Byron bottleshop DA under the radar

A liquor bottleshop development application (DA) that was ultimately rejected by the Office of Gaming and Racing (OLGR) is again before

Located behind the Palace Cinema on Jonson Street, it is roughly half the floorspace area of that in last year's liquor licence application by Dan Murphy's.

While Council approved Dan Murphy's DA in May 2011, a full day of public hearings before a OLGR panel in 2012 heard almost unanimous calls for its rejection.

Remarkably the renewed application was missed entirely by the public and media: public exhibition for the DA closed July 8, 2013.

The applicant is Nerang-based Global Centres Australia Pty Ltd, which, according to Cr Duncan Dey, never withdrew its original DA.

So who is the applicant? A search with the Australian Securities and Investments Commission (ASIC) shows that that company is what is commonly termed a 'two-dollar company'. ASIC records say Global Centres Australia has issued two shares, valued at \$1 each, to GTM (Aust) Pty Ltd. GTM shares the same Australian Company Number (ACN) as the Azzura Group, and is now the new company name. The site's property owner, Robert Badalotti, is the sole officeholder of GTM.

Cr Duncan Dey told The Echo that Council's Planning Review Committee (PRC) last Wednesday looked at two applications for the area below the Palace Cinema on Jonson Street.

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Heated debate on fluoridation issue

More than 250 people attended a debate on fluoridation in Byron Bay last Wednesday, chaired by journalist and broadcaster Mick O'Regan.

It was the first of the 'Critical Conversations' hosted by the Community Centre and featured guest speakers from both sides of the debate.

Supporters of fluoridation were Dr Brendan White, vice-president of the Australian Dental Association; Professor Alison Jones, a clinical toxicologist; Dr Kerry Chant, chief health officer for NSW; and epidemiologist Professor Wayne Smith.

First to speak was Dr Brendan White, who said he was motivated to get involved with supporting fluoridation after arriving in Byron Bay 18 years ago, after having lived in Adelaide, which has water fluoridation, and noticing how many children he was having to treat for serious dental health issues.

'In Adelaide I would expect to find one diseased tooth in a class of preschoolers, he said. 'When I was involved with my children's preschools here, I found at least ten diseased teeth in these classes. Nine years ago I initiated the process to seek fluoridation for our community.

'We do have an oral health crisis in our area. The North Coast Area Health Service says the decay experienced in five- to six-year-olds is the worst in New South Wales.'

Decline in dental decay owed to fluoride

The state's chief medical officer, Dr Kerry Chant, spoke about legal and technical aspects of water fluoridation, about funding and about the current coverage in the state.

She also spoke about the safety and effectiveness of fluoridation.

Dr Chant said the reasons for the

decline in dental decay included an exposure to fluoride. 'Water fluoridation accounts for 70 per cent of the reduction. Twenty-six per cent is attributed to the use of fluoride toothpaste and two per cent to fluoride tablets.'

Speaking against fluoride were former Lismore mayor and former chair of Rous Water, Dr Ros Irwin; Merilyn Haines, retired medical laboratory scientist and president of Queenslanders for Safe Water; dentist Dr Robert Gammal, a past president of the Australian Society of Oral Medicine and Toxicology; Brunswick Heads dentist, Dr

Marcus O'Meara; and former Byron Shire councillor Richard Staples, who was also formerly a member of Rous Water.

Dentist opposed

Local dentist Dr Marcus O'Meara said that he came from a long line of dentists. 'I am a fifth generation dentist', he said. 'My father was a dentist in Ireland pre and post water fluoridation and he did notice a difference in the dental caries in kids teeth at that time.

'Pre-fluoridation it was common to come for a routine check-up continued on page 2 >

Beachie wins court case against police

Local court magistrate Michael Dakin has upheld the defence by the Beach Hotel to a charge by police of allowing staff drinks after closing time.

On Good Friday last April, police charged the hotel with trading 'beyond permitted trading hours,' after a raid where they alleged staff were having after-hours drinks in the lounge area of the hotel.

Under Section 144B of the Liquor Act, it's an offence to serve liquor after hours.

But the hotel's legal representative, Tony Hatzis from lawfirm Hatzis Cusack, told The Echo that under Section 17(5) of the Liquor Act, publicans can defend allowing after-hours drinks, or 'staffies,' in specific areas of the hotel.

and get a couple of fillings. Post-fluoridation he noticed more and more kids coming through and not needing fillings and this was a trend worldwide at that time in the countries that fluoridated.

'Improvement in caries prevention and education in oral hygiene has meant that the benefits of water fluoridation have been well and truly diluted. The facts are there for anyone to see.

The glory days of water

fluoridation in the 50s, 60s and 70s, when teeth were bad and music was good, are over. Nowadays we are better off putting our resources into making dentists avail-

The Echo spoke to mayor Simon Richardson before the forum and asked why it was that Council was not hosting the event. Cr Richardson said that Council had already made a choice against the introduction of fluoride to the shire's water.

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Govt health dept warns of measles outbreak

Be alert for measles in the Byron Bay area, says the North Coast Public Health Unit.

The unit issued a statement last Friday saying a Byron Bay High School student has been diagnosed with measles.

'This student also travelled to and from school on the Bangalow–Byron Bus (Blanch's Bus Service – bus numbers 32 and 30). Three other people in the Byron Bay area have been diagnosed with measles over the past two weeks.'

Mr Paul Corben, director of North Coast Public Health Unit, said that measles is highly infectious among people who are not fully immunised.

'Measles is spread through coughing and sneezing.

'Symptoms can include fever, tiredness, runny nose, cough, and sore red eyes, which usually last for several days before a red blotchy rash appears.

'Complications range from an ear infection and diarrhoea through to pneumonia and swelling of the brain (encephalitis),' Mr Corben said.

Mr Corben added that vaccination with measlesmumps-rubella (MMR) vaccine is the only way to prevent infection.

Byron Bay and nearby areas have among the lowest vaccination rates in Australia so further cases may occur.

'The meeting was mainly to determine who would manage the applications. It's at a very preliminary stage of considering the DA,' he said. 'Both were directed on Wednesday by the committee to be determined by Council, not staff.'

'One of the applications is to build a restaurant in the block nearest to the street,' he said, 'and another is a section 96 application for a building refit where the rear building has been demolished.' As for the front plans for the restaurant, Cr Dey expressed concerns that the applicant planned a very small kitchen while the dining area and bar area appear much larger.

Meanwhile Paul Waters, president of the town's business chamber, Byron United, told *The Echo*, 'I expect the applicant will run into the same problems with OLGR over density of liquor licences in Byron Bay, especially with the focus on alcohol-related issues that have been evident in the past year in Byron Bay and in fact around the state.'

Less carparks

But he did add that he was, 'quite impressed with the longoverdue renovations of the shops and carpark and credit should be given to the owners. However, it looked like a few carparks had disappeared at that end of the development.'

Darren Pearson, the operator of The Cellar bottleshop located in the northern end of the Woolies carpark, told *The Echo* he was very concerned to hear of the plans.






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Farewell Dave Rankin, muso extraordinaire

David Laurence Rankin (aka Crusty), 77 years old. Born Melbourne, May 30, 1936. Died, Lismore, October 6, 2013.

Dave 'Crusty' Rankin, renowned jazz trombonist, practical joke-a-gram proprietor and potty humourist extraordinaire, was seen off in style at a New Orleans-style funeral procession from his Parkes Street home to his 'church' – the Lismore Bowling Club.

I first met Rankin about 12 years ago, commanding the stage of Lismore's Tattersalls Hotel on trombone with infamous post-punk Lismore band Blurter – wearing only a Ronald Regan mask and a g-string. It was the perfect introduction. He never passed up the opportunity to cross genres with like-minded musicians and Blurter – a motley bunch of middle-age tradies



It was unusual to see Dave Rankin play his trombone sitting down – sometimes he would wear just a g-string and mask.

who got sick of not being musicians – was right up his alley.

Christa Hughes, aka KK Juggy from Machine Gun Fellatio and daughter of Australian jazz great and journalist Dick Hughes, remembered the weekend Rankin got them both a gig in Lismore in the 1990s.

'We generally did get good houses but this was jam packed with *young* people. Dad definitely had the biggest reputation at that stage but would the audience think he was an old fart? We hit the stage and the crowd went wild. I felt like a Rolling Stone the reaction was that big. Afterwards a rowdy group went back to Dave's place and partied till dawn. It was definitely one of my favourite nights

of touring ever with dad, all

organised by "Dirty" Dave

Rankin. A true jazz man.'

David Laurence Rankin was born in Melbourne, May 30, 1936, to Bruce Couch and Gertrude 'Francy' Donellan, who died during the labour. He was adopted and raised by his uncle, jazz pianist Frank Rankin, and wife Anne.

Rankin moved to Balmain in Sydney in the early eighties before settling in Lismore in the mid-eighties. He studied music at SCU, gaining a degree with a view to teaching, but never really took to 'the formal approach'.

He bought a house in Parkes Street where he planted a rainforest and started a successful practical-joke-agram business. He continued performing with his floating ensemble, Jazz on the Move.

Rankin is survived by four children, Merella, Rachel, Tom and Zali; and 14 grandchildren. His only great grandson died a week after birth.

Lesbian community talks mental health

Mental health has been identified as one of the most significant issues of public health in the broader community.

But what must this be like for members of the lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender, (LGBT) communities?

For those who experience homophobia, stigma and discrimination at work, home, school or out in the community because of their sexual or gender diversity, coming to terms with, and seeking support for mental health issues can be an extra challenge.

Social worker Deborah Taylor is a member of the North Coast Lesbian Alliance (NCLA), a group which is just a year old. She believes regional areas like ours can often suffer from under-resourcing in comparison to the highly serviced metropolitan areas.

Byron funding lost

'We are very under-resourced here. There was a gay and lesbian outreach counselling service at the Byron Community Centre, but it lost its funding and now it means that anyone here on the coast who wants counselling has to get to Lismore.

'I am really passionate about finding money and applying for grants, says Deborah. 'We have only been going

Redefining our heroes

It was an obvious comparison to make. Firstly, there were the well-paid politicians who rorted their parliamentary allowances on private jaunts and only paid the money back when their greed was made public. Then along come the volunteer firefighters taking on one of the most terrifying phenomena in nature among searing heat and lung cancer-producing smoke – and without a Commonwealth car to drive them to the fire front. Give them tax breaks, we say. And free beer.

Our firefighters fit easily within our modern-day idea of 'heroes'. It was not always thus. The word derived from an ancient Greek word for 'defender' or 'protector' and was associated with the cult of the demi-god who arrives on Earth to protect us from ourselves when we misbehave. When war was regarded as a glorious thing - which it still is among the cruelly brainwashed – it was acceptable to worship psychopaths such as Achilles, his bent character captured so well by Brad Pitt in the film Troy. The cult lingers on in Columbus Day in America; it became a national holiday in 1937 at the urging of Roman Catholic blokes in the Knights Of Columbus, who wanted a male role model for young boys, conveniently overlooking Christopher Columbus's cruel slaughter and torture of the Lucayan people of the Bahamas.

In Australia we tend to like our heroes a bit more down-toearth and are happy to chiack them when necessary - firefighters, ambos, soldiers who help their mates, even footballers (though probably the words 'sporting' and 'hero' should be seen together only in the company of paralympians).

While role models can be useful, the cult of the hero is dangerous when we come to depend on him/her at the expense of our innate abilities. For every Corporal Benjamin Roberts-Smith VC or Malala Yousafzai there is the everyday hero who receives little adulation but just gets on with exercising their ability to make their immediate neighbourhood a better, safer place through kindness and persistence.

The firefighters fit that description. Wish them cooler weather and heavy rain.

tive outsider, Labor's first, tentative lurch towards democratic reform would have to be accounted a failure.

With much fanfare the party's foot soldiers were told they would have the opportunity to take part in the election of the leader, only to wake up and discover they hadn't - well, not really.

After three weeks of electioneering the rank and file had voted decisively - three to two - for Anthony Albanese, but the caucus went even more decisively for Bill Shorten. Thus it was entirely business as usual; the caucus remained the sole arbiter of who was to lead.

And, just to rub it in, the decision was almost entirely along factional lines. Almost, but not quite: while the right was rock solid for Shorten, a handful of the left deserted Albanese, and this defection proved decisive. Then, of course, the warlords did the rest. While Shorten got the deputy he wanted in the left's Tanya Plibersek, the factions divvied up the rest of the spoils among their chosen few, with the result that that not even the bulk of caucus, let alone those outside the party room, got any effective say in the makeup of the opposition front bench.

The result was entirely predictable and less than wholly satisfactory. Senator Don Farrell, rejected by the voters of South Australia as unworthy of even a backbench role in parliament, got to serve out his term in the shadow ministry as his party's spokesman on the Centenary of ANZAC - surely a role which would have benefitted from having someone who is still going to be around the place as that anniversary approaches. His fellow king maker (or rather regicide), David Feeney, gained a promotion for no reason discernible to observers - except that he is a capo of the Victorian right. Much the same could be said of Stephen Conroy, although his future, in the political killing ground of Defence, does not look all that rosy.

Naturally, there were complaints. The loudest came from the women of the right, who complained that just one of their number - Michelle Rowland - made the cut. The faction unceremoniously dumped the former speaker, Anna Burke, not even supporting her

The caucus remained the sole arbiter of who was to lead and, just to rub it in, the decision was almost entirely along factional lines

for the lowly position of chief party whip. The women of the left did considerably better, allowing Shorten to boast that with a total of 11 female ministers, he had the most feministfriendly front bench in federal history; which may have been true, but was of no comfort to those who had missed out for the benefit of those they considered their inferiors.

The long-serving Warren Snowdon, now demoted to the parliamentary secretarial outlands, made the usual noises about coteries of anonymous men meeting in secret, and certainly he and a few others, notably Ed Husic, could consider themselves hard done by. But as he himself admitted, while the factional system endures, so will promotion on grounds of seniority and personal fealty rather than pure


main high. Those who seek to frustrate them - mainly the union bosses who see any step forward, however small and hesitant, as a threat to their own fortresses of power and influence - should be aware that not only a majority of the general public, but an increasing number within the party itself, now view their eventual demise as inevitable.


Membership has already grown dramatically and the newcomers will not countenance a return to the status quo. At the national ALP conference next year, it is a safe bet that attempts will be made to derail the entire process of reform, and while these will fail, there is a real risk of a faction-driven compromise which could be almost as bad. If the unions cannot push the rank and file aside altogether, they will probably demand their share: an attempt to move to the system of the British Labour Party, which elects its leader by a three-way split between the parliamentary party, the rank and file and the unions, is certain. But this would have the result of effectively disenfranchising the rank and file altogether: it would give the factions a permanent twothirds majority, if they chose to use it - and of course they

Given that the unions still have 50 per cent control of the conference, it is a real possibility. And if the unions want to play tough, they will also be able to stall further reform, such as the obvious next step: party preselections for the Senate and for state upper houses to be determined by a ballot of all eligible members in each state. And this where Shorten's role will be critical. In the run up to the leadership election, he matched Albanese by promising to continue the reform process; but there has always been a feeling that he is rather less keen on it than his left-wing rival, and the feeling has intensified since he took the top job. He has shown some signs of trying to shake himself free of his own union past, but at the conference the screws will be on.

If he succumbs, if he relegates it all to the too-hard basket, he will immeasurably damage both the party and his own credibility and electability. It is not overstating it to say that his chances of becoming prime minister hinge largely on his ability to sell himself as a reformist leader – of both the Labor Party and the nation as a whole. He can make history, or he can appear as a footnote. So get with it, Bill – live up to your name. Shorten the odds!

■ I can appreciate how much courage it takes for W B Crompton to overtake an unprotected cyclist when he's feeling totally exposed inside his two tonnes of steel box. It would be useful if he understood that bicycles are vehicles and fully entitled to use the road. Also, if he wants to quote the road rules it would be good if he got them right. Drive or ride as near as practicable to the lefthand side and not as near as possible to the extreme left.

I am a very experienced and considerate cyclist. I realise I'm slower than most motor vehicles and, wherever I can, try not to impede them. But that's not going to happen at the expense of my safety

and neither W B Crompton nor any other motorist should expect it.

In town you will not find me riding in the door zone. With the amount of motorists who open their doors without looking it's not a safe place to be and I would urge cyclists to never ride there. Out of town where a road may be too narrow for three abreast without compromising my safety, I'll make it very clear that motorists are not invited to share the lane. They have to use the oncoming lane to overtake and it's up to them to make sure it's empty. Occasionally motor vehicles are held up but rarely would I ever add even five seconds to anyone's journey. To begrudge those few seconds is to begrudge my safety and, potentially, my life.


There are other road rules W B Crompton might be interested in. Never overtake

Medicating a recalcitrant population is not welcomed

■ If there had been more time available, the question I wanted to ask at the fluoridation panel discussion last Wednesday was: how can it be considered a cost effective use of taxpayers' money to administer fluoride via tap water when this means there is no control over the dosage levels?

Everybody drinks different amounts. Many of the target group, being children and early teenagers, may drink little or no tap water, some preferring cola or other softdrinks or juices. Many families may intentionally avoid tap water because of the chlorine content, which has been demonstrated to be a cause of heart disease, and instead drink bottled water.

Another group uses rain-

water catchment and many people, again in the target group, won't even get much if any via cooking with water, eg those who eat a lot of fast/ takeaway foods and other processed food that does not use water in cooking.

There is also no way of demonstrating accuracy of the studies that claim evidence of benefits from comparing results of before and after introduction of fluoride into water supplies because of this lack of measurement of who got what doses and what other factors may have occurred over this timeframe.

In terms of cost-effective treatment, why would you go to such a great expense to fluoridate the megalitres of all water supplies when only a tiny amount of that water

will end up as drinking water for the target group; most of it ending up in the environment or drunk by older people for whom there can be no benefit but instead possibly harm?

Isn't direct supply to those who are the target group with readily available pills going to be far more cost-effective and measureable regarding assessment of effects? This method also has the benefit of allowing freedom of choice as to what chemicals are ingested into our bodies. Supply of pills is clearly a more costeffective and ethical option.

■ I have a simple little device, a radio/microwave

alarm. It starts to beep when it detects greater than .001 mW/sqcm electromagnetic radiation and is most sensitive between 100MKz and 3GHz, within which range are FM, TV, amateur radio, microwave ovens, mobile phones, wireless LAN, bluetooth, GPS etc, according to Wikipedia.

Walking it around Mullum it is almost entirely silent. It starts to beep about six metres from a mobile phone connected and three metres from a microwave oven cooking. Put up against the phone the beeping is far more intense and the same about 0.2m from the oven. I decided not to see what would happen if I put it in the oven. Although, I did try it in a wireless hotspot and there was a disturbing level of beeping, but there could have been some other cause

It seems that to really understand the proposed Mullum wi-fi we need to get clear on what levels of radiation would be present and also the level at which human health is impacted on. That unfortunately might be the end of that project, or could there be a safe way to do it?

Planting the seeds of wisdom around the globe

Michel and Jude Fanton are in perpetual motion, a twoperson NGO (non-government organisation) on a global odyssey for seed freedom.

The couple formed Seedsavers in 1986 after concerns that corporate seed production would lead to the loss of varieties cultivated over centuries for their taste, nutrition and robustness. Their concern was shared; after decentralising their operation, 120 seed networks sprouted across Australia. Members meet in each other's gardens to swap seeds and gardening lore. Byron Hinterland Seed Savers is active in Byron Shire.

'We received 8,700 strains from gardeners around Australia,' says Jude of when the duo began to take off. 'Our typical provider was ageing, sometimes antisocial, and fanatical. They didn't want to pass away without passing on their favourite breeds.'

Food shortage

And then they went global. 'We now specialise in helping war-torn and newly modernised nations,' says Jude, who was among the first foreigners to reach Cuba following the Soviet collapse and the near starvation of the population. East Timor, Cambodia and Afghanistan also received the 'seedsaver' treatment. In their travels, they encounter aid groups who respond to food shortage by distributing hybrid seeds, pesticides and fertiliser.

It's unclear if using poten-

tially genetically modified (GM) seeds and chemical poisons is simply ignorance, or the vacuum left by war and corporate opportunism to open up new markets. But Jude and Michel's alternative is to educate on permaculture methods and link locals with seed and knowledge.

They don't have a five year plan. 'We have a five-minute plan and a 5,000-year plan, says Michel. The five-minute plan was to eat wild almonds. The 5,000-year plan is to bring more local traditional varieties into the global diet. The foods we eat now used to grow in the wild. In 5,000 years we should be growing an even greater variety of nutritious food and natural medicine?

One senses that the couple have reached a junction in their life and life's work, are

passing from actors to elders, and with this they begin to share their wisdom:

Get planting

'Just plant something,' says Michel. 'We've planted stuff from all over the country. If it survives, it adapts. If you send seeds from Byron to a frost-prone area, only the early-flowering varieties will survive. The first year you may get a poor crop, but if you continue to collect the seeds, next year more of your plants will flower early, and soon you have something different: a locally adapted variety. The vital step is to harvest the seed, or you lose nature's

'I haven't spent time worrying about [biotech GM corporation] Monsanto. Yes, there is room for political activism, especially against laws restricting the right to save seeds, but if you keep planting and swapping and showing others how, the rest

The couple has just returned from a five-month tour of 13 countries, including a seed exchange with 5,000 participants in Greece and assisting an embryonic seed network in Senegal, west Africa.

The longest-lasting, most effective organisations are those that start without a budget and are light on their feet,' says Michel.

Park plans

A new Board and Trust has taken up management of Brunswick Heads Caravan Parks. Appointed by minister for planning Andrew Stoner in June, the NSW Crown Reserve Holiday Park Trust and Board is now responsible for 23 north coast parks, three south coast and seven inland



gent. Designed to maximise park profits, the new plans of management ignore the requirements of the new licence agreements and fail to include new boundaries and conditions or address compliance and safety issues.

No properly surveyed maps with accurate land measurements have been provided by the Trust or Crown Lands to date. Council, the community and the new Board will be forced to rely on misleading, inaccurate 'concept drawings' -

rather than properly detailed plans as would be expected of any other developer - in assessing POMs.

Terrace POM 2010 misrepresented the inter-tidal zone, omitted the legally required setbacks and buffer zones along the riverbank boundary and other caravan park boundaries and failed to clearly identify encroached road reserve lands. It's unlikely the new Board will bother with a site visit.

Mr Bolger's Trust has failed to properly consult and negotiate with community stakeholders. 'Negotiations' with Council are limited, closed meetings with no community representation, and no minutes or updates available to the public.


No-one in the state land management team is protecting the public interest and both Council and the community can look forward to a good shafting by Crown Lands Department and the new Holiday Park Trust and Board this summer.

THE MOST RECENT IS TORA, A FIVE PIECE WHO EFFORTLESSLY FUSE ACOUSTIC INDIE POP WITH ALT-ELECTRONICA TO PRODUCE LUSH PULSING SOUNDSCAPES THREADED WITH SEDUCTIVE MELODIES.

Jo Loewenthal, Tobias Tunis, Jai Piccone, Thorne Davis and Shaun Johnston all went to a Rudolph Steiner school in the small NSW north coast town of Mullumbimby. They first came to attention through the 2010 Mullumbimby Music Festival Youth Mentorship Program, and were booked for the festival in their own right the following year. Seven spoke with Jo on the eve of their gig at the Byron Surf Festival.

Jo, how did attending Shearwater impact on your musicality? Who were the people there that influenced your musical development? (Am I right in thinking that quite a few of you were old school buddies?)

As a hyperactive and easily excitable child, I was a nightmare for any classroom unless it involved hands-

Luckily Shearwater harnessed this energy in music class by providing a hands on learning environment, which encouraged us to create our own music. To this day I strive to be unique with my music as a result.

Who are the musicians that have most influenced you?

I have been making music with Shaun and Toby since the start of high school, which is seven years ago now. We have all influenced each other more than anyone else, our differences in musical taste shines through in the music we make.

Over the period of my career my musical tastes have

changed dramatically but the first names that come to mind are John Mayer, James Blake and Bon Iver. All there of these artists drove me to obsession and inspired me to make better music.

How did the Mullum Music Festival Youth Mentorship Program assist your musical development? Was it an integral part of your early musical path?

The youth mentorship program has helped us make invaluable connections in the music industry. As a young artist it is hard to know what to do with your talent, so I think the program gives a sense of direction and is a great way to get your foot in the door.

Is there a song that you love that you think 'I wish I had written that!'

There are many songs that I wish I had written but if I had to choose one it would be Gravity by John Mayer; it's so perfectly simple and solemn.

Tell me a little about your new debut EP - where did you record it? Who with?

We recorded the EP in one of our garages, which was difficult because of the bad acoustics. We took it upon ourselves to self-produce the whole thing, which we soon realised was easier said than done.

What did you set out to achieve with the feel and sound of it?

We set out to create something that anyone could easily listen to. We wanted a soothing sound with lots of space and dynamics.

How close did you get?

I feel that we achieved what we set out to achieve but there is always room for improvement which is an exciting prospect and I think any good artist would agree.

What are the stand-out tracks for you?

This is a question that I have been asked a lot and my answer remains the same: to me Calming Her is the most unique, interesting and I think it best represents the sound of Tora. My next favourite is Due To Lies, when I play it on my nice big sound system; the synth just massages my brain after a long day.

What should we expect for your performance at the **Byron Surf Festival?**

When we play live we do everything in our power to recreate the sound of Tora on record. It's a challenge having five people in a band that plays such a minimalistic style of music; a lot of the time there's only one or two musicians playing at once.

You can expect to see five young men enjoying themselves and hopefully enjoying the weather.

This year Play Mullum joins forces with Byron Falls Festival and the winner will also be offered a gig at the upcoming Byron event.

Along with Festival directors Glenn Wright and Brandon Saul (Mullum and Falls respectively) Marty Jones, editor of Rhythms magazine is one of the judges who is looking forward to hearing what musicians have to offer.

'There are a few things I look for when judging. Lyrics are pretty important obviously, but it's hard not to take into account the musical talent of the person – taking into account they have to sing at the festival, so being in tune is an advantage!

So for Marty it's not just about the lyrics.

'It's also the arrangement, some people put in a lot of thought, interesting instrumentation, originality; it doesn't sound like a 12-bar blues that sounds like everyone else.

With so many songs already written about the road, how hard is it to find something new to say?

'It's not easy. There are so many songs written that it's so hard to write something and you have to take into consideration that a lot of entries are from teenagers, so you have to make a subjective judgment that it rings true - if you are a really, really good interpreter of song it doesn't matter if you've lived something or not, it should ring true anyway'.

By The Time I Get To Phoenix – Jimmy Webb/Glen Campbell When it comes to great road songs, Marty Jones can't go past By the Time I get to Phoenix by Jimmy Webb and Glenn Campbell.

'There's something about the Webb/Campbell combo that slays me every time. This has to be one of the most heart-rending leaving songs ever, and Campbell has done a particularly affecting new version on his latest album.'

So what is it about the road that goes so deep in the human psyche?

'I think that it goes back to Homer and the Illiad, it's always about the quest, its like the grail, or Jason and the Argonauts, its about the seeking of knowledge – and also a big part of it is confronting the fear of the unknown – its a huge part of travel, and some people seem to do it well...'

In fact Martin believes that it's such an important part of Australian songwriting because of the enormous distances so many musicians have to travel to their gigs.

'As a musician in Australia you have to travel a lot and you have to do long stretches, and I think there is a romance of being on the road in Australia, because it can take you 15 minutes and you can be nowhere. It's just you and this immense vastness!'

Eighties rockers **Bourbon Street** have re-formed for three gigs in the northern rivers/Gold Coast area before heading north to perform at the


Airlie Beach Music Festival in November.



The horror film is also 'an invitation to indulge in deviant, antisocial behaviour, so according to King the horror writer is 'neither more nor less than an agent of the status quo', which involves at least having a full belly and enough money to buy a book or watch a film. The horror concept of a cosmic war waged between good and evil certainly helps support the fearinducing status quo of some religions, but one must allow that it also provides the element of conflict all drama is tied to. King dwells on conflict between Apollonian and Dionysian forces within our own personalities and how horror fiction naturally reflects that. At a deeper level than nightmare monsters, King also examines 'social horror', by which writers such as Ira Levin The Stepford Wives, Rosemary's Baby parody – our own justification of repression in whatever form. Terry Gilliam's Brazil and George Orwell's 1984 also tackle that edge of 'social horror'.

King even attempts to answer the question, 'How do you justify earning a living by feeding off people's worst fears?' 



SWEET TOOTH

lan McEwan is perhaps best known from the film of his novel Atonement, in which Keira Knightley gave one of her more powerful performances. He seems to have a real flair for understanding his female characters and this is on show again in Sweet Tooth.

As with Atonement, all is not what it seems on the surface in Sweet Tooth. The first-person narrative by the protagonist, Serena Frome, finds her caught up at the lower end of the



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

PRISONERS ___

By ghoulish coincidence, this abduction thriller has arrived at the same time as the reopening of the investigation into the disappearance of Madeleine McCann from a resort in Portugal in 2007. The location of Canadian director Denis Villeneuve's movie could not be more different - the icv burbs of middle America with winter closing in - but the elemental horror of stolen children is as chilling in its impact and in the outraged emotional response it engenders. A couple of neighbourhood

families are celebrating a typical Thanksgiving together when their two small daughters go missing. Alex (Paul Dano), a young man with the IQ of a ten-year old, is the obvious suspect, having fled the police after being spotted at the location of the crime. Keller (Hugh Jackman), the father of one of the girls, cannot accept it when Alex is discharged from custody and, as in the Wild West, he takes matters into his own hands. Working on the case is Detective Loki (Jake Gyllenhaal), a tattooed, jaded cop with a nervous tic

whose approach is as much intuitive as forensic. It is the clash in temperaments of the two men that drives the story while writer Aaron Guzikowski's screenplay gives nothing away – in fact it sometimes is at great pains to muddy the water. There remained a nagging illogicality for me, but the tension is sustained throughout and the plausibility never questioned thanks to the edgy realism of every character. The shocking realisation that we are all prisoners of our own nature belatedly comes to Keller, whose actions are meant

and apparently directing

to be at least partially forgiven after what he'd witnessed Alex doing to his dog (which, for mine, is a cheap trick on Villeneuve's part). Jackman is great as the alpha male hunter with a short fuse, and Gyllenhaal, not too far from his dogged role in Zodiac, combines his usual doe-eyed softness with unwavering resolve. If an occasional plot point is farfetched, it is not enough to detract from a tightly wrung, abrasive whodunit. ~ John Campbell
