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

With 2008 HSC results filtering through over the past couple of days, Byron Bay High School students have had a lot to celebrate. Approximately 20% of students received a UAI over 90, which places the school as the top performing State High School on the North Coast of NSW.

The school's top performer for the year was David Hertzberg with 99.6 (which is the highest UAI ever recorded at Byron High), closely followed by Kirra Liu at 98.5 and Sholto Forbes-Spyratos at 98.4. In addition, Kirra came second in the State in Personal Development, Health and Physical Education (out of 12,995 contenders) with a score of 99.0. 






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# Kay's memories for all to read

Kay's Stephen's personal story spans her life in pre-World War II England, through marriage and motherhood to her migration to Australia.

'She is highly respected by staff and students and her compassion for students and wisdom in supporting teachers and parents have made her a legendary figure in the school community.



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
# Rusty racks up his 25th guide

He has been in publishing longer than anyone in this area, and is in a truly unique position to provide insight into why counter culture emerged when it did and why this region became a magnet for it. Rusty Miller is truly one of Byron Bay's more colourful personalities that identify the Shire from other holiday destinations in Australia, and his annual free Byron Guide has just turned 25 years

As a native southern Californian, he was born in La Jolla and started surfing in 1953. In the early 60s he travelled each December to the north shore of Ohau where he earned a reputation riding the big waves at Sunset Beach, Waimea and Pipeline. In 1965 Rusty achieved what most American surfer's dream of - USA Surfing Champion. By the late sixties he moved to Hanalei on the island of Kauai. 'It was 1967. As my professional surfing career was fading, I dropped back into soul surfing to live on this most north west piece of America.'

The uncrowded perfect waves of Byron Bay in Australia beckoned in the early 70s, however, and during the Aquarius Festival in 1972, he produced the region's first alternative free newspaper, The Byron Express.

#### Surf legends

In a trip to Bali later that year, Rusty found himself surfing the now renowned Ulu Watu for the first time, and footage from that was included in the surfing film, Morning of the Earth. 'Actually I am only in about five shots in the film, he told *The Echo*. 'It's just that they used Steve Cooney and myself on the main logo which is on all the records, T-shirts, boards etc.' It remains to this day a seminal piece of filmmaking and introduced the international surfing world to the magic of Indonesian waves and culture.

In 1984 Rusty was contracted by the Byron Bay Chamber of Commerce Tourist Promotions Committee to produce the *By*ron Bay Holiday Guide. 'I start-

At the same time he also earned chamber of commerce, Rusty says, 'but they made me tender to do all the work each year, so I registered the name and did it myself. They were very unhappy with me for years.'

> It's still in its current A5 format, aimed at locals and visitors alike. It portrays the spirit, feeling and contemporary pulse of Byron through images, writing, handy clues and advertisments that connect you to our world.

> What significant changes has Rusty witnessed in the Shire the past three decades?

#### More sharks

'More sharks! Both the two legged and ocean variety. Even though it sounds scary, it's the reality of being in the water. Upon the land, overdevelopment obviously.

'The concepts, ideas and experiences that people wish to have here are similar, and more people are coming here to obtain them. If you are in advertis-

'The contradiction is that the very thing that draws people here – art forms of all nature and music, for example, that is played for little or nothing - brings people to this region. If you are involved in yoga or surfing, you are probably not bringing in the big bucks, you are doing it because you love it.

'When people use Byron as a real estate financial cash cow, there will be resentment and disempowerment, because creative people find it more difficult to live here. It's interesting times however because of the global financial collapse, and people are still coming here even after the meltdown. It seems things are turning back to basics. As an example I can't see rents going up that much more.'

How does Rusty feel about holiday letting, schoolies week and the like?

'I believe in responsible planning and regulation. If you are living near an industrial estate for example and fibreglass dust is coming into your window, you need protection. That's an extreme example, but planning ensures safe and equitable living standards for all.

'The same goes for someone who is on holidays and having a party next door and you are trying to get your kids to sleep because they have to go to school the next day. Maybe a little less crowds and more quality lifestyle where people visiting are unashamedly reminded that they shoud stay in touch with the natural elements. With respect to law and order, I like to see the police walking and riding bikes about town, talking and being friendly and hip.

'The 2009 theme for the Guide is Byron: The perception and reality. I struggled, as all the writers did, with this theme.

We don't determine our time or place or choose our parents. But in our lifetime as individuals we can choose to change location, philosophy and the way

### Challenges facing Council

Byron Shire Councillors go into the new year for a well-deserved break and will meet again in February 2009 – unless a special meeting is called. They will not be entirely off the case during this time, however, the mayor especially continuing her commitment to ensuring New Years Eve in the Bay goes off peacefully. No-one should underestimate the enormity of the workload facing councillors nor the seriousness of their responsibilities.

As per some twisted tradition, their last agenda for the year was again ridiculously large - around 300 pages in reports and the same again in annexures. No-one can be expected to read and fully absorb that much material in the time available, yet we do expect councillors to make sound decisions on these weighty matters, from individual development applications to overarching policy directions. Part of the problem is that staff need Council resolution on a number of items before our elected representatives take leave; the other part of the problem is that councillors' aspirations expressed in resolutions overwhelm their ability to carry them out. As a community we expect too much from an underfunded and under-resourced organisation, yet it is better to aim for the stars even if we end up in the gutter which, hopefully, meets Australian construction standards.

Another struggle for this council, as with councils in general, is a state government which sees it as a convenient whipping boy, handing on onerous tasks without providing appropriate support. The latest fly in the ointment is the government's plan to reduce development contributions made to local government, following on constant whingeing by developer mates. The submission from the Local Government and Shires Association on this issue can be found at www.lgsa.org.au/developmentcontributions. The plan would enable the planning minister to decide what levies are applied where and to keep levies with the Treasury instead of them going straight to the local council. Expect fewer community facilities in the future if the plan goes ahead, along with increased rates to make up the lost revenue, but don't blame Council for the problem. Some hope lies in the federal government's recent overtures to councils and the possibility of constitutional recognition as a third tier of government and escape from the state government's oily grasp – but don't hold your breath.

Of course the biggest uncertainty for coastal councils, and for all of us, is the future effect of climate change. We have perhaps become blasé about the power of the ocean, having thankfully avoided a major cyclone since 1974, but change is on the way. Council is incorporating planning for climate change into its policies and documents but in the end the execution of coastline management may be down to emergency services and lawyers at twenty paces.

Remarkably, these six corporate giants sold about US\$100 billion worth of military equipment to the Pentagon in 2007, and their combined revenue from global military sales was \$130 billion in 2006. They were touting their wares at the Brisbane Land Warfare Conference recently where Raytheon unveiled its Silent Guardian crowd control technology, which rings a prohibited area with a force-field capable of penetrating clothing and burning any intruder by

zapping their nerve endings. I call on Justine Elliot to challenge the Rudd government's dealings with these arms manufacturers, many of which are involved in criminal behaviour: bribery, sale of torture equipment, falsified end-user export certificates and government defraud. She should also ask if US forces in Australia stockpile/test cluster bombs. in asking the US to divest itself of cluster bomb stockpiles?

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# Local to go over the Alps by balloon

What does an adventure tourism pioneer do once they 'retire' to the North Coast? Quite a bit! Describing himself as 'retired before the recent stock market crash, now semi-retired', Mullumbimby resident Chris Dewhirst has just been commissioned by the tourism authorities of the Capannori region of Northern Tuscany (near Pisa in Italy) to fly their promotional hot-air balloon over the Alps in the new year.

Chris, who led the first successful balloon flight over Mt Everest, seems like just the chap for the job. Awarded an OAM for his contribution to adventure tourism, in the early 1970's Chris was the first to rock climb up the east face of Frenchman's Cap in South West Tasmania, and the first Australian to ascend the Nose Route and Salathe Route on El Capitan in Yosemite National Park (at which time these climbs were record of 37,400 feet. 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

# Late moves to ease Byron Bay traffic woes shot down

A notice of motion by Mayor Jan Barham at last Thursday's meeting to 'improve traffic flow in Byron Bay' went down 5-4, Crs Tucker, Woods, Heeson, Cameron and Morrisey voting against.

Cr Barham called for a report to the first meeting of Council in 2009 to look at a number of options including the use of an alternative access through the town via a second rail crossing; removing the parking on the northern side of Shirley Street to facilitate an additional traffic lane; or the removal of the southern Shirley Street parking for the creation of a dedicated bike lane; the widening of the existing railway crossing to facilitate an additional lane to support the traffic entering the town that includes traffic turning left into the caravan park, turning left into Jonson and through traffic; and the possibility of out of town parking to facilitate a shuttle bus/cycle sharing service to the town. Council would have also written to the Minister for Transport 'seeking a trial of the alternative access that involves the second rail crossing.

In notes to her motion Cr Barham said, 'A trial of an access route that bypasses the town centre to provide access

to the southern side of the town could be undertaken with the approval of the Minister for Transport by approval for a second crossing of the railway. The traffic that is wanting to travel to the south of the town would do so via Butler Street, cross the railway lane and then access Jonson Street via a turn left only exit to then turn right into Marvel Street.

'The congestion that arises along Shirley Street could be minimised by removing the parking on the northern side of the street to provide an additional lane and at the entrance to the town the existing crossing being made a two lane crossing. The addition of an additional lane on the rail crossing into the town would facilitate the traffic that is turning left into the caravan park or seeking to turn left to go to the beachfront that is mixed with the traffic that is seeking to go through the town.

#### **Transport strategy**

On a more upbeat note, Councillors voted 8-1 in favour of Cr Basil Cameron's motion to develop a shirewide transvoted against and, interestingly, there were no speeches against. Cr Cameron's specific

He also called for the introduction of trams: 'Let us use the rail line through Byron for a tram type service, linking Sunrise to the High School and all points in between. With the addition of park and ride, the catchment could extend to Ewingsdale, Suffolk Park and areas

further out. 'It would cost less to get a tram service up than it would to build a bypass and show the world that we are a community that is prepared to live by the values we share. Better that we are remembered for our tram than a traffic snarl.

#### Council and the Splendour challenge

Following public addresses calling for Council not to defend its approval of a Splendour concert at Yelgun against a Land & Environment Court challenge by CONOS, Councillors voted 8-1, Cr Morrisey opposed, to authorise the General Manager 'to manage the litigation in accordance with the General Manager's general delegations'. Council resolved

also to get 'regular updates, by way of memo, on the progress of this matter'.

There is more to it, however, according to Mayor Barham. She told *The Echo*, 'Council has provided direction to the GM to manage the legal case but to advise the councillors on further information that should be forthcoming in relation to the issues and advice to Council in relation to matters with the case, particularly in relation to the issues and whether to defend or not. It may result in a special meeting of Council in the new year.

'It is usual practice to have the advice on the prospects prior to making a decision about defending but as the matter has been expedited by Splendour it has not allowed for the issues to be defined and considered for legal advice to Council. Apparently there are three boxes of documents that are being sorted and read prior to advice being able to be given.

#### **Good news for** library

The new Byron Bay library planned for Middleton Street got a move-along with Council voting 9-0 to authorise consultants Stephenson Turner to produce detailed designs for DA lodgement. Currently Council has a capital budget of \$4.8 million for the project with a projected shortfall of \$305,841 in funds. There is a possibility of further grant funding from the State Country Libraries Fund and other sources.

The great nature adventures all begin here, where we live. What you need to do is tune in to what everything else is doing. Sure, people take up a lot of your attention. This makes it hard to notice the rest of the world. But if you stop, wait and listen to something else, you will easily begin your own explorations.

Start by walking to the beach. Take a notebook, a pen or pencil and refreshments for yourself. A watch is handy, too.

The trick is to do like the animals do: look around up ahead of where you are walking. They are watching everything around them. So should you. They notice details. With a bit of practice, with asking yourself some very specific questions, you will learn to notice these details too.

Carpobrotus is a creeping plant of the sand dunes that helps hold sand together. How many other species of plants also grow in a similar way? How do they hold the sand? Remember to always write Can you sketch them and the date, time, place and compare the leaves, branches, weather on each page of your roots, flowers (if any) seeds? How would you guess the size of each plant?

Walk through the plant community from the back of the dune down to the front. What species of plants do you find along your path? How many are in your list? Can you make up a symbol for each of them? Using the symbols, could you draw a map marking where these plants are? Can you find the names of these plants?

What if you do meet an Echidna! They are so very shy, quiet and very sensitive to vibrations. If you wait quietly for a while, it may get busy again. What is it doing? Where is it

Can you see any signs of digging? Can you find any of its scat (animal poo)? It's unusual, with its ends looking 'chopped off'. Are there other places you can spot these marks and signs? Each Echidna hikes a lot over its territory, which can be up to fifty hectares. They often have four or five favourite burrows they use to rest and stay cool during hot days. Can you find any? What about keeping a diary about all you are finding out? Can you make a map of the world of one Echidna?

If you wait and the Echidna does not move, is it perhaps injured? Without touching it, can you see if there is any blood? Listen: is the animal breathing in a noisy way? Perhaps someone can watch for it while you get help: ringing the wildlife volunteers from WIRES is a good start.

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


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


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# When flowers bloom in a corner of hell

Within five minutes of meeting Kirsty Sked I cried and laughed and cried again. Hers is a story not so much about herself and not much more about where she has been, but more about the people she has met.

home in Brunswick Heads and Lismore where she works as a physiotherapist at the Base hospital, a challenging career in itself but not the only option for Kirsty.

'After a few years being a physio, I decided that I didn't want to spend all my time treating tennis elbow. I took a year off to visit developing countries and work in their hospitals.

Since 1997 the Democratic Republic of the Congo, the DRC - formerly called Zaire has been rent by ethnic strife and civil war, touched off by a massive inflow in 1994 of refugees from the fighting in Rwanda and Burundi. This is the bloodiest war since

#### Breaking the spirit

The strongest weapon used in this horrific conflict is breaking the spirit of the people. Children are given guns and told to just use them, women and children are repeatedly raped and held captive as sex slaves, their captors knowing they will be rejected when they return home; and families are made to act out atrocities upon their Kirsty found herself in Africa friends, neighbours and their own families under the threat of death, atrocities so unspeakable that I cannot stomach recounting them on this page, suffice to say that the Congolese are living all our worst nightmares.

Kirsty has not only witnessed these atrocities first hand, she has returned to Africa over and over again to simply help these people to help themselves. They are constantly talking about forgiveness and all of their songs are about forgiving their neighbours and others who have hurt them. They know that hatred and revenge will be the end for them so they don't succumb to it.'

#### Simple needs

When she set out on this path she simply asked the people what they wanted, what the needed and their response was plain. They needed a bag of seed and a hoe to work the earth, and they needed a goat. It has been Kirsty's personal mission to provide these basic items which can and do turn the lives of these people around and put them in a position to help themselves.

Kirsty has no political alliance in the Congo. She has met General Laurent Nkunda, the antagonist in this war, a man who is wanted for war crimes and crimes against humanity by the Congolese government.

'I ate goat and cheese from fine china in Nkunda's jungle hideout. We were surrounded by about 60 of his personal armed guard with rocket propelled guns and other machines of death. I went with two armed convoys, my aim was to visit people in his camps and register the survivors of sexual violence in the region. I asked Nkunda for his permission to have access and he was very positive and welcomed any help for the women and children who were war affected.'

Like scenes from an Indiana Jones movie, Kirsty and her small band of aides have traversed the Congo in rickety old trucks and vans and cars through armed borders, guard

posts and muddy mountains and jungles where a person could be lost forever, taking seed and goats to the victims of this terrible war.

To date she has delivered 1100 hoes, two tonnes of seed, and 350 goats. She has provided 30 rabbits to men who have stayed with their abused wives, and 33 soccer balls. This is a venture that Kirsty finances herself from her work as a physio in Australian hospitals.

The most refreshing thing about this woman is that she's not angling for your donation or a monthly stipend for some cheeky faced urchin on a postcard. She doesn't really need you to hear about the work she has done or the horrors that she has seen, but she does want you to know that we should never give up on anyone no matter how crushed they may

irreparable so we give up on corner of hell.

them and throw them away. Over there they embrace the broken. They have a strong drive for survival. They look at their life and the lives of their people around them and they say to themselves, "I will be restored", and they are. Something in this darkness is really powerful. We need to learn from that.'

For strength and inspiration Kirsty calls to mind a quote from Dan Eldon, an English photojournalist who was killed in 1993 by an angry mob in Mogadishu: 'Once one has been to these challenging terrible places they're always strangely drawn back, because there's nothing that can compare to seeing the raw reality of the basic human need for survival. It disgusts and inspires.'

#### Will to live

Kirsty says that in these desperate war zones, the little people rise up and recover and rise up and recover because they have an unquenchable will to live. They move through horror and enter hope so quickly. They still dance and sing with more energy than can be imagined.

'They are the beautiful mystery of life. For them, nothing is guaranteed so they cherish each moment. A meal a day is embraced because they know tomorrow the meal or the people they share it with could be gone.

'They live powerfully and with a strange joy mixed with despicable fear and suffering. They choose to be alive. And it is a phenomenal privilege for me to share my resources with them. Meeting humans of this calibre, I don't need a TAFE course in self development.'

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
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# How do we measure greening success?

Remember when the protection of the environment was the domain of the conservation movement? Remember the committed individuals involved in the battles to save the forests and the Franklin River? The movement they pioneered is no longer regarded as radical - in fact, their views could almost be seen now as mainstream. The words 'environment', 'green', 'sustainable', 'renewable' that dominated their campaigns in the 1970s and 1980s are now the catchcries of the 21st century. Environmental issues have gone from being the possessions of 'greenies' to dominate our politics, our media and indeed our lives. Everyone talks about climate change; community groups around the country are busy with projects to benefit the environment. Children in our schools are taught about recycling, sustainable living and how to reduce their footprint on the earth. The environment is now a major area of discussion for political parties and governments have realised that people are concerned about the state of Australia's natural resources and the future we are leaving for our children.

#### A different approach

Everyone seems to be doing something for the environment and there are dozens of community groups on the far north coast that are working on Landcare and coastal care projects and their efforts are much appreciated. But how do these projects, and others funded or managed by the different tiers of government, marry up in the big scheme of things? If the environment continues to grow in terms of its importance to the Australian public – and it will - do we need to approach it differently?

I believe we do and it was with interest I recently picked up an article by the Wentworth Group of Concerned Scientists.

The article Accounting for Nature: a model for building the national environmental accounts of Australia raises some interesting points about the environment and the myriad resbeing run by the Commonwealth, State and Local governments, and community groups around the country.

The authors of the paper point out that approximately \$8 billion a year is spent by governments in Australia on environmental projects but they question an absence of processes to account for how the money was spent and the success, or otherwise. of the projects. Are they making a difference? Is the money being spent wisely? The authors promote taking accounting stand-



ascertain the state of the country's economy, and applying

them to the environment. I have a background in economics and I can see merit in taking this approach to the environment. On a micro level most of us are trying to do what we can to minimise our impact on the environment. We know about the big picture when it comes to global warming, pollution etc. On a local level people can and are being empowered to do their bit for the environment – for example composting, turning off unused appliances, limiting the number of trips to town, switching to solar hot water or alternative forms of energy and recycling garbage and household items.

#### Measuring success

A lot of people on the far north coast are genuinely concerned about the environment. The natural attributes of the region give many of us genuine pleasure. Who isn't moved by the majesty of the rainforests, the might of our rivers and the sight of dolphins and whales off the coast?

There are scores of community groups, local, State and Commonwealth government departments and individuals all working to improve environmental outcomes in this region. How do we measure the success of their work? Success in some cases is clearly visible or easy to calculate – other projects are more complex.

The authors of the *Account*toration and study programs ing for Nature report believe that the implementation of a and cities. national environmental accounting system will allow for greater control and accountability of money channelled into environmental projects. They advocate for a nationally controlled base for all projects to provide a strong framework, avoid duplication and allow for project outcomes to be genuinely measured.

Such a system would build on the work done by organisations like the Northern Rivers Catchment Management Authority (NRCMA), which coordinates ards, similar to those used to and funds environmental resto-

ration projects from the Tweed south to the Hastings local government areas.

The Wentworth Group of Scientists suggests catchment management authorities would make up a regional framework providing annual reports about particular regions. These reports would eventually be used to guide policy development.

#### **Caring for Country**

It appears the Federal Government is looking at the work outlined by the Wentworth Group of Scientists. In July 2008 it announced the commencement of its Caring for Country program which, as stated on its website, 'seeks to achieve an environment that is healthy, better protected and resilient and provide essential eco-system services in a changing environment'.

The Federal Government has identified six areas as national priorities with the programs to have short-term goals and a business plan to be released each year. It lists the priority areas as the National Reserve System, biodiversity and natural icons, coastal environments and crucial aquatic habitats, sustainable farm practices, natural resource management in northern and remote Australia and community skills, knowledge and engagement.

Similarly the Wentworth Group's report calls for the recognition of five environmental assets: land, water, greenhouse gas emissions, marine and coastal resources and towns

If we are serious about the future of Australia and the protection, and indeed enhancement, of our natural environment, we need reform. We need to stop looking at environmental issues in isolation, instead focusing on a local project and its relationship to regional, state and national plans.

Decisions about funding and projects need to be coordinated. This would result in less duplication of resources, and would overcome the oftenconflicting agendas and objectives of different government years between 1995 and 2003.

agencies, catchment management authorities and local governments. I am confident we would see better environmental outcomes. Funding should be specifically targeted and the outcomes of projects would be analysed for their success or otherwise with information detailed in regular reports.

For Australia to move towards a system resembling the National Environmental Accounts system suggested by the Wentworth Group there would need to be a change of thinking and attitude in all levels of government.

Planning and administration for such a system would need to transcend politics. That is, governments would need to abandon short-term plans designed to win votes and concentrate instead on 'the big picture'. There would need to be an acceptance that the preservation, protection and enhancement of the Australian environment are jobs of enormous magnitude, requiring long-term planning, goal setting and coordination.

#### The big picture

How much would it cost? While it would take some time and creative thinking to set the system up to ensure it is accountable and transparent to all stakeholders, the bones of the skeleton are in place already.

Like other CMAs around the country, the Northern Rivers Catchment Management Authority allocates funding to a range of diverse projects on the far north coast of New South Wales and is integrated in the Commonwealth's Caring for Country program. State and territory and local governments also have a range of environmental initiatives.

Individually each project obviously has it merits but how do those projects fit into 'the big picture' or marry with others being implemented in the catchment area? A national accounting system would provide a framework to show not only where the billions of dollars are being spent, but also where they need to be spent.

Planning for the long-term is not something governments in Australia traditionally do very well - the emphasis being on winning the next election. However, the future of Australia, its plants and animals and natural resources and the way we live and work are at stake so here's hoping the new year brings with it changes to the way we approach the environment providing for long-term strategic planning to ensure the natural assets of our country are protected and enhanced.

# Advance Care Directives: How the elderly can take control of their future medical care

Advance Care Directives are important forms that document your wishes for treatment if you fall ill and no longer have the mental capacity to make decisions for medical treatment.

As some people get older they think about filling in a form that deals with their treatment choices if they become seriously unwell and are too ill to express their wishes. The form I've developed is only two sides of foolscap paper and should be reasonably easy to understand. The Advance Care Directive is available on the internet at www.moonstmedical. com.au/ACD. A family member, friend or GP may be able to print this off for you.

nursing home, this may not be important to you if you at least had a chance that your life and suffering would end sooner.

It is essential for you to discuss the form with close family and your Enduring Guardian if you have one. That way you can be confident that they will advocate for your choices if vou become ill.

When you've completed the form you should take it to your doctor who should go through it with you to make sure you have filled it in correctly and consistently.

If you have mild dementia he will confirm whether you still have capacity to make these decisions. Your GP should keep the original. Ask him or her to annotate your 'Past Medical History' on written notes or computer to indicate that you have an ACD.

Remember, the form will common causes of death in only ever be used if you lose the capacity to make decisions. You should review it every two years or if your general health deteriorates as your opinions to treatment may change with time. In NSW ACDs are legally binding and are governed by the Law of Consent.

With cries of "Jo Saturnalia!" the celebration would include masquerades in the streets, big festive meals, visiting friends, and the exchange of good luck gifts called Strenae (lucky fruits). Romans decked their halls with garlands of laurel and green trees lit with candles.

The Persians adopted their annual renewal festival from the Babylonians. New Years Day was celebrated by burning fires all night. There were feasts, acts of charity and a number of deities were honored and prayers performed to ensure the total victory of sun that was essential for the protection of winter crops. There would be prayers to Mithra and feasts in his honor for protecting "the light of the early morning". One of the themes of the festival was the temporary subversion of order. Masters and servants reversed roles. The king dressed in white would change place with ordinary people. A mock king was crowned and masquerades spilled into the streets. As the old year died, rules of ordinary living were relaxed.







The Hopi tribal celebrations are dedicated to giving aid and direction to the sun which is ready to return and give strength to new life. Their ceremony is called Soyal. It lasts for 20 days and includes prayerstick making, purification, rituals, and a concluding rabbit hunt, feast and blessings.

## Jewish Hanukkah

The Jewish rabbinical holiday of Hanukkah is another winter solstice celebration. Hanukkah, originally called Chag Haurim - the festival of light, commemorates the rebuilding of the temple after Judah Maccabee defeated King Antiochus. A menorah was found, but there was only enough oil to keep the lamp lit for one day ... miraculously it lasted eight days! The Hanukkah "festival of lights" is clearly a metaphor for the solstice's lengthening of the light ... the return of the sun. In commemoration of this event a menorah, a 9-branched candlestick, is lit each of 8 nights (using the ninth candle), amid singing and blessings.







John Butler has cut his dreads. The pin-up boy for Aussie roots has come of age, and just when he looked like becoming a hippy icon, he's done a Bowie and had a bit of a makeover. John now spends as much time touring overseas as he does playing Aussie gigs, something he finds suits him quite well from his home base in Western Austraia.

#### So does John Butler ever look in the mirror and gawp, how come I got hit with the lucky stick?

'It's hard to stay to outside of your story, you can't even look at yourself outside of your body! Every now and then I look outside. What is incredible is that I can feed my family and do great things from the fruits of my art. It's something I thank God for every day. I see a lot of tight belts and suffering and not to be in that position is surreal in a kind of macabre sense. It's a spin out, but for me it comes from a great sense of responsibility and I am head down in the middle of the creation of a storm and trying to do something and contribute.' And contribute he has. With the profits from his super successful independent career, Butler has set up the JB Seed Project. Now in its fourth year, this project is unique in its ability to pull together the established and the emerging within the arts community to share resources and knowledge, subsequently creating a sense of community. This is achieved while maintaining the flexibility to operate in a responsive manner, to offer what artists in the establishment phase of their career require to assist them in becoming self sustained.

For John, being able to offer assistance to fellow artists is a vital part of his creative process

'They are very driven people and to be part of the incremental process is amazing.'

John Butler made his name by touring. He sold CDs under his own label from the back of the tour van. In an industry that has always favoured the Holy Grail of the **Record Deal, Butler cleaned** up. And he did it ethically. His journey to success has been an inspiration to artists who once again found their belief in the importance of passion and cutting a path your way. For Butler, he was inspired by fellow musicians who'd already blazed a trail.

'I learnt from The Waifs. You don't wait for someone else to make it happen for you. You go out there and grab the audience by the scruff of the neck. You have to make it happen for yourself, and once you have success, people go back and look at the success and pick it apart, but you can overanalyse technique and strategy. There is always going to be the art, passion, and audacity and for me there is a certain amount of that ethos: Hey, if they are doing it there is no reason I can't! And then there is the X factor. People relating to something as an animal instinct, people relate and see passionate people creating something unique, it inspires me when I see it, when I see something or read Noam Chomsky and think outside my own box. I am attracted to people that have their own shit going on and they live their life with passion.

'People are often talking about

what is power? Is it passion? Is it purpose? Or, is it profit? They are the four things that make a business work, what most people agree on is purpose, when you have purpose you have power, and passion, and usually you will end up profitable.

'For me, it was all about purpose. It was about me being creative, paying the rent, contributing to my society, you can't bottle anything, if you could there would be a million and one of me's or Powderfinger. You just need to find how to do things your own way.

'As musicians we are in the process of creation, I don't want to say business, with all honesty. You have to look at how you create and survive off it, and there's no book about how to create from the ether, but that's what we do.

#### So how does John **Butler do his** bit to minimise his carbon footprint?

'I see it as a chess game and you have to be willing to lose some pawns to get the king. When you get the king you can change all the things like if you are too fundamentalistic at the start then you don't do

carbon flying around the world but hopefully I am part of the consciousness shift around the world and inspire other people.'

## **Make the Exodus** The **Exodus Cyber Tribal Festival** returns for its eighth






#### **Under a New Moon**

## to Your Senses: Tantra Teacher Toni at Star Light Festival

According to tantra teacher Toni De Marco we've been doing it all wrong. The relationships between men and women fail on the basis that we haven't learnt how to maintain and grow intimacy, both sexual and emotional with our partners, and so are left returning to the market, trading in a partner for new one very similar to the old one. In her workshop Tantric Sacred Relationships, Toni offers advice on how to kick start relationships, how to love yourself, open your heart, renew your passion and for singles, how to be ready for a sacred relationship. She also has five easy ways to achieve multiple orgasm.

#### A guest speaker and facilitator at The Starlight Festival in Bangalow this year January 8 – 11, Toni de Marco is a remarkable woman.

Originally a model, this Californian girl was always a seeker of something a little deeper than an all over tan and perfect teeth. In her mid twenties she began training as a counsellor, specialising in working with couples finding ways to enhance their intimacy. Many years later, after a journey through Yoga and NLP, Toni found herself training as a Tantra teacher and using the intuition and knowledge gained from years of practise to assist people find the happiness and satisfaction they seek in relationship.

'What led me to studying tantra was stale relationships, where the sex just went downhill. I thought, there must be exceptions, but I noticed the similarities in all these

relationships that I was having and I thought maybe it was someting to do with me, I kept going out with my father. Not that I wanted to consciously, but I would keep changing them into my father. Finding a way to healthy relationships is about identifying and working with our family patterns.'

'I realised I kept trading in for the same guy. Then I realised it was me! You are 100% responsible for your life, whatever happens you have to be accountable for it. You start to realise that it's not out there – it's in there.'

#### So what advice does Toni give to married couples, or couples in long term relationships to aid the longevity of their union?

'I always tell people when they come to my workshop to put aside four or five hours to spend with your partner one evening per week. Too many people let their life get in the way, you just have to make the time. A little quickie is okay from time to time but the relationship needs more nourishment. If you have kids, then you need to arrange they stay with a friend or relative. It seems difficult, but really it's the most important thing.'

## But it's not all about maintaining sexual intimacy.

'I suggest one other hour midweek where you have a withhold session, where you get to share all the things that you have been withholding, its a safe place, there is no argument, it's a conciliatory place.

'You need to be able to tell people how you are feeling.

A withhold session gives you a couple of days to get it together to come from your feelings. When you are hurt, the first thing people want to do is point the finger and blame the other person. You have to say – when you do that I feel... You can't be wrong for that, and it teaches you to respect each other's feelings.'

## So why is communication so important?

'If people can't talk to each other they can't have good sex. People usually have good sex at the beginning of a relationship when they don't really know each other.'

# So how do new couples set up habits so they don't go down the paths that have injured their previous relationships?

'I get couples to work out a partnership contract that states what their boundaries are, what does and doesn't work and to renegotiate it every couple of months so you are in that relationship for what you want.'

For Toni, the key to all successful relationships is recognising our patterns. We have to face the story we are living out, consciously or unconsciously so that we have the opportunity to change it. Consciousness helps us to become chain breakers. It also frees our kids from living out our stories.

'According to my first teacher, you can never get rid of your family history, but you can build positive patterns in the area you want to and once in a while you might bring people

into your life to work things out – 90% of healing the problem is realising that you have the problem.'


#### Toni aims to bridge the gap between men and women's sexual arousal.

'The reason why we need longer love making is that it takes a woman 45 minutes to an hour to get hot and juicy. How many couples are there that have sex in 15 minutes? At least half the women on the planet aren't getting satisfied and are faking orgasms. They don't know what the problem is

'Women need to be stroked, my first tantra teacher used to say men are like pop tarts stick em in the toaster they're done in a few minutes, but women are like a casserole, you have stick it in the oven for 45 minutes to an hour to get hot and juicy.'

## So what can people expect at the Starlight Festival?

'The Starlight Festival is a 2 hour session where we do at least a couple of things out of the workshop: a process called compassionate communication which is learning to speak from your feelings and then I teach the five techniques to multiple orgasm. # A Happy mAn

For over a decade musician and environmentalist Johnnie Mac has been living his dream, combining his love of culture and country with his project Ganngjalah Cultural Gardens taking shape and his album, *The World Seems Happy* ready to launch.

Johnnie talks about his music and his garden project as if it were the same thing. The two concepts intertwining and weaving, the album echoes this beautiful delicate dance of story and place.

'It's been a long time coming! I have a good life and why stuff it up with music! Seriously, I have wanted to get my music out there and get it out the right way, it's the Jeff Buckley syndrome, you are a bit perfectionist and get very anal about the songs. The artist doing the CD rang me and said: you have the date wrong - the song's 15 years old! I said no it's right it's taken me that long to get it on disk! But it sounds so relevant, and the issues are still timely. We want to have a big impact and reach as many people as we can with this album.

'One of the songs is closely tied in and came out of the project – out of the Ganngjalah Cultural Gardens a place we have been working on with the traditional custodians for eight years. We have a bush tucker program and we educate people about landcare and indigenous issues and tell story about the environment. It's at Mt Burrell, where the cafe is where we are doing the CD launch.'

#### I asked Johnnie what inspires him, what it is that ignites such a verbose passion.

'It's my love of Australia, that's the most important aspect.

It comes out in my songs.
Without that cultural cringe. It's about Australia's environment,
Australia's people, indigenous and non-indigenous. It's that flavour that inspires me to work and teach and also sing.'
The music is thick with messages, delivered with the conviction, and as Triple J presenter Robbie Buck says: 'It's a passionate and provocative Aussie blend of the Violent Femmes and Billy Bragg.

inspiring messages with great melodies and a vibrant streak of angst.'

## It's true. And it cuts to the bone. One of the songs is *Chant of Namatjira*.

'It's about what happened to Albert Namatjira, his life and how that reflects how we treat indigenous people – we are interested when they are famous and then we are afraid of indigenous people when they aren't famous. We need to set up relationship with indigenous community – part of the success of the gardens is that we get to establish those relationships.'

#### It's the perception of Australia and our identity that Johnnie is keen on changing.

'I remember when I travelled and I was singing some of these songs and heard Europeans say: you don't have much culture in Australia. I said No we have 40 – 100,000 years of culture, and that changed people's view of culture. I sang *Chant of Namatjira* in Western Australia in a pub recently – you could have heard a pin drop, at the end of the song, someone yelled out what is a Namatjira? It was perfect. So many people dont know his story or the tragedy of his story And we are not learning how to change.

'We have to work together and do things together physically. One of the fellas I work with in the gardens will be singing with me - Kyle Slabb, he'll be playing percussive instruments and chanting and singing. The message from him is we have to do things together and build things together, and that's the only way we'll get the longevity in the relationships. We do a lot of story

telling in the show.'

#### After years of recording, Johnnie has managed to get the band together.

'The difficulty we have is getting the musicians together in the one spot! There are five in the band, Sham on backing vocals, Kyle on indigenous flavours and Bill Jacobi on bass and Malcolm Clarke is the drummer from the Sleepy Jacksons. Getting them together is the challenge. I recorded in the same way that's why it's taken so long although, getting Kyle in was hardest even though it was local because he was crossing boundaries, we recorded at Nimbin Bushtracks, a few times he came out he got headaches and couldn't do it, once he asked permission from the traditional custodians it came together in an hour.'

# Border Art Prize winners announced

An excited crowd of keen artists, art lovers, friends and supporters attended the award presentation of the Border Art Prize at the Friends' annual Christmas party.

The award is open to artists from the northern NSW and south east Queensland residing in the Tweed Shire Council, Gold Coast City Council and adjoining council areas.

Three hundred and twenty three entries are on show, as an open award this means a huge display of diverse artwork by professional, amateur and emerging artists. For many people this sort of award is their first time to show their artwork publicly.

This year's winners are: first prize of \$3,000 was won by Avital Sheffer from Mullumbimby with a beautiful earthenware clay vase titled Sfat-em (mother tongue).

Brisbane art gallery director Bruce Heiser, from Heiser Gallery, commented for me, Avital's piece links us directly with the past. Its very shape and the material from which it was produced reflects antiquity, and this sense of "ancientness" is reinforced by the use of Hebrew, one of the world's great languages, as text. Informed by what has occurred in the past, Sfat-em (mother tongue) I would have us continue a dialogue with ourselves in which all our knowledge is ourselves to know'.

Robyn Sweaney, also from Mullumbimby, won the second prize of \$1500 with an oil on linen work *Far from the City*. Bruce Heiser said 'Robyn Sweaney's oil painting could be an Australian gothic. Shirley also awarded well known Murwillumbah potter Ann Lee's beautiful *Salt Fire*, wood fired teapot commenting that it is 'not your usual teapot (as it is) bold, beautifully glazed and carved'.

Although delighted to be selected Ann was unable to be at the Gallery to receive her award as she was on her way to see Cirque du Soleil in Brisbane! She said the award just made her day even better. Gallery staff note that when Ann discovers her work was also purchased on opening night she should be even happier.

The Border Art Prize is on exhibition over the Christmas and new year period until Sunday January 25. It is a must see exhibition and a great place to take your Christmas visitors to see everything from painting to pots, textiles to topiary (well, a hat made from leaves), landscapes, streetscapes, jewellery, modern, traditional, colourful, quirky and even a portrait of Rolf Harris.

Also on exhibition during this period are stunning works in Transmigration an installation by Natalie Kunst and Rachel Stone's Canary in a coalmine. #### BYRON BAY FILM FESTIVAL TAKES ON THE WORLD

Byron Bay Film Festival (bbff) recently announced the dates for the next festival (Friday March 5 to Saturday March 13, 2010), and its establishment as an entity in its own right with the addition of an 'international' tag.

Since its inception in 2006 bbff has experienced rapid growth. What began essentially as a back-catalogue screening of local filmmakers, an idea designed to raise funds for a beleaguered Community Centre, grew to 850 entries from around the world last

'We basically decided to change the name of the festival to reflect the international status that we've built up. With entries last year from 55 countries and films screened from 34 countries we're now in a position to wear that name credibly. We've kind of grown into it,' says festival director J'aimee Skippon-Volker.

The decision to run the next full nine-day festival in 2010 is primarily to allow a reasonable timeframe to call for entries and to organise the event. 'It's a huge task,' says J'aimee, 'and

has been a particularly popular activity. Children have control over their own projects, designing pieces and carry out all handiwork themselves. One of the first themes was swords, based on Buddhist ritual weapons. Young children designed and cut mini swords from sheet copper and brass using a variety of hand tools. Enameling has been a popular choice to create bag tags and pendants. The youths cut their initials from copper sheet and use a gas torch to heat from underneath to fuse the enamel onto the copper.

we want to give filmmakers the chance to think about their entries or even create something specifically for the festival.'

The 2010 festival also coincides with the celebration of a centenary of film at the Community Centre venue. And while that will be the focus of the festival J'aimee points out that it's also a celebration of where cinema is going in all of its facets rather than simply a retrospective.

'Up to this point we've been solely fundraising for the Community Centre, says J'aimee. 'We've now worked out an arrangement with them so we can split off to become our own entity in order to guarantee the sustainability of the festival itself.'

Most proceeds will continue to go back into the Centre and the arrangement between the parties is 'mutually supportive'. bbff retains the same team with the exception of the addition of Madeleine Faught, who met J'aimee through her involvement with the Activating Human Rights Film Festival and Conference.

It's also the same venue, the same awards, and the same

diversity in films although J'aimee agrees that, as a separate entity, they will have more control in the overall direction of future festivals. 'We can continue to push it forward in the way that suits the best interests of the festival,' says

One of these initiatives is to run 'satellite events' in 2009 to wet the appetite of film fans until the festival proper in 2010. 'In some ways they'll be like mini festivals, says J'aimee. 'It allows us to pick up on new releases while they're new, and films will still be eligible for awards at the festival if they've screened in one of the satellite

Despite the new international tag organisers have resolved to keep the acronym, bbff, because, says J'aimee, 'It's already well known, and supporting local filmmakers and films is a really important aspect of the festival. We hope, one day, to be able to offer grants to film makers through proceeds from the festival.

#### Frost/Nixon

Few of us, if any, see the need to take into account our own actions when judging the moral conduct of others - not that Richard M Nixon, the USA's disgraced 37th President should be exonerated for his gross betrayal of public trust. Nor does Ron Howard attempt anything so spurious in his brilliant new movie, adapted by Peter Morgan

from his award winning stage production, which covers the marathon interviews given by Nixon to British journalist David Frost in 1977 (who had interviewed him in 1968: they were not total strangers to each other, which is deleted from the official record here. Disingenuousness is not unique to politics). A tidy prologue clarifies for generations not familiar with

and the sorry scandal that led frost/nixon to Nixon's 1974 resignation, then the story plunges into the backroom wheeling and dealing that allowed for the deal to be struck. Michael Sheen's Frost, single-minded in his ambition to make it in America, is presented as a playboy of the western world rather than a bona fide interrogator and, with the excitable eyebrows of a ventriloquist's dummy and persistent salesman's smile, Sheen often appears to be channelling the Tony Blair he played in The Queen (also written by Morgan). It's a portrayal that is at odds with recollections of Frost, but it works well as a counter to the brooding, mercenary interviewee. Frank Langella as Nixon is simply great. A facial resemblance is not



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


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

#### 1. The Diving Bell and the **Butterfly**

You wouldn't credit that a film about a bed-ridden, paralysed Frenchman who can do



nothing but blink his left eye could be so engrossing. With dross the currency of all media, this is a reminder of how the best art can make your spirit soar. It's about the power of imagination, the necessity of communication and the primacy of love.

#### 2. Juno

The simple story of a schoolgirl who finds herself up the duff and how she, her family and boyfriend cope with the pregnancy. Diablo Cody's script is gossamer fine and director Jason Reitman keeps it real. Breezy, poignant and without histrionics, the moment when the entire audience goes to water is a beauty. Juno and Bleeker are winners and journeyman actor J K Simmons provides tremendous warmth as Dad.

#### 3. The Savages

A parent's passing is a sombre subject and a guarantee of minimal box office returns, especially in an area as agedenying as ours. Which is too bad, for writer/director Tamara Jenkins's treatment of the dying Lenny and his adult children, Jon and Wendy, is as delightful as it is sad, as confronting as it is comforting. Laura Linney and Philip Seymour Hoffman are superb as the siblings and its surprise last shot is the best of the year.

#### 4. The Band's Visit

If ever you hoped for two people to jump in the sack together it's Tawfiq and Dina in this Arab/Israeli production that is loaded with melancholy on a personal level, but charged with hope in its

promotion of cross-cultural understanding. The blokes in the Egyptian band wear the snazziest baby blue uniforms and Tawfiq winds it up with a song of exquisite longing.

#### 5. The Black Balloon

A beautiful boy-meets-girl story in the context of a family's struggle to raise an autistic/ ADD son. It has deservedly been awarded numerous gongs, but there was no nomination for Gemma Ward, who makes the movie. Her performance is enchanting and naturalistic, but the knobs at the AFI, revealing only their narrowness and precious selfregard, passed her over – she being a model and not an actress.

#### 6. Mongol

An epic in the grand tradition, covering Temudjin's life up until he'd established himself as the fearsome Genghis Khan on the verge of carving out his vast thirteenth century empire. Russian Sergei Bodrov's richly textured, convincing recreation of the period has an unambiguous morality, sweeping landscapes, mighty horseback charges and, though it may be cutely anachronistic, an enduring love story at its

#### 7. Gone Baby Gone

Casey Affleck followed his psychotic portrayal of Robert Ford in 'The Assassination of Jesse James' with an equally compelling effort as the down at heel private investigator seeking the whereabouts of an abducted child. The single



mother is a dope dealer in the grungy end of Boston and the question is posed: where does the kid's best interests lie? Gritty and provocative, even if the reveal is a tad far fetched.

#### 8. In the Shadow of the Moon Dealing with the Apollo program that ultimately saw

Neil Armstrong take his giant

leap for mankind on the Moon. there are no tricks or dazzling CGI, just conventional use of archival footage and personal commentary from eleven of the astronauts involved (excepting, alas, Armstrong himself). Uplifting for the vanishing ideals the men personify and the candour and humanity with which they reflect on their deeds.

## 9. Charlie Wilson's War Ever since 'The Graduate',

director Mike Nichols has consistently shown himself to be an astute observer of America's manners, mores and politics. This is an exposé of



how the road to the hellish mire of today's Afghanistan was paved with good intentions. Sardonic, uncomplicated and honest, with quality input from Tom Hanks, Julia Roberts and Philip Seymour Hoffman as a chain smoking CIA agent.

#### 10. The Bank Job

A classic heist from Aussie director Roger Donaldson. Set in 'sixties London and based on real events, it's stylish and refreshingly old fashioned, staying true to the genre and not indulging in the tarty, parodic excesses of crime flicks such as 'Rock'n'Rolla', 'In Bruges' and their ilk. #### Of the 368 movies that I have reviewed for The Echo, only one has got the treatment without me actually seeing it.

There is no point in trying to defend the indefensible, but I did make every effort to get to the cinema for a screening, only to be repeatedly foiled by unforeseeable twists of fate. 

Now I'm not so sure, what with Pierre Bavard's How To Talk About Books You Haven't Read and Henry Hitchings's How To Really Talk About Books You Haven't Read making names for their authors.

if you are going to bullshit,



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

Despite Black's extra knight, this endgame is a well-known theoretical draw, but Rujevic carelessly played 63.Rh2?? and after 63... Nf6+ White was forced to resign, handing Smirnov the title, \$1,000 first prize and his first International Master result.

Smirnov's lucky break in the last round was, however, only fair given the torment the chess Gods had inflicted on him in his earlier Masters games. In the first round, Smirnov's game against West was headed for a draw when the veteran IM reached the second diagrammed position.







## **GLUTEN-FREE DESSERTS**

Victoria Cosford



Gluten-intolerance is on the rise. US statistics cite that in 2003 those Americans who had been diagnosed with Coeliac disease (the best-defined and most severe form of the intolerance) numbered 40,000 whereas today the figure is 110,000. It has become positively fashionable.

Aside from the fad aspect and the rather many self-diagnosed sufferers who naturally begin to feel better once they give up fast and processed foods (so many of which contain gluten), another explanation for this enormous increase in victims is that true gluten-intolerance, once thought rare, is finally receiving attention which is long overdue. Gluten is the protein found in wheat, rye and barley and it is gluten in patients with Coeliac disease which damages the lining of the small bowel, affecting the absorption of food and leading to symptoms which include diarrhoea, bloating, rashes, weight loss and iron and folic acid deficiency. And so a glutenfree diet will rule out all ordinary breads, pastas, convenience foods as well as gravies. custards, soups and sauces which have been thickened with wheat, rye, barley or any other gluten-containing flour. Rather worryingly, there are still many countries not required by law to mention gluten on the labelling of their products although in Australia and the European Union new product-labelling standards are enforcing this. What this 'fad' has given rise to is an increase in gluten-free versions of foods the truly intolerant would be forced to renounce - with mixed results, to be sure, and a tendency toward glugginess, heaviness and stodginess of texture in my experience.

However, the challenge lay before me, to come up with a handful of sweet ideas with which my sister could play. And really, there was nothing difficult about it at all; the more I thought about it the more I saw the sense for everyone, not only gluten-intolerants, to end their meal lightly. Here is a handful, then, of those ideas - my sole advice being to very carefully check all labelling for 'hidden' gluten (examples being cornflour, malt, some custard powders and icing sugar mixture.)

- Creme Brulees preheat oven to 160°C and grease 6 ramekins. Heat 600 mls cream to just below boiling point. Whisk 6 egg yolks with 1/3 cup sugar and gradually stir in hot cream and vanilla. Strain custard into a jug, pour into ramekins then baked, foil-covered, in a bain marie for 50 - 60 mins or until set. Chill overnight and just before serving sprinkle thickly with extra caster sugar and place under hot grill until caramelised.
- Poach fruit peeled and halved pears in a syrup of fresh ginger, sugar and water; or red wine, cinnamon sticks, cloves, caster sugar, black peppercorns and bay leaves; plums in red wine, star anise, cinnamon sticks, cloves and lemon juice.
- · Roast stone fruits like peaches and nectarines and serve with icecream and meringues – or serve meringues with lemon curd and strawberries.
- Make a fruit fool rhubarb is gorgeous puree cooked rhubarb, add rosewater and sugar to sweeten, chill then serve in glasses swirled through layers of thick whipped cream.
- Make panna cotta, home-made ice cream, jellies and semifreddo.
- Or, because we live where we live, serve everyone a **mango**, a lime wedge and a spoonful of mascarpone.



#### Ingredients

180g snapper fillet skinless 6 small bangalow potatoes (kiplers or nicola) 8 green fine beans 8 yellow fine beans (butter beans) 2 heads small fennel

12 cherry truss tomatoes

1 bunch green basil 1 bunch red basil 1 bunch oregano 16 mazanillo olives (pitted)

100ml good local olive oil 30ml good red wine vinegar sea salt and pepper.

#### Method





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## **Getting ripped is a summer bummer**

In light of the recent drowning tragedy at Mollymook, Surf Life Saving Australia has issued some timely advice on 'how to avoid' and 'what to do' if caught in rip and reminds all beach goers to only swim at patrolled beaches this summer.

While the majority of the 38 swimming related coastal fatalities last summer were due to people being caught in rips, a Surf Safety Survey found that only 19 per cent of Australians know how to recognise a rip and if caught in one, less than half know how to get out of

The survey found that of the 625 respondents, 72 per cent rely on beach signs or advice from lifesavers to identify rips, and if they find themselves in strong currents, most people rely on lifesavers to rescue them with only 43 per cent knowing how to get out of trouble by themselves.

The following are Surf Life Saving Australia's 'Tips for Rips'. One or more of the following features might alert you to the presence of a rip;

- darker colour, indicating deeper water
- murky brown water caused by
- sand stirred up off the bottom smoother surface with much conserve your energy

If you do happen to get caught in a rip there are actions you can take for self preservation:

- Don't panic stay calm and
- fight it; and signal for assistance. If you are a confident swimmer, swim parallel to the shore until you reach the breaking wave zone, then try and swim back to shore.
- If you don't think you can swim parallel to the shore away
- from the rip, stay calm, float with the rip and signal for help. • Remember to stay calm and

'A lot of beach goers swim next to the wall as it is a shelter from the wind. It's important to look for discolouration in the water, that is a good clue to what's happening under the surface.

'We have had to pull a couple of people out of the rip already this year. That's why we have the flags so people know where it is safe to swim and where we have patrollers watching the

It is important to swim near SLSC patrollers and NSW Lifeguards at all times and children should be supervised at all times no matter how high their level of swimming ability.



# Lifeguards launch Beachsafe

Northern NSW lifeguards launched their summer safety campaign last Saturday.

More than 120 lifeguards commenced patrols on 41 beaches along the north coast and these will continue until Monday January 26.

The Australian Lifeguard Service, in partnership with local councils, will provide safe swimming areas as well as undertake rescues, undertake first aid treatment and provide surf and beach safety advice.

'Lifeguard services play an important part in ensuring the northern NSW coast remains one of Australia's top summer destinations,' said Stephen Leahy, Northern NSW Lifeguard Coordinator.

'People know they can go to a beach close to where they are visiting and there will be a lifesaving service there on any day of the summer holidays."

extensive campaign that seeks remain constant and lifeguards to reduce the number of preventable drownings in northern NSW during the summer

A recent nationwide study that reviewed coastal drownings over the last four years clearly indicated that males up to 30 years old were most likely to drown and that drownings occurred in rips near patrolled locations between 12pm and 6pm. Most drownings occurred in the first months of the year, on weekdays.

Part of the campaign focuses on community education but lifeguards will play an important part in Operation Beachsafe. Lifeguards will be maintaining a high level of visibility – beachgoers should be able to quickly identify their lifeguard (not just the safe swimming area and the flags) when they arrive at the

Operation Beachsafe is an beach. Preventative actions will are expected to communicate informally and regularly with people on their beach.

> Lifeguard Services have been extended with all beaches in the Tweed Shire and Byron Bay's Main Beach now being patrolled to 6pm on weekdays. Ballina's Lennox Head and Shelly Beach will be patrolled to 7pm on weekdays. Two new beaches are being patrolled for the first time this summer - Mooball at South Pottsville (Tweed Shire) and The Wreck at Byron Bay.

Two 4WD trucks and three rescue jet skis will back up lifeguard services in the event of a major incident.

'Safety information cards will given to visitors to our beaches and we are placing them in as many hotels, motels, caravan parks and backpacker hostels as possible, said Mr Leahy.
