Small schools targeted by state Nats/Libs

Around 16 local small schools could be severely affected by a state government planned shake-up which would see them lose their principal and have their funding transferred to larger schools under a 'hub and spokes' schools network system.

The recently released government 'Local Schools, Local Decisions' initiative says it would provide schools and principals with more authority to make decisions at the school level to improve student outcomes'.

But opposition Labor education spokeswoman Carmel Tebbutt says that principals were concerned that a proposal for small schools to operate in a network was a 'backdoor means to close small schools'.

She told *The Echo* that, 'Despite being asked in parliament to rule out school amalgamations, education minister Adrian Piccoli refused

to do so. Small schools are often the hub of their local community and can provide a wonderful education experience for students. The minister's failure to provide clarity on the government's intentions is causing anxiety in local communities, particularly in schools where there are significant numbers of temporary staff or key appointments are not confirmed or extended'.

NSW has 600 small schools that would be affected by a principal reclassification proposal that 'particularly concerns' the NSW Primary Principals' Association (NSWPPA).

Wilsons Creek P&C secretary Sharon McGrath agrees and told *The Echo* that, 'by removing teaching principals at many of the Byron Shire's small schools and placing their decision-making power in the hands of off-site principals in Mullumbimby and Byron, the **continued on page 3** ➤

Storm damages Byron Bay hospital

A flash storm which ripped through Byron Shire on Saturday night caused damage to Byron Hospital's roof in the emergency department (ED), causing patients to be relocated to the general ward.

Executive director of the Tweed/ Byron Health Service, Bernadette Loughnane said that access to the ED is through the main entrance to the Hospital until further notice. 'At no time were staff or patients placed at risk', she said in a statement. Emergency services including two crews from the Byron Bay Fire and Rescue service rushed to the scene at around 7pm and there were no reports of injuries.

The Byron SES later attended to help with the cleanup – one more stop in their busy evening.

Byron Shire SES unit controller John Farley said that volunteers were called to assist the elderly in town. 'We went to both Byron Aged Care and Feros Village Byron Bay to attend to several broken skylights', said John on Monday. 'They were all smashed by hail. Consequently we have been, and are still, busily patching them up in readiness for the professional repairers before any more rain comes.' John said no residents needed to be evacuated. He said that between them, the SES and the rural fire service had eight units in the field between them with 44 staff including headquarters communications.

SES community engagement coordinator Janet Pettit says that of the 90 jobs in the northern rivers, 55 of those were from the Byron area.

Govt grant money 'drying up': mayor

Funding to improve lighting and CCTV at the Byron Bay taxi rank remains uncertain with the federal attorney-general's department refusing to commit to the funding.

The 'Safer Suburbs Program Taxi Security Scheme, totalling \$60,000, was announced for Byron Shire Council under the previous Labor government but remains in limbo under the new Tony Abbott-led government.

A spokesman for the attorney-general's department, which is under the direction of Liberal MP George Brandis, told The Echo, 'Grant spending across the government is currently being assessed due to tightened financial circumstances and the need to ensure financial commitments are consistent with the government's priorities. Byron Shire Council will be advised as quickly as possible of the outcomes of this process once the government has concluded its considerations?

It comes after \$149,000 funding for a cycle track was axed by deputy prime minister and Nationals leader, Warren Truss, last week.

Mayor Simon Richardson says essential infrastructure funding seemed to be 'drying up' in recent months.

'For smaller councils like Byron Shire, grant funding is a significant component of how we deliver projects and programs. It enables us to match our existing budgets and get projects off the ground faster.'

(DEC) and the government, that downgrading the role and status of principals in small schools improves student outcomes'.

Proposal rejected

President of the Mullumbimby Teachers Association and member of the State Council of the NSW Teachers Federation, Wil Constable, told The Echo that 'A principal reclassification document was discussed at the October State Council, made up of 350 representatives across the state, and that draft proposal was rejected.

'At the November council meeting, councillors will be presented with the next update in this important matter'.


The government initiative applies to all public schools with funding of less than \$1m, and according to the NSWP-PA that's roughly 160 students.

The NSWPPA represents nearly 1,800 principals across NSW, including nearly 600 principals who will be affected by the principals' reclassification initiative.

Local small schools likely to be affected according to enrolment figures on the department website would include Coorabell (103 students), Crabbes Creek (33), Durrumbul (67 enrolments are listed on the department's website although parents at the school say actual enrolments are 30), Goonengerry (29), Eureka (29), Main Arm (73), Newrybar (36), Rosebank (49), Stokers Siding (64), The Channon (49), The Pocket (60), Uki (100), Upper Coopers Creek (12), Whian Whian (17) and Wilsons Creek (67).

DEC (Lismore Network) director John Lynch visited Durrumbul last week to meet with the school P&C and reassure them that their school had not been earmarked for closure. Although The Echo has been told that the acting principal's contract had not been renewed past June 2014, Mr Lynch told The Echo that while he could not discuss individual staff members' personal circumstances, 'the DEC will move to appoint a permanent principal as soon as possible'. He also said that while schools may amalgamate where that would result in better student outcomes, Durrumbul was 'not in that situation'.

Mr Lynch also said that the networking proposal was a 'separate issue' from the principal reclassification and that any decision to 'form a network will be made by school principals and their local communities' rather than be 'imposed'.

Councillors to go head to head over fluoridation

Cr Woods's push to fluoridate the Shire's water supply has met with strong resistance from fellow Councillor Rose Wanchap.

Both have submitted opposing motions for the upcoming Council meeting this Thursday, and it comes after a closed meeting was held with Councillors and health professionals. Additionally a public meeting was also held at the Byron Community Centre where residents rejected the proposal.

While Cr Woods's case for fluoridated water is a little light on detail, Cr Wanchap submitted a 1,900 word motion explaining her opposition and requesting Council maintain a no fluoridation stance.

Cr Wanchap says in her motion, 'The US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) classify fluoride as an "unapproved drug" The Therapeutic Goods Administration of Australia (TGA) have never approved fluoride for drinking water. The TGA acknowledges that it has never evaluated fluoridation chemicals for safety or effectiveness.'

But in her motion in support of fluoridation, Cr Woods says, 'The best and most effective, efficient, cost-effective and equitable method is by the addition of the recommended dose to the Shire's drinking water.'

'The addition of fluoride is endorsed by the Australian National Health and Research Council, US Centres for disease control, WHO, Health Canada to name a few.

Cr Woods, who is also on the board of water supply authority Rous Water, told *The Echo*, 'I have always been in support of fluoride as I have three generations of my family who have benefited from the use of fluoride to protect teeth.'

Meanwhile Council staff say in Council's agenda that the motion – if succesful – does not include Mullumbimby's supply.

They say, 'Rous Water has four constituent Councils" Ballina, Byron, Lismore and Richmond Valley. Rous Water supplies bulk water to the majority of these local government areas, but there are townships that are excluded, including Casino, Nimbin, Mullumbimby and Wardell.

Cr Woods agrees that Mullum's supply would be exempt from dosing if it were to go ahead, 'except during a bad drought when water may have to be pumped from Rocky Creek to supplement the supply.'

'The NSW health department is paying the capital cost for the plant and equipment but the cost of the fluoride will be born by all councils whether it is in our supply or not.'

Previously Cr Woods said that Rous Water have asked Councils to make a decision on fluoridation as plans are underway for dosing plants at Rocky Creek Dam.

One man's journey to seek justice from the Catholic Church

It would seem that \$55,000 is the amount a child should expect to be paid after a teacher plays with his penis.

It's the accepted reimbursement a ten-year-old might recieve after a teacher from a religious institution sexually abuses them.

And that abuse would most likely ruin your childhood, education, job prospects, social life and romantic and sexual relationships. Relationships with your own children may also be affected.


But wait! There is one more relationship ruined.

If it turns out that the source of your spiritual knowledge, the one trusted to educate you about the great almighty, was also the fellow who sat you on his lap and slipped his hand inside your undies, chances are you will find yourself bereft of faith in both humanity and God.

John Saunders was in grade six when a lay teacher from Mosman Marist Brothers Primary asked him to take a seat on his knee.

This was the beginning of daily sexual and emotional abuse that lasted about eight months, and 40 years on, Saunders still carries that weight.

In 1997 Saunders gathered

himself enough to begin the end of his torment when he visited a police station and reported his ordeal. In 1998 the church made him an ex-gratia payment to shut his mouth.

When in 2004 Saunders continued his original quest to seek justice from the church in regard to his ongoing abuse by school bullies as a teenager in the Catholic school system, he was, under the hand of Cardinal George Pell, given a 'pastoral response', another ex-gratia payment of \$10,000.

Public hearings

Thankfully the physical and emotional abuse of children at the hands of the Catholic Church is finally being addressed: the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual

Abuse is now underway. Public hearings and private sessions will continue into December of this year at least.

It is expected that 5,000 people with speak to the commission. And while it is possible that John may be included, for now he is addressing the problem on other levels.

John has written a book, the Sexual Abuse Survivor's Handbook: One man fights the Catholic Church.

The book tells John's story but also aims to be a healing guide for abuse survivors and a practical handbook for those wishing to confront their perpetrators and seek

compensation and justice through the legal system.

And for those wanting to learn more about how to approach the healing, John will also co-host with mayor Simon Richardson a forum entitled 'Child Abuse & Community: How does Institutional Child Abuse affect Community?'

Byron forum

Panelists will include professionals in the fields of health, law and relationships, and the evening aims to break down the social taboos and exchange knowledge and further community connection.

It will explore the impact on children, adult survivors, intimate relationships, family, friends and community, government and the institutional response.

There will be qualified people available to support those who may become distressed.

John says he wants the night to better inform the public, 'in the critical conversation on healing child abuse in all its forms.'

The public forum is open to all over the age of 12 years and will be held at the Byron Community Centre Theatre on November 28 from 7pm.

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A pilgrimage to the Pilliga CSG waste-lands

The site of a 2011 CSG wastewater spill in the Pilliga Forest remains void of any regrowth, even after two years, according to Byron Environment Centre (BEC) co-ordinator David Saunders.

Mr Saunders was part of CSG-free activist group that recently visited the pristine Pilliga scrub, located west of Tamworth in north-central NSW, and inspected the wastewater spill site and supported forest protectors there.

a nuclear accident site, very frightening, and these are from just test wells on a small scale. The evidence I saw and photographed of the now desert-like landscape from the spill says it all. CSG mining isn't safe and is insanity.

Earlier this month another group of north coast activists visited the Pilliga, where locals are coming together to oppose CSG.

cious Great Artesian Basin from CSG industrialisation,' she added.

Bundella farmer Megan Kuhn said, 'Here in northwest NSW we are currently facing an enormous challenge that we certainly didn't ask for. Our communities, our water resources and our farmlands are all threatened by a coal seam gas invasion.

'Santos has no social licence to operate and they are forcing themselves on concerned rural communities. 'We are standing on this road today to highlight Santos's unacceptable behaviour in fencing off our Crown roads for their private drilling activities,' she said. Gomeroi elder Maureen Sulter added the message: 'Winangaya dhawun. Respect the land. to protect this place from coal seam gas mining, she said.

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He says he made the trip to get firsthand knowledge of the industry, as he was 'asked for updates and info on CSG so much' while working the BEC kiosk.

'I was shown an area consisting of hectares of former forest land where a CSG tailings dam overflowed after a rain event. The area affected by the spill is completely dead now; all trees dead, all wildlife gone, not even a single ant to be seen. It looks like spoke to Anne Kennedy, president of the NSW Artesian Bore Water Users Association, who told a familiar story.

'We feel we have been backed into a corner by governments refusing to listen to us or to consider the impacts of the potential loss of our groundwater if this gasfield is developed,'Ms Kennedy said. Mullum Music Festival gets Kinky

This year Mullum Music Festival welcomes the legendary Kinky Friedman as one of the major international headliners for what is to be their sixth event.

Musician, author, entrepenuer and Governor of the Heart of Texas, Kinky is an American living legend.

In fact he's been called the Frank Zappa of country music. His Mullum Music festival appearance is one of only ten performances the 70-year-old is planning for his Australian tour.

In a landscape of whitewashed politically correct automatons, Friedman continues to present a one-finger salute. He's currently pushing for the legalising of marijuana and the growing of hemp, in his campaign for Texas Ag Commissioner.

'I can't think of any elected officials I respect and admire; they are all dead,' says Kinky.

'All my political heroes are dead. All we are left with are the bad people who go into politics. The hall monitors.

Musos as leaders?

'What we need are the musicians. We could run the country a lot better. Sure, we wouldn't get much done in the morning, but we'd be honest and we'd get the creative work done all through the night!'

Kinky Friedman has worn many hats over his long career that began in 1966 with the almost obligatory obscure, one-off single with his university band, King Arthur & The Carrots.

Kinky has left his indelible brand on the Texan and global landscape with classics like They Ain't Makin' Jews Like Jesus Anymore a song which is now entrenched as



a cult classic in the American songbook. Although not everyone gets the irony. According to Kinky, it's the curse of political correctness.

'Political correctness is a term coined by Joseph Stalin and it had a terrible effect on American culture.

'People like Richard Pryor or George Carlin - they wouldn't make it today because these days it's about people who become a product like Lady GaGa or Justin Bieber or Miley Cyrus. The culture of the system connives to create this. Things become homogenised.'

And They Ain't Makin' Jews Like Jesus Anymore?

'That's about a man who confronts bigotry in a bar and does something about it.

'On my last European tour that was by far the favourite song. Germans by the way are my second-favourite people, and the first, well, that is everyone else!'

'Satire,' says Kinky, 'is certainly one of the casualties of political correctness. In America there are no media.

'There is no journalism, except at a high-school level. That's when they want to know the truth, and then they gradu-

ate and get a job and they realise that people won't print the truth so they stop writing it.

Kinky Friedman's career is as impressive as it is diverse.

Alongside a foray into politics, he has also toured with Dvlan and written books with Willie Nelson and Billv Bob Thornton. A tribute album Why The Hell Not featured Kinky tracks covered by Nelson, Lyle Lovett, Dwight Yoakam and Asleep At The Wheel.

Who would Jesus deport?

Kinky believes there is some simpatico between Texans and Australians. 'There is a linkage between Texas and Australia. People feel at home. They know about freedom?

When told about Australia's current political and humanitarian dilemma with refugees he summed it up pretty simply: 'Well, who would Jesus deport?'

Now that's one hell of a bumper sticker.

GST hike on mobile-home pensioners 'devastating'

Thousands of north coast pensioners living in mobilehome parks face a ten per cent hike on their rents under a federal government plan which many have only just found out about.

A draft ruling two weeks ago by the Australian Taxation Office (ATO) on the Goods and Services Tax (GST) paid by park owners means they now face having to pay a 10 per cent GST on their rents.

Ken Cummins, president of the Tweed Heads/Tweed Coast branch of the Affiliated Residential Parks Residents Association (ARPRA), says

the move is outrageous and will impact severely on fixedincome pensioners and retirees living in mobile-home parks in the region.

Mr Cummins says many pensioners own their own mobile homes, but will be forced to pay the GST on the leases on which they sit.

'In many cases this will amount to around \$30 a fortnight increase for many, which they just can't afford.

Richmond MP Justine Elliot, who has taken up their fight this week in parliament, has slammed the plan as 'devastating for thousands of locals who simply cannot afford a ten per cent increase in their rents'.

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

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Sharing economy spooks big business

arlier this year, I travelled to Melbourne for ▲ a conference. Instead of paying to stay in a hotel like I normally would, I paid a local couple to stay in their spare room. On arriving at their clean and tasteful apartment high above the city streets, my hosts handed me a cold cider and we chatted about our lives.

This warm welcome was a sharp contrast to the experience of arriving alone to a lifeless hotel room. I thoroughly enjoyed my stay, it cost less than a typical hotel room and I was within a few minutes' walk of the conference venue.

The business that facilitated this experience was Airbnb, one of the poster children of a movement known as collaborative consumption. Established in 2008, Airbnb hooks up people who have room to spare with people who need somewhere to stay. More than 500,000 properties are listed worldwide and more than 8.5 million people have stayed in them. Clearly, others are getting as much out of the Airbnb experience as I did. Last year, the company was valued at US\$2.5 billion.

Airbnb is only one of a plethora of businesses that are buying into the collaborative consumption model. It's an economic model based on access rather than ownership. Collaborative consumption startups use the internet and social media to facilitate peerto-peer exchanges, allowing people to share assets and services directly with those who require them.

This emerging sharing economy includes marketplaces like eBay and Gumtree,

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car sharing services like Go-Get, bike sharing services like Melbourne Bike Share, peerto-peer rental services like Open Shed, errand services like Airtasker and clothes swapping services like the Clothing Exchange. Many more startups focusing on diverse products and services are operating in Australia.

Clearly, this emergent sharing economy is a potential threat to established business models. If consumers are sharing things they already have, then they don't need to buy something new - or at

least, they don't need to buy so often. If I stay with a local in Melbourne, I'm not giving my money to a hotel chain. In short, if the sharing economy takes off, existing businesses will be selling fewer products and services.

Collaborative consumption initiatives tap into idle capacity in the economy unused rooms, tools that are gathering dust, spare seats during the morning commute and unused skills - and make this capacity available to consumers at a lower price than the incumbents.

As well as being financially attractive to consumers, participation in the sharing economy reduces environmental impact by making more efficient use of existing resources. On top of that, participants can make new social connections with

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the people they share with. It's a win-win-win proposition for consumers - they can feel good about their environmental impact, build new social relationships and save money at the same time.

Despite this attractive business case, the sharing economy has so far been too small to pose much of a threat to existing business interests. For example, only one per cent of tourists visiting New York stay in Airbnb properties. Globally, there are about one billion cars, but only 2.3 million members of car sharing

programs. Nevertheless, the

sharing economy constitutes a new disruptive element that is growing rapidly. Revenue in the global car sharing market is expected to grow from US\$1 billion in 2013 to more than US\$6 billion in 2020.

Just how big the sharing economy could grow remains uncertain, but there is some research on its market potential. In a Masters research project, more than 84 per cent of the Dutch respondents expressed interest in participating in collaborative consumption of some sort.

While current uptake in Australia falls well short of these levels, new collaborative consumption startups are appearing on a regular basis and participation is growing.

Recent legal responses to the disruptive emergence of the sharing economy may indicate that it is indeed seen as a threat to the establishment. In New York, Airbnb is caught up in an investigation into possible breaches of a 2010 law that makes it illegal to rent out your own apartment in the city. New York City's attorney-general filed a subpoena for data on all Airbnb hosts in the city. Ride sharing startups in the United States have also run into legal trouble in several cities.

The responses of businesses that may be threatened by the sharing economy are also instructive. Several car manufacturers have responded to the threat posed by car sharing startups by launching their own car sharing services. Earlier this year, Ford launched its FORD2GO car sharing service in Germany. BMW also offers a premium car sharing service called DriveNow in Germany and San Francisco. Presumably, these manufacturers are entering the market in response to the competition posed by car sharing.

Given the clear financial, environmental and social benefits of collaborative consumption, it makes sense for existing businesses to find ways to tap into the sharing economy. Rather than seeing the sharing economy as a threat, smart businesses will recognise it as an opportunity to find new, more sustainable ways to connect to consumers.

All concerned people will meet at 8.15am on Thursday November 21 outside Council continued on page 13 ►

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
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

Byron's Draft Local Environmental Plan 2013 endorsed by Council for finalisation

The draft Byron Local Environmental Plan (LEP) 2013 applies to most land in Byron Shire and will regulate land use and development. It replaces Council's existing Byron LEP 1988.

The plan was publicly exhibited from 24 September to 24 December 2012. A total of 1,257 submissions were received addressing a wide range of issues, which were progressively reported to Council meetings between February and September 2013.

Key changes made to	the exhibited draft LEP
Deferral of Environmental zones and provisions: E2, E3 and E4 zones and related overlays/provisions have been deferred until outcomes of the State Government's environmental zones review are known. Current Byron LEP 1988 and Byron Shire Development Control Plan 2010 will continue to apply to all deferred land in the meantime.	Clause 4.1 AA Minimum subdivision lot size for community title schemes: amended to enable existing approved Multiple Occupancies to convert to Community Title subdivision subject to development application approval.

Decision not to re-exhibit changes to the draft LEP

The draft LEP changes will not be re-exhibited in order to focus council resources on preparing a new Local Land Use Plan required by the State Government within the next couple of years. The new Local Land Use Plan will replace all NSW Councils' existing LEPs, Development Control Plans (DCP) and planning strategies.

Shire-wide Development Control Plan (DCP)

A Shire-wide DCP is currently being prepared to be used alongside the new Byron LEP 2013. The new DCP will be exhibited for public comment before coming into effect. Both the new Byron LEP and the Byron Shire DCP are envisaged to take effect around the middle of next year, however this timeframe may change depending on any further adjustments required by the NSW Department of Planning and Infrastructure and/or other unforeseen circumstances.

Finding free kicks for holiday lets

It seems to have gone unnoticed that Council in the new LEP has quietly legalised holiday letting in one part of Byron. As you proceed into the Bay along Shirley Street you will see a number of commercial operations with an office and vacancy signs out front. This is pretty cheeky considering they are all zoned 2(a) Residential.

The only outfits that seem to be legal are the motel and the youth hostel, both of which qualify as exemptions under the rules. Not that anyone would likely complain about the main entryway into town being given over to accommodation, that being the norm throughout Australia.

Council's solution has been to rezone these for 'serviced apartments', which has the effect of legalising shortterm accommodation in that area. There is no requirement for any onsite management



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The Shape of Things to Ride

Geoff McCoy gives us the lowdown on shaping boards for riding the waves.

Geoff started shaping at Ron Surfboards in 1964, initially producing what everyone else was doing at the time: early traditional 9ft to 10ft mals with multi-stringers were standard.

Geoff spent his free time surfing around Narrabeen and took the leap opening up his own factory in Brookvale, allowing him to push his design theories to the limit. Using the world's best surfers as test pilots ultimately propelled the McCoy brand to global recognition.

After expanding his brand by opening McCoy USA, Japan and Hawaii, the business grew exponentially but through circumstances out of Geoff's control he was forced into receivership and he found solace and a more sustainable lifestyle in Byron Bay, living at what was then the easy, relaxed pace of town.



Geoff, what do you see when you look at surfing in Byron Bay? While the high profile of Byron

Bay may be good for business, the pressure on local surfers has been relentless. Far too often we are contending with ever-increasing numbers for each wave. Often these visitors are aggressive and egotistical with little real surf experience. The Bay has become a mecca for uncontrolled chaos, which causes long-term locals much frustration and disappointment. I might also point out that the popularity of Byron Bay this time around has ridden on the back of the surfboard industry.

Where is surfing today and in what direction do you see it going?

It has completely diversified with countless board manufacturers and a wide range of equipment available, eg jet-propelled surfboards, standup paddle boards and everything in between as well as a whole host of accessories and paraphernalia.

Is surfing at a pivotal point with the advent of machine shapes and the epoxy boards?

Yes. The influx of poor-quality Chinese product has had a major affect on the surfboard industry worldwide. But, because of the low quality of the product, I personally have found people returning to the locally crafted, higher-quality product.


What is your take on this?

Personally, I believe that there is a place for high-quality handcrafted and machineproduced, polyurethane as well as the high-quality epoxy constructed surfboards.

Where do you see yourself in surfing today?

I see myself as having a massive amount of knowledge, accumulated over four decades in the dedicated study of the surfboard and its interaction with the energy forms of waves – it is an endless journey to transmit that understanding into my designs. I feel extremely fortunate to have been able to work in a career that I both enjoy and love.




Where do you see Australia in the world of surfing today?

Sadly we are no longer recognised as the design leaders. However, we do currently have a bunch of world-class surfers with Joel Parkinson as current world champion and a group of up-and-coming

talented surfers, which will keep us at the forefront of international surfing into the future. Australia is a nation of sun-loving beach worshippers. You must also remember that 99 per cent of all surfers are recreational, just doing what they love to do, at every opportunity.

What do you think about the number of female surfers in the water today?



I think it's great! My partner Mieko is a very keen surfer. It has given the lineup a completely different vibe and it satisfies the eye candy!

Do you have an opinion on climate change?

Yes, I do have a strong opinion on climate change and the planet's health overall. I believe that each individual needs to be responsible in the way they lead their own

nations who are actively

working towards solutions. Recently I watched a YouTube about a guy in Japan, Akinori Ito – he has invented a machine that turns plastic into fuel, not to mention right here in Australia on Lord Howe Island where they have a state-of-the-art recycling facility.

Through a desire to provide everyday surfers with more practical surfing equipment, Geoff has followed his own design path that has resulted in a strikingly different form of surfboard that is functional and versatile.

As the sport of surfing evolves and the equipment continues to reflect the needs and wants of the everyday surfer, Geoff's approach, refined over decades, is being used as a reference for some of today's up-and-coming shapers and surfboard manufacturers.

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

A PERSON'S LIFE CAN CHANGE IN A MOMENT. FOR SINGER/SONGWRITER FELICITY BURDETT, EVERYTHING CHANGED WHEN SHE LOST BOTH HER DAUGHTERS, AGED EIGHT AND TEN, AND HER EX-HUSBAND IN A CAR CRASH JUST OUTSIDE BRAIDWOOD NSW.

Burdett has had a leave of absence from performing, and now hot off the heels of her European tour she is ready to share her music with north coast audiences.

Burdett talked frankly to *The Echo* about her very difficult journey.

'It's obviously been really, really difficult, understanding my emotions and how to work with that sadness that is there all the time. You tend to almost go off into daydreams like you feel detached from reality. You will be talking to people, and then you're not there. My motto is to be right there in the present moment; that's my major way of dealing with my grief.'

What is astounding about Felicity Burdett is her quiet courage. Her refusal to be angry or bitter. 'The whole self-pity thing is not for me. I kind of believe that what is meant to be will be and I feel that it was meant to happen for some reason; whether it was to affect a whole lot of people around me or strangers because they were such amazing people or all three of them

were such amazing people, or all three of them. They had such a beautiful effect, people. For them all to go touched everyone's hearts and it still continues to.'

In a relatively short time Burdett has reframed her tragedy, finding something positive in her loss.

'I am looking at life in a different way now – it's about really, really appreciating what you have in your moment – what you have right now. Death is a huge part of life and at any stage you can lose someone close to you, and you don't want to have regrets. You need to follow what your heart says. If you are not happy you need to change it.'

Burdett's songwriting has been a place of healing and solace.

'I guess now I am even more honest with my words – that's probably the best way to explain it. It's more real, and I am digging deeper and I am still continuing on with the message because I like to inspire people and give people hope. All those barriers between strangers and me were stripped. People know where I have been so they open their hearts to me straight up, so when I am singing, it's all truth and honesty – I connect with people even more than before.'

Her new album is *Make a Life Count*. 'Pretty much all the songs I wrote after the accident were as a healing process for me. I set up a studio in Skye's room and I used that time to go in and record stuff. I'd wake up at all hours; on Skye's birthday I woke up and wrote a song for her. That album is what I am touring with right now.'



Once a frontperson of a band, Felicity has gone solo, and her latest musical love affair is the ukulele. 'I have taken up ukulele and I absolutely adore it – it's so cute!' Getting back on stage wasn't easy, but with the support of her two close friends in the Hussy Hicks she made the step.

'Getting back on stage can be quite daunting. I have been over in Europe touring with the Hussys. It was a good way to throw myself into it. They were my first shows after the accident, and I thought I'll deal with it or I won't and I will find out soon enough, and if I can't do it I have my good buddies who were capable of covering my show. I have learnt how to separate my emotions in a positive way and not get to that point of tears – which can be quite difficult; I am only able to do it now.

'I think this tour is going to be a lot more confronting though, especially coming to Byron Bay. There will be lots of crew rocking up who I may not have seen since the accident. I like to face my fears, and playing music is such a good distraction for me and it's healing. Being on stage is like being in a bubble. But it's a powerful thing and it makes you feel good. Like you are doing your bit for the world. If you can reach one person in a good way... just a little... well then it's worth it.'



ENOUGH SAID

Enough Said

The first thing that this unreconstructed Seinfeld fan thought was 'jeez, hasn't Elaine (Julia Louis-Dreyfus) aged'. Well yes, she has (haven't we all), but she's still lovely, which led to a second inescapable observation - that writer/director Nicole Holofcener has provided us with one of the most perceptive and kind-hearted romanticcomedies to come our way since her Friends With Money (2006). And she has managed to do it without flooding her characters' dialogue with aggressive, blokey expletives. Eva (Louis-Dreyfus) is a divorcee whose daughter Ellen (Tracey Fairaway)

is about to go off to college. Self-employed as a masseuse, she meets poet Marianne (Catherine Keener), who soon after becomes a regular client. Eva is also introduced to Albert (the late James Gandolfini) and, without her knowing that he is Marianne's ex, they start dating. The set-up, if purely functional, has countless possibilities for humorous episodes while the prospect of everything blowing up in Eva's face is ever present. In accordance with the title, what Holofcener homes in on is how Eva, untrusting of her own instincts, allows her perceptions of Albert to be altered by Marianne's mean-



When a director as singular in vision and equally direct in expressing it as Ron Howard collaborates with a screenwriter as succinct as Paul Morgan, the result is bound to be engaging in its narrative and insightful in the manner in which it deals with its subjects. In combination, the pair has pulled off the near-miraculous feat of making possibly the world's most boring sport totally absorbing. So if you are of the opinion that Grand Prix racing is an enormous wank, try to bury your prejudice for the screening of this ripper movie. England's James Hunt (Chris Hemsworth, yet another grad from the Australian soapies) and Austria's Niki

Lauda (Daniel Brühl) were Formula 1 world champions in the seventies. Though both from conservative backgrounds, their natures were opposite in the extreme. Handsome, blond Hunt was all 'sex and drugs and rock'n'roll', whereas Lauda, smaller and less physically imposing, was the precise, no-nonsense perfectionist who found contentment in a loving relationship with wife Marlene (the beautiful Alexandra Maria Lara). Their intense professional rivalry and personal enmity underpin what is a simple but timeless story. It begins, unusually, with each man introducing himself through a voice-over on the morning of the fateful German Grand

Prix at Nürburgring, 1976. It is a peculiar technique and it gives to proceedings a sad and retrospective fatalism. Lauda goes so far as to allude to what is about to happen later that day. As is Howard's way, the approach is tabloid to start with, but subtler tensions and deeper virtually seamless and, given understandings are eventually

eked out. Hair and costume design is strictly authentic (embarrassingly so for some of us - check out the Italian guys who give Niki and Marlene a lift), crowd scenes are expertly handled, archival footage is



the unavoidability of featuring screaming cars, the rev element is kept to within easily bearable portions. Honour is never far below the surface in any good sports flick and it crosses the line here with belated poignancy. ~ John Campbell

Last year Mullum Music Festival director Glenn Wright decided the festival needed a patron. He wanted somebody who he felt embodied the spirit of the event, who could be a good spokesperson, and also had the charisma to boot. It didn't take much deliberation to come up with the **Mama Kin**. She just fit the bill.

Now in her second and last year as Festival patron, Mama Kin has been part of a very innovative project, something that will only be seen at Mullum Music Festival. Mama Kin will perform her Saturday show at the Civic Hall with young musicians and singers from Cape Byron Steiner.

So how did this come about?

'I have been at Mullum Music Festival for the last few years and I've seen great talent coming out of Cape Byron Steiner. I mentored Matilda Dods last year as part of the Youth Mentorship – and she's on the program this year!

'Tom Whitaker who runs the music program is a good friend of mine as we were walking home from a gig I said I'd love to do something special with those kids!'

And so that's how it happened. Danielle and the Cape Byron choir and various musicians got together over a month ago for a rehearsal. They will be presenting Mama Kin's back catalogue which will include songs from *Magician's Daughter, Beat and Holler* and her EP *The Talisman*.

With 10–15 singers and percussionists, and strings, this will be a very full musical presentation for Mama Kin, who has been nominated for Blues and Roots at this year's ARIA Awards.

'I love what we are doing. I love that sometimes you hear things you

cannot possibly deliver without lots and lots of people. There are some moments that are only made possible by the sheer force of numbers.'

A mischievous spirit herself, Mama Kin has been relishing the experience of working with teenagers.

to Mullum 'I just love their awesome freedom more than and their up-for-ness! anywhere I always think when I have to work with else...' young people that they are going to be jaded - I guess I have a pre-conception that teens are disengaged or toocool-for-school and they are not as open as they are. And it's never true! This generation has been given a bad rap. We underestimate them. I think that's the feeling I had as a teenager – of being underestimated!'

Danielle believes that working in groups is a powerful thing for young people.

'I think doing things in peer groups is amazing. They are at a great age to be doing peer work and they don't have to stand out on their own – it's about making me looking amazing! It's what all teenagers should have to do and they should be grateful!' jokes Mama Kin with a wicked laugh. It's easy to see why this foot-stomping raconteur of wit and whimsy has managed to enthral a group of adolescents.

As for Mama Kin's approach to this year's festival...

'I am looking forward to the new venues. I am looking forward to being back in Mullumbimby. I am looking forward to eating the great food at Rock & Roll

Cafe, and I am looking forward to seeing Ray Mann Three, Raul Midon, Kinky Friedman, Robert Ellis, Jaaleekaay and lots of other great international acts. 'I am also looking forward to catching up with my fellow musicians. I look forward to Mullum more than anywhere else because there are so many catchups and you never know when another artist is going to pull you on stage and get you to sit in with them!'

Mama Kin is also part of Songbirds of the 70s – a dynamic show stopper that closes the Festival on Sunday. Featuring the women singers of Mullum Music Festival in a spectacular concert celebrating the great women singer/songwriters of the 70s – High School at 8.45pm. This will be a Knock Out.

You can also catch Mama Kin on Saturday at the Civic Hall at 9.45pm with the Cape Byron Steiner school singers and musicians.


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BOUTIQUE MULLUM HIN

If you have not been before then it's a different way to put on a music festival. Possibly the closest examples to our format would be found in the many small-town jazz and arts festivals held in Europe that use the existing structures of the charming towns. The big variation is that we don't stick to one genre of music; rather we try to present as many different musical options as we can. Music is music and if it's good music then we are up for it, be it hip-hop, country, blues, classical, reggae, rock or folk.

It's not unheard of at the Mullum Music Festival to walk out of a concert by a flamenco troupe (Arte Kanela Flamenco), then cross the road and catch an indie rock band (Skipping Girl Vinegar). That same evening you might have already

Fossil fuels and Pole dancing at Warsaw climate talks

hen the Olympic Games finally opened itself up to corporate sponsorship in 1996 in Atlanta with the XXVI Olympiad, one of its principal partners was Coca-Cola, whose main product is probably the antithesis of what a finely tuned athlete should be consuming.

And so it is with the UN climate change talks. In Warsaw, the 19th Conference of the Parties - the first to be held in a football stadium has become the first to openly embrace corporate sponsors. And they are, for the most part, a group of fossil fuel donors, the antithesis of a lowcarbon diet that the world CoP. The host nation, which

needs if it is to avoid the worst impacts of climate change.

The logos of the likes of Polish oil company Lotos, and brown-coal producer PGE, are prominent. Maybe not quite so prominent as the bright red Emirates bean bags scattered around the corridors of this curious building - a veritable rabbit warren of staircases, corridors, escalators and doorways that house delegation offices, meeting rooms and exhibits and side events - but highly visible all the same. Their sponsorship was crucial for the construction of temporary buildings that sit on the main pitch, surrounded by an empty arena.



Arctic melt

The Poles have previously used the host website to celebrate the melting of Arctic ice, saying that it would allow ships to cut their journey and open opportunities for building new drilling platforms. Even the United Nations Environmental Program was preparing to release a report on Monday highlighting the huge possibilities of extracting billions of tonnes of 'methane hydrates' from the ocean floor beneath the Arctic Ocean, before it was pulled at the last minute. 'We need to look at the report again,' said a spokesman by email.

The ministers arriving this week (with the notable exception of Australia) will have much to do, because inside the negotiating rooms things did not go well in the first week. Some progress was made in items such as defining market mechanisms for forest protection, but others such as loss and damage (payments made to vulnerable countries for damage caused by climate change) and MRV (a mechanism to verify emission reductions), ran into a brick wall, or were left turning in circles. But these issues are merely proxies for what is happening on the broader level. These talks have been dominated by the impact of Typhoon Haiyan and the backtracking

on emissions targets by many of the world's developed nations, at least those outside the EU. Japan's decision to slash its emissions reduction targets, Australia's apparent backing off from its higher range engagement, and the cheering of these developments by Canada, have widened the gulf in negotations.

'I do not have any words to describe my dismay at Japan's decision,' Chinese lead negotiator Su Wei told reporters on Friday after Japan reduced its target from a 25 per cent reduction to a 3.8 per cent reduction, blaming the closure of nuclear reactors cause by the Fukushima disaster. However, analyst group Climate Action Tracker said even replacing all nuclear with coal would only account for one-third of this change.

Oz fossils

Australia, meanwhile, is being blamed for obstructionism at nearly every level of the talks. It has won four 'fossil of the day' awards - a prize awarded daily by environmental groups to the country doing most to derail progress. It's an unprecedented collection in the first week of the talks.

Australia got its first for its refusal to commit to climate finance, a second for one its move to repeal the carbon price and its apparent backing away from a 5-25 per cent emission reduction target range. The last two have come from getting a 'gold star' in obtrusiveness – firstly for attaching conditions on various streams of negotiations and listing things they would not talk about, and the second was its statement on Friday that climate finance is 'not welfare'.

The Australian NGOs and BiNGOs (business types) that are attending the summit and associated side events are being bombarded with the same questions: What the hell is going on down there! Observers say the big issue for the Australian delegation seems to be about intellectual property. There is still no indication yet whether Australia will renew its commitment to the 5–25 range or not.

'It's a grim situation,' said one observer. Another noted that even the United States was appearing as a moderate, even though it had not substantially changed its position, although its efforts on controlling coal pollution are widely noted as a key step.

It seems though that the Umbrella Group, of which Australia, Japan, Canada, Russia, New Zealand and the US form a major part, are losing faith in the UN process, and are looking once again at finding a solution in another forum, the Major Economies Forum – where they think a solution can be found away from politics of the UN meeting, the demands of minor countries and the scrutiny of NGOs.

Still, agreement among the nations that contribute 80 per cent of emissions will not be easy. Last week, Brazil presented a proposal to create a methodology to calculate each country's responsibility for causing global warming, based on historical emissions going back to 1850. It would probably force developed countries to cease emitting any time soon. Or they could wait until the end of the decade. By then, the historical emissions of the developing countries will likely have overtaken the historical emissions of the developed world.



MINISTER LAUNCHES STRATA LIVING REFORMS

Minister for fair trading Anthony Roberts last Thursday released proposed reforms that 'will improve strata living for millions of people across NSW'

Mr Roberts said there are more than 72,000 strata schemes in NSW and average five new schemes are registered each day.

'It is estimated that by 2030 half of Sydney's housing stock will be multi-unit dwellings and the proposed reforms will strengthen a culture of community and cooperation in strata,' Mr Roberts said.

'They support democratic, accountable and transparent decision making and empower strata communities to chart their own futures." A position paper: Strata and Community Title Law Reform, highlights 70 proposed changes by the NSW government, including:

• Requiring managing agents to disclose at each annual general meeting any commissions received in the previous 12 months and to seek approval for those expected during the next year. All non-monetary benefits

and gifts from third parties will be banned.

- The model by-laws will allow for certain pets and prohibit smoke drift where it causes a nuisance or hazard.
- Hardwood floors will need owners corporation approval.
- Notice will be required for changes such as refitting a bathroom but approval will not be required for minor cosmetic changes such as painting a wall or inserting a picture hook.
- Owners corporations will be able to limit the number of people who occupy lots to prevent overcrowding.
- Owners corporations may enter into an arrangement with the local council to issue penalty notices for unauthorised parking.
- Tenants will be given the right to attend and participate in owners corporation meetings.
- When registering a scheme, unit entitlements must be determined by an independent valuation to provide more transparency and consistencv

- The limiting of proxy votes to prevent an individual or group controlling decisions.
- Documents may be issued and meetings held electronically as an alternative method to traditional paperwork pro-

cesses and meetings. Mr Roberts said the NSW government will introduce a high-rise development bond to protect homeowners against building defects.

'The bond will be equivalent of two per cent of the cost of the building work. This will address defective work and give consumers added protection if a developer becomes insolvent. 'The bond will be released once an independent defects inspection has been undertaken and any defects have been rectified.' Chief executive of Urban Taskforce Australia, Chris Johnson, said 'An independent assessment of defects by acknowledged experts is a much better way to resolve problems. We are supportive of the retention of some funds to cover the cost of possible defects as determined by the independent expert,' Mr Johnson said.

Chair of the Owners Corporation Network, Stephen Goddard, said, 'Perhaps the most important reform is an attempt to address building defects that affect 80 per cent of all new strata schemes." Mr Roberts said the position paper also outlines a new system for the collective sale of strata schemes. 'The state's strata buildings are ageing and the cost of maintaining them with special levies can be too expensive for some owners. Trying to collectively sell a strata scheme can be a costly and drawn-out process that creates conflict and ultimately sees all parties in the Supreme Court. 'To address these issues the government has developed a new model for the collective sale and renewal of strata schemes where there is less than unanimous support from owners. 'The proposed model for the collective sale of strata schemes provides greater

fairness and transparency, and improves the level of protection for owners. 'It will inform and protect owners every step of the way and will help prevent conflicts between owners

and third parties.' Mr Roberts said.

The proposed threshold required for the collective sale of a strata scheme will be 75 per cent of lot owners, where each lot has one vote. Key features include:

- An opt-in provision which means that a general resolution is needed before owners can formally consider a collective sale.
- A 'strata renewal committee' is appointed by owners to oversee the development of a collective sale/ renewal plan.
- A minimum of 60 days for lot owners to consider and seek their own independent advice on the plan.
- Oversight of the process by an independent Strata Commissioner at the Land and Environment Court to ensure fairness.
- The Strata Commissioner to consider whether the process has been followed and everyone has been treated fairly. The Strata Commissioner will seek to resolve any dispute through mediation. If the matter can't be resolved it will proceed to a hearing.

'Our strata buildings are not designed to last 1,000 years so why have a strata system that does? It is contrary to the public interest to have strata titles that do not easily allow urban renewal,' Mr Goddard said.

'The proposed changes that set a 75 per cent threshold to finalise a strata title can open up the opportunity to renew areas where 1960s and 1970s apartments were built to much lower standards than those used today,' Mr Johnson said. Strata Community Australia (NSW) president, Greg Haywood, welcomed the release of the position paper. 'We would like to express our gratitude to the minister who has at all times ensured that our organisation has been involved in all stages of the consultation process,' Mr Haywood said. 'We believe that the time is right for change in the strata industry and that this position paper identifies and addresses long held concerns in the sector with a view to changing them for the better.' 
