Heavy fine for tree massacre

A contractor for a controversial proposed new township at Bilambil Heights who chopped down and poisoned over 1,200 trees, including many threatened species, has been fined \$135,000 and ordered to complete 200 hours of community service.

Chillingham farmhand Lance Rawson pleaded guilty in the NSW Land and Environment Court to seven charges under the National Parks and Wildlife Act and was convicted last week with one of the largest penalties ever handed down in the state for such offences. He was also ordered to Brian Preston, said 'the conservation pay professional costs

Rawson was contracted to poison camphor laurel and privet by developer Godfrey Mantle and his Terranora Group Management Pty Ltd, which owns the land and currently has plans before the state planning department for the township with up to 1,800 homes known as The Rise on the 170-hectare site of the derelict Terranora Lakes Country Club.

But the court found that Rawson went much further, using a chainsaw and poison to kill 1,279 trees, of seven different threatened species, between December 2005 and September 2006 on the property which included highquality remnant rainforest.

The court heard that environmental consultants were also engaged to complete flora and fauna surveys for the site which identified hundreds of individual threatened species on the land which were then marked with pink flagging tape.

When the consultants later returned to the land they discovered achievement of the objects of the

many threatened trees, including those marked with the tape, had been cut and poisoned.

The court found that Rawson's actions were deliberate and that he acted in reckless disregard of information, advice and warnings from one of the environmental consultants that at least some of the trees he had cut were threatened species.

Warnings ignored

Rawson also ignored warnings from a Tweed Shire Council ranger that the cutting of trees on the property may be contrary to the law.

The court's chief judge, Justice of biological diversity is a common concern of humankind' and Rawson caused actual environmental harm to seven threatened species and populations of those threatened species and an endangered ecological community, their habitat, composition, structure and functioning.

Justice Preston said Rawson admitted pulling out hundreds of plants on the site but found his denials over picking some specific plants lacked credibility.

He said Rawson also tried, but was 'unconvincing', to suggest other people including marijuana growers or opponents to the controversial development, were to blame for cutting and poisoning trees on the site, even though he had never seen anyone doing it.

Rawson's actions in picking plants of threatened species without first applying for, then obtaining approval under the National Parks and Wildlife Act, he said, 'thwarted the

He accepted Rawson's evidence as to his lack of knowledge of threatened species generally. Rawson said he knew some plants were protected by the law but did not know which ones.

He also accepted Rawson's evidence that he never had a conversation with Mr Mantle or anyone else from his company about threatened species on the property or about Rawson cutting told to do'.

The court also heard how an ecologist tagging the threatened species on the property had seen 20 Red Bopple Nut trees (a threatened species) which had been cut down and confronted Rawson over it.

He said Rawson could have and should have refrained from cutting and poisoning plants of threatened species unless and until all necessary approvals had been sought and obtained from the regulatory authorities.

The court heard Rawson had no prior convictions for environmental offences.

The prosecutor had also called for a jail sentence because the offences continued on page 2

Move to ban signs at council meetings

Community councillor Dot Holdom wants to ban people from bringing signs into the public gallery and using mobile phones during council meetings.

She says the signage is often disrespectful and suspects some people are using mobile phones to film meetings in defiance of a long-standing prohibition on recording any of the proceedings.

The move has sparked a mixed reaction among colleagues but has been given the thumbs down by some longtime gallery watchers who say she shouldn't interfere with their democratic right to hold aloft signage to express a point of view.

'I think they have the right to bring in signs as long as they are not derogatory so councillors know what people expect of them,' said regular gallery goer, April Margieson.

Town tip, recycling centre to close

The planned closure of Murwillumbah's rubbish tip and its popular recycling centre at the end of this month has caused a stink among residents with scores appealing against the move.

The state government has deemed the garbage depot on the town's outskirts a pollution hazard due to potential contamination of groundwater, forcing Tweed Shire Council to close its gates for the last time on November 30, bringing to and end a 30-year era.

The 20-hectare councilowned site will then be remediated by capping the rubbish set up for flood-free storage for council items such as drainage pipes.

It will spell the end of the recycling centre which has been run from the tip for 14 years by Mark and Andrea Beaton and their friend Michael Beham.

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

Council, not gallery, at fault

The push to stop people taking placards into the public gallery is an over-the-top knee-jerk reaction which reeks of hypocrisy.

Several councillors claim their delicate sensitivities were assaulted by signs calling for a fair deal for koalas and outbursts from the more vociferous gallery members during a renewed debate over the future of the massive Kings Forest estate.

Some say this robust form of democratic expression is intimidating while others have trotted out the little old ladies (LOL) argument, in that LOLs in the gallery are being whacked over the head with the hand-held cardboard placards.

But the councillors' expressions of indignation are a bit rich considering it was their own actions which fuelled the anger and disquiet displayed at the meeting.

The gallery was packed with people determined that the council didn't again abrogate its responsibilities when it was unexpectedly given a second chance to exercise an opportunity to influence the outcome of the shire's biggest greenfield developments.

On the first occasion chief planner Vince Connell presented a detailed and exhaustive report raising a host of red flags about the concept plans for the estate, including expert advice about the fragility of koala colonies in the area.

Mr Connell also warned that the government was about to remove the council's last shred of planning powers by allowing the developer to draw up his own development control plan (DCP) for the estate which would over-ride the council's own DCP.

But instead of sending a strong message to the government by endorsing Mr Connell's concerns as he requested, councillors inexplicably and disgracefully dropped the ball.

They decided just to 'receive and note' the report – a strategy which sent a message to Macquarie Street that they weren't prepared to give their weight to any of the concerns raised by their planning experts and consultants.

The councillors, with the exception of Katie Milne (and Kevin Skinner who happened to be absent), went along with the view expressed by lottery-chosen mayor Warren Polglase, that to endorse the report would 'restrict negotiations for a better outcome!

Their limp-wristed response was not only a kick in the teeth for Mr Connell and other planning staff and consultants who had been toiling for years to put together the report, but the wider community who shared their concerns.

So when the council was unexpectedly given what Mr Connell said was a second chance to have a say on the plans at the last meeting, people turned out in force to ensure councillors didn't throw it away again.

This time the councillors 'got the message' and finally agreed to endorse his report. If, as Cr Kevin Skinner suggested, the public presence in the gallery may have intimidated the way some councillors voted, then The Echo says: 'Thank God you were there?

If councillors want to avoid a repeat of the hostility which was aimed at councillors other than Katie Milne, Barry Longland and Joan van Lieshout, they need to carry out the job they were elected to do.

Banning signs and stopping people from dressing up in colourful costumes is a further erosion of the democratic process which started this year with a new Catch-22 media policy preventing councillors from making public anything which is not already publicly available. If small minds prevail and the threatened ban is implemented, it will be interesting to see how far the free speech squelchers are prepared to go. Will a T-shirt with a slogan the mayor or Cr Holdom objects to be considered a placard? We imagine protesters will line up for the opportunity to be ejected, thereby confirming Tweed's recent accolade as the worst council in the state.



Oil spill emergency Global temperature is influ-

enced by evaporative cooling of the ocean surfaces and surface pollutions by oil should be attended to immediately.

Ten weeks ago oil escaped from a drilling rig in the Timor Sea. The federal government should have been active in ensuring Australian resources were protected and that safe drilling procedures were maintained; and to take immediate action.

The federal government minister did nothing for ten weeks, while the overseas drilling company took its time and own resources and refused immediate International help.

An eventual enquiry may find that the drilling company did not maintain sufficient drilling mud hole pressure on withdrawing the rods, or maintain mud volume and density. The present fire prevents a quick removal of pipe obstruction and closing the head valves.

This large oil spill will affect the evaporative cooling of the Timor Sea and the monsoon season may be drier, with fewer reflective clouds and poorer rain fall in the northern parts of Australia.

As this oil and ocean pollution will affect Indonesia and Australia a competent authority should be in charge. Action by the federal government minister is required immediately.



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

The final was conducted in public and Varshavsky stopped after eight minutes, with only two obvious numbers filled in and no working notes. By that time both of Varshavsky's rivals had finished although, since one had made an error, Varshavsky stood to gain an extra \$1,000 if he completed his puzzle. Nonetheless, Varshavsky simply gave up and accepted his \$3,000 third prize.

No action was taken at the time, but an open letter by the second placegetter provided plenty of grounds for suspecting that foul play might have been at work; as at the World Open,

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

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

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Beach Buzz what's happening on the coast

National Coastal Safety Report

Australian men are nearly nine times more likely to drown at the beach than women according to the just released Surf Life Saving Australia National Coastal Safety Report, and it is young men who are most at risk with those aged between 30 and 39 recording the highest number of deaths (overall, men accounted for 88% of coastal drowning deaths in Australia).

'Men just never seem to learn when it comes to surf safety, said Matt Thompson of Surf Life Saving Australia. 'Arrogance, bravado and an inflated sense of their surf swimming ability are a lethal combination and the statistics speak for the limits of their ability, Mr Thompson said.

'We have a goal of reducing drowning deaths by half by 2020 which is ambitious but, we believe, achievable. Clearly, men are one of the main targets and we hope these figures will shock them in to changing their behaviour at the beach. Safely negotiating rips is a major area that we hope to educate the public in and you will see this throughout the summer.

In the 2008/09 season, there were 23,075 rescues in total carried out, 1,322,212 preventions occurred, first aid was administered on 69,013 occasions and there were 87 resuscitations. Of those, 44% who drowned lived less than
