Mullum locals hold vigil for refugees

A snap candlelight vigil for refugees on Sunday night drew more than one hundred Mullumbimby locals, and they were just some of the thousands who assembled in Sydney, Melbourne, Adelaide, Perth and Hobart.

Co-organisers Nicolette Jackson and Rita Youssef-Price explained, 'We organised it to remember Reza Berati, an Iranian asylum seeker who died after a horrific, violent attack this week on Manus Island, which also left 77 other asylum seekers injured.'

Inhumane policy

'We heard about this nationwide initiative and felt strongly compelled to organise something in our town.

'We lit candles and took a few moments to honour Reza and all the other asylum seekers who have suffered and died as a consequence – either directly or indirectly – of our government's inhumane immigration policies.

'We are appalled by what is occurring, and we feel let down by political leaders on both sides for turning this issue into a means to win votes by a race to the bottom.

'These cruel asylum policies do not speak for Australia.'

Censorship at an unprecedented level

GetUp's national director Sam Mclean added, 'Across the country, people lit candles on Sunday night for those who've lost their lives and suffered in our care.

'The truth is we just don't know what's happening in these detention centres. The government's effectively shut off the lights, taking censorship to an unprecedented level,' he said.

'We need a truly independent inquiry into this tragedy and proper public scrutiny of these places,' said Mr Mclean. GetUp co-ordinated the vigils with groups including Amnesty International, the Asylum Seeker Resource Centre, the Refugee Action Coalition and others.

Chemical-free weed control has come to Byron and soon you may be seeing this chap steaming roadside weeds, carparks, playgrounds and estates around the Shire.

It's all thanks to an Aussie patent, which gives just the right heat to a spray nozzle to kill weeds. And remarkably the weeds are mostly eradicated after a second application.

Local property maintenance business operator Paul Sommers, from Garden Warriors, is the north coast licensee for Australian company WeedTechnics, and has partnered with Byron Shire Council to trial it on open spaces.

The new venture is called Steam Weeders, and his rounds will include Mullum's new Tallowood Estate and various parks and playgrounds.

Sommers said he was compelled to look for alternatives to herbicide use after public concern about their widespread use. While the proliferation of herbicide use is a concern that mainstream media has largely ignored, it was the subject of a 2012 University of Leipzig study which found 100 per cent contamination of Monsanto's glysophate in all urine samples tested. Additionally glysophate exposure in rats resulted in decreased testosterone levels, according to a 2011 paper published by the US National Center for Biotechnology Information (www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov).

Redundant chemicals

'It makes chemical use – especially around public places – almost redundant,' says Sommers.

'There's no risk of litigation due to toxic spray drift, and it can be used in all weather conditions.

'It also gives native plants a chance to grow after the weeds have been eradicated. It's perfect for rehabilitating weed-infested waterways and organic farms as well.'

Council's parks and gardens su-

perintendent, Andy Erskine, is supportive of initial trials, saying applications last month at the Suffolk Park sports field carpark appeared to work well.

'From initial observations, certain weed types such as flat and broadleaf, fit best under the applicator hood and are immediately burnt back.'

The robust invention all sits on a trailer – a diesel engine heats up a water boiler to 120°C; that is attached to a specially designed 'Steamwand'. The WeedTechnics website claims that, 'for hydro-thermal weeding to be commercially viable, temperatures need to be greater than 98°C, and must have rapid transfer into the plant cells.'

Sommers enthuses, 'Hybrid and fully electric vehicles incorporating the invention are being developed and some were on display at a recent trade show.'

And it's also not the first time Byron has had the WeedTechnics continued on page 2 ➤

But it is a first for Byron Council – the trial supports an ambitious resolution back in late November 2013 to be chemical free within five years.


Byron has now joined other councils in trialling chemical-free weed control, including Victorian councils of Maroondah, Yarra and Greater Dandenong. Fremantle (WA) and Leichhardt (NSW) have such programs in place already.

Enviro cred under attack by staff: Morrisey

A former Byron councillor is warning that Council's 'environmental credibility' is under threat after staff suggested utilising \$155,000 from Council's environmental levy to cover the budget shortfall for Manfred Street rockworks.

The issue will be debated at this Thursday's meeting.

Dr Patrick Morrisey, now based in Sydney, told The Echo, 'The hard fought for and critically important environmental levy, which funds valuable initiatives right across the whole shire such as the Koala Plan of Management, is proposed to be raided to fund placing rocks on Belongil Beach'.

The contentious decision to build rock walls along Belongil Beach will no doubt benefit residents who are under the threat of erosion as well as public lands and roads under Council management. Construction company Baulderstone, who are building the Tintenbar to Ewingsdale Pacific Highway upgrade, have offered the rocks.

Cr Di Woods told The Echo, 'I would support the

work on the rock wall and we have to find funds from wherever we can to get it done.'

'However, I would look to repay the funds from the sale and/or lease of property as we raise funds from our excess land in the Byron Area. There is a proposal currently on the Bayshore Drive land, and if we are not successful with that venture, we could look to sell that land which would bring in substantial funds.

Mayor Simon Richardson simply told *The Echo* he won't support the recommendation.

Provest ignored by A Stoner

It comes as a Tweed residents' group were recently snubbed by NSW Nationals leader Andrew Stoner despite a request by Provest for them to meet. Dubbed Save Lot 490, the group has amassed more than 10,000 signatures and is petitioning the government to save a 40-hectare block between Kingscliff and Salt from development. It's one of the last remaining

Byron, OS, Suffolk Park to get improved internet, but no joy for Skennars Head

Infrastructure to improve internet connections has been upgraded for residents and businesses in Ocean Shores, Suffolk Park and Byron Bay, and Telstra claims this will result in higher internet speeds for ADSL services.

The boost will give access to services that were previously unavailable, says Telstra Country Wide area general manager for north coast NSW, Sue Passmore. That includes digital TV through Telstra's T-Box and Telstra's new Digital Office Technology (DOT).

'The existing infrastructure in the local exchange was struggling to meet the demand in Ocean Shores, Suffolk Park and Byron Bay for fast internet at certain times. We're very excited that this upgrade will allow many of our customers to have a more consistent speed experience when using their ADSL service, either at home or at work,' Ms Passmore said.

'There may be some individual reasons customers still do not get the internet speeds they expect from their service. These include a customer's distance from the exchange, their own equipment and whether or not they are served by the specific parts of the exchange that have received an upgrade.'

Skennars ignored

Meanwhile, there is still no broadband coverage in Skennars Head nor any promises from Telstra to deliver to all of these 300 homes, says resident John Bortolin. 'Telstra contact us at least once a year promising we can now get ADSL,' said John. 'Every time we tell them that we can't.

'I went through the entire process of signing up with them for ADSL only to be let down because nothing had changed. That ridiculous process included a plan change, hardware sent in the post to be set up, the connection failing as the service has never been available, packing up all the hardware and sending the equipment back again. And then having to go through the process of fixing the phone plans back to the way they were before!


Local businessman Gavin Payne says it's poor form that the copper providers can't get it right in an area with sufficient houses close enough together to warrant an exchange upgrade.

Gavin Payne, managing director of NewSprout, a national business based in Lennox Head said, 'Data, when using the 3G mobile broadband network, is still a great revenue earner when people use lots of it. It's no wonder the big providers don't want to erode that revenue only to replace it with a much cheaper ADSL Broadband option.'

NewSprout wants to be able to offer their ADSL services to Skennars Head, and unfortunately this is a battle they have already fought and lost many times with the copper providers. 'It is near impossible to get any exchange upgrade information from them,' said Payne. 'NewSprout is support driven - we are trying to bring sanity into the internet service world. We service customers nationally and yet in our own backyard we can't help our neighbours - it's embarrassing'. NewSprout is lobbying the copper provider (Telstra in this case) to do their part in upgrading the necessary infrastructure that only they have control over, so that NewSprout can offer its ADSL Broadband to Skennars and improved services to Lennox. Steve Bisley: a man of letters



The most complex and far reaching relationships we have can be with our parents.

The joy, the love, the gratitude, the sadness, the pain, the confessions, the imperfection, the hurt and the outrage are all emo-

State govt keeps mute on NBP noise report

While no funds have been identified for the project, Council staff say they have been quoted \$6,900 plus GST per event.

In a letter to Council on November 8 last year, the Department of Planning and Infrastructure's Chris Ritchie wrote, 'I note you have requested to be provided with a copy of the department's site visit report from the 2013 [Splendour In The Grass] SITG event. The report prepared by the departmental officer attending the event was prepared for internal information only, therefore I am unable to make this available to Council.'

When The Echo questioned the secrecy, the department's media spokesperson said the officer who attended the 2013 Splendour in the Grass Festival did not prepare a formal 'site visit report'.

"The "report" referred to in the letter to Byron Shire Council refers to informal, internal notes that are not appropriate to release publicly.

Venezuela struggles in post-socialist chaos

Protests against the social democratic government in Venezuela have intensified in recent weeks with the deaths of seven students and the jailing of the opposition leader in the capital Caracas.

Venezuelan-born Fransicso, now a Byron Bay resident, told The Echo, 'the crackdown has seen all media being bought by the government and the public are largely unaware of the chaos.'

He says the government started shutting down all the TV channels around 2006 and later bought out the remaining two channels. 'We only know what's going on through social media,' he said. He said he has been involved with

student movements since he was 17 and is still in touch with those students back in Venezuela.

'One hundred and fifty are missing and they could be in jail or dead, he said. 'The government have shut down internet and water in parts of the country, and it's hard to get sugar, milk, bread, rice and toilet paper.'

Chavez legacy

He says under previous president and social democrat, Hugo Chavez, the country began sliding backwards economically and socially.

'His socialist ideals are aligned with




Cuba and against the US. He was against the freedom of speech and our economy went down and crime went up when he came in.

And Chavez's successor, Nicolas Maduro, has implemented similar policies, which include retaining the nationalised oil industry. The BBC reported that after a short-lived coup that saw him removed from office for a couple of days in 2002, Chavez accused the US of being behind the move. The Washington Times reported just last week that president Maduro has revoked the press credentials of US media organisation CNN over what he says is 'war propaganda'.

No water, no life

It was good to hear rain on the roof, albeit not much, on Monday morning. When your water supply comes from rainwater tanks, you keep a keen eye on the level.

Likewise the regional water supply authority, Rous Water, keeps its eye on the levels and on possible future needs. As of last Monday Rocky Creek Dam was 73 per cent full, which is pretty good considering the recent dry weeks and the impact of visitors on the supply over the summer months.

But according to Rous Water's predictions – based on climate change, reduced rainfall patterns and population growth – 'by around 2024, demand for water will match what current sources can reliably supply'. So the authority has embarked on a Future Water Strategy, which proposes more emphasis on demand management, investigating water re-use as a further source, and, most controversially, investigating increased use of groundwater. (Emotions run high on possible impacts on our groundwater, as can be seen this week in Sharon Shostak's video report on fracking on *Echonetdaily* echo.net.au.)

According to a report associated with the strategy, average water savings as a result of rainwater tank installation in the Rous Water supply area are calculated at 50 kilolitres per house a year.

That figure could be upped, I reckon, but it won't take care of all the demand.

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Brutal and careless? It's a vote-winner

S o now the Chinese have joined the international chorus of condemnation of Australia's policy on asylum seekers.

It would be easy to brush this aside with talk of pots and kettles, to point to Beijing's ruthless repatriation of desperate escapees from North Korea.

But while doing so is entirely legitimate, it ducks the real issue: the criticisms undoubtedly have substance.

It is no longer seriously denied that the policies of successive governments have breached Australia's obligations under the United Nations Convention on Refugees, or that human rights of the asylum seekers in detention, especially in the offshore gulags of Nauru and Manus Island, are being abused.

And, as the tragic events of the last week have made abundantly clear, the debate is no longer just about legality or even politics; it has become a question of basic morality.

In a sense it always has been; since Paul Keating first implemented the policy of mandatory detention, opponents of the increasingly draconian measures used to deter the boat people have argued that they cruel and inhumane. But by and large the objections have been dismissed as impractical idealism and the protesters derided as do-gooders and bleeding hearts.

Morality seldom intrudes on realpolitik, except when the onanists of the fundamentalist religious lobby get hot and sweaty over matters such as abortion and gay marriage.

When it comes to dealing with the more immediate concerns of the voters, toughness is seen as a positive virtue, and mercy and compassion as weakness to be avoided at all costs.

The current supreme commander of our borders, Scott Morrison, insists that his religious faith has taught him the value of kindness, justice and righteousness, but he adds immediately: 'The bible is not a policy handbook' The sermon on the mount may be all very uplifting in its place, but government has to deal with harsh reality.

One of the few politicians who does accord morality a wider role in everyday life is Kevin Rudd, and he designed the Papua-New Guinea solution in the full knowledge of the ethical dilemma it involved.

As he tells it, the imperative was to end the drownings at sea, and to achieve this end, any means could be justified.

If asylum seekers were so desperate that they were prepared to risk the leaky boats in the hope of salvation, then that hope had to be removed: it had to be made clear that the end of their voyage, if they achieved it, would be as bad as, if not worse than, the beginning. Manus would be a hell on Earth; even the camps of Indonesia would be preferable.

And of course the Jesuitical Tony Abbott has embraced the principle with enthusiasm, although in public his reasoning has been rather less complex than Rudd's: Abbott's slogan has always been Stop The Boats, not End The Drownings.

And the public, uninterested in splitting moral hairs, has generally been happy to endorse any measures taken by either side, as long as they work.

At least it has up till now. But the death of one man and the injuries to scores of others in the melee of last week has meant that the unintended consequences of the policies can no longer be ignored.

If the Manus Island solution ever was sustainable, it is not so any longer. The antipathy between the locals and the inmates has passed the point of no return.

The asylum seekers, having been informed that they have no chance of asylum in Australia and therefore nothing left to lose, will continue to rebel and the islanders, resentful of the

about not succumbing to pressure and moral blackmail but we are no longer talking theoretical abstracts and hypothetical outcomes, but actual events. One man is dead, and as things stand, more deaths, injuries and general mayhem are inevitable.

Confronted with another death recently, an Indian student who hanged himself in a detention centre as he faced deportation for overstaying a visa, Morrison shrugged it off: asked by the ABC's Barrie Cassidy if anything could have been done to prevent the suicide, he quipped: 'Could he have avoided overstaying his visa?' Very droll, minister, but the situation has gone a little beyond that point.

If Morrison does not recognise it, there are signs that some of the military, who have been conscripted to his command, are starting to feel a little uncomfortable; after all, they did not don the uniform to round up the helpless and innocent for incarceration in life-threatening concentration camps.

The defence forces chief General David Hurley, the head of the navy Admiral Ray Griggs and of course Morrison's personal C-in-C, Lieutenant General Angus Campbell, have all been forced to make personal appearances in the last couple of weeks to defend the actions of those under their command.

And they have not looked happy. Perhaps they even thought of another interrogation, a more formal one; one in which the response 'I was only obeying orders' was dismissed as totally inadequate.


When the full history of these troubled times is written, its verdict may be a harsh one.

We would all have seen the news that a refugee has been killed while in detention and that the Department of Immigration has released personal details of thousands of refugees, thereby exposing them and their families back home to torture, imprisonment and murder.

Byron Shire's cherished Environmental Levy is under threat.

The rush to build a rock wall at Belongil has already seen \$300,000 diverted to this ill-considered project. Now Environmental Levy funds of \$300,000 or more are proposed to be raided.

Environmental Levy funds are raised as a special rate variation with ministerial approval specifically for environmental works. As such,

Telecommunications have been doing the rounds of the Shire's hinterland recently.

They are here to promote the National Broadband Network and the government's plan to build towers to spread fixed wireless broadband networks instead of underground fibre optic cable to our homes, or 'to the node'.

These towers will emit radio frequency electromagnetic energy (RF EME). There is a plan to build one on Red Hill in The Pocket on private land. Many people have grave fears about the effects of RF EME on our bodies as we have seen recently with the opposition to wi-fi within the Mullum CBD.

Shriver feels the weight of the body image aesthetic

Mandy Nolan interviews the author of a controversial novel about obesity and our relationship to our bodies

author Lionel Shriver came to public attention with her controversial novel We Need to Talk about Kevin, an exploration of a failed relationship between mother and child that later became an international feature film starring Tilda Swinton.

Shriver's latest release Big Brother continues her penchant for provocative and uncomfortable themes, this time addressing our firstworld relationship with food and weight, telling the story of a morbidly obese man who moves in with his sister and her family.

With an impressive 12 published novels under her belt, Shriver is a writer who likes to push the boundaries. At just 15 she changed her name from Margaret Ann to Lionel, something she felt was more appropriate to her tomboy nature.

Known for her social activism, she challenged the US healthcare system with So Much For That, and now, with Big Brother, she addresses weight, a sensitive subject considering her own brother died of obesity-related health issues.

'I try to pick subjects that have more than one facet,' says Shriver, 'something which I am conflicted about. I am torn on the weight issue, because I don't want anyone to be sad if they don't want

to, to feel they have to strive to achieve a weight, but if you remain within a certain high weight range it can kill you.'

Shriver believes that the narcissistic obsession with image is not only making us miserable, it's making us fat.

'This whole obsession is out of control and it's making lots of people miserable and making them miserable just makes them fatter. I am becoming extremely impatient with these magazines and mainstream newspapers that track celebrity - and they talk about weight, but they are not digging into the issue. They deal with it as a medical problem, but its a very complex issue. It's psychologically complex, emotionally complex.'

Obsession

And it's not as simplistic as fat. Shriver's thesis is that fat and thin form part of the same obsession with control and our battle with our physical form.

'Being thin gets confused with virtue,' says Shriver, who believes that people now approach the body like a work of art. 'It's how they expect to actualise themselves, refine themselves.

'But to refine your body is only to refine your body. It's boring. I think the fitness thing goes too far as well. We put this huge burden on men and women, like you have to be super slim or have a six-

'It's one of the things that I find humbling about writing - the limitations. I don't know how much it helped resolve losing my brother. I did hope that in some ways it would be a tribute to him without being some slightly weird, fictionalised hegemony. I needed the story to be a book in its own right. We don't need to afflict the readership with a series of journal entries! First and foremost, Big Brother had to be a novel that works as a novel. When I was writing I set out to tell a good story first.

Although it was the intense emotionality of the sibling relationship and the recognition of the close existence of love and repulsion that gave Shriver the impetus to follow a story, that may have been upsetting for the rest of her family.

'My parents especially were very worried about this book, so I showed them before I published to allay their fears, and I think they were upset there was nothing to be of-

fended by - they weren't in the book!

'Having that level of obesity in my family meant I had an access to what it feels like. When I saw my brother in the latter part of my life, I didn't think, "Oh you overweight slob, why don't you do something?" - it was heartbreaking, what I felt was absolute sorrow and I couldn't stop thinking of what he went through on a daily basis, because really heavy people get treated like shit.'

Shriver's book is being met with robust conversation, and in the US one of the usual criticisms is her use of the word fat.

'I have had my head taken off for using the word fat on radio. But for me it's a descriptive word, because when you eat too much you develop fat. It's not muscle or bone. I also love the word; it's short and punchy and it's a little onomatopoeic. And I don't think you change the world with euphemism. I am writing about fat.'

AUSTRALIA'S LARGEST REGIONAL FILM FESTIVAL, BYRON INTERNATIONAL FILM FESTIVAL, KICKS OFF THIS FRIDAY WITH A DAZZLING OPENING NIGHT, WITH A

LINEUP THAT FEATURES 226 FILMS FROM 36 COUNTRIES. This is the world trip you thought you couldn't afford. One film of particular interest is *Pretty Brutal*, by filmmaker Monica De Alwis, that features the inside story of New Zealand's first roller derby league. Their challenge: run a democracy and train together as sisters then savage each other come match day. Monica spoke with *The Echo* about a sport that is taking the world by storm!

Monica, why did you choose roller derby as a subject? I started to see DIY-style advertisements for all-female, full-contact roller derby posted around town. I hadn't seen this kind of image used to represent a female sport before. I was surprised at the general comments and media reactions around me, which were quick to sexualise or stigmatise the idea of women's being aggressive. I was attracted by derby's collision of sport and subculture and excited by the questions it raised about gender and identity. I was also intrigued by the dichotomies that the sport seemed to marry. Members were encouraged to develop bad-arse alter egos yet surrender themselves to the collective. The new phenomenon struck me as a wonderful experiment that was creating a stir and had met some need. I was curious to see how the story would unfold.

Is the appeal of roller derby somehow linked in with our obsession with violence? I do not believe roller derby is violent. It is physically and athletically aggressive. There is a distinction. As the league navigated its early journey, I think these language distinctions emerged through painful trial and error. I also feel that attitudes towards athletic aggression being a traditionally masculine domain are responsible for the way female derby is sometimes framed as a 'violent' spectacle as opposed to a legitimate sport.

What kind of girls take up roller derby? Do you think it's a reaction to the incredible amount of messaging around girls' body image? A spectrum of people play derby and their reasons for getting involved vary. It is a challenging yet community-oriented sport that encourages women of different sizes, ages, experience levels and backgrounds to get involved on or off skates. I think this has contributed to the sport's rapid growth. Players possess strength, agency and unapologetic athletic aggression, while shamelessly marrying those qualities with glitter, humour and permission to play up or down their femininity. The fact that your body is capable, important and celebrated on the rink is a positive and attractive message.

What were the stories that were unfolding when you started shooting? When I arrived on the scene three

intersecting elements drew me in. From an outsider's perspective, The Pirate City Rollers appeared to have a strong sense of identity. For me that image was constructed from media coverage as well as leaguegenerated propaganda. However, I realised there was a tension between this surface image and an unfolding inside story. The Pirates were a fledgling league, the first established outside North America. I observed an assemblage of strong personalities with diverging ideals about what they should be. Pieces of Hate, a divisive yet magnetic central character, made her presence known straightaway. What drove her on a personal level to invest heavily in a potentially volatile sport was bound to have an impact on the evolution of the league's story.

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How did you see relationships grow or change during the film? The early league I filmed subscribed to ideals of democracy and equality. People were often drawn in for friendship and the

chance to be included in the creation of something new. As league members tested their own personalities, motives, and commitment levels against these concepts I saw leaders, followers and power structures emerge. As the competitive season kicked in, relationships between friends and teams, coaches and new recruits became fraught with unspoken tensions. When asked to be aggressive with each other against the backdrop of sisterhood, I felt some players had much to wade through before recognising aggression in a sporting context is 'nothing personal'. When this separation

doesn't happen, the situation can become threatening and everyone reacts differently in the face of conflict. On the other hand, I saw relationships between some women transform into something very honest and healthy through roller derby.

What decisions did you make in the edit room when it came to how the film was going to look and just what story it was going to tell? It became clear that this film was not going to be a topic-based film introducing roller derby, neither a sweeping look at the sport's evolution. I could see the trajectory of a debut competitive season being the narrative spine of the film; however, what was unfolding before me was a one-off scenario that could not have been scripted. So, the story we decided to tell was the most organic and intimate one. *Pretty Brutal* became a film about a human experience within the context of a fledgling roller derby league. I often shot handheld, and being short, I shoot from an angle that enhances the feeling that you are within a scene or are a participant in a discussion. Initially this was a pragmatic

decision but became a relevant way to tell this kind of candid, behind-the-scenes story.

How has the reaction to Pretty

Brutal been? There has been a lot of positivity. Pretty Brutal was awarded Best New Zealand Feature, Best New Zealand Editing and Best New Zealand Director at Australasia's premier documentary film festival, Doc Edge 2013. It has been invited to screen in Los Angeles, New York and Texas. I've been happy to see a whole variety of viewers, derby and non-derby alike, turn out to screenings and communicate with me about the universal touchstones they've found in the story. For those who appeared in the film, it was clear to see that Pretty Brutal captured a time of difficult growth; emotions and old rivalries surfaced on premiere night and we had a very rowdy cinema experience! Newer members of the Pirate City Rollers were proud to have an historical document recording some of the experiences that helped form a framework for their current organisation. I look forward to engaging with leagues around Australia and hearing about their own startup stories.

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The Soul Stone

AT JUST 24, US SOUL SENSATION ALLEN STONE IS MAKING HIS MARK. THIS SEATTLE SONGWRITER TALKS ABOUT MOBILE PHONES AND SOCIAL NETWORKS; HE SINGS ABOUT THE CLOUT OF THE CHRISTIAN RIGHT AND A CULTURE OF GREED. His music reaches back four decades to the late 1960s and early 70s, when songwriters such as Stevie Wonder, Marvin Gaye, Donny Hathaway and Bill Withers brought introspection and social commentary to soul music. Unlike his peers, Stone left the pop rock unturned.

I feel it is a higher call being a musician. You need to be able to play your instrument; you need to be able to do it live without processors. People are getting away with pressing a button. To me my greatest accomplishment is that when I leave the stage people have had a good time and they experience something that was live and real and unique to that particular audience.

'We are all narcissistic; songwriters are built on narcissism! But for me my favourite record of all time is *What's Going On* by Marvin Gaye. THE RISING TIE

A bloke with a tie on the streets of Mullumbimby or Byron Bay is a bit of an anomaly. We think 'poor bastard must be on his way to court for DUI'. Or 'must be going to a funeral'. Or worse, 'a lawyer'. Actually that's not true; most of the lawyers don't wear ties around here either.

I have to admit I find a man in a tie a little bit sexy. I think it's because it implies that he's got a job. Or that he's a bit of a prick. I find him even sexier if that's all that he's wearing! That being said, I have always found the tie a rather strange piece of fashion equipment - apart from allowing us to visually distinguish white collar from no collar, I really can't see what possible

IT'S HARD TO PIN DOWN JUST WHAT IS SO INTOXICATING (AND I USE THAT WORD CAREFULLY) ABOUT COMEDIAN FIONA O'LOUGHLIN, BUT AS AN AUDIENCE MEMBER IT IS POSSIBLE TO THINK'I COULD LISTEN TO THIS WOMAN FOREVER'.

Growing up in an Irish-Australian family, it seems to me that storytelling became second nature. It was what they did every night around the dinner table, and there's really no storyteller on the comedy circuit quite as enthralling as O'Loughlin.

Starting out as the comedian mum of five who hailed from Alice Springs, a lot has changed in the decade or more that has seen O'Loughlin go from Central Australian obscurity to the darling of the Melbourne comedy scene.

Her marriage is over, her children mostly grown, she's living in Melbourne, and in the past five years she has waged a very public battle with alcoholism. Now sober and enjoying recovery, Fiona's latest show, My Brilliant Career, shows O'Loughlin at her most incisive. She has this rare ability to navigate the human condition with humility and humour.

'I do get heaps of quiet time, and I have this amazingly simple fucking life that I didn't know existed. I had to leave a husband and give up drinking to get it, living with just Mary and me.

'I've upped the ante of autobiographical standup - I talk about being single because now I am ready to tell all about it. There's so much I couldn't talk about before! There is this delicious story that takes up half the show; it's about my 'nearly' affair. Of course I was accused of it, but it never happened!

'I have never had a show so full,' says O'Loughlin.'It was over-written by an hour. I couldn't believe it - two hours came out of me

'It's tongue in cheek and the poster image is me looking

function this long triangle of fabric actually serves. Is it a reminder that 'hey look I'm in a suit, but I have a dick'? You know, it's like an arrow pointing to the phallus. Is it some sort of power pointer? 'Don't fuck with me, buddy - see down there? That's where I keep the negotiator." When this suit comes off I may be all white and pasty like a strange anaemic spider, but down there is a fierce and terrible beast. Well, maybe an angry lizard. Okay, a blind skink.

Or maybe it's to hide the unsightly buttons. Like a valance for the body. Or maybe, because the culture of suit wearing is so constrictive and the opportunities to express one's individuality are so limited, the tie offers a man a chance to make a small colour statement. I mean, how many times have you seen a guy in a hot-pink tie and thought 'wow, mate, you are really pushing the boundaries!'

Apparently the tie was invented by the Victorians to protect the shirt from the detritus of every day. Wow, so men are big babies wearing bibs? Maybe they should learn to eat without spilling shit. Blokes in blue singlets seem to manage it. Historically only two groups of people have ever had anything around their necks: slaves and the hanged. I have always thought the tie would be very convenient if you were needing to strangle someone. I mean you don't even need to bring a stocking; you could kill a man with his own neckpiece. Makes being a serial killer of public servants so much more efficient.

I think perhaps ties are part of a pathetic hope that the wearing of such will instil in the viewers of the tie wearer the message that the man in the tie has power. 'You will listen to me. I have authority, because I have a tie.' Greenies are a group generally characterised by

as pleased as punch, and meanwhile there is a holocaust behind me!'

O'Loughlin talks about her marriage, admitting that the two have become friends.'I have no fire in my belly to fight. I feel so happy when he stays with me in Melbourne. I remember seeing him on Christmas Day and there he was with all his brothers and I got this... Oh I love you like a brother feeling.

Reflecting on her childhood, O'Loughlin laughs, 'I was a melancholic kid. I didn't like the way the world worked. I used to think that it's not fair that adults are in charge and I am in trouble and I don't have a voice and I married into that - men of my generation are handed down this belief that life is just drudge, and now I'm single and I'm free and I'm not in trouble and I can do as I please. I am not trouble - I love being 50!"

It's a refreshing take on most women's dread of the middle years, with many seeing it as the beginning of their 'invisibility'.

'Being a standup female comedian is one card that is precious - we are not invisible and we won't be. I don't feel that and I don't act that - I get a real kick out of ageing. I love my old hands; I have vanity about my face but not my hands - it would be lovely to look at our whole bodies like that!'

When talking about her recovery from alcoholism Fiona expresses relief.

'It was a roundabout that took me five years to see the light - I kept relapsing because I would carry around the sack of shame and that was so heavy, like a massive bag of potatoes; every day you take a potato out but it is still a bag of potatoes. I think one of my sisters just wants me publicly flogged in the town square! I have guilt and shame about how many people have turned up to see me and there's a drunken waste of space on stage! I am very accountable for that, and every single day I think of that, and if I could, I'd do the making-amends tour!'

So what was the turning point for O'Loughlin?

'It was getting caught with my hand in the cookie jar and breaking my agent's heart, who was a good friend. I lived like Lance Armstrong, I thought if I didn't have two little tiny vodkas, that I would be letting my audience down - then I got caught red handed. Nine times out of 10 nothing would happen, but you are putting

People with ties generally exploit people without ties. Men in ties generally don't have CSG wells dug next to their infinity pools. Although it would solve the Sunday arvo problem of having to duck down to the servo for a gas bottle. You could run that barbie 24/7! No, men in ties prefer to poison the waterholes of people who live without ties.

Farmers don't wear ties. People without ties don't have as much power as people with ties. Or money. So are ties some sort of secret masonic symbol of power? Ties are usually worn to meetings. Now this is either for one man to tell the other men that they have power, or perhaps it's not the men having a meeting at all; what if it's much more sinister than that... what if it's just a gathering of ties who've brought along their men hosts? Perhaps this planet hasn't been fucked up by men after all. Maybe it's the work of the tie! Only women can save us,

because we are tie-deficient.

dynamite next to a lit flame every time, and one in 10 times there would be another consequence. I got caught red handed, so I said, tomorrow night I am going to do it without my two vodkas, and then I did it, and I was funnier, and clearer!

'I couldn't put alcohol in me before a show now if I were paid a million dollars - the smallest price to pay for sobriety is that you are little bit boring..

O'Loughlin believes her life as standup comic offers something that many other recovering addicts don't have.

'I was so lucky – I had to relearn to be a standup, and my standup life has never known me without alcohol, and every day I have a gig I have a shot of adrenaline like no other. It used to be something I had to get through; now I can't wait! I am such a lucky duck.'





TARAB: TRAVELS WITH MY GUITAR

by Carl Cleves, Transit Lounge, **RRP \$26.00**

It would be a gross understatement to say that local musician Carl Cleves has led an interesting life. He has had enough adventures to fill at least ten 'ordinary' lives and has been very fortunate to survive several life-threatening events.

Remarkable too is Cleves's talent to recount them in a highly entertaining memoir/travelogue.

For a travel book to be memorable the writer must be able to produce, as if out of a magic hat, amusing anecdotes, psychological insights into the natives and customs of each place visited, vivid descriptions of scenery and authentic moments of self-discovery in response to the adventures. Cleves succeeds admirably in all these areas.


Cleves's impulse for travel is not only adventure-seeking but also the study and playing of all sorts of music. The Arabic word tarab can be defined loosely as the ecstasy experienced when hearing or performing uplifting music. For Carl the ecstasy also extends to meditation and drugs, and I found his descriptions of ecstasy while on a variety of psychoactives - hashish, LSD, MDMA, San Pedro - the most compelling, despite his personal and professional devotion to music.

The book begins with a staid upbringing in Belgium and then on to South Africa in the late 1960s to study music at a university and with black musicians, an illegal act under the despicable Apartheid regime. From there it just gets crazier. With his wife Beatrice, Cleves finds himself playing cards with a general in the middle of a Sudanese uprising, getting into trouble for adopting chaotic bush-babies (which end up in Antwerp along with various African exiles Cleves takes under his wing), and experiencing other moments of fear and loving on the Nile, in Rwanda, Uganda, Kenya.

The second stage of adventure begins in 1970 when he and Beatrice take the 'hippie trail' by truck through Iran and Afghanistan into India, help out building a village, finding in the process that 'music is the great communicator' across language barriers, and get caught up in the impact of the India-Pakistan war. Throughout all these travails, several useful angels in the guise of officials or compassionate individuals keep them from disaster – just.

From India it's on to Australia in 1972, from Darwin to Sydney, the first encounters with western communes, a cataclysmic suicide attempt when Beatrice leaves Carl, and a renewed sense of 'the good life' following on from the first Aquarius Festival at Nimbin.

Cleves takes on the daunting task of building a home in the bush, finds a new partner in Shanti and gains a son in Tashi, who becomes pivotal - a three-year-old passport into other people's homes - in Carl's later travels in South America. Tarab gradually moves on to the 1990s in Sydney, where Carl meets Parissa Bouas, his current wife and partner in the musical enterprise known as The Hottentots and Hottentot Party, the up-tempo world music appreciated fondly by many north coast residents.

Another recurring theme in Tarab is Cleves's life-threatening illnesses - particularly hepatitis and Crohn's disease - and his capacity for nearly getting killed in the water. He nearly dies of Crohn's and nearly drowns in Brazil, and succeeds in breaking his neck in the sea after the 1994 Maleny Festival. Phew! His journey back to health (and being able to play his beloved guitar again) concludes the book.

The book could do with a better range of photos and more information about Cleves's life on the north coast, and a closer eye to typos, but these are minor quibbles compared to the vast amount of enjoyment, and a valuable education, the reader derives from the guitarist's perilous, sometimes hare-brained, iournevs


LULU BELL AND THE BIRTHDAY UNICORN

IMDb, the film reference site, tells me that if I liked this I'll like Inside Llewyn Davis, to which I say, 'give me a break!' Alexander Payne's sad but funny, quiet but emotionally rowdy movie is streets ahead and it's also fortified by kindness, a trait in which the Coen brothers can hardly ever be accused of over-indulging. Bruce Dern, who has aged like a fine wine, is Woody Grant, a wiry-haired, forgetful pissartist who, upon receiving a scam 'you have won' leaflet actually believes that he has a million bucks coming his way.

He sets out on foot to make the journey from Montana to Nebraska to collect his money. He will not be dissuaded, so his son David (Will Forte) takes time off his deadbeat job in an electrical goods shop to drive him to his destination. After a minor accident that sees Woody hospitalised, his feisty wife Kate (June Squibb) and older brother Ross (Bob Odenkirk) complete the entourage as the Grants, stopping over in their hometown, are exposed to the stark reality of their family history and

Frank, bleeding from an appendix scar, is on the lam, a convicted murderer who has just escaped from prison. Adele (Winslet) is a single mum battling to cope with social alienation and depression.

his MP3 player. He's had a few vins and is mumbling the words of Dylan's majestic Like A Rolling Stone. The camera draws back slowly and, as it does, the song bursts into full volume, with Nick standing in singlet and undies, while Meg is lying in bed watching him... they are alone together. Owning up to one's shortcomings and delusions is a confrontation that is more often than not kept in the too-hard file. The City of Light will illuminate harshly, but forgivingly, Nick and Meg's long, slow descent into self-oblivion. Broadbent, who is always good, is perfectly in tune with a radiant performance from Duncan, and what a treat it is to be re-acquainted with Jeff Goldblum in neurotic,

Every work of fiction demands a suspension of disbelief and Jason Reitman's compassionate film of how our need to love and be loved, above all else, goes perilously close to failing this mandatory test. Told by Henry at different stages of his life (the last brief narration, by Toby Maguire, poses the question, 'why the earlier voice?'), the events unfold over the Labor Day long-weekend – five days that Reitman manages to make seem like weeks. Apart from Adele's phlegmatic acceptance of Frank's presence, I found it verging

self-parodying overdrive as Morgan, the celebrity academic whose publishing triumphs and Rue de Rivoli

on the implausible that a hunted killer could be holedup in a suburban house, playing baseball in the yard and working outside on the family car, without somebody noticing. But I was prepared to go with it because of the brooding sexuality that grows between Adele and Frank - even if Reitman, averting explicit carnality, tends to overdo the juicy erotica of a peach-pie-making scene. Meanwhile the pair's backstories are dealt out in short, sharp flashbacks. Adele's state of mind is explained by an unbearable loss and

Frank's crime is revealed as a cruel blow of fate. Winslet's sensibilities are unerring and Brolin, if a little too stoic, is good as a man wronged. Reitman might have thought twice about his cheesy coda, but all of the pieces of his cryptic jigsaw puzzle eventually come together to complete the unpredictable but satisfying big picture. What is apparent to the outside world is only ever the tip of the iceberg - which is how it is for all of us, isn't it? ~ John Campbell





La Table

MULLUMBIMBY IS A RELAXED TOWN and yet is blessed with a number of quality eateries. Perhaps its greatest lack in the past has been a quality restaurant open regularly at night. The arrival of French chef Bruno Pouget and his Australian partner Louise five years ago initiated an evolution in the Mullumbimby cafe scene, raising the bar particularly in regard to the evening fare.

The twin cafe and restaurant of La Table stand side by side on Mullumbimby's main street and both combine 'naturale-grooviness' with relaxed, modern style and offer interior dining, as well as alfresco seating extending from a large pergola to an expansive courtyard garden with plenty of shade.

The Sydney Morning Herald Good Food Guide has recommended and reviewed La Table every year since 2009, and it was the first in the Byron region to be recognised in their Top 10 Sustainable Restaurants in NSW.



According to Bruno and Louise, from the beginning the aim of La Table has been integrity and quality; to 'not want to settle for less'. Chef Bruno says the aim is to serve, 'French Mediterranean-style cuisine from quality, seasonal, local produce'.

Visiting the cafe at 10.30 on a Monday morning, there were about 50 people sitting in couples eating and talking. Given that there are a lot of cafes and not very many tourists in Mullumbimby, what's going on? Cafes can become a de-facto office; La Table with its large covered private tables also seems to double as a meeting room for groups of 20 or so from around the shire.

As a regular vegetarian diner, it's possible to cycle through the options without getting sick of them - favourites are the omelette Provencale with ratatouille, goat cheese, basil and sourdough (\$16); zucchini and haloumi fritters (\$15) and the lentil and veggie burger with beetroot relish, caramelised onions, cheese and aioli on Turkish bread (\$16). If you're feeling extravagant try the pan-fried potato and goat cheese gnocchi with Napoli sauce, courgette, pesto and olives (\$21) which can be washed down with a bottle of wine, or if you're feeling ascetic you can enjoy the daily

GOOD TASTE

If you've noticed the similarity between the cake

offerings around the region, you'll be pleased to know that the restaurant's kitchen is in operation six days a week and all the cakes and pastries are made in house. A quick scan of just the gluten-free options: Italian torte, mixed berry friand, almond fruit cake and chocolate mousse cake, and for the dairy-lovers apparently the house-made Barambah organic vanilla bean icecream is very popular.

La Table takes their coffee seriously - it's one of the best coffees in Mullumbimby and they pride themselves as being pioneers in the region: they were the first to serve organic coffee with organic milk; and since mid last year are now coffee merchants, offering different blends of Espresso Botero fresh coffee that customers can take home packaged, whole bean or ground to order.

> Anyone in the restaurant industry knows the long hours required to make a success of one establishment, let alone two at once. To create a more desirable work/family balance, Bruno and Louise changed the restaurant concept in June 2013. Now, in addition to offering private catering for intimate gatherings and special groups, the La Table 'Resto' hosts a special event dinner in the style of what the French call 'table d'hôtes'- a set menu at a fixed price with a certain number of dishes.

This unique set menu, threecourse dining experience is

on the first Saturday of each month. The menu is based on this model, Louise explains, 'serving the food we love, using fine ingredients cooked beautifully. The whole experience is wrapped in enthusiasm, love, fun and with a great deal of soul. It's about eating with friends and enjoying what has been cooked for you... adapted to our Australian version of hospitality.

Guests are normally informed of the event by private newsletter; the next monthly dinner is this Saturday 1 March and the menu includes a surprise appetiser followed by entrée of goats cheese and pecan tartlet, carmelised fig and baby greens; a main course of braised wild barramundi, tomato and tarragon risotto, saffron buerre blanc, wilted greens and dessert of poached Bosc pear, coconut macaroon and chocolate sauce. \$59 per person. Reservations are essential as seating will be limited for these 'table d'hôte' events and special dietary requests need to be discussed at the time of reservation

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

Support grows for 'Stop West Byron' petition

The change.org petition Stop the West Byron mega-development now exceeds 2,000 signatures and it continues to grow. The petition calls on local MP Don Page to intervene and stop the NSW planning and infrastructure minister Brad Hazzard from rezoning the West Byron site for development.

'The number of people who have signed the petition reflects a groundswell of people who are not happy about this proposed development, says Cate Coorey, president of the Byron Residents' Group. 'Close to 1,200 of the signatures are from people in the 2481 postcode (Byron Bay) and neighbouring postcodes. Given the population of Byron Bay is less than 10,000 that represents a significant number of people expressing

'There are also many posts from people who have visited

Byron Bay – both Australians and foreign visitors - people who don't want to see our beautiful town lose its charm to greater traffic problems and environmental degradation.

'The Byron Residents' Group was formed to advocate for the residents of Byron who want to see Byron develop in a sustainable way that is in keeping with community attitudes. What this petition is telling us is that community attitudes are not behind the proposed West Byron development.

Discontent

'You only need to look at the comments that people have made in their messages to Don Page to see the level of discontent about this development.

'Many people are telling us they are really frustrated by the approval process. Despite having a democratically

elected council that has three times rejected this development on multiple grounds, the developers have ignored local wishes and taken project approval out of the hands of local government by going to the NSW government.

'Many of the people who have written comments have conveyed with great passion and clarity the very good reasons why this development is bad for Byron. They cite the loss of character of Byron, the already impossible traffic, the koala habitat and the potential damage to Belongil Estuary as fundamental reasons to not allow this land for development?

The Byron Residents' Group is meeting this Thursday February 27 at Suffolk Park Community Hall at 6.45pm. The group also hopes to meet with Don Page, present the petition and discuss their concerns.

Cricket might be just cricket but rugby isn't just rugby

When I moved up from Victoria almost 20 years ago I went to the pub to watch 'the rugby'.

I know, I know, I got it wrong.

My 20/20 hindsight tells me that not only was it the league, it was a State of Origin

- but back then, my southern AFL-infused sensibility registered just a 'rugby' game with men who had legs more like tree trunks than the lanky fellows I was used to.

Fortunately when I took over as sports editor at The Echo about six years ago, sales rep and mad Manly man Pete Couldwell, aka Video Pete was on hand to set me straight.

Betwixt Pete and our awesome league commentator John Campbell, I have been given a fairly decent education in the rules of how to get it right.

Though the codes of rugby split over 100 years ago, it was

still a source of animosity until recent times when humans realised that now they get two sports to enjoy.

I spoke to a league-unionist over the weekend.

Nathan Nicholls has been playing football for many years. 'I have played league all my life, says Nathan. 'But union I have only played for eight years. Personally, I do enjoy league more?

Nathan says that in union he plays as a fly half, scram half or wing and in league he plays as hooker or centre.

People's attitudes have changed and Nathan now slips seamlessly between codes and says players at all of his clubs have no qualms with his switching from one to the other. Fortunately, the local comps usually see union on a Saturday and league on a Sunday which in the past meant he could play both. Nathan says he sees the

main difference as the tackling and the 10-metre rule. 'With league, once you make a tackle, if there are more than three people, one has to go back the ten metres to be back on side, he says. 'You also only get six tackles.'

'With union you can tackle the ball player and you don't have to come back the ten meters and you can get as many tackles as you want.

Nathan has in the past played both codes over the space of one season but this winter will stick to league, his prefered code. 'I reckon union is harder. But league is

more fun?

Getting rugby terminology right is important if you don't want to upset the humans.

Newbies (mostly Victorians like moi) still have trouble getting it right and to be honest it did take me a while, so last week I asked Video Pete to put pen to paper to write it in English as if we were all 9-years-olds. And he has.

Union versus league

There appears to be some confusion around football terminology, particularly in relation to the codes of rugby league and rugby union.

Granted, these two codes as well as Australian Rules and soccer are all 'football', but some sports fans and new arrivals from the southern states are confused as to the differences inherent in the naming of the two rugby codes.

If the word *rugby* is used on its own, this ALWAYS refers to rugby union. If the word *union* is used on its own

it means the same - rugby union.

Rugby league is rugby league or sometimes just plain league: end of story. Rugby league is NEVER called rugby without the totally definitive addition of 'league'. Simple as that.

Okay, rugby league is also the 'footie as is rugby union'. So too is Aussie Rules.

QUESTION: Do Soccer fans ever refer to their game as footie? Football yes, footie perhaps not.

NRL makes a record investment in rugby league

The NRL will invest more than \$200 million in the development of rugby league over four years after securing the broadcast rights deal plus delivering increases in sponsorship, major game revenue and merchandise sales.

After funding and expenses, the NRL delivered a record \$49.6 million in the 2013 financial year, including significant revenue growth in both broadcast and central operations.

ARLC chairman, Mr John Grant, and NRL chief executive, Mr Dave Smith, today presented the NRL 2013 financial results, which represented a \$60 million turnaround from 2012.

'We have significantly increased our investment in the game following the new growth that will make it the strongest and healthiest it has ever been.' Mr Smith said the

NRL would invest in areas that generated strong commercial returns.

The NRL is forecasting that more than \$200 million will be available for strategic investment in the future of the game, of which \$80 million is forecast to be set aside for a 'sustainability fund' that is invested to generate a commercial return over the next four years.

Like private sector companies, the NRL is creating a reserve to ensure it has financial security to withstand any unforeseen events. The NRL's goal is for non-broadcast revenue to double over the next four years.

In addition, at least \$120 million will be put into a 'growth fund' over four years to be used to invest directly in the strategic priorities of the game from grassroots to NRL clubs, fans and members, stadiums and infrastructure, and commercial operations that generate more returns for investment. The \$120 million will be spent on football and participation, fans and members and financial sustainability and governance. ARLC chairman, Mr John



Grant, said 2013 had delivered a solid injection to the growth fund and, as this was invested over time, it would ensure Rugby League has a sustainable foundation from which it can continue to evolve as the most dynamic and exciting sport in Australia.

'We set out as a commission to create a financial base that, if invested wisely, could make a real and long-term difference to Rugby League,' he said.

'In 2014 and beyond, we will work with our clubs, state fan and membership culture; support for clubs playing in the state leagues, grass roots infrastructure and touch football participation.

'The \$1.2 billion broadcast rights deal, negotiated in 2012, provided the opportunity to fundamentally change the way we operate,' said Mr Smith.

'We are using this opportunity to embed a new funding model where all revenue generated by the media rights deal is wholly invested back into the game, and central business expenses are selffunded by non-broadcast revenue. At the same time, we are being disciplined with our costs, especially in relation to staffing and administration.
