**QLD developer** in talks with **West Byron** landowner

A QLD-based company that develops suburbs around Australia is in talks with one of the West Byron landowners to sell his share of residential blocks.

Villa World QLD director Michael Vinodolac confirmed with The Echo that they are working with Sydney-based property tycoon Terry Agnew, 'which will deliver approximately 300 lots with a minimum lot size of 450sqm in accordance with the zoning requirements.'

The 108-hectare site opposite the industrial estate was controversially approved by the NSW planning department in November 2014.

Mr Vinodolac said, 'We propose to deliver a very different estate from a typical Villa World estate. While we have not finalised our plans yet, we would expect that this project will incorporate appropriate design and building covenants to ensure high-quality design outcomes and sustainability targets. We want this project to respect the character of Byron Shire by implementing appropriate housing covenants.'

#### Affordable housing

'The intent of this is to deliver more affordable housing options than just traditional homes, particularly for first home buyers.

'Further, we have engaged a local development team with all of our consultants living and working in northern NSW to ensure that the benefits of this project are kept within the region.

# Can a ten unit Mullum affordable housing refusal be defended?

A member of Council's Heritage Advisory Committee has told *The Echo* he believes that there are grounds for refusal of the Mullum affordable housing project on Stuart Street.

The DA for ten one-bedroom units with five carparking spaces was given the green light at the June 29 council meeting; however, it will be again presented for debate and a vote at the upcoming August 4 meeting after a rescission motion was lodged.

Len Bates, who is the Mullum community representative on the council committee, claims both the Local Environment Plan (LEP) and Development Control Plan (DCP) have detailed heritage conservation provisions, which stipulate no units and only single-storey homes in Mullum's heritage precinct.

'The Land and Environment court has upheld these provisions with other similar cases,' he said.

Mr Bates claims this development will begin the erosion of the heritage of the town and that other areas for affordable housing should be considered just outside the CBD that are also within walking distance.

The proposal was given passage by Council owing to the affordable housing provision within the State Environmental Planning Policies (SEPP), which stipulate just 30 per cent must be for affordable housing, while the rest can be sold at market rate.

But mayoral candidate Cr Spooner believes there are no planning grounds for refusing the Stuart Street development, 'including conservation or heritage considerations.'

He said, 'It would mean either the developer walks away or takes the decision to court.

Yet when why he thought that, Cr Spooner replied, 'In regards to Koho [the developer], I have no idea what they are intending to do if this gets refused and neither is it an argument from the right [wing]. It just makes economic sense.'

Cr Spooner said, 'How is fewer units being developed a better outcome for affordability? What's worse, by saying no to everything we will end up with more expensive unaffordable housing being proposed.

'Current Green councillors and ex-Green councillor Rose Wanchap have all argued against it happening.'

Cr Spooner said, 'Is Mr Bates proposing that lowerincome people should only be living on the fringes of our towns as modern-day fringe dwellers? I would never support such a discriminatory policy. From a purely economic point of view, you do not propose affordable housing to make money. There are much easier and better ways of doing that as a developer. Otherwise, we would be inundated by proposals.'

Mr Bates also claims Council's Heritage adviser/ consultant did not address the proposal adequately, but staff replied that LEP allows for a maximum height of nine metres, 'which provides for two storey buildings.' Council's director of sustainable environment and economy, Shannon Burt said, 'Provided the design is sympathetic to heritage conservation areas, the DCP allows for new developments.'

## Mayoral campaign kicks off

#### Affordable housing to be campaign cornerstone for Greens, Labor

Mayor Simon Richardson (Greens) has announced his intention to run again for the top job, and promised that affordable housing will be a cornerstone of the campaign.

It's also a topic that will be a key issue for Cr Paul Spooner, who told *The Echo* that he also intends to stand for mayor and will be announcing a Labor Party team of councillors shortly.

*The Echo* asked via email if conservative Cr Sol Ibrahim has plans to run again for mayor, but has not received a reply.

In Cr Richardson's press release, he referred to Nicqui Yazdi, a longtime resident and youth worker, who may have to move from the shire owing to high rents and unaffordability.

She confirmed with *The Echo* that after 18 years of renting she considered the options to be 'absolute dumps which were going for \$550 a week'.

'That's hundreds more than I can afford.' The mayor said in his press release that he has been working hard at addressing the issue, and his main priorities 'will be to ensure that the valuable contributions of longterm residents such as Ms Yazdi are not lost to the Shire because of a lack of suitable housing.

'At threat is the very thread of what makes our Byron Shire community so special – the diversity of our residents and the enormous contribution they make to our community.

'Holiday letting, particularly in Byron Bay itself, is a contributing factor. Negative gearing has fuelled a growing number of absent property owners who effectively remove their stock from the residential letting market.'

#### **Granny flats**

The mayor also took aim at the 'largely anti-community sentiment of the notorious "gang of five" councillors,' who have mostly controlled the chamber throughout the term.

He said, 'The Greens have managed to champion through a number of major affordable housing initiatives during this current term of Council – while saying no to others where the community has expressed major, valid concerns.'

'One of the most popular has been the waiving of certain fees

on the construction of granny flats, says mayor Richardson.

'This can result in savings of around \$15,000 to \$30,000 and we've already seen several hundred granny flats constructed as a result – far more than in neighbouring shires.

'The challenge will be maintaining this arrangement over the longer term. The Greens are committed to making it a permanent feature in Byron Shire, whereas other less socially conscious, more purely profit-motivated councillors would love to do away with it next time the policy's reviewed.

'Another big achievement has been the creation of a special LEP for the Byron Arts and Industry Estate.

'A NSW first, the LEP enables creatives to now live where they work, whereas previously this was unlawful.'

#### Sloganeering

Cr Spooner has claimed that in contrast to the Greens, a Labor team would 'ensure affordable housing is supported and encouraged in council and not just used as a campaign slogan.'

## **CAN's back! Scrutiny set for Council elections**

A community group that rallied for transparent, responsible and inclusive local governance in the 1990s has re-emerged for the upcoming council elections, owing to what they say are 'scary' similarities to that era.

Longtime local Rossco Phillips again heads Community Action Network (CAN) and is again calling on the community to get involved and embrace participation to be 'part of the solution' to the issues facing Byron Shire.

Phillips says owing to a period of 'relative sanity' of Byron Shire politics, the group did not have to rally like they did after the 90s. 'But now we find ourselves again with a

council that is leaving many residents cold.

'In the 1990s, the concept of "unique and natural Byron" was going out the window fast, Phillips says. 'So a group of motivated and concerned residents came together in 1994 and formed Save Our Shire (SOS), which then became Community Action Network.

'CAN ran a very successful campaign in 1995, which saw a landslide win to the community with a seven-to-three councillor result, and included Ian Kingston defeating the pro-development candidate, Ross Tucker, for mayor.

'Ironically, the new council had to then place a moratorium on nearly all development in urban areas until the sewerage systems could be updated and/or expanded to cope with the load.'


Phillips says leading up to

elections, CAN 'will identify and support candidates who share our principles, and welcomes local residents' support to help us get them elected.'

'CAN will assess councillors who want to be re-elected by reviewing their voting histories on the important issues, and we also want to meet new candidates to hear what issues they care about and why they believe they would make good councillors'.

'We strongly believe the future of this Shire cannot be left to chance – or to the whims of the state government.'

## **Rubber hits the road**

Local government is one area where the rubber hits the road, and that's not always a metaphor. The grand plans and policies of federal and state government are often enacted through local government - local councillors often wear on their faces the egg which should have been aimed at someone in Canberra or in Macquarie Street.

In NSW, as former Byron Shire councillor Ross Tucker (1991-2012) noted, local councils are the 'bastard child' of the state government. And as bastards they are not always treated with the paternal tenderness due to them. They fork out for expenses which should be the state's responsibility, sometimes on important planning decisions, and are underfunded by their haughty parent and castigated for crying poor.

In addition, in the large municipal centres, councils are often the plaything of the Libs and Labs seeking to extend their power bases.

Into this sordid arena come the untried council candidates, some of them Candides believing in the best of all possible worlds. Really, they have no idea of the truck which is about to run over them, despite the best intentions of candidate briefings.

And yet already the Shire candidates are lining up for the September 10 election (elections.nsw.gov.au). Even that old warhorse Fast Buck\$ is considering running, apparently having forgotten the anguish the role of councillor brought him last time. Apart from some good work on Clause 45 in the Byron Local Environmental Plan in relation to the sewerage moratorium, Bucks distinguished himself as the only councillor in the Shire (perhaps in Australia) to appear at a council meeting dressed as Jesus Christ.


Most councillors are less colourful; some, in fact, lack any zest or flavour. But candidates wishing to do a proper job for their constituents should be aware there is an awful lot of reading of complicated documents that might not always resemble the English language. That's unless you plan to sit there reading the Daily Terrorgraph and put your hand up when your mates tell you to. Then there's dealing with the Yes Minister aspects of government bureaucracy and figuring out the procedural motions by which other councillors will seek to thwart your intentions.

I should know. I covered Byron council meetings from about 1989 until 2010, when my doctor warned me that reading any more agenda papers would be hazardous to my health.

It's an important job which involves more than rates, roads and rubbish if you want to get a handle on what's really happening in the global village.

I wish the council candidates good luck in their pursuit of their goal, but think carefully before entering the arena. If you were looking for a career path full of sweetness and light, then you should have gone into the news media.

## Let's talk about local political donations

he question of political donations was recently brought to the attention of the gallery during councillor debate on July 29, when Cr Basil Cameron asked Cr Sol Ibrahim directly who funded his campaign.

It brought ooohhhhs and aaahhhs from the chamber.

The question of course is whether he and others who recently rammed the coastal policy through - the CZMP BBE - were funded by Belongil landowners.

Cr Ibrahim replied indignantly and with some irritation that he paid an independent assessor to evaluate his campaign finances and that he had followed the 'letter of the law' when it came to donations.

And while he went on to say that it is a democratic right for individuals to contribute money to political parties, he never replied to the question of who financially supported his campaign.

#### Virtual unknown

Before the current councillors were elected in 2012, The Echo reported on all councillor donations and their election war chest.

It costs on average around \$10,000 for a campaign, which will get you in the press, on radio and perhaps TV. Just as important is signage and printed materials.

It should be pointed out that Cr Ibrahim was elected onto Council in 2012 as a virtual unknown, and he swapped preferences with conservative councillor Di Woods.

Cr Ibrahim told The Echo at the time, 'While Di Woods's 'We also had many other offers which were declined due to ineligibility' - Cr Di Woods in 2012

policies are not all the same as ours, I do not find anything there that I am strongly opposed to, and some that I agree with?

Prior to being elected, Cr Ibrahim told The Echo on September 4, 2012 'Most of our supporters have no interest in becoming involved in politics, but they are fed up with watching the mismanagement of their shire. They have donated to us on the understanding that their privacy will be respected?

#### **Donation returns**

It's not ideal of course, but political donation returns are published over a year later by the electoral commission.

And like all levels of government, donation laws are fairly loose, hard to track and easily bypassed.

When the electoral commission published the political donations from the 2012 local elections, The Echo did a story on January 24, 2014.

The story reported, 'Cr Ibrahim's Vision In Action team reported no donations of any kind except his own, which totalled \$3,867.

Except his campaign cost \$11,797. When asked about the donations at the time, Cr Ibrahim said, 'I received about two dozen donations.'

'All were below the reportable threshold from local residents who were of course not developers, or involved

in gaming or liquor, as per AEC rules.

And when asked who were Cr Ibrahim's main backers, he replied, 'It is a bit mischievous to imply that I or other councillors had "major backers".

He said, 'I think it would be quite obvious to anyone who reviewed my votes, and my carefully stated reasons, that I am not beholden to any backers, unlike some of the Greens of course.

'The Greens received about a third of the votes, and my votes were about equal to Paul Spooner's and Basil Cameron's combined. Clearly there are a wide range of legitimate community views in our Shire?

#### **Cr Woods brings** Hunter and Cubis

The other supporter of the controversial coastal policy is Cr Di Woods and her team of 'True Independents'. Her vote also brought fellow councillors Chris Cubis and Alan Hunter to the chamber in 2012.

As reported at the time, they raised by far the most capital, with 30 individuals donating a total of \$19,728 alone (all anonymously as they were under \$1,000).

Additionally, a fundraising event added \$12,290 to the war chest, making that at least \$32,018. Cr Woods has been in Council for 12 years, and was the natural successor to former conservative Cr Ross Tucker.

According to the electoral commission, her campiagn cost \$13,866.53, which included a marketing team that was paid \$8,195.

Asked at the time if she would advocate a change in donation disclosure given donations under \$1,000 are anonymous, Cr Woods replied, 'I would always agree with absolute transparency from all candidates including the Greens?

#### **Ineligible offers**


She also said in 2012, 'We had many donors who had their money returned to them as they were ineligible under the electoral ruling.

'We also had many other offers which were declined due to ineligibility.

'We had a consultancy firm working for us who sought donations on our behalf and we maintained absolute scrutiny to ensure we had only legitimate donations that complied with the ruling by the Electoral Funding Authority (EFA).

■ *The Echo* did not profile the other councillors owing to their not holding the balance of power in Council. The majority council was made possible when Greens councillor Rose Wanchap quit the party and aligned herself with an opposing ideology.

#### Seeking clarity

#### Money or medicine?

*The Echo*'s recent critical scrutiny of the new Byron hospital is most welcome, and deserved. When governments come to us bearing such gifts as shiny \$88 million hospitals, there is likely a sting in the tail. With this new public health

edifice our community will be stung in a number of ways. We lose the existing Mullum and Byron hospitals and the Bangalow and Ocean Shores public health centre. This centralisation of services offers great cost savings for the beancounting health bureaucrats with the added bonus of selling the land on which these services previously operated into a buoyant property market. Expect to hear the words 'affordable accommodation' when this happens.

And as last week's paper went to some lengths to document, large shiny sheds are only as good as the health professionals they're staffed with. It is hardly surprising that the hospital is not employing adequate nursing staff. Nurses cost money, and the job of the bean counters is to keep the purse strings held tight. Health outcomes do not matter to these people.

The trend of the last decade has been a steady increase in the ratio of patients to nursing staff in our hospitals (especially when patient acuity is accounted for). Yet for Wayne Jones, CEO of the local health district, the staffing problems at the new hospital are dismissed simply as staff ineptitude. Or, in management-speak, 'heightened emotions and transition issues'. What rubbish. The problem is with a health system where management's only metric is money; nurses are a fuel to be burnt up; and patients, well, bugger them.


Eighteen months ago First Dog on the Moon began mentoring Eaten Fish and they have since kept regular contact.



## Biodiversity loss a serious threat

Recent research on biodiversity loss reveals that climate change is a 'wild card', a new challenge to Earth's eco-systems, according to a recent issue of the journal Science.

Global mapping reveals 'unsafe levels' of biodiversity across 58 per cent of Earth's surface. Biodiversity loss is substantial enough to question the ability of many ecosystems to support human societies.

Key points note that 'safe limits are exceeded if less than 90 per cent abundance of original species or 80 per cent of those species is retained'. The analysis found average local abundance of species across the world was 84.6 per cent.





'These babies are still getting used to strangers,' cautions the trainer. The two blue and gold macaws look me up and down. Each of these parrots is almost a kilo in weight, over 70 centimetres in size, with a beak that can exert 35 kilograms per square centimetre. I pretend I am a new part of the furniture but they are still wondering if I could be a danger, a new source of food or maybe a playmate.

Finally, the birds relax some feathers and make slight chattering sounds. 'They will do what is most rewarding for them,' says the trainer.

'Right now I am training them to be calm with new people. That's a first step for any companion pet, especially ones as big as these.'

The philosophy to the training is also important. Gone are the old ideas of domination and brute force. According to Sarah Friedman, US psychology professor and



animal trainer, every companion animal can be empowered to 'make the right behavioural choices...to get something of value rather than escape something averse?

This starts with the companion human learning Nature's Law of Effect. Freidman explains, 'behaviour... what a parrot does, under certain conditions... that [which] works from the animal's point of view is repeated and

Macaws have inquiring minds and companion humans work with this. Knowing the birds constantly explore for high-energy foods, humans offer titbits as reinforcements during training. Humans can also offer attention, scratches and vocalisations of their own as reinforcements because the birds are sociable creatures. According to the each bird's individual personalities, one will prefer a scratch here to there, or favour their human's trilling instead of clucking or cooing.

The birds are always looking to sharpen their beaks. They investigate things with their tongues. They coordinate using their foot and beak like humans do fingers and thumbs. All the while, they



These are the things I want to say to you. These things I have held inside or even worse run from. It is not easy, what I have to say, and it should not be easy. These are things that tear at who we are. These are the things that kill, that spread disease and madness. These are the things that drive people to suicide, that put us in prisons and steal our sight.

I have started this so many times and stopped. I have tried to find the right words. It is so tempting to turn to rage and blame. I am angry: I know that. It flares suddenly and with the slightest provocation; it takes my breath away sometimes. I know where that comes from. I have seen it in my father and he inherited it from his father. It comes from the weight of history.

I am afraid too. And that comes from the same place.

I have known this fear all my life. When I was young it used to make me feel sick, physically ill in the pit of my stomach. It was a fear of what could touch us – the sense of powerlessness, of being at the mercy of the intrusion of the police or the welfare officers who enforced laws that enshrined our exclu-



sion and condemned us to poverty. It was a heavy hand that made people tremble. I see it still in my father. I see it as he tenses up just at the sight of a police car. He has done nothing wrong. But when he is pulled over for something as routine as a random breath test his heart beats faster and he fumbles his keys. We fear the state and we have every reason to. The state was designed to scare us.



## **Austerity and abundance**

#### Making credit where credit is due - for the 99 per cent

As I sit under a tree, the abundance of nature is overwhelming. The geology, the water cycle, the tides, the birds, the schools of fish, the forest of beauty and photosynthesis, the soils of billions of organisms per handful. This vast symphony of nature sustains and delights millions of species, and is the true wealth that underpins the economy.

Yet the economy is stripping away this real abundance to honour some artificial zeroes created in a bank computer. Out of thin air, banks allocate credit. This starts the process of employing and extracting resources. This credit creation could be useful but is most often used by the capitalist elite to build excessive houses and bet on the derivatives market. Ordinary people chase these dollar credits, surrendering their time to an anxious search for money for needs and ambition. Most people are debt slaves.

#### Indebted

Worse, we are indebting our environment. If we strip-mine our environment, we are doomed as a species, dragging down with us most of the other millions of species. We don't even count the ecological services in our Gross National Product estimates, let alone in most corporate balance sheets. Most corporations, piratical gangs intent on maximising profits by any means possible, happily destroy environments, utilise skilled, healthy labour without paying much tax, and dominate politics so it serves short-term aims.

Women's increased workforce participation and fabulous new technologies have come onto the world stage in the last 30 years, creating great abundance. This vast creativity could be used for so many important things such as ending world poverty, or repairing the environment, or even just not working so hard, creating community and leaving nature alone.

(the 'debt'). Governments in fact need to run deficits just to balance the extraction of so much wealth into dead ends such as the tax havens and the stockmarket, otherwise the economy would grind to a halt through inadequate demand. When the US government and others decided to 'bail-in' the wicked banks who brought you the 2008 crisis, the trillions were conjured up, as Paulson admitted, out of thin air. Against future taxpayers, maybe, but essentially money is no object when it comes to bailing out hyperwealthy banks and corporations, or war (such as 30 billion dollars worth of sub-

#### marines, or the Iraq disaster). **Corporate welfare**

Corporate welfare overwhelms the welfare to old, sick and young persons. One estimate is that corporate subsidies in USA are five times their profits, making small business look uncompetitive. Moreover, Big Business has access to most superannunation/ pension savings via the stock market, while small business must borrow at high interest.

So in order to balance the budget, Australians, like the hapless Greeks and the abused Africans, are told to expect austerity. Austerity is reduced services and increased taxation. This will bring the nirvana of no government debt, we are told. Government spending, reviled by the neoliberal ideologists as inefficient and wasteful, in fact represents the collective desire of the accountable democratic state and its people for health, education, environment and security. A healthy, educated population is a foundation of economic progress, as well as inherently wonderful.

#### Creating credit

But we don't need auster-

cent to pay back their easily created loan with interest that is often three times the original loan.

So one way we don't need austerity is to stop paying the 40 per cent of efforts and resources currently going to the private banks. Another is to reduce waste, war and other corporate subsidies. Yet another is to create a public bank.

#### **Public banks**

Public banks funded Australia in the early part of this century, and in Canada, Russia, New Zealand, Japan, Germany, and currently fund 40 per cent of the world's people. It's no 'butterfly chasing' idealistic proposal; it's common, easy and incredibly liberating to have public banking.

Public banks, as in North Dakota, cushion crises, support smaller independent banks, and fund government and other initiatives. They can return interest monies to education and help fund organic agriculture and affordable housing. They can offer breaks to farmers, small business and young families. Check out the websites of Ellen Brown and Michael Hudson.

#### Inequality

To hear the National Party, for instance, pontificate about how hard it is for us to 'get ahead' when their government wilfully supports private banks and corporations to extract wealth from the community, is aggravating to me. Except that it highlights the Australian people's recognition of the growing inequality in society. This inequality is inherent in private bank credit creation - a few profit, most slog to pay. We need money and credit, but not to enrich the few.

As in Bernie Sanders's grassroots campaign in the USA, younger Australians are realising our social compact between the generations is broken. That individual efforts to 'get ahead' are not enough. We need to work together! We need to explode the myth of balanced budgets and austerity. We can reclaim the true abundance of nature, society, women's work, technology, political experience and community goodwill. We can work less, love more and have a future.



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Where has all this extra wealth creation gone? Largely into the pockets and tax havens of the capitalist elite, the one per cent who now own half of human wealth.

Governments can create credit. Governments do not need to pay a billion a month to private money markets

ity. Governments can create credit for worthy purposes, just as private banks conjure money out of thin air. It's no more inflationary, if it's done with proper oversight and for productive purposes. Somehow our governments have delegated the right to create credit to private banksters, and no-one's taking about that in schools or media. It's the greatest bank robbery of all time! The one per cent create money and extract real work and resources from the 99 per

### Eden at Byron Garden Centre

Winter is a great time for gardening. Plant some flowers (think pansies, violas, snapdragons, marigolds, dianthus) for instant colour. Cram them into pots or bare patches in the garden. Add some of your favourite herbs and leafy greens. You also need to plant bare-rooted roses, asparagus, and potatoes in the next month or so.

Trees and shrubs planted now will be well established before the summer heat arrives. Most gardeners find that it's easier to do the serious physical work in this nice cool weather, so get stuck into those big projects now.

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
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# Nothing better than breakfast on the deck

#### ONCE UPON A TIME, BUT NOT SO VERY LONG AGO, THERE WAS A MAN WHO TOOK OVER A BUSINESS.

The business was not only a rival to his previous employer, it was located next door. In many versions, this story would be a tragedy, with scenes of shock, horror, recrimination, and even legal action.

But this version of the story is a happy one. The man in the story is Jack Wright. He has taken over the Brunswick Burger & Fish Bar. Located in The Terrace, Brunswick Heads, across a laneway from his previous employer, The Hotel Brunswick, who are fully supportive of Jack's new venture.

'The hotel is like a big family,' says Jack as he describes starting at the hotel as an 18-year-old 'glassie' before progressing through the ranks to become a bar manager.

His ex-boss, hotel licensee Kyle Douglas, confirms that there is no animosity. 'I'm excited that Jack is operating a business of his own,' Kyle says. 'He is a hardworking young man who is down to earth, friendly and knowledgeable. He has the right attributes to succeed in Brunswick Heads, and the Hotel is happy to offer support and advice where necessary.'

Not only is this a good news local business support story, it is a story of a hard-working, go-getting member of Gen Y. Jack is just 26 ('turning 27,' he says). He has good business role models with his sister and brother-in-law running a successful food distribution company. He also has great support from other family and friends. 'A chef friend helped me put together the menu,' he says. 'And a couple of mates helped me with the renovations.'

Jack is responsible for the renovation design, which includes pallet-style outdoor seating and a decorative wall of wood salvaged from an old Queenslander. Fittingly for his generation, he found inspiration via Instagram and Pinterest. He also did a tour of duty of the burger bars up and down the coast. 'I ate a lot of chips,' he laughs.

In fact, on one morning last week we were told that no fewer than five whales were spotted, with the whales expected to come even closer to shore on their way home.

There is a great range of options with which to break your fast. As you might have gathered from my love of cereal, I prefer simple breakfast fare, so jumped at the homemade granola (laden with whole hazelnuts and dried figs) with stewed fruit, adding Greek yoghurt to further 'up' the yum factor. For those with heartier morning appetites, regular eggs are on offer, or you can spice it up with Spanish-style eggs or with dukkah-roasted pumpkin. The homemade baked beans are delicious and plentiful. If breakfast out is not your thing, the deck is open the rest of the day for coffee and cake, as well as lunch and dinner – though at dinner, not only is there no cereal on the menu, I find it hard to choose between the two outdoor dining options – the sea views from the deck and the hinterland sunset views from the other side of the restaurant.

Breakfast on the deck is available every day 8am-noon. Times may change as the weather warms, so check out www.oceanshorescc.com.au. His chips are delicious, with a choice of regular or French-fry style, as well as sweet potato and tofu versions. Classic burgers are joined by ones based around pulled pork, teriyaki sauce and Cajun chicken. There will always be a vegetarian burger special and, of particular interest to families, there are \$5 kid meals.

The business that Jack is building is likely to change its name later this year but the friendly service, fun vibe and good food will remain.

Wine and cheese - a combination so well accepted that the words roll off the tongue as smoothly as the actual wine and cheese slide down the throat.

There are historical reasons for this pairing - in early times (when food miles were of concern for the opposite reason they are now), wine and cheese were produced in nearby regions, particularly in France. There are also scientific reasons - our palate enjoys being cleansed by astringent sensations while we eat rich foods. By alternating between the tastes in one meal, we are able to control the balance between the two.\*

It was a junior staff member who suggested this timeless pairing when Byron at Byron was looking for a new winter offer. I suggest that this person is in line for promotion, as they know the simplest ideas are often the best.

The enactment is also simple. A cheese board, along with two glasses of wine, is available on the verandah daily from 4pm into the evening. Priced at \$38, this is designed for two people to share, but there is nothing stopping you from savouring two glasses and all the cheese yourself.

The verandah is heated and protected from the weather, but retains views to the lush bushland of the resort, visiting kookaburras (accustomed to a diet of wagyu beef!) and swallows that circle the skies around sunset. On Sundays, live music is a bonus, courtesy of singer/ songwriter, Greg Kew (who moonlights as a muso in addition to his usual role as a waiter).

The specific cheeses vary, but will always include three contrasting types

- for example, an English cheddar, an Italian Gorgonzola and a French bouche d'Affinois (similar to brie). Further variety of taste is provided by pear, quince, muscatels and/or nuts.

The final part of the science lesson is that, though wine is only mildly astringent, its ability to cleanse the palate increases with the quantity of consumption. So, if you need to order an extra glass of wine in order to get the balance just right, feel free to blame science.

# A classic combination Stockpot Kitchen

Bowling clubs aren't traditionally known as foodie hubs. Social hubs yes, places that serve as community meeting places yes, but not really somewhere you would once have gone for a fine meal, something other than your run-of-the-mill pub grub.

In parts of the Byron Shire, however, this is no longer the case.

Graeme and Jen Stockdale's Stockpot Kitchen is a shining example, having been run out of the kitchen at the Bangalow bowlo for around

a year now. Specialising in southern USstyle cooking, their down-home approach and concerted use of local produce has endeared them to the local crowd, their specialty nights regularly selling out.

'Graeme's been cooking with fire for at least 15 years,' says Jen Stockdale of her chef husband, on why they decided to head down the US comfort-food route. 'So I'd bought him a small smoker for his birthday. He got really into it, and our friends had a big one that he really got in to. So from there it grew. My brother lives in America, so he's always sending through all these things.'

The smoking culture has boomed in this country over the past five years, punters taking to the non-Australian method of barbecuing like ducks to water. Not many do it well, however; it's not as easy as it sounds, but Stockpot have proven they're on top of it all, Graeme Stockdale bringing his own flavour to this time-honoured way of cooking.

The Byron Bay Brewery has been bought by beverage giant Lion, who are very conscious of fitting into their new space.

As was widely reported in late April, brewing giant Lion have purchased the Byron Bay Brewery. Wholly owned by Japanese company Kirin Holdings, Lion are responsible for the likes of well-known brands XXXX and Tooheys. In recent years, however, the company has successfully branched out into craft beer, amply

evidenced by their effective running of, among others, Little Creatures and James Squire, two of Australia's biggest craft-beer

Their acquisition of the Byron Bay Brewing Company will take their craft brew tally to six; the fact it's based in one of the most sought-after locations in the country is not lost on the multinational.

'If you look at Australia, Byron Bay has got to be in the top three "must do" locations, so for us to have an asset in that space and be able to [be a part] of the tranquillity and the amazing location, it's really good,' says Will Wood, Lion's business development manager for hospitality. As Wood goes on to explain, Barry Schadel, the former owner of the brewery, was looking to retire and approached Lion regarding a sale. An agreement was reached and so now Lion do have a foothold in Byron Bay, something Wood is quick to acknowledge comes with a responsibility.

important for us] to reach out into the community and ask, "How can we help you?" We're a successful business, and we want our community to be successful, so we purchase locals where possible, we recruit locally, and we look to engage community groups to see how we can, through our success, help showcase their success as well.'

How Lion will look to do this remains to be seen. The company in the immediate term is conducting a full refurbishment of the brewery and restaurant, which is currently closed until September. Plans include a move away from counter service to table service, while the focus on the beer itself will still be strong. 'We're very much [about] breweryled hospitality spaces,' Wood confirms. 'So when customers come in, they get a very strong sense of who we are from our beer.'

pulled pork, smoked brisket burgers, southern-style fried chicken. 'There are a lot of different elements to it; he'll experiment with dishes and then they'll go on the menu when he's happy with them. And talking to people, he talks to Fletcher (Potanin, Bangalow BBQ & Bluegrass Festival), they pick each other's brains, and people will come in and say they had this dish when they were in the deep south, and Graeme will research it and figure it out. He always wants people's input.'

The humble bowlo is still a community meeting place, a social hub, but now it's got the food to go with it, courtesy of those such as Stockpot Kitchen.

The Byron Bay Brewing Company has won a slew of awards over the years, and so stands as a feather in Lion's cap, and not just because of the location. All that remains is for Lion to properly transition into Byron Bay itself. Meanwhile, Pighouse Flicks and The Buddha Gardens Day Spa are still open.



'We do have great history with Geelong and Fremantle (where Little Creatures is brewed), the communities benefitting from our investments,' he says. '[It's very

'I was always a bit of a bad boy. Always saying the most inappropriate thing at the most inappropriate time. It was my not just thinking dirty thoughts. I was saying them.

'I have always been able to translate an idea or something into my head to make a joke. A lot of people are funny, but they lack the skill to translate it to material!

'A lot of my family are really funny,' he says. 'They try and tell me jokes that I am supposed to say on stage and I am left saying to them, that's going be hard to translate... and they say, look at Andy, he's the big comedian now!'

Andy came to public attention with his online comedy sketch show called [ITALIC]White Bloke Atcha. [/ITALIC] 'I felt the hunger and fell into it,' he laughs.

'I remember my first real gig - it was a little bit daunting, and everyone does things that are like comedy. You joke with your family for 20 years before you become a professional, but the thing is my first professional gig happened in front of a bunch of strangers. They were going to hear what was in my head. It was a RAW comedy heat in the bar on the hill in Newcastle, jam packed. I was in the top three so went on to the state finals, which was good.' Yes it was good. State finalist for your first ever live performance is nothing to sneeze at!

'When I started off I was very political,' says Saunders of his foray into standup.

'It was because of the lack of inclusivity of Aboriginal people in main-stream media. Now we are all over mainstream media. Well we're in the anti-smoking campaign ads. I have always done a lot of tongue-in-cheek jokes and that can make me look angry. I steered away from that. There is a lot of humour in an angry comic, but you just don't want to mix it with bitter and cynical!'

Saunders is nothing remotely bitter or cynical. Fast, furious, able to jump from impressive act-out to act-out at lightning speed, making insane comedic connections missed by others... like Aliens coming to Earth and saying, 'take me to your leader' and having to take them to Donald Trump.

EDY WITH A MESSA

'Anger is a great comedy avenue but it needs to be used right; it's like crudeness. There are some comedians who go too far and it's not funny any more but if you are smart and use it in an articulate way people get it. That's the same with political humour and cultural humour. It takes skill to not show that anger, and to try to get your point across in words.'

As such, Saunders often finds himself a bit of a cultural educator for community members who have little Indigenous knowledge or experience.

'I find this quite endearing and quite funny that people come up to us and say you know what, I learnt something. It makes me just think, wow people can't be that detached from Indigenous people! But they are.'

Although Saunders's comedic star is definitely on the rise, he won't be leaving his home town of Taree any time soon. 'Living there really helps with my lifestyle and my inner peace,' he says. 'I tried the city twice and it just didn't suit me. I would definitely live in Byron Bay! For me it's about the conncection in the country. I am not saying I couldn't connect in the city, but there is a rhyme I think to myself: One in seven billion and still more to come – how am I going to make a mark when I am only one?'

Oh, I should have mentioned: Saunders is also an impressive hip-hop and beat-box artist.

'I find power in being able to put words together. Humans really respond to rhyme. There are new rappers saying let's go away from rhyme. You are trying to change mindsets with words. People need to hear the lyrics and the rhyme helps them move their mindset!

When Saunders is asked about his greatest influence, he goes to family.

'My grandfather - unbelievable man, greatest human I have known – he taught me it's human to be different and humane to accept the difference. He was very compassionate, and my grandmother was the same.

The matriarchs: we miss them. They are there for a reason, to instill those types of beliefs in the younger people. He used to have a bunch of people coming from universities and asking questions about acceptance and diversity and one time one of them asked him about to stop racism.

He said to this older journalist, "Do you have kids? The only way to stop racism from this point on is to teach your kids to have acceptance, be inclusive and nonjudgmemtal. Stop racism one family at a time; start with your kids." It's that great saying; children are messages we send to a time we will not see and it's our job to make those messages strong and true, and I believe that is what humour is about. It's okay to laugh at things, and to laugh at yourself, and the best thing to do is to be happy and have a laugh...'

Andy Saunders is not just a comedian, he's one hell of a message carrier. Don't miss him when he headlines at the Byron Services Club with Ms Stella as support and Mandy Nolan as MC on Monday.



Bela Fleck and Abigail Washburn have mastered the deceptively intricate art of the duet. And they've done it on the banjo. Their performances embrace a diversity almost unthinkable – coming from just two banjos and one voice. Washburn's beguiling composing, playing and singing blend with Fleck's riveting and virtuosic musicianship to create music that is both unique yet familiar in texture. Fleck, a 16-time Grammy Award winner, has collaborated with Chick Corea, Oumou Sangare, Zakir Hussain, Edgar Meyer, Dave Mathews, Earl Scruggs and the entire Cleveland Orchestra for his banjo concert The Imposter.

Washburn's banjo has taken her far beyond the usual old-timey comfort zone, musically and geographically. Singing and recording in French, choosing classic and contemporary chansons has grown from a kooky little side project to a going concern, with the girls recording their second album Album Deux this year. This one for the first time features a number of their own original compositions written, of course, in French!

'We got an ARIA nomination, which was exciting,' laughs Abby. Not that they went. 'We've been lots of times and you really have to turn it on. I am naturally an introvert. I can do it; it comes at a cost!

#### So how does a self-confessed introvert cope when she finds herself centre stage?

'A lot of people I know definitely have that side of them. I wouldn't have admitted to it, or allowed myself to think that way. But being alone, that is always how I recharge. That is the definition apparently - introverts are people who recharge on their own and extroverts recharge in a crowd. That always made a lot of sense to me!'

#### So what is it about the coming together of Baby et Lulu that is so magical?

'We are so complementary!' says Abby.'I think she would be the extrovert. We are wired differently but we are great friends and we adore each other. When I do my own shows I would be a lot more anxious about putting the show on and making sure it was great but with Baby I feel a lot less pressure. The band is excellent. I am not holding the show, and she (Lara) is probably a little better at show biz than I am. We just cover each other in different kinds of ways. There are some days when I am quite lively and animated, and can be the opposite. It's not always the same. It's so nice to have a pal in your corner who knows you. We naturally cover for each other!

'As for the appeal of Baby et Lulu - it's hard to know what the appeal actually is! We are still mystified. Our shows in Sydney always sell out - we don't really know why. We are two Australian girls singing in French!'


Many of the songs are wonderfully tortured. Such is the nature of love!

'It is intense and melancholy. I love the exquisite pleasure of feeling sad; it is exquisite and beautiful and taps into the poetic lines of you. That's what I love about singing generally and singing in French – the joy in playful songs. Some of the songs are really intense and passionate and we are allowed to do that onstage. As a singer I am allowed to be intense and dramatic and emotive, whereas talking to my friends in a cafe I am not always allowed to be so dramatic!

'A lot of people don't love the depth of what are deemed unpleasant emotions. I watched a little story that showed we think that sadness is a bad thing where people are trying to pretend life is rosy and that we should be happy all the time and, if you are not, you have done something wrong. We don't have a great tradition of that here. Thank god for music! Go to a concert; you can cry in the dark.' Music really does allow people to be exquisitely sad. If only for three minutes.

But its not all heartache! There is a lot of joyous, cheeky moments!

'Baby et Lulu is playful and we dress up. We put on our high heels and lipstick and curl our hair and dress up. And we dress with each other. It's very girly. Neither of us does that. I thought that girly fun was over. I think people like that as well so they dress up too! I am not sure if it's escapism for people.





# THE RETURN OF **MS STELLA**

WHEN I MET MS STELLA HER NAME WAS STILL BARBARA.

She was this intensely clever and attractive 20-something young woman who'd rolled into town from Melbourne, scored herself a primo job writing the entertainment pages of The Echo and was soon to join me on stage in the Queen Bs.

Over three years we satirised, plagiarised and outraged as many people and venues as we could find. From the six-week residency doing Friday arvo downloads at The Rails to forgetting to bring a tent to Maleny Festival and having to sleep on our jackets on the grass, to feature shows at Cocomangas, where our doorman turned out to be none other than Puppetry of the Penis's co creator David Friend. (He would later go on to blow us right out of the water. Embarrassing when the bouncer has a better career than you do.) It was a wonderful, free and evocative time in Byron, full of nudity, sanyassins and satire, and perhaps I remember it even more fondly because I was in my late twenties and the book of my life hadn't been written yet. Barbara changed her name to Stella and got into documentary making. I kept getting pregnant. Stella left. I stayed. Eventually, after some stealthy moves I scored Stella's job at The Echo as entertainment editor and the rest I guess is history. In the last few years Stell and I have reconnected comedically, with me performing at the comedy room she runs in Newport in Melbourne where she lives. So as part of her winter soujourn it only seems right that Ms Stella should jump up at some of my gigs.

air-guitar competition. Think teased hair, power ballads, tongue-out, balls-to-the-wall lip-synching and power strumming, riffing and



It's early days yet, but this dreadful movie of mind-numbing noise and bluster has shot into contention, with a bullet, for a leading place among the year's Joe Cockers. Old-school ghosts, the ones that you rarely ever see other than as creepy, shadowy apparitions - the ones that actually scare you and make you wonder about whether the phenomenon could possibly be true - have been made a thing of the past by splatter-fest CGI. As a new take on the unfathomably highly regarded 1984 original, with women instead of men as the saviours of New York City from dastardly paranormal activity, I certainly didn't go along expecting anything other than vaporous green monsters causing idiot mayhem. But it is even more brain-dead than its spectral villains are ridiculous it's like a ghost story written by Donald Trump instead of Edgar Allen Poe. The gang this time around is Erin (Kristen Wiig), Abby (the cheaply stereotyped Melissa McCarthy), Jillian (Kate McKinnon, in a performance that provokes jaw-grinding irritation) and Patty (Leslie Jones, who, for some reason, has attracted more online ire than director Paul Feig). The girls, as serious believers in ghosts, have to prove themselves in the eyes of the doubters and the government, which is at pains to keep

the truth from the public (yawn). Chris Hemsworth as Kevin, their beefcake Aussie secretary, does a you-beaut dumb blonde routine without any memorable lines (the script is slipshod throughout), Ozzy Osbourne gets the briefest of cameos, playing himself at a heavy metal concert, and Bill Murray, in homage to Bill Murray, has seven figures added to his bank account for reciting some lines as a ghost sceptic. You get a few bars of Ray Parker Jr's classic theme song, but it's not nearly enough to lift the leadenness. The last twenty minutes are as loud as these sorts of action flicks always are now – I left with a splitting headache and if you care in the least what happens you're easily pleased.

## **LOVE & FRIENDSHIP**

As a proto-feminist (long before the term was ever coined), Jane Austen will always remain relevant. Her Pride And Prejudice and Emma are unlikely to ever be out of print. This movie, adapted for the screen by American writer/director Whit Stillman, is based on a lesser known novella, Lady Susan. Portrayed with precision and unflappable calm by Kate Beckinsale, the eponymous heroine of the story (if we can call her that, so duplicitous is she), the widowed Susan Vernon, has made a mission of seeing to it that her daughter Frederica (Morfydd Clark) makes a match that will ensure her future happiness, wealth and security. To do this, she must outwit and manipulate the gentlemen with whom she cavorts in London and rural Kent.

There is a lot of information to be absorbed in the first five minutes as Stillman introduces us, in a bookish, almost stilted manner, to the players who will be caught in Lady Susan's web. There are the Manwarings and the DeCourcys, of whom young Reginald (Australian Xavier Samuel) will be her target, and a coterie of gentry, including the gibbering idiot, Sir James Martin (Tom Bennett), the doughty butler Wilson (Conor Lambert), and Lady Susan's American confidante, Alicia Johnson (Chloë Sevigny, adorable as ever). All of the characters are so finely drawn and the dialogue, as you'd expect, razor sharp (you actually need to listen closely) and wry. Art direction is a feast for the eye – although my companion informed me that the fabulous costumes were not all strictly in period, ranging between Restoration and Regency, which is neither here nor there for a mungo like me - and the edit never lets the narrative become bogged down in wordiness. Lady Susan's, and true love's, ultimate triumph is only slightly diminished by the partner she chooses for herself, but in the back of your mind you understand that she knows exactly what she's doing and that all will end well for her. Great stuff - if only we could get more of it.

## \$20,000 for Mullum netball shelter

The Brunswick Byron Netball Association has been awarded a \$20,000 grant to help build a weather shelter at the Mullumbimby courts.

Lisa Alexander, coach of the world champion Australian team, was on hand to help make the official presentation of the grant money in Mullumbimby last month. She also made time to give a host of local juniors some training and fitness tips.

Brunswick Byron Netball Association applied for a grant through ANZ Netball Nation. There were four grants of \$20,000 up for grabs Australia wide.

The proposed shelter will protect players and spectators from both the hot and wet weather, grants coordinator for the BBNA Julie Ryan said.

Council is also contributing roughly \$20,000 in cash and in-kind support, she said. If all goes to plan construction will begin this year so the shelter can be ready for use by the beginning of next season, she said.

Part of the grant application was through a video presentation that featured local junior players explaining why the shelter was needed.

This video and the fact that the BBNA was ready to move ahead with the project helped get the grant request over the line, Julie said.

Being awarded the grant was 'pretty exciting and pretty hard to believe,' she said.

It was an Australia-wide program, 'so you expect not to get it,' she said.

The BBNA includes five clubs: Mullumbimby, Byron Bay, Bangalow, Ocean Shores and Main Arm, and includes 360 registered players.
