Labor calls to delay rate rise

Is a ten per cent compounded permanent rate rise a certainty?

Greens mayor Simon Richardson believes so, having told The Echo previously he expects a majority vote to prevail at this Thursday's council meeting on February 2.

But Byron Shire Country Labor councillor Paul Spooner says the case has 'not effectively been made' for a special rates increase in Byron Shire and is calling on fellow councillors to delay any increase for at least a year.

Councillors Cate Coorey (independent) and Alan Hunter (Nationals aligned) have also expressed concern at the plan, with Cr Coorey telling The Echo the proposal 'hasn't been presented well' and Cr Hunter saying he doesn't 'trust this council to deal with it properly.

And such, the rise could conceivably be in jeopardy: if all three councillors, plus Cr Spooner's Labor colleague Jan Hackett voted against it, they would only need support from deputy mayor Basil Cameron or one Greens councillor to prevent the rise.

One Greens councillor, Michael Lyon, told *The Echo* that he believes the vote on Thursday is 'not a done deal for me.'

'I want to see how we can spread the burden around,' he said. 'A public registry of roads in the Shire would be a good start. If that information were shared online, roads and costings could be evaluated on a case-by-case basis?

Cr Spooner said that after considering the more than 2,500 responses made by residents through submissions, surveys and council information stands, 'there is no mandate for a rate rise over the next four years'.

The Shire's GM Ken Gainger has proposed a Special Rate Variation (SRV) of between 33.5 per cent and 60.5 per cent over the coming four years.

But Cr Spooner told The Echo that 'this is one of the most extensive consultations we've undertaken' and 'the Byron Shire community has clearly said no' to the rate rises.

'You cannot say on any level that this has been endorsed,' he added.

Amalgamation threat

Mr Gainger previously told The Echo that Byron Council could be in danger of amalgamation if the SRV were not adopted. But Cr Spooner said that since the NSW Orange byelection and the ascension of Premier Berjiklian, that threat had abated.

'Given the shifts in politics in NSW, any fears of forced amalgamation are unfounded,' he said.

'Byron was declared fit for the future. We do need to ensure we are financially viable, but I'm suggesting we take a bit more time before we impose one of the most regressive financial measures that has ever been proposed in this Shire on our residents?

He added that no group had stood for Council on a platform of continued on page 2 >

Rape or beatings will be experienced by one in three girls and women in their lives.

Focusing world attention on the need to stop violence against women, One Billion Rising began on February 14, 2013. Known as V-Day, it takes place in more than 200 countries including Bangladesh, Bosnia, Pakistan, the Philippines, Nigeria and Kenya as well as Byron Bay. It brings women, men and children together to dance in defiance of violence.

People are invited to gather together, wear red clothes and join in the dance on Main Beach in Byron Bay for the fifth year running, this February 14 from 7am.

Fifth year running

Local organiser Stroma Lawson says, 'It is a special dance to a piece of music written especially for the event, called Break the Chain?

She says, 'It has very moving words about domestic violence and there is a routine choreographed to go along with the song that you can learn online?

The importance of V-Day is currently being highlighted in Russia where they are in the process of decriminalising domestic violence.

According to a recent report by Human Rights Watch, Russia's lower chamber passed a bill on January 27 that will 'decriminalise a first offence of family violence that does not cause serious harm requiring hospital treatment.'

Following the V-Day dance there will be two entertaining evenings of Vagina Conversations on February 14 and 15 at the Byron Community from 7.30pm.

The fundraisers will include stories both funny and sad about vaginas and orgasms by a fantastic range of the Shire's women.

The Echo apologises to readers who have been caught up in this scam, and we thank those people who first

brought their concerns about the ad to our attention after publication. Unfortunately, this scam had not received the publicity it deserved in the two months that it has apparently been operating.

The Echo has reported it to the ACCC's ScamWatch and the Victorian Police are investigating.

Holiday letting precincts wanted – VOHL

A residents' group affected by holiday letting have rebuffed comments by Greens mayor Simon Richardson over their view as to how best to handle the issue.

In last week's Echo article, Mayoral thoughts on holiday letting, mayor Richardson said, 'The precinct model was the fairest model I thought but there was no appetite by the holiday-let organisation, the victims of holiday let or by the state government.

But Victims Of Holiday Letting (VOHL) said that is 'not quite correct.'

VOHL co-ordinator Doug Luke says his group were 'hungry for precincts or zones.

Council meets Thursday

'Our original preferred position was and remains for Byron Shire Council to take illegal holiday lets to court including The Land and Environment Court, (LEC).

'VOHL would still prefer this as it demonstrates Council's legal responsibility and duty of care towards residents. Our numerous submissions and letters have supported this?

'A majority of councillors on the previous Council voted not to take legal action.

'There have been a number of LEC judgments, including the landmark Dobrohotoff v Bennic (Terrigal case) in May 2013, that have shown holiday letting is illegal in residential zones. NSW LEC case law is clear and consistent: mixing short-term letting with permanent residential occupants is "fundamentally incompatible."

Unsupportive govt

Luke says, 'When legal action did not eventuate, VOHL then examined the concept of precincts or zones for holiday letting.

'This had also been put forward by Council under [former Greens mayor] Jan Barham.

'Unfortunately, the NSW DPE would not accept this and suggested the "open model" plan where holiday

letting is allowed in any zone where a residence is legal.

'VOHL has consistently supported Byron Shire Council in developing a policy of registration and regulation that puts the onus on owners/ managers to avoid and/or resolve problems with holiday lets that continue to adversely affect neighbouring residents. VOHL would welcome support from state government following the latest reshuffle.

'VOHL is grateful that the mayor and his "new" Council are prepared to act in the best interests of residents and offer them some overdue protection from rampant short-term letting, including AirBnB?

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Investigation called for after patient waits 13 hours at Byron Hospital ED

Newly minted health minister Brad Hazzard already has a job on his hands after shadow north coast minister Walt Secord wrote to him yesterday demanding an investigation into staffing levels at the new Byron Central Hospital.

It comes after a patient with bowel obstruction had to wait 13 hours in the emergency department.

Ocean Shores resident Sue Harrison was rushed by ambulance to the hospital at around 10pm on the night of January 22, but when she arrived at the ED, only one doctor and two nurses were on duty.

Ms Harrison told *The Echo* that an hour after she arrived, while she was still waiting to be seen, a patient arrived in cardiac arrest, which required the full resources of all three staff to deal with.

And after the 13-hour wait Ms Harrison was still forced to rely on her private health insurance in order to receive proper treatment.

She said the ordeal began when she had to call 000 after could not walk.

'The ambos were incredible, fast, helped my pain and got me to Byron Hospital emergency quickly and safely, she told The Echo.

Lack of staff

A lack of staff appeared to be the main issue for Ms Harrison, who said, 'The poor nurses were so busy they never stopped and one nurse had to work three hours after her shift ended. To have a doctor having to be on the phone arranging transport is a total waste of personnel. It is actually dangerous that a doctor is unable to respond to emergencies and instead waste his time on ward secretary work.

Ms Harrison described the situation as 'unacceptable for a brand new hospital, or any hospital in Australia?

'First of all we should have surgical rooms, but maybe more importantly they need more staff.

'When I told one of the nurses I was going to write a letter she said "please do! We

being in such pain that she are a first-world country and north coast,' he said. this should not happen."

Secord's letter to minister Hazard says in part, 'It is ludicrous that we have a brand new hospital without appropriate staffing?

Two attentive Brunswick Surf Life Saving Club (SLSC) patrol members saved two lives last Sunday after a couple got caught in a flash rip at Brunswick Beach, 100 metres north of the flags.

The club's Guy Knox told The Echo the incident occurred shortly after high tide in moderate surf conditions.

'Within a minute, they were dragged 50 metres into the surf zone. Two attentive patrol members - Bryce Holmes and Sam Atkins - ran to their surf rescue boards and raced to assist.

Boat motor stalled

'As Bryce and Sam arrived at the scene, a Brunswick SLSC inflatable rescue boat, skippered by patrol captain

'With waves breaking over the rescue boat, stalling the motor, Brianna pulled the woman from the surf.

'Craig got the motor started before the next set of waves and brought the woman safety to the shore. Her partner was accompanied to the shallows by Bryce and Sam.

'The quick thinking by those patrol members involved helped avert a possible tragedy,' he said.

Use of legislation against holiday letting too punitive say councillors, staff

A plan by former mayoral candidate Matthew Hartley to shut down holiday letting has been rejected by both a Labor and a Green councillor.

Sections 119B and 119C of the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979* appear to provide the power to appoint and empower a special investigative and prosecutorial team to pursue holiday letting.

Hartley says that with an estimated 1,500 homes zoned 'residential' now let full time as tourist accommodation, action via legislation should be pursued immediately.

But councillor Paul Spooner (Country Labor) told *The Echo* that 'setting vigilante groups onto holiday-letting operators is not the way to go.'

'We know it's affecting communities around the world, and I can't see why we are not having more of a conversation with the state government around this.

'While we are vocal about this locally, we really haven't taken our voice to Sydney.

'We know homes are being bought in the Shire for the purpose of just being an Airbnb property. It's a business, and as a shire that experiences this issue acutely, we need to be a key voice in NSW parliament.'

Cr Spooner says there is a strong case for the state government to implement Airbnb's tax-collection scheme, which is enacted in the US, France, Netherlands, Portugal and India.

Greens councillor Michael Lyon told *The Echo* he believes a registration fee for holiday lets 'is doable'. 'We are still looking at annual

fees for registration and how to build a solid case of how holiday letters will pay. I invite Matt [Hartley] to work with us on how to make compliance work without those extreme measures.'

Hartley maintains that the activity is still illegal, despite any tax that is imposed.

■ The full reply to *The Echo* by Council's legal services co-ordinator Ralph James on the matter is at the end of Hartley's letter on page 14. James says such action, 'could result in Council being locked into constant and expensive litigation.'



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Banks asked to please explain

Australia's four big banks will again face parliamentary scrutiny, with public hearings planned from March 3 till 8 in Canberra.

According to the Standing Committee on Economics, their focus will be asking ANZ, Westpac, Commonwealth and NAB about developments in the market

and prudential regulation, as well as how consumer protections have been enhanced after government reforms and actions by regulators. The hearings have been criticised by Labor as having no consequence and instead Labor are calling for a royal commission. ■ For more info visit www.

An agreement aimed at resolving long-standing border anomalies that affect businesses and residents living in northern NSW has been signed by both the NSW and QLD governments.

NSW deputy premier John Barilaro (Nationals) welcomed the announcement of the NSW-QLD 'Statement of Principles and Priorities for Regional Collaboration 2016-19', hailing it as a landmark agreement between the two states.

Under the agreement, governments will be required to address issues on a projectby-project basis in four key areas: regional economic development, alignment of services and sharing of information, local transport and issues of national significance. Barilaro says it will pro-

vide for better recognition of teacher registration and accreditation, joint planning and response to emergencies, and the integration of crossborder bus services and pointto-point transport.

'This is fantastic news for people living and working on both sides of the border

and will greatly assist in the resolution of long-standing border anomalies,' he said.

'Major border infrastructure projects and the harmonisation of heavy-vehicle regulations will also be actively progressed.'

DV info shared

'A very important component of the agreement is the opportunity to better share information with interstate government agencies to ensure the protection of children and victims of domestic violence.

'My government colleagues in Tweed, Lismore, Northern Tablelands and Barwon have long championed the cause of crossborder communities, highlighting the difficulties and challenges of living and working near a border?

Tweed MP Geoff Provest (Nationals) said, 'This agreement represents a positive outcome for the Tweed and is a great step forward for communities on both sides of the border.' Lismore MP Thomas George (Nationals) said it was also great news for his electorate.

frequency of usage would equate to 60 return trips per day or 120 passes of each and every property between the hours of 7.30 am & 10.30 pm!

Since train services ceased in 2004, Byron Shire Council has approved the development of many properties along this rail corridor. Developers and property owners were never warned about the possibility of the trains even returning, let alone at such frequency and impedance to their amenity of life. Having endorsed this intensification of property and development along the line, Council is now ignoring the plight of this community.

While our concerned residents and businesses were aware of the train line and that it had in the past been used a maximum two to three times (ie 4-6 passes of properties) a day, no one, in their worst nightmare would have envisaged that Council would approve, for the construction of platforms to enable a train service operating at 10 times that number and potentially up to 120 passes a day. Furthermore, owners of properties adjoining the track are concerned that such intensive use could cause irreparable and significant damage to their buildings, as no one was aware of the train and it was not something taken into account in the design and construction phase.

We are concerned about Byron Shire Council's role in the approval of a train service to operate between Sunrise and Byron town and Council's apparent indifference to the effects this might have on the environment and the amenity of people living or staying along the rail corridor.

These approvals were given despite Council never having sighted the commercial license agreement that BBRC has with Transport for NSW. This fact was confirmed at the Council meeting in October last year. The terms and nature of this agreement are still unknown to Council and the public.

During the DA process , BBRC made little attempt to consult with the residents and businesses at the Eastern end of the line. The only direct communication was a letter drop stating the train and its usage as a 'fait accompli'. Although BBRC invited comment and queries it did not initiate any meetings to consult with residents or businesses.

3. Is it fair and reasonable to subject people along the rail corridor to the noise that will emanate from the diesel engine and the screech and clatter of steel wheels on steel rails up to 30 to 120 times a day? Please view the video of the same train travelling at a even slower speed than planned to understand this noise level. Go to; Facebook/byronbaytrain

4. Is it fair and reasonable to subject those people living within earshot of the Kendall St crossing to the loud noise of the train's horn or whistle up to 30 to 120 times a day as it approaches from each direction till 10:30pm every night?

5. Is it fair and reasonable to disrupt the flow of pedestrians and traffic using Kendall Street up to 30 to 120 times a day?

6. Is it even safe for cars and pedestrians for the train to be crossing Kendall Street with such frequency?

7. In light of the above information are you prepared to review the hours of operation and frequency of usage of the train platforms and storage

the Sunrise Progress Association represent many concerned residents and businesses located along the rail corridor that stand to be significantly affected by noise, and pollution and the disruption to their livelihood and enjoyment of life. There are around 1500 beds of both residents and accommodation businesses that will be affected.

approved a development Council application on 17th September 2015 for the construction and use of two train platforms and a train storage shed to be used by the Byron Bay Railroad Company (BBRC), an affiliate of Elements Resort. This was to facilitate the running of a diesel train service between Sunrise and the town centre. Approval was given to allow the platforms to be used from 7.30 am - 10.30 pm seven

The BBRC had stated that it plans to initially run an hourly service, which equates to 15 return trips a day or 30 passes. On the 8th November 2016 our representatives met with Element's Project Manager Jeremy Holmes, the Owner/Director Brian Flannery and their Chief Engineer. At the meeting, Mr Flannery stated that they (BBRC) were able to run the train up to 4 times an hour and would indeed do so if they saw fit. This

We ask the following questions of Council;

1. Did council, when making this decision, opt in favour of visitor accessibility over residential and business amenity? Are those who live and work along the rail corridor to bear a burden for the sake of train users. the great majority of whom are likely to be Elements Resort guests?

A group representing NSW surveyors is urging the new premier Gladys Berejiklian to halt the proposed sale of the Land Titles Registry, which manages the Land and Property Information (LPI).

According to www.lpi.nsw. gov.au the LPI 'maintains the largest centralised land title registry in Australia?

President of the Institution of Surveyors NSW, Michael Green, released a statement on Monday saying that the land registry is a 'vital, sensitive service that must be kept in public hands?

His organisation fears the sell-off is to build two new

Green added that giving up millions of private records to a commercial operator driven by profit - could compromise data and result in diminished services.

An agile PM with his pants down

erhaps emboldened by for Wall Street. the Trumpery of alternative facts Malcolm Turnbull spent most of last week spruiking an alternative Trans Pacific Partnership.

Unwilling to admit the reality - that The Donald had killed off the idea with a stroke of the pen, and in any case its abolition had been bipartisan American policy for many months, our prime minister continued to fantasise that it could still be the cornerstone of the new strategic and economic alliance he craved for Australia.

Bullshit, of course, sheer wishful thinking. But his persistence was baffling to the point of derangement.

First, he tried to pre-empt Trump by pushing for Australia to ratify the deal - if he were serious he could have done so months ago, but in any case there was little point: until both Japan and the USA ratified (and admittedly Shinzo Abe rushed to do so in a similar panic move) the TPP could not go ahead, so why bother?

Then he suggested that perhaps, pressed by more serious Republicans, Trump could perhaps reconsider. This is highly unlikely, but even if it came about, the consequences would not be good for Australia.

The main criticism of the TPP, as far as it could be ascertained through leaks from WikiLeaks (the details were kept secret from all except the major corporations which designed the drafts) was that it gave the USA too much power: in particular it allowed enhanced property rights for Americans (the antithesis of free trade, one might have thought) and it set up a system by which aggrieved private companies could sue sovereign governments if they felt like it. Both big free kicks

Wall Street, complains that the TPP is not favourable enough to America: he wants even more favours and advantages.

At its best, the TPP was never all that promising: the only real selling point was that it might give our farmers (well, some of them) a toehold into the American market. In spite of the ritual palaver about jobs and growth, serious analysts such as the World Bank estimate the overall net worth of the TPP at less than one-quarter of one percentage point -

not per year, but forever.

And Turnbull and Scott Morrison refused to let our own most responsible agency, the Productivity Commission, even consider the deal.

So if the original version would have been something of a fizzer, a revised Trump version of a TPP would be a disaster for Australia, not some kind of redemption.

So Turnbull, absurdly, turned to threats: if Washington would not play ball with Canberra perhaps Beijing would: perhaps China could become the centrepiece of a new TPP. Quite apart from the fact that China would not have the remotest interest in picking up the pieces of a failed American agenda, the whole concept of the TPP was to cement USA supremacy and contain China: part of the increasingly shaky American pivot to Asia.

When no-one took any no-

tice of this nonsense, the latest tactic was to say that, well, perhaps America was out, but we could still save the rest of the TPP. The indefatigably optimistic trade minister, Steve Ciobo, spoke of a 'twelve minus one' TPP.

Not even the government's staunchest conservative allies bought this idea: in The Australian both Greg Sheridan and Judith Sloan, to name but two, derided it as farcical. And in case there was any lingering doubt, Japan (yes, the Japan which had ratified the original TPP) and Canada both declared that



a TPP without America was a meaningless idea. So, with three of the big boys out, the concept of a 'twelve minus three,' with probably more dominoes to fall, is not worth pursuing by anyone serious – which leaves Turnbull and Ciobo, still clinging, not even to a straw, but to the open

waters of internationalism. It has been a major setback, so Turnbull, never one to admit the obvious, instead rounded on Bill Shorten and the Labor opposition, branding them as protectionists and men of the last century simply because they had faced the fact that the TPP was dead, defunct, fallen off the twig: an ex-TPP. All of which suggests that despite all the clear signals from Washington that the grand alliance was never going to happen, the government has no plan B: only denial, obfuscation, bluff and bluster.

It is not an auspicious prel-

ude to Turnbull's big Wednesday address, in which he will orate to the National Press Club (and anyone else who will listen) about his ideas for the year, the parliament, ahead.

Apart from no TPP, no national economic plan promising corporate tax cuts for all, and never, ever negative gearing to help ameliorate the housing crisis, not much has been foreshadowed, apart from the endless threats to our security and still more reasons to impose draconian measures to restrict our liberties in order to protect us from all being murdered in the streets. Not such exciting times for 2017.

The overall picture is that of a government caught well and truly with its pants down, although it was repeatedly warned that both its belt and braces were in urgent need of repair. The expectation - at least the hope – was that Trump would lose, and if by some chance he won, he could be persuaded to act like a moderate - that his radical rhetoric would be constrained by wiser heads.

But it has not been so, and it is time to accept that perhaps he actually meant what he said, however rash and reckless it may be.

So when Trump moves to inaugurate trade wars, and, more alarmingly, his incoming state secretary, tyrannosaurus Rex Tillerson, threatens a blockade of the artificial Chinese islands in the South China Sea, perhaps it is time to start taking Trumpery seriously.

Alternative facts may be comforting, but they will neither pay the rent nor safeguard our interests.

We wait with considerable trepidation as our agile prime minister prepares to mount the rostrum on Wednesday.

Will we welcome our marine climate refugees?

Making sense of small talk is a never-ending task for this particular biologist. I deeply, truly want to hear what people think about the weather, water, fish and all that. Over the years, I've been splicing together these sound bites into a detailed collage.

'I have this idea what the Great Barrier Reef is going to do with all this global warming,' my Byron friend spoke up excitedly. 'It's going to move south. All that coral and all those creatures. They will end up right here in Byron Bay.'

'Exactly,' I said. 'Climate refugees! And how shall we welcome them here?'

In the next second, I am remembering an earlier conversation I had with another friend who works with Queensland agencies in the Great Barrier Reef.

'We now have a few million dollars to spend,' he said. 'I am putting it all into buying up coastal wetlands and rehabilitating whatever we can. Habitat. It's all about saving habitat.'

In the third second I remember something I read

in the journal *Nature*. (Although not a face-to-face conversation, let's count reading as a virtual conversation.) Maps of sea-temperature changes show various 'climate traps'.

Marine animals migrate from warming waters only to find their favoured temperature zones disappearing altogether. Or they find other conditions in these new places are poor, without the food or habitat they need. The water quality is marginal or detrimental.

So I finally say to my Byron friend, 'If we have marine climate refugees, is our coastal water clean enough? Do we have functional wetlands where the juvenile fish can move in and grow up? Where are our oyster and pipi beds? Do we have seagrass in the Belongil for dugong?

'The Belongil is in such bad shape.

'We have no treatment for stormwater pollution. Every rain we have, the water washes all the vehicle pollution from roads and pavements into a network of closed pipes and open drains. Some pour into the Belongil. Others go straight out to sea.' 'From out at the lighthouse, I've seen that line in the sea, the colour change after rain, the run-off.'

He shakes his head. This conversation moves on.

Later, I overhear some people chatting about the new water re-use pipes in the public toilets at Byron Bay.

'Did you know the effluent from the West Byron Sewage Treatment Plant goes into the Belongil through open drains from Ewingsdale through West Byron?'

'No! But with more tourism and development, isn't there even more effluent? Are they hooking up more toilets with recycled water?'

Another time, I am at a picnic by the Rocky Creek Dam. We small talk, considering the water in the dam, which is the source of the water in the taps of Byron Shire. The question is raised: what does water conservation mean in the tourist towns that draw on the water of this dam?

Another day. Over coffee, another friend asks me. 'How do I learn about water and the environment? I want to, but how? I want to get out more in nature.'

I think about the last few months. I spent many long hours indoors collating the results of 17 surveys done by volunteers. They spent hours outdoors traipsing the waterways of Byron, which have decades upon centuries out to millennia of experiences to share. Many may be in poor shape now but they have potential.

I hear again the angry residents about 'tourists destroying the place'. I remember a child by the water. The parent near the bridge calling out, 'I didn't think we'd see any fish in here but look!' Projects throughout urban Australia aim to create 'water sensitive cities'. Plants and microbes in waterways and ponds cleansing stormwater. Trees for wildlife, to cool urban air. Recycled water piped everywhere. Outreach to business, tourists and residents about water conservation. Neighbourhood programs to monitor, enhance and protect waterways with education and action.

I wonder about watersensitive coastal living. Some observers doubt that Australians can manage themselves differently in existing commons. Is every aspect of life fated to be enclosed, monetised and propertied forevermore?

I look at my friend. 'Rain's expected. It's so hot, getting wet will be fine. Let's go watch the flow in that waterway.'

► continued from page 12 bureaucracy and a mayor more interested in his tourism development concepts for the rail corridor than getting involved with the local grassroots to secure a bestpractice infrastructure outcome for his community.

Please explain with real facts, not fake facts, why our green council sees fit to destroy a wide stretch of redflagged critical habitat in the Cumbebin wetland at an unquantified and significant perpetual cost to the community; why no cost benefit, in fact no detailed costs whatsoever have been provided to the community for the proposal; why we undertake studies and legislation for the preservation of our community-built heritage environment when our very own council can ignore impacts and ram a main road right through an established residential conservation area. If Byron Shire Council were pragmatic in the face of the obvious blowout in costs for their bypass proposal you would be sensible in thinking they might now seek an out-of-court settlement of the hugely expensive appeal, call in all parties and address

co-ordinator, Ralph James, told *The Echo* on November 22 last year that such an enforcement approach on holiday letting 'could result in Council being locked into constant and expensive litigation.

'The risks and results of such litigation would be counterproductive to achieving a long-term strategic planning and compliance solution.

'Allowing planning instruments for Short Term Rental Accommodation (STRA) is likely to enable neighbours and the community to decide where and how STRA premises can be located and conducted,' he said.

However, Mr James reaffirmed that instances of safety and environmental harm would have priority, be investigated and where substantiated, enforcement action taken.

■ I found myself shaking my head in disbelief at our mayor's 'Thoughts on holiday letting' in last week's Echo. He says there is 'no legislation to stop it'. This statement needs a bit of further explaining from our mayor.

The Land Use Tables in Byron Shire LEP 2014 set out ob-

jectives and permitted uses for each land zoning. The tables also list prohibited uses.

For example in an R2 -Low Density Residential Zone 'commercial premises' are prohibited. Clause 1.2 in the LEP sets out the aims of the plan including: 'to minimise conflict between land uses within a zone and ensure minimal impact of development on the amenity of adjoining and nearby land uses'.

My understanding is that the LEP is a statutory document (ie a state law) that is effectively policed under the EPA Act, which sets out the procedure for orders and penalties for failure to comply.

If a permanently shortterm-rented property is not a 'commercial premises' then why this is so needs to be explained by the council to the neighbouring residents who experience the conflict described above. If holiday letting is a 'commercial premises', then there is legislation to stop it.

The mayor appears to be saying that the planning system applies to every other form of development and use, but not to this one.

Is Byron really an ecological community?

Dr Greg Wilding

For me, the short answer is 'yes', it is. But how is Byron becoming an ecological community of belonging?

Here is a summary of the distinct approaches and contributions being undertaken in the Shire to answer the present challenges to our ecology.

Back in 2015, Byron Shire Council set the agenda for the Shire's becoming carbon neutral by 2025. Five working groups were formed to tackle the problem under the categories of energy, land, transport, housing, and waste.

Since then a lot of positive progress has been made. Through the continuing research of Zero Emissions Byron, ecological answers to lowering CO₂ emissions in the Shire are beginning to emerge.

Energy retailer

Last year, the birth of Enova, our community-owned green energy retailer, was an important ecological development. With their basic drive towards keeping ecological profits and jobs in our area, support an ethic of community inclusion in the benefits, and continuously trying to build a stronger network of local energy generation, they marked out what community energy is all about.

COREM, Community Owned Renewable Energy Mullumbimby, is another inspirational group simply because their particular form of dedicated passion, focused on community belonging in terms of renewable energy

proliferation and ownership, cannot be anything but right. From establishing solar systems on community buildings (Drill Hall), to organising festivals (RenewFest), to shoring up community awareness and participation 'in action,' they cannot be ignored.

Byron Eco Park is another significant approach to local community and ecological belonging in the Shire. Byron Eco Park is a large coastal farm that functions as an ecological hosting property. Hosting, and hence demonstrating, ecologically sustainable businesses, technological projects, and ecological offset conservation, has been the brainchild of Dieter Horstmann and his foundation (the DH Foundation).

Basically the idea is that if a renewable environmental project can present a feasible business case that either figures into a community's renewable needs (a DA-proposed 5MW community solar park, for instance), or can produce an arrangements that supports ecologically protective outcomes (creating conservation agree-

ments) it can be hosted at Byron Eco Park.

Various areas of the property, 'eco-zones', are dedicated to various workable eco-business operations. Some zones are dedicated to operational ecological businesses such as the medicinal-honey factory, the organic-muesli factory, and bio-char distribution.

Other zones are in other phases of development, such as the ECO village hill development, and the 'green concrete' project (in development with Southern Cross University).

Eco approaches

Horstmann's conception of Byron Eco Park utilises the property to host and push forward various ways of demonstrating differing ecological approaches to land use, to housing, to energy production, and to transport. For him, ecology equals determining the best possible culture of relations between humans and nature.

Several of the eco businesses mentioned are housed in an award-winning solar-powered building known as Hangar No

5. This building also runs an EV charging station, which powers the farm's EV.

In the 2016 international WAVE rally (the world's biggest EV rally), Byron Eco Park represented our community's drive towards the future of EVs and a solar transporting world. Thousands of support cards, collected from children all over the globe – a card collection journey that started right here in Byron Bay – ended at the United Nations headquarters in Geneva, where all the cards were displayed.

I want to also recognise that there are so many other talented and dedicated individuals and businesses that are right now out there in our community that continue to offer their ecological awareness, which is the very thing that defines our ecological belonging.

Firstly, Abel Tasman, who was a Dutch explorer, discovered the west coast of the Southern Land (Terra Australis) in 1644. He named it New Holland. Secondly, in 1688 William Dampier, a British explorer, who cir-



cumnavigated the globe three times, hit the northwest coast of New Holland.

Both seamen sailed on, not thinking the desolate expanses of what is now Western Australia worth settling. So we could have been either a British or a Dutch colony way back then. Imagine if ei-

ther of them had landed on the verdant east coast.

Thirdly, Captain James Cook landed on the east coast in 1770. He hoisted the Union Jack somewhere, called his discovery New South Wales (or New Wales), then claimed it for king and country. He charted and mapped the entire coast before sailing off to England.

Fourthly, Captain Arthur Phillip landed in Botany Bay in New South Wales on January 18, 1788, with 11 ships full of soldiers and convicts. He hoisted the Union Jack and claimed the land for Britain. Finding the harbour unsuit-

able, and after dealing with the French explorer, La Perouse, he sailed up the coast eight days later, and landed at Sydney Cove, Port Jackson, on January 26, 1788, where he disgorged his cargo and set up a penal colony under the Union Jack of Great Britain.

Also, Captain Matthew Flinders of the Royal Navy charted the entire coast of the the South Land and declared it to be a continent. In 1804 he proposed the name Terra Australis (Southern Land) be replaced by the name Australia, thereby doing away with New Holland, that became Western Australia, but not New South Wales. And so Australia came into being and the beginning of the independent states arrived.

However, we did not become a nation of states and territories until January 1, 1901, Federation Day. Until that day we were not a nation but a British colony. (Some people may argue that we still are until we become a Republic.)

So Australia Day, January 26, is a misnomer. It is only the day a fleet of ships full of soldiers and convicts arrived to displace the Indigenous population and set up a colony run by the British.

With regard to the flag .: Obviously the flag raised until after Federation was the Union Jack. The flag of Great Britain. The flag everyone is waving about, wearing on their feet and wrapping them selves in today was first flown on September 3, 1901, which was declared Australian National Flag Day. A good day to celebrate?

It wasn't until 1935 that all states and territories marked January 26 as Australia Day, but we didn't celebrate it as a holiday until 1994, thanks to Paul Keating.

Not that long ago, and not so long that we can't change the 'celebration' to a more suitable date, or change the name.

Rail and the tiny train provide solutions, not problems

■ Councils in the northern rivers find it increasingly difficult to pay for road maintenance because everything is carried by road. All passengers and freight in trucks and buses tear up the roads but don't pay for the damage they cause. Under-recovery of these costs has been estimated at between \$7,000 and \$10,500 per truck each year. Ratepayers are therefore paying the repair bills of trucking companies.

Statistics show that road accidents are on the rise and have cost approximately \$500 million over the last five years. When the government does cost comparisons between road and rail services they don't include costs incurred by taxpayers of road accidents, road maintenance, traffic congestion, air pollution and carbon emissions. NSW governments appear to be biased against railways, possibly because of electoral

donations from big companies who make money out of roads.

Rail is 200 times safer than road, especially given the terrible state of local roads. When will one of the major parties support what's best for the community rather than money for their campaigns?

The prospect of rail services in this area is so popular it would do more for the electoral prospects of either party than money anyway. Our communities want better, safer roads.

■ While many Byron Shire residents are concerned about the injustice of 14,000 ratepayers trying to fund the provision and maintenance of infrastructure and services for almost two million visitors per year; mega developments and festivals in environmentally sensitive areas imposed on us by the state government, the destruction of our national parks, reserves and wildlife by hundreds of people camping and partying illegally, as well as the accompanying traffic gridlock, a couple of Sunrise Beach residents are obsessed about the tiny Byron train.

The increasingly shrill rhetoric and misinformation from these people has to be seen to be believed.

Anyone who has used public transport in the city knows you're very lucky to get one train every hour, especially in off-peak times, let alone four per hour!

As for toxic fumes, the Byron train, with or without solar panels, will not generate

anywhere near the amount of toxic fumes as people who travel regularly between Byron and Sydney either by road or air, let alone the amount generated by two million visitors trapped in gridlock daily on Ewingsdale Road.

But the train will take cars off the road; even if it's only a small number, it will reduce toxic fumes, not increase them.

It's becoming clear that these people do not want trains of any sort, solar or otherwise, on the train line they've plonked themselves next to, no matter how much the rest of the community wants and needs decent public transport.

The GoodLife Pure Safya

The Safya family may be relative newcomers to Byron Bay but they have embraced the vibe of how to best do business here – combine good knowhow with an ability to go with the flow, trust your feelings, have a laugh, and make strong connections with those around you.

After spending two years looking for a venue for an Egyptian-influenced eatery, they were very close to signing a lease but it didn't feel quite right. 'I felt uneasy, so I went for a walk,' says co-owner Fady Soliman. 'The For Lease sign here was just being put up, so I rang the number and the landlord met me within minutes.'

The result of that walk was that Safya opened just before Christmas on the corner of Fletcher Street and Bay Lane. Safya is a cafe with an Egyptian influence and a focus on locally sourced and seasonal dishes. 'It suits all tastes,' says Fady. 'Some dishes are exactly what you would expect from a regular cafe; others have a strong Egyptian influence.'

Fady is one-quarter of the Safya family. He and his brother, Andrew, up in Cairo and their cousin,

Ramy Meshreky, in Alexandria. Fady's wife, Caroline, is 'Aussie through and through' (according to Fady) and it is she who masterminds the blend of cuisines in the Safya menu.

For those not wanting even a hint of Egyptian flavour, the all-day breakfast menu features straight eggs, granola and dishes such as the Goodness Brekkie (eggs on quinoa with greens and Coopers Shoot tomatoes). That hint can be gained in dishes such as the Dukka Dukka, with eggs on avo and feta finished with a homemade Egyptian dukka. For the full Egyptian experience, you can try Cairo Eggs: fried in cumin-infused butter and served with falafel, labne and fresh mint on pita bread.

Similarly, for lunch (again, available all day), options include a steak sandwich, a falafel wrap or a Siwa Salad – a traditional mix of watermelon, pickled red onion, feta, rosewater and toasted pistachio and sesame.

The Siwa Salad takes its name from the part of Egypt that has influenced the design of Safya. The oasis of Siwa is in Egypt's Western Desert, just 50km from the Libyan border and situated below sea level. One feature of Siwa are the crumbling ruins of the old town, called Shali, which was constructed of a mix of mud and salt.

Safya has used more modern building materials to create a welcoming space that opens to outside seating. Lights will bring to life the space during evenings, which are planned for the near future and which will see further traditional Egyptian dishes, such as fuul and koshari, served.

Coffee is something that Safya take seriously, with cold drip and chemex brews on offer in addition to usual espressobased drinks. A range of teas, including a fresh chai, are also on offer. Cold drinks include kombucha, made by Caroline, and two Egyptian drinks that are both magically refreshing on hot Byron days – Kark A Deh (a mix of hibiscus tea and rosewater) and Tamr Hendi (a brew of tamarind and rosewater). Safya means 'pure' and is a word with strong meaning for the family. 'The feeling I get here is the one we've been seeking,' says Fady. from all over the world and African cuisine will be served.

'It's all been channeled,' she said of this very ambitious project. 'It's amazing; it's all just happened. We are all very aware of the chronic situation with the split. You have to realise the connection of the earth and honour that and stay connected to that. It's a global issue. The Indigenes have it right. My job is to put the Indigenous at the forefront everywhere that I do anything because they have the knowing. They have the knowledge and they have the connection.'

One of her connections has been with Jingki, aka Kerrianne Cox, an impressive singer/songwriter who shares Bele-Verdy's passion for connection.

Jingki has been in the studio busily finishing off her latest album *Womyn of the Sun* that she recorded live at the Nimbin Bush Theatre a few years back. She plans to have the album ready for the Blue Flame. The recording was an immensely positive project and Jingki reflects: 'It was really good and the Bush Theatre was great about it. Rather than having to pay for studio time we walked away with a little bit of cash! Wow what a deadly project not having to spend a lot!'

She was also empowered by the process of recording live and being at the helm of all the decision making.

'I worked with women musicians who were open, and I got to be the maestro. That took a couple of months in the building and working... and to be ready for the performance. I have done three studio albums in my lifetime and one of my dreams was to do a live recording because everyone says you are better live. I wanted to capture that live energy, and it came about. I have played with a lot of men who dominated the industry and because I was in a position of power and I gave that strength to the other women.

'The CD can only hold 70 minutes of music, so that is bringing me into the USB world. We have done a small film clip with one of my language songs, a song about coming together and rising up and growing up, that was given to me by a beautiful sistergirl down the road. This will be more intimate with a live recording and a live video to go with it.'

Jingki takes the ethos of the three-day event throughout the story of her music.

'I am a global citizen and we are connecting with all of life. I am not interested in the old story any more. It's not sustainable. That was the journey that we needed to complete. We know what it is like to be separated. It's not until you reach that threshold point that you know. I want to be part of the oneness. I want that to be the gift of my inheritance. It is going back to the old story of tribalism, the one where we were all part of one tribe and that we are connected.'

Speaking to the deeper values of the weekend's gathering, Jingki says:

'We are working on many levels. This is a place from the old story; it's a gathering place and I come from a place of gathering as well. It's like the cleansing now of the old paradigm, and people being able to come and share their knowledge and their wisdom and apply those tools, and here we lay it on the table, to come and make strong choices, so we are better informed and we can make good choices.'

Jingki reflects on her own process, something she calls a softening.

'A big part is honouring of the divine feminine and the grounding of that. I was hardcore, and I have softened a lot; I realised that I don't need to be like that any more. Part of reaching that point allows you to accept the status quo, and to understand – to shape and rearrange consciousness within this new dreaming of who I am now and how we are and how we shape.

'It's what old people say: this has been foreseen.'

League describes Snarky Puppy as 'a pop band that improvises a lot, without vocals'. Snarky Puppy's bandleader Michael League takes five minutes to share with us some of the artists and songs that have shaped his life.

What is the one song that reminds you of growing up and why?

Rocky Racoon by The Beatles. It was one of the first songs I learned to play on the guitar. It was also the song my best friend and I used to sing at every high-school party.

What is the song that gets you up on the dancefloor every time?

No Diggity by Blackstreet. My guilty pleasure.

What is the song that's always busted out when no-one is around; why?

There aren't a lot of songs I'm ashamed to listen to, but maybe *Toxic* by Britney Spears. I love that song.

What is the song on high rotation in your car at the moment?

I don't have a car, but the song I'm listening to the most right now at home is a song called *Dying Star* from Maz's *Idealist* record. He's actually a member of Snarky Puppy, but he has a vocal project as well and a beautiful record out 14 October.

What was your wedding song (or what would it be)?

I definitely haven't thought about a wedding song, or a wedding for that matter, but *Maybe I'm Amazed. Maybe I'm Amazed* is an amazing song, by Paul McCartney of course.

Your favourite song to cover at the moment?

We don't really do cover songs, but we did just play *Phenomenal Women* with Laura Mvula in Italy and it was so much fun.

If you could sing a duet with anyone dead or alive who would it be and what would be the song?

If I could sing a duet with anyone it has to be Tom Petty, and I would want to sing *It's Good To Be King*.

Your all-time blues hero is... and why?

My all-time blues hero would have to be Albert King. He was the first blues guy I ever heard, and I learned so many of his solos when I was just learning to play the guitar in high school. It was an education in expression and communication with so little. No frills, just straight soul. Amazing; definitely my favourite.

At just eight years of age, Garrett Dutton, aka G Love, picked up a guitar. He wrote his first song in the ninth grade and began playing harmonica on a wire rack.

Last out here just a few years back with the Blues Festival with G Love and The Special Sauce, he makes his welcome return to play solo acoustic for the **Byron Bay Surf Festival** this month. It's a mode that takes Dutton back to the roots of where it all began... with him, and with the music itself.

'It's pretty cool when I do my acoustic,' says Garrett. 'It's ruder than the Delta blues, and with a trio, with The Special Sauce, we have a lot of freedom and a huge repertoire, but the solo there gives even more freedom. I can do a u-turn whenever I want. I generally start out in the Delta blues and folk blues realm, both covers of older people like Robert Johnson and Bukka White, and then make my way to my original streetside blues and then I take it more into a hip-hop realm...' Not just a solo set, but something of a music lesson in the evolution of modern blues and hip-hop.

'It really is,' says Garrett.' That is the goal of my acoustic set, to start with the rootsy vibe

and take it into a party mode. The blues is serious and folk is serious and hip-hop is serious too, but it really is all a big party! When you play music I think in the end music is meant to make people dance.'

While G Love performs more than 100 shows with his band, he only gets to play around 30 solo shows a year, so that makes them all the more special.

The birth of his new baby has only served to remind G Love of the power of music.

'We have a 10-month-old baby and it's funny to see his natural reaction to music; when you put music on, he doesn't have a taste – you put a song with a beat on and he becomes a different person. I remember when my grandfather was on his last legs and he was in a nursing home and my father and I went to visit; he was non-reactive, man, he was done. There were songs he liked: he loved a Leadbelly song, Goodnight Irene. I played it; he had had a stroke and he was non-communicative but, when the music was playing, he went from staring at the floor to singing in a pure loud clear voice. Once the song was over he shut down again. Music has a hold over people."

A regular collaborator with musicians such as Dave Matthews, Donavon Frankenreiter and Jack Johnson, Garrett reflects on a culture that encouraged 'musical conversation' of sorts. 'Honestly, it's such a natural

thing,' he said.' I would go to these parties and there would be a jam session room and I would end up there. I never really like standing around talking at the bar; I always wanted to play and that's what I always did and what I always still do. It's not that I don't enjoy great conversation; I just like a musical conversation, and there is a lot of merit in that sort of communication. I strive to have that with everyone. I say, hey, let's jam. Whether they are famous or can't play at all, it's my unofficial mantra and it has led me to play with some of the greatest musicians in the world. It's something that G Love says

the harmonica I can blaze with anybody, with the best of them, so over the years after you've done it you do have a little more confidence, but you don't need the confidence – you need the desire to play – and even if you are nervous about going in front of someone, just concentrate on the moment and the music, and the rest will follow.'

For a boy from New Jersey, Garrett admits that while he's a gun on the stage he's also not bad in the surf.

'I have gotten to run shoulders with the best surfers in the world. I feel that there is something about a beach lifestyle that goes with music. It's about having an acoustic guitar by the van or bonfire or on the front porch while waiting for the surf to come up. It goes well with travelling. It's about the road trip. ENTERTAINMENT cinema Reviews

LIVE BY NIGHT SPLI

Let's be clear about it - the idea of 'post truth' and 'alternative facts' is only playing catch-up with Hollywood. Clyde Barrow was a murderous thug, not the handsome larrikin portrayed by Warren Beatty, while Burt Lancaster's kind if misunderstood Birdman of Alcatraz was a brutal and callous killer. But American cinema's love of violence and its juvenile championing of the wronged outsider continue unabated and are rewarded with bursting box-office profits. Ben Affleck has directed and stars in a movie about a gangster who is really just a nice guy with a penchant for shooting people – and the body count is astronomical.

Set in the prohibition era, his character, Joe Coughlin, is a petty crim in Boston who makes it big as a bootlegger, crowning his achievements by undertaking the construction of a grotesque casino, à la James Packer. His bloodstrewn career is justified by a throwaway line at the beginning in which Joe, whose narration is heard throughout, explains that a lot of good men got killed in WWI because they were following orders, so henceforth he would not follow orders. Unfortunately for Joe, he bites off more than he can chew when he bonks the blonde who belongs to the king-pin of Boston's Irish crew (a barely credible scenario, but it's Affleck's screenplay, so he can do what he likes). Forced into an alliance with the Mob, he is sent south to Florida with his loyal sidekick Dion (Chris Messina), to safeguard his boss's supply of rum and, needless to say, trouble accompanies him at every turn.

It is a rambling, messy story that is most interesting when dealing with Joe's confrontation with the Ku Klux Klan (a perfectly hideous performance from Matthew Maher) and the unforeseen problem of the pretty preacher (Elle Fanning) who turns the town against gambling. As a graduate of the Mount Rushmore School of Acting, Affleck grinds you to a pulp by the time the big shoot-out erupts and, in truth, it's Dion's vintage black-and-yellow convertible that steals the show - it's gorgeous.



Most of us had stamped 'peaked

early' on the file of M Night Shyamalan. Nothing he has done since The Sixth Sense (1999) has been anywhere near as good as that psycho-meltdown, but his latest, though still not in the same class, has gone some considerable way towards turning around the slide. Room and 10 Cloverfield Lane have recently brought the confinement drama into vogue and Shyamalan's contribution to the genre is creepy, suspenseful and beautifully acted, but oddly it is not scary.

James McAvoy plays Kevin, a self-aware schizophrenic with 23 known personalities. He abducts three teenage girls from a carpark and locks them in his windowless, dungeon-like home. You will immediately think 'knickers and knockers', and it's true, it has its fair share of underwear shots, but it is far from being a sleazy perv fest. Instead it concerns itself with the relationship between Kevin and the numerous people who are competing for prominence in his split personality, and Doctor Fletcher (Betty Buckley), who has been studying his case as a long-term confidante.

McAvoy effortlessly trips from Dennis to Barry to Hedwig to Jade without needing to camp it up and Buckley finds a credible and engaging balance between mother and analyst. Of the abductees – yes, they are all pretty size 8s – it is Casey (Anya Taylor-Joy) whom Shyamalan draws with most depth. She is damaged herself after a traumatic childhood - the scene in the woods where

she bails up her uncle with a hunting rifle is the movie's true white-knuckle moment – but it is ironically her broken wing that gives her the strength to deal with the crisis at hand.

The final revelation of where Kevin lives is hardly subtle, but it is nevertheless immensely saddening. It also leaves you wondering if perhaps Shyamalan has a sequel planned, for the 'closure' that is traditionally arrived at in such a straightforward escape story does not eventuate. And as a last dark joke, Bruce 'the Bruiser' Willis turns up in a diner.
