

Tourism Byron have estimated that 600 out of 700 rental properties could be affected, however a tourism audit produced by Southern Cross University in 2004 counted only 17 percent of all holiday rental houses and units within the 2(a) residential zone.

The anomaly can be partly attributed, say SCU researchers, to the fact that properties along Lawson Street, currently zoned coastal erosion (7f2) and not 2(a).

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

Byron High student recognised for excellence





Biggest night of the year

The end of the calendar year is now only 21 weeks away and plans for the biggest party night of the year in Byron Bay are still unresolved.

The decision to step back from the format of the last few years and opt for a more low key approach that would appeal to a greater proportion of residents seemed laudable at the time. Local police agreed that the level of drunkenness had exceeded normally acceptable behaviour, even for New Year's Eve, and asked for a ban on alcohol in the streets. The BayFM dance party was deemed to be attracting the wrong element and creating a negative image.

If the people of Byron Shire want to reclaim New Year's Eve as their own, now is the time for action. This Wednesday, July 27 at 6pm the public are being asked to air their views on what they would like to see happen on December 31. What type of entertainment should be booked, who is interested in taking part in the parade, should there be fireworks? Are we talking about classical music on the beach, fire ceremonies, lantern parades, community singing or carnival drumming and

Another fundamental question that has yet to be answered is how will the costs of managing New Year's Eve be funded? One possible option of cancelling the whole kit and caboodle didn't get off the ground when raised by Ross Tucker, no doubt because of the fears of what might happen if revellers were left to entertain themselves.

Even if the state government coughs up a \$25,000 grant under the Community Safety Plan this will only go some way to fund the \$138,000 budget produced by Council staff. While Mayor Jan Barham says the current estimate is somewhat over the top it seems very unlikely that the ratepayers of Byron Shire will not have to foot the bill to some extent. Which makes you think that if we are paying for the party, then shouldn't we make sure we have the input so that we enjoy it.

Visiting Professor David Simmons from the New Zealand Tourism Recreation Research and Education Centre spoke at Council recently about similar events across the Tasman where pre-sold ticket sales within the community covered all expenses. A back of the envelope calculation shows that if the program for New Year's Eve can be made attractive enough to justify a \$20 ticket price, then a crowd of 6,000 will ensure the event breaks even. Influencing the make up of that crowd to largely include revellers who will respect the town, (hopefully with a major local contingent), also comes down to the content of the night's events.

The New Year's Eve community meeting is on this Wednesday at Council's Training Depot in Bayshore Drive.

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

CHESS by Ian Rogers

Arkadij Naiditsch's win this week of the elite Sparkassen tournament in Dortmund, Germany, ranks as the biggest upset in the history of top level chess.

Not only was 19-year-old Naiditsch the youngest and lowest ranked player in the field, he was also the only player in the tournament ranked outside the world's top 100. He was competing against nine of the best players in the world, including Classical World Champion Vladimir Kramnik, yet the Latvian-born teenager led for much of the tournament and, despite being under pressure in many games, was defeated only once on his way to first place.

Naiditsch's peers were restrained in their praise, unsure of whether this result might be a flash in the pan. 'He works hard but I don't know if he has an exceptional talent,' said Israel's Emil Sutovsky, who lost to Naiditsch in the game given below. 'Still, he won't be outside the top 100 for much longer!'

The closing ceremony Naiditsch's parents ecstatic while the man at the centre of attention seemed somewhat stunned by his achievement. Naiditsch did however accept an invitation from the tournament's second youngest player, Etienne Bacrot, to invest his winnings while continuing the celebrations and the two could be seen returning from Dortmund's casino at 6am the following morning.

A few weeks back I was in New Zealand teaching comedy to the kiwis. Whilst I enjoyed the process it seemed a bit redundant - they're pretty bloody funny as it is, they didn't seem to need the extra coaching. In transit from Rotarua to Auckland I ducked into a servo and asked the bloke sweeping if he knew the way to Auckland. He just said 'Yip' and went back to his broom. Sadly I marveled that there was no song that spoke to who we are as people. I was filled with a sense of cultural despair. I wished I'd paid more attention at the Indigenous Festival and learnt a traditional song. I know a few Warumpi Band songs but I didn't honestly think I could get away with White Fella Black Fella. The only other songs I could remember the words to was the theme to Love Boat and Lou Reed's epic descent into the maelstrom, Heroin. Neither touching, significant nor respectful. There's no way I'd even

think of mouthing Advance Australia Fair – just the thought of the song makes me want to give John Howard the finger, and so, at the end of the day I was left with Waltzing Matilda. A strange little song about a bloke who got a bit intimate with a sheep. I mean, aren't the Kiwi's the ones who are supposed to have a longstanding romance with the woolly wanderer? But here we are, proud as punch, singing for all the world to hear about our finest moment with a jolly jumbuck. I sang the stupid song about a bloke dancing around his campfire with his four legged friend, the ecstacy of their love and the agony of their separation. It was humiliating, but its idiocy, its double standard and its tuneless drone was truly Australian. My thongs pulsed with pride. Sadly, my Maori friends heard me sing and changed their mind about the welcome. Only kidding. (Greek national anthem, about a goat).



GUERRILLA: THE TAKING OF PATTY HEARST

Before she became Monster-in-Law, Jane Fonda posed for propaganda photographs with the Viet Cong. The hippy movement had soured, US troops were mowing down American students and history was being filmed as it happened. The line between art and life was blurring. In California, a cell of 'urban guerrillas' (their term) formed the Symbionese Liberation Army, aiming to bring down the fascist state. In 1973 they kidnapped the newspaper heiress Patricia Hearst. This riveting doco closely tracks the ensuing events, from Hearst's first tapes assuring her family of her well-being, to her arrest following the infamous bank robbery when the poor little rich girl was caught on camera with an automatic weapon and a lot of attitude. Radicalised or brainwashed, the judgement is left to the viewer, though smart inserts from Errol Flynn's Robin Hood suggest how the gang saw itself. Jane grew up and married CNN's Ted Turner, Patty went home to the mansion and

MADA-GASCAR

Madagascar opens with the animals at the Central Park Zoo living in pampered complacency. The chimps are cultural snobs while the carnivores dine from silver platters. Two of the beasts are big buddies: showboating lion Alex (voiced by Ben Stiller) and fun-loving zebra Marty (Chris Rock). Neither have notions of predator and prey. Carnivore Alex is satiated by yummy red steaks. He's not just domesticated, he's urbanized, preferring street noises over ambient jungle sounds played on loudspeakers. But Marty seeks his roots. His quest is kick-started by 'psychotic' penguins who plot their escape commando style. When Marty splits, Alex races to fetch him; hypochondriac giraffe Melman (David Schwimmer) and no-nonsense hippo Gloria (Jada Pinkett Smith) go along. Somehow they wind up marooned on the island of Madagascar. It has a strong story that also looks at strained friendships, cultural assimilation and the longing to belong. But mostly it's about comic lunacy; even the slapstick gags show sparks — if not fires — of creativity. Madagascar is brilliantly written, animated and performed, it not only bridges the child-adult divide, but also makes its kid-friendly humor smart in its own way.



MONSTER IN LAW

There is a wonderful early scene where Viola (Jane Fonda), having been just told that she is to be axed as host of a long-running talk show, is interviewing a sixteen-vear old charttopper. The penny drops for Viola and, confronted with her own outdatedness, she goes for the bimbo's jugular, metaphorically and literally. It is the highlight of this brightly coloured but standard prince-and-the-pauper MO. Jennifer Lopez is Charlie, a temp whom Viola believes is not worthy of her son's hand in marriage. As Kevin, Michael Vartan is dripping wet whilst JayLO, the future daughter-in-law, not so much acts as pulls faces and mannerisms in a performance that cranks up the annovance factor to the max. It is Fonda's class alone that saves the movie as she goes about her shrewish way in an attempt to sabotage the nuptials. It all grinds along to the inevitable gorgeous garden wedding and, gosh, you would not believe who ends up catching the bride's bouquet. John Campbell



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


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In the Red

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The mysterious alchemy of yeast

Every step of yeast cooking is a little excitement. From the dissolving of this living organism in water - be it in fresh or powdered form - through to the triumphant finale, the process is more about magic than anything else. A pinch of sugar into blood-warm water and the yeast scattered in, whisked and set aside until the mixture begins to bubble, composes itself into a creamy foam. At this point it is added to the other ingredients, almost always flour, with extra water, oil, eggs, melted butter providing the necessary additional moisture and dimensions of richness. And then the kneading. Expanse of space, extra flour to counter the stickiness, strong rhythmic movements with impeccably clean fingernails. Pushing down with the heel of the hand and a pulling, stretching away with the other. Working air into the ball of compact dough, thumping it, stroking it, re-shaping and pressing it, folding it over and urging life into it. Best done to music near a window out of which you may occasionally glance, this stage can be mesmeric and soothing, circular, cyclical and cathartic. Pounding away disappointment and loss, coaxing out strength and faith. Suddenly it has become a sphere silk-smooth, a flawless, unblemished dome to be placed in an oiled bowl and left somewhere warm in order that the growing continue.

When you return, the dough has blown up so far that it bulges against the plastic film you have covered it with: it is a vast, pale lifeforce. Punch down hard into that soft, yielding flesh, and then it is ready to be sculpted or stretched into whatever you wish. Packed into a loaf tin, pulled until nearly transparent then pressed into a disc, rolled out and filled with surprises. And then cooked - most often baked - into its final flourish, charging the air with aromas almost intoxicating. a perfume you could dive into.

My mother baked bread which we would eat too much of, butter running down its hot, thickly carved sides. I should have carried on the tradition but instead my sister has: the same recipe for a simple, high-topped loaf of sturdy whole-

meal bread. I escape to her, a weekend requiring big sisterly support, and she feeds us her dense pea and ham soup with its chunks of smoky ham hock, and hanks of bread. Afterwards I am not sure which has cheered me more: the meal or how cosy and bearable we managed to treat the theme of Badly Behaving Boyfriends.

I am so vigorous that I am inspired to bake my Onion Tart. This is guite the loveliest version of a guiche I have ever come across: sweet and creamy onions enclosed in a meltingly light yeast pastry. Discussing this with a chef friend of mine I learn something new that he was taught during his apprenticeship, namely that, before proving it, the dough should be worked - kneaded, massaged - until it feels like a woman's breast. So now we all know



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
