

Nationals oppose highway toll

The State opposition will not support tolls on the Pacific Highway said Deputy Leader of the Nationals, Don Page on Monday. Leader of the Nationals and Shadow Minister for Roads Andrew Stoner arrived in Ballina today (Tuesday) to announce his opposition to a plan by the State Labor government to investigate tolls as a way of speeding up construction on the Pacific Highway north of Newcastle.

be publicly funded, this is a more appropriate mechanism to use for the main road joining Queensland and Sydney,' Mr Page told The Echo.

Calculations by the Nationals indicate that tolls on motorists would have to be substantial to repay the investment by the private sector to

city toll projects.

'The bottom line is that in country areas traffic volumes are not as high as in the city. Whereas tolls in the city might be reasonable we would have to pay substantial tolls in the country. We don't want the country to be asked to sign a blank cheque in relation to tolls. There is no guarantee we wouldn't see motorists being charged a hefty toll.

'If the private sector operates financial dividend that they must extract for their shareholders. If the government does it [operates the road] they are producing a social dividend,' said Mr Page.

Under the new funding arrangements for the upgrade of the Pacific Highway, the state and federal governupgrade the highway because ments are each contributing of the low vehicle numbers in \$160 million a year. This



New Issue of Resident Parking Coupon

Byron Shire Council is currently issuing the 'New Resident Parking Coupon' for use in the designated paid parking areas of Byron Bay. All residents who currently have the old "CP" parking coupon are required to re-apply for the new red parking coupon. The old "CP" coupon will remain valid during this change over period when affixed to the vehicle it was issued. The Old "CP" coupon will be phased out early 2006.

In accordance with Council's resolution, a resident parking coupon will be issued to each vehicle that is registered in New South Wales to a residential address in the Byron Shire. Residents wishing to apply for a parking coupon will be required to supply a copy of their current New South Wales vehicle registration certificate, displaying a residential address to Council for processing.

Residents who operate a business vehicle are required to submit all of the

- copy of the current vehicle certificate registration showing the vehicle is registered as business / commercial use,
- copy of your current New South Wales driver's licence displaying your current Byron Shire residential address and a copy of a current utility bill displaying your current Byron Shire residential address.

Resident parking coupons will only be posted out to the address as represented on the certificate of registration, or in the case of business registered vehicles, posted to the address as represented on the driver's licence. Please ensure address details are correct on the certificate of registration prior to applying. If you need to change your address please contact the Road and Traffic Authority prior to applying.

There are minimum requirements residents need to provide in order to receive a resident parking coupon. Please note that it is the responsibility of applicants to ensure they provide the correct paperwork for processing.

Byron Shire Council's General Manager, Pamela Westing says that 'Council has commenced action to have the caveat lapse via the normal processes in the Lands Department'. Attempts to contact the Sports Association were unsuccessful.

An extraordinary meeting of Council has been called for today (Tuesday) to hear the rescission motion on Lot 107 as well as other matters not dealt with at the December 20 ordinary meeting.



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

The time for submissions to Ballina Shire Council on the Lake Ainsworth Crown Reserve (Draft) Master Plan is running out.

Closing date is Friday Ianuary 13 and Lyn Walker of the Lake Ainsworth Community Access Group is urging interested parties to give their opinions on the plan.

The Access Group was the status quo. established in April 2004 in order to save the lake from overdevelopment after a redevelopment proposal for new community park area in the caravan park was put before Council.

Following a public meeting between the group and Council in June 2004, Council agreed that the wellbeing of the lake needed to be a priority. 

A town reclaimed

New Years Eve in Byron Bay this year was a success.

For years we had been told that attempts to stop people coming into town would be futile. What was wrong with young people enjoying themselves on one night of the year, we were asked. We had to provide entertainment or the crowd would turn ugly, we were warned.

Of course there were also commercial interests at stake here. Many in the business community benefit financially from the influx of revellers on December 31, and while some were prepared to sacrifice their bottom line for a return to sanity, a minority was

We had reached the point where the price being asked of the community to 'tame the beast' was too high. Not just in what it was costing Council in hard cash, but more importantly in the effect on the local community. No longer could we stand by and watch our town being literally trashed year after year, particularly for a party that many did not feel safe attending.

Changing tack on New Years Eve was a gamble that has paid off. That it could be turned around in one year is a minor miracle and one for the greater good of the community and the town's image.

There have been losers however in all this and we are beginning to hear the rumbling from some businesses who claim their revenue has dropped and are urging a return to larger crowds. Conversely others in the commercial sector say their income is up and anecdotal evidence points to fewer tourists spending more.

Tourist numbers to Byron Bay have grown steadily over the past decade, increasing the height of the peaks in the summer and reducing the depth of the troughs in winter. We have reached a point where questions are being asked about what level of tourism the town can sustainably handle and this New Years Eve demonstrated that numbers can be successfully controlled.

There has to be a trade-off between a business's right to make money and a resident's right to enjoy a sense of peace and community. The streets of Byron Bay have been swarming with visitors for the past two weeks and those businesses who say they are struggling must not be meeting the market. In the fickle tourism game it can sometimes be hard to foretell what the successful product or service will be and in the Bay this is exacerbated by the large number of competing services. That is an obvious consequence of doing business in a hot market.

There will undoubtedly be pressure brought to bear on the New Years Eve committee to change the formula and ramp up the numbers again. This is pressure which should be resisted.

We have reclaimed our town – for at least one night - now let's make sure we hang onto it. In addition, the issue of community safety, particularly for women, on a year-round basis needs to be looked at seriously.

This will not happen without the goodwill of Council, business and a wider community intent on beating the cultural 'norms' which lead to violence.







For when massive atmospheric this reason carbon dioxide is pollution, including high levels of carbon dioxide, resulted in very high temperatures on Earth's surface. Believed to be from asteroid impact with earth, the resultant global warming caused the extinction of most of our larger animals including dinosaurs.

> As distinct from the above natural events, we are now experiencing similar rapid global warming directly dioxide, into our thin, sensitive and delicate atmosphere. The abuse of our life-giving

Carbon dioxide has the property to absorb the sun's infrared radiation which would otherwise be a major player in global warming as it effectively blankets the earth's surface thereby not allowing heat to escape.

Australian dentists improve Tibetan smiles

Noone likes going to the dentist, lying with your mouth open while someone prods, drills and injects is the closest most of us will come to torture. Try to imagine what the experience is like for a Tibetan child who has never been near a dentist and what's more probably doesn't even know what a dentist does.

Late last year a team of five Australian dental workers, including Mullumbimby dentist Michael Leach, visited remote villages in the foothills of the Himalayas offering dental treatment to Tibetan children. Queues of children from eight to 14 years of age patiently waited to see a man from a strange land, with a strange white face and a lot of really scary looking instruments. Many overcame their fear in return for the promise of relief from the misery of toothache.

While most Australians visit the dentist at least every few years, the majority of Tibetan children have never had any professional dental care. As a result Michael Leach saw eight or nine year old children with teeth hollowed out by decay.



New audio guide for tourists

A new Audio Guide Kit for visitors to the Byron region has just been released. The kit contains a detailed map of the region which has three colour coded routes clearly marked (gold, red and blue), together with an audio CD which has easy to follow instructions to complement the map.

The CD can be played on either the car or a personal CD player. Both the map and the CD are contained in a plastic case.

The kit is available through various business outlets in and around Byron, including the Byron Visitors Centre, for \$24.95. The kit is also available at the Ballina and Lismore Visitor Information Centres.

Although the routes start and finish at Byron Bay, the kits are designed so that people can start anywhere on any of the routes. They identify the appropriate track number from the map and start the CD at that track.

The Gold Route covers Mullum, Crystal Castle, Minyon Falls, Rocky Creek Ewingsdale.



The ongoing Xstrata Aus-Championship BrisbanehasturnedintothDavid Smerdon show, with the 21year-old International Master heading for Grandmaster performance; Australia's first such result for a decade.

Between rounds two and six of the Championship Smerdon not only took on all five Grandmasters in the tournament - he also remained undefeated, defeating Australian number two Darryl Johansen and German GM Roland Schmaltz and drawing with the top three seeds, Lubomir Ftacnik, Murray Chandler and this writer.

A win over defending Australian Champion Gary Lane in the seventh round left Smerdon tied for the lead in the tournament and needing only modest results against lower seeds in the final rounds to start on the road to becoming Australia's third Grandmaster. Smerdon has been tipped for greatness 15-year-old he gained the International Master title, finished third in the Australian Open and became the ACF Player of the Year.

Prior to the Australian Championships, Smerdon expressed the fear that his Olympic position was in jeopardy after modest results in 2005 but now he could be seen as challenging for the number two board on the team, a position which has been Darryl Johansen's for two decades.

The individual encounter between the two rivals in Brisbane, given below, proved a good omen for the new guard, Smerdon catching Johansen in a sharp prepared line and winning convincingly.



2006 could be a breakthrough year for a new local company that has launched the FruitWise hydroponic system in Australia and New Zealand, and it is generating much interest. Based in Billinudgel, HydroGarden Australia Pty Ltd has just begun to market the system to new and existing strawberry and herb growers in both Australia, NZ as well as SE Asia.

The system was developed as a way to make strawberry production more efficient, maximising the use of space. Productivity is a key selling point, as pickers can harvest from up to 80 plants from the same position, and the design offers the grower the opportunity to pack direct into punnets, reducing handling time and fruit damage.

FruitWise only uses around 50 ml of water per plant per day, so water savings are huge. The system means there is no need to use herbicides and pesticide use can also be virtually eliminated when growing in a protective structure.

She's got the kind of face, the kind of voice, and the kind of talent that could have seen her waltz into any record company and snap up a contract. The only thing she doesn't have is the attitude, as Ember herself puts it 'some people are drawn to buck the system.' Ms Swift is definitely a system bucker. She credits the trend towards independent artists to a world wide movement that seeks to source its own music, and not have tastes dictated by the corporate music machine.

'There's been a huge increase in respect for and credibility of independent artists. It's very much a grass roots movement. I feel really strongly about the union between art and activism and for me my art has always been hand in hand with my political perspectives, and my hope for change.

Holocaust victim, the teenage Ann Frank scribes in her remarkable diary 'In spite of everything, I still believe people are good at heart.' A breathtaking act of optimism and compassion in the face of the darkest face of human cruelty. We can't all be as hopeful as Ann Frank, especially seeing as we know the end to her story. How does one maintain belief in positive change in a world that seems so quick to thwart it?







TCR records is one of the pioneering breakbeat labels. What's it like working alongside Rennie Pilgrem and co? Rennie's been in the game for a long time, he's cool, he knows

how to treat people and has that old school vibe. The rest of the boys are cool too – some colourful characters.

What's it like DJing in a male dominated genre – is talent enough?

You've gotta be able to deliver the goods if you wanna get respect. I've been doing this a long time now so I don't get phased there has definitely been some tough times but you just keep working and it pays off.

What are you working on now, production wise?

When I return to the UK I'll be doing an online mix album for Distinctive which will be available in March 06. I'm producing an Electro House 12 – which will appeal to B/beat and Electro heads – a deep groover. I've hooked up with another producer and under the name Scandal Tan, we've done a track with the Ragga Twins called 'Bring Forth the Booty' in a dancehall b/beat vibe. That will be released over here on Hussle and Bussle, and there are 2 more to follow featuring vocalists.



What will you be playing in your set here? Electro, B/beat and Electro House.

Where do you see the breaks sound evolving to?

That's a question – who knows – Breakbeat is a versatile genre and it can go in many different directions. It's up to the producers really. Breakbeat has really diversified over the last few years, I prefer the evolution of Breaks into more Electro 4/4 based arenas.

London has long been the epicentre of electronic music. Where else on the planet is breakbeat blowing up?

Australia most definitely... I first came here in '99 and it's grown from strength to strength.

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
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

LEGEND OF ZORRO

For each actor there is a role in which he is allowed to achieve greatness. Antonio Banderas found his as the voice of the cat in Shrek 2. As Zorro again, in the sequel to The Mask of Zorro, he is nevertheless commendable as the masked avenger. Realizing that he might never be taken seriously, Banderas does self-parody to a nicety. It is 1850, California is on the verge of statehood and Don Alejandro de la Vega (Zorro) is finding the life of the landed gentry tough going - especially with his heroic urges being hamstrung by an estranged missus who wants him to spend more quality time with her and their swinish little boy. As his wife, Catherine Zeta-Jones combines well with Banderas - their relationship saves the movie - but the attempt to import the stresses and strains of contemporary family life into the mix is a dud. Movies like this are best when they keep the tongue in cheek and not in your face and, despite some decent swashbuckling, it's a bit much like an over-extended TV sit-com with stunts. Flabby, densely plotted and too long. John Campbell



RUMOR HAS IT

What might have become of the characters from The Graduate had they been based on a real Pasadena family? By inviting comparisons to a modern classic, this movie simply succeeds in highlighting its own shortcomings. Sarah (Jennifer Anniston) is engaged to be married and, though she is a little rich girl with everything, she is confused and unhappy (sigh). She also believes that her grandmother (Shirley MacLaine) is the notorious Mrs Robinson, and that she is the illegitimate daughter of Beau (Kevin Costner), the eponymous graduate, who, by bedding Sarah, will have slept with three generations of women in her family. That history will repeat itself is a given, but the story is sluggish and contrived - the coincidence at the end which confirms who is Sarah's father is simply awful. Anniston is entirely one dimensional, Shirley MacLaine and Kevin Costner walk through undemanding roles and Mark Ruffalo as the cuckolded nice guy is a gormless shadow of the sleazy cop who so impressed in In The Cut. Lacklustre and laboured, with the best moment being a glimpse of the fabulous Anne Bancroft seducing the young Hoffmann. John Campbell

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


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In a ferment over food

Local author Clive Lawler has cooked up a book called 'Whole don't mean Wholesome – A Love of Fermentation and all Things Sloooow'. The book is available at Santos Mullumbimby for \$28, or Clive will post direct for \$25 + \$5 postage - contact food2die4@eftel.net.au.

According to Clive, the book 'reveals how we, via the early 60s manic, reactionary shift into raw and whole foods, have since committed the serial blunder of overlooking the critical and now scientifically proven health hazard of the existence of toxic anti-nutrients in all raw and dried foods. It poses, in very plain, un-minced words, how the ancient, but mostly forgotten art of food fermentation and its almost extinct ally, the sloooow kitchen, not only form the observable counter to this unwanted invasion of naturally occurring chemicals in our foods, but also form the supreme and vital enzymatic means of converting all positive nutritional elements contained within those foods, such as proteins, starches, etc, into their desired, pre-digested states.

'Without proper fermentation practices of so-called whole foods in these last 50 years, plus the rush to fast foods and quick kitchens, we (and I also mean here, health food shoppers) are suffering a pandemic of allergies and intolerances to many anti-nutrients including phytates, as well as to gluten, starches, lactose and more, and so exposing us to related, ensuing diseases like asthma, obesity and the ravages of accordingly devastated immune systems - all of which are totally unnecessary and avoidable.

Clive has had an interesting life, to say the least. In the early 70s, Brisbane-born Clive (aka Nirava), was road manager for Oz Hall

o' Fame blues/rock band Chain, after which he became founding editor and chief writer of the Melbourne-based music magazine Daily Planet. Clive says it was the first weekly, nationally-distributed 'young' paper to discuss topics such as pollution, nature, health foods, marijuana, jazz and blues and the broader arts

After the Nimbin Aquarius Festival, Clive lived communally in WA for four years, where he cooked and baked bread for 120 people daily, and became a father, of two daughters. Later, at Tamborine Mountain in Queensland, he started a health food store and 'quack' herbalist practice (there were no naturopathic schools then), and authored a weekly newspaper column called 'Wild Herbs of the Hinterland'. He terminated his successful "Hinterlander" column when the editor rejected an earnest, if somewhat tongue-in-cheek article titled 'The Therapeutic Value of (leftover) Sperm as a Face Pack - Think Zinc.

In the early 80s, he started a long and gratifying career as an Osho devotee, and sound engineer for live bands. In 1988, he went to India, with enough money and visa to stay for only three weeks. By the time they were both spent, he realized that India was his new multi-dimensional home, so he tore up his return to Oz plane ticket, and winged it instead, in the city of Pune. Clive remained in India for 15 years. He was given the soubriquet 'Dr Nerves', for his attunement to and empathy with friends and strangers when they fell ill, and for his ability to fix them fast, with the perfect herb, or info at hand.

After almost carking it, a result of ingesting a large stew of mis-identified, neurotoxic mushrooms that popped up in his vegetable garden one fateful August day in 2002, he suddenly returned to Oz to recover and heal. 'India is absolutely the worst place on Earth to heal a severely injured nervous system, Oz possibly the best.

He washed up near Byron Bay where he bakes bread and ferments and still was, at last check, mould-free





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Living life in the raw

Regarding food, I always used to think that the world could be divided neatly into two: the people for whom it was a passion and a source of sensuous pleasures, and those for whom it was merely fuel. Now while I realise that it is more complicated than that – there are shades, overlaps, sub-categories – I still consider it a fairly accurate means of evaluating the relationships most people have with

All of which made challenging the notion of Raw Food. I was privileged to be invited to attend a recent Master Class, as it called itself, in the preparation of gourmet raw food. Held at the Ewingsdale Hall, it attracted about 50 people one warm and golden December Saturday, a number which impressed me considerably. As it turned out, many of them had been involved in this raw food 'movement' for some years, if not already converted to it.

Anshu and Anand were the presenters: lean men of an indeterminate middle age whose enthusiasm for their subject was compelling. They took turns in firstly defining raw food and its tenets then demonstrating a three-course meal as an example of its enormous possibilities and permutations. In essence, cooking food alters and deforms its molecular structure, resulting in the production of three times more white cells than normal in the human body, cells which perceive the cooked food as foreign matter. This toxicity throws our body chemistry out and gives rise to disease. In addition we are far too acidic and our consumption of sugar and processed foods results in a depletion of oxygen, bacterial build-up and the thriving of fungus and yeast which eventually leads to more possibility of disease. Raw food on the whole is alkaline;

raw food is the means whereby our bodies may begin to revitalise and to heal. A list of superfoods was read out to us: bee pollen (the 'complete 'food), spirulina (protein, vitamin and mineral powerhouse), maca (energy, libido and stamina), MSM, hempseed, brazil nuts, coconut oil and

pepitas - I made a mental note to check out Santos for the maca – and then a Super Fruit Shake was passed around for us to try, utilising all these ingredients. Notwithstanding its unappealing colour - a sludgy shade of olive green - it actually tasted gorgeous, rich and coconutty.

The demonstrations showed us how to create, not cook, pizza, stuffed capsicum and apple crumble cake. Food processors and blenders whirred and whizzed busily, breaking down ingredients like sprouted buckwheat, soaked flaxseed, almonds, raw vegetables, dates, more nuts (ideally soaked for eight hours): sure enough at the end there was a pizza, a stuffed capsicum and an apple cake. How did they taste? They all tasted of exactly went into them – the addition of ingredients like spices, fresh herbs, grated ginger and honey meant that they also tasted good.

My particular problem is that I love precisely that deadly chemistry which occurs when food is cooked. I love the transformations, the changes, the magic that happens when heat is applied to raw ingredients. I love the smells and I love the textures, I love the practical act of creating a glorious dish from a handful of raw components. Nibbling my way through the raw apple crumble cake I found myself thinking how whacking it into an oven might have taken it to a higher level. 'Cooking does something strange to food,' Anand mentioned at one point - and yes it does, and to me that is the excitement of it.

I came away unconverted, but admiring. It seems like a worthy cause to pursue, and there was no doubting the bright-eyed energy and exuberance of its proponents. It's just that I love cooking



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
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
