With a solid background in music and events and a love for Mullumbimby, it was only a matter of time before Glenn Wright brought us the Mullum Music Festival.

As a Main Arm resident and owner of Vitamin Records, a label with a diverse string of independent artists, Wright was a local festival director in waiting. Sitting at Poinciana Café just four months ago, he was witness to Mullumbimby locals meeting to discuss events held outside of the town, mostly in Byron Bay. The concept of the MMF was born and Wright had the festival put together in no time.

Glenn told The Echo he wanted to produce a real music festival, one that provides something for everyone, not just Australian rock. There are hip hop acts, classical musicians, folk, reggae, African beats, singer/ songwriters and vocalists all tied together in themed groups to make sure festival goers are treated to their favourite kind of music.

'We have a little community town opening its doors to a big event. The acts I have booked are either really well known or those that already have a following but are just about to really happen. I tried to put an international or interstate act alongside local acts. I am really looking

forward to seeing profile acts in the smaller venues, like Rhombus at the Ex-Services Club, and Gyan with the Drill Hall acoustics will be amazing.

'Mostly though I wanted to book acts that would be hanging around Mullumbimby for the duration of the festival. We have booked accommodation in the town to encourage that. I want to see the guys from Rhombus having dinner at Milk and Honey with Mullum locals and C W Stoneking doing laps in the Mullum Pool with Richard from IGA!

'I love the festivals that give a sense of community to the towns that host them, like the Bellingen Global Festival, Woodford, the Edinburgh Festival and fringe and arts festivals. I would love to see the MMF grow organically over coming years, with perhaps the possibility of adding smaller satellite gigs in hinterland venues?

The inaugural Mullum Music Festival kicks off this Thursday and runs through until Sunday. Kids under five have free admittance and other tickets and festival passes can be bought at www.mullummusicfestival.com or from the hotline (02) 8250 1102. In addition to the scheduled shows, the Poinciana Café will be hosting unannounced festival acts every day (November 20-23) at 3pm and 7pm.

Splendour approval taken to court

Environmental lobby group Conservation of North Ocean Shores (CONOS) has lodged an appeal in the Land & Environment Court against Byron Shire Council for its approval of a Splendour in the Grass 'trial' festival at its site located at Yelgun, adjacent to the Billinudgel Nature Reserve.

CONOS president Bob Oehlman said, 'We wish to stress the fact that we are not against festivals in Byron Shire. However, we do oppose the use of the Yelgun site for the Splendour in the Grass festival, and believe that Council should not have approved this "trial" event.


We are challenging the approval as it is contrary to local environmental planning controls which aim to protect the biodiversity significance of the subject land.

'The development footprint for the festival is proposed on either side of Australia's most easterly wildlife corridor, the Marshall's Ridge wildlife corridor. The proposal requires substantial permanent infrastructure that will have a significant impact upon the wildlife corridor, and all for a one-off trial event.


High conservation

'It is time to get this proposal into perspective. The north coast is the most biodiverse region in NSW. The Marshall's Ridge wildlife corridor has been identified as a regional corridor of very high conservation significance for a suite of already threatened species. The wildlife corridor is the link for species from the coast to our world heritage hinterland.

'While we acknowledge that the Splendour people are currently carrying out a tree planting regime which may enhance the wildlife corridor in the future sometime, the proposal will in fact cause the immediate loss of biodiversity including the removal of "old growth trees". 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Keeping kids safe on the street

In 2002, Byron Youth Service held a forum at which young people could address the issues they face on the street at night. The kids said having workers on the street at night to advocate and look out for them would help, so the Street Cruise initiative began and has been around ever since. SC workers and volunteers provide vital adult support to local under eighteen year olds who are at risk on the streets on Friday nights but the program is in immediate need of further funding.

Street Cruise coordinator Deb Pearse told The Echo, 'We adopt harm minimisation strategies towards the kids affected by drugs and alcohol. We'll make sure they are able to get home or have someone to take care of them. We may give their friends information on how to take care of them. We often work as mediators between the kids and the cops, and because we are working "on the spot" so to speak we get the opportunity to intervene when young people are vandalising, being rowdy and intimidating and when there is conflict which may lead to fights. Because all the kids know us we do have some success in preventing many situations from escalating. If there is violence or an incident we are able to call the police or the ambulance straight away.

'It takes a long time to gain the total trust of young people. After five years on the job they trust that I and other SC workers have their best interest at heart. Because they know this, they listen when we spell out the consequences of irresponsible behaviour. We let them know what the penalties are for underage drinking,

buying alcohol, graffiti etc.

'We keep an eye out for young girls on the street, especially if they are with men who are older or intoxicated. A lot of the girls are relieved when we intervene, they have lots of bravado but many of them are scared and admit they didn't know what to do.

'The kids know we are on the streets on Friday nights from 8:30pm to midnight and they will often seek us out. They know we have no other agenda other than their wellbeing. The kids are going through a phase of life where they are too old to be hanging at home and too young to be let into venues.

'They hang out on the streets to be social and close to the action, they have nowhere else to go.

'The SC interaction is a vital one, not only do they often get us to talk to their parents, but we are also able to refer them on to educational opportunities, counseling or other activities because we know them all so well?

The Movember event raises awareness around men's health issues and funds are used to support charitable organisations, with a focus on prostate cancer and depression in men.

Since its inception in 2004, Movember has raised over \$30 million globally, significantly increased awareness of prostate cancer and depression in the community, and is working toward changing the attitude men have about their health.

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Words and art meet for The Buttery



For many of those seeking treatment at The Buttery, describing their emotional journey in words to explore the roots of their addiction can take time. Part of the art therapy program encourages participants to create images that complement the normal channels of dialogue which can often create a stumbling block for those who have been traumatised.

Remodelling the bund at NOS

The bund is at Kallaroo Circuit, North Ocean Shores. It was, until September 29, the bit of road constructed over the Capricornia Canal. Under the bund two large pipes constricted the free flow of river water from Tweed into the Byron Shire.

Bright and very early on September 29 half a dozen huge Mac trucks roared into Kallaroo Circuit and spent the day being fed with tonnes of dirt from the bund which they roared off to pile up at Yelgun. The trees and bush on both sides of the road were razed and mulched.

Local residents had been warned that the bund was to be remodelled. No more strolling to the beach for locals and no more mad drivers and bikies able to speed at midnight down the wide Kallaroo stretch. This golden silence will remain until work finishes on the bund in December.

There was a display of indignation on September 29 – car hooting mainly - from residents alarmed at the thought of tonnes of polluted cane farmers' water being released Anglo-Indian word used to from Tweed to flood lowlying areas like South Golden Beach. (Flood modeling by consultant SMEC suggests this



will be minimal, according to flood and drainage engineer James Flockton at Byron Shire Council).

On the first day of this operation, a somewhat eerie silence ensued after the workers had erected the barricades and warnings about trespass, and departed at 4pm.

The first to arrive at the denuded site was a flock of Indian mynas.

Quite suitable, really, as 'bund' originated in 1813, an describe any artificial embankment, dam, dyke or causeway, and was derived from a Hindu word 'band'.

The Indian mynas like cleared land. They chased away a few native birds and grazed. Young humans came next, with skateboards and bikes, scaling the barricades with ease. At least the kids chased away the Indian mynas

Over the next few days huge concrete box culverts arrived (1.5m high and 4.8m wide), which will be arranged across the bund in sets of three, over the top of the existing pipes – 21 culverts in all. Then the road will go over the top, the roadside greenery replaced and mulched with the previous greenery, and traffic and

walkers can reclaim the road. The work is being conducted in a dry site with sediment controls to protect the Marine Park. Dykes on either side of the excavation hold the river back and it continues to flow through the original pipes. When the redesign is finished, water will only flow through the culverts when the water flow is very high and we are in flood. The culvert design was a lengthy process with Byron Council working hard to achieve what it sees as a good compromise for local residents and to resolve a long standing dispute between Byron and Tweed Shire Councils.

A tough mini-budget

NSW Premier Nathan Rees was unlikely to win any friends with his cost-cutting mini-budget, and that holds doubly so on the north coast. One of the more reliable indicators of its impact is that bookmakers are now getting an influx of bets in favour of the coalition winning the next election.

Obsessed with propping up Sydney's ailing transport system, the Labor government cares little at this stage for picking up votes in National Party heartland where, for instance, local Nats MP Don Page is now likely to canter in should he choose to run again.

Two of the measures likely to harden north coast hearts against Labor include delays to funding the Tintenbar-Ewingsdale highway upgrade and the scrapping of the petrol subsidy of 8.35cents/litre by July 1, 2009. In addition, the deferral of the Country Towns Water and Sewerage Program could have a detrimental effect on Byron Shire Council's upgrade plans.

We can also expect further squeezes on the health system, already exhibiting symptoms of morbidity. The capital works allocation to build the new Byron District hospital seems to be receding over the horizon, although \$27m is still set aside for the Lismore Cancer Centre.

The online summary (www.treasury.nsw.gov.au/?a=12713) hardly captures the political nuances in the mini-budget. You can read of a restructure of Planning 'to better reflect roles and responsibilities' but the news that the Office of Strategic Lands, which include parklands and rail corridors, will fall into the hands of Labor Party fixer Joe Tripodi carries greater portent than that. Planning in NSW remains a matter of political whim.

And high above this mini-budget towers the international farce of governments' credit ratings being assessed by commercial companies such as Standard & Poor's. All governments and banks should reject this nonsense imposed by a free market economy bereft of common sense.

Affordable boarding

Byron Shire Council last week took a punt on a planning agreement with a developer over affordable housing. While the fine points are still to be settled and the development applications submitted, Council has agreed to support solicitor Norman Hunt's proposal to have nine boarding houses and 13 dwellinghouses on 9,000 square metres off Bangalow Road, Byron Bay. The trade-off is Council allowing a 'density bonus' in exchange for the developer providing discount rents in the boarding houses.

While it makes me uneasy to see Council horse-trading over densities for a social benefit, it is a case of suck-it-and-see. If the developer acts in good faith and Council is capable of monitoring (and enforcing) the provisions of the planning agreement, then it could be a viable way forward in planning for a great social need

In this case we should abandon the traditional view of boarding houses as grotty urban digs of last resort as portrayed in the movie Praise. As Mr Hunt pointed out in public access, it is effectively shared housing of the university college kind which appeals to a younger generation not ready or willing to commit to a McMansion.

Or it used to be when I worked for *The Australian*.

The facts of the matter are that on October 10 Rudd hosted a dinner at Kirribilli House for a number of guests, one of whom was Mitchell. Sometime in the course of the evening he left his guests in the drawing room to take a phone call from George Bush in the adjacent study. A fortnight later The Weekend Australian ran a story by-lined Matthew Franklin saying Rudd had been astonished to find that Bush apparently did not know what the G20 group of countries was.

The story was immediately proclaimed as a major embarrassment not for Bush, but for Rudd, who was accused by the opposition of deliberately leaking it for his own self-aggrandisement. Get on with the settlement strategy

I don't often grace these pages with laments about matters pertaining to my own material interests, but as Council has just passed a resolution which is disastrous for my finances, readers will perhaps forgive me for any narkiness beyond the usual.

I'm talking about the Rural Settlement Strategy, a review of which has just been deferred yet again – for no good reason that I could identify.

First a bit of history. The Rural Strategy was promulgated in 1998 when I was on Council. It identified certain areas near Coorabell (and other places) as in principle suitable for certain forms of rural development, being community title (CT), multiple occupancy (MO) and tourism. All existing MOs were also deemed suitable for conversion to CT, regardless of where they were located.

My property at Coorabell falls within the areas selected and when the maps of the draft version were displayed to Councillors my property was clearly identified as eligible on the basis that an MO had been granted in 1987. However by

been put before Council my property had been deleted. Later, environmental planning director David Kanaley wrote me a letter confirming that it had been deleted because the MO in his view had lapsed. He didn't inform me at the relevant time, or offer me an opportunity to dispute his view, nor did he at any time visit the property to assess it according to the criteria applied to neighbouring properties. In other words my property is in a limbo where it is not described in the strategy as suitable, but where equally it has been rejected as unsuitable according to the extant criteria. Lawyers might call this a denial of natural justice. I don't see conspirdirector trying to make his job simpler than it was.

No doubt there were many other people aggrieved by exclusion from the strategy, but is there anyone else in the situation where four neighbours in a row to the south are included, where other immediate neighbours to the north have a tourist resort and ex-

ous six lane high level Brunswick River bridges wasted millions. There is no need for high bridges as the river is not navigable. When this was pointed out to the RTA they said they needed the height to reduce the climb up the hill to the north but then they designed a drop of the road to the original level of the Rajah Road turning, thereby nullifying height gained from all. the high bridges. The alternative was hideous. Victor's comment on the need to swap cynicism for hope is also welcome, given the long history of causes for cynicism American regimes have bequeathed to the world. But unless many a brave light in that land of excess is ready to shine steadfastly on many a dark truth, colonial exploitation and Vietthen I fear the buds of hope that sprung up on election night will never flourish into a garden of shared prosperity and peace.

Like other commentators, Mungo linked Obama's election and Kennedy's in 1961 Mungo's memory may have been temporarily clouded by a glass of euphoria too many when, without hint of irony, he stuck the 'philosopher Kennedy. Indeed, Kennedy is a good place to start shining a light on America's dark truths.



Chemical weapons

Recently the Australian, American and Hong Kong governments all decided to allow their populations to consume, for the first time, food which contains cyanuric acid and also melamine at 2.5 parts per million (ppm). Reimschuessel et al state that although

appeared to have low toxicity when administered separately (1), when taken together they were highly toxic.

Wikipedia defines a Binary Chemical Weapon as 'two chemicals that when combined make a toxic agent'.

A scientist from the food standards Australia and New Zealand agreed with the writer that the combination of melamine and cyanuric acid appeared to be a binary poison.

Cremonezzi et al describe Byron Bay mealamine as a 'tumorigenic agent' (2) that induced 'preneoplastic (pre-cancerous) urothelial proliferation' (2)

Cats fed 2000ppm melamine and cyanuric acid developed lethal kidney failure in just two days (3), so perhaps humans fed two parts per million melamine and cyanuric acid will develop lethal kidney failure in 2000 days or about

six years. There is no antidote civilians - women and chilto melamine and cyanuric acid poisoning. Prawns, fish, eggs, biscuits, poultry, wheat and milk powder from the northern hemisphere have all been contaminated.

Evolve festival artists still wait on payment

Evolve Festival organisers are likely to be facing a lawsuit from bandleader Barry Singh, who paid his orchestra \$18,650 out of his own pocket to perform at last October's festival.

In what appears a financial disaster for Evolve Arts Festival Pty Ltd, organisers told performers via email shortly after the event that management will be 'meeting with current and prospective investors to refloat the company, to settle the current debtors and prepare for Evolve 2009.'

The email went on to say 'initial reports are not looking too good at present in terms of current cash flow, due to a lower than expected amount of walk up ticket sales on the day.' A second email sent only last week made a similar statement, with the hope to secure funding for next year and consolidate the debts incurred by this year.

enough for Mr Singh, bandleader of The Northern Rivers Symphony Orchestra. 'Despite providing a written contract, the cheque he [organiser Stuart Hucker] presented on the day bounced, Mr Singh told The Echo. 'This could potentially bankrupt the orchestra.

'There was no reply from numerous emails and phone calls, but we decided to do it anyway as it is close to home for us and it didn't incur many personal expenses.' Mr Cruickshank said while it was a great idea and wanted to support it, 'They should have pulled the plug and gave everyone their money back. I wanted to support the idea of this festival as it was a local event for locals.

'Now what this has resulted in is having to completely post produce, critically analyse all aspects of our efforts in over 40 departments and put that Non-performers such as PA into a positive business plan for 2009. Everyone on our outstanding invoice from this year's list is a part of this business plan and the goal is to raise the capital for both years in one to two share call movements.

Still positive

'I do acknowledge that my earlier indications were that I would have a solid plan at this stage being a month post festival. To be honest this process is taking longer than I had planned and for that most part it's out of my hands in terms of time frame.

'The bottom line is I'm attempting to raise over a quarter of a million dollars - which is a lot of money. The outcome is still looking to be a positive one. Unfortunately I still can't give you a solid date of payment, however I can assure you that we shall have a result in the near future?

'Forget Byron, forget Nimbin -Mullumbimby is the Northern New South town to be: where wordly freaks 'n' straights of all walks and wanderings are pitched together. Located smack-bang in the hinterland of the Eastern Oz corroboree zone, hugging mother Mount Tincogan and a mere teatowelwhipping's distance from Mt. Wollumbin. It also has a very excellent Olympic pool (featuring oddly very well behaved local children) in which I swim regularly.' Jesse Lubitz of Tin Pan Orange (Saturday at the Civic Hall) agrees, 'There's a lot to love about Mullumbimby. I think Mullum embodies the vibe that I'd heard about in the Byron area. I can't wait for the festival - hearing some exciting new music and some good ol' favourites.

For **Heidi Elva** (Sunday at the Bowlo) it's poetic: 'The last time

I was in Mullumbimby, I arrived late at night and drove out into the hills to stay with friends. Over little creeks, further and further into the unknown. Once there, I hopped out of my car and looked up at the sky. It was full of the brightest stars. Being from the city you forget how many stars there are up there.' Locally based internationally acclaimed circus performer Joel Salom (Opening night at the Civic Hall on Thursday) sums it up.'I like Mullum because there's more locals than tourists. You can stop your car in the middle of the main street to talk to friends and other drivers don't yell at you. Murray Kyle & Friends



'I think it already has influenced mainstream, a lot of people are moving to the digital format.


So what was the criteria?

Max Pavne

Mark Wahlberg's solemn voice-over tells at the beginning that 'I believe in pain, I believe in death, I believe in fear.' Isn't that just peachy? As New York Detective Max Payne, he has seen his wife and little girl murdered before his eyes and, rather like Charles Bronson's character in Death Wish (1974), he decides that vengeance will be his at any cost. The typecast Bronson made a wonderful film, Hard Times, with director Walter Hill, about a bare-knuckle fighter and his stray cat... but I digress, which is all you want to do from this bucket of swill. Shame on its creators. The plot might have had some legs, for it ostensibly exposes the manner in which big business can corrupt authority - in this instance it is a pharmaceutical company producing a magic potion that will make soldiers invincible. Conspiracy theories are the go in our paranoid times and, as in the excellent Michael Clayton, they might as easily be investigated intelligently and - shock horror - with little or no bloodshed. Alas, appealing to the functioning brain was not an option for the scriptwriters

here. Everything happens at night, in the rain or snow, with frosty lighting and against the metallic backdrop of a most inhospitable Gotham. (Visually, it reminded me of the equally putrid animation, Sin City.) A cold, almost monochromatic palette is relieved only by occasional crosses to Max's honey coloured vision of his wife and kid in their bedroom, angels waiting for him to complete his murderous revenge. Picking the bent cop in the chain is a lay-down misere the minute he appears and after that it is all guns blazing until his summary execution. In one thrilling scene (just kidding), Max is confronted by a SWAT team a dozen strong. They've got the Darth Vader caps, the armoured body-wear, the high powered automatic rifles etc, and they're no more than a few metres away. Max has only his pistol. Mind you, it's a whopper – in fact, I wouldn't back myself to pick it up with one hand (you don't think it could be plastic, do you?), but Max takes the blokes on and half a minute later he's plugged them all without so much as copping a flesh wound. That's the sort of movie it is. Max Dupain, on the other hand, was a great Australian photographer, one of whose pictures, Sunbaker (1937), remains a truly iconic Australian image... but I digress. ~ John Campbell

Philippe, manager of a post office in France's south, hopes to fill a vacancy on the Côte d'Azur. Having won preferential treatment by pretending to be wheelchair bound, he blows the scam by absent-mindedly standing to shake his superior's hand. It's a hilarious moment and one that immediately puts you on side with the schmuck who, for his dishonesty, is shunted off to the godforsaken North for two years. It appears that Picardy is regarded in much the same way by Southerners as Ballina is by the urbane burghers of Byron – it is a place to be avoided at all costs. Philippe's wife won't have a bar of it, so she stays at home with their little son, seeing her husband off as though he were going to

surprise, it doesn't rain all the The dialect, Shtimi, is difficult though, and it is on Philippe's workmate Antoine is probably No matter, there is much more and is hitting the bottle due to his failed love affair with clerk Annabelle. Philippe tries to help Antoine with his drinking problem but predictably gets plastered himself – his turn as the loaded bicyclist is a scream – while he also needs to come to a rapprochement with his depressed wife. This constantly amusing and endearing piece has a palpable sense of place, a ton of heart and, after the postal workers outdoor lunches of beer and pommes frites, such is the suggestive power of cinema, I came out tonguin' it for a schooner and a plate of chips. ~ John Campbell

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


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LIVING & COOKING @ LIZOTTE'S **BRIAN LIZOTTE**

His brother Diesel has been a well-known name on the Australian music scene for decades – and clearly creativity courses strongly through the Lizotte genes, as this exuberant, often larrikin cookbook proves. At the age of 18 Brian Lizotte, despite his shared love of music, decided to choose cooking as a career over that of trombonist. His restaurant on the central coast of NSW - from whence many of the recipes spring - has actually ended up satisfying both passions, having long been the dining destination for musicians


local and international alike.

Lizotte's On The Bay, launched in 2000, was the culmination of years spent catering for touring bands, a lifestyle requiring virtually the same relentless schedules as the artists for whom Brian cooked More than that, it was a means whereby he had his own venue at last, a 'lounge room'

concept where artists could come to him rather than the other way around – and not only come to eat but come to play. The list of those who over the years have dined there could just about read as a Who's Who of contemporary rock, blues and jazz musicians.

This book represents a warmly – even cheekily written - insight into both the world of catering to musicians and life on the road - but better still, it is a valid source of mostly lip-smackingly delicious dishes. It's easy to see how Brian's reputation was forged from the likes of Char grilled Baby Octopus with Persian Fetta, Chilli and Coriander; Pistachio and Herb Roasted Chicken Breast with

Chilli Jam; Deep Fried Vintage Cheddar Filled Zucchini Flowers with SunDried Tomato and Macadamia Pesto - chilli, cheese and deep-frying pop up regularly! But so too do native bush flavours and ingredients, of which Brian is an unabashed proponent. There is even a section toward the end where he offers cosy, homely recipes for the sort of comfort food we all at times crave - not least musicians who spend months eating takeaway or restaurant meals - and so there is Joe Cocker's Shepherd's Pie; Roast Beef and Brown Potatoes;



Aunty Anna's Lumberjack Cake, and possibly one of the most gorgeous chocolate brownie versions I have come across ('Momma Lizotte's') which calls for 600 grams of dark chocolate, 350 grams of crushed pecans

or macadamias, 500 grams of butter and 8 eggs, amongst other ingredients. Even the Chocolate Chip Cookies employ brown sugar AND honey AND caster sugar as well as generous doses of chocolate chips and more crushed macadamias.

Sweetest of all is the way Brian sets out the recipes, listing ingredients under the word 'Instruments' and method under 'Rhythm' The food photography is just about edible and even the regular references to famous names manages not to annoy.

It's a gutsy book inspiring you to both cook the food and seek out the restaurant.

PIZZA CHAMPS





When I was a kid my uncle Charlie needed a transplant.

These days I go to the gym three times a week and I also practice yoga regularly. Good the games after his participagoing for a man at death's door five years ago.

'Every day I feel grateful. I feel like I am on borrowed time. I wanted to get fit and healthy and that lead to the games. I won my age group in the 5k run and actually got line honours in the race beating men a lot younger than myself, I was quite happy about that.

running a time of 54.44 for the 10k course and decided then to enter the Transplant Games.

What is next for Chris? The 17th World Transplant Games will be held on the Gold Coast next year for eight days from August 22 (www.worldtransplantgames09.com). Chris is not sure yet if he will compete – he'll see when the time comes.

Chris is eternally grateful for his life gift and hopes to work toward raising awareness of the plight of those waiting for their precious gift.

Unfortunately, Australia has one of the lowest organ donation rates in the developed world. An estimated 100 people die each year while waiting for an organ transplant due to the shortage of organ and tissue donors.

Last Thursday the Senate passed legislation to set up a national organ donation and transplant system. The government will spend \$151 million over the next four years on programs to improve the rate of organ and tissue donation in Australia and funding will also be made available to support transplant doctors and other specialist staff in both public and private hospitals.

Prime Minister Kevin Rudd is sympathetic to the cause as he is himself the recipient of an aortic valve, a gift he received in his mid-30s as the result of damage from a bout of rheumatic fever during his childhood.

You can help save lives by registering your consent to become an organ and tissue donor. Remember to tell your partner, family or friends about your decision.
