Rally chief jumps gun, starts firing

The fight to stop the controversial world rally returning to the Tweed next year has picked up steam after the rally board chief was accused of provoking violence against anti-rally campaigners and jumping the gun on an official decision on the event.

Despite the state government yet to table an official review of the rally's impact to see if the (unknown) millions of taxpayer dollars were justified, Rally Australia chairman Alan Evans told media this week that he believed the local population would 'now welcome the return of the event and react against protests', that 'you will never see a repeat of that again' and that 'the locals will be very, very antagonistic towards them.

The comments shocked members of the No Rally Group (NRG), who saw them as provocative and misleading, especially with a local newspaper repeating unfounded claims, since dismissed by police, that protesters hurled rocks at rally cars.

The claim at the time during last September's event provoked a violent backlash against protesters. The newspaper this week apologised for repeating the lie, after the NRG protested.

NRG secretary Andrea Vickers said Mr Evans's 'aggressive' comments would stir up hostile sentiment against opponents of the rally, and she had serious concerns for the safety of protesters, who were 'vilified' by many media outlets during last year's event.

Ms Vickers said rally organisers were trying to 'intimidate us into silence by making inflammatory comments' and the NRG would continue to oppose an event so inappropriate for an area with significant environmental values.

The head of the firm in charge of coordinating the rally review, Integrated Marketing Solutions (IMC), Mike Cahill, told local media Mr Evans's comments pre-empted the review report because state development minister Ian Macdonald was yet to table it in parliament and now the rally board chief had to 'live with the consequences of his actions'

Murwillumbah's business chamber chief Toni Zuschke also added fuel to the fire by telling the media she backed Mr Evans's comments because she believed the rally protesters had 'stepped over the line' last year.

NRG spokesman Scott Sledge described the rally chairman's comments as 'provocative and misleading', especially since police had dismissed the rock-throwing allegations after fully investigating them.

Mr Sledge said the comments amounted to a 'contempt of parliament' which showed 'monumental arrogance' and 'demonstrates a total disregard by rally organisers for due process and the wellbeing of local resi-

Meanwhile, Mr Evans also told local media that some stages of the planned race could be diverted to Casino and the Richmond Valley and talks had already been held with shire officials, who welcomed the move.





Payback time?

There is something very disconcerting about council's steadfast refusal to drop a \$100,000 developer levy on Cabarita Beach Surf Lifesaving Club's modification plans for its deck, an issue set to be considered by council at its meeting next Tuesday.

The excuse put up by the mayor doesn't stand up to scrutiny and deserves the strongest condemnation, but when one looks at the history of the club, the mayor, the developers next door and the council's sacking a few years ago, alarm bells ring loud and new councillors should treat this with utmost caution.

In a nutshell, earlier this decade the developers of the old hotel site next door to the surf club, Resort Corp, had eyed the club's beachfront land at Pandanus Parade to expand their project, now known as The Beach, but were frustrated by the club members, despite the best efforts to acquire that and council-owned land behind the club by Resort Corp, then mayor Warren Polglase, his pro-development factional colleagues and staff.

Furthermore, Resort Corp director Paul Brinsmead, the son of pro-development faction member Cr Bob Brinsmead, was involved in an orchestrated election slush fund known as 'Tweed Directions' to bankroll the campaign of this pro-development faction. The council was eventually sacked in 2005 by the state government after an inquiry found it had become the puppets of developers.

Now we have Cr Polglase, back in the mayor's chair, frustrating the club's wishes to expand its clubhouse to enhance its surf lifesaving activities. The locals at Bogangar/Cabarita fought long and hard for their beachfront public facilities there and the electorate at large surely doesn't have that short a memory.

The club rightly asks why a community-based non-profit organisation devoting thousands of hours each year through volunteers is treated like a profit-driven developer, and Cr Polglase issues a press release saying council 'has already given the club substantial funds' for life saving activities and that the deck application is for 'entertainment facilities', so the club has to cough up.

This simply doesn't stack up as the club is nothing like a commercial enterprise such as that next door. State MP Geoff Provest has also weighed in against the mayor, saying the deck extension was primarily to help the community club in its lifesaving role, that it was not a wealthy club full of poker machines and the levy effectively takes money away from the club's lifesaving role.

Interestingly, the mayor says the expansion of the deck was 'in direct competition to an existing hotel immediately across the road and other commercial businesses'. How churlish, you'd expect that sort of argument to come from the developer next door. The mayor and his faction lobbied hard and won concessions for Resort Corp over the relaxation of planning controls such as setbacks at The Beach resort, yet he's not going the extra mile for a community surf club which has raised most of the money for its new club. Even the help from council was in the form of a secured loan, so it was not a handout.

Locals are saying there's a whiff of payback in this decision, given the history of the developer and the mayor. 

Keeping your computer safe and secure

IT security journalist and broadcaster Pat Gray answers some questions and explains basic home computer security.

Q. Apart from securing/locking your wifi access, keeping up to date with patches and changing passwords periodically, what can one do about internet viruses/attacks on a garden variety PC or Mac?

Antivirus software, while not 100 percent effective, is still a must. Thankfully there's plenty of free antivirus software out there – AVG Free is popular, as is

Microsoft's new Security Essentials. Keep an eye out, however, for fake anti virus software.

Q. What is safer, the most up to date Mac or PC?

Macs are probably safer, but they're certainly not more secure. Windows is actually miles ahead in terms of the security features baked into the operating system, however Microsoft users get hammered harder because there's just more of them. We are starting to see more viruses emerge for Macs, but the average punter is safer using Apple platforms, for now.

BEING UGLY A NEW DISCOURSE FOR HAPPINESS AND LIBERATION

When I was 17 I became a feminist. Overnight the pretty country girl with a part time modelling career became a fundamentalist zealot with the fervour of a born again Christian. It was the ultimate anti-Oprah makeover. Hair was regenerated on smooth brown legs, armpits and bikini line. Makeup hit the bin. My long blonde locks were shaved short on one side, dyed blue on the other. Soft floral dresses and mini skirts were replaced with overalls and stilettos were crushed by my 18 hole Doc Martens. Bras became something to tie marijuana plants to the trellis with and Barbara Taylor Bradford was replaced with Germaine Greer, Anne Summers and Shulamith

In just one week I became conventionally unattractive. My mother was horrified. 'It's like you want to look ugly!' She was right. I did. I was surprised how much fun being ugly is. And it's a time saver! As a teenage girl being 'pretty' had been a constant source of low self-esteem. Like most teenage girls I was filled with an all pervasive self loathing fuelled by fashion magazines and gender conditioning. I would never be pretty enough, slim enough, desireable enough. I would always need designer shoes, a different nose, perter tits and a smaller arse. I would also need to be shorter. Being a beautiful young woman was not the entry to the perfect life I thought it was. It was a constant reminder of all the ways I didn't measure up. When I looked at other women I saw everything that was wrong with me.

I believed that being thinner would make me happier. That a new haircut would change my life. Becoming a feminist was my way of breaking mirrors. I no longer strived to win love with attractiveness. It was like becoming a man. It was fucking awesome. I moved in with four other young feminists and together the five of us had two years of hairy makeup-less bliss. We studied, we partied and we dragged home nervous young men for sexual experimentation. (We all tried to be lesbians, but when it came to the fruit bowl of life, it was the banana not the paw paw that topped our weet bix.)

This was when I first started performing, when I first

found my creative voice. As a comedian I still believe it was the liberation from the need to be desired as attractive that gave me the passage I needed to become a standup. And guess what, girls. I still got a root! Over two decades later I wear makeup, I wax, on occasion I wear heels. The uniform is different, but I'm still very much a feminist.

As a feminist mother of daughters I thought that my politics would inoculate my girls from the bullshit gender identity war. But up against popular culture, one woman's belief system is the equivalent to having one finger in the dike. (Pardon the analogy.) I cannot hold back the enormous force of oppression

Twenty years ago feminists wrote about women's oppression as objectification by the 'male gaze'. Patriarchal capitalism is a cockroach. Toxins like feminism are incorporated and homogenised. Women now believe that they're not oppressed, mainly because technology and popular culture have provided gateways and stimulus for us to become the auteurs of our own oppression. We no longer need lonely fat men masturbating into their socks to pornographise us. We now have the technology to do it ourselves.

If you have a daughter, have a look at the photos she takes. Cameras turned in. Where we oldies hold a camera pointed out at the world, this new generation turns it 180 degrees in on themselves. Front and centre is the girl. Pouting, with large eyes looking at

the viewer. Little girls taking photos of themselves that look a lot like the pretend faces of pleasure and desire I've seen in porn movies. Little girls in their bras and undies having pillow fights or bubble baths and photographing themselves. Little girls who aren't lesbians pretending to kiss each other.

Then they post them on the internet on Facebook or MySpace or whatever social media is the latest fad. (Post is a more benign way of saying 'publish'.) They wait for comments like 'you're so beautiful' or 'you look hot'. I wonder how young girls learnt to be so sexualised so young?

Young girls have their first sprout of pubic hair, only to shave it off. Young girls are having boob jobs at 18, eating disorders are on the rise, and in Australia the average age for sexual intercourse is between 13 and 14. Our young women have become the auteurs of their own oppression, offering themselves up for the 'male gaze' in a world that has the technology to objectify and publish every little girl with the internet and a webcam.

It's much harder to liberate a generation of young women who have been taught to oppress and objectify themselves. They are not prepared to not be beautiful. I propose a new wave of feminism for a new generation of women. There's only three steps to begin with, a training course in turning the camera out so that you see the world instead of the world looking at you, grow back your pubes and let your mother dress vou.
