With the advent of the rain NAIDOC Week celebrations in Byron Bay last Saturday moved from the Peace Pole indoors to the Youth Activity Centre.

The day included Aboriginal dance performances by the local Arakwal Dubay and Baygil Nali Jagun dancers, live music, and activities such as face painting, basket making, and wool weaving.

Last Wednesday the Arakwal NAI-DOC film festival screened at the Byron Bay community centre.

Greens indigenous affairs spokesperson Ian Cohen MP paid tribute to the work of the Arakwal elders over the years, in particular Yvonne Graham, Lorna Kelly, Linda Vidler and Dulcie Nichols. 'We all owe a huge debt of graitude to their determination, generosity and foresight,' Mr Cohen said.

'They have been instrumental in shaping their culture for their own people and all residents and visitors to Byron. Elders' love for country has helped ensure the protection and conservation of many precious areas.'



A sea of hands and children dressed in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander colours greeted the special visitors attending Mullumbimby Public School's NAIDOC Assembly. Nine of the school's students are members of the Deadly Dancers who opened the assembly with a vibrant array of dances. Delta Kay from the Arakwal People shared a Dreaming Story with students, helping them to understand the importance of accepting each others' differences and embracing our individual uniqueness.

New coordinator for Project U-Turn

A new coordinator has been appointed by Byron Youth Service (BYS) to run Project U-Turn, a local initiative aimed at reducing binge-drinking among young people in the area.

Kate Reed is a formallytrained counsellor with a Masters of Counselling degree from the University of Western Sydney. Her wide range of work experience includes working with homeless youth and young people with mental health issues and disabilities. Most recently she spent five weeks in Africa working for the Healing Hands organisation, a multi-disciplinary team helping women and children deal with trauma.

Project U-Turn refers to 'turning the trend of bingedrinking in the area around', Kate told The Echo. Funded through the National Binge Drinking Initiative set up by Kevin Rudd, it provides \$250,000 to address the issue over the next two years.

The February 2009 NSW Office of Liquor, Gaming and Racing Social Profile Report for Byron LGA identified alcohol abuse among teenagers as a major problem on the north coast with risky drinking behaviour among the 16+



with the state average of 31.9% and high risk drinking behaviour at 11% compared to the NSW state average of 8.9%. The data in such reports is corroborated by local police, youth mental health workers, council youth workers, drug and alcohol counsellors and local emergency department staff who all agreed that alcohol is a major problem utilising much of their limited resources and time.

Binge-drinking behaviours are the cause of hospitalisations, assaults and accidents affecting young people, their friends, family and future. Kate told *The Echo*, 'I think it's a big problem right across Australia but here in Byron [it is aggravated by] the party culture of the area, with Schoolies and

Project U-Turn has an emphasis on peer education young people working together on the issues and coming up with ideas conveyed in their language, utilising technology and social networking media. 'We really want to use tech-

phones, the internet ...'

Various projects have been envisaged, all involving the young people themselves, and include developing a drama production about binge-drinking for playing in schools; a short film competition; development of a 15-second commercial for advertising in local cinemas; a poster competition in conjunction with Flush Media; bluetooth mobile phone campaigns and graffiti arts around the Shire.

Kate, who together with her Mullumbimby-born husband ('gives me a little bit of cred!') moved to the area 18 months ago, told The Echo that 'everyone has been amazing here with wanting to help out with this project!'

Former shire president Barry James dies, aged 84

Former Byron Shire president and local identity Barry James died in June this year, aged 84. Mr James served on Council from 1962 to 1980 and was at the Shire's centenary celebrations in 2006.

Local historian Frank Mills has fond memories of a young Barry with whom he attended St John's school in Mullumbimby when they were lads and later on when they both served on the Byron Shire Council, Barry serving as president from 1967.

'Barry had a bit of a political history as his father had at one time been the mayor of Mullumbimby, says Frank. 'He was good on the council and







Bureaucrats lock horns

A disagreement between Byron Shire Council and the Department of Local Government made the front page of the Northern Star this week - well, at least the DLG's side of the story. If you want to read the relevant letters in full, go to www.byron.nsw. gov.au/meetings/meeting/284 and download the annexures under item 3. Neither touch Ernest Hemingway's style for 'lean, hard, athletic narrative' (New York Times).

DLG honcho Ross Woodward was the bearer of bad news -Council was not to get the 9.83 per cent rate rise it asked for. Woodward pointed out that Council had received seven special rate variations in the last eight years - which the DLG had agreed to as a way for Council to get out of the 1990s slough of fiscal despond, so it could hardly be news to Woodward. Despite increased rating income of 102 per cent over that time, compared to the state government's pegged rate of 31 per cent for the same period, Woodward reckoned Council had 'made little inroad in addressing its infrastructure maintenance requirements'.

Hang on, that wouldn't have anything to do with the state government giving with one hand and taking away with the other, would it? This 'cost-shifting' is a particular bugbear of the Local Government and Shires Association, which estimates it takes away five to six per cent on average of NSW councils' annual revenue.

Once you translate the bureaucratese, Woodward's main beefs with Council seem to be these: 1. It failed to report income and expenditure as required under the 'Instruments of Approval' nothing to do with the Spanish Inquisition, apparently. 2. It failed to use the o7/o8 special variation to produce an asset management system. 3. Costs for the new Byron Bay library and the Byron Regional Sport and Cultural Complex at Ewingsdale have blown out and the DLG has not been told enough about them.

A few days later Woodward had a response from Council's general manager Graeme Faulkner. He noted: 1. There is nothing in the Instruments Council has failed to comply with, so there.

As to 2, the GM pointed out that Council has awarded a tender to Civica Pty Ltd to supply and implement an asset management system. Mind you, this is almost four years after the DLG recommended a long-term asset management strategy.

(This system comes with \$505,208 implementation costs and \$34,811 annual costs. Activity is specialised in local government, isn't it? Couldn't one of our highly-paid executive managers come up with an asset management system?)

And for 3, 'Council understands that the Department does not have a standard template for councils to use in the preparation of capital expenditure reviews'. No problem there, Woodward could hand it over to Planning NSW, which manages to create a new and improved standard template every few years.

More importantly, Woodward wonders if Council can continue with its proposed level of expenditure. Obviously some community donations will go by the wayside now the rate rise is only 2.6 per cent. Is it a storm in a teacup or is Council in real trouble? Councillors don't seem too worried - they recently gave Faulkner a 'satisfactory' on his performance review, and Cr Tom Tabart failed to get the numbers when he called for an external review of Council's finances.

If he is so concerned that Council 'must complete a thorough review of all its operations', then Woodward could send in his own team for a forensic analysis and put all our minds at ease - or otherwise.




end of 2014-5 be totally absorbed by the supermarket industry." Currently many of the liquor outlets in the Byron Shire, including the hotels and clubs, are locally owned.

Woolworths often sells alcohol as "loss leaders" at prices lower than the wholesale prices available to smaller retailers. Woolworths also use other marketing strategies not available to independent outlets, e.g. Woolworths recently emailed some of their Everyday Award Card holders an exclusive "limited offer" of 5 Litre Beer Kegs for \$22.99, a saving of \$13.99.

Woolworths liquor pricing strategies are not always transparent: liquor outlets adjacent to supermarkets often charge much higher prices than their other liquor outlets, to capitalise on captive grocery shoppers. In a recent example cited by consumer group Choice, VB beer cost 54% more in Woolworths Liquor than in their Dan Murphy's store.





As a former bookseller, I have pondered why I, like millions of readers, am so drawn to crime fiction. In fact, in the days when I ran this country's biggest bookstore, it was my experience that crime fiction constituted around twenty percent of all fiction sales.

I find the logic of the best crime writing extremely satisfying. The knowledge that there is information that I must learn, details yet to be revealed and, essentially, real conflict and a darkness happily missing from my actual life keeps me torn between the urge to keep turning the page and the desire to postpone the finishing of the book. One could trot out the truism that evil characters, the baddies, are infinitely more interesting than the goodies, but when I think of all the crime writers I truly admire, the element that links them in my

mind is the creation of a compassionately drawn protagonist, generally male, frequently solitary, significantly flawed the next book.

I've been considering whether I should urge you to read the three Robotham books featuring Professor Joe O'Loughlin in chronological order, but being a person who always wants dessert before main course, I understand if you want to leap straight in with Bleed For Me. But promise me this: you will immediately afterwards go back to the book store and search for The Suspect and *Shatter.* I must say the second of those has one of the most riveting beginnings I have ever encountered: in fact, the book was terrifying.

So why must you read Bleed *For Me*? For a staggeringly well plotted narrative that will keep you bug eyed well into the night, for a moving exploration of what it is to be a father and estranged husband, for a forensically precise inventory of mortal frailties, for exquisite descriptive passages and sudden stabs of wit, for the warmth of humanity that imbues every page and of course, to begin a new obsession with a writer worthy of the effort.





The speckled egg that is singer/songwriter Gyan's latest creation has hatched. Produced at her home studio with her husband Simon Greaves with a host of musical collaborators, *Superfragile* has been four years in the making. At times delicate, others haunting, this is another remarkable offering by a very unusual girl.

You have such a sense of humour in your lyrics ...do you spend a lot of time crafting them? They're like poetic riddles ...

I've had some people ask if it's ok to laugh ...that's even more funny to me...but I guess it's the funny side of tragedy that I'm attracted to.

Most of the album was collected very quickly ...it was more like being the missing vocal member from the NECKS (that's a pet dream I have). Two thirds of the album came very spontaneously. Si had the red button on thankfully. That's where I'm spoilt having a great home studio and an engineer /producer husband – the clock doesn't govern the sessions. Also I think writing with an audience present makes for a very different approach than penning away in some dark café – that's my usual.

I liked hearing James and Timmy chortling as we peddled through ideas...

I love the album, it's so understated but elaborate and complex at the same time. Did you start out with a concept for the album, or did it evolve as you went?

I guess I've had my fill with the huge elaborate productions where the producer insists on throwing in the kitchen sink, so since returning to Australia and holding the reins I feel so much closer to home and my love for the bare beautiful economical way of saying things ...a limited palate is a good place to begin and then adding dynamics as you go with orchestral voicings which is a huge toy box of sounds to pull from. Nothing is ever preconceived with me except to try to conjure an intimacy and beauty, which seems so overlooked being such a subtle thing, almost on the verge of extinction.

How do you start with a song – is it a melody, a word, a feeling? What is it that you strive to evoke?

Some songs are created from poems I've had under my bed for a while just waiting their turn to get an airing with melody. Sometimes it will be the immediacy of an experience like the song 'Jehovah' where I was recording that day and this woman came knocking at the door (for the umpteenth time) with those little magazines with the happy family on the front surrounded by adoring animals and me wanting to hide in the backyard ... (never was very good at turning them away). Or a conversation with my brother about the TV we use to love as kids and how we preferred seeing the wires pulling the spaceships through the sky than the now CGI process everyone's resorted to.

I guess I like to think of songs as short movies – a flicker fest from my mind's eye rather than the pop formula style I was stamped under. Some songs are purely dictated by the melody and words that were born

with it ...Sometimes you're lucky and it makes sense, other times you're left scratching your head and having to bring it in to some semblance of understanding.

It's taken you four years to make this album, why so long? Is that arduous for you? How do you immerse yourself in the process?

Oh it's only that long because life took a few twists and turns in its making like meeting Michael Leunig and that project took over from the making of this and that was about three concentrated years of refining and touring and then I penned an odd little book with a girl friend (how WEIRD is that) which suddenly won awards and demanded a lot of attention being that we were first time publishers and having to don that hat accommodating huge orders all of a sudden. Slowly percolating in the background was this little baby that then needed a lot of Simon's attention for the orchestration that we'd envisaged. Another huge love and learning curve for him but we didn't see the point in putting out anything that was half cocked or near enough ...so before you know it four years have passed since your last confession!

I love fowl play ...did this occur to you while actually eating a roast chicken?

I've been fairly much a vegetarian since I was 14 years old but I do have moments of late where I feel the need to eat the occasional bird or fish which always comes at a cost. That song was written after I had eaten that chicken and had a terrible nightmare. My imagination is far too great to eat meat with joy ...the reason I really struggle with eating animals is I can imagine myself going up to a cow in a paddock and wrapping my mouth round its hind quarters and taking a bite and just how absurd that looks and feels ...no way!

Why Superfragilistically? Are you a fragile girl? Is there a hidden toughness?

That word fell out of my mouth while writing with my dear friend Timmy Gaze one day and now in hindsight it does sum me up. The 'one skin too few' syndrome, the super fragile – I probably can relate a lot more to the Nick Drakes and Leonard Cohens of this world than anything too bombastic which tends to get a lot more airtime but I wouldn't want it in my lounge room. Working with Leunig also honoured the sensitive and the gentle souls – mine included – hoisting up the little fragile sculptures of beauty for that tiny moment before they all come crashing down the earth again and swept away by the cleaners.

How do you use your voice differently to when you first started singing? I love the gentle tones and then the unexpected turns that rip right through you.

My previous manager used to want me to engage the fourth gear most times when I was singing and didn't like it when I was idling, but I have to say how much I enjoy effortlessness when listening to other people sing and how much it's about the story for me or the sound and where it travels rather than the vocal tricks we could perform. When you're younger you have so many colours to explore, and influences knocking at your door, things to prove to yourself and as I've grown I just see the value lies more in simple communication.

Does having your own studio make you more relaxed about the recording process? Do you set times, or sneak in at night?

It has been a great step losing all the intimidation that those padded cells can make you feel not to mention the urgency of having to watch the clock. But it doesn't come cheap with the huge overheads of how much it costs to run and upgrade ...so you're damned if you do kind of thing. But it does allow you to have the luxury of waiting for the right take without a gun at your head.

Tell me a little about the players on the album. You have sourced a variety of sounds, including the saw! Do you have those sounds in mind at first, or does it come to you as you record?

I love to call on my old mate and collaborator Tim Gaze to help me with the music. We have such history we don't need to think about where the other is travelling while writing, for it's as if he is my hands. Also good to play with James Cruickshank again for working with him is a bit like going to a drawing class and we do a hundred quick sketches through the course of an afternoon and then I have the job of sifting for gold later. It's fabulous working with Si for I can sing him string lines and he has the knowledge to orchestrate them into beautiful four piece harmonies. We called on string players from here and Brisbane like Kat Philp on cello, Bridget Crouch on viola, Benjamin Greaves on violin, Cleis Pearce on violin.... then we travelled to Sydney to record the amazing James Greening for the only Trombone player to make me weep ...Garrett Cositgan on pedal steel ...Azo Bell on saw ...Tim on timpani, Simon on celesta and and and some



Captured in a Mousetrap Heart

On the back of sold-out preview shows earlier in the year, **Thirsty Merc** mark their official return to Australian audiences, with a new sound, a new guitarist, a new single Mousetrap Heart and their exciting new album and tour of the same name.

Recorded in Los Angeles, Mousetrap Heart

 signifies a revamped and reinvigorated Thirsty Merc, and reintroduces the band with a dynamic new sound. The Sydney four-piece are clearly feeling refreshed, and you can hear it in the music. Everything is tighter and funkier, with an unmistakable bounce in their step.

From the album's opening notes, the first seven songs are a wild, rollicking, no-fat, groove-fuelled odyssey, filled with fast-moving arrangements and spilling over with Rai's razorsharp, occasionally hilarious turns-of-phrase and succinct observations of real life.



Beautiful Tattoo

A new exhibition celebrating tattoo art opens next week in Byron, featuring a surprisingly beautiful collection of artworks showcasing ink on the skin.

Multi-award winning local photographer Alberto Sanchez is making the final additions to a new series of works, showcasing the work of local custom tattoo artist Camilla (Millie) Zavattaro, owner of Rock of Ages Tattoos Parlour in Lennox Head.

The limited edition prints are layered photographs, in which his original portraits of local women have been marked and manipulated to create a series of unique hand worked montages, exploring the nature of body-art, beauty and tribalism.

Recently announced as the Australian Institute of Professional Photographers' Portrait Photographer of the Year, Runner Up for Queensland, Spanish born Alberto says that in 2010 he has been enjoying extending his artistic practice in new directions.

Earlier this year he experimented with a series of images depicting iconic Byron Bay scenes, which he layered with words and textures to create original limited edition artworks, and he has been excited to witness these works hit a chord with local and visiting arts audiences.

With the Tattooed show coming up, Alberto says he has been inspired to begin a new series, showcasing women and their body art against subtly decorated backgrounds, merging the idea of art on the skin and art on the wall.

He says he has always being amused by the contrary reaction tattoos have in the viewer, which he describes as often being disapproval and admiration in equal amounts, and hopes that by incorporating the tattoo into fine art photography, he can dispel some of the aspersions associated with body art forms.

The Tattooed show is being held in conjunction with Retrospect Galleries' annual urban art show – an international showcase of cutting edge works by young artists, from around the world, now in its third year.

Retrospect's Bree Delian says the Gallery is trying to broaden the show this year in recognition of the burgeoning tattoo culture.


'Although tattoos have been around for thousands of years, we are experiencing an explosion in the number of tattoo parlours, and also seeing the rise of custom tattoo artists like Millie Zavattaro, who are attracting attention to body art, as a significant art form,' Delian comments.

'Tattoos today are a far cry from the old sailor images, and there has also been a shift away from appropriating Indigenous designs from different cultures.'

'Now a new form is emerging, spearheaded by the artist/ tattooist, whose work on the human canvas is created with artistic integrity by individuals working with their own individual forms of markings.'

The interest in evident when you consider that regular clients





may have to wait months for a booking at Rock of Ages, to be marked with one of Millie's unique custom motifs.

Also featured in the show are stunning works by Spanish artist Vilchez contrasting the tribal cultures of Latino Maras gangs with Japanese Yakuza warriors – depicted as tattoos on the gangster's bodies. Using a classic printing technique, Vilchez combines woodcut or linocut relief, with dry crystal etching for the tattoo, creating two different finishes in the same print.

Tattooed and Revolution of Art open 6pm Friday July 16 at Retrospect Galleries, 52 Jonson Street, with a live tattoo demo by Millie Zavattaro. All welcome!



The Karate Kid

Dre Parker is a tough little dude. On one leg because the other's been broken by his bigger opponent, the black kid from Detroit gets up to take the fifth and deciding fall of a Beijing Kung Fu tournament, winning everybody's heart, including his enemy's, and making Rocky Balboa look like a big girl. I had a hunch that he might - I mean, co-producer Will Smith was not going to let his precocious son sign up for a flick in which he would not be bathed in the sweeping orchestral glory of the battling underdog. Dre (Jaden Smith) is in China because Mom has been transferred there by her employer, though her soughtafter skills are never revealed. It's love at first sight when he

meets Mei Ying (Han Wen Wen) at their privileged brats' school, but life turns into a nightmare when he is targeted by the local bully. Luckily, Mr Han, his apartment's maintenance man, is none other than Jackie Chan who, understanding Dre's plight, decides to instruct him in the revered skull-breaking skills of Kung Fu, of which he is a master. Mr Han does bodywork on a car in his living room and, not unprecedentedly, has emotional scars from a tragedy in his past which Dre's friendship will help heal as, for a sec, the film looks like it might turn into 'Gran Torino'. Director Harald Zwart presses unerringly all of our primal retribution buttons, diverting us along the way with touristy shots of the Forbidden City, the Great Wall

and a tranguil lake high in the forests surrounding those famous pointy mountains. He even manages to create a Greenwich Village atmosphere for Dre's compound, but you sense that off camera there is a bevy of minders, translators and secret police ensuring that no untoward comment is made about the People's Republic. Jackie Chan lends a calming dignity to proceedings, Han Wen Wen is a charming young actress and even Smith grows on you enough to have you rootin' for him when he's up against it. But it's hard to escape that, for all the malarkey propounded about the honour and ancient wisdom of martial arts, the overarching theme of this populist morality tale is that if someone beats the crap out of you, you train hard, lift your game and then beat the crap out of them. 'There is no bad Kung Fu', Mr Han preaches, 'only bad teachers'. Or, as the American sophistry has it, 'guns can advance the brutally don't kill people, people kill people'. We are hard-wired for violence.

The Secret in their eyes

It's not often that you can put your hand on your heart and say'l had no idea how this would end'. Not that the unforeseen in itself makes a great movie – any trickster can pull a rabbit out of the hat to fool an unsuspecting audience. Also essential are the complementary ingredients of credibility and, above all, the denouement's ability

to explain and make sense of all that has come before it, confirming the work's artistic integrity. Satisfying those criteria perfectly, Argentine director Juan Jose Campanella's taut and ultimately harrowing mystery was justly awarded the 2010 Oscar for Best Foreign Film (and as far as I'm concerned, it leaves 'The Hurt Locker' for dead). Told in flashback, retired court investigator Benjamin (Ricardo Darin) reacquaints himself with his former boss, Irene (Soledad Villamil), after writing the novel that he hopes will unburden him of the torment of the Morales case, a rape/murder, and the horror of what its investigations revealed. Going beyond the usual who-dunnit's brief, this is a late blooming romance, as Benjamin and Irene grow closer together, and an exposé of the way in which an authoritarian political regime (the Peronist) pragmatic as well as corrupt the innocent. Campanella has a background in writing for American TV ('House MD', 'Law & Order'), which doubtless accounts for his knack in turning the screw at exactly the right moment, and for the economy with which he tells a story that is broad in scope and deep in psychological observation. Felix Monti's tight cinematography adds to the unease - his arresting closeis in play is a brilliant example of camera craft and editing. At the other end of the spectrum, a static, silent scene involving Benjamin, Irene and the hateful Gomez (Javier Godino) in a descending lift is loaded with more gut churning tension than you'd find in a dozen other movies. Villamil and Darin are outstanding as a couple dealing with latent, unresolved passions - with his weathered face, unpolished refinement and

just-off-the-pace awareness of what was happening around him, Darin reminded me of Anthony Quinn - and Pablo Rago contributes a subtle, edgy performance as Ricardo Morales, the victim's distraught husband. I saw it at Paddington's Verona before driving out to Homebush for Origin III. Such incomparable drama. Screening this weekend at Mullum Flicks, this definitely is a must-see

Each time I leave, well-fed, I note the motto burned into the café's entrance architrave: 'The pursuit of happiness is greatly overrated.'



Jumping Red Ant

Victoria Cosford

You often hear about farmers 'doing it tough', regardless of the state of the economy, and it is eminently understandable given their reliance on forces and factors beyond their control. The weather, and specifically water availability and drought management, are the big issues in Australia, the world's driest inhabited continent. Sometimes droughts last for years. Yet here I am in the company of such a cheerful, optimistic and enthusiastic farmer that you would never guess at great hardships

I first met John Atkin some years ago at a cooking class; at our next encounter, outside his stall at the Byron Farmers Market, he thrust a bouquet of flowers into my arms. Any man who does that and who addresses me as 'darl' has me instantly charmed and so it was with John, who did both.

John and his wife Kathy run Jumping Red Ant: Small Crops and Flowers, and after inimitably getting lost here I actually am at the Duranbah headquarters. Standing, moreover, in an enormous room whose many windows throw up vistas of hills and dales: lush Northern Rivers countryside. Two of John's teenage kids are being tutored in French at an endlessly long table; Kath is making cups of tea and as I perch myself on a barstool at the massive granite benchtop I am chiefly conscious of base envy. This is my dream kitchen!

John is utterly passionate about cooking (hence the cooking class; hence the kitchen) but it is after all an extension of his passion for produce. 'I've always been interested in food, he tells me. And yet his background was in fitness – he and Kath used to own six Body Works centres in Brisbane. In the 80s he read an article about olive-growing which inspired him (until he found out more about it) at a time he was realising that the fitness industry, and increasingly his administrative and managerial role within it, was no longer to his taste. They found their 10-hectare property in the 90s, intending it originally as a retreat and a weekender. 'We used to

come down here to get away and relax', John says. When it became available to buy they purchased it – although it wasn't until 2001 after a 3-year stint running the pub at Wooli (John : 'Kath didn't like it'; Kath :' I'm not a pub person') that they thought, why not try farming!

They began selling their produce at a little market in Kingscliff but it wasn't until the Byron Farmers Market kicked off that things began to take shape. Markets in general were becoming a lot more popular and 'it's been the best move', John tells me, 'it's a good association and great ethics ... I think it's one of the most authentic farmers markets in Australia. I want to see it expand!'

It has however taken them 'nearly ten years to get to this stage', he says. Kath handles all the administration and looks after the burgeoning business of roses and flowers; John 'coordinates the farms and does the veg.' Farms' refers to the shareagreement he has with fifth-generation farmer John Julius whose 50-acre property is a short drive away. Off we set in the four-wheel drive to visit paddocks of corn and taro, pontiacs and eschallots, silverbeet, broccoli and sweet potato, avocados and citrus, tomatoes and capsicum, zucchini and eggplant 'A whole ratatouille!', I exclaim. John Julius on a tractor over the other side of the paddock waves at us; an assembly of white cockatoos is poised on the rich red soil of another. No insecticides, no pesticides. 'Farming', John tells me, 'has been able to provide the lifestyle that we like, unlike the pub - being able to be around my family and see them every day ... I think it's all to do with managing things ...' He is excited about the Northern Rivers Food Link and 'what could develop out of that funding.' An active committee member of the Byron Farmers Market, he would 'like to see all the markets come together, pool resources and set standards ...a sort of co-op. They would have more power and everyone benefits: the farmers and the community.'

King's golden passage. First up he was Johnny-on-



Running out of people to build the houses

The release last week of the NCVER Apprentices and Trainees Annual highlights the urgent need to reduce the attrition rates in apprenticeships, according to the Housing Industry Association (HIA).

The HIA said too many apprenticeships are not completed, exposing the need to remove the barriers to skills and better support the number of apprentices that complete their training.

HIA Executive Director - Industry Workforce Development, Nick Proud, said attrition rates show one third of young apprentices cancel in the first



year and 55 per cent fail to complete the apprenticeship altogether.

'The attrition of first year apprentices in construction is increasing, he said. 'The percentage of first year apprentices that fail to complete the first year of their training has increased from 25.5 per cent in 2001 to 33 per cent.

'HIA fully supports the traditional indentured apprenticeship model, but says that there is a need for greater support and mentoring provided by the industry to reduce the attrition in the first year, a practice that is yielding results in the Group Training model.

'HIA projects that Australia needs to build over 190,000 dwellings in 2010 alone to meet underlying demand and over the next ten years we need to build 420,000 dwellings more than we built over the last decade.

'The residential building industry has been in a state of skills undersupply across many trades occupations and there is a need to foster apprenticeships, to complement reskilling, upskilling and skilled migration efforts.

'Put simply, government and industry efforts to increase the number of dwellings being built needs to be more effective at increasing skilled tradespeople numbers if there is to be sufficient resources to build the homes that are required in the future.'
