'Oversized' Bangalow development rejected again

A legal showdown between the developers pushing for a large-scale Bangalow mixed residential-commercial building and Council is likely to return to the Land and Environment Court after councillors voted to reject a compromise proposal recommended by staff at last Thursday's meeting.

The two-storey building proposal is adjacent to the A&I Hall and would include eight dwellings, three shops with basement car park and an attic.

It would take up almost the entire property. When the plans were initially revealed it riled residents, including the Bangalow School P&C, and public meetings were held in response. Residents claimed such a large-scale building would set a precedent and was not in keeping with the town's low-key planning strategies.

Crs Cubis, Woods and Hunter

voted against, while Crs Richardson, Cameron, Dey, Spooner, Ibrahim and Wanchap voted for the legal clash.

The vote re-affirms a previous decision, which was based on concerns for 'bulk and scale,' among other factors. And despite some concessions by applicant Gordon Highlands, the development still contravenes Council's development control plan (DCP). The vote comes despite staff recommending to approve it if the general manager undertook conciliation. Confidential legal advice was also presented. Ex-councillor and vocal opponent Jenny Coman told *The Echo*, 'We are very proud of those councillors who supported their community by voting against the staff recommendation [to accept the development]. I know how difficult it is to do that and we thank them.'

Local Nationals MP mute over Bruns plans by govt

'A town square beheading without even letting the public bear witness,' was how Byron Shire mayor Simon Richardson described the quiet adoption of large-scale development plans for Brunswick Heads holiday parks and reserves last week.

And while fellow councillor Di Woods also condemned the contentious plans by the government-run NSW Crown Holiday Parks Trust corporation, our locally elected state representative, Don Page (Nationals), is remaining mute.

When asked by *The Echo* for comment on the independent audit's questionable findings about the public submission report, the retiring MP instead suggested that questions be passed back to the organisation that compiled the report.

It's unclear if Mr Page even read the submission report and subsequent audit; his reply was, '[The Crown Holiday Parks Trust's media officer] is in a much better position than I regarding any details.'

The mayor slammed the long-serving MP with, 'I presume Don Page's silence over the matter is due to utter embarrassment.'

Broken election promise

Notwithstanding the 2006 holiday parks takeover by disgraced NSW minister Tony Kelly from Council and loss of revenue, the mayor also took aim at the government's claims when elected that it would 'put locals back in control of planning matters that affect them'.

'Not only have the Brunswick Heads Plans of Management (POM) kept control over the holiday parks in the hands of the state government appointed "Trust" seeking the highest return; they have put the same operators in charge of ensuring compliance, the setting of public access widths and overall reporting. For example, what was once public access that allowed fishing and picnicking, could, if the manager sees fit, be as narrow as 1.8 metres wide.'

Meanwhile Cr Woods told *The Echo*, 'While some concessions have been made over all the parks, there is still no access being granted along the foreshore at The Terrace Reserve Caravan Park, but rather an adjusted plan for the public to walk through the park.'

According to the public submission report – which is of questionable validity due to the audit review – there were 80 supporting submissions to, 'Provide public access to and along the foreshore at Terrace Reserve'.

Cr Woods said river access and access outside the park boundary was a 'major point' from all the public submissions.

She says another issue along the riverbank is the 'continued erosion along the edge, which

is compounded by the permanent residents' structures that almost hang over the edge.'

'The Trust representative said that the permanent residents along the edge of the river will be moved by natural attrition.

'However, there has been a sale to a resident during the last couple of years, with no indication to the purchaser that their structure was in fact in a position that the Crown had previously informed Council during its control was inappropriate, and Council had been informed that the structure had to be moved and in fact had asked that Council relocate all the residents living in structures that were hanging over the edge of the river bank.

'Council had begun the process, prior to the Crown assuming control of the parks.

'Under the Trust's management, it appears that they do not believe that this problem continued on page 2 >





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
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Nationals select candidate for NSW Ballina seat

No stated political background

Mr Beavis's statement says that he is 'running for parliament for the community, not himself.

'Unlike other parties, in the Nationals we know what our duty to the community is.

'You deserve a government that works with and supports you. It means a government that looks to a sustainable future for our children and one that stringently protects our environment.'

Mr Beavis has been with the Northern Region SLSA Helicopter Rescue since 2008.

needs urgent attention, and I find that quite at odds with the instructions given to Council, and wonder what is really in store for those residents.'

'Get-out' clause

'There are a number of concessions that contain a get-out clause, which basically says they could change their mind. For example, a fence being erected along The Terrace Road, while not in the immediate plans, could be seen to be necessary at a later date, while access through the park could be stopped if deemed unsafe.

'I am of the opinion that once the plans of management have been implemented, and the parks have been given the majority of their upgrades, then the state will see them as a very attractive piece of real estate to be offered up for sale to private enterprise.

'Not just in Bruns, but places like Evans Head, Ballina, and many other parcels of land, particularly along the coast, will be seen as a way for the state government to get some fast money. Just like the sale of the NSW Lotteries, the electricity infrastructure, the Newcastle port etc.'

NSWCHPT reply

NSW Crown Holiday Parks Trust CEO Steve Edmonds has defended his development plans for Bruns, despite similar plans sparking public outrage at the Silver Sands caravan park in Evans Head.

He echoed NSW minister Kevin Humphries reply last week that '41 amendments were made to the plans of management as a result of public input,' and repeated that subject to 'reasonable conditions', public access through The Terrace Holiday Park and to Simpsons Creek will continue.

He told *The Echo*, 'The public car park and kayak launching facilities will be upgraded as part of this plan.

'The Trust will progressively relocate existing structures away from foreshore sites to enable the re-establishment of a natural bank profile and the protection and restoration of the vegetation communities as part of its foreshore environmental restoration project.'

While ignoring public concerns over access, Mr Edmonds spruiked the development, saying, 'Additionally, the Torakina and Banner Park Reserves will benefit from \$1m worth of improvements such as playground facilities, boardwalk platform and upgraded amenities which will benefit the local communities, businesses in the area, tourists and other visitors to Brunswick Heads.'

Asked why there was no public announcement over these major developments, Mr Edmonds replied, 'In ac-

cord with due process, it is appropriate to firstly brief local councils in relation to the adoption of plans of management before public announcement. The meeting with Council was arranged to fit with Council availability.'

Good faith?

The mayor meanwhile said that during the last year or so of negotiations with the Holiday Parks managers, 'it was clear we would struggle to achieve anything like the outcomes the community deserved.

But with the state government requiring Council to negotiate, we did so in good faith. I thought if we could maintain public access, we had secured at least something for the community, knowing that ultimately we were being forced to play the tune created for us by the state government.

'Though tenuous, the community have managed to keep public access along the Brunswick River in front of two parks, with a touch more public access gained on the eastern side of Massey Greene, but access through The Terrace Reserve will be at the discretion of the managers.

'There is absolutely no compulsion whatever for the permanent dwellings to move away from Simpsons Creek and allow for public access as appropriate. To rub salt in the wounds, this disgraceful management model has been promoted within the wider review of the Crown Lands Act as a model example of efficient and successful management.'

Brunswick Heads chamber of commerce president Peter Wotton told *The Echo* their reply was still in progress, as 'one person on this committee is ill at the moment, we have not been able to consider all the issues as yet.'

'We will have a statement for you on this very important and complex matter soon.'





Another use for rail thrown into the mix

With all the talk around rail trails and light rail, here's another idea to consider for our disused railways.

RailExplorers Byron are proposing to use the 13km of abandoned railway line that runs between Banglaow and Byron Bay as a 'tourism experience'.

Pedal-powered rail carts could wind their way down the region's spectacular coastal and rural landscapes.

It's the idea that Alex Catchpoole and Mary-Joy Lu are hoping will be embraced by locals and government, and they have just launched the project after 18 months in research and development (R&D).

Fleet of 100 in South Korea

The pair were inspired by the cart's designer, Yun Jin-Gyu, who operates a fleet of 100 carts in Gokseoung, South Korea. Alex and Mary-Joy are now working with Jin-Gyu in bringing it here.

'The carts have revitalised

once isolated communities,' Mary-Joy says.

'We estimate this could generate more than 22 fulltime jobs and \$1.2 million in wages going back into the local economy every year,' she says.

'And it will also provide the government with a valuable revenue stream.

'Our advice is that there is

minimal work to get the track serviceable to run from Bangalow to Byron for this type of operation, she says.

She points to the lack of family-friendly activities in the shire and that Railexplorer would be attractive to couples, families and an older demographic. Mary-Joy added that using the track in this way

preserves it for future rail use and that Railexplorer could work alongside rail trails, which they both support.

'Rail carts would be an invitation to travel further to those not ready for the rail trail.'

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
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Guppy shows off his dark arts


Between 2009 and 2011 Guppy's powerful and enigmatic narrative-based paintings travelled to eleven different locations in Australia in a solo show.

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Byron Bay parking changes mooted

A review of Byron Bay's parking has recommended a flat rate of \$2 per hour throughout the town centre, a suggestion which has gained the support of mayor Simon Richardson.

The mayor says the study, released last week, found that the majority of people who sought parking in the town centre were there for a quick trip and used a car park for less than an hour.

'One step is to increase the number of shorter-term car parking spaces,' he says.

'A quicker turnover in car parking means that a greater number of locals can get in and out of the town centre faster and spend less time circling the block, he said.

And while demand is high, he says another step could be expanding the paid parking area to gain significant financial returns to Council and the community.

'With in the parking review, the consultant proposed a flat rate of \$2 per hour throughout the town centre.

'The Resident Parking Coupon would still be in place and means that locals can park there free for up to four hours.'

\$1 million annual return to Council

'The new paid parking income stream could see a minimum \$1 million annual return to Council and the community each year for improving maintenance or providing seed-funding for new infrastructure. It potentially means new toilet blocks, better gardens, roads and footpaths.

'If implemented, paid

parking would not apply after 6pm and therefore would not impact on the night-time economy with people heading out to dinner or a band.'

Mayor Richardson also noted that a modest fee would be a more equitable way to share the costs of infrastructure between locals and visitors.

'With 729,000 domestic day-trippers arriving in town each year, their impact on the community and infrastructure is significant but financial input to Council is minimal.

'We can't do a bed tax, but we can collect a couple of dollars from each visitor through the extension of paid parking.

'Similarly we've managed to keep general rates to the rate-pegging limit for the past five years and we have not asked ratepayers for any additional increases. Council would like to keep it that way and raising some revenue for infrastructure from parking users rather than all Byron Shire residents is part of the solution, he said.

But the proposed changes could affect those who park in town and work 9am-6pm.

The mayor says all-day parkers - except those with their own private parking would need to park on the perimeter of town or find a new car space when the time limit was up. Mayor Richardson acknowledged that the proposed changes to parking arrangements could have consequences for residents, workers and visitors, which will need to be managed carefully.

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Bentley gas drilling suspension remains

Anti-gas campaigners and ed to descend on the blockade Bentley landowners, along with the Greens, Page MP Kevin Hogan and Richmond MP Justine Elliot, have all welcomed the state government's decision to uphold Metgasco's licence suspension to drill for gas at Bentley, just outside Lismore.

It comes amid growing pressure from northern rivers councils - except Richmond Valley Council – which have requested that the region be declared gasfield free.

The licence suspension came just days before more than 800 police were expectat Bentley, which, at its peak, was attracting thousands of 'protectors'.

Bentley landholders commended the NSW government for its decision to uphold the suspension.

'We thank the government for listening to the people of Bentley and the northern rivers and upholding Metgasco's licence suspension,' Bentley landholder Rosemary Joseph said. 'Industrialised gas ields have no place in our valley or the region as a whole.

'The northern rivers is known for its beautiful and

productive farmland, and is a worldwide tourism destination that should be protected from invasive gasfields in perpetuity.

'Our community is greatly relieved that will not have to face another drilling attempt from Metgasco and the huge police presence it would require any time soon.

'However, while a licence is still in place we will live with the threat of the drilling hanging over us and are urging the government to take the next step and cancel Metgasco's licence outright.'

I'm no lawyer, but...

The third rejection of a long-running development application (DA) in Bangalow by Council last week will likely lead to a showdown in the Land and Environment Court, we are told.

A proposal for a two-storey building with eight dwellings, three shops with basement car park and attic has pushed Council's planning policies beyond the max; it would cover almost the entire block and sits on the relatively quiet Station Street adjacent to the historic A&I Hall.

Submitted by Sydney-based developers Gordon Highlands, It received a lot of criticism for being out of character with the rest of Bangalow, and public meetings were held. It's arguably out of character with just about anything in Byron Shire, really.

Anyway, confidential legal advice was given to councillors regarding their chances of defending the rejection. It's interesting that staff opinion changed to now recommending acceptance of the DA since the last rejection, despite only minor changes being made this time.

And whatever legal advice was tabled, it clearly rattled Crs Cubis, Woods and Hunter; they voted against Council holding ground and supporting community objections. They wanted instead for it to pass and ask general manager Ken Gainger to mediate.

While voting to minimise the chances of expensive court costs is prudent, the double edge is of course is that it messes with the fine balance of public amenity and sets precedents.

And in this case the majority of councillors are rightly concerned at the impact traffic may have given the building's size; the primary school is opposite the back laneway.

Holding ground can lead to wins of course; at Thursday's meeting, the mayor pointed out other DAs that were defeated: KFC, Dan Murphy's... and even a development on Mullumbimby's Station Street that was averted just before it went to court.

Regardless, a lot of this hinges on Council's Development Control Plan (DCP). But what is it? According to Byron Council's website, a DCP is supplementary to the Byron Local Environmental Plan (LEP), 'by providing more details, guidelines and controls applying to the various forms of development permitted...'

Incidentally, the DCP was also adopted by Council last week, which is a key issue that divides mayor Simon Richardson and Cr Sol Ibrahim over West Byron.

While the mayor says it's a 'useless' policy that has been 'gutted by the state government', Cr Ibrahim says he's confident that the DCP, 'coupled with other statutory instruments and plans of management, can produce a great outcome.'

So doth this policy contain magical powers?

One comment gleaned was from Council's executive manager of planning, Ray Darney. He said of the policy last week that, 'While only a guideline, some provisions are prescriptive and must be met when submitting a development application such as sewer, water and communication utilities. Other provisions allow flexibility and innovation in design to be accommodated such as landscaping.'

So there you have it. The court will presumably, along with other factors, examine how this case applies to the DCP.

The question is: like sport, will this be a game of two halves? And instead of sport being the winner, in this case will it be the lawyers?

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Climate debate: strange days have found us

ewis Carroll could not have written a better storyline than the weird juxtaposition last week of former US vice-president and climate campaigner Al Gore and mining magnate Clive Palmer as fellow warriors in the battle against global warming. 'Shock And Gore' screamed the headlines of both the Daily Telegraph and the Sydney Morning Herald – probably to the severe chagrin of both headline writers.

The shock pairing in parliament house required instant analysis by media pundits. The *Herald* saw Gore as the caped crusader who convinced Palmer that climate change is a reality – while not putting him off mining coal – and *The Australian*, predictably, slammed Gore for being conned into supping with the devil, inevitably cruelling the chances of their mate the prime minister.

A fine bromance

In much more detailed analysis Cathy Alexander for Crikey explained how the bromance came about, including the Australian Conservation Foundation's role in the meet-up and the surprising news that Palmer United Party members are actually interested in climate change and renewable energy. Apparently Queensland PUP senator-elect Glenn Lazarus (glennlazarus.com.au) - he of the sobriquet 'The Brick With Eyes' from his rugby league days – is happy to promote action on global warming, as his Facebook page shows, inducing fits of teeth-gnashing

in American climate deniers.

Dealing with polluters is often an ethical crisis for environmentalists. Is gladhanding Clive a positive thing for Gore or the ACF or does it lose them too many brownie points with activists and green-leaning voters?

Clive's interests

Despite his sometimes 'happy fool' image and stunts like pretending to fix his Roller outside parliament house, Palmer didn't get rich by being anyone's sucker and, in the best traditions of psychopathy, will be looking after his own interests no matter what.

Giles Parkinson, editor of RenewEconomy, managed on Echonetdaily (echo.net.au) to squeeze the good juice from the Gore/Palmer mashup: 'The key import of what Palmer has done, however, is to leave the key infrastructure of the carbon pricing mechanism in place. That is essential. Once the political intrigues have been dispensed with, and once the Liberal Party follows Palmer's lead,

isolates the right wing rump currently at the controls, and re-embraces the need to address climate change with the best tool at their disposal – a market-based mechanism – then the scheme can be dusted off and re-introduced at short notice.'

It took some of the wind out of Tony Abbott's sails last week and he was left with the meaningless description of the carbon tax as 'toxic' while environment minister Greg Hunt fielded questions on the actual details of what Palmer's surprise move meant.

'Toxic mix'

The word *toxic* got a run earlier in June in Paul Krugman's article 'Interests, Ideology and Climate' in the *New York Times* (http://bit.ly/krugclimate): 'What makes rational action on climate so hard is ... a toxic mix of ideology and anti-intellectualism.' Klugman believes the vested interests of the coal magnates are not as big a problem as the Ayn Rand cultists (aynrand. org) who believe their greed should not be interfered with

by government regulations or, heaven forfend, scientific argument.




Melting ice



Public transport needed, but what kind?

■ The economic and social value of recommissioning the Casino to Murwillumbah rail line cannot be overemphasised. It was closed in 2004 by Michael Costa and premier Bob Carr against the wishes of Byron Shire Council and the vast majority of disappointed locals. The northern rivers of NSW is an area where population change is projected to grow at the highest rate of 27 per cent. This translates to about 244,000 people in 2020, up to 309,000 people by 2031.

We must consider the long-term future of this area where rail travel would provide a safe, fast and relatively cheap method of moving freight and people to either Brisbane or Sydney and places in between. It will also ease the burden we place on our roads.

The high population and employment growth in southeast Queensland attracts northern rivers residents across the border as commuters. The growth of the Gold Coast-Tweed major city will create strong demand for transport connections.

We must focus not only

on the costs of rebuilding this line and extending it north to Queensland, but also to change focus towards the short- and long-term benefits that such a service would provide.

Recently one group has advocated only temporary use of the line for a walking or cycling track and dismantling and selling off the existing rail line, which can never be replaced in future. Apparently, they may build and sell high-priced flats over it very

A Casino to Murwillumbah Rail Study released by the state government on Friday June 13 estimates that the trail will cost \$75.5 million and would add 88,320 visitors to the region per annum. It further states there is an 'approximate annual budget of \$750,000 allocated for the purpose of maintaining the corridor'.

Greens NSW MP Dr Mehreen Faruqi MLC slammed the study as a 'blatant exercise in justifying a predetermined outcome'.

'The estimated cost of the rail trail... comes to around \$600,000 per km,' Ms Faruqi

Staff overload?

There are approximately 19,000 rateable properties in Byron Shire which provide the principal revenue for Council to carry out its responsibilities. A principal proportion of the revenue collected is used for water

and sewerage. Ratepayers deserve that this money is used prudently. Questions need to be asked as to whether or not this is occurring.

Excluding salaried staff, the current operational structure for water and sewerage requires ratepayers paying for 29 wages positions. This includes six coordinators and three supervisors.

The current infrastructure for water and sewerage consists of four sewage treatment plants (STPs) all of which are computer controlled, one water treatment plant (WTP) and a telemetry system used to monitor the STPs and

In contrast, in 2005, BSC had six STPs, one WTP, one reuse system and a telemetry system. The wages staff numbered 19 people, one coordinator and one supervisor.

Something is seriously amiss. The evidence is there to indicate that as infrastructure becomes less, and computer controlled, that more wages staff are needed.

This structure has been in place since 2012.

Salaried staff are not included in the aforementioned pre- and post-computer operated setups. It is unknown how many salaried staff are added to the ratepayers' bill

for water and sewerage, thus biting into BSC revenue.

The mysterious fish which soars like a bird

Mary Gardner

In 1891, when Mary Malloy was fifteen, the plague erupted in Sydney. Her father and two brothers died. Her mother, a nurse, took up a new position in Byron Bay. They travelled from the city on the steamer Ellen Nicoll. The passage was rough and many people were seasick. But not Mary. Decades later, as Mrs Flick-Harrison, she wrote she 'enjoyed the rough seas'. The boat waited at sea for a few hours before traffic cleared and they could reach the jetty at Main Beach. A queue into town was common even back in 1891. But what also deeply impressed her on that voyage was seeing 'quite a lot of flying fish', some of which 'ended up on the deck'.

The fifty or sixty species of flying fish actually glide through the air. Accelerating underwater at a speed of more than thirty body lengths per second, they dart forward and up, spreading their wide fins like fans. Their tails beat the water fifty times a second. Although their body size is modest (only 150-500mm in length), they soar a distance of one to four hundred metres.

With plentiful absorbent sand and the privacy of darkness only steps away from the marquees where considerable amounts of alcohol were consumed, surely this is not thoughtful and responsible waste management? There are a number of outstanding

Perhaps the fish are escaping underwater predators such as tuna, only to be exposed to hungry birds like boobies and terns. Maybe they have long distances to travel: large home ranges with scattered hot spots of their favourite prey? Surprisingly little is known about most species. They are vital to indigenous and artisanal fishers throughout the subtropics and tropics in every ocean. But now commercial fishing is making its impact.

One example is in Taiwan, where fourteen indigenous groups are officially recognised. One tribe, the Tao, revere the flying fish. Each year, their festivals summon the fish and participants closely

supervise the fishing effort. But the Taos are less than two per cent of the population. Other people in Taiwan harvest the fish commercially, processing the eggs as tobiko. This brightly orange, black and green caviar fetches good money in the global sushi market. This take of breeding females is so large that there are now calls for 'no take' marine reserves centred on the Taiwanese spawning areas.

The sustainable sushi movement includes tobiko in 'black box seafood': a popular product, drawn from poorly understood fishery and as such, unsustainable. Complicating commerce is that Taiwan, like Japan, is a centre for processing. That's how a

ends up on eggs which are freighted in from far away seas. One strange flight for unborn flying fish.

Left to themselves, some species of flying fish spawn in great orgies. Others mate in pairs. Some spawn where they spend their whole life - in the open ocean. Others are coastal and spawn in bays or near shore. Some are reported to ride a wave ashore, spawning and returning to the sea as the wave ebbs. All have unique eggs with tendrils that hook onto floating algae, coconuts, logs, pumice or plastics where they drift till hatching.

Flying fish, the Exocoetidae, are deep-time creatures from 65 million years ago. From 12,000 years ago, they starred in the lives and legends of people who settled in Taiwan and then navigated across the great Pacific

By the time the great sailors reached Hawaii in AD400, they had spread the name mālolo throughout Polynesia. This also became the name of the first luxury cruise liner, sailing from Honolulu in the 1920s. It's also the name of the Poly-







Bruns plans are a visionless imposition

The location of caravan park boundaries at Brunswick Heads has been one of the most contentious issues facing North Coast Holiday Parks since 2000. Boundary issues were discussed in detail in submissions by Council, Foreshore Protection Group and Bruns Progress Association and in many individual submissions, yet these important issues were not raised in the report on submissions or clarified in the plans of management recently adopted.

Are the public walkways along the riverbank publicly owned and outside the caravan park boundary or part of the commercial enterprise under the management and control of the NCHP? Where is the foreshore boundary of the caravan parks - the medium high tide line (currently the reserve boundary), the top of the riverbank (BSC preferred boundary) or the fenceline of the walkway (retaining walkway in public ownership)?

In approving the POM the newbies - minister for Crown lands Kevin Humphries and recently installed trustees, chaired by Alan Revell, have also decided to ignore the Local Government Act and Council's long-standing directive to reinstate a 3m buffer zone and 10m building setback along Simpsons Creek in Terrace Caravan Park. Council included this legislative requirement in the new licence agreement in 2012 and their comprehensive submission on POM.

The Trust claims it considered the impact on park operations, site constraints, significant vegetation, and permanent residents and 'has made provision for ongoing public access through the holiday park as currently exists, subject to reasonable conditions'. Relocating foreshore sites would enable foreshore rehabilitation, protect vegetation and fulfil the community's aspiration for the reinstatement of a continuous foreshore pathway along all the riverbanks through our Crown reserves.

Remediating the foreshore would enhance park operations and enable a far more realistic assessment of site capacity. This is clearly too hard for the newbies to comprehend, and willfully resisted by our Crown lands managers.

Compliance and setback issues detailed in multiple submissions over the past decade have also been airbrushed and ignored in the report on submissions and POM.

The new POM have allowed commercial activity to expand onto adjoining road reserve and Crown parklands, zoned coastal wetlands - granting permission

for an activity that would be prohibited without NCHP/ Crown Lands' very dubious claim to 'existing use rights'. What other developer could argue that encroaching onto adjoining land and intensifying park activities beyond the licence conditions enables them to continue operations as an 'existing use'?!

It certainly helps, when you're both landowner and developer, to also have the ultimate decision-making authority to grant approval to your own visionless project.

Confidence in government is at an all-time low. Those faceless backroom bureaucrats have ignored community and Council input and produced a pretty shabby outcome that will adversely impact on our caravan parks and Crown Reserve parklands, on our community and amenity.

Labor will stand against this unfair budget that hurts pensioners, families and students. The fact is Tony Abbott and his National Party collaborators are cutting pensioner and senior payments. This is well explained in a Parliamentary Library review of the Abbott budget authored by Michael Klapdor.

This paper established that Tony Abbott is cutting funding or restricting eligibility for a range of programs that provide assistance to pensioners and self-funded retirees. This includes: increasing the age pension age to 70; terminating the National Partnership Agreement on certain concessions for Pensioner Concession Card and Seniors Card holders and abolishing the Seniors supplement.


The states and territories are yet to issue a long-term response to the slashing of the National Partnership Agreement by Tony Abbott but it is likely that, without this financial assistance,

many concessions currently available will be withdrawn or reduced. This will raise the cost of living for pensioners and retirees, particularly in terms of energy bills and transport costs.

Abolishing the Seniors supplement, a payment worth \$876.20 a year for singles or \$660.40 a year for a member of a couple and paid to CSHC holders and eligible Veterans' Gold Card holders, will see the loss of such payments affecting more than 280,000 CSHC holders.

Combine this with Tony Abbott and the National Party's unfair doctor tax and petrol tax and it is clear that the National Party is directly attacking the pensioners and senior citizens of our nation. As your local MP I will keep fighting and voting in parliament against the National Party's unfair budget.


The pursuit of God and Man by a troubled boy

rowing up in WA in the fifties would be hard enough for anyone. Victor Marsh, whose memoir The Boy in the Yellow Dress has just been published by Clouds of Magellan Press, also had to struggle with two elements of his personality, apparently disparate but in his mind closely connected.

The elements in question are being sexually attracted to men and being temperamentally attracted to God (God being shorthand for the ultimate meaning of life, the universe and everything). Most people have desires in some degree for sex and for spiritual fulfilment, but the achievement of this book is to make the two quests seem both polarities and identities.

For straight people the quest for sex does not usually set up personal and societal tensions, but for young



gay people the odds have always been stacked against any chance of simple emotional development. Marsh's account of his growing up without permission to be himself is both harrowing and familiar: take all the normal adolescent angst and then add an atmosphere in which

you are expected to hate yourself for being different.

The arts, and theatre in particular, can be a refuge from a father's disapproval and society's casual cruelties, and love affairs are also shields and distractions. Still unsure of his orientation, for a while the young Marsh undertook an onand-off heterosexual relationship and later there was a son from this

He is coy about his son's mother. She is now a public figure and hence deserves anonymity, or at least requests and receives it. The reader may speculate about her identity, and also calculate that whatever public career is involved must be well past its zenith and unlikely to be damaged by this book.

When the contradictions in his life became too overwhelming to bear Marsh abandoned WA and tried his luck as an actor in Melbourne's Pram Factory. Then, although the role of actor seemed the closest fit to his mercurial personality, he left that too and became a follower of the young guru Maharaji when he visited Australia

This was the connection that enabled Marsh to make sense of at least one of the concerns in his life and he spent a decade as an instructor of the techniques of meditation in Maharaji's ashrams, both in Australia and in many other countries. After this he became involved in television work in Melbourne and Los Angeles.

Perhaps achieving a degree of inner peace was the spur to tackling the social and personal aspects of his sexuality, as Marsh has since written with insight on Christopher Isherwood (Mr Isherwood Changes Trains, Clouds of Magellan, 2010) and edited a book of perspectives on same-sex marriage (Speak Now, Clouds of Magellan, 2011).

This is the life of an actor, writer, television presenter and producer, devotee of Indian mysticism, academic, father, grandfather, gay rights author and teacher of mindfulness. The scope of the book is ambitious, seeming to touch most of the fabric of the material world while being, essentially, a drama of unfolding spiritual perception. No lack of incident then, but also no lack of reflection on what it all means. Marsh has experienced desperate oppression and soaring freedom, and presents both conditions in well-written and colourful detail.

As with time and tides, everything changes and surfers and the surf lifestyle have morphed into a much more supportive breeding ground for junior surfers, and into the noughties, up-and-coming wave riders are being nurtured by their 'vintage' forefathers and mothers.


This century has seen the advent of the professional junior as more and more groms are starting their careers early and leaving school to study remotely, while travelling the country and the world in search of great waves, podium dollars and sponsorship - our juniors are living the dream.

The latest of our grom crop to hit her stride is Tyler Wright who, at just 20 years of age, has career winnings of US\$303,450 to date and currently sits fourth in the ASP rankings after Gilmore and another of our not-so-long-ago groms Sally Fitzgibbons.


The lucky break for most of our modern groms has come from the generosity of the major surf brands, who are investing their dollars in sponsoring ever younger competitors, and of high-profile surf competitions that cater for the junior crew, and standalone junior competitions such as the Skullcandy Oz Grom Open.

Lennox Head, which is famous for its world-class point break, also offers exceptional beach breaks where the best groms and juniors in Australia and beyond come to wake up this sleepy town in July to put on a worldclass show of high-performance surfing.

All the dramatic action is captured through the live webcast, giving fans an action-packed view of the competition.

Le Ba president Jonathin Hewett just keeps getting more stoked with the event as time goes on. 'I am thrilled that SkullCandy and Le Ba Boardriders can offer what I feel is the most professional grom contest to date', he says. 'There was definitely a shortage of junior events in Australia at the time we began and we wanted to offer something unique to our future stars of the sport, as well as giving something back to the local community.'

In 2013 the Oz Grom introduced a new U20 division. This came about as Le Ba recognised that there was a real lack of pro junior events currently on

the calendar for Australian surfers once they had moved out of the under-16 division. Again, Le Ba wanted to implement a contest that was a first and different from a normal Pro Junior.

The Under-20 division is an invite-only division showcasing the best 24 pro junior surfers with fantastic prize money on offer for the winner of the man-on-man final.

This year's event promises to prove the theory that the Oz Grom is both growing in popularity and as a drawcard for great junior surfers and avid spectators.



Robyn Chalklen and Chris Parkinson are The Yearlings. The music of this husbandand-wife team has been described as having 'dirt on its feet and blood on its hands'. Evocative, dark and, at times, seductive, Chris spoke with The Echo about his new album. All the Wandering and his upcoming local show.

Can you tell me what your concept for All the Wanderina was?

We recorded live to our cranky MCI one-inch eight-track tape machine and transferred it digitally to ProTools via a little eight-channel Neve sidecar. We did a bunch of overdubbing and listening and we quickly discovered that we wanted a little more diesel in the tank. We started hearing a horn section on some tunes and female vocals on others and what the songs really wanted was a fat groovy rhythm section.

These were not just folk songs to be sung as a duo; they demanded more.

How do you prepare for an album?

In the studio things develop and a lot of the time stuff that you did not even think of before recording become important and all of a sudden you travel down a new path and that's kind of the magic of recording, following the path that the song is leading you to. It works best for us to go in a little loose and open to the new ideas that inevitably in that environment open up to you. Our motto in the studio is to 'let it unfold'.

What is the essence of good songwriting for you? How do you do it? Is it a two-way process with both of you writing together?

Good songwriting is distilling the music and lyrics down to the essence with no fluff. We aim to allow the music and the lyrics to breathe with space for secrets to lurk in the shadows.

We write separately and come together three-quarters of the way through; that's the real great part – bringing a new song in the fold to play – and the spontaneous stuff that can happen in the first couple of plays through can be really cool so you have to have the iPod running to catch it, cause if ya don't, she's gone. Often we will add something to the other's song, such as a bridge or an edit of lyrics or a different chord or harmonies, something that wasn't there in the first draft, so that's the way we collaborate and the songs become Yearlinged as a result.

What should we expect for your Mullum show?

We are thrilled to have Sara Tindley opening for us, as she is one of our favourite singer/songwriters and has become a close friend over the years. We will be performing with BJ Barker on drums. There will be electric guitars, acoustic guitars, harmonies and drums, and we may even get Sara up to sing a couple with us. Love playing in Mullumbimby and we can't wait. It'll be the beginning of our tour and I can't think of a better way to start.

MULTI-TALENTED JO JO SMITH IS A NATIONAL MUSIC TREASURE WHO IS LIKENED TO ARTISTS SUCH AS JONI MITCHELL, BONNIE RAITT, ETTA JAMES AND NORAH JONES.

Not to say Jo Jo sounds like them; Jo Jo sounds like Jo Jo but, like them, she certainly delivers on many levels, vocally and lyrically, with uniqueness in sound and composition. She returns to her one-time home in the Byron Shire to launch her new album *Standing in the Lovelight*.

There is something really indescribable about the quality of your voice. I guess you could say it makes you feel good. What are the voices that have the same effect for you?

Stevie Wonder, Chaka Khan, Donny Hathaway, Carl Pannozo, Roberta Flack, Phoebe Snow, Peter Cupples... so many.

How do you feel when you sing?

I feel weightless and in touch with my spirit, very Mullum / Byron Bay!

David (Flottie as I called him) played with such freedom and awesome musicality, always reaching heights that amazed me. I think of him so often and smile.

Tell me about your new album *Standing in the Lovelight* – what is the feel of the songs? What stories do they tell?

Sessions are followed by a Q&A with filmmaker Clive Neeson. *The Echo* had a preliminary chat to find out what it's all about.

Can you give me a few sentences about the underpinning thesis of the film?

Through the 45-year journey of adventure travel pioneering, the audience witnesses enormous changes and the future challenges to the survival of our ecology and civilisations.

But the tragedy is that we have failed to notice this because of a thing called 'shifting baselines': ie we all accept the world we're born into as the norm and so with each generation we have gradually lost sight of the paradise this planet used to be. By rekindling the innovative spirit and a love of the wild we could restore the wilderness to its rightful magnificence. Our hope in achieving this lies with the next generation, and the ability for parents and educators to realise that tomorrow's protectors of the wilderness are the kids that play in it today, a fact that is strongly borne out in the characters of Last Paradise. Our chances of solving the biggest global issues of the future will depend on getting the kids to play outdoors.

How does a physicist factor into a story of change and environmentalism?

Few people realise how much our current civilisation is dependent on massive exploitation of semiconductors and cheap energy sources. Our food, clothing, housing, transport, hospitals, jobs. Interfering with the flow of these commodities and you have an instant global calamity and starvation.

The biggest challenge ahead lies in our ability to minimise impact on the

natural wilderness as we continue to supply these for an expanding human population. Currently we are loosing that battle. Innovation in the semiconductor technology and the energy industry is primarily underpinned by physicists (solid-state physics, thermodynamics, atomic, etc).

To protect the natural wilderness against the demands of a rising population we require understanding and innovation at a higher level. Yet today children are more inclined to study economics and marketing rather than the natural sciences in the naïve belief that economic growth is king over ecological survival. Last Paradise reveals these realities between the lines.

Is change inevitable? The planet looks nothing like it did 20 years ago, or 50 or 150,000 years — how do we balance the natural entropy of change and sustainability?

Humans see themselves as incomplete. It's our human quest for paradise that has driven a change against the natural entropy. As seen in the film, we can affect this by redefining our concept of paradise.

Why do you think Byron has been so responsive to the screenings?

Last Paradise mixes adventure, travel, lifestyle and ecological sustainability. These are the very things that bring people to Byron and they are the foremost issues facing the future of Byron.

If you had to choose just three words, what is the key messaging of *Last Paradise*?

Imagine, innovate, solve.

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PICKING A WINTER WINNER

THE STILLSONS' JUSTIN BERNASCONI HAS PUT TOGETHER A BEAUTIFUL NEW ALBUM TITLED WINTER PICK THAT FEATURES HIS DEXTEROUS **GUITAR PLAYING.**

Tell me about the concept for Winter Pick.

Winter Pick is an acoustic guitar fingerpicking album. It was recorded over the winter of 2012. The songs on the album were inspired by listening to a lot of a great guitarists including John Fahey, Richard Thompson and Doc Watson. My partner Cat Canteri (The Stillsons' other songwriter) had been carping on about wanting to do a solo album for years.

Once she actually started one I thought, well, I'll be blinded if I'm not going to do one too!

How did you go about choosing the players who would contribute?

The players on this album had to be versatile in folk, roots and blues. I had known Ben Franz, Cat, Corey Romeo (The

Stillsons), Pete Filder, Alex Burkov (Tinpan Orange), and Sam Boon (Saskwatch) for years. I knew they would understand the aesthetics I was going for. I didn't know Jeff Lang when I approached him to produce the album.

Once I explained that I wanted to make an acoustic guitar album of tunes that were inspired by the likes of John Fahey and Richard Thompson, he was really interested, and asked me come around to play him some of the material

In selecting just 12 tunes, what were you looking for in putting the album together?

I was looking to create an album that would make the listener feel that they were experiencing winter turning into spring. The biggest consideration after recording, mixing, and mastering the album was the song order. The album is very eclectic, with tunes being mixed up with folk, blues and bluegrass influences.

The album is half instrumentals, half songs. I needed each track to flow like one piece of music; this was critical, and so it took a month to decide on the right order.

What do you think is the essence of not just good, but authentic and unique, guitar playing?

Tricky... and a somewhat loaded question! I particularly like singer/songwriter guitarists such as Robert Johnson, Mississippi John Hurt, David Rawlings: great melodies, passion, finesse. The tune is always the king, guitar showboating second.

Have you ever gone too far in a guitar solo and thought, hell, I can only forge on from here?

Yep, generally when I'm playing bluegrass. Because I'm relatively new to the style, it's easy for me to get all muddled up, then I think, oh dear, what is this rubbish you're playing? Stop!

What should we expect for your local show when you present the album at Treehouse in Belongil?

This will be my first time at Belongil Treehouse Cafe, and Ben Franz will be performing double bass along with me, so there will be heaps of goodtime blues, country vibes. I'll also be performing some of my darker songs, and solo pieces from Winter Pick... there may be a few surprises –

At the Treehouse in Byron on Thursday and the Sheoak Shack on Saturday in Fingal Head.

TRANSFORMERS: AGE OF EXTINCTION

After an overnight flight from Tokyo to the Gold Coast, I approached this with little haste but confident at least that its noise level would not encourage me to drift into the deep sleep that my head longed for. Michael Bay has directed all four of the *Transformers* series, dating back to 2007, and he is really good at what he does, ie, mega thrash-trash sci-fi. Showing no taste for experimentation or even mild variation, Bay has more or less made the same movie over and over, and the latest incarnation differs from its predecessors only in its overdue change of cast. Matey Mark Wahlberg, as Cade Yaeger, a Texan grease monkey, has taken over from the intensely irritating Shia LeBeouf as the indestructible Everyman protagonist, while a rather pouty Nicola Peltz, as his daughter Tessa, has joined the party to fill the time-honoured role of the Helpless Blonde.

As far as story goes, it is at first complicated, with the transformers (cars that turn into giant warrior robots) being in two factions – those that are on the side of humans opposed to the megalomaniacs who have a tendency to reduce cities like Chicago, Beijing and Hong Kong to rubble. The US government, represented by Kelsey Grammer, has been in cahoots with the high-tech industrialist Stanley Tucci in an effort to 'clone' the aliens and, as the government always does in these situations, it has become the oppressor of the people it is meant to save (or something like that).

Amir Mokri's robust, vibrantly coloured cinematography, if tending to be over-reliant on the extreme angle, is a constant pleasure and, to give credit where it's due, the CGI is astonishing – a chase through and over the gleaming towers and grungy tenements of Honkers is thrilling. Tucci, as you'd expect, provides moments of understated humour and Bingbing Li, as the Chinese agent Su Yueming, is inscrutably sexy in black. The concluding scene, however, suggests that the extinction referred to in the title cannot, alas, be taken literally.

BIFNDFD

I have liked Drew Barrymore ever since I saw her as the little girl in *ET*, but I can't stand the monstrous ego and knuckledragging 'comedy' of Adam Sandler. His CV of lousy movies is second to none, so the depths to which he might sink in his latest disposable Hollywood rom-com was always going to depend on whether the sweet Barrymore could keep it afloat. She can't.

They were thrown together with only mildly disastrous consequences in *The Wedding Singer* and *Fifty First Dates*, but the odds firmed in favour of this being yet another dud when I saw the name of director Frank Coraci, whose collaborations with Sandler and Kevin James have given dross a bad name. The setup is as old as the hills. Jim and Lauren, both single parents, meet on a blind date at Hooters – such blatant product placement should be enough to give the game away.

The date goes pear-shaped and, you wouldn't dream about it ... they meet up again when they are on holiday with their kids in South Africa. *Obvious* is too subtle a word to describe the bell-clanging certainty with which Jim and Lauren's inevitable falling for each other is laid out before us. The scenery, a pleasant distraction, is of the eye-candy variety and the general tone of what is an execrable, deliberately unsophisticated script is more in keeping with the Stone Age. Sandler's view of women appears to have been heavily influenced by the Taliban, and how he gets away with the

demeaning racial stereotyping that defiles this crock is beyond me. Unfortunately, the dispiriting truth of the matter is that there is an audience that is regularly amused by it. Ordinarily I prefer not to quote other reviewers, but the *New York Times*'s AO Scott hits the nail on the head, viz: 'Most of *Blended* has the look and pacing of a three-camera sitcom filmed by a bunch of eighth-graders and conceived by their less-bright classmates'. What he said.

HEALING

The opening sequence in writer/director Craig Monahan's unheralded gem Healing, of an eagle in pursuit of a hawk, is breathtakingly fast and tense. When the mighty raptor is entangled in barbed wire, it is collected by the inmates of a prison farm and, with other damaged birds, nursed back to health in an aviary constructed for the purpose. Viktor (Don Hany), an Iranian, will be its chief minder. The obvious metaphor, in the title and circumstances of the men's captivity, is beautifully dealt with in a script that creates mounting tension without resort to mawkish sentimentality or thrill-seeking violence - it is subtle in a way that has become all too uncommon.

Performances are great – Hany, whom we know from TV, gives to Viktor an embittered stubbornness and inner turmoil that easily elicits empathy, the ever reliable Hugo Weaving is stoic but likeable as Officer Perry, while Mark Leonard Winter's Shane, the weedy but rat-cunning stoner, delivers lines of deliciously un-PC humour. Lifting it to greater heights, the music of David Hirschfelder, so perfectly withheld until exactly the right moments for maximum effect, makes poetry with Oscar winner Andrew Lesnie's cinematography. Perhaps the real star of the show, however, is Yasmine – a wedge-tailed eagle, just like the ones we see soaring on the thermals of our own skies. Releasing her into the wild, Viktor tells her, 'All you seek, is you'. As in real life, the perfect ending might not always be what you anticipated, for, as Bob Dylan sang all those years ago, 'are birds free from the chains of the skyways?'

The greatest learning is gifted to us when we're able to cope with the hardest truths. This is by far the best movie on in town, one that will let your heart take flight. Go see it.



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
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A play called *Food*

Food historian and senior lecturer Dr Adele Wessell says, 'Cookbooks provide a rich and valuable way to look at the past. Traditionally, cookbooks and recipes were thought of as blueprints for meals and even as manuals for conservative values.

'More recently we have recognised their aesthetic value – and acknowledged how little cooking might be done from them! Cookbooks and recipes are about more than what we eat - they can be seen as history in several ways. They give meaning to the past by representing culinary heritage. They trace important historical developments: migration, travel, reform movements and popular culture.

Dr Moya Costello, food and wine writing lecturer at SCU, will reflect on the storytelling aspect of cookbooks. In particular, Dr Costello will be looking for cookbooks that include food and wine pairing.

'Wine can set the dreaming, remembering mind in action. Just the aroma and appearance of wine can act as triggers which open doors onto our pasts. Like food, wine develops identity and belonging.

School chaplains threaten vulnerable students: Greens

The Greens have called on the state government to immediately remove chaplains from NSW public schools after the High Court ruled the national program unconstitutional and removed all regulation.

According to Greens NSW MP John Kaye there is no evidence that the chaplains add any benefit to schools. And he is worried that the stated policy of some groups providing chaplains to NSW schools, including describing all homosexual activity as sinful, could harm vulnerable young people.

Dr Kaye said the June 19 High Court decision overturning the National Schools Chaplaincy program has created a six-month regulatory vacuum in NSW. Chaplains have another next six months of funding as the Abbott government has stated it will not attempt to recover the funds it allocated for the entire 2014 school year.

The NSW government relied solely on the national

code of conduct and a ban on both proselytising and 'expressing views that are discriminatory or biased on the grounds of religious ideology, beliefs or sexuality'.

'Parents send their children to public schools expecting a secular education and not to be preached at by a minister of religion, Dr Kaye said. 'It is a breach of faith to have their children exposed to proselytising, made all the more galling because it is paid

topping the list. Commonly known as Yesterday-Today-Tomorrow (Brunfelsia bonodora), this plant is beautiful but deadly.

Dr Fiona Park, one of the Animal Referral Hospital's internal medicine specialists, reported an increased number of Brunfelsia poisoning cases over the past couple of months, which has resulted in the death of one dog this

'Dogs seem to be attracted to the berries and seed pods but all parts of the plant can be considered toxic,' she says. 'Signs of poisoning include salivation, vomiting, diarrhoea, muscle tremors and seizures, and can last up to several days with or without treatment.

Unfortunately, there is no antidote - just supportive therapy via enemas to remove the plant material from the gut, seizure control, administering fluids and possibly general anaesthesia depending on the severity of the case.

'Because Brunfelsia poisoning can be potentially life-threatening, all exposures need to be taken seriously and treated by a vet immediately, says Dr Park.

Puppy in trouble

Mac, an 8-week-old Beagle puppy, got himself into serious trouble recently when he snacked on the Brunfelsia plant in his backyard. His owners heard a yelp and discovered Mac seizing, and raced him to the Animal Referral Hospital in Homebush.

Unfortunately, the antiseizure drugs administered to Mac to stop the convulsions did not work, so the puppy had to be put under general anaesthetic with a breathing tube for 24 hours, explains Dr Park. It took some time for



Tradescantia fluminensis, or Wandering Jew, a common weed on the north coast, can also be poisonous to pets.

Mac to wake up and another few days before he was able to eat and walk, although, still wobbly. The cause of the seizures became apparent when Mac emptied his bowels, revealing the remains of the poisonous plant.

'Mac was very lucky he made a full recovery, says Dr Park. 'If he hadn't come so

quickly and had continued to seizure, he could have died.'

Other dangers

Take a look around your backyard and in your shed,;you'll find a number of other dangers that can be harmful to your pet, says Dr Shayne Thomas, emergency

veterinarian at the Animal Referral Hospital.

Besides Brunfelsia, a number of other plants are toxic to pets, such as liliums (in cats), Wandering Jew and daffodils, plus others from the vege garden, including mushrooms and the tomato and potato plants.

The orange seeds from palm trees are also potentially toxic, causing vomiting and liver failure, adds Dr Thomas.

'Be careful where you store and use rat baits, snail pellets, insecticides and fertilisers, such as blood and bone, which can cause vomiting, diarrhoea and severe pancreatitis,' she says. 'It's amazing how often the door gets accidentally left open and the dog goes fossicking.'

Ticks and drowning

Dogs are also known to eat out of the garbage and get into the compost bin, ending up extremely sick with possible seizures. Tick paralysis from ticks and drowning in the backyard pool are a problem year round.

'Administer monthly tickprevention treatments and check your pets regularly for ticks. Make sure your pool fence is not just child proof but also pet proof to prevent accidental drowning, warns Dr Thomas.

Also the traditional Aussie backyard barbecue can be an unexpected danger with dogs eating cooked bones and foods they really shouldn't.

'I recently had a case where a dog got a wooden meat skewer caught across the roof of its mouth,' she says.

'The owners had a barbecue the day before and had no idea the chicken skewers left lying around by their guests would be a danger.'

Vale Les Donnelly, viva the Giants!



A game of footy doesn't necessarily have to reach the highest standard for it to be a fantastic contest, for it to be packed with drama and bursting with emotion.

Les Donnelly, synonymous with rugby league in the area and the man after whom Mullumbimby's home ground is named, passed away on the day before his beloved Giants hosted Marist Brothers in their Round 11 NRRRL clash.

It also happened to be the tenth anniversary of Mullum's 2014 grand final victory over the Rams and to mark the occasion the club minted a one-off jersey with the names of the players from that day on the backs of the current crop of Giants in equivalent positions – wearing number 10, prop Dan Molenaar was the sole survivor from 2004.

It might be true that all is fair in love and war, but the axiom certainly does not apply to football, for Mullum's season has been blighted by injury and demoralising near misses. With a place in the play-offs a virtual impossibility, there was not a lot hanging on the result of Sunday's encounter – except for pride, and the Giants possess that quality in spades.

Young Jack took the most obvious line between A and B - he put his head down and arse up, ran straight and knocked attempted tacklers down as though they were 9-pins. It was a magnificent effort and it rightfully sent the crowd berko.

Young Aussies say friends, family could be key to home ownership

Young Australians say they'd consider buying a property with a friend or family member if it meant getting their foot on the property ladder.

Research commissioned by Slater & Gordon Conveyancing Works found more than a third of 18-24-year-olds, and just under a quarter of 25–34-year-old, would consider buying a property

Comparatively, those aged 45 plus were far less likely to consider buying with a friend but far more likely to consider buying a property with a family member other than a spouse.

Slater & Gordon Conveyancing Works Solicitor Robert Kern said young people were feeling the squeeze when it came to property prices.

'Capital city prices increased by 10.9 per cent between March 2013 and March 2014 and recently the International Monetary Fund warned Australian homes were the third most expensive of 24 countries. So it's no surprise young people are willing to consider buying a property with someone other than a partner to get their foot in the door.

'That more of the baby boomers would consider buying with a family member probably reflects the fact an increasing number of parents recognise their children are fast being priced out of the market and are willing to help them out.'

Mr Kern said buying with friends or family members was becoming more common, but both scenarios could have drawbacks and it was important that a contract provides for any change in

'Down the track it's quite possible one of the owners will want to sell or can't cover the mortgage, or even just wants out of the

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'That's why it's important you consider all of the potential scenarios upfront and actually have mechanisms for one or both of the parties exiting the contract written into it.

'Without them, the worst case scenario is that the Supreme Court will step in and appoint an independent trustee.

'This can be a stressful, long and expensive process, so some people choose to include alternative dispute resolution avenues, such as mediation, in the contract as well.

Buying a property with family members can also present problems where common-law rules apply.

'For example, if there is a dispute between parents and children, the courts may find that it is reasonable to assume the property was a "gift", in which case the parents could forfeit the funds paid towards the property to their children,' Mr Kern said.

The research also found more than 58 per cent of the 2,000 Australians surveyed would not feel confident working through legal documents themselves and just over half did not understand simple terms such as the difference between joint tenants and ten-

'Buying a property is a huge commitment that can be complicated if you have an unconventional arrangement,' Mr Kern said.

'While I think it's great that young people are taking innovative steps to get into the market, it's important they are protected if circumstances change.

'It's a lot more difficult to change a contract later than at the beginning,' he said.

The research found:

- 37.85 per cent of 18-24-year-olds and 23.65 per cent of 25-34-year-olds would consider buying a property with a friend Only 9.14 per cent aged 55+ would consider buying property with a friend
- 60.75 per cent of 18-24-year-olds and 53 per cent of 25-34 year olds would consider buying property with a family member other than a spouse
- 37.7 per cent of 45–55-year-olds and 37 per cent of Australians aged over 55 would consider buying a property with a family member other than a spouse\
- 58 per cent of 18-34 said they did not know the difference between joint tenants and tenants in common, compared with 48 per cent in the 45-54 age bracket and 45-5 per cent over 55
- 58 per cent of Australians said they would not feel confident working through the legal documents themselves when buying or selling
- 54 per cent of 18-24-year-olds, 52-4 per cent of 25-34-year-olds, 57 per cent of 45-54-year-olds and 64.5 per cent of Australians over the age of 55 said they would not feel confident working through the legal documents themselves when buying or selling.
