be implemented urgently, 'and nothing less than in situ replanting of these trees, when appropriate, can be accepted, unless of course we are prepared to forget.'




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# 'When people think that politics is a joke, they then deserve the jokers that rule them' – Jit Sharma

The wrecking ball of local governance again arbitrarily swung from one unread report to another ignored staff recommendation at last week's Council meeting.

Maybe that's a bit harsh, but ill-informed comments from a few councillors have been ongoing for years now.

Yes, it's hard to fly like an eagle while surrounded by turkeys. At least the staff are in control, well sort of.

So what did our assumed mayor, Cr Sol Ibrahim, achieve this month?

# Fifty thousand dollar report

Like their federal and state counterparts, Cr Ibrahim and his team of Crs Woods, Wanchap, Cubis and Hunter embrace roads.

A staff request for \$50,000 was passed, which will see a traffic consultant 'determine the priority of intersection upgrades' along Ewingsdale Road. Undoubtedly it's needed now that Byron is expanding, but it's not being included within the current master plan for the town, which is underway.

Roundabouts will be investigated at Kendall Street into Belongil, and modelling of the seniors living and commercial development surrounding the central hospital will be undertaken.

That's yet to be approved, which says a lot about current planning practices; this must be a predetermined development, much like West Byron, the bypass and the rail trail.

# **CCTV** in Byron

One of the few times Cr Ibrahim has agreed to allow the Byron Bay master plan to be considered was in deferring CCTV installation.

Perhaps because it didn't get in the way of a road?

An exhaustive staff report revealed that the Byron busi-

ness community don't want to commit any money to it.

The Liquor Accord is yet to even reply to Council on the matter.

Fair enough. Despite what could be considered very profitable trading conditions of late, we pay taxes, so why don't the feds do something?

Council agreed that 'funds may best be obtained through grants made more successful if coming from within a Council- and community-endorsed master plan.'

Meanwhile, Casino is set to install a federally funded CCTV network worth \$463,000 in the next three months. *The Echo's* Darren Coyne reported last week that the successful tenderer is SAT Pty Ltd, a Sydney-based radio communications consultancy company.

The network of cameras will be beamed directly to the local police station.

But local police here have said they don't want to contribute to the project, which leaves Council dealing with this on their own.

When federal money was offered last year, Cr Ibrahim and his supporters enthusiastically jumped at the idea, despite staff concerns it would be a financial burden.

# Bangalow derelict heritage housing

Remember 9 Station Street, Bangalow? It's heritage listed commercial/residential zoned land with an existing old cottage that sits adjacent to the A&I Hall.

On numerous occasions, the Sydney-based developer/ owner has wanted to erect a large mixed residential commercial building there, yet was foiled by pesky objections.

This time, the idea is to demolish the asbestos riddled ramshackle-of-a-home in preparation for something yet to be decided.

As Bangalow-based town planner Paul De Fina told councillors in morning

public access, the house is unliveable, an eyesore and needs to go.

But after some inquiry by the mayor, it was discovered that the home was occupied only a few months ago.

Despite staff and consultants advising against, demolition was approved, provided it was maintained 'in a safe and clean manner, without a street fence.'

Crs Dey, Richardson, Cameron and Spooner voted against the motion.

# Who supports gay marriage?

Here's one to consider if you are a supporter of gay marriage, or not.

Crs Cubis and Hunter – who gained a seat in Council thanks to Cr Woods – were unsupportive of a motion by Cr Dey which calls on the Commonwealth government to 'end marriage discrimination and support marriage equality for same sex couples.'

While Cr Hunter appears to enjoy an open Nationals party relation... ahem, membership, Cr Cubis refuses to confirm or deny his National Party allegiances to *The Echo*. It must be tough being in the political closet.

Anyway, the motion gained Council support and the mayor will present the position to the National General Assembly of Local Government when he travels to Canberra in June.

# Byron CBD redevelopment

The redevelopment of the historic Council chambers in Byron's CBD will go before the public for comment.

The aim os to retain the existing facade but see the back end rebuilt for a 250-bed backpacker accommodation, shops and restaurants.

All councillors voted in favour.

Also a name worthy of Byron Shire has at last been suggested for the Byron sports facility on Ewingsdale Road. It looks like it will be renamed the Cavanbah Sports Centre.

# Secondary dwelling review

And secondary dwelling contributions are set to be reviewed by councillors, 'to see if it stays or goes'.

Mayor Simon Richardson said the fees that were waived were to increase availability of housing stock for locals and provide a financial incentive for secondary dwellings that had been built without Council approval, to seek approval.

Council staff say that since 2011, about \$2.3 million has been lost in Section 94 developer contributions from strucutres being built without approval. It also predicted that between 2015 and 2026 a further loss of \$3.9 million could be anticipated.

And finally, did you know that many councillors in QLD are paid a professional wage? Ours are paid around \$14,000 pa.



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# **ACCC** to look into gas prices

The federal government will launch an inquiry into gas producers to increase transparency and drive down household bills.

Gas retailers have recently added a rental fee for gas cylinders, increasing bills

for some substantially.

Industry minister Ian Macfarlane says the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC) will lead the six-month probe.

He announced the measure on Wednesday while releasing the government's energy future blueprint. 'We want consumers to be able to see how gas is being priced, where it's available, what stocks are held and have more transparency in that market than what we have currently. That will also drive down prices through better transparency and better competition.'





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# Floodplain plan for Belongil approved

Belongil now has a floodplain management plan, despite concerns by residents and some councillors that the plan might be seriously flawed.

Shirley Lane residents Cath Walton and Jay Pearson told public access at last Thursday's Council meeting that they were worried the adjacent Cumbebin Swamp, together with their local Belongil Creek tributary, would be ruined if a proposed massive pumping station were built nearby.

Ms Walton said, 'the creek is tidal and more prone to flooding when the creek mouth is not opened'.

She added the area, which was 'abundant in wildlife', was maintained by local residents.

'We don't want pumps, drains and levees installed. We're concerned that in future development will take over the last refuges of nature left in the Bay, Ms Walton said.

And Belongil resident and former councillor candidate Laurie Lynch told Council he did not believe the consultant's report was backed up by proper data.

Mr Lynch even went so far as to conduct his own measurement of flows in Belong Creek during a flood, which he claimed showed the consultants' modelling was 'out of whack'.

# **Pumping station**

Ms Pearson said the area had been identified as a prime opportunity for watersensitive urban design in the future, which was in line with proposals of the Byron Bay draft master plan.

'Infrastructure needs to deliver solutions for local residents as well as Council.

'The proposed pumping station will be ugly, destroy amenity of the wetland and the shared pathway, she said.

Ms Pearson added that local residents did not receive a letter advising them of Council's intentions.

# Computer modelling

Meanwhile, Mr Lynch said his measurements of the velocity of Belongil Creek, conducted after a 200mm rain event with a high coastal surge and two-metre tide, showed surface flows of o.3metres/ second over 10-metre and 20-metre distances two hours after high tide

This compared with consultants' modelling of up to four metres/second for a onein-100-year event, he said.

But under questioning from Cr Di Woods, infrastructure manager Phil Holloway said data was available from the consultants, though it was not contained in the report.

'Computer models are large and complex and can take up to 24hrs to run, he

'I'm happy to talk to Council regarding its needs for data for reports in future, he added.

# Masterplan

Mr Holloway also told the meeting that the specific proposals, such as pumping stations and levees, need not necessarily be implemented.

'If the same outcomes can be obtained by other methods that are more in line with the master plan.

Several councillors questioned whether the master plan's authors had been party to the floodplain management plan, particularly as many of the former's recommendations had to do with water sensitive design and stormwater harvesting methods, such as building an artificial lagoon behind Clarkes Beach.

Mr Holloway said the master plan consultants had been provided with copies of the floodplain management plan, along with numerous other

Council studies, but had not commented on it as yet.

The mayor asked if there were value in holding back the report until the master plan was finalised 'so we can have integrity in the process'.

Mr Holloway responded that more than five years' work had so far gone into the plan and that opportunities to apply for grants to implement some of its recommendations would be missed if approval of the plan were deferred.

Greens councillor Duncan Dey urged Council to approve the plan, despite its apparent shortcomings, so that Council could 'move on'.

He added that since a house that had been earmarked for demolition after being declared as being in a flood zone had since been rezoned as safe, he had no further reason to delay approval of the plan.

Cr Dey, who is himself a flood hydrology specialist, said his 'biggest regret with design of this plan is a couple of humungous pumps built in town to lift stormwater.'

'That's nearly the worst thing you can do.

But he said, 'the process is taking so long, my inclination is to get it out, pay off the consultant and do a review.

'It will incur costs but it just needs to be sealed off and hearing that there will be options to review it makes me feel we should just get on with it. The first thing you get in a one-in-a-hundred-year event is a blackout and those pumps won't be working,' he added.

The motion to adopt the management plan was passed unanimously.

Meanwhile, Council's director of sustainable environment and economy, Shannon Burt, says the coastal zone management plan (CZMP), which outlines coastline management, is unlikely to meet the June 30, 2015 deadline.

She told The Echo it was owing to, 'belated intervention by the OEH in relation to the draft cost benefit analysis prepared by Council's consultants.

The rockwall project, entitled Coastal Hazard Management Study Byron Bay Embayment, was also a 'key part of the CZMP'.

'The OEH have recently advised that they are completing their own independent cost benefit analysis of the management study. As a result, Council's consultants will also need to review the alternative cost models. This task comes at additional cost and time.'

A spokesperson from the NSW Office of Environment and Heritage explained that funding for the 'interim protection works at Belongil Beach was subject to the submission of a draft design that satisfied the NSW Coastal Panel and relevant state agencies, including OEH, and grant requirements'.

They told The Echo that OEH had, 'concerns with the proposed design related to the scale of works, impacts to public safety, beach access and amenity.

'Funding has not been withdrawn and is still available dependent upon submission of a satisfactory design, they said. 'OEH has recommended Byron Shire Council complete its CZMP as a matter of priority.

# Rocks bias: mayor

Council's rejected offer of scientific advice from the OEH has angered mayor Simon Richardson, who told The Echo that 'integrity and scientific rigour have been jettisoned.'

'Cr Ibrahim and his supporters don't want the eyes of the NSW Office of Environment and Heritage (OEH) over it. I do, he said.

'And they should too.'

'OEH have rightfully been appalled with the interim wall fiasco and are concerned about our economical modelling, which was clearly biased towards a rock wall "solution".

'When the OEH chief economist steps in with serious concerns about the cost

benefit analysis modelling considering all the possible options; tells us his team will redo one at their expense and they wish to create a high level expert Council and OEH steering committee to make sure the process is robust and thorough, why wouldn't we support that?' He queried what expertise Crs Ibrahim, Wanchap, Cubis, Woods and Hunter had in the field.

'I share the need to get this management plan completed as quickly as possible, but not at the expense of the opportunity for staff and OEH to work together to achieve a better, more transparent and more considered outcome.

# **Expert concerns**

And dumping large rocks on beaches has also attracted criticism from another expert in the field; retired coastal engineer and longtime resident Andrew Winton-Brown addressed council on Thursday and asked them to explain the secrecy and cost benefit analysis.

He said, 'Estimated to cost up to \$3m to build and \$800,000 per year to run, has this plan been factored into any of the analyses of the options particularly the environmental, social and tourist impacts of building such a system at a popular surfing beach and within a national park? Have National Parks and the Arakwal people been consulted as stakeholders?

'What are the risks associated with this plan?'

# The nation is watching

'Once the CZMP legitimises the rockwalls, they still have to be built, Cr Duncan Dey told The Echo. 'None of the current structures are up to the standard that will be

'Funding of the re-construction is therefore their next hurdle. Their desire is to have the state – ie the public - fund as much as possible. Not only are the capital costs critical, but the ongoing maintenance is a huge longterm issue.

'I think the residents are ready with the capital to build new correctly designed walls but what they don't want is twofold: to foot the bill for sand nourishment and to carry the responsibility for rebuilds after storm damage. Our science is clear: (1) there will be no sand in front of the

# The historical context of sand dunes and structures

The 'planned retreat' policy, which aims to relocate homes or commercial buildings on NSW coastlines, has a history dating back to 1978, according to Council's Planned Retreat Fact Sheet.

It seems governments acted after large cyclones in 1974 took out large parts of New Brighton, then called Sheltering Palms. 'By 1977 the houses were abandoned,' says the document, which was produced while Jan Barham was mayor in 2010.

'At the Belongil Spit in the 1970s, houses and the road along on the beachfront were also lost as a result of coastal erosion and storms.' The document says, 'Planned retreat was suggested as a possible management strategy in 1978 in the Byron to Hastings Point Erosion Study. Following the study, Council developed and adopted the Byron Local Environment Plan 1988 and Development Control Plan 1, 1988, which included Part J [of that study] for development on coastal lands."

As of 2015, many houses and commercial buildings near Belongil beach do not comply with that policy, says former mayor and now NSW upper house MLC Jan Barham.

She says, 'Over the years a number of audits have been conducted by both the NSW Department of Planning and BSC and have identified these unapproved works.

Ms Barham added that those few who purchased before the planned retreat policy was adopted in 1988 should be compensated, 'as was defined in the original 2010 coastal management plan (CZMP)'.

And with the previous CZMP in 2010 never being adopted, Council are now back to the drawing board.

But why was it never adopted? Ms Barham says a 2011 media release by the then-general manager stated there was a discrepancy between the new coastal protection laws and Local Government Act, which had resulted in the need for a new Byron Shire CZMP. 'However, this discrepancy had not been explained to the council or the community, she said. Then minister for the environment, Robyn Parker, replied to Council that OEH was 'unaware of any discrepancy between these Acts that may have affected the draft CZMP. Ms Barham adds, 'There appears to be no information publicly available to explain the reasons why the draft CZMP was withdrawn.'



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# Moguls go for gold at tax-fiddling

he late Kerry Packer was notoriously reluctant to be quizzed by parliamentary inquiries - indeed by interrogations of any kind.

He had, he explained, once died as a result of a heart attack on the polo field.

Having been resurrected, he now had more important things to do with his valuable time than respond to questioning he regarded as irrelevant.

Dragged before a senate committee on tax avoidance in 1991, he summed it up famously and succinctly: 'If anybody in this country doesn't minimise their tax they want their head read. As a government I can tell you that you're not spending it so well that we should be pay-

Well, perhaps, although it could be said that even the most incompetent government providing services such as defence, health, education and the rest are more likely to be worthwhile than the legendary gambling binges that were Packer's idea of discretionary spending. It was once reported that when a Texas rancher boasted that he was worth \$100 million, Packer responded insouciantly: 'I'll toss vou for it.'

But the man in charge would not have seen the point of any rebuke, or any appeal to the idea of noblesse oblige that once was regarded as the birthright and duty of a former generation of tycoons. He could, and often did, indulge his private charities and causes lavishly and generously, but he regarded them as his personal right and choice; he was simply not interested in the idea of social responsibility or public benevolence.

Taxation was just an imposition. If it was dragged out of him he would pay it, kicking and screaming, but not a cent more than he had to. And such,

overwhelmingly, is the case of his corporate successors ever since.

The multinational moguls who came before their own senate inquiry last week clearly took the view that they were there to say as little as possible and do precisely nothing. And they were considerably more mealy-mouthed than Packer had been almost a generation earlier. The hard line was, if anything, harder, but they were not about to state the obvious: we're grabbing whatever we can and sitting on it, and the rest of you can all get stuffed.

of the bedrocks of civilisation, let alone one of the benefits, is not in the agenda. Tax is at best, a necessary evil: greed is good.

And this impregnable refusal to even countenance the need for any change or modification of their mantra is what makes it so hard to come to grips with what is essentially a political problem for this government for any government. So rather than taking the high moral ground, Hockey and his colleagues might be better off going with the flow - saying yes, the big boys are getting away with murder, but so would

you if you had half a chance. Why not lie back and enjoy

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
should, in the scheme of things, being collected in Australia, but no-one would tell him.



# Traffic conundrums

Byron Shire's Local Traffic Committee (LTC) is only local from the Sydney-centric perspective of its owner: the NSW government. It is not a committee of Council.

It's the state's four-way forum of police, Roads & Maritime Services (RMS, was RTA), the state member for Ballina, and one councillor (me, also chair). The LTC determines whether things like speed limits, parking signs, and other requests for traffic controls are legal or not. It does not design them.

It looks at whether they comply or not with state guidelines. LTC does not design kerb blisters, mentioned as 'concrete islands' in a letter in The Echo of April 8. Personally, I agree with Buck\$

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The very first double-decker was operated by the Economic Conveyance Company of London in 1847. pulled by horses. The double-decker needed three.

In 1956, the Routemaster was introduced, a model that has captured imaginations at home and internationally like no other. Its very name reeks of majesty and power. The Route Master. It's been in more films than MGM's lion, more postcards than the Eiffel Tower, and the scene of more passionate kisses, proposals, bust-ups, stand-offs, fights, reunions and singalongs than Times Square and Circular Quay put together.

For 50 years, the Routemaster ruled the road roost until 2002, when, in a new age of civic mindfulness, it could no longer do its job properly. To adapt the buses to accommodate less nimble or disabled passengers, as required by new, more enlightened disability legislation, just proved too difficult and so they were decommissioned, to an uproar of public dismay.

An uproar perfect for a politician willing to step in and save the day. 'We will build a new Routemaster,' proclaimed the mayor of London. It will be the same, but better. It will be redder, and even more lovable and

iconic. The wheels on this new bus will go rounder and rounder.

He brought us Boris Bikes too, the hire-bike scheme now all over London, much

And a competition was decreed throughout the land. And in due time, entries were sifted and a winner was declared. And it was declared as much as anything because it was the coolest bus ever designed on the planet, with all the features of the earlier model upgraded to the latest spec, and with an outrageous transparent curve that spiralled from the floor all the way around the back of the bus up to the top where it evened out into one continuous window. It was so cool, it simply had to be built.

The bus is also called the Boris Bus, after London's Tory mayor Boris Johnson, the driving brains behind it. He brought us Boris Bikes too, the hire-bike scheme now all over London, much to the annoyance of Barclays Bank who funded the scheme and hoped people would call them Barclays Bikes. (Can you take a Boris Bike on a Boris Bus? No.)

Boris himself has more plans afoot. This May sees a general election in the UK. With masterful ambivalence Boris has repeatedly ruled himself out of running for prime minister, though noone believes him and many would be happy to see him in power.

The Tories hope to stay, of course, but prime minister David Cameron caused a stir last week by frankly admitting he has no intention of running for a third term should they get in for seconds now.

In public, he and Boris have a love-hate relationship full of sharp banter and posturing. It's quite possible they've hatched plans for Boris to take over at some point if public opinion is behind them.

Is Boris cool? Er, no. But that's not stopped him so far. He may look daft, he may like to play the fool and curry easy favour, but he's a shrewd, hungry and dangerous bus designer under that bonnet. Forget Great Britain. We may one day become Boris Britain.

and don't like kerb blisters. They homogenise our funky rural Shire into a compact mini-Balmain.

By way of example, the blisters that ate Brunswick Heads were funded by grants from outside Council. That money cannot be diverted to where we'd rather spend it, fixing our rural roads.

The LTC may have had to approve Bunnings' new roundabout on Bayshore Drive but it did not design it. I hope others can advise how its colour was chosen. And I hope future roundabouts don't take as long to build as that one did.

■ In Byron we can't move the town layout or the roads we currently have and there is little or no room for new roads. So we are stuck with the current street plan but we could make the streets that we do have more efficient in their role of allowing traffic to pass by changing to a circular one-way system.

The one-way system I propose would run from the Lawson/Jonson streets round-

streets roundabout, then down Fletcher Street to Marvell Street, right onto Marvell Street and right again at the transit bus stop and down Jonson Street back to the Lawson Street roundabout.

There is room for two lanes with all vehicles in the one-way system exiting from the left lane as you would on a two-lane roundabout. I expect the current parking capacity to be retained on these streets but with probably a change in the nose in/rear in arrangement.

I also suggest a two-way system on the loop that comprises the top of Jonson Street from Lawson Street roundabout to the Beach Hotel, along Bay Street to Fletcher Street T-section, and then down Fletcher Street to the Lawson/Fletcher streets roundabout. This would enable good main beach access from both the Ewingsdale and Suffolk Park directions and tie in nicely with the proposed one-way system.

We would also probably need two lanes into town from the police station to Jonson Street and one lane from the Lawson/Jonson streets roundabout out of town to the police

Love to see this given serious consideration by everyone and some constructive debate. The Butler Street bypass will have a limited benefit and is not a popular option, just an option born out of desperation.

The truth is you were in the wrong whichever way you want to look at it - might be time for you to check the road rules and your manners.



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# A tale of remembering those fallen in war

Engraved on every Australian war memorial from Mullumbimby to Kununurra are three words: Lest We Forget. It is an imperious, stern refrain, reminding us of the incalculable loss war has has brought to families and towns across Australia.

But far from simply urging us to think of loved ones who fought and died or current soldiers in conflict zones, it now seems to carry

the collective burden of who we are as Australians. Yet like our de facto anthem Waltzing Matilda, its meaning is far from clear. As Anzac Day has morphed into the nation's rallying point, World War II veteran John Evans would like us to focus on what we are remembering.

'We gotta teach people about what can happen and the consequences of war, otherwise they could forget. It has been taken out of the history books; especially in

Europe and Japan it has been deleted. People have to understand. Lest we forget the real history.'

John's is a rather unusual story. He did not have to sign up. He worked in Sydney in a metal-plating factory, a 'protected industry' during the war years, so he needed permission from his employer to join. He got that, and the day he turned 19 fronted up to the recruitment depot. His mother was inconsolable.

The Oxford Dictionary defines 'duty' as a moral or legal obligation, a responsibility. With today's emphasis on personal motivation and living our dreams, the concept seems outdated, antiquated. Yet John's response, like many of his generation's, was sincere.

'I was listening at night [on the radio] to the Battle of Britain and what was going on over there,' he says. 'All wars are made of young people who think they are bulletproof and headed for adventure?

As a young boy he had devoured the popular Biggles flying series of books, so the airforce was his natural choice. He was one of more than 37,000 Australian men who became RAAF aircrew through the Empire Air Training Scheme. It was a massive venture that took soldiers through years of specialised training across Australia and Canada. Yet he very nearly missed out.

Born in Chippendale in 1922, John Richard Evans was one of a family of fourteen. His father worked on the railways. It was pre-dole.

'In a large family things were tight and any money that came in was readily accepted. So when I turned 14 – that was on a Friday – I left school, and on the Monday I went off to work.'

Yet along with attending night classes for his apprenticeship as a metal worker, John also began studying for his Intermediate Certificate - the equivalent of Year 9 at night after work. It was a lucky decision as the RAAF demanded a minimum of Intermediate level education from its pilots.

After another six months of day job along with night

courses in preliminary aeronautics, navigation and Morse code, John officially 'went in' on Friday December 5, 1941. On Sunday 7, the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbour.

A year and a half later, in the dead of a Canadian winter, he finally got his 'wings' and was attached to the 451 Spitfire Squadron. He was dispatched to England and flew countless training exercises with the bomber crews who were suffering extremely heavy losses.

'You saw what happened to those Lancasters and Halifaxes when they came back, the damage... God knows how they got back... and those that didn't make it.

# Stiff upper lip

'A lot of bomber crew actually had PTSD and couldn't fly and they were virtually confirmed as LMF - lack of moral fibre – and demoted. They were bomb shocked... but that was the standard that was applied, stiff upper lip and all that.'

It was during this period that British Bomber Command was beginning to order strikes against civilian targets in Germany, culminating in the attack on Dresden, leaving devastating casualties.

'I don't believe in war, put it that way, says John, 'but in Europe you couldn't think of not doing something about it. Yes, Lest We Forget means to remember what happened to them [the soldiers], but also what happened to civilians as well.'

During two busy years

in England and Scotland John trained others and was trained. He met his wife, Rosemary Gilbert, the love of his life, who worked with Flying Control, and he trained some more. 'Finally I had to go down to Bomber Command in London and ask why I was still there.'

# Bombing V2s

He got his posting in late 1945. The Spitfire Squadron was assigned to making runs over the Channel to Holland to bomb the sites of the deadly V2 rocket (Vengeance) that Hitler had aimed directly at Britain in the dying days of

'My first mission was cancelled for some reason... and that was it, the war was over. I was rather disappointed that I did not save a lot of lives but I am thankful I never killed anybody, although I was prepared to do it.'

At 92, John has the palest blue eyes. He is soft-spoken and, from our conversation, clearly fair-minded.

Fairness is a trademark of the Australian way of life, a covenant we rely on, and despite tough seeding conditions in 2015, it won't let go; it holds on to our collective psyche like Kikuyu.

At its most extreme it manifests in the Tall Poppy Syndrome - the desire for unnatural equality. And at its best, it is uncomplicated selflessness. You do your bit.

Says John: 'I always believe in doing right and being treated like I treat everybody else. Where I could help, I helped.'







The north coast's award-winning filmmaker David Bradbury tackles the fraught story of two major Vietnam War battles involving Australian soldiers in his latest work, The Crater. The story began when Private Brian Cleaver wandered off the street into a masterclass in Perth given by director David Bradbury.

Brian asked David if he would make a film about his search for 42 missing North Vietnamese 'enemy' bodies he helped kill 45 years ago. Brian's account of events at the 1968 battle of Coral and then 13 nights later at the battle for Balmoral provide the central narrative for the story.

The film uses a mixture of contemporary interviews with both Australian and Vietnamese war veterans, archival footage and dramatisation to connect modern viewers with the reality of battle and the historical narrative of the men behind it.

# **Body count**

Five hundred young Australians died during the Vietnam war from 1965 to 1972. Within two years of being home, over 2,000 Australian Vietnam vets had committed suicide.

'I could have picked a lighter and easier subject to dramatise in my first serious attempt at documentary drama,' says Bradbury.

'By May 1968, as the Australian body count mounted and the tide of public opinion turned against the Vietnam war back home, the Battle for Balmoral was never reported.

'Balmoral was destined to die in the forgotten dusty annals of Australian military history. Then three years ago Brian Cleaver literally wandered in off the streets of Fremantle to proposition me to make a film about his time in Vietnam.

'That was the starting point for my collaboration with Cleaver on a journey that would take me to Vietnam three times, exploring the crazy courage exhibited by both sides during two nights of battle and the psychological scars Brian and other vets carry to this day.

'Through Brian I met and interviewed a number of other Australian vets who had fought at Balmoral. Each contributed his own story and I've included a few of them.

'During my final trip to Vietnam I was able to capture interviews with three NVA

veterans who recounted their experience of the battle from the all-important Communist perspective.

'I hope the film does justice to the courage and fighting fervour of not just the Australians but the NVA as well. Ultimately though, I intend it to carry a strong message about the futility of not just the Vietnam war, but wars in general.'

The Crater has its local debut at the Bangalow A&I Hall on Saturday April 18 at 7pm, hosted by Kerry O'Brien with a Q&A with Bradbury afterwards. You can find out more about the film at www. thecrater.com.au.

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# HEN 360

ACCLAIMED AUSTRALIAN RAPPER 360 HAS BEEN TOUTED AS THIS COUNTRY'S HOTTEST AND MOST CONTROVERSIAL CROSSOVER STAR. HIS ABILITY TO DISTIL THE ZEITGEIST INTO RAP BOUGHT HIM TO ALMOST INSTANT ACCLAIM.

Following on from 2012's Falling And Flying, the double-platinum smash album that resulted in Sixty's meteoric rise to fame, his latest offering, the bold and passionate gold-selling Utopia, is the soundscape to a young man's life who found himself growing up and facing his demons in the public eye, dealing with the double-edged sword of fame: the perils of flying too high and the vulnerability it causes behind closed doors.

# Tell me about creating Utopia. What went into creating the album?

This time around I worked with a bunch of different producers from New York and LA to start things off. I got a bunch of songs together and came back to Australia to work with Styalz and then flew down to a producer called Lifted, from LA, who's signed to Good Music (which is Kanye's label), who executively produced the album. I finished off the album and they all worked together.

Tell me about performing with Eminem on his tour. It must have been an amazing experience. Were you nervous about having to step up to a gig like that? He's on most people's list of influential and interesting people...

It was incredible. I got an email saying, 'Eminem's coming to Australia to do a tour and he's asked heaps of Australian acts to put their music forward - what songs would you want him to hear?'

I chose a few songs including my rap battles, because I knew that he came from that same background. Suddenly I was told I was on the tour and I was just blown away. It was special as well because it was my first tour sober.

# And you did it sober! What was the impetus for you to get clean?

If I didn't get clean I would've died. I've had a few near-death experiences because of drugs. When you start dabbling in things when you're younger, you think it's a lot of fun and you never think it's going to be a problem. Then snap seven years later and you're a demon.

# Drugs and alcohol are a work hazard for most performers. Do you think that it is harder to get a real pitch on your problem because everyone else is doing it too?

It's definitely tougher because drug use is so common these days. When I was going through school people didn't really use drugs - they might've smoked weed. But you look at 15–16-year-olds now and they're smoking ice. They're passing a pipe around, not a spliff. It's fucked up. It's tough when you become an addict and your friends are using drugs, because they might not be addicts and be able to find a balance, but you can't.

How does being clean change the way you approach your music? Was it scary at first to find a way through?

It was scary. I felt like I was going to suck creatively if I wasn't intoxicated in some way. For the first month or so it was pretty hard. I couldn't really write anything. But if you just stick it out and stay confident it'll come, and it's actually much better.

You rap on issues like homophobia, suicide and mental illness. Do you think that rappers/ musicians need to be more aware of the messages they disseminate?

I think it's important for people in the public eye to be positive role models, to understand if they do have a young fanbase that their words have a lot power and can influence them. I think it's important they notice that. There're a few rappers that I know who completely glorify drugs - they have a young fanbase and post photos drinking codeine syrup, which is pretty messed up. It is possible to be dangerous and edgy without being bigoted and stuff like that. I think Australian hip-hop is less bigoted - most Americans are bigoted in their rap

but Australians I

don't find are.

# What are the issues that you are most passionate about?

I'm passionate about mental illness, which can include drug addiction, depression, anxiety, eating disorders. I'm always trying to do positive things in my life and trying to inspire other people to do positive things.

# How do you incorporate your own story into the narratives of your raps or your music?

Writing is always very personal. Usually or most of the time what I'm writing about comes from something I've been through or am going through at the time.

> What should we expect for the Byron show?

Research in the US suggests that as many of 47 per cent of women suffer from what they are now calling Female Sexual Dysfunction. Pharmaceutical companies have been pushing the creation of this 'disorder' so that they can develop the elusive Pink Viagra - a pill designed to 'cure' it. In my practice I see that education, not pills, will support most of my clients.

It is exactly because we don't talk about women's arousal that many of the issues arise.

One of the things we need to discuss is how different men and women are in the way they get turned on.

We also need to talk about the fact that there is no one size fits all' in the arousal game. What works for me one day may not work the next and it might never work for you.



We are all wonderfully unique, delicious beings, but if we don't know our own bodies, it's hard to expect someone else to.

## Do people know enough about sex? Are we teaching it right yet?

I've been studying sexuality for more than 30 years but a lot of the information that has rocked my world and which appears in the documentary only became available in the past few years. For instance, pioneering research into the true extent of the clitoris was undertaken in the late 90s by an Aussie urologist, Helen O'Connell. She observed that surgeons took special care to avoid particular nerves and blood vessels in prostate surgery on men in order to preserve their sexual function. But sparing sexual function in women undergoing pelvic surgery was a matter of guesswork. None of the available textbooks described the nerve or blood supply to the clitoris. She undertook to rectify the omission and in the process discovered a whole new understanding of that delightful organ.

us to see what is happening in the brain during arousal has also only been available in the past decade.

I have found that having a map of how my body is designed for arousal helps me to feel even more pleasure than I already did.

There is an abundance of information and a lot of misinformation available that creates more confusion. The things they read about

iust make them feel more inadequate. Sadly, owing to a lack of understanding about their own body's arousal needs, many women have early experiences in which they weren't turned on nearly enough. Apart from being disappointing and uncomfortable, the sensitive tissue of the vagina quite literally checks out, becomes numb and women are left wondering what

all the fuss is about. As far as sex education in schools goes, in most places that I want to support people is still sadly limited too - usually embarrassed discussions on how relationships. Dissatisfaction to prevent pregnancy and STIs. Although these are important topics there is very little being taught about pleasure, the MRI technology that now allows details of sexual experience and the joys and the journey of relating intimately with another human being.

Young people are looking to the internet to find answers to their natural questions about their burgeoning sexual interest and there they are bombarded by a multitude of images, very few of which give any information about female arousal.

# What do you think are the stumbling blocks for western culture when it comes to addressing sexuality?

The curious cone of silence around genitals and sexuality that has been in place since the Victorian era has a lot to answer for. If we can't talk about our pleasurable parts it makes it tricky finding out how to get them functioning optimally. Add to that the legacy of guilt

bestowed upon us and you have a recipe for disaster. What are you trying to achieve

with your documentary?

# CINDERELLA

You get a lot more background than is strictly necessary in Kenneth Branagh's re-telling of this much-loved fairytale, and the result is an ever-soslight apologia for the wicked stepmother (Cate Blanchett). Widowed and left with, as she describes them, 'two idiot daughters' to raise, she re-marries only to find herself in the shadow of Cinderella's deceased real mother, thus accentuating her bitterness and meanness. Otherwise, Branagh doesn't deviate from the well-trodden path, knowing that, at its core, the tale's theme of revenge is one that should not be tampered with if his audience is to be rewarded with the satisfaction it craves. You can read too much into a simple narrative, but it seems

that the Cinderella story is particularly pertinent to an age in which everybody feels hard done by - we all want 'those bastards' (whoever they are) to get their comeuppance. The centrepiece here is the ball, at which our heroine is reacquainted with the dashing prince, who is unaware of her identity but overwhelmed by her ravishing beauty and purity of heart. Earlier, the fairy-godmother, played by an ageless Helena Bonham Carter, had performed the tricks of turning the pumpkin into a golden carriage and the mice into white horses before decking out Cinders in her fabulous gown and those portentous glass slippers. It's a fantastic scene, bettered

only by the frantic dash from the palace when the smitten ingénue realises she must return home before the stroke of midnight. As the ideal of every girl's daggy olde-worlde dream, Lily James (from Downton Abbey) is captivating and gorgeous. Richard Madden as the prince is pretty gorgeous, too, as is the art direction, the cinematography and the costume design by the legendary Sandy Powell. A gal needing a guy to find fulfilment might be horribly outdated, but Cinderella's lesson - to 'be courageous and kind' - is one that should never be out of fashion, especially as we watch our own society slide into callowness and cruelty. # THE SPONGEBOB MOVIE: SPONGE **OUT OF WATER**

SpongeBob SquarePants first appeared on TV way back in 1999. He made his debut on the big screen 2004 and I can distinctly recall nothing about the movie but plenty about my little nephew's excitement at being taken to it. That little nephew now has 456 Facebook friends and is playing guitar in a grunge band somewhere in the back lanes of Sydney - and he wouldn't be caught dead anywhere near SpongeBob's latest incarnation. Which begs the question - how does a studio (in this case Nickelodeon Movies) maintain a cartoon character's relevance to an ever-changing market? The short answer is it beats me. All I know is that I couldn't get a seat at the first session that I rolled up for and was astounded to find that, when I did get to see it (in Lismore) it was still drawing good numbers well into its second week. Unfortunately, this time



around I was not accompanied by an enthusiastic grommet, so the experience was less than illuminating. The secret recipe for SpongeBob's renowned patties goes missing and SpongeBob and his crew need to leave Bikini Bottom and venture into the 'real world', ie, move among real humans rather than animated ones to set matters right. With rapid dialogue and helterskelter plot development, the adventure hurtles along at a pace frantic enough for me to wonder if the kids around me were doing any better than I at keeping

tabs on all that was going on. But that might possibly be the secret of this type of cartoon's appeal, for it is genuinely whacky in the (vaguely remembered) childish sense of the word. And it is not short of some terrific sight gags, too - I laughed out loud when, at the beach, they attempt to return a giant hairy porpoise (a man sunbathing) back to the water. The overall effect is, if not quite exhilarating, upbeat enough to lift an adult's spirits, but it is terribly sobering to see Antonio Banderas acting with cartoon drawings.

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

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



# **Protective parents** now busily swooping

The Masked Lapwing, aka Plover, is making human residents a little nervous at the moment with its over-protective parenting and eerie late night calls.

'The Masked Lapwing is a very protective parent who isn't afraid to chase away animals and people it sees as a threat to its young, says Susanna Bradshaw, CEO of the Foundation for National Parks & Wildlife.

'This means many residents have learnt to tread carefully when walking through the lapwing's favourite nesting spots like ovals and grassy parks.

'While these birds make the most of a warm, wet autumn, you can expect them to start nesting and increasing their defensive behaviour.

'There will be more swooping at park visitors and making a racket if you get too close to their nest or babies. But you'll be pleased to know that they rarely make contact with you - it's all just a part of their performance?

There are several things you can do to live more peacefully with Masked Lapwings:

- Vary your walking route to avoid the Lapwing nests for the next few weeks. Lapwings only swoop before they lay their eggs and after their chicks have grown enough. The rest of the time, they are quite shy.
- as this could encourage them to chase you.
- Watch where you put your feet so you don't step on any eggs among the grass and check for nests before you mow the lawn to avoid a Lap-

• Keep cats indoors as much as possible and train your dog to keep a safe distance from the birds and their nests.

'Let's not forget all the good things about Masked Lapwings,' said Ms Bradshaw. 'These birds will remove all sorts of insects from your lawn, giving some protection against lawn pests like army grubs, mole crickets and lawn beetles.

'Post-European settlement, thousands of Aussie animals have had their homes destroyed or dramatically altered. The Masked Lapwing is an unusual tale of success - fields replacing forests have allowed these birds to flourish in their preferred habitats.

'Lapwings will not nest if you keep your lawn long or create garden beds and plant trees instead of big expanses of lawn.

'Whatever you do, don't remove their eggs. It's illegal and ineffective as the Lapwings will simply re-nest and re-lay."

Masked Lapwings in the north of Australia have very large, bright yellow wattles (the fleshy bit of skin that roosters and turkeys also have) on their faces, like a mask. Their masks appear to shrink in size the further south in Australia they live.

# DRINKING WATER QUALITY MANAGEMENT PLAN Installation and Annual Test of Backflow Devices for Commercial, Industrial and Mixed Developments

Council is committed to protecting the quality of the drinking water reticulation system within the Byron Shire. The backflow prevention policy deals with the prevention of backflow of water from customers' systems back into the potable water distribution and reticulation systems. Preventing this flow reversal (backflow) reduces the possibility of contaminants entering the potable water supply. The policy provides monitoring and response procedures while identifying hazard(s) and adopts a preventative risk management approach for the entire supply line from catchment to consumer.

Water supply connections are identified where there is the potential of contamination by chemicals and pathogens. Industrial, commercial and mixed business connections are rated as a high hazard and are required to have a Backflow Prevention Device installed. Council's priority is to ensure that these connections are compliant and are tested every 12 months.

Council officers will be contacting business, commercial and industrial property owners over the next few months with advice and information in relation to specific backflow protection requirements.


