


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# Janslide! Barham way ahead in voting

Byron Shire seems certain to return Jan Barham as mayor with a huge primary vote. With 62% of the primary votes counted, Barham was winning all booths across the Shire with an overall total of 6,412 249. votes -50% of the formal votes.

Her closest rival, Cr Ross Tucker, by a whisker, could manage only 28% - 3,559 votes.

# Tourism management plan on public exhibition

At its meeting of August 28, Byron Shire Council resolved to place a draft of the Tourism Management Plan on public exhibition. The strategies and actions in the plan are intended to guide the development, management and marketing of tourism over the medium to long-term.

The plan is now on exhibition and public submissions will be accepted until Thursday October 23.

According to Ray Darney, Council's Director of Planning, Development and Environment Services, the consultation process conducted by Australian Regional Tourism Research Centre delivered a balanced, representative outcome

'We hope that the community will recognise the effort that went into the plan during the exhibition period,' Mr Darney said.

## Info sessions

Two information sessions will be conducted by ARTRC. The first will be held on Wednesday September 24 from 6pm to 7.30pm in the meeting room at the Ocean Shores Community Centre. The second will be on Thursday September 25 from 6pm to 7.30pm at the Byron Bay Community and Cultural Centre.

A range of documents, from the outline of ARTRC's approach to consultation summaries and background research, to the draft plan itself, is available for viewing at Council access points and online at the Council's website www. byron.nsw.gov.au.

Council engaged ARTRC to prepare the Tourism Management Plan in 2007.

ARTRC consulted with community groups, experts in regional tourism from around the country, and provided online opportunities for community input. ARTRC also convened a Citizens' Jury over a full weekend to get input from community members.

Last Saturday marked the 100th birthday of Public School Education in the valleys of Wilsons Creek, Huonbrook and Wanganui. Students and teachers, past and present, young and old, gathered at the school for a celebration of centennial proportions.

On September 13, 1908 the Wilsons Creek School opened its one door to 14 students. In 1921 the Huonbrook school opened but it closed in 1962 as it had only nine students.

The Wilsons Creek School was when it opened, and remained until the late 70s, a one teacher school. The first of those teachers, a Mr F W Salway whose family came from Bega, earned a salary of 25 shillings a week the craftroom. and according to Keith

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


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# **Byron Artisan Market for the Bay**



# **BU loses it**

Lobby group Byron United seems to be tragically at a loss when it comes to facts about Council. Its final advertisement in the Byron News last week could only be intended to discredit mayor Jan Barham just before an election. If the intention of Byron United is to promote the interests of local business in a positive way, then on this occasion it has failed dismally.

Council staffers have a different take on BU's 'facts'. Council does not have a \$44 million debt as claimed by BU, it has loans of \$33.7m for current and future works programs. This is a common practice by governments of all sizes to pay for new infrastructure. Council's Debt Servicing Ratio is lower than the State average.

Nor has Council raised 'an extra \$22 million' in rate rises over four years. The actual figure is \$5.7m and has helped bring Council's rates revenue in line with other similarly sized councils.

Best displaying BU's ignorance is its attempt to discredit the 04-08 council for its part in retiring the \$7 million debt acquired partly by the misuse of restricted funds in the 1990s. The building program in 91-95 was not funded entirely by a rational loans schedule as it is now - it relied on misused funds and a fire sale of Byron Bay assets, which the then Byron Bay chamber of commerce complained about bitterly.

And what happened to BU's commitment to Council staff to check with them before releasing figures? While BU president Ed Ahern has since acknowledged some of his figures are wrong, he has yet to offer a public apology to Council's general manager, to Jan Barham, and to residents who were misled.

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



# **Clone wars among the Hydroids**

At the start of our wandering through the Animal Kingdom, we met with the Porifera (the sponges), with their different types of cells in co-operative colonies. From here there is a sharp turn and every animal henceforth is eumetazoan, with tissues and organs of some sort. Again, we find ourselves on the seashore where, often overlooked, are sea anemones.

These are fixed to some hard surface: a soft bag topped with a fringe of tentacles waving about a round opening. The bag and tentacles are made of differing inner and outer tissue layers. A jelly like mesoglea fills the space between them. The gut space. There is but one opening to this gut. Its label the nematocysts, the stingers pass both in and out.

These results read like a nervous systems. Nerve cells are found to be widely varying in shape and arrangebio-electrical apparatus, they also transmit into body fluids important chemical messengers. Some are proteins. Some are catecholamines, such as adrenaline ('fight/ flight' hormone) and dopamine ('desire' hormone).

Here, in this unassuming marine creature, are the same molecules of emotions ours.

In 2003, D Ayre and R Grosberg of Wollongong identified aggressive/defensive behaviour between different family groups of anemones. The animals at the borders of the patch load up their tentacles with extra nematocysts and clobber any strangers until there is a clear zone between 'them' and 'those'. 'Them' is a set of clones: one of the reproduction pathways is splitting into two, and then two and so on. 'Those' are other clones.

Meanwhile, within the patch, some of the clones have extra large gonads full of egg and sperm which they mini-history of research in release into the sea. 

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



# Byron Bay branch part of NAB's 150th birthday

October 4 marks 150 years since the National Bank of Australasia, one of NAB's founding companies, opened its doors for business. NAB is celebrating its 150th anniversary by reflecting on the history of its partners, staff and communities, and has uncovered a rich tapestry of stories about the people, places and events that have shaped its heritage.

The National Bank of Australasia first opened for business in a small office in Melbourne at eight o'clock on October 4, 1858, with £90,000 in capital.

The bank's founder was a Scottish migrant named Alexander Gibb who believed that banks should serve the Australian people and that the profits they made should go to Australians, not to shareholders in England. Accordingly, he called his bank the National Bank of Australasia. The bank expanded into Colonial Bank of Australasia other states: South Australia in 1858; Western Australia in 1866; NSW in 1885; Queensland in 1920; Tasmania in 1922; and Northern Territory in 1955. Its first acquisition was the Bank (NAB).

Over 50 years later, in 1981, the bank merged with the National Bank of Australasia to form the bank we know as NAB. Over the past six months in the Northern Rivers region three men have died in tragic and unnecessary circumstances. Each of them was allegedly involved in a scuffle, over trifles of 'property' or pre-eminence, which ultimately led to their deaths. All of these incidents could have been avoided. In some cases by a lot less alcohol, in others by a lot less ego, and often by a lot less of both.

Sadly, the reality is that these three incidents will simply become part of the crime statistics that cite men as the highest proportion of offenders in violent and alcohol-related crimes.

The NSW Police Service identifies alcohol as being related to as much as 70% of all street crimes and, in overall crime/gender statistics, men represent over 90% of offenders between the ages of 10 and 65. Fortunately, organisations like UNCLE and the Pathways Foundation are encouraging and slowly changing many underlying values. 'Pathways,' as Bere says, 'includes the whole family because it's not just about the young girl's or the young boy's journey, it's about the whole family, about what sort of examples and relationships they have there. We can't expect young people to be all full of hope for the future and where they're going if all the adults around them appear pessimistic or depressed.'

# Healthy men

Mark Gasson echoes a similar theme for UNCLE, in terms of providing appropriate and constant role models for young boys to enable them to become healthy, adult men.

'I absolutely believe that it makes a huge amount of difference,' says Mark, 'And it's important to get that message out there. When boys are young and at an impressionable age that's when they learn the most and form the patterns of their future behaviour.

'It's either a case of normalising bad behaviour and violence, and carrying it on into their later life, or it's a case of preventing those habits from forming in the first place, and approaching socipositive way.'


## GOT TO LOVE A MAN WITH SOUL

#### forces with beat-boxing, drum stick wielding and record scratching - it's the kind of project that has seen Festivals around the world applaud them as 21st

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
#### Century Circus. According to Ben, Tom Tom Club was magic from the start.

I said, I am going to bring in this amazing DJ in who's a great drummer as well and the show took off and went from a little concept that debuted at Woodford Festtival a couple of years ago to getting soldout five star reviews."

#### Tom Tom Club have recently returned from a New York season and were the toast of Edinburgh Festival.

'We went to Edinburgh and it's mindblowing, there are more people as artists at that festival then attendees at Australian Festivals! It's a real testing ground. As a culture, particularly compared : to Americans we don't have a lot of ego, we don't have



a lot of money or a lot of reputation. When we came with this urban circus infused sideshow collaboration with hip hop drumming and scratching, it was so raw and real, there was no bullshit, there was a lack of direction that was refreshing, the personalities on stage were real. We are not just a cast.

#### Tom Tom Club is unique, and unlike the enormous franchise circus groups who set up troops all around the world, these guys want to keep it real.

'We could have seven versions travelling the country, we truly do it because this is who we are." Working with circus performers brings home just how focused you need to be on stage. The acrobats are risking their lives, when things go wrong it can go really wrong, they are professionals, I have watched them do it for hundreds and hundreds of shows and seeing them doing double





Among the most formulaic of teen pics, they are also the ones that are bound to flee fastest from your memory bank before you can remember where you left your car (though in my case that can be quite a long time), and are universally scoffed at for achieving exactly what they routinely set out to do, viz. positively reinforce in youngsters the worth of having a goal and persevering to attain it. 
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## THE HUMBLE OLIVE

## Victoria Cosford

There is an olive tree in Croatia which has been calculated to be about 1600 years old; not only that, but it still produces olives which are made into top quality olive oil.

I find this sort of data humbling - but then olives themselves are a humble fruit. As far back as 3000 BC the trees were grown commercially in Crete, cultivated as a source of olive oil, fine wood, olive leaf (for medicinal purposes) and olives for consumption. Although today olives are cultivated in many regions of the world, it is the Mediterranean which is mostly associated with them and whose very flavour, many writers feel, is encapsulated in its fruit and its oil. A hot climate and a proximity to the coast are the ideal conditions - although in Italy the olive tree has traditionally been planted to make use of the poorest areas unfit for other economic use (steep slopes, difficult climate, poor soil, for example.) Further evidence of its humble nature, history and origins.

And yet there was nothing humble about the plump olives warmed in ouzo, chilli and garlic I could not stop eating on the verandah of an inner city Sydney pub recently: perfect partners to a flinty Pugliese white wine as the sun went down. If anything, olives glamourise a dish, lift it to lovelier levels. And then, of course, there are so many different types, each with their own individual characters. Italian olives alone present a great range and only Elizabeth David could describe them like poetry. 'There are dark, luminous black olives from Gaeta;' she tells us in Italian Food, 'little coal black olives of Rome, smoky and wrinkled; sloe-like black olives of Castellamare, like bright black eyes; olives brown and purple and yellow from Sardinia; Sicilian black olives in oil; olives of a dozen different greens... olives of all the greens of the evening sea...

Most people are aware that green olives are just the unripe fruit. In Spain, table olives are traditionally picked at this stage



- which generally results in olives that are plumper, firmer and more sharply flavoured than the black. As black olives have been given longer to ripen, they have a higher oil content, giving them a milder flavour

and softer texture. Beware, however, ink-black olives in brine which are usually green olives subjected to chemical trickery - in other words, dyed, with very little flavour to speak of. Beware too buying olives which have been pitted: much flavour has been sacrificed in the process. Janni Kyritsis (ex-Berowra Waters and MG Garage) suggests that to remove olive flesh from the stones, simply place the olives between two tea towels then gently hit them with the palm of your hand or with a meat mallet. Pitting olives is an occupation I actually find soothing simply with my own two hands.

It is always better, when cooking with olives, to add them toward the very end as prolonged cooking accentuates their bitterness. Then again, one of my all-time favourite recipes for Chicken Cacciatore never seems to suffer from the handful of olives flung in with the peeled tomatoes once the chicken pieces have browned in their oil perfumed with rosemary and garlic and wine then left to simmer for up to forty minutes... I have to be cunning, anyway, when it comes to cooking with olives: despite his Greek ancestry, my partner cannot abide the things. I haven't yet made him my little Olive Beer Breads and I can almost guarantee he would love them. Oven-warm, with a tomato salad and some creamy Persian fetta, they are a celebration of a humble fruit - and absolutely gorgeous.

## **OLIVE BEER BREADS**

Pit a cup of black olives. In a large bowl combine 3 cups of self-raising flour with 1 dessertspoon sugar, 1 teaspoon salt and 1 can of beer. Work the olives into the sticky mixture then dollop into large oiled muffin moulds. Bake for an hour in a 175°C oven.

These are the Rolls Royce of traditional Greek biscuits. Give these to a friend and it is the ultimate sign of respect. And be warned these are seriously addictive...

## ALMOND AND ROSEWATER FINGERS

- (Makes about 20) 2 cups almond meal
- 1 cup icing sugar\*
- 2 egg whites
- 1 tsp vanilla extract







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1 tsp rosewater 200g almond flakes

• Preheat oven to 170C.

- In a mixing bowl, combine all ingredients, except for the almond flakes and mix well.
- With wet hands, shape teaspoonfuls into small fat fingers and roll them in almond flakes.
- Bake on a lined oven tray for approx 10-15 minutes, (times will vary with differing ovens) or until edges of almond fingers are golden. Allow to cool on the baking tray 5 minutes and then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely.
- These fingers will keep at least a month in a sealed container in the refrigerator. They can be frozen and if so, should be defrosted overnight in the refrigerator.
- This recipe can be double or tripled or if a small batch is required, ingredients can be divided by half.
- \* Icing sugar: use pure icing sugar if you want gluten free or icing sugar mixture if gluten is not an issue.
