Tweed Council threatens Byron Shire with legal action over flooding caused by bund

On June 30 this year, much of the north of Byron Shire was under several feet of water. Weather records were broken after three days of torrential rain and Tweed Heads experienced its wettest day ever. The residents of South Golden Beach and New Brighton were among the worst hit, with floodwaters entering many low-set houses. Some residents believe that flooding in these areas could have been worse if not for the existence of a 'bund' or restriction across the Capricornia Canal at Kallaroo Circuit, which slows the flow of water from the Billinudgel Nature Reserve into the residential area of South Golden Beach.



Prospective tenants for the nine subsidised rooms are likely to be referred by local crisis centres such as BayAmi who say they are struggling to find affordable housing, particularly in Byron Bay.

Mayor Jan Barham described the agreement as 'a groundbreaking outcome for affordable housing. 'This is cohesive village style living in a location which fits all the parameters for high density affordable living all within walking distance to town. We felt we needed to address the issue of affordable housing in Byron Bay and were willing to make concessions to a bona fide developer.'

Byron Shire's planning regulations allow around 22 dwellings on a site of this size, however these can be overridden by state government policies if seniors living (housing for over 55 year olds) is being provided. Mr Hunt told The Echo that he could have built 37 dwellings




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



The future of cork

In the rush throughout the festive season it is sometimes overlooked that one of our fundamental commodities, cork, is at crisis point. The advent of the screw-top bottle has put the future of a proud tradition in jeopardy.

The Echo, the last refuge of sodden provincial hacks, misses the Pavlovian response to the reassuring pop! of the cork leaving the bottle. The squeak of the screwtop just doesn't contain the same auditory pleasure.

And as Byron Shire Mayor Jan Barham told *The* Echo, 'I don't really have much to say about corks, though I have been collecting them for a long time. In my teens I just thought that as a natural resource they were too good to end up in landfill.

'I have made many a cork board but find myself with a big collection now and have a feeling that an idea for using them will come to me some time but for now I will just keep collecting."

Our lives have been deeply entwined with cork since prehistoric times, when our ancestors hunted the cork-bearing mammoth. Cave walls have been lined with cork, and stencilled thereon images which look remarkably like push pins, or human hands.

Things picked up a pace a few thousand years later when Benedictine monk Dom Perignon started using cork as a stopper in sparkling wine bottles rather than oiled rags. You can imagine the chagrin at a modern day dinner party if the host had to pull an oiled rag from a bottle of Porphyry Pearl.

The Rainforest Alliance notes of European cork practices, 'Cork-growing lands tend to be models of sustainable management. The cork oak tree (Quercus suber) is unique in that its thick bark can be stripped off every decade to extract the cork without damaging the trees, which live 170 to 250 years

'The montados, where the cork oaks thrive, are largely open swathes made up of grassland and scrub vegetation interspersed by trees, where farmers have practiced a low-intensity mix of agriculture and forestry for millennia... Villagers gather edible fungi for their own consumption, use rockrose bushes for firewood in their traditional stone bread ovens and tap local beehives for honey flavoured with native lavender and rosemary. On even a small patch of cork land a farmer can raise a herd of goats, a few cows and some pigs.'

The Fischer story dominated the early months of the year until Fischer avoided the threat of extradition to the US by acquiring an Icelandic passport and was finally freed on March 24. After a few days of saturation press

the big names coverage, Fischer settled down in Iceland with his Japanese fiancée and has lived a quiet and apparently happy life ever since – at least until some of his most treasured possessions, confiscated from a storage room in the US, appeared for sale on eBay a few weeks ago.

Earlier in March, Kasparov had shocked the chess world by announcing that he was quitting tournament chess to concentrate on challenging Russian President Vladimir Putin in the political arena.

Kasparov's announcement came on the same day that he lost to Bulgarian GM Veselin Topalov in the last round of the Linares tournament, leaving both players tied for first at the world's most prestigious tournament.

Subsequently Topalov showed outstanding form, winning a super-tournament in Sofia and the FIDE World Championship in San Luis, to prove that he had taken over as the number one player in the world.

Topalov's successes pushed Indian superstar Viswanathan Anand into the shade, despite Anand's fine start

to the year with a win at the prestigious Wijk aan Zee tournament

However, if Anand was shaded in 2005, Classical World Champion Vladimir Kramnik was completely eclipsed. Kramnik's tournament results this year were so mediocre that when Kramnik finally found a sponsor for a reunification world title match, Topalov was able to brush it away saying that Kramnik's title had become meaningless.

The biggest upset of the year came at Dortmund in July when German youngster Arkadij Naiditsch edged out a world class field including both Topalov and Kramnik to take an unlikely victory. The year ended with another young player, 15-year-old Norwegian Magnus Carlsen, doing well enough at the World Cup in Siberia to qualify for the final stages of the next World Championship cycle.

On the domestic scene, 2005 began with victory for Italian Woman Grandmaster Elena Sedina at the Australian Open in Mount Buller, an event which was so defec-

tively organised that the repercussions are still being felt by the Australian Chess Federation.

National Champion Gary Lane won the Oceania Zonal in January only to find that his reward was not a place in a World Championship as expected but a trip to Siberia in winter for the World Cup.

New Zealand's Igor Bjelobrk was the most successful player on the Australian tournament circuit, while Alex Wohl, after some lean years, tied for the Doeberl Cup and also performed creditably in Europe.

Queensland's Moulthun Ly was Australia's standout junior player of 2005, becoming at 13 the youngest ever Australian Junior Champion and then finishing second in two major Grand Prix tournaments in Queensland in June. including a win over GM Darryl Johansen.

The start of 2006 sees Australian chess in a remarkably healthy state, with the junior boom continuing, especially on the east coast where an estimated 200.000 are now playing at school chess clubs, and big companies such as Xstrata and Myer becoming new sponsors of major Australian chess events in the year ahead.

I think it's already out there, it's called intelligence. I start thinking of things like: the car I saw parking in Woolies in the disabled zone driven by the two able bodied 18 year olds. The sad look on the dog's face who lives in a dusty hole in my street. I

ran through a list. Ring my grandmother. Oh

been an insomniac. I was

and, I've still got those shoes on layby. Must take back the DVD that's been out since September. Now it's 1am and my brain is showing no remorse. I decide to watch TV. Apparently your brain is less active watching the telly than when sleeping. Apparently it's even less active when you watch crap like Steel Magnolias. Drift off for an hour or so in between Sally Field having a few weeping sessions. Am relieved when Julia Roberts dies, but realise that I have inadvertently taken it all in. Can't stop thinking about whether the Daryl Hannah character has a baby boy or a girl. It's 3am, I trundle back to bed. My son has arrived and nestled in between my husband and I. It's hot and sticky. He decides to put his legs on me. Then I get the dead arm to the throat. Once I managed to regain my breath I do a 180° and slept up the other end of the bed. Check the clock. It's almost 4. Just about to drift off, when my husband starts snoring. Put pillow

over head and contemplate the horror of the next day, our Christmas shopping expedition to Pacific Fair. Jesus, chain stores, the Gold Coast and 2 hours sleep. I'm going to need some serious medication. It's definitely going to be a 5 Prozac day. Decide the best way to avoid snoring is to sleep on the floor. Collapse on the carpet at about 5am. The cat climbs the fly screen door inches from my face, the bird bell is ringing and ringing. I vow to glue the cat's paws to cardboard. The darkness evaporates. The trees take shape. It's light outside. I feel like I've had some acid adventure, and I'm still reeling from my pedestrian suburban hallucinations. But it's just a bout of insomnia. I almost drift off when I hear a car pull up outside. It's 6am and my walking partner has turned up to take me to the lighthouse. I am naked, wearing only the fluffy throw from the end of my bed, standing in the driveway. As they say, there is no rest for the wicked

TAKING THE STREET TO THE STAGE THE BEAT ON BLUE KING BROWN'S CARLO **SANTONE**

It takes a great musician to make it on the street. It's a tough place to start, it takes guts, persistence, and to make any cash at all, it takes talent. Not everyone can cut it playing the pavement, but for percussionists, Natalie Pa'apa'a and Carlo Santone, the street was the place that helped them fashion their feel, where they cottoned on just how to connect. Up until about a year ago, Nat and Carlo were regulars on the Byron scene, performing their body percussion with SKIN, busking Jonson Street, or performing with Michael Franti at the East Coast Blues Festival. It was like the heartbeat left town, when they packed up their drums and headed to Melbourne to put themselves in the thick of Fitzroys vibrant roots scene.

It's the kind of move most Byron artists contemplate at some time, taking their music from regional to national, but it doesn't always come off. But for Natalie and Carlo, it was only a matter of time before Blue King Brown were formed, and they were one of the most sought after roots/ rock/reggae act in town. It's all about who you know. Or, who knows you. Fortunately Carlo found himself on a few people's Christmas Card lists.

'We did have contacts, we built them over the years and we moved into the heart of the music scene in Collingwood and Fitzroy. This is the first time I have spent a lot of time in Melbourne, there's so much to see and do. Initially we just needed to find a band and new players. It took us a few months to find the players we wanted. We went and saw : ne. Me and Natalie developed people play and checked them out and basically the first three guys we asked and wanted are the ones we play with now, so I guess you could say it worked out well, which was cool. We wanted people who could play in Skin as well, we still do it, not as much, and the drummer and percussionist need to be able do that as well. Blue King Brown are very percussive, we want to keep that element in there.

Does Melbourne's ready embrace for the sounds of Natalie and Carlo, indicate the existence of that thing one could loosely call a Byron Sound?

'I reckon our sound is a combination of Byron and Melboura lot of our sound in Byron and took it with us. Since then we have got a whole lot of new inspiration in the city.

So what's the secret? How do two North Coast dreadlocked drummers get the keys to the

'We went pretty hard. Our goal was to set up a touring band, because we don't want to live in Melbourne forever, we were just doing what we loved. JJJ have been really supportive, they've been great. So much good stuff has come out of that. One of the biggest thing for us essentially was meeting and playing with John Butler – we played a lot of big shows with him, which

has been great and led to playing with Spearhead.'

It certainly gives credibility to a player. And this didn't come from an agent, or a publicist, or even a clever marketing manager.

'All that stuff comes from playing on the streets. That's where people like John (Butler) saw us. He saw us busking in Byron somewhere and invited us to come and sit in with him for a show. John was originally a busker himself...

'Busking is a good experience it really sets you up performing to people. It's independent music at its core - it gets your playing skills up as well.

We did it every day for years. We loved the energy of street performance. You try and take it to the stage, it keeps you fresh.

For Natalie and Carlo, a big part of their inspiration has also come from their work in central Australia, conducting music and songwriting workshops with aboriginal kids from 3 until their late teens, something they do four times a year.

'They (the kids) are just amazing, they just have a natural rhythm out there, and you can definitely see the progression. That's given us a whole lot of inspiration for our music. "Water" (the song that broke them onto JJJ rotation) came

from out there. And ironically, the first time it got played, we were out there. It was the synchronicity of being there just at the right time.

Blue King Brown return to the North Coast to play the Beach Hotel on Wednesday 4 January, they are also featured at Woodford Festival and have been invited to play the East Coast Blues and Roots Festival.

Now with an APRA Songwriters Award for 2005 under their belt, Blue King Brown are a musical force to be reckoned with. And as Carlo

THE SPIRIT OF EXODUS AND BEYOND, A VISION **SPLENDID AS REVEALED** BY FESTIVAL COOR-**DINATOR, ANDREW** RICHARDS.

Finding out someone's real name is like finding out what kind of undies they are wearing. It's like the power name, the secret identity. Lurking under the mild mannered exterior of Andrew Richards is DJ Booth, funking up the Shire and beyond with his turntables and his band Dubshack. But right now Andrew is wearing a different kind of hat, and it's not because he's balding. It's because he's the frontman for an exciting new company 'Grooven' who are promoting the Exodus Festival this year, in Urs's absence.

In its sixth year, Exodus has gained in momentum, creating a Dance Festival utopia in the rather unlikely spot of Bald Rock, Tenterfield. This year, the creative focus is being shared between what is denoted as 'organic' and 'electronic'

According to Andrew, 'the new thing we are trying to bring to the Festival is the live music. There is still going to be a dedicated trance stage, but this time it's trance and more. We're hoping it's the music that's had to happen. It hasn't been done before – a festival that has techno plus a good range of bands.

Grooven is an innovative and resourceful shop based in the Byron Arts and Industrial Estate. Run by parent company WOM, their mandate is to endorse efficient energy resources, hence their Hemp business and to foster music

that they feel reflects the richness and diversity of spirit the North Coast is famed for. Most recently they took Wild Marmalade to Japan as part of a cultural exchange where the band was often the only live act playing at electronic festivals.

According to Andrew the key component for bands in this genre is their capacity to improvise.

'The bands we have taken on, particularly Wild Marmalade, they are our organic trance band, are all improvised. Improvised is the key word for us. Especially when they are responding to the crowd, not just playing the set. That's when you get the real magic that you just can't get with a DJ. I suppose we are looking for the best of both worlds."

For this year's Exodus, a number of live bands that meet the organic mandate have been included on the bill. There's Jikooha performing live Japanese techno, Pnuma Trio from the USA, who originate from the live Jam scene forged by the Grateful Dead. The String Cheese Incident, one of the hits of the 2004 Bluesfest, also emerged from the same Jam Band scene.

So why here? Why the music that we make in Byron?

'Byron Bay culture has an authenticity and a realness to it, to the music. WOM fell in love with Australia. Then they fell in love with Byron Bay. They saw Wild Marmalade and saw it as a good representation of Byron culture, as part of a bigger movement."

So what's the big movement? Why the hemp?

'Hemp is a renewable resource that grows itself in a few months. It's much more efficient for the planet and saves trees. For WOM they have a company slogan which brings it all together, it's "spreading organic culture". This relates to the organic in food, in music, in clothing, in culture and in everyday life. They have taken the feeling of Byron, and I think they are one of the groups of people who value the nature of this place and are trying to save authentic Byron culture.


This year's Exodus not only features an impressive lineup of DJ's and International bands, it will also be featuring a few other innovations.

'The Big Chai Shop is also happening, and it's never happened before because there has always been a separation between hippies and techno, or the alternative scene. Hippy is a bit of a difficult word. This will be the big drumming tent, with didge and drumming circles.

Exodus is an experience for partygoers and the more laid back family types as well. With quiet camping, chill out spaces, kids activities, supervised swimming, and a program that slowly progresses into a deep forest techno party, this year's Exodus promises to be something special. 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

BILL CONNER GIVES THE BACKSTORY ON A LOST TOWN, ON THE EVE OF ZANZIBAND'S CD LAUNCH.

Driving over in the car today I decided to listen to Zanziband, a bunch of fifty something characters, some business men, some full time musicians, who have reunited after almost 20 years to record their first album. Produced by Tom Misner, head honcho of Studio 301, this CD has all the licks of a top notch recording, but at the same time heralds a time of Byron past when young men with beards would gather out the back of a bloke called Merv's place and set up a gig on the back of a ute.

The band formed back in 1982 and the emergence of the album is somehow timely, coming on the crest of the wave of development and tourism, which may one day obliterate that hippy barefoot blues and beer drinking vibe for good. For Bill Conner, the infamous creator of BC hats, Zanziband signified an idyllic time when tourists were scarce and space on a good wave was common.

So why record Zanziband

'I hadn't done anything since 1987. My fingers were out of shape...I am not really much of a musician but I used to organise the gigs! I set up the gigs and used to get the money of Tom Mooney! If it weren't for Tom (Misner) rediscovering us, saying it was good it wouldn't have happened.'

Tom insisted the band make a beeline for the studio and the ensuing recording of some 10 songs strikes right at the heart of a Byron we've almost kissed goodbye. The twenty something year hiatus on the lyrics gives an ironic perspective - I love hearing 50 year old blokes singing about the government, and smoking weed and being on the dole! Go the baby boomers! Of course, most of them are respectable business men now!

But Byron was a different place back then.

'The Hotel Great Northern was nonexistent. The Top Pub was there and Michael Barnes used to play in a band called the Chincogan. That was the only gig in town until Tom Mooney bought the Rails in 81. Tom saw us (Zanziband) at the Piggery and he thought it must be good, after all there were 10 people at the Rails and 80 people at Merv's party.'

Back in the early 80's the gig scene in town was a little different to what it is today. You didn't have international and national touring bands popping in every other week. It was an eclectic and creative community which really excelled in making it's own

'Tuesday night was the Rissole (RSL) Band, Sunday arvo was the happening day at the Rails and Friday and Saturday there'd be something at the Top pub, but that was before Strop bought it when it was a bit rough, but it was still good.'

'You'd finish up at the Top Pub and race to Dinty's (around where Bay Action is) and they'd pack the place with as many people as they could and lock the doors.'

Tourists at that time in Byron were unheard of.
'I swear, if one girl who wasn't a local turned up at

the pubs they'd know she was a tourist and she'd have 8 guys surrounding her. It was totally different then. We used to have more men than women!'

And why would that be ladies? One word answer: surf

'We all came here to surf.
There was no industry here

— I made hats and sandals
and belts and sold them at
the markets. You would have
to line up and wait for spare
shifts at the Meatworks. I
never did it. Too much of a
brown rice hippy.'
So if no one knew about
Byron, how did it happen to
pass that a brown eyed boy
from Florida should make his
way to such a remote coastal
village?

'It was word of mouth. I was literally in Florida, 1969 and I heard about Broken Head and an American girl there called Marsha who made granola, living on Seven Mile Beach.' BC recalled a time when New Years Eve, wasn't quite the headache it is now. 'I swear I remember we drove past the Hotel Great Northern and there were 8 guys outside there on New Years Eve and we thought, Wow, it's really raging tonight!'

Like a tsunami, change has crept up on Byron, both wondrous and terrible, and left many stupefied in its wake.

'All of us ex Yanks and pommies had been there before, we'd come from places like that. We only had \$20 so couldn't buy anywhere, we knew it was going to change, but didn't know when... the exponential growth rate is phenomenal.'



So, for someone who came here to find a quiet place to surf, make sandals and create a bit of blues, is Byron still the place you'd come to out of choice?

'Byron Now is exactly what I would have hated then, I would have gone to another town, and started that off. I'd be somewhere else...the quietness and not seeing another person for a week, that's what we used to love.'

'I still love the people that are here, I still love the ocean, but I don't love anything much about Byron. But then I'm just a grumpy old fart!'

Zanziband, reformed, refurbished and re-animated thanks to the talents of Mr Misner. Catch the last wave of the Golden Age of Byron at the Rails on Tuesday 22 December when they launch their album, and then again at the Blues Fest. It's a great album, a fitting testament, to what must have been a great time. I just wish I hadn't wrecked it!

JOST SAUER TALKS ABOUT HIS JOURNEY FROM DRUGS AND **DESPAIR TO HEALTH** AND HAPPINESS.

How does a former drug addict suddenly end up on the path to enlightment? That was the question I was most tempted to ask keynote speaker for the Starlight Well-Being Expo, Jost Sauer, an ex drug smuggler and addict, who found recovery and spirituality in a most unconventional manner.

According to Jost: 'The journey started 30 years ago in Germany. I was heavily into the hippy dream. In 1973 when Dark Side of the Moon came out I had my first joint. It was fantastic. From then I did it as often as I could. But after a while I needed harder drugs like speed and cocaine. In Germany we had access to these drugs very easily."

'By the time I was at Uni I was using drugs constantly (speed mainly). I got kicked out of my profession – I was working for the Catholic Church as a day counsellor for migrant children. If you got kicked out of your job in Germany, it means the army takes you

for service, so I deserted and lived in the underground. I became a drug dealer, smuggling between Amsterdam and Berlin."

For Jost, he wasn't just dealing drugs for money, he believed that it was having a positive impact.

'It made a lot of sense to me at the time because I believed in the nature of drugs and because it got you to this altered state, which was something close to spirituality, I believed I was doing something good.

'I used more and more speed. I was becoming more and more crazy and I was really depressed

'In 1981 I came to Australia, I flew from Amsterdam to Sydney, those days it took 4 days, and I had taken so many drugs by the time I arrived in Australia I was so off my face. I realised when I was standing in the queue that I had a block of hash in my pocket so I went off to the toilet to destroy it. I was followed by security who auestioned me. I said, Look, I forgot to smoke it. They also found amphetamines on me... I thought it was a very rude country... I said, where should I go? They said, go to Nimbin.'

'When I was in Nimbin I was introduced to Chinese medicine and went down the path of repair. I found out the drugs had shown me what I could do and that I could replace what the drugs were for with natural medicine. I think drugs were instrumental for me in finding out about life, but they take it away (life) at the same time.

As a practioneer of Chinese medicine, Jost is pioneering a revolutionary treatment which seeks to assist addict recovery by supporting organ recovery and then assisting them to continue their spiritual journey

'I specialise in wholistic drug recovery so that the addict can continue the journey the drugs initiated. I have observed that if you have taken drugs then there is no way you can return to normal life. In order for drug recovery to be effective, you need alternatives, otherwise you are plagued by emptiness and post drug depression.

Jost claims to have an 80% success rate amongst the addicts he works with.

'I identify the damage done by the drugs and heal that appropriately. Drugs create a state by enhancing organ function that hasn't been developed by spiritual practises so it draws out something from that organ in order to have that altered state. Once the person engages in recovery and repair their damage, they go on the path of the master, it's the only way drug users can go."

So why Chinese medicine?


'Chinese Medicine is well suited to describe drug addiction and the practise is very effective in assisting repair and recovery. Organs create reality - emotional, physiological and spiritual."

This is a revolutionary approach to a conventional treatment program which

asks the addict to focus on the psychological implications of long term drug use.

'I always tell everyone if drugs had no side effects, I'd take them every day. It's what happens to you when you do that makes it destructive. I never resonated with AA or NA, I couldn't relate to counsellors and I never believed that I was wrong, or that I had a deeper need to love myself. I believe it's not just psychology, it's physiology and it's spirituality.

Jost Sauer, author of 'Higher and Higher: from Drugs and Destruction to Health and Happiness' presents his extraordinary story and alternative drug recovery treatment, at the Starlight Wellbeing Expo, Bangalow A&I Hall on Thursday 5 January. 




i believe in fairies

Who can't remember that magical time when fairies lived in the bottom of your garden? Nature spirits who tended flowers, collected dewdrops and mended broken dreams,





the noble ross

Byron Shire has always attracted a diverse range of talented people, all of whom help to create the unique community that defines the region. A recent addition to the eclectic melting pot is musician, song writer and teacher Ross Nobel, his wife, writer Moya Sayer Jones, and their two sons Holden and Tennyson. Émigrés from the Kangaroo Valley, Ross and his family have spent winter holidays in Byron Bay for the last fifteen years and fell in love with the place. Having made the big move, Ross is now settled and keen to start teaching again.

His list of achievements is impressive, including co-writing the hit musical comedy 'Kissing Frogs' with Glynn Nicholas, and on his own, the 'Plumbers Opera'. Produced by Mike Walsh and directed by Simon Phillips, this spoof on opera is currently being considered for production in the US, which Ross is very excited about.

'It's hard to write a musical; you need to have a great story, and then write the music and the lyrics to go with it,' said Ross. 'And you need to have lots of songs – at least 16 or 17.'

Ross has also just finished work on his CD 'Upright Man', which was influenced by 'The Blind Boys of Alabama' – a blues band which has performed at the Blues Festival singing haunting and beautiful spirituals.

Despite his obvious tal-



ents as a writer and performer, teaching is his passion. Ross has taught his own children who, at 14 and 12 have achieved grade eight and six piano respectively.

He spent the last seven years building up his 'School of Groove' in Kangaroo Valley where he taught over 1000 students between the ages of six and sixty. As a trained life coach, his approach to teaching is a holistic one based on the Buddhist belief that you think of an idea and then just do it without building obstacles.

'I believe that children are attracted to a certain type of music,' said Ross. 'I like to make a goal for them, then create a structure by which they can learn. I consider music to be a kind of therapy for kids, especially in their teens when they may feel isolated it can become a tool for them to express themselves. I aim to give nine to fourteen year olds some technique so they can use music for therapy.'

Ross teaches piano and singing, and claims that he can teach anyone to sing, even those who are 'profoundly not alert to their own sound. I can't turn everyone into a Pavarotti, but I know I can take anyone further up the pitch road. I've taken nine year olds who are drastically out of pitch and after a few years have taught them to sing and accompany themselves on the piano to a performance standard.'

Ross's enthusiasm is contagious; his belief in hidden talent and his ability to bring out the best in people is obvious in the way he listens to people, not hears them, really listens. A short time in his company is enough to make anyone feel excited about the realms of possibility within themselves.







Over the past few years one of the hottest double bills has been Entropic and CODA. After successful gigs here and at Woodford in the past they return for another performance at the Coorabell Hall. 2005 has been a busy time for Entropic. After the release of the debut album 'Braille' and remix counterpart Rendezvous came the latest album, 'Factory Seconds' which brought a string of successful launches around the country. Your live show is an integral part of your set, fusing art and music. What can the punters expect in Byron?

You did a tour of 67 gigs in Australia. What's it like playing in small country towns as opposed to inner city venues?

Regional towns are very cool... We love doing them... It is very refreshing and the people do no take themselves so seriously and are genuinely having a good time... City people especially Sydney are very aware of their surroundings and of who is looking at them...

You've written a few soundtracks for TV shows and movies including a National Geographic series and the movie Blue Horizon. Do you employ the same process for writing sound to visual instead of planning the visual to sound?


No... Writing for NG or any film work is more like an emotional collaboration with people from a different medium... So you tend to work to their brief and vision (very exiting)... with my show, I experiment with visuals on my computer and it has become a hobby... So Its an way of presenting to the public another facet of me I suppose...

How do you evolve a sound that is both enjoyable to listen in a lounge room and is dance floor friendly?

I am a real sucker for chill out music and I am always divided between chill and trying to make people dance. So I try and combine the two and mix it up a bit...The next album that I am writing will be a cocktail of sweet and sour... a bit of chill and a bit of dance.

You've done a lot of remixes: Men at work, Tina Arena and Spiderbait amongst others. Any that stand out as a challenge or as an unusual result?

The stand out for me was remixing Ice House and working with



Iva Davies as I have always admired his work... how it has lasted the distance... he has definitely written some signature tunes... it still sounds good!

You've done a track called 'Dare' talking about John Howard's lack of apology for the treatment of Aborigines. How do you feel about him, now that he oozes such a large degree of compassion and sensitivity?

Does he?... I hadn't noticed... how can you take someone seriously when he lived at home till he was 32 years of age?

What's happening in the Australian electronic music scene, any artists that we should look out for?

The electronic music scene is perhaps not at its peak... but there will always be people who want to party and dance... I think the electronic music scene will re-emerge with a new twist to it.

SHOOTING THE BREEZE WITH DJ SEAN CANDY

You've recently won an MusicOZ Award in the Dance Category. Tell us a bit about the track.

Well, I got commisioned to do a remix for a lady called ROSA MUSICA who is just about to release her album that she did with Tone Wandalla @ CrystalGrid called Electric Swamp Creatures. It is a lush slower breakbeat number called Dawn of The Age with a couple parts of vocal and reversed guitar. I usually write more upbeat dance tracks, but decided for a different feel for this one, which paid off. I like to experiment with all different styles of electronic genres.

What sort of opportunities will arise from this award?

For a start, I have won two songs to be produced by a central station producer in Sydney, and some recognition from record companies maybe. It's a nice thing to be recognised for what you love to do. It makes opportunities by giving me inspiration to go on, and push forward knowing that I am on the right path.

What's the difference between Sean Candy and AB Didgeridoo Oblivion?

My two alter egos. Well, Sean Candy is actually my real name and I thought it was a great name for a DJ, so when I started DJ'ing I looked to the Candy within. AB Didj is what I do in a live capacity. It involves me playing didj with tracks I produce and live electronic drums. I have been performing that for years, travelling a lot overseas, but it burnt me out... too much gear to lug around also, CD's and records are much lighter!!

What else is happening production wise?

I am currently working on an album with Nick Taylor, Melaine from PUSS and Whit from Spiderbait, which is kinda electric rock pop. We are putting lots of time into it, and it is sounding top notch, called Slot Machine. Just finished doing the dance soundtrack for George Greenough's Dolphin Glide DVD which will be out soon in Japan. I have also been writing tracks for Ganga Giri while he is overseas and sending it through the net for him to perform to.

What's your involvement with Edge Core Records?

Edgecore has unfortunately finished, cause basically we are all artists. We slowly realised that we wanted to focus more on the art side of things and trying to run a record label from Byron was tuff. I did enjoy what we did though, the music was out there and original and was nice to be part of it. Our parties were always fun too.

What do you think of the local, national and international scene at the moment?

I think what we have in Byron is great. Our parties aren't huge but they rock. There is some great talent right here on our doorstep. Nationally, and internationally it is all going on, so much to experience, so many good artists sharing their sounds... just wish the mainstream was a bit more varied. Throw in more odd sounds in the mix, tear the barriers down between commercial and underground.

What are you doing for New Years Eve?

For the first time in a long time I will be taking it easy on New Years night, as I am having a kidney transplant in January. I will go down to Super Freaky Kinky for some daytime action. May be doing a sneaky set at around 8pm in the Bar area, See ya there!!!

SUPER FREAKY KINKY

SuperFreakyKinky is an all-day, outdoor electronic circus and dance festival held in lush green fields beside the Brunswick River, surrounded by the canefields and rainforest mountains of Mullumbimby. Ten minutes drive from Byron Bay, it is the New Year's Day choice of a couple of thousand booty shakers, LA Lakers, money makers and label fakers as the perfect holiday celebration. With Byron Bay scaling down its traditional NYE events the focus has now shifted to the following day, an outdoor day and night party to welcome in 2006. What's more this year all children under 14 are free and under 18's are only half price on the door.

More than just a dance party – but mostly that, featuring international, Australian and local DJs including London stalwart and label owner Paul Arnold,

'I've been to Byron pretty much every time I've been over,' he says. 'I love it. It's great, it's fantastic, what else can I say! To be playing there on New Years day is just going to be superb! I don't know if there is anywhere else in the world I'd rather be!'

Coordinator and DJ Jackie Onassid adds, 'Life is super, and it can get freaky and let's face it, we all love a bit aofkinky. The philosophy of the festival is to create a cartoon reality where all ages, all sexes, all races and all sexual preferences can play and be accepting of each other. Embrace that everybody is their own blueprint and that that is the fun part of life! Pump it, jump it, kick it and lick it on NYDay with SEKI!'

This year's musical flava has a definite taste of breaks about it. It features Australia's producer of the moment BassKleph alongside longtime label owner Paul Arnold, in Australia as part of Fat! Recordings 8th Birthday international tour. Dirty electronic disco is also well represented by Melbourne favourites Honeysmack (live), and Disco Pussy vs Slack as well as Sydney's Mardi Gras regular Sveta and underground tech specialists N-Zed vs Miss Skye.

The signature Byron sound will be provided by Puss (live), Nick Taylor, Rock Hardson, Jet More, and Jackie Onassid on the outdoor stage. Indoors in the fully licenced bar with river and mountain views, locals Noodles, Strawberry Syme, Foxxy and Junkbeats mash up musical styles with the Gold Coast's Giv and Anakin.

Providing the visual element to the kaleidscopic perfomances are a myriad of artists including the nationally acclaimed Spaghetti Circus, the punk chic dames of Electric Dollhouse and the Solid Gold dancers Karli and Astro Boy. Super-FreakyKinky brings together an eclectic mix of styles and people.

FORMER DANCE WRITER BECKY BUCKWELL SPEAKS ABOUT MAKING WORK OUT OF PLAY, HER NEW BYRON DANCE CLUB.

Over the past three years Seven has blossomed into a comprehensive entertainment liftout, and during that time Becky Buckwell has been our girl on the ground, as Dance editor covering the action both locally and further afield. It wasn't long before her talents for picking up the pulse of the party crew was noticed by 3D mag, where she is a regular monthly columnist. We sadly farewell Becky as our Dance writer and welcome Dan on board, but at the same time herald the beginning of an exciting new Byron based project: a dance club that has been initiated to reflect the positive and creative energies of a rich and diverse scene: Byron dance.

The corner of the Woolies Plaza metamorphoses once again, and out of the ashes of the fallen C-Moog, a new phoenix arises: Play. This is the joint brain child of Becky and DJ Phil Smart, who have silently been pushing for a local dance club that as Becky puts it: 'is all about qualities of sound and quantities of fun.'

According to Becky 'Phil had been trying to buy a club in Sydney, and moved here two years ago to focus on production. We were both very involved in Dance Inc, and met through the scene. We bonded because we share the same vision as well as the same birthday.'

Ironically, that's New Years Eve, which should see these two burgeoning new promoters having something to really celebrate.


Through the regular Dance Inc meetings, Becky went on to say 'we have been talking with other people about how we could get a local dance venue in Byron. Then Cmoog came up for sale. Dance Inc was more about getting an all night legal venue, but we compromised on the all night to have a dance floor. A lot of the other places in town are more lounge bars, we are really going to focus on the dance aspect... (not as many lounge chairs)... furniture, what's that!'

The vision for Play is really centred around 'Byron Sound'.

'Friday nights will feature Nick Taylor and Phil Smart and guests, and that's when we'll showcase the Byron sound...which is quickly described as tech house bent breaks'.

I remember attending some of the original forest doofs some 12 years ago. They were extraordinary vibrant parties, both organic and electronic at the same time. For Smart and Buckwell (should we start calling them Smart Bucks?) this is one of the places where they have found inspiration.

'Another catalyst and influence for the party was all the big outdoor forest parties. We've painted the dancefloor midnight blue with original artworks depicting sunrise and sunset...the Chill Bar is daytime Byron, white, blue and yellow...'



A dedicated crew of Dance officianado's have been working around the clock, painting, cleaning, plumbing, and even 'smudging' out the old to bring in the new! A new sound system has been installed that is designed to reduce output outside of the venue, and a whole new light system has been fitted as well. In a year that has seen the proliferation of corporate style enterprise and franchise encroach on the Byron business scene, it is refreshing to see some local faces taking a punt, and trying to provide a venue that will enrich the local scene that they care so vehemently about. Play will be open from 10pm until 3am, Wednesdays to Saturday until Monday 2 Jan, when they will start including a Monday Play. Support your local dance crew, something Becky jokingly calls: 'The doof dollar'.

>> MORE BLUES

The East Coast Blues Festival is one of the world's best festivals. I can say that now because it's had two Pollster nominations for Best Festival alongside Glastonbury and Monterey Jazz Festival. Not bad for something that started 16 years ago at an old Piggery and then progressed to a footy field! The vibe has continued to grow and this year, the artists are phenomenal. David Gray, Buddy Guy, Public Enemy, Bob Geldof, The Blind Boys From Alabama, Pete Murray...need I say more. Let me fill you in on some of the acts which are fronting this year: Public Enemy – one of hip hop's greatest - these guys rewrote the rules of hip hop and became the most influential and controversial rap group of the late '80's and for many, the definitive rap group of all time. Pioneering a variation of hardcore rap that was musically and politically revolutionarv. Public Enemy have had a lasting impact on popular music and popular culture. Their albums, 'It takes a Nation of Millions to Hold Us Back' and 'Fear of a Black Planet' were revolutionary releases and includes singles '911 is a Joke' which criticised emergency response units for taking more time to service people in the black community than in the white. Public Enemy revolutionised the rap world with their political, social and cultural consciousness, which infused itself into skilled and poetic rhymes with jazzy backbeats. Also appearing is blues legend Buddy Guy. I saw him 15 years ago in an old Brisbane pub and was completely blown away. People were packed out onto the footpaths in a show that must have gone for four hours. It was absolutely euphoric. I left feeling as though I'd had a spiritual experience. The man is a giver. He has a colossal musical resume and many hardearned accolades. He's a Rock and Roll Hall of Fame inductee, a chief guitar

>> GETTING BIGGER



These blokes are uber cool, which is ironic seeing as they emerged from some highly religious god fearing family. This is just a

>> KNOCK ON **WOODFORD**

This year the Woodford Folk Festival celebrates its 20th event. So what's in store for patrons who rock up for this year's six-day festival that starts at brekkie time on December 27 and plays through to midnight January 1? The festival's program manager Michael Peterson, who has been working all year lining up the ingredients, gives a taste of the wonderful things to come. 'The festival this year is unmistakably Woodford and it has been given a real change-up and refreshment,' said Michael. 'It's now time to consider, while maintaining our traditions and our core, to look at regenerating as well for the next generation, the future of the festival and sustainability of its cultural program. This year, apart from the surprises and unexpected, unscheduled performances that occur at Woodford every year we have 1850 scheduled performances over the six days. Basically, that is more than 300 per day.' Following on last year's unprecedented success of the circus programme, the vaudeville, cabaret, variety and burlesque elements of this year's festival have been expanded. 'Not only do we have a circus tent this year but we also have a variety stage running day and night with all manner of theatrics and musical theatre. That venue is called The Empire and will be running into the wee hours,' said Michael. For those who want to pick up a circus skill another venue has been added. It's called Circadia and for those who join the workshops under the tutelage of nationally and internationally renowned circus trainers there's a chance to

tumble, juggle and swing in a real show. Street theatre has become a special drawcard at Woodford, performers attracting passing festivalgoers like iron filings to a particularly strong magnet. This year organisers say the Woodford festival streets promise to be far more alive and exciting than they have ever been. 'Giant puppetry is another aspect we are bringing to the festival – puppets from six inches high to seven metres high. You'll find them in venues, in gypsy caravans; there'll even be roving puppets on pushbikes. 



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

BROKEN FLOWERS

Jim Jarmusch steadfastly refuses to be constrained by the Hollywood template. His movies are always a bit skewed and rarely concerned with neat resolutions. This is the story of Don Johnston, a has-been Lothario whose partner leaves him just before he receives an anonymous letter from an old flame with the news that the son he never knew he had will seek him out. Johnston goes looking for past loves in order to clear up the riddle of his unexpected fatherhood. As Johnston, Bill Murray's forte of non-acting is perfect almost to a fault. The responses of the women with whom he reacquaints himself vary from the sexually willing, to the clumsy and frosty, and the outright aggressive. It is they who put Johnston's life into context and nudge him towards a resigned self-awareness. The humour is gentle and the style minimalist, if a little studied. All of the supporting players are excellent, with Alexis Dziena a show-stopper as Lolita, the daughter of one of his ex girlfriends. Part road trip, part romantic mystery, Johnston's journey is a melancholy one that, as ever, ends where it begins. **John Campbell**

The reason she has become known as this is an old story: after waiting for her fiancé before they were to be married, her groom arrives and kills her! She rests in the ground to wait for her soul mate, whether he knows he is the Corpse Bride's groom or not. It's a cold dark night, the moon is full, the stars are bright and the forest is a little bit creepy. Wandering through the black mangled trees, Victor (Depp) just can't memorize his wedding vows; he keeps jumbling the words. Victor ends up in the dark forest ringing his hands and muttering his vows, the vows that the Corpse Bride hears, bringing her out of the grave. Thus Victor suddenly finds himself accidentally married to another woman, a voluptuous bombshell bride who also happens to be dead. This animated film is visually stunning! **Ross Goode**

Locally based music website www.soundfoundation. com.au provides signed and unsigned artists the opportunity to sell and promote their

'It's all about getting music out:

there in the public domain,' says Eastman, 'the more opportunity there is to hear an artist, the more chance there is of sales

'The music is sold as downloadable MP3's, and there is no joing fee for musicians, and uploads of MP3 files and brief biographies are also free, 'Eastland explains. His background is in graphic design (both print and web) and photography. Having worked as a director in top Australian advertising and photography agencies, he is well skilled to administrate the sophisticated site. Profits from downloads are split

evenly between artists and Sound Foundation.

Unlike many websites offering simply a self administrated 'postings', the artists are screened to assure high quality content and professional sound production.


Eastland claims the site has received over 22,000 visits in nine months and has generated sales in 12 countries.

The Eurogliders, Jez, Forte, Scarlett Affection and Afro Dizzi Act are just some of the sixty artists that have submitted music to the site, and it is accredited by Australasian

Performing Right Association Australia (APRA) and the Australasian Mechanical Copyright Owners Society (AMCOS).

Recently, Eastland helped change legislation in relation to podcasting (downloading MP3's on demand) and covers of music under copyright. Originally, artists were not allowed to release a cover of a song as an MP3 download, however after Eastland liased with APRA, this is now legislation.

Teamwork, magical touches and creativity mean the world to Kim Mitchell. A Mullumbimby angel really - her tireless efforts in community and festival based work are an inspiration. Happiest when she's working with others to create an event that members of the community will benefit from, she's well known for her optimistic outlook in making sure that the job gets done. 'Let's creatively put it together, so there can be something extra for community,' says Kim. Community event organisers are often reliant on local business generosity as their main source of funding, and with business owners constantly invited to support 'such and such' from the 'blah blah,' Kim recognises their important contribution. 'They show fantastic spirit, and support artistic development within the community,' she says. 'I know sometimes business owners can feel a bit drained by everything that goes on. but their support is always really appreciated'. Although Kim doesn't get paid for the work she does, she explains that it comes back in different realms. Given a gift voucher for her own use, she instead used it as a raffle prize for a charitable cause, but having no

LITTLE FISH

Little Fish is an interesting portrayal of how heroin addiction impacts a cross section of people in suburban Sydney. The "little fish" in the multi-million dollar heroin trade swim around in circles, trying to escape the lives they are stuck with - some with more success than others. Tracy (Cate Blanchett) lives with the legacy of her former addiction, faced with temptation to fall back to her old ways, and constantly hitting a brick wall in her attempts to start her own business and escape her stagnant existence. Blanchett is, of course, strong in her portrayal, which was apparently inspired by her real-life interviews with addicts. The moment when she is tempted to return to her old ways is genuinely disturbing. Noni Hazelhurst is particularly excellent as tormented mum Janelle, desperate to keep her family from sinking, once again, into the mire. Hugo Weaving is convincing in his role has a drugaddled former football hero. His strong performance is



boosted by his startling physical transformation. Watch out for Dustin Nguyen, who you might remember from '80s teen cop show 21 Jump Street. His accent is a little confused, which we can probably write off as the result of his character's multi-national background. Although the pic takes its time to build up pace, it's a deeply moving exploration of the underside of life in Sydney suburbia. Some sub-plots work much better than others, but the film is well worth a look, especially if you are a fan of the talented cast who shine here. Ross Goode

Last Saturday saw the festival of Saturnalia. 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Summer means mangoes

There is a new breed of mangoes whose skin you may eat. A case of pure serendipity led a Queensland-based company to develop this particular strain, which they have christened the Honey Gold Mango – an uncontrolled cross between a Kensington Pride seed parent and an unknown pollen parent in 1996 giving birth to this unique hybrid variety. Pinata Marketing Australia is hoping to export the fruit across the globe; already feedback has been excellent. Honey Gold Mangoes can be bitten into and eaten just like apple s except for the risk of the spurting sticky juices. (It is hard to talk about mangoes, any mangoes, without resorting to language almost sexual: these are, after all, the sexiest of fruits, and the most sensual. And in India they are a symbol of love.)

Summer, amongst so much else, means mangoes. Mangoes challenge description: they taste of both the earth and the sun, flesh lush and fibrous, faintly sweetly feral. A box of mangoes is a perfect Christmas present, each heavy bulb a promise of pleasure. And yet for many years I resisted them: despite the flavour they seemed too much of an effort to eat. Before I learnt other ways of doing so and well before the invention of the Honey Golds. I could not imagine how to open then eat a mango without being in a bath. Unlike apples they cannot be sliced neatly down their centres then into segments - too much trouble and too much mess meant it was simpler to stick to peaches.

And then I learnt the restaurant way: the carving off of the cheeks on either side of the pit, scoring their flesh into tidy little squares then turning the cheek inside out to expose an edible work of art, cubes seared cleanly away from the skin. Once I had mastered that there was no stopping me – the only disadvantage being that a knife was required, and preferably a small dish into which to tumble the golden cubes.

Only quite recently was I shown another way, a way which means that when there is just you and a mango your desire will still be satisfied in quite the simplest manner - no knives, no small dishes, no baths needed. Best done on a headland overlooking ocean,



with a path which can quickly lead you down to water afterwards. Bite, merely bite through the skin and with your teeth peel it back, then sink your mouth into that honey golden earth-and sunshine flesh. The juices melting past your chin. Food and drink in one weighty package - nourishment and nectar.

I look forward, however, to trying one of these mangoes with edible skins. Their press release came accompanied by recipes, and I offer the following very easy and delicious dessert.

GRILLED MANGO WITH CINNAMON CREAM

Slice 3 Honey Golds away from seed and grill on an oiled moderately hot BBQ for about 6 - 8 minutes, turning occasionally until grill marks form. Arrange on a serving platter and serve with 1 cup of sour cream to which you have added 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 teaspoon of cinnamon (or more to taste) and 1 teaspoon liquid honey.
