Greens MLC Ian Cohen, who was a member of the parliamentary committee, said that the recommendations also called on the state government to better handle claims for compensation for those who are affected by the highway or face compulsory acquisition of properties.

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Council takes big stick to dirty dogs

Byron Shire Council Rangers will be conducting a blitz on uncontrolled dogs during this holiday period.

Byron Shire Council General Manager, Ms Pamela Westing, said dog owners face potential fines of \$110 if their dogs are found in prohibited areas, and \$220 for failing to pick up and remove their dog's droppings.

'The compliance action against uncontrolled dogs and their owners will be increased these holidays following a spate of recent complaints about dogs in prohibited areas on local beaches,' said Ms Westing.

'Council's rangers will be targeting all Shire beaches during the Christmas/New Year holiday period. Council provides a number of dog exercise areas throughout the Shire and dog owners are encouraged to use these so as not to cause nuisance to other members of the public.'

into the high thirties, bushfire season is well and truly here, and the Rural Bushfire Service is urging people to take sensible precautions. Dave Cook, Far North Coast manager of the service told The Echo that while the current fire danger is high, it is likely to increase over the next few days as temperatures rise.

'Recent storm activity has helped keep bushfire activity down over the Christmas period,' said Mr Cook. 'However, with the likely rise in temperatures over the next few days, that could easily change. We've restricted fire permits and have refused them altogether until January 3 unless it is an agricultural emergency. We are keen to discourage people from burning off their rubbish until this hot weather has passed.'

For people who live in a bushfire zone, Mr Cook advised that they should ensure that all gutters are free of leaves and debris;

Called 'Floor Studio', the setting is intended to replace the obstetric bed for the great majority of births. According to Ms Boenigk, the setting is a creativey, comfortable and safe environment that empowers labouring women and offers them childbirth with dignity. Its simplicity strikes a deep chord in couples preparing for childbirth, and they are highly motivated by the prospect of active participation in the birthing process.

'Eligible projects include preparation of conservation management plans, works to protect or stabilise the fabric of places or to reverse the causes of deterioration and works to repair, reinstate or restore the fabric of historic places.

'To be eligible, places must be entered on the Australian Government's National Heritage List or the state government statutory heritage register.

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New Issue of Resident Parking Coupon

Byron Shire Council is currently issuing the 'New Resident Parking Coupon' for use in the designated paid parking areas of Byron Bay. All residents who currently have

the old "CP" parking coupon are required to re-apply for the new red parking coupon. The old "CP" coupon will remain valid during this change over period when affixed to the vehicle it was issued. The Old "CP" coupon will be phased out early 2006.

In accordance with Council's resolution, a resident parking coupon will be issued to each vehicle that is registered in New South Wales to a residential address in the Byron Shire. Residents wishing to apply for a parking coupon will be required to supply a copy of their current New South Wales vehicle registration certificate, displaying a residential address to Council for processing.

Residents who operate a business vehicle are required to submit all of the following:-

• copy of the current vehicle certificate registration showing the vehicle is registered as business / commercial use, copy of your current New South Wales driver's licence displaying your current Byron Shire residential address and a copy of a current utility bill displaying your current Byron Shire residential address. Resident parking coupons will only be posted out to the address as represented on the certificate of registration, or in the case of business registered vehicles, posted to the address as represented on the driver's licence. Please ensure address details are correct on the certificate of registration prior to applying. If you need to change your address please contact the Road and Traffic Authority prior to applying.



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There are minimum requirements residents need to provide in order to receive a resident parking coupon. Please note that it is the responsibility of applicants to ensure they provide the correct paperwork for processing.

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Jarjum Playground a step closer

Plans for the Jarjum Playground at Clarkes Beach, Byron Bay, have been finalised and it is one step closer to being built, according to Jarjum Association secretary Laurel Judell.

Byron Shire Council agreed at the November 22, 2005 meeting to seek approval from the Department of Lands to allocate \$200,000 from Crown Reserves towards the construction of the Jarjum Playground. Department of Lands' Susan Tracey told *The Echo* that an audit review was currently being completed before the money will be considered for allocation. The audit should be completed by early this year. The Jarjum Association

For whom the road tolls

With the egg still fresh on its face from the fiasco of the Cross City Tunnel, you would think the state government would have vetoed any mention of the words public private partnership (PPP) or toll road for at least another six months.

Yet two days before Christmas, a suspiciously convenient time for making major announcements, the state and federal governments announced a solution to the endless delays in upgrading the Pacific Highway – a completely new road called the North Coast Motorway, which may require a toll and will probably be managed by the private sector.

Perhaps NSW roads minister Joe Tripodi thought the experience of sweating in holiday traffic for hours would convince motorists that a toll road delivered through a PPP is a palatable solution. It is a worrying development. In Australia we have come to expect free highways as a right, particularly in country areas where long distances are travelled just to visit a medical specialist, for example.

Roads are provided by government as a public service, to make the wheels of society go around and hopefully make road travel safer. The private sector operates roads to make money, it is not its job to look out for our interests.

The Cross City Tunnel illustrates a practice found overseas where private road operators pressure governments to restrict access to alternative free routes and even reduce funding for standard maintenance. Those who can't afford, or choose philosphically not to use, a tollway could be left with an unmaintained goat track as their much publicised free alternative.

Becton home and hosed?

It seems extremely unlikely that the state government will not approve Becton's revised application for its Byron Bay resort, North Beach. NSW planning minister Frank Sartor announced he would make the decision on the controversial development, despite Byron Shire Council's protestations it was their baby.

After initially seeking approval for a 370 room resort a few years ago, Becton has reduced its plans down to 290 rooms, 40 bedrooms above the limit set by Council in its development control plan for the environmentally sensitive site. Sartor could easily play Mr Reasonable by arguing Becton's latest plans are close enough to Council's desired outcome, so let's all agree and get on with it.

Mayor Jan Barham's concerns that this latest proposal is merely the first bite at the cherry and, if approved, will be followed by subsequent stages seem to be borne out by the fact that land zoned for tourism development has not been included in the DA.

Becton Corporation has been a major donor to the state Labor party and it could be seen to be payback time. Becton executives always said they were in for the long haul and now it seems the wait might have been worth it.

\$50 toll to Newcastle, predicts NRMA

If a tollway is built to replace the Pacific Highway, motorists could be paying \$50 to drive to Newcastle from the Oueensland border, according to research undertaken by the NRMA. The state and federal governments signed an agreement before Christmas to investigate a separate major road, the North Coast Motorway, between Newcastle and the Queensland border. The charging of tolls is one option being looked at to fund the estimated \$8 billion construction cost.

'We may be able to get the job done a lot more quickly if the private sector is involved in the financing, which would then require a toll on new or upgraded sections,' said Federal Roads Minister, Jim Lloyd.

The early rounds of the 2005/6 Australian Championships in Brisbane have richly fulfilled the hopes of the organisers, who broke with tradition in inviting three foreign Grandmasters to compete in Australia's premier domestic tournament.

The foreign stars were invited in order to give local players a chance to achieve Grandmaster results in the event and Queensland's David Smerdon has taken the opportunity with both hands. Smerdon, 21, entered the tournament with his Olympiad place in question but his early results have confirmed that the Melbourne University student is a rare talent.

In the first three rounds Smerdon defeated NSW Champion Andrew Bird, drew with top seeded Lubomir Ftacnik of Slovakia and then outpointed third

falling to Ftacnik. However both have bounced back and have everything to play for - Olympic places, Grandmaster results and even the dream of the Australian title - in the later rounds. However first prize in the tournament looks likely to be won by one of the five competing Grandmasters. New Zealand born Englishman Murray Chandler was the early leader

but Ftacnik, having recovered from an early bout of jet-lag, remains favourite. The most spectacular finish of the Championship to date came from unfancied WA player Jay Lakner.

Mad, bad and dangerous to know?

Entering into almost mythic took me into detention. proportions is the US peace activist, Scott Parkin, who was deported from Australia on Were you allowed to commu-September 15, 2005, for being deemed a threat to national security. I spoke to him on the phone while he was waiting to catch a plane at Houston Airport and put it to him that the as a surprise.

Yeah, it took me completely off-guard and left me completely baffled.

Then you were escorted out of the country with a guard that you had to pay for.

Two guards and I had to pay for their tickets to and from Los Angeles from Melbourne and I had to pay for their accommodation in Los Angeles.

Why did you come to Australia?

I came mostly just to vacation and backpack in your country, snorkel and surf and stuff like that. I'm an activist, an anti-war activist and I also wanted to network with local activists and give some talks about what we were doing in the US, so I did.

And that was when you knew they had an interest in you.

No, they are completely ridiculous. I said this a lot in the Australian media, I'd never ever harm an animal. I think these animals are abused enough by the police when they use them as crowd control. I definitely wouldn't do anything to urge protesters to hurt them and as for us unarresting people or springing You refused an interview with people from the clutches of the police, I have several times when I was in Australia, got up and said that was a bad idea. Certainly in the United States that leads to things like assault on a police officer.

Well, Dick Cheney, former CEO of Halliburton, is the Vice President of the United States. Since Bush and Cheney have been in power Halliburton has received over \$30 billion (US) in nobid contracts for the reconstruction of Iraq and the logistical support of the illegal occupation going on in Iraq. To me and many other people in the US it's just like a revolving door of corporate influence going in and out of the White House and we have worked really hard on trying to raise awareness on that issue. I think we've met some success. I mean Halliburton's still in Iraq, but Halliburton is also a household name that is synonymous with corruption and cronyism in this country at this point.

What is it that Halliburton do?

They do a number of things. They're in the oil infrastructure in Iraq, they provide services which help support that, like piping and engineering and stuff like that. They also own a company called KBR, or Kellogg, Brown & Root, which provides a lot of logistical support - they do laundry, food services and cafeteria services, and deliver things around Iraq. They are also the ones who have the contracts to help build these 14 permanent bases over there in Iraq I've been campaigning on which the US is currently implementing.

It's a growth market really,

Yeah, it's like one segment of our country goes and bombs and kills and another segment comes and rebuilds and profits from it.

Would you come back to Australia, Scott?

Sure.

Do you get this kind of attention in America?

I have got a little bit of attention, but nowhere near the attention I did in Australia. A friend of mine who helped a lot when I was in jail said I was the 'Cindy Sheehan of Australia', and she was the one who did media for Cindy Sheehan so she'd be the one to know.

Cindy was the one at Camp Casey at Bush's ranch in Houston. I believe his approval rating's at an all time low.

I read somewhere that he was lower than Richard Nixon at the height of Watergate. Currently his approval rating with African Americans in the US is 2%.

Today [October 27, 2005] the 2,000th American soldier was killed in Iraq and there are protests springing up all over the US today and Cindy Sheehan, the anti-war mother, the mother of a slain soldier, is chaining herself to the White House today.

You think I'm PSYCHO, don't you, Mama?

Jacko and Chopper's testimonial on what it's like being a Wild **Colonial psycho**

ver the last four years, two of Australia's most well known and loved popular icons have toured the country letting the lip slip, recounting rather disturbing real life anecdotes and revealing an unlikely world perspective. Most people would need no introduction to ex AFL star turned comedian/ actor/raconteuur, Mark Jacko Jackson and his legendary accomplice Chopper Read, crim/author/artist/ and inspiration for one of the seminal Aussie films of the nineties.

According to Jacko, their success on the live circuit has a lot to do with their ability to keep it fresh, to keep it real.

'It changes every night. I've never heard Chopper do the same show twice. He has no idea at all and a lot depends on what his food is like. As long as the food doesn't resemble prison food the show is

outstanding, but if it is he gets a little bit reserved ...

This puts a bit of pressure on the kitchen to come up with the goods, because as Mark says: 'we eat at the venue... and providing the food's really good there will be a really good show!'

'People won't be bored, I line Chopper up before he goes on and then pick up all the pieces. Now we got two comedians, Nick the hippy - he killed them there last time - we found him in Perth, and now we have another bloke, who is the MC comedian, auctioner, The Dickster - from Fat Pizza.'

This is not a conventional show, and in saying so, some very unconventional things have happened to the blokes in the course of touring. It was traveling through the desert that Jacko recalled a particularly extraordinary event.

'We were driving out on this 10 k stretch of road and the car got hit by two 303 bullets. We were just coming out of Mt Magnet - and we hadn't seen so many dead animals, and we got hit by two shots on the

side. They pierced the side of the car and smashed into the beer, and we debated it whether we should go to the cops, but didn't because he put it down to a drunken roo shooter...'

'These shows are unique - they don't hide under the bed - it's hugely patriotic. We don't say the 'c' word, we say the 'F' word. The stories can be on the heavy side, but if people want to see some hard core stories, you only get a chance – to see one time in your life, it's like getting a chance to see Ned Kelly ...

Jacko also notes the extraordinary public fascination with the man who is Chopper Read.

'You see Chopper's paintings up against a Greg Norman golf stick (auction) you know what it will go for money... that's the Australian way, we haven't lost that appeal. I wouldn't like to do 23 years... to get a reputation like that. He owns up for what he does and corrects people about what he hasn't done.'

So why the live route?

'When I was at the peak of my luck in Australia I never sold out to any TV station, because I felt why

should I, why sell to one particular outlet, a lot of people do - you see so many sportsman that take that contract, and by doing that you burn a lot of bridges, by the same token, I am still working 25 years after I retired.

'I diversified, I wrote a book, I brought out a punk record, I did professional fights. You get to an age and you think I should have done those things, then you got to take advantage of that - if there's anything in the world that I like, it's doing comedy. I'm an anecdotal comic - I tell stories about my life about what has happened, I get infuriated with these comedians that get up and do these gags - I tell stories of things that actually happened to me, and use the language that was used.

'I've really got a story to tell, I have come from nothing and made something out of nothing... I don't do keynote talks, I refuse to do those talks, what sort of speaker does that? No one really gains anything from that unless you have the art of captivating and give people

something... Now they have this new thing of life coaches, give me a fucking break, didn't god give you a brain? You have to wonder where these life coaches have come from. And people are giving this shit to people and they're eating as much as they can!'

And Jacko's take on the violence erupting on Sydney beaches?

'You've only got to look at the politicians, what would they possibly know about what happens in the street, they wouldn't have a clue because they are not on the street ... and again, it's the dogooders, because we don't have strength in our policing - saying that political correctness has to be adhered to. Politically correct people should come and listen to this show, just to get their minds right about what happens, firstly their jaws would drop, that these things actually happen, really, it's a different story... Don't be scared, we've never had any trouble.'

Hollywood's social conscience has not yet resulted in an outraged expose of how actors like Jim Carrey are paid more for making a movie than most of his audience will earn in a lifetime. Was it a millionaire who said 'imagine no possessions?' The greed of corporate America is a topical but less challenging target, as Dick plummets from the heights to struggle street, his company gone bust after its directors' illegal asset stripping. THE CHRONICLES **OF NARNIA**

Lewis Carroll's Alice plunged through the looking glass into a land of tricksters and riddlers. Narnia, at the back

of a wardrobe, is a more troubled kingdom. As in the 'real world,' where the Luftwaffe is bombing London, the barbarians are at the gate and C S Lewis's child heroes, whose coming has been prophesied, will oppose the White Witch and her murderous rabble. Plenty has been made of the film's Christian iconography - there is even a resurrection - but it is primarily a king and country epic, with no room to doubt the rightness of war. The concluding battle is redolent of Shakespeare's Henry V and it is more rousing for it. It's a visual treat throughout but, at a time of breathtaking SFX, it's good to see a director (Andrew Adamson) not too proud to utilise the elementary day-for-night technique in one nocturnal scene - which in itself exemplifies what is a curiously old fashioned movie. Concerned with loyalty, truth and courage, and featuring fauns, centaurs and talking animals (the cockney Mr and Mrs Beaver are standouts), it is less imposing than the Rings but much more intimate. Shane Kennedy was the brother I never had, my landlord, my flatmate, my close friend in addition to having been half of this small local business which supplies markets and cafés with more than just muffins. Shane always supplied more than just love, to so many people. I first met him about four years ago when his film star looks, as my mother would have described them, disarmed me. Mid-thirties, low-voiced, courteous and utterly charming, he disarmed me more by the fact that he was the only gay man I was actually attracted to

Shane was Barry's partner, their home a large sprawling property just out of Byron Bay where they would throw lavish parties, with designated parking lots for the scores of people who would cluster around the swimming pool or the bar area with its strands of fairylights. Generosity was the keynote in all their soirees: the endless succession of platters, drinks topped up, long table under the stars set with beautiful linen, the air perfumed with barbecued meats and fish. Shane: batik kerchief, frangipani behind one ear, drifting from group to group, a kind word to everyone, his laugh ringing out into the night.

I moved into the cottage on their property and began to better know him. The most gentle man, he spent much of his time on the property maintaining the extensive subtropical gardens, plant life and trees whose splendour is our medium. Animals and plants responded to him in the same way that humans did: gardens most glorious sprung up under his delicate fingers; dogs, horses, chooks, cats, ducks, peacocks his children, ranging freely across the ten acres of wellcropped lawns and vegetable beds. Shane used to leave flowers on the windscreen of my car. Or curl a glamorous floral arrangement around the door handle of my cottage. The night I nearly died because a mosquito coil had dropped, still smouldering, on to an old fabric bag then filled the cottage with smoke, it was Shane's voice calling me out of a semi-asphyxiated sleep at midnight then his hand hauling me out into the night and back into life

It was Shane who lit a hundred tea-light candles all around the swimming pool to greet me late one night I arrived home. I parked the car, walked through the garage and into a fairyland, a kidney-shape of tiny lights describing the glossy silent pool then

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the short path which leads to my cottage. It must have taken him so long to light the candles, set an inch apart, to create this magical homecoming. He called me Gorgeous and Beautiful when I was at my most frumpishly dull. He left homemade biscuits, muffins still warm, a packet of soft ginger sweets on my dining table.

Shane really needed a new liver in order to turn forty. Too ill, finally, for the operation, he decided that he just wanted to come home from the hospital where he had spent several twisted, tortured weeks, and be there for as long as it lasted. We were all waiting for the ambulance to bring him home: his family and his closest friends - we were all there when the bed he had travelled in had manoeuvred him into his own bedroom - we were all there for him to take in, one final beautiful image of love so fierce it charged the air, before giving up, sliding away. He was making cards - magazine cuttings pasted on to bright cardboard - for all his friends the week before he died, and one of the several he made for me says, 'We are all so lucky to live where we do. Just waking up is a beautiful thing, all the birds. I love it.' I am incapable of reading this without crumpling.
