West Byron in gridlock

Will Byron Bay's traffic gridlock be addressed before the first sod is turned on the yet-to-be-determined West Byron Project?

Yes, according to NSW minister for the north coast and Byron resident Don Page MP (Nationals).

It comes as public submissions close this Friday for the proposed estate, located 2.5 kilometres west of the CBD. If approved, it would be the town's largest suburb in decades.

Mr Page told The Echo, 'I have told the consultant for the West Byron landowners that I will not support the project unless the Byron bypass has been constructed.

'We have serious traffic congestion in Byron already and it should not be exacerbated. There are other issues which also need to be considered with their proposal and this is currently happening through the public exhibition and consultation process. I will treat those issues on their merits.

But are the issues being addressed? Not according to Council's planning staff, who say issues remain,

which they raised with NSW Planning and Infrastructure in 2011. Director of Council's environ-

ment and planning, Ray Darney, told The Echo that, 'staff have recommended within the draft submission that the bypass needs to be completed prior to any residential subdivision proceeding at the site.'

As for residential density, he says, 'The current proposed allotment size is too small and the overall density of development is not compatible with the general urban form and character of Byron Bay.

And similarly, the concerns of flood mitigation raised in 2011 also remain. Mr Darney said staff have recommended within the submission that they are not satisfied with the flood planning levels as proposed by the developer.

'The flood levels and flood planning levels for the development must be consistent with Council's adopted flood study and flood management plan, which follows the process in the NSW flood plain development manual?

However on its website's FAQ, the West Byron Project claims, 'The department commissioned WMA Water to undertake an independent review, which supported the modelling and flood planning levels.

'There are no developable lots in high flood hazard risk areas. There will be a negligible impact on offsite peak flood levels?

Council pressure

But it's just not roads, density or flooding issues; Mr Darney says there would be a significant amount of infrastructure required to service up to 1,000 allotments.

La Playa locked out but still operating

The operator of Byron Bay's La Playa restaurant/lounge bar (now called Soho) is refusing to leave the premises after he was given an eviction notice for unpaid rent.

In a bizarre twist of events, the bar's owner John Cooper was in the building when locksmiths arrived to change the locks, and now he won't leave.

He told *The Echo* that he has no intention of closing the door to lock himself out. 'My rent is now paid up and was only 16 days late, he says. 'Due to the fact that I have invested \$350,000 [in renovations] and have ongoing business and bookings there, I have remained in the building to continue to trade.

The venue at 9 Fletcher St made news late last year when it was sold to strip club operators who opened there briefly but were denied a liquor licence.

Plans were subsequently scuttled by the Office of Gaming and Liquor (OGLR) after the mayor and community expressed outrage.

Meanwhile, a court case between Cooper and landlord Bill Bailey will be heard in a week, according to Mr Cooper. Mr Cooper has complaints about common area improvements, the lease change-over and delays to

renovations required so he could re-open and trade.

Court case looming

He claims when he took over the lease three years ago, the building, 'had been gutted and was in a severe state of disrepair'.

'[After renovations] We began to wonder why we were been treated this way, especially after we had spent well in excess of \$250,000 on renovating to a high standard. Mr Bailey was so pleased with the [renovation] work, that on several occasions he asked to parade mem-

► continued from page 1 Council that the development should be provided with dual reticulation to recycle water and that the bypass and roundabouts on Ewingsdale road need to be provided by the developer.

'In addition the trunk drainage system needs to be comprehensively designed and provided by the developer to ensure the quality of stormwater runoff does not impact negatively on the sensitive Belongil Creek.'

Bypass voluntary contribution: developers

The Echo understands that one of the priorities for the current councillors in their first term is to complete a Byron bypass. Given the issue has plagued successive councils for 25 years, it would be quite an achievement.

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And with a total cost for estimated at \$270,000.

> 'The minister has also agreed to assist Council with additional funding for the construction of the Byron bypass once we know what the full cost will be.

Road costings

While the bypass is just one part of the solution, width improvements to Ewingsdale Road, which leads into Byron, could also alleviate the traffic gridlocks.

Figures were sourced from Civil Team Engineering in Murwillumbah (www.civilteam.com.au) and Sydney-based Leighton Contractors (www. leightoncontractors.com.au). They told *The Echo* estimates for such a road would be in the ballpark of \$15-\$20 million for eight kilometres. Leighton's Loren Hickey said, 'A four-lane flat undivided road (two lanes in each direction) with asphalt on a rock underbase totalling 15 metres wide would be approximately \$25 million with a simple asphalt spray from the road edge

outwards. If it required a pavement footpath add another \$5 million. For shorter or longer road, divide or multiply.

Meanwhile, mayor Simon Richardson told The Echo he is unsupportive of West Byron, 'certainly not at the scale being proposed, but that is no matter within Council's power.

Unsupportive

'The monies we have do not go remotely towards addressing the long-term traffic and road infrastructure needs in Byron Bay. One roundabout alone is around the \$1 million mark. In regard to traffic, there would not be a stupider place to plonk a development five times the size of Sunrise [than the site] proposed on Ewingsdale Road. So if the proponents want it, they need to ensure the rest of the community don't have increased gridlock because of it.



Calls for Byron Residents' Association to foster vision

Cate Coorey is calling on By- ed mess then everyone loses ron residents to help form an action group to stop what she and her group see as the 'imminent spoiling of Byron'.

She says, 'The idea for a Byron Residents' Association was born out of a group of local people alarmed and frustrated that decisions are being made that take away our ability to have a say in how the town develops. We are asking community members to join us in creating a force of people that will work to have our say heard.

'We still believe that Byron is unique among NSW's coastal towns and that its character is what brings people here. If that essential small-town relaxed community feel goes and is replaced by yet another Gold Coaststyle over-developed crowd- visitors, business operators and residents?

She says of immediate and urgent concern to the community is the West Byron urban land release.

'This project will overwhelm Byron. It is a housing estate that will increase the current population of our town of 9,000 by 25-30 per cent. Byron already has traffic problems.

'It's an area of low employment because jobs are few and there is no infrastructure in place to support this kind of growth.

'We want people to visit Byron and not get stuck in traffic jams all year round.

'The area is also key koala habitat that if destroyed will mean the decimation of our beloved and shrinking koala

population. There is no plan of management for koala habitat protection as required by State Environment Planning Policy.

'Added to that is the problem that three-quarters of the site has acid sulphate soils, which become toxic when drained. The Department of Planning and Infrastructure has already ignored its consultant who recommended against draining the acid sulphate soil on the site.

'We are not just about NIMBYism and saying "no" to any kind of change?

Masterplan in the works for Byron town centre

Have you wondered why cars have the best view of the beach in the Byron CBD? Or whether misguided development incentives inadvertently cause the high commercial rents, forcing out small business and attracting franchises that export profits out of the area?

If so, you are not alone. Last November, Byron Council voted to allocate \$250,000 to develop a town centre and foreshore strategy to guide decision making.

The aim is to transform what it termed Byron's 'rundown, incoherent' town centre into a 'more liveable town for its residents' that would also 'hold on to its reputation as an attractive and vibrant destination' for visitors.

Noting that 'lack of adequate planning has resulted in the night-time economy being dominated by licensed entertainment venues,' and resultant 'antisocial behaviour', Council's aim is to produce a strategy that 'promotes the town's natural environment,

relaxed atmosphere, spiritual and cultural diversity, health and well-being experiences', leading to extended 'length of stay' and hence visitor 'dispersal' to other towns in the Shire.

Identifiable 'town heart'

An identifiable town heart, which may include a pedestrian mall, revitalised back lanes and enhancement of Railway Park are changes being considered, along with cultural and youth hubs, a focal point between Main Beach and Clarkes, more pedestrian and bicycle access, public art, small-scale commercial development of the foreshore and an integrated transport hub that replaces the current bus stop.



Toughened drink laws 'don't go far enough'

The NSW Police Force has taken the unusual step of congratulating the state government over a tranche of new laws designed to reduce alcohol-related violence but the opposition says the changes don't go far enough.

The new laws, announced by the premier last week, will toughen penalties for socalled 'coward punch' singlehit attacks, force bottle shops statewide to close by 10pm (currently midnight) and take action against recalcitrant venues in the Sydney CBD and Kings Cross.

Mandatory

Offenders convicted under new one-punch laws will now face a mandatory minimum sentence of eight years' imprisonment, while laws allowing offenders to bargain for a reduced sentence because they were under the influence of alcohol or drugs will be scrapped.

For violent crimes in which drugs and/or alcohol are aggravating factors the government will increase maximum penalties by two years. The laws will impose a 1.30am lockout on all ven-

market and Darlinghurst and require them to close by 3am. A freeze has been announced on new alcohol licences in the area and police can ban recidivist offenders for 48 hours across the entire precinct.

A 'periodic risk-based' licensing scheme will be introduced, with higher fees imposed for venues and outlets that have later trading hours, poor compliance histories or are in high-risk locations.

Violence

In a short media statement the NSW Police Force said while it was yet to see detail of the proposed legislation, 'any changes that see a reduction in the availability of alcohol will assist police to manage the problems that flow from alcohol abuse, including the levels of violence we have been witnessing. The misuse of alcohol has been a major issue for NSW Police for many years so the broad package of measures is welcome.'

Local coalition state MPs have defended the package and the Last Drinks at 12 group has described it as 'encouraging'.

Tweed MP Geoff Provest said they '... build on our targeted approach to tackling

government, including the "Three Strikes" regime, increasing police numbers and powers and improving public transport'.

But no rules have been announced to deal with alcoholrelated violence in regional areas specifically, which has drawn criticism from opposition north coast spokesperson Walt Secord (Labor).

Statewide

'Evidence shows that it's a problem in the Tweed, Byron, Newcastle, Sydney, and Wollongong. So the premier is just thinking about the Sydney media and fixing his immediate problem and not looking at a statewide, wholeof-government solution,' he told ABC radio.

Ballina MP Don Page said many of the measures did apply to the regions, including the sentencing changes and the earlier closing of bottle shops.

Last Drinks at 12 spokesperson Mick O'Reagan said while 3am closing was already in place in Byron it had not curbed the problem.

Mining communities shortlisted for NSW regional infrastructure projects

A \$160 million investment into the state's mining communities by the state government is now closer, with nineteen infrastructure projects being identified throughout regional NSW. 'Resources for Regions' is the first program of its kind

in this state, says deputy premier and minister for regional infrastructure and services Andrew Stoner (Nationals). It aims to boost economic growth and productivity, ease infrastructure constraints, 'and support NSW commu-

nities affected by mining,' Mr Stoner said in a statement. The announcement comes despite a recent transport study by the government that identified the northern rivers as being the fastest growing region in the state.

Ewingsdale speed camera: the state's \$1.4m cash cow

The speed camera on the Pacific Highway at St Helena, Ewingsdale, is the third most lucrative site for government coffers in the entire state, raking in almost \$1.5 million in fines just last year.

Statistics revealed by the NSW opposition show that in 2013, the coalition government collected more than \$79.1 million in fines from speed and red-light cameras in NSW, an all-time record in revenue for the government.

NSW Labor has accused the government of using mobile speed cameras to collect revenue, with safety an 'afterthought'.

Despite the Ewingsdale camera being in the thick of massive reconstruction of the highway for the most part of 2013, it ranked 17th and 18th on the Roads and Maritime Services (RMS) list.

But Labor MLC Walt Secord says the figure for the Ewingsdale camera has been split in both directions ('southbound' and 'northbound') to 'reduce' the amount for that camera alone. The 'southbound' part of the camera collected \$694,490 (2,994 fines issued) and ranked 17th, while the 'northbound' part collected \$776,228 (2,977 fines) and ranked 18th.

'But if you combine the total of the two cameras on the one site, it is \$1,470,718 for the entire year,' Mr Secord told *The Echo*.

Revenue increase

Mr Secord, Labor's shadow minister for roads, said the income around the state from the cameras had increased sharply by more than 32 per cent over the previous year.

'Data from the Office of State Revenue have revealed that from January 1 to December 31, 2013, the O'Farrell government collected \$79,108,374 in fines from a total of 232,151 notices,' Mr Secord said.

'And each month, the amount collected was greater than the previous one, start-

ing in January with \$4.6 million and growing to \$10.006 million by December.

According to the data, revenue from speed and redlight cameras was: \$79.1 million in 2013, \$60.13 million in 2012, \$42.84 million in 2011 and \$5.84 million in 2010.

'While I recognise the need for red-light and speed cameras in fixed locations for safety reasons, especially in school zones, I do not support them for blatant revenue raising.

'Unfortunately, the evidence is mounting: the O'Farrell government is using mobile speed cameras to collect revenue, and safety seems to be an after-thought. In opposition, Barry O'Farrell promised to reduce the number of speed cameras, but in government, they are seen as cash cows,' Mr Secord said.

The figures show the No 1 revenue earner was the fixed camera on Sydney's Eastern Distributor at Darlinghurst, which detected 10,047 motorists speeding, with a total revenue of \$2,275,724.

Best practice please

It was a surprise to learn the West Byron Project developers have yet to address Council staff concerns from 2011 over traffic, housing density and flooding.

One has to wonder what type of development this will become.

A positive so far, however, is the developer's offer to pay \$7,000 per residential lot which would go a long way towards an estimated \$8.2 million bypass. But offering the community infrastructure such as roads to get your way - even in good faith - typifies what is wrong with ignoring due process. Why bother with councils at all? When you leapfrog Council to get to the state for large-scale approvals - like Splendour's Yelgun site or Mullum Woolies – it means developers are instead wearing the boots that popularly elected representatives should be wearing.

It means the community's voice comes second to the state government and the developer is doing what they want on their own terms

Ultimately it's a risk-reward ratio exercise. Almost all developments are for financial gain, so social capital (the public's goodwill) is weighed up against perceived financial outcomes.

Losing a little social capital here or there is okay if the final outcome means a good cash return. It's similar to political gains.

But it doesn't work that way here: many who have ignored the wishes of this engaged and savvy community have failed before. It's a community with a proven history of repelling inappropriate development.

And that's where local NSW Nationals MP Don Page comes in.

As with the Brunswick Heads residents currently dealing with an 800-page 'grand design' document for their town, the West Byron decision rests with Don, we are told. Still, there is an opportunity for the West Byron Project landowners to make that suburb the envy of all.

One example is just up the road: the Currumbin Eco Village. It's a community that is based around sustainable housing principles.

Retaining Byron's unique character should be at the forefront of this development. Let's hope the developers work with all of us so we can avoid the dull visionless consumeristic urban sprawls that are

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Govt paranoia aggravates the burns incident

• or once I have to agree with Tony Abbott. I do not believe that Australian navy personnel ordered asylum seekers to hold on to hot metal pipes, thereby inflicting serious burns to their hands.

Our sailors are not perfect: various inquiries over the years have shown that they, or at least some of them, can be insensitive, undisciplined and at times downright ugly. But this is not to say that they would indulge in pointless sadism. There has to be another explanation.

We start from the premise that the burns are real: the pictorial evidence appears conclusive. And there is absolutely no reason to believe that the Indonesian police are somehow colluding in a monumental fraud to embarrass the Australian government. Thus either the burns came about through accident, or they were deliberately inflicted.

Abbott has said that the asylum seekers obviously had a motive to try to discredit Australian policy; he seems to be implying that they may have burned themselves in order to do so. This seems almost as improbable as the accusation that they were the results of torture and carries disturbing echoes of the 2001 'children overboard' incident in which the Howard government gave credence to rumours later proved false with the intent of demonising asylum seekers in general. So, as Sherlock Holmes would say, having eliminated the impossible, whatever remains, however improbable, must be the truth.

Let us consider the circumstances. The asylum seekers are stopped and boarded by the Australian navy, in what can

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only be seen as a hostile act. At first they hope, and indeed may even have been told, that they are to be escorted to Christmas Island, the first step to reaching Australia.

But then they find that they have in fact being turned around and are being pushed, towed or otherwise forced back whence they came. Quite possibly some or all try to resist and the Australians defend themselves; a certain amount

of push and shove ensues, and in the confined space, some of the asylum seekers end up battered and bruised.

This later leads to accusations that they were punched and beaten by the sailors.

And the result is that they no longer have any doubt that the Australian navy is their enemy, and a ruthless one at that, prepared to do whatever it takes to compel them to return to Indonesia. Their logic is faultless; after all, these are precisely the orders Abbott and Morrison have given the navy. So this is war.

The asylum seekers now accept that they have lost the battle and effectively surrender; they must do whatever they are told to by the victors.

And this is where it gets tricky, because we have absolutely no way of knowing what the victors told them or how well they understood it, or even if they understood it at all.

It may be that one of sailors



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Last say approaching on West Byron development

■ Mr Murray accuses me of misrepresenting the proposed West Byron development and urges people to rely on the developers' claims (Letters, January 21).

Rather than the West Byron suburb being for the claimed 850 dwellings, housing 1,000 people, the Department of Planning and Infrastructure now admits it is for up to 1,100 houses. At current occupancy rates of 2.55 people per dwelling this represents an increase of 2,800 people to the 10,000 currently residing in Byron Bay and Suffolk Park.

This represents a major impact on Byron Bay's already stressed infrastructure.

The West Byron traffic study is based on a maximum of 856 houses rather than the 1,100 now proposed, and does not account for customers or deliveries to the numerous shops and businesses proposed. Rather than the claimed eight per cent increase in traffic using Ewing-

sdale Road to enter town on a weekday, the increase in vehicles using Ewingsdale Road is likely to be over 20 per cent.

The increased congestion due to increased traffic will be worsened by reduced speed limits, two additional roundabouts, pedestrian crossings, and incoming traffic having to give way to traffic from West Byron. The traffic study maintains, 'If nothing is changed then an intolerable, and unsafe, traffic environment will develop in the near future – even without the West Byron Development proceeding.' How much worse will it be with West Byron?

The assessment of the impact of the West Byron proposal is predicated upon a town centre bypass being in place. It does not assess the consequences of the development without this bypass, yet this is what is being proposed.

Any benefit of the proposed bypass in alleviating traffic congestion in the town centre will be effectively neu-







Back On

Tell me, what the impetus was for Bourbon Street to get back together?

We got offered to do the Airlie Beach Music Festival last November, and that got the band talking again. The lineup was awesome (Hoodoo Gurus, lan Moss, Dragon, Johnny Diesel, Glenn Shorrock, Brian Cadd, Russell Morris and many, many, more great Oz acts) and it was an honour to be asked to do it. It was truly a great festival, kind of part Bluesfest with a big top tent and main stage, and part Blues on Broadbeach with cool acts playing everywhere in every possible venue. The organisers involved the whole town and it was a bloody hoot to do a gig on the main stage.

Why did you guys stop playing in the first place? Things in life always run their course and after we made our last album in 2007, Banned For Life at Airlock Studios Brisbane and Old Dog Studios in Corndale, with lan Haug from Powderfinger coproducing, we thought it was a good record and we did well in the studio, but we looked around when it was finished and there was nothing else to see and at that point there was nowhere else to go but apart. It was an emotionally, mentally, spiritually and financially draining experience for everyone involved.

What's it like getting the band back

together? It is new, it is great, it is fun and it is music! All the right elements seemed to have come into play again. To be honest it is like being a kid again, only with a little more responsibility. It has been really well supported and we have been humbled and overwhelmed.

What has changed and what has stayed the same? What's got better? Or worse! Everything changes and everything seems to stay the same! As technology advances, people are people and stay the same. What is happening now among the four musicians that play together in Bourbon Street is a very direct, honest, dynamic energy to be together playing their music and sharing that energy with other people.

What is the essence of a great gig? When you have performed to the best of your ability, given all of yourself that is possible, and have somehow moved, touched or inspired someone in the audience.

How has the music industry changed since you started out? Fewer gigs for sure, and fewer venues with abundant crowds craving for live music. I think opportunities still exist and you need to look in new different portholes to find them.

If you were to give some advice to younger players, what would it be? Believe in yourself no matter what! Not in your ego, but in your spirit! Believe what you're doing is a good thing to share with others. If your intention is pure, your audience will naturally and organically find you.

Who are the people who have most influenced you? Me personally – Bob Dylan, Stevie Ray Vaughan, Angus Young and Roy Buchanan... you'd have to ask the other guys their influences but I know Col digs Mick Jagger and Robert Plant, Simon digs Paul McCartney and Lenny digs Phil Rudd... No doubt Bourbon Street has been influenced by the entire 60/70s music and also put our toe into the very source from the blackest pool of blues music from the 1920s and 30s. We are a northern rivers of NSW rock Australian band and we are pretty proud about that.

Why do you think Bourbon Street fans have endured even when the band has stopped? The band and the fans shared an important part and period of our lives together in the 80s and 90s. That time is gone and so are some of those people but the song remains the same.

What should we expect for your Lennox gig? Four 50-year-old dudes rockin' out hard with AC/DC underpants and Rolling Stones socks on!

Every day I need to allocate at least three hours to filling in forms. Does stubbing my toe on the bed this morning count? What about when my feelings got hurt when that woman rubbed my stomach the other day because she thought I was pregnant? Does that count as an injury?

And now everyone wants online forms. Just click through, they say. Like it's easy. Bullshit. I click through, fill in the relevant bits and the cyber-form god sends

In fact I have urgent forms in that cupboard from three years ago. They don't seem so urgent now. Like the one for my wisdom-teeth surgery. Sure, my teeth are growing sideways into my gums. I just drop a few Nurofen and make a plan to keep my mouth shut once my teeth start to bunch up.

There are forms mounting up that I have to deal with. A tax return that needs filing. Jury duty. A passport renewal, plus a new application for Ivy. A long detailed form for quitting an old super account and a new form to roll it into a new account. Then there's the form for tracking down all my missing super accounts.

Nothing ever seems to make sense. I am always the idiot that has to ring the 1800 number to get a customer service operator to help me through. I bet they call that the idiot line. I can just see them at head office: 'Idiot phone's ringing again, who wants to talk to the

retard?' Once you've called and admitted your failure to complete without assistance I am sure they check your name off on the national 'loser' network so that every time you are sent a form to fill in you are flagged as a serial non-completer. And I not only speak English as a first language, I studied it at university. If I have form freak-outs what happens to someone whose English is poor? Or who has memory loss. Or isn't very bright?

In the old days the only form you filled in was your dole form and it was just a series of boxes that asked boring stuff like 'Did you look for work?' and you ticked YES. And then it asked you to list three places. My friend Wally used to write stuff like 'applied for job as astronaut at NASA'. No-one at Centrelink picked him up on it until he thought he'd tell the truth and answer YES to the question about looking for work. Wally was cut off his benefit the next week. Which was funny because at least he was telling the truth. But forms don't do nuance, and they certainly don't do irony.

Forms are oppressive, man. They don't recognise the enormity of human spirit - they are reductionist tools of the fat controller trying to squeeze us into our appropriate boxes. I'm going to form a new religion. And the main belief of the religion is that we don't fill in forms. We will be called the NONconFORMists. The only problem is - to register a new religion I have to fill in a fucking form.



ONE OF THE GREATEST THRILLS OF BLUESFEST IS THE UNLIKELY COLLABORATIONS BETWEEN ARTISTS IN THE ONSTAGE PERFORMANCES. AUSTRALIAN SINGER/SONGWRITERS JEN CLOHER, LIZ STRINGER AND MIA DYSON HAVE TEAMED UP TO PRESENT A VERY SPECIAL THREE-WOMAN SHOW – SOMETHING THEY'VE BEEN TOURING FOR A FEW MONTHS NOW. SEVEN SPOKE WITH JEN CLOHER.

What was the inspiration for the collaboration? I've always been a huge fan of Mia and Liz as songwriters and musicians. One morning I woke up with the idea of 40 shows in 40 nights - a slightly biblical number, I realise. Over the day I thought about who I'd most like

to play 40 shows with in 40 nights and Mia and Liz were at the top of my list. I emailed them that day and by the following morning they had confirmed they were in. Then came the next two years of planning, organising funding, co-ordinating individual schedules etcetera until we finally hit the road in August last year. We did 35 dates over about two months - a bit more realistic and manageable than my original idea.

What are the strengths that you all individually bring to the table? The main thing is having three different perspectives; you can bounce ideas around rather than having to rely solely on yourself. Individually though I would say that Mia brings the numbercrunching skills to the table; Liz is great at co-ordinating our band and locking in tour logistics; and I'm good at keeping the social media side of things rolling along. Musically - Liz is the gueen of harmonies and can work out three-part harmonies on the spot; Mia is great at working out guitar parts and arrangements; and I'm great at playing tambourine.

Years ago I read a book called Anything She Can Do, I Can Do Better - by feminist author Rachel Oakes-Nash - it investigated female competition and how it undermines women's self-worth. In your experience, do you feel that the mainstream music industry sets women up against each other as competitors rather than collaborators? Perhaps. I think more than anything the media have a tendency to heap women songwriters together as a 'genre', which I find lazy. Who cares about the media anyhow (present company excluded)? All three of us have built careers through playing live and releasing the best music we can make. Our connection to our fans, the people who continue to make it possible for us to have a career, is the relationship we nurture. My experience of the independent music community has been supportive. We all know how hard it is to have a sustainable career when you're self-funding and releasing, so we respect and support each other. Coming together as Dyson, Stringer and Cloher is another example of that community spirit.

What is it that you love best about the songwriting of Mia Dyson? It's powerful, robust and full of heart.

What about Liz Stringer? Liz is an incredible storyteller and a natural musician.

How do you complement each other? We are all very different as songwriters and performers but for all of us the song is the most important thing. The strength of our songwriting makes for a powerful hour of music.

I imagine touring can be a very solitary and often isolating experience. What is it like having Mia and Liz along? What do you get up to off stage? Do you eat toast? Write songs? Stay up drinking wine? Do yoga? We cook meals together whenever we can; we all love good food. We also get excited when an old Meryl Streep movie is on the telly in our hotel room. And Mia lives for chocolate, which rubs off on Liz and me.

How do you craft a song with three songwriters on board? Essentially one of us will write a song and take it to the others. It's at that point that the collaboration begins – we'll suggest arrangements, play with different tempos, try harmony parts things usually find their way pretty quickly, which I think has a lot to do with having known each other for more than ten years now.

What should we expect for your Bluesfest show? It's a rock 'n' roll show. People seem to think we'll be there with our acoustic guitars singing pretty harmonies but once we're onstage together we tear it up. I think people walk away surprised by how much we like to play rock 'n' roll.

What was it that started your love affair with reggae music? first heard reggae music through my older brother, who was listening to Bob Marley, Black Uhuru, Culture, Don Carlos, etc. I was maybe 6-7 years old (1982-1983) and hearing the sounds coming from my brother's room struck a chord in me. Also at the time I was attending Hebrew school and studying the Torah

Marley, Bunny Wailer, and Peter Tosh to record their first album Catch A Fire.

Why do you think as music it is also so closely aligned

with a 'spirituality'? Jamaicans tend to be very religious and spiritual people of Christian background, and for these black African people looking for the second coming of the messiah. On 2 November 1930 when Haile Selassie was crowned as 'King of King and Lord of Lords, the Conquering Lion of Judah', as recorded by John in the holy Bible's 'Revelation', this was the answer. Also as very poor people you must look for ways and means of keeping positive and that is the backbone of Rasta spirituality.

How did this evolve? It all first developed when African slaves where forced to adhere to Christianity and learn the holy Bible. The birth of Rasta

reaffirmation of the message of true oneness and togetherness. It's also about pushing boundaries and breaking down barriers, both socially within the lyrics, and also musically. Our story is about bringing people together and to put forth the message that times are changing and good people are going to push this through to see a positive future for our coming generations.

You are named after Haile Selassie's visit to Jamaica -**Groundation Day. What was** so significant about this day? Kingston, Jamaica, on 21 April 1966 was the scene of a miracle. a living god coming forth to bless his people. It caused a huge awakening among many Jamaicans, who that day began to grow their locks, stepping out of the world of Babylon, and calling themselves Rasta. However, most Jamaicans where very much against this 'cult' as they called it and wanted nothing to do with what they saw as a false messiah. It really was a day of judgment for the

people on the island: some for Rasta and some against. However most Jamaicans would say, 'yes, Rasta philosophy of loving each other and the planet, and doing no harm to no-one it the right way'.

How do you keep a band like **Groundation together? There** have been many players to

Tell me a little about the current the Groundation works back in man, Daniel Wlodarczyk, who is brilliant and carries songs like Weeping Pirates and Music is the Most High to even greater heights, and singer Sherida Sharpe, also from Kingston is like an older sister to Kim Pommell. In fact she was the first Jamaican female vocalist who began rehearsing

lineup. We have a new trombone 2005 so everything has come full circle.

What should we expect for your Byron Bay show? Byron bay is gonna be on fire this night of the Groundation performance. Each one of our shows is unlike the previous: new songs, new solos, new collective improvisation. Expect to hear

a reggae band that sounds different from anything you've known to be reggae and yet it will be welcoming. I expect the show to be full of positive energy that will stay with the people for many days and weeks to follow.

As a reggae academic, what would you say have been defining moments in reggae? I would say the most defining moments in reggae would have to include the winter of 1951–1952 when Federal Studios, the firstever recording studio in Jamaica, first began recording music; 1962 when the country gained its independence from Britain; 1966 when His Majesty Haile Selassie visited Jamaica; and 1972 when owner of Island records, Chris Blackwell, gave £5,000 to Bob North Coast news daily: www.echonetdaily.net.au

culture came from Jamaican and African leader Marcus Garvey, who said, 'look to Africa for the crowning of a Black King; he shall be our redeemer'. Then another Jamaican by the name of Leonard Howell saw Haile Selassie's 2 November 1930 coronation as this redeemer and began to spread the message and the seed grew from there. Rasta is about love and a close connection to the planet and a commitment to social justice.

Where does Groundation posit itself in the story of reggae? The Groundation story is a continuation of reggae and Rasta story that came from Jamaica and reached worldwide. It's a

pass through the doors. It is very challenging. In fact most people are not really able to handle the pressures of touring. You have to be kind and very positive towards life to keep a band of so many musicians together. It's true we have had many different people along for the ride; however, the foundation remains the same as of those who started the group: me on vocals and guitars, Ryan Newman on bass, Marcus Urani on keys, David Chachere on trumpet, and Jason Robinson on sax. SCATTERED: THE **INSIDE STORY OF ICE IN AUSTRALIA**

by Malcolm Knox, Allen

Australian journalist and author Malcolm Knox has written a comprehensive, entertaining and eyeopening account of the rise and rise of methamphetamine use in Australia. He surveys its earlier history in Asia and how it came to take over from amphetamine ('speed') as a major illegal

According to Knox, meth, crystal, shabu, now

generally known as ice, has some pretty exciting effects for the user, at least until the psychosis, paranoia and rage set in. Its high - reputedly a much stronger rush than sex - lasts much longer than speed, and makes the user feel invincible and effective. You can knock over banks or alphabetise your record collection all day long without losing concentration. It is significantly cheaper than heroin or cocaine and, for the dealer, it can be made in a backyard lab (do not try this at home - you might blow yourself up or stain the curtains).

But – and it's a very big but – it fucks with your brain big time. Ice sets loose the brain's popular pleasure neurotransmitters such as dopamine in great floods. 'But in the aftermath of neurotransmitter release, writes Knox, 'the methamphetamine is involved in other chemical reactions that damage the body's capacity to make new neurotransmitters'. Some research also indicates that long-term ice use can ravage nerve cells in many regions of the brain, resulting in slowed motor skills and memory loss, with symptoms similar to those of Alzheimer's or Parkinson's. It can also lead to antisocial behaviour of the most violent kind and a lifetime of depression.

Knox is no 'literary gentleman with a seat in the grandstand' (Tom Wolfe, 1973) in his observations. He talks to users, cops and experts and presents a wealth of case histories, many of them not for the squeamish. Petty crims and upmarket lawyers, both cliques ice users, get to have their say.


Most of the dangers of ice are made obvious. Among the most disturbing is the peddling of ice as a party drug among youth, especially young males who are already under the delusion they are bulletproof. It is often passed off as ecstasy, which is another kettle of euphoria altogether.

Knox also points to the islands of sanity in the sea of law-andorder rhetoric that drowns the sensible drug debate we need to have: these are the National Drug & Alcohol Research Centre (http://ndarc.med.unsw.edu.au) and the work of Dr Alex Wodak. director of the Alcohol and Drug Service at St Vincent's Hospital in Sydney. President of the Australian Drug Law Reform Foundation (http://adlrf.org.au/), Wodak helped introduce the first needle

St Elmo Dining Room and Bar

ST ELMO DINING ROOM AND BAR IN BYRON BAY is both a restaurant serving modern Spanish cuisine and a bar with sophisticated cocktails and an extensive wine list.

It certainly has the vibe going on, with customers liking the groovy bar-like atmosphere, good service, the fact that you

can sit out near the street (in good weather the roof rolls back), and the fact that you can just turn up and be welcomed without necessarily having a booking (it's a small venue, so it's better to book if you want to guarantee a table).

The modern, tapas-style menu aims for quality and seems to satisfy those familiar with the more upmarket tapas bars of Barcelona. Tapas is a great way to share food around the table, a great way to sample a range of food while drinking and a very warm way to be together around the table.

When we visited for Sunday lunch alt-folk artist Paul Appelkamp (Lionheir) was playing some soulful tunes to an appreciative audience of romantic couples lingering over their meals, young groups just drinking cocktails, family groups and a few people who'd just popped in for a glass of wine and to listen to the music.

With around a dozen wines available by the glass (the blackboard list changes regularly) propping up the bar seemed quite an appealing idea, and we started to wish that we hadn't brought so many children with us.

The service was excellent, with the staff somehow managing to be young, groovy, knowledgeable about wine and very considerate of the

children, who enjoyed trying different food from the tapas menu.

In deference to my vegetarian sensibilities we ordered a range of vego items such as Catalan Tomato Bread (\$4) and marinated olives with cornichons and guindillas (\$9) together with Empanadilla de Calabaza - pastries filled with butternut pumpkin, manchego, goat curd and almonds served with smoked chilli chumi churri (\$14 for six of these really delicious

with roast baby beetroot, green beans, roast peppers, roast onions and hazelnuts (\$22.50), patatas bravas; fried kipfler potatoes tossed in a spicy tomato sauce with aioli (\$10).

One standout dish was the Setas Con Manchego: pan-fried portobello and button mushrooms with Jerez vinegar, peas,

> manchego and enoki (\$17). As it was a Sunday we also ordered the regular Sunday special - a very tasty seafood paella, designed to be shared between two. My wife, who eats glutenfree, was very satisfied with the range on offer.

GOOD TASTE

The paella went very well with a beautiful restrained Sancerre; a French sauvignon blanc from the Loire Valley. Unlike sauvignon blanc that we are used to from New Zealand and Australia, this wine has greater emphasis on minerals and citrus and makes a perfect accompaniment for shellfish.

The wine list is extensive, with a number of quality wines on offer from France, Spain, Portugal, and Argentina as well as from all over Australia.

There were a lot of dishes on the menu such as the slow-cooked beef cheek in caramelised red wine with cauliflower puree, fried breadcrumbs and thyme or the seared scallops with piquillo peppers stuffed with potato and prawn salad that sounded worth coming back for. Combined with the interesting wine list, the great range of cocktails and sherries and the range of untried desserts (the almond pudding with orange, citrus curd, Turron semifredo and candied almonds seemed particularly good), we were already

making plans to return for some more quality 'adult' time in this upmarket but relaxed Byron venue.

St Elmo is open seven nights a week for dinner and also from 12noon for lunch on Saturday and Sunday. On Sunday there's also live music from 1.30 till 4pm (check out stelmodining.com to see who's playing) ..

The unregulated business of property investment advice

In TheConversation.com, Peter Koulizos examines the current state of 'expert' advice. Record low interest rates are stoking Australia's property market, with some expressing concern that property spruikers are targeting self managed superannuation funds investing in the sector.

Providing property investment advice can be a very lucrative business. Anecdotally, a property investment adviser can earn anywhere between \$20,000 to \$40,000 commission on one property deal, selling a \$500,000 new apartment or house-and-land package. Considering the money you can make, some of you reading this might now be thinking that working as a property investment adviser is a smart career move.

But before you do, answer the following questions. *To become a property investment adviser, what educational qualifications are required*?

 Diploma in Financial Services? - Diploma in Real Estate? Bachelor of Business? Answer: none of the above.

That's right, you can advise someone on buying a million dollar property and make tens of thousands of dollars in commission in this one transaction, yet you are not obliged to have any educational qualifications; not even completed Year 12.

The compulsory continuing professional development requirements for a property

It makes sense, doesn't it? Why would you have to do any ongoing training or development to keep up your skills if there was no minimum training or education requirements when you first started in the job? *The licensing requirements to*

become a property investment adviser include: – Police check?

Minimum entry educational qualifications?Endorsement from two

current property investment advisers?

– All of the above?

Answer: none of the above.

A life insurance salesperson needs to be licensed. A real estate agent needs to be licensed. You would think that someone who is advising you on making one of the biggest decisions in your life is also licensed. Well, you thought wrong.

The regulatory body that oversees the property investment advice industry is:

- Real Estate Institute of Australia?
- The Financial Advisers Commission?
- Australian Securities and Investments Commission (ASIC)?

Answer: none of the above.

You would hope that a large and powerful organisation such as Australian Securities and

Investment Commission (ASIC) would be keeping an eye on investment advisers

who are involved in some of the most important and expensive life decisions people will make.

Unfortunately this is not the case. 'Why?' I hear you ask.

The simple answer is real property is not considered a 'financial product' under the Corporations Act. Anyone can give advice on real property and is not obliged to abide by the Corporations Act nor do they come under the scrutiny of ASIC.

This is despite well-known cases such as the collapse of the high-profile property spruiker Henry Kaye's empire, which was prosecuted by ASIC in 2003 for providing false and misleading investment advice to property investors. In 2010, Kaye was disqualified by ASIC from managing corporations for five years.

The Property Investment Professionals of Australia (PIPA) are lobbying for the regulation and licensing of property investment advice. They are trying to clean up the industry and have instigated entry-level educational qualifications, ongoing professional development, a code of conduct and advisers can study to become a Qualified Property Investment Adviser (QPIA). Unfortunately it is not compulsory for advisers to join this organisation but their member base is slowly increasing. They are building awareness of the lack of regulation in property investment advice but at this stage they have been unable to convince federal government that changes need to be made in this area. However, they are hopeful that with the recent change in government, some progress will be made.

In the meantime, if you attend a property seminar (which in many cases is a front for a property developer's cleverly disguised hard-sell session), ask the so-called 'adviser' the following questions:

- Are you a QPIA?
- What qualifications do you have in property or investment?
- Can you disclose the arrangement you have with the developer of the properties that you are trying to sell?

If they can't provide you with satisfactory answers to these questions, keep your wallet in your pocket and your hands on your purse.







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Nothing like the mention of electoral funding sources to get a few knickers (and Yfronts) in a knot. The Greens respond en masse to their detractors in the letters pages this week. Some Byron Shire candidates seem to have an almost Edwardian reserve to the matter of money, as if revealing who funded them was a most indecent act. It's in the public interest for residents to know who puts up the loot and for what motives, so don't expect The Echo to shut up about it.

Ian Oelrichs, president of the

local Design Advisory Panel (http://dap.org.au), has had a go at the ad-hoc development of Byron Bay, fearing its 'character' may be ruined. It's a hobby-horse local architects have wheeled out from time to time over the decades. What one considers the 'character' of Byron Bay to be is a very subjective thing, as is 'good design', though most of the buildings in the Bay would be regarded as of the school of Late Australian Berserk. The natural environment of the Bay wins out hands down over the 'built environment'. Harmony, beauty and consistent design are unlikely to take centre stage in the built environment until the ghost of Oscar Niemeyer is given planning control - which is sure to happen when there isn't a buck to be made in property development.

Magistrate and former north coast standup poet David Heilpern continues to give the police the irritations. As Echonetdaily reported, the magistrate dismissed a charge against a Mt Isa man who pleaded guilty to hold-

ing five blue ecstasy tablets outside the Splendour festival at Yelgun. Despite the guilty plea, the case had been adjourned five times in seven months, which Mr Heilpern rightly described as a waste of taxpayers' money. Heilpern is an odd man out in the usually conservative magistracy, admiring poetry later in origin than Tennyson's and writing in 1998 a book, Rough Deal: Your guide to drug laws (Redfern Legal Centre Publishing), with Steven Bolt, advising folks of their legal rights and obligations. Mr Heilpern was also a judge of the 2011 Nimbin Performance Poetry World Cup, a gig he thought was tougher than judging criminal offences. 
