Champions shine at woodchop

Timber cracked and chips flew at the annual Brunswick Heads Woodchop, which began last Wednesday and culminated in the finals on Friday and Saturday.

Well-known as a family event the woodchop attracts axemen and women, and their entourages, from around Australia and New Zealand. It's a particular highlight on the axe women's circuit because it is one of only two events in the country where women can compete in both championship and handicap heats and finals.

While New Zealand women competitors now take this as a given, captain of the visiting NZ women's team Sheree Taylor started competing 23 years ago and laughs, 'There were no women's events then, and a lot of resistance to the merest mention of any.

But that didn't stop the feisty New Zealander, who says she took to the sport 'instantly'.

'My husband was an axeman. It's been a hard battle to break the barrier of competing in what's traditionally a "man's" sport but it's been tremendous. We've travelled all over the world competing and met so many people through the sport, says Sheree. 'Brunswick Heads is a really good show. It's well catered for and the women's teams are treated with a lot of respect?

Fellow team member Karmyn world champion axeman she met in the arena, has only been competing for five years but shares the passion of the rest of the team.

'I started in the Jack and Jill saw events with my Dad,' says Karmyn, 'and it just grew from there. I love it.'

There's no shortage of passion on the Australian women's team either. Australia with hopes and aspirations, and a healthy dose of friendly cross-Tasman rivalry. 'We love the New Zea-

ping that he got involved.' Naturally enough, son Jim decided to follow the family tradition.

The Shipman/Pearson family are also veterans of the circuit with fatherin-law Les Pearson chalking up 29 years at the Brunswick Heads event.

'Not that much has changed,' says Kel. 'There's a few less choppers, a few getting older and a bit slower, but there's still lots of families. It's a real family event.

Son-in-law, Peter Shipman, who has also been coming for 20-odd years, is the log getter for the wood chop. 'All the timber comes from the poplar plantations near Grafton. They were planted for the match factory but it closed down.

Peter's father was an axeman who chopped until he was 75. Now 81, he didn't come with them this year but is hoping to make it for the 50th anniversary of the event next year. Peter's son Dan, in only his fifth year of competition, took out first place in the 13 inch Underhand.

Brunswick Heads Woodchop executive committee members, Joy Slater and Rosslyn Hogan, were delighted with this year's event and praised the hard work of the many volunteers in making it a success.

'We're looking forward to the 50th next year,' says Joy. We hope to get a heritage listing to ensure the event can continue, as it is, for another 50 years?



Art boost for indigenous health







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Byron trashed by the crass in vans

It reached a crescendo with schoolies and has held the note ever since. The gaudy vans, and cheap-rent holidaymakers in station wagons and four-wheel drives seem to have invaded Byron Shire. And residents, it's fair to say, have had a gutful.

Every morning, afternoon and evening throughout the parking bays, beach access points and residential streets across the Shire they congregate, like a bunch of gypsies (only not so culturally interesting), 'with chairs, tables, and music loaded out the side of their van, eating lunch and leaving the remnants in the grass ...' as Rebecca Olive of Suffolk Park so aptly described it in last week's letters.

A major problem lies with the campervan rental companies, who, if their websites are any indication, make the most of the 'freedom' aspect of their vans. Go anywhere, anytime, and take your bed and your kitchen with you.

Wicked campervans website proudly states ^îless rules, more fun' and commiserates, 'Well, you know how when you go travelling, hostels and hire cars can be very expensive... hard to find... blow your budget... leaving you with less money to spend on all the exciting adventures?'

Yeah, it's a real bummer that, having to pay for accommodation and food and transport while you're travelling. Surely you can do it at someone else's expense? It's much cheaper there is simply not enough of that way.

One not-so-eloquent tale of camping on the Wicked website from The Echo, Byron Shire proclaims 'Off the beaten track we decided to roam/ With beds always with us, we felt right at home!/ Off to the mountains, we climbed up some hills/ The tremely busy throughout the van provided adventure, we could enter at will/ In hostel rooms, with alcohol under ban/ So we said, "oh f**k it/ We will party in the van"."

With a staff of on parking infringements in the CBD when a quick daily round from Broken Head to Belongil will net at least 50-60 illegal campers (you do the maths), and that's before 7am! Which still leaves plenty of time for illegal parking, and the lunch- and dinner-shift illegal campers.

There's also the general message that a 'warning' sends. In campervan website chatroom parlance it translates to, 'don't worry man, you can camp anywhere, they only give you a warning?

Large and adequate signage would also be helpful, and perhaps Council could raise the issue with the Local Government Association (LGA) - no doubt this is happening Australia-wide. The LGA could then raise it with campervan rental companies and remind them of their legal obligation not to encourage or incite illegal behaviour, particularly in visitors to the country or state who may be unaware of many local laws.

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

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Farewell to Yani Mitchell

Narayani 'Yani' Colours Mitchell, who grew up in Mullumbimby and was a former Echo staff member, died in London of breast cancer on November 12th 2008, aged 34. Yani was the much-loved eldest daughter of Elayne and Brian Mitchell's four children. Growing up, Yani was an assertive, gregarious and articulate person; her family and friends often commenting that this child would never be oppressed and would surely become a confident adult who would successfully make her way in the world.

While attending Mullumbimby High School 1987-1992, Yani developed a keen interest in feminism, the environment, student unionism and politics. During her university years at Southern Cross and served as the Women's Officer on the National Union of Students 1994-95. She traveled around Australia working on conferences and arguing passionately for social justice she and Sam travelled to many causes including equality, antiracism and student rights.

Yani's strong communication skills and passionate arguments for a range of causes endeared her to friends and her managers and co-workers in a slew of local her school and uni days, including Mallam's supermarket, the Kiosk at Byron Bay swimming pool and The Byron Shire Echo in 1995/6. Yani maintained friendships with many people she met during these years right to the end of her life.



Nippers fail the sunsafe test: ACSCM

A recent media release from the Australasian College of Skin Cancer Medicine (AC-SCM) has slammed Nipper programs for their failure to pass the sun safe test.

ACSCM urged Surf Lifesaving Australia, who organises many of the programs, to rethink sun safety and called for a 'no participation' rule if children have no hat or rash vest.

The College believes that programs are frequently undertaken at the worst time of the day for ultraviolet B (UVB) exposure and that there is too little regard for sun protection.

Associate Professor of Cutaneous Oncology, Dr Anthony Dixon, asked, 'Rather than the caps, why not require the children to wear the provided club rash vest for all Nippers events? The children's team will be identifiable, their skin better protected, and the sponsors of the rash vests will have greater exposure. Everyone wins.'



Going Slow

Many people in developed countries, including those who have chosen to make a seachange or treechange, are now wary of the need for speed, especially when the cult of consumption is helping to imperil our planet. Speed in this case is the conditioned rush to achieve without any purpose grounded in pleasure, or as Pink Floyd put it: 'Run, rabbit, run/ Dig that hole, forget the sun/ And when at last the work is done/ Don't sit down/ It's time to dig another one.

This wariness is reflected in the Slow movement, simply and amusingly described in journalist Carl Honoré's book In Praise of Slow. It is about achieving a tempo which best suits your needs, about not being a 'slave to the machine', even if it is one of your own engineering.

As Honoré puts it: 'It is a cultural revolution against the notion that faster is always better. The Slow philosophy is not about doing everything at a snail's pace. It's about seeking to do everything at the right speed. Savouring the hours and minutes rather than just counting them. Doing everything as well as possible, instead of as fast as possible. It's about quality over quantity in everything from work to food to parenting.'

Perhaps the best-known facet of the Slow movement is Slow Food (www.slowfood.com), founded in 1989 and now with 85,000 members worldwide. It promotes the well-savoured meal, accompanied by good conversation and composed of good ingredients, and biodiversity among local producers.

The Slow movement also covers music, sex, crafts and exercise, to name a few. Tempo Giusto works to see the classics played at a pace more suitable to times before the advent of the piano speedsters. Citta Slow wants towns and cities to be more enjoyable for its citizens rather than simply thoroughfares for vehicles. The fabulous Long Now Foundation is creating the 10,000 Year Clock as 'an icon to long term thinking'. According to its timescale, the year is now 02008.

Many of the Slow movement's concerns for resources, people, and wildlife fit in well with the push for sustainability and environmental conservation. Life at a nourishing tempo is intrinsic to Byron projects such as Seed Savers, the farmers markets and Sustainable Streets.

However, there is a lot more of the Slow philosophy which could be incorporated into local life, and I commend its principles to our councillors.

One area of Slow this Shire needs to work on is Slow Driving, especially for the safety of our teenagers. I'm also tired of very important men in SUVs, on their way to matters of great consequence, trying to sodomise my car. I wouldn't mind so much if they knew how to drive and could perform a graceful Juan Fangio overtake, but it's obvious they can't drive for shit. In all they manage to save about 50 seconds on their overall journey by driving manically, thereby fraying their own tempers and the rural quietude of those around them.





Ways of seeing

The great strength of Mary Gardner's articles is that they encourage ways of seeing, examining, and thinking about the natural world around us. This, to my mind, far outweighs any occasional inaccuracy regarding Australian bird species, or subspecies.

The two subspecies common around these parts are the Australian White Ibis (Threskiornis molucca) and the Strawnecked Ibis. The Sacred Ibis (Threskiornis aethiopia) is an African bird. Obviously, your correspondent last week is interested. But what disturbs me is the attribution of words like 'filthy' to the comparatively recently learned habits of ibis and collector? other birds. I know the birds have been 'culled' in places like Sydney because some people consider their habits and the smell of their roosts and colonies 'offensive'. But it is we who are responsible for the smorgasbord of organic waste these birds have learned, like other animals, to exploit. Just as in Shakespeare's London, kits and ravens glutted themselves on the human waste piled in the city's streets.

are vectors of diseases harmful to us; and I'm not suggesting that measures should not be taken to control them. But I have reservations about the what we have created in the tendency to use certain species as scapegoats. Sincere 'envirozealots' are sometimes prone the releasees of Guatanamo to this. The problem is that demonising a species can open a floodgate to wanton disregard and cruelty; and this is justified in the minds of the perpetrators by convincing themselves that they are dealing with 'vermin'. The cane toad is only one example of this. Another is labelling pigeons as 'rats with wings'. This snappy epithet was coined, I believe, by American pest control companies. A recent example here is the Indian Myna. It is true that it is bold, aggressive, and has other habits similar to our own species. Nevertheless, I have seen a Magpie drive an Indian Myna off the sports field easily enough. It is the human species which is often responsible for these perceived imbalances in the natural world. There can be few better examples of 'filthy' behaviour than that demonstrated by some visitors to the Bay, particularly over the socalled busy period. 

Council could resolve how to deal with traffic congestion within a few months and make significant progress within 12 months, though I expect I will be saying the same in another 15 years.







Plastic: it was a scientific wonder of the modern world. From the Greek plastikos or 'fit for moulding' the name refers to the malleability during manufacture that allows it to be cast, pressed or extruded into an abundance of shapes and forms. From the time it crept into human existence in 1855 (as cellulose-based fake ivory) to its post-1980s infiltration into almost every miniscule aspect of life on earth, plastic has been a Rosetta Stone

But like many convenience jettison 5.5 million items of items of the modern world, all this convenience comes at a cost. If not so obvious for the human species, the price paid by the environment and the other creatures that inhabit it is becoming dangerously (some would say terminally) high.

Current research estimates that there are about 18,000 piec-

What is most puzzling is why a ban on plastic bags is feasible in South Australia but nowhere else in Australia? With the same prohibited. This is enforced in commercial and consumer con-Australia with the Protection siderations the South Australian government decided, quite clearly, that the environment and consumer sentiment were greater priorities than commercial resistance.

Obstacle to ban

The real obstacle to a ban on plastic bags and the introduction of container deposit schemes lies with the federal and state governments (except South Australia) under the auspices of the Environment Protection and Heritage Council. As signatories to the National Packaging Covenant, Australian governments have become convenient bedfellows with industry and commercial interests to ensure that consumers, not producers, are made responsible for litter waste management and the majority of its costs.

While the covenant appears to be a pro-active communion about the environment between commercial interests and governments, in reality, it's a tacit agreement for governments to do nothing about container deposit schemes or bans on plastic bags in return for industry funds for clean-up campaigns such as Keep Australia Beautiful and Tidy Towns.

It's a similar story with plastic bags. Industry-funded research projects naturally enough come up with distinct drawbacks to a national plastic bag ban or levy and a national deposit scheme. Much of the resistance consists of fear mongering about the 'cost' to low-income consumers of paying for plastic bags or the cost to industry, which would be passed onto the consumer.

All of this resistance is despite figures of a 90% reduction in the use of bags over six months following the introduction of a plastic bag levy in Ireland, and the successful introduction of plastic bag bans **Plastic free** all over the world.

After all, less than 30 years ago before the mass invasion of the single use checkout bag, we did actually manage to carry our groceries and all sorts of things home without plastic!

Sheer love of the planet (instead of the dollar) has already produced some fantastic initiatives like morsbags - 'sociable guerilla bagging', whose project has no financial incentive although people are welcome to donate to the cause if they wish with time, fabric or money (which is normally donated to an environmental cause). Worldwide, so far, morsbags has distributed almost 36,000 bags, which has meant approximately 18,000,000 less plastic bags in the world. It's a simple but effective solution that has immediate results and everyone can help.

Clare Hopkins and Jo Immig, who started the Bangalow morsbag pod, Boomerang Bags, have made and handed out almost 900 bags. 'All the bags are made from recycled fabric (anything from sheets to shirts) or fabric roll ends that are donated,' says Clare. 'It's primarily fabric that would have been destined for landfill, which is such a huge waste of resources. Instead of getting rid of things thoughtlessly we can look at it and ask what we could use it for. We need to start thinking of plastic in a different way, to make the commitment to change, one step at a time, together.'

Boomerang Bags' aim for 2009 is to make Bangalow plastic bag free. With extra resources they'd like to make the whole Shire plastic bag free but they need more volunteers for sewing and some inspired ideas for alternative style containers for food items like sprouts and strawberries.

I argue for establishment of a joint estuary management committee that would devise a new plan for both estuaries that would have statutory powers. This approach works

in other areas, and would be more efficient than separate efforts. Many of the issues are common to both creeks. As well, the Belongil at this point is heading in the same direction as Tallow Creek. What the hard line activist approach has brought us is dead fish, lost birds, a smashed community effort in the Belongil, with flooding impacts and more fish kills to come.

Wildlife murder

Hundreds and thousands of deaths to Australian wildlife occur on our roads each year in NSW. The exact statistics are impossible to acquire, but it is certainly an extremely large number. If one thinks about it, and actually places themselves in the position of an animal, roads are places of great murder. With large, merciless, solid, fast-moving objects zooming along, what are the chances for a little innocent animal?

I feel for all wildlife and I am often frustrated when people don't even bother to simply swerve when there is something in their car's path. Here in the Byron Shire there are many unique species that are unfortunately killed on our roads. For wildlife carers in our Shire, roads are a major reason for local injuries to wildlife.

I have saved many animals, - including birds, reptiles, and amphibians - from death on our roads. I have also taken various dead ones off of our roads in respect for them. I know that there are some people similar to me. But sadly, most people aren't. Most people don't hold wildlife in high regards, and simply don't even care when they drive over an innocent creature. Sigh.

To help reduce these horrible deaths, there are a few tips I can point out – having the ability to simply swerve when driving is a key factor. Using one's peripheral vision, driving slower at night, and using the high-beam for better vision will also help. On low-traffic small roads especially, I have experienced many frogs when it is raining. A simple swerve can save a frog's life. Many birds are also killed, quite often because the ignorant driver thinks that they will fly away when the fast car approaches. But often they don't fly away in time. It's sad, I know. 





An old game for a quiet evening inside a book

Television was crap - as is often the case. I had forgotten to bring home Hellboy II: The Golden Army in order to study tactics for the next council meeting.

So we decided to read aloud poetry. Along with Scrabble, it's something to do when the energy use of the internet becomes unsustainable and it is shut down. Think of that.

We picked the old school stuff. Not a mother-fornicator in sight. From my 1977 edition of The Penguin Book of English Verse, which has survived decades of grotty flats, bookshelf purgings, breakups, silverfish and cockroaches. And those clever wasps which glue pages together with some sort of gum.

We didn't go all the way back to Sir Thomas Wyatt - 'When her loose gowne did from her shoulders fall' - but we did do John Milton (1608-1674), the bovver boy of blank verse. A friend once asked me to fax her a copy of Paradise Lost. How we delicate aesthetes laughed. Milton probably isn't read much these days - he doesn't translate well to Blackberry but his words resonate down the centuries.

Blind John invoked a muse -Urania, who handles astronomy, a kind of weird choice - to:

- What in me is dark Illumine, what is low raise and support;
- That to the highth of this great Argument
- I may assert th' Eternal
- Providence, And justifie the wayes of God to men

Two hundred and twenty years later Fockbury boy A E Housman (1859-1936) felt he had a better way to the transcendental:

And malt does more than Milton can

To justify God's ways to man.

I'll drink to that.

Even God's chief opponent gets the good lines in Milton. Lucifer's optimistic contemplation of fighting on begins with phrases still in common use:

- What though the field be
- lost? All is not lost; the
- unconquerable Will,
- And study of revenge, immortal hate,
- And courage never to submit
- or yield: And what is else not to be
- overcome?

Lucifer is planning eternal





What does an art gallery mean in the mindset of today? An art gallery is usually a space for the exhibition of visual art, however sculpture, photographs, illustrations, and installation art may also be on show. Despite being primarily concerned with providing a space for artists to display their wares, art galleries are sometimes used to host other artistic activities, such as music concerts or poetry readings.

Everyone recognises good art when they see it, but what do we know about our local art galleries and studios?

Their primary purpose is to present and preserve art, but as the representation of artistic endeavour, they provide the source for humanity to reflect and learn about ourselves and what is possible through artistic pursuits. The establishment of the Art Gallery of New South Wales in 1870 led to Australia's first globally recognised art gallery. Art galleries existed across Australia well before white settlement, as reflected by the Blue Mountains World Heritage Area.

For a moment let's head south to the declared Blue Mountains World Heritage Area where the Greater Wollemi Pine was found. As well, Australia made world headlines when hundreds of well preserved rock art sites were discovered in this area.

At home in the northern rivers, many people choose art as a way of life and

a means to make their living. This passion has given birth to a great variety of art galleries, where individuals and groups of artists display their work and make it available to us all. I respect institutions whose purpose is to present art, and I admire the artists who share their vision with us. Here are just a few of the galleries and studios that you can visit.

Tweed River Art Gallery

The original Tweed River Art Gallery opened in the Bicentenary year of 1988. The new building opened in 2004, is set on a hilltop location that offers stunning panoramic views of the Tweed Valley, Border Rangers, Tweed River and Wollumbin (Mt Warning). The building includes a workshop, six exhibition spaces, library, café and shop. The Border Art Prize is an exciting exhibition


on show until January 25. Tweed River Art Gallery is one of the five galleries selected to host the fascinating exhibition Great Collections from February 5 to March 15, 2009. This landmark exhibition brings together iconic


treasures from the eight premier cultural institutions of New South Wales. Rare and significant art, objects, documents and curiosities combine to create a unique showcase from over 200 years of collecting cultural material in New South Wales. The official opening is on Friday February 13. You can find the Tweed River Art Gallery on Mistral Road, Murwillumbah.

Zakay Glass Creations

Zakay Glass Creations, the work of Byron Bay artist, Asaf Zakay, are based on what is known as the golden mean or divine proportion. This code dates back centuries to when Indian scholars discovered a special pattern in numbers. This sequence became known as the Fibonacci numbers. Glass artist Asaf Zakay specialises in three-dimensional forms of sacred geometry, using the age-old technique of stained glass. Asaf's unique, bevelled glasswork creates visual magic as his suspended objects throw stunning rainbow colours throughout the area in which they are displayed. 
After a long overseas touring schedule Carmella Baynie returns with her world music group The Bhakti **Raga Ensemble for their** Sacred Chants 2009 Concert. Originally a pop singer, **Carmella found herself and** along with it, a very different way of using her voice. A Byron resident for many years, it was her time away that put Carmella on the spiritual path.

'I moved from Byron and ended up singing in World Music Bands and played with people like Bobby Singh and Afro Moses O'Jah and I was embroiled in an amazing period of world music, everything from African to Celtic. It wetted my appetite from music other than pop.'

But what she loved the most was sufi music. Very very funky sufi.

'I found Kowali exciting because I grew up singing sacred music. I was thrown into a Latin choir by my Dad at seven with grown ups, I loved to sing and I think looking back my Dad was a bit of a guide because when the whole pop thing ended for me, he introduced me to classical singing.

'Sacred singing is in my blood. When I was doing the whole Rajneesh thing we did a lot of kirtan, but we did it in English... you'd be singing "there is such magnificence..." I think they should forget the translations! It's much more powerful in Sanskrit! I have always loved that style, pop music was something I loved too, but I was having such spiritual experiences and I was in my eighth year of yoga and I couldn't see the point



So why are chants so powerful? And why have all the great chants been written. It's very much a case of I like your old chants better than your new chants.

'The actual chants are 5,000 years old and came from a time when society was a lot more pure and it was like in the Greek myths when the Gods

roamed the earth. The gods of the Indian pantheon walked the earth and they contain the energy of the time. When you are chanting it is so pure that it can't help but purify your heart and take you to that place, which is nice because most of us are looking for that feeling of enlightenment and joy. It opens the heart and gives such an incredible rush of energy and it's raising the kundalini at the same time.'

Sacred chants work because as Carmella says: 'They are from the Vedic scriptures and tried and tested - you can write different melodies for the chants but the chant itself remains the same. Kirtan is becoming a phenomenon around the world, there's a book called The Yoga of Kirtan that has just come out. Most

kirtan singers put their own musical interpretation onto the sanskrit chants, some might do traditional, some might do fusion. We are a classical Indian ensemble but we do fusion as well. We branch into contemporary and also celtic styles - so the music can speak a common language. People are hungry for it at the moment. I had an article in the Sunday Herald about my workshop: 'Born Singing' where I take people through that journey, and we have had over 350 replies from all ages, all walks of life, saying I think this might be really good for my heart. I had people pouring out their personal lives to me. They say when you have a recession you get to see what thrives and what careers thrive. I think there will be a resurgence

of people diving into their spirituality because a lot of people have lost a lot and they need to be able to make sense and find meaning."

Bassnectar is the music project of Lorin Ashton, a San Francisco based producer and DJ with 'probably the largest cult following of any DJ in San Francisco' – SF Weekly. After more than a decade of fulltime involvement in the underground electronic music scene producing, performing, remixing and collaborating with such artists as Buckethead, Freq Nasty and KRS One, Bassnectar has helped define the current sound of the West Coast Underground.

Q: Is your latest album 'Underground Communication' a platform for giving the underground a voice; and what does underground mean to you?

A: 'Yeah, I think that music (and music culture) is an awesome way to communicate 'under the radar'... it is a unifying force, and it is an emotional outlet. It is a dynamic form of expression, and in a world

Q: What is a good gig to you?

Q: What can we expect to hear when you play outdoors

at Coffs Harbour and what from your gig at Liquid in **Byron Bay?**

A: 'Anything heavy and wobbling... the usual suspects of Dubstep, DnB, Hip Hop, Glitch, Mashed up Nonsense, whatever. Honestly, 'genres' bother me because they are restricting, and there is something GOOD in any genre of anything.

Q: With a hectic gigging schedule of approx. 150 shows a year, how do you find time to work on your own productions?

A: 'I try to enjoy life on and off the road. It seems to pass by so quickly and what I enjoy most about it is falling deeper into it. I seem to express and experience depth best when I pay attention, so I try and do that a lot.'



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

Vicky Cristina Barcelona

You've got to admire the good and the beautiful for the way they cope with their emotional traumas. Woody Allen's favourite subjects - wealthy, self-absorbed, garrulous New Yorkers - are relocated from Manhattan to Barcelona in his latest highly acclaimed feature. Better judges than I have award it the 2009 Golden Globe for best pic in the comedy/musical category, but I found it too joyless to be funny and, were it not for the auteur's living legend status, would describe it as fatuous Nor does it have the tension and tempestuousness of Allen's outstanding Match Point (2005).

Undeniably, it is gloriously shot by cinematographer Javier Aguirresarobe and directed with a sure hand by an expert in the craft, but, like Brideshead *Revisited*, it becomes soporific in its perfection. Our innocents abroad are provided with palatial accommodation by acquaintances from back home and roam elegant streetscapes, enjoy sophisticated but authentic restaurants, stylish cafes and bars, none of which are cluttered by high season tourist trash, a moonlit flamenco recital - you just wish that Woody would get out into the real world occasionally. The performances cannot be faulted – Rebecca Hall's especially, perhaps because she is not encumbered by the adoration showered on her celeb co-stars – but the depictions are of types rather than characters. Vicky (Hall), about to attain a master's degree in Catalan culture without having conversational Spanish (we'll let that pass), is staid, sensible and engaged.

Her girlfriend, indolent Cristina (Scarlett Johansson), with no apparent means of support but living the Vogue dream, is a bourgeois Bohemian who knows what she doesn't want from life. In Barca for the summer, they meet the perfectly stubbled Juan Antonio (Javier Bardem), a painter of rather passé canvases who nevertheless has done well enough to own a plane, a fab split level casa and a fine wardrobe of linen shirts. His ex, Maria Elena (Penélope Cruz) turns up after the swarthy devil has had his way with the less worldly Yanks and yes, she's passionate and volatile. Sexual permutations inevitably ensue, the tale's twists and turns accompanied by a confiding, Mills and Boon-ish narration that wants to frame caricature as grand art. And it's only a little thing, so to speak, but with Cristina lying naked beside him it does come as a surprise to see Juan Antonio clamber out of bed in his undies. The image of the fiery Latin lover goes down the drain and the movie's essential fakeness is embarrassingly exposed. Almodovar without the juice. ~ John Campbell

Yes Man

Whether it is simply a case of him belatedly growing up, or some guiding hand tapping him on the shoulder and suggesting that it might be time for him to pull his head in a bit, Jim Carrey has of late got his manic side under control and begun to present himself as a reasonably average kind

of human being. Here he plays Carl, a divorced bank loans officer with a career as dull as dishwater and an after hours existence that consists of sitting at home alone watching DVDs. Realising that he can sink no lower, he allows an old buddy to take him to a seminar where the thin-haired, lizardy Svengali (Terrence Stamp – to think, he was once as sexy as George Best and Nureyev) elicits from the reluctant convert a promise that he will say yes to every proposition that comes his way. It's a neat premise, one that you know will land Carl in a lot of hot water before he finds the fulfilment that you come to desire for him. 'Familiarity breeds contempt' or 'better the devil you know' - either idiom can be applied to romantic comedies such as these, depending on your mood. They rarely bother with originality or social comment that goes beyond the comfort zone of an audience that typically appreciates an irreverent edge in the humour, but not for that edge to draw blood. They also demand, as a given, that the Guy and the Girl get together. (This one actually ends with a snog against the backdrop of the sun rising over LA. Purr-fect!) But first ... Carl meets the Girl at a servo one night, having run out of petrol after driving a dero home to the edge of town. She is Allison (the adorable Zooey Deschanel), and she sings in an avant-garde rock group with the wonderful

Antonio's turgid paintings) and hits it off with Carl, changing his life for the better as crazy love takes hold of them - their spur of the moment trip to Lincoln, North Dakota has the film's funniest moments. But this is not Ingmar Bergman, so we needn't fear the worst for him and his belle. Shamefully enjoyable. ~ John Campbell
