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Homecoming gig packs out

Cyclist injured on Ewingsdale Road

A 39-year-old Coorabell woman is in a Brisbane hospital with head and leg injuries after the bicycle she was riding was involved in an accident on Ewingsdale Road near Byron Bay last Wednesday night.

Police are appealing for witnesses to the accident and owing to her condition, and the accident is believed to have occurred at around 6.30pm.

The woman was found lying on the road by a passerby about 300 metres west of McGettigans Lane.

She was taken to Tweed Heads Hospital then later transferred to the Gold Coast where she was reported to be in a serious but stable condition, with multiple fractures.

The latest accident on that road has sparked a warning by a local cycle club that another cyclist could be killed there unless the cycleway is upgraded all the way to the highway from Byron Bay.

Four cyclists have been injured in accidents on Ewingsdale Road west of McGettigans Lane in the past three years.

CCTV go ahead: after stalling comes the installing

A federal government grant of \$200,000 was an offer too good to refuse, and Council staff will now be preparing the installation of sixteen CCTV cameras in Apex Park and on Jonson Street.

The decision at last Thursday's Council meeting will also include a funding provision of \$15,000 per year to the Byron Youth Service's Street Cruise Program, beginning in the 2015/16 financial year.

Additionally, partners will be sought to help the estimated \$80,000 per year and/or find partners to collect the data and maintain the system (eg NSW Police).'

Perhaps most importantly, a lighting component has been included, totalling \$45,000.

The mover of the motion, Cr Chris Cubis, told fellow councillors that he had been affected by Byron's street violence. 'An apprentice of mine was bashed to within an inch of his life,' he said.

During debate, mayor Simon Richardson warned of the cost associated with CCTV upkeep and cited studies which suggest that it is only effective in carparks.

'In terms of town centres that experience street violence, CCTV is the last thing people think about. Even police presence doesn't help.'

And in a rare show of fiscal abandonment, Cr Sol Ibrahim said, 'If it's going to cost some money, then so be it, we have a \$60m budget.'

'Capture and conviction is what the community expects.'

Meanwhile, president of Byron Bay's chamber of commerce (Byron United), Michael O'Grady, told *The Echo* that he personally conducted a study on behalf of the chamber a year ago.

'I looked at the CCTV installations of surrounding shires, and one of the findings was that maintenance costs were not as high as Council's estimated \$80,000.'

But Mr O'Grady did concede that with the cameras being near the beach, there could be higher costs associated owing to the salt air.

He added that the topic of contributing to CCTV had not yet been canvassed with Byron United members.

Residents prepare for bypass fight

Butler Street residents in Byron Bay say they are gearing up to save their street from becoming a bypass after a majority of councillors voted against a proposal to pursue the unused rail corridor.

A motion at last Thursday's meeting by Cr Duncan Dey requested written confirmation from the state government to 'make land permanently available within the multimodal rail corridor'.

But it gained only the support of Dey and the mayor; Crs Ibrahim, Cubis, Woods, Cameron, Wanchap, Spooner and Hunter instead voted against.

And while proceeding the current course reflects advice from the general manager Ken Gainger and staff, the Butler Street Community Network's Paul Jones says that Council's failure to 'fully explore bypass route alternatives' is a fundamental requirement of their application to state planning for the project approval.

'We feel Council is its own worst enemy as they are so afraid of appearing to be indecisive and delaying the process that they vote to proceed into a legal and procedural quagmire,' says Mr Jones.

'As a result this will certainly have the effect of delaying the outcome and wasting precious financial resources'.

But the town's chamber of commerce, Byron United, remains hopeful of a rail corridor outcome.

Labor opens Ballina candidate pre-selection to public

For the first time ever, the community will help select Labor's next candidate for Ballina, NSW Labor leader John Robertson announced last week.

'For the last 120 years, the Labor Party has picked its candidates through a preselection involving only its members - however, for the first time in the party's history, all residents who are on the electoral roll in the state electorate of Ballina will have a voice in the process.'

The move is an attempt to wrestle the electorate away from the Nationals; retiring local MP Don Page has held the seat for the last 26 years.

Labor preselection candidate, Byron Community Centre manager and Byron councillor Paul Spooner will run an information session this Saturday at the Byron Community Centre from 11am.

Ballina councillor Keith Williams has also announced intentions to run for preselection.

Mr Williams is a former CEO in the nonprofit sector, and is known for his work with Australian Seabird Rescue.

► continued from page 1 said in a newsletter to members, 'What was an encouraging outcome is that the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) study for the bypass will need to consider possible alternative options. This may provide for the state-owned and unused land adjacent to the rail line to be considered for multi-modal use.'

Tough love?

During Thursday's debate, Cr Sol Ibrahim turned directly to the Butler Street residents in the gallery and said, 'I'm sorry, but it's too late.'

He said that Council had already allocated and spent much of the \$250,000 on exploring the current route.

'Will the current government say yes? Most likely they will, but we would go back to square one.

'We don't have the money for a new EIS. At the start of this council's term, the bypass was on everyone's lips. The previous council debated it for four years. All Butler Street residents have known for the last four years if not longer that this was likely.

It was around that time that Council pest Fast Buck\$ interjected from the gallery

and demanded to know if a cost analysis of the proposal had been undertaken.

After repeated bellowing by Buck\$, the general manager eventually said that the state government asked Roads and Maritime Services (RMS) for one but Council have yet to see it.

Cr Basil Cameron received applause from the gallery when he said that 'it doesn't stack up to spend a lot more when we are not going to address the traffic problems in the long term. We are geographically constrained, so it doesn't matter how many bypasses are built.

Procedural quagmire

Meanwhile Mr Jones says that he and fellow residents will now 'object in every possible way to prevent approval of the project EIS submission as Council has left them no alternative?

He says Council also failed to acknowledge the work done by the GTR proponents in clarifying so many misconceptions and in tabling an innovative proposal that addresses most if not all community, business and environmental concerns.

'GTR has provided a superior bypass plan that avoids the Shirley Street roundabout bottleneck and enables extension through to Cemetery Road addressing the increasing traffic congestion approaching from the south of town and helping to retune Bangalow Road to far better residential amenity.

'Butler Street Community Network will continue its work to protect our town's cultural and built heritage.

'We love this place in which we live and we will strive to ensure a workable, inspiring bypass solution that will enhance and support our town's unique people-friendly character.

Splendour noise and general compliance fallout rolls on...

The sounds of Splendour affecting neighbours was again amplified at Council's meeting last Thursday, with South Golden Beach Community Association president Kathy Norley taking Council to task over its obligation to residents.

The calls came despite the NSW Department of Planning (DoP) and Environment being the regulatory authority in regard to noise, not Council.

'The sound that hit us was unbelievable,' she said. 'It hit tens of thousands and two shires. This was meant to be addressed prior to the event... there were many breaches.

'We need a formal survey done by the two shires on this.' Ms Norley also said telecommunications during the event was a 'farce' and a 'complete failure'. 'You are putting residents at risk; people with medical conditions... EFTPOS went down in Bruns.'

Camping

It also follows a call from former Greens councillor Tom Tabart, who raised the question of what responsibility Council had regarding camping and compliance at the event.

Council's director of infrastructure services, Phil Holloway, told *The Echo* that a bush fire emergency evacuation plan is submitted as part of the festival site's development consent, and was approved.

While the state government sent sound monitors to the event and a report is expected soon, Council's media spokesperson told *The Echo*, "The switchboard had about seven phone calls on Friday afternoon regarding noise and one on Monday morning."

'Rangers reported a "quieter than normal" weekend', they said.

While not responding to how many complaints were received, North Byron Parklands general manager Mat Morris told *The Echo* more complaints were received than the previous Splendour on the Friday night, 'due to a strong northerly wind blowing towards South Golden Beach and North Ocean Shores.' period on the Friday, no complaints from the north of the venue were received. Conversely, with the wind change on the Sunday to a southerly, complaints were minimal in South Golden Beach and North Ocean Shores areas, while there was an increase north of the site. Wind direction and speed certainly was a major factor during the event in terms of audibility.' Mr Morris says from the sound monitoring data collected, organisers will 'further fine-tune sound generated at events'.

'Of note, during the same

Concerned residents marched through the streets of Byron Bay for the second time in a month last weekend to express solidarity with the people of Gaza.

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NSW govt cooking up a housing shortage: residents' group

Byron Residents' Group has accused the Department of Planning and Environment (DoPE) of grossly misleading the community and the planning minister on the need for the rezoning for intensive development of 108 hectares at West Byron.

'When DoPE exhibited their proposed rezoning and development control plans for West Byron in November 2013, they justified their claim that it was a potential State Significant Site (SSS) on the grounds that it was needed to alleviate pressures on housing supply,' says Cate Coorey, president of the Byron Residents' Group.

'Only two months prior, in September 2013, the DoPE had prepared a report, the *Far North Coast Region Residential Submarket Analysis* the proposed West Byron development, over the next five years 910 lots would be produced throughout Byron LGA, which is more than enough lots to accommodate the extra 1,000 people.

'The DoPE exhibited their proposal for 1,100 houses at West Byron on fraudulent grounds as they knew there was no basis for it to be a State Significant Site.

'Even more alarming is that in order to justify the rezoning of West Byron, DoPE recently released revised population projections claiming that Byron Shire's population will now grow by 5,500 people from 2011 until 2031.

'It is hard to understand how the 2013 estimate of a 3.2 per cent population growth for Byron Shire from 2011– 2031 increased almost six-fold creased growth has come at the expense of growth elsewhere in the region. No other local government area (LGA) has met their targets, she said.

Meeting request

Additionally, NSW planning MP Pru Goward has agreed to a meeting with the residents' group later in the month in Sydney.

While Ms Coorey welcomed the opportunity – which was facilitated by local MP Don Page – Ms Coorey said that Ms Goward's reply to Mr Page contained factual errors and repeated much of the same rhetoric from those within her department.

'Rather than repeat the



planning messes of the previous government – several members of which are now before ICAC – the minister should be looking at remediating them. The minister refers to West Byron as having been identified as a "potential State Significant Site" – and I stress 'potential' – the SSS was sought under the previous Labor government.

We don't know why the minister feels it is worth invoking the previous government's work, especially as the SSS designation was never given and this rezoning and development is not being treated as a SSS by the planning department but as an application for a new SEPP.

'DoPE delayed release of this 2013 report until February 2014, after public submissions on West Byron had already closed.

'The Department's report also estimated that, without

'It beggars belief that in a matter of months DoPE could find a need for an extra 4,500 people in order to justify their minister approving at least 2,500 extra people at West Byron.

But it's also home to a burgeoning business that takes its sound seriously.

With its four employees, Bruns Acoustics produces high-quality speaker units designed to be used with modern wireless technology such as smartphones and MP3 players.

40 units per month

One of the crew, Phil Johnson, says the decision to set up shop in Bruns and produce a premium product was because his team became disenchanted 'by the constant push to reduce cost, often sacrificing quality and often using material harmful to the environment.'

'We also got tired of travelling to faraway Asian countries to exploit cheap labour and engage factories that had no regard for the wellbeing of their workers and the environment.

'We thought we could do better, so a year and a half ago we wrote our own design brief for our first Bruns product.'

That product turned out to be the Bruns BA1 Timbre speaker.

The current output is 40 units per month, he says, and they are made from local Camphor woods. Phil says effort was made to design the unit with premium materials and without moulded plastic.

CAD designed

'It's CAD designed to very tight tolerances for efficient material usage and is powerful enough to fill a living room with amazing pristine audio,' he says.

So were there any inhibitors or red tape that make this operation hard?

Phil says, 'Launching any new business is really hard work and being a small team we know there are a lot of long days and nights ahead if we are to be successful.

'But we have one thing on our side that fuels the fire, we love what we do. To be able to wake up excited to go to work every day living in this amazing shire is a dream in itself?

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

When communications minister Malcolm Turnbull was not invited to the meeting of cabinet's national security committee, which discussed mandatory metadata retention for two years as part of a national security package, process was trashed, with bad consequences.

Those present, including that self-confessed non-techhead, Abbott, needed Turnbull's advice. The shambles into which the plan has fallen shows just how much.

Also, Abbott's apparently ignoring or forgetting to include Turnbull, not a member of the NSC, had all the risks of prodding a porcupine, especially when the decision was leaked before Turnbull got a say in cabinet. Turnbull might be on the outer, but proper process is all about containing division and dummy spits.

If the government hoped that its national security measures would (at least partly) change the public focus in a way that was positive for it (while Joe Hockey privately tried to cajole crossbenchers on the budget, which is the most pressing game) the mission wasn't accomplished.

Abbott has managed to unload his unpopular plan to

scrap Section 18C of the Racial Discrimination Act, but the metadata proposal has unleashed a debate that could be almost as damaging and is probably not worth the effort anyway.

As Gillian Triggs, president of the Human Rights Commission, put it rather wryly to a free-speech symposium last Thursday: 'Seemingly overnight there has been a radical reversal of the public debate,

from protection of the right to freedom of speech in our democratic, multicultural society to introduction of a suite of proposals to limit that right in the interests of national security.

For attorney-general George Brandis, with responsibilities in both areas - 18C and metadata - it has been a devastating week. Brandis had to cop the 'leader's call' on the RDA. He then gave his fumbling Sky interview on metadata which, replayed endlessly, made him a political laughing stock.

Not happy when on the back foot, Brandis pulled out of the free-speech symposium, which had been organised by Human Rights Commissioner Tim Wilson, who was appointed by the government to especially focus on 'the liberal human right of free speech'. Wilson was already unhappy about the 18C backdown, before then being stood up by Brandis, whose non-appearance just kept him in the spotlight.

Brandis and Turnbull met on Thursday to try to get some order into the metadata debate, which has become in the public arena more about Big Brother than the terrorist threat.

Speaking to Bloomberg, Turnbull stressed that the types of data that should be retained were still being worked out.

'Unfortunately metadata is a term that can mean different things to different people. So what we want to do is get to

telcos], conclude the very, very clear parameters of our policy and then explain that and justify it, he said. 'We're in an iterative process, we're on a journey and until we get to the end of it, it's difficult to be much more specific than that.

The public debate is anything but iterative. As Turnbull said, 'the commentary has got ahead of the policy'.

The issue has thrown into the same bed the Greens and the conservative Institute of Public Affairs. 'I never thought I would be at one with [Greens senator] Scott Ludlam,' IPA executive director John Roskam tells The Conversation.

As the IPA gears up to battle Abbott on metadata it is also delivering a sharp kick at his retreat over 18C, with a \$37,000 full-page advertisement in Friday's Australian telling him that it will fight on for the repeal 'even if you won't'.

data plan: 'We are very, very opposed. This is very dangerous. Once it happens there is no winding this back. It gives enormous power to the government over people's privacy. The material will leak. It will be used for purposes not related to anti-terrorism.

If the government managed to get the proposal up, there would almost certainly have to be with tough new controls, which the security agencies wouldn't want. Bret Walker, until recently Australia's national security legislation monitor, this week said he didn't think collection and storage posed a problem - but access to the metadata should require a warrant (which it doesn't at the moment).

It's worth remembering that Labor started along the metadata retention path but abandoned the 'journey'. It got all too hard as an election approached.

In the United States, in the wake of the revelations about the collection of data in the document-dump from former National Security Agency contractor Edward Snowden, there has been a backlash against metadata and arrangements in relation to it are changing.

While it's too early to make any firm prediction, unless he's very careful Abbott's metadata initiative might end up going the same way as the crusade to get rid of 18C.



fundamental duty and responsibility to prosecute the illegal holiday lets in 2a(R2) residential zones. There were several legal precedents to support this including Dobrohottof v Bennic (2013) in the NSW Land and Environment Court.

VOHL supports the current effort by Council to develop a holiday letting strategy to enable regulation. We attended a meeting on May 27 with councillors and staff to examine Council's discussion paper through a workshop process. From our considerable research we made

our comments and submitted our proposals.

We have provided information to show that the proposed potential holiday let zones or precincts are too large. These can be seen at www.byron.nsw.gov.au/newforward-planning. We would like Council to map the location of known permanent holiday lets. We suggest that streets which have minimal or no holiday lets be excised from the potential zones or precincts.

We welcome a strong development control plan which will help regulate holiday letting. We want a legal

independent entity such as Council to be the final regulating and registering authority. All potential holiday lets should go through a DA process so that the public have the ability to make submissions. A commercial rate should be applied to all holiday let businesses.

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

Heady times for the Gough mob

If you close your eyes when Joe Hockey lectures the poor, if you stop your ears when Chris Pyne speaks or Scott Morrison defends torturing children, if you grind your teeth when George Brandis tries to define metadata, if you've programmed your browser to replace Abbott's sneering face with a kitten, it could be helpful to remember that there was a time when politics was at least partly about vision and not who can prove himself the biggest psychopath.

Not that there haven't always been psychopaths in parliament. Mungo Mac-Callum's latest book, *The Whitlam Mob* (Black Inc), makes it clear that bullies, fools and crooks have always been the majority party. But the career of Gough Whitlam shows that wit, intelligence and idealism can prevail over the bloodsuckers, if only for a brief time.

As well as cheering the spirits by pointing out what politics can achieve, Mungo outlines the history of the seventies in a painless and entertaining way. Each of the main players on both sides is given a short profile and a magisterial verdict. These thumbnail sketches are often very funny, but they also serve to show the events of the period through different frames of reference, and the whole collection leaves older readers feeling they have

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

Sticky Buns and great coffee

Mr and Mrs Bun the coffee makers, or David and Jenny Kennedy (as they'd probably prefer to be called), are the owners of Bun Coffee. In November 2004 David shipped a small roaster from Turkey to the port of Brisbane and then on to Byron Bay.

Less than a year later he relocated his young family from Sydney and Bun Coffee was born (the name came from his nickname during his days in a French patisserie - Mr Sticky Bun). He now spends his days sourcing and roasting premium single-origin coffee beans from around the world. Back in the early 1990s, David's commitment to his then Sydney cafe led him to spend a number of years learning the art of roasting. His training, along with what seems almost a 'calling' to create award-winning coffee blends, has paid off and since 2005, Bun Coffee has won multiple awards.

The roastery itself is an Australian Certified Organic (ACO) processor that is Fair Trade certified, Rainforest Alliance certified, HACCP certified manding (in a nice way of course)? After all if the socks you bought weren't fit for purpose, you'd have no compunction in returning 'em.

So, if your Barista is too busy chatting with workmates and sends along a lukewarm, crappy coffee, then speak up. Skilled roasters and coffee growers work tirelessly to maintain the high standards we enjoy in Australia. In the northern rivers we have many of them right under our noses. Here are some of those champions of coffee...

If you looked to find the Moonshine folks you'd find them hidden amongst the coffee trees in the hinterland of Federal. Moonshine is a boutique, small-batch roaster.

This little company doesn't provide branded umbrellas or colourful windbreaks (yet). Instead they're producing some lovely blended roasts.

Try to get a table in the Footbridge Cafe in Brunswick Heads and you'll soon realise it's not an easy affair. The crowded little place is turning the people and the Moonshine on, and the quality of my latte attests to this fact.

Specialising in Australian-grown coffee and using local beans as a part of their blends, each batch of coffee is micro-roasted by hand, and the hand belongs to Richard Kelly. He, along with his wife and two children, the latest Luna, born only a few weeks ago, live on the farm where Dad works the roaster and blends the beans. Everything here is done by hand and is evaluated using oldfashioned means (all five senses) with 'a little bit of science'.

All in all the quality and consistency of this coffee is working to their advantage in a fiercely competitive market. If you wanted to drink a cup then the Doma in Federal serves a good cup, as do Punch & Daisy in Mullumbimby and Luscious in the Byron Arts & Industry Estate.

Zent' and the art of coffee roasting

The coffee purist and the coffee grower are sometimes melded like a zen farm-

er with a caffeine habit and there appears to be no-one who embodies the passion of coffee more than Rebecca and John Zentveld of Zentveld's Coffee.

Rebecca is a fierce friend of locally grown coffee, as you'd expect with 50,000 of the bushes in their backyard. Zentveld's also has a constant need for more local green beans. Keeping high demand for their brand satisfied means that Zentveld's heavily supports other local micro-growers, buying-in their green beans.

If you've ever been concerned about origins, then think about this company. When you choose to buy their Australian product, it's from around here, it's 'almost organic' (not certified but nothing nasty used I'm assured) and it's filled with the energy and personal touch that good owner-operators instil. If you prefer the flavours from overseas, to stay competitive Zentfeld's has its own global blends too. Whatever you do, don't get Rebecca started about her favourite topic – local beans – unless you've got a few hours to kill (it's the caffeine I think).

One good reason to visit their coffee plantation is the fantastic views; a second is a bag of fresh-roasted beans direct from the roaster. This week there's even a classical 'Coffee Concert'; a live classical concert with the Southern Cross Soloists. This event is being held on Friday August 15 from 11am. A no-nonsense, hands-on sort of guy, you'll find John talking-up all things coffee at his stall in \triangleright

He sells his small coffee plantation with all the gusto of his larger competitors and he doesn't appear too concerned about their market share. 'I don't care about my market share, there's plenty of demand and I'm doing all I can to fill my own', he told me.

Ewingsdale Coffee grows the beans and supports other smaller micro-farmers by buying as much as he can to supplement his own supply of beans. They don't roast though, that's taken care of by the Bun Coffee roasters down the road. It's a lovely thing when people can work together in harmony and still be in competition. Barefoot on the beans

Don't you just love the back-lane holein-the-wall? Barefoot Brew Room is as rustic as you get. This is the front counter (almost literally) of a tiny but thriving cafe. It smells like team spirit and freshly ground and roasted coffee. A team yes, and not quite in their teens are Rodney Contojohn and his girlfriend Dawn Beaumont.

Within minutes of my enquiring about the goings-on of this caffeine burrow, Dawn was spouting information on their enterprise like a wellseasoned public relations pro.

Rodney is the roaster behind these blends and he hand picks, blends, then personally cares for the roast until satisfaction results. He was taught how to roast coffee personally by Phil Di Bella at Di Bella in Sydney's Surrey Hills and, like all clever students, he thought he might set-up a shop himself.

Not only have they a flourishing cafe, but it didn't take long to tell me of their wins at the Golden Bean Awards 2013: Silver Medallist - Overall Golden Bean; Bronze Medallist – Espresso (Blend II); Bronze Medallist – Milkbased latte (Blend II). When you consider the size of this little business and then imagine the size of the overall coffee market... it's a big deal indeed.

What comes round, goes 'round

Pizzas are no longer just the go-to snack of drunken teenagers and the midnight munchies. Pizza kitchens are serving their fare with more care and generosity than some restaurants. These days you can get a square meal that's round for a reasonable price keeping the gourmet and the fussy tastebud both happy. Pizza has usually been a thing of the Italians, though these days, I'm not sure that's the understanding anymore. The northern rivers has some of the best pizzas you could ever want or wish for. This week **Matthew Michaelis** looks at three very different types of pizzeria:

Sticky Fingers and wagging tongues

Generally you can glean an eatery's reputation from a local faster than a hungry cockroach on a wheelie bin. A good reputation equals superlatives, while bad reps receive the verbal equivalent of CAPS and exclamations!!!

At Sticky Fingers the words used to describe this place are the former. You'll hear the likes of 'best thin crispy crust anywhere in Australia' or 'huge pizza', 'generous toppings', 'best I've had'.

These aren't shy commendations. There is, however, nothing like trying the goods yourself and when you do, have a squiz at the top sellers. This isn't the billing for a confused stage show, they're some of the cast of Sticky Finger's menu; the 'Sinderella' is topped with caramelised onions, sundried tomato, marinated pumpkin, spinach, pine nuts and pesto. The 'Mick Jagger' struts to table with pepperoni, ham, chorizo, onion and pesto. The 'Diana Ross' is one of the stars; topped with pepperoni, ham, onion, mushroom, toasted capsicum, olives, pineapple, anchovies and pesto (like the singer this pizza is larger than life).

The salads here are tremendous too: large servings of piled-high ro-

quette, apple and a generous garnish of shaved parmesan cheese; or a roasted pumpkin, spinach, pine nut and fetta salad. Salads come forth in good deep white china bowls. It's fully licensed, so 'vino' or beer is on the table if required. Whatever your 'take' on recommendations, the wagging tongues do appear to enjoy their Sticky Fingers (don't take my word for it!).

Here the owner, Zohar Flantz, offers an eclectic selection of his own specialities from throughout the Middle East and wood-fired pizza the Italians would envy. He made it his job to learn how to make pizza dough, toppings and get the 'good oil' on the ways of the Romans. He did so by hiring an Italian to teach him the things he didn't already know. Clearly he's a grade A student.

A wood-fire-oven stands central in the shop and provides the heat for more than just the pizza. Freshly made wood-fired pita is filled with hummus, tahini, green falafel and tabouli. Or try the zatar flat bread, topped with labneh, tabouli and olive oil. The dough for his pizza is proven for 48 hours to give it a depth of flavour like a sour dough.

The Calabrese pizza with tomato base, mozzarella and Salumi salami is great with extras such as anchovies and chilli oil. For sweet try a freshly baked babka.

You may need your GPS to get here and you'll have to get here between 7.30am-3.00pm, Monday to Friday, but try the food and you'll be wanting others to be in the know too.

Luscious choices

To the uninformed, this cafe is not in plain sight neither is its location so easy to describe: turn down the main street into Byron at Ozigo, past the BP, turn first left then second right into Tasman Way then just 'round the corner turn right into the carpark... you get the idea. I had absolutely no trouble, Apple's voice of reason led me directly to the door. It seems that most people who eat here are already in the know. They'd know the energy and care the menu provides. They'd also know it's a 'come as you are' affair. With relaxed and casual furnishing, big corners, cushioned and comfortable – you'll get to know it's the

Meraki – from Santorini to Pizzeria

Line up, Line up, Line up! You've arrived early to notice a healthy queue already extending itself out the door and around the corner. The front counter at Meraki Greek Restaurant at 5.30pm on a Wednesday was like the box office at a popular show. And, pretty much, that's exactly what this clever eatery is. Here the popular pizza menu is in lights and starring alongside is the Greek cuisine. Enter stage right: the support act – a \$10 schnitzel that's so sizable it could take out the waitress carrying it.

Inside the comfortably lit restaurant the seats were starting to fill with 'eat-ins'. Chef and owner Dino Georgakopoulos, it seems, has been quick to see that old club grub isn't always the ticket. Of course, the well-priced grog is certainly a drawcard (and goes well with pizza, kids and fizzy drinks).

The bases and toppings on these pizzas are well worth a try (if you haven't already joined the throngs for a takeaway). Recommended: the Garlic Prawn served with Napoli, spinach, Coopers Shoot tomatoes, Fior di latte (mozzarella made from cows milk), prawns, garlic, olives, lemon and pesto; Greek lamb with Napoli sauce, spinach, tomatoes, and sliced slow-roasted shoulder of lamb; Kalamata olives, feta and tzatziki (almost a souvlaki). The vegetarian choices will certainly not disappoint, with a hearty and well-flavoured roasted pumpkin, Napoli, feta, Spanish onion, pine nuts and spinach -The Calabaza (pumpkin) or marinated field mushrooms, truffle oil, shallots, mozzarella and roquette.

This is a colourful and tasteful cheap eat, decked with images of Greek islands and a nice low light; an affable, energetic service and the best of three worlds. Santorini – who needs it? (well... maybe a little).

estaurants often boast interesting interiors born from a shabby chic aesthetic, eccentric owners and their eclectic collectables. It's whimsical at Treehouse: part island bungalow, part emporium, and part gallery. If you've left your cash behind, there's an ATM camouflaged as an arty installation; if you're a gamer, a working Space Invader glass-top table sits like a cornerpiece in a Zuckerberg time-out room. Behind

the espresso machine is a large wooden frame, complete with dials and controls stuck on the wall like the skeletal remains of a Victorian plasma screen. A collection of paintings

from a local artist is on high and a Bruegel print (The Peasant Wedding) suggests baked goods will come flying out of a well-staffed kitchen (albeit not in the morning).

I seldom see a dual personality in a restaurant, but here on some nights you'd be forgiven for thinking the place was a Tim Burton set. Wandering minstrels upstaged by an animated table service, larger-than-life smiles, smouldering bartenders: all told it's a vibrant, cheery scene. Alas, I'd come here

for brekkie and at this point had been lulled into a false sense of food security - I was quickly brought to earth when I sighted the morning menu.

This is a lightweight breakfast menu embellished with a good helping of friendly banter. Unlike its bountiful evening staffing, it's order and pay at the counter. Not a problem I thought; I'd nearly ordered the entire menu - four items. The barista, Alex, proved to be an artist himself. Not the

usual flinch or eye-roll from this guy as I placed my long-winded coffee order - 'double shot ristretto, ¾ length, skim milk latte: small cup please'. No, instead, he set about producing the finest coffee I've

had in a long while; silky, strong and smooth. Not a Dutch Master, but a master of coffee and a credit to the art of baristing and the Byron Bay Coffee Company roast he was brewing me.

The food in the AM is fresh and fast. Burger-style buns come lightly filled with meaty mushrooms, relish, and eggs on a sesame seed bun (not a jingle in sight). Eggs, bacon, aioli and a ciabatta with generous slices of avo atop goats cheese. But I suggest you

save your excitement for the PM tucker. The Treehouse atmosphere and food from breakfast to dinner is a Jekyll-and-Hyde affair. I'm supposing that's because the place nextdoor serves a comprehensive breakfast, and conversely the Treehouse caters well to the night folk. Whatever the case, it's much more likely to impress at night when the joint is jumping, entertainment is up and the crowds gather to drink and be merry.

The dinner menu is a world from the sober AM laminate. Smart and popular choices include everybody's faves; wood-fired pizza, pasta and tapas sit with the likes of a roasted pumpkin salad and desserts served potted in jars. Wintry fare of pumpkin, orange and cinnamon soup was just the thing on a chilly eve; on asking another patron how they found their fettuccini, the answer was unusually quick, 'perfect, al dente and I really loved the sauce, and the smile was convincing too!

The pizza is made to order and freshly fired in an open corner oven, flames licking the edges. I'm a self-professed dessert-o-phile, so plonk a sweet into a glass jar, and you've already lost me. Desserts are a thing of beauty to me; I want it to be love at first sight, and then be seduced by the flavours. But around me were jars and jar lovers, so I quieted my mind, closed my eyes and spooned the delicious

and warming chocolate pud into the mouth that previously wasn't persuaded.

During a cold winter morning, Treehouse is the stuff of good eggs, bread rolls, cardboard carriers and a really good takeaway coffee. When the sun sinks though, large parties of people meet here. Some celebrating, but for the most part, they're gathered on comfy lounges and long tables to take in some art - the art of friendly service, good food and fun furnishing.

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

SOME MEN GET BETTER

TWO YEARS AGO MIKE MCCLELLAN DECIDED TO RETURN TO WRITING. **RECORDING AND** PERFORMING FULL TIME.

Mike released Song and Danceman in 1974 with the title song topping the charts and bringing him to national recognition.

His debut album in 1972 had been regarded as one of the most auspicious of his era. His second album went gold, and in 1976 he released his finest album of the 70s, Until the Song is Done. He was compering a TV show in 1979 that became Mike McClellan's Country Music. He travelled to the UK and America, away for over 12 months.


On his return to Australia he did something unexpected: He changed careers.

'There were several factors that made me make that decision - I had come back from being overseas where I had lived in the early 8os. RBT had come in, clubs were struggling and ditching the bands; in general the business was a lot harder. I had come back with a new wife, who was keen to start a family and a medical practice, and I had also tired of touring. I once did 60 shows in 10 weeks all in NSW - and I got to the point where I wanted to set down roots.'

McClellan was approached by advertising agencies, who were keen for him to join their ranks. They'd noticed his natural ability for an easy lyric and a catchy tune.

'It was an easy avenue for me to take at that time,' says Mike, who was signed up by MOJO as their creative songwriter. And yes, you are sure to know some of Mike's commercial jingles: Four X, Red Rooster... In fact one of Mike's friends begged him to pull the Rooster jingle. 'He told me his daughter wouldn't stop singing it and it was driving him nuts!'

Mike set up his own ad agency. He worked at the Country Music Academy in Tamworth as a senior tutor and is now a senior visiting fellow at the Australian International Conservatorium of Music.



And back in 2011 Mike released his first album of new songs in 20 years.

'I had kept up writing but not with any real concentration. That was one of the stimuli for wanting to go back to doing it full time. I didn't want my creativity to get diluted, and I love performing.'Writing music and getting out there again was a deliberate intention - that this would be what I want to do for the rest of my life.

While If Only For a Moment reacquainted Mike with his listening public, it was the release of Dancing in the Rain, his new and, some say, best-ever musical offering that has had the critics raving.

ABC Radio's Richard Glover wrote: 'Mike McClellan just gets better and better. It is such a beautiful record. I loved every song."

'I wrote this last album as a focused effort over sixeight months. In a way I felt I was making up for lost time. I sometimes regret that I didn't get back to it sooner.

This most recent album reflected Mike's emotional journey through what he calls one of his toughest times.

'I went through a tough emotional time with the release of the last album. There was a lot of emotional stuff: my wife and I divorced, and a lot of what is in the album reflects what I was going through. It is a

product of that tough time. You sometimes use the writing to work through the issues and work out the cathartic struggle. I think a lot of what I write is intensely personal, but what I am going through is no different from what other people go through, it's just that I write about it. Other people listen and interpret through the prism of their own experience, and if they get something out of it, then that's a good thing.

'We all have songs in our lives,' says Mike, 'that signpost particular moments or things that have happened and all you have to do is hear that song and those memories come straight back.'

As an older artist re-entering the music industry Mike is philosophical about the approach.

'This industry can be very demanding, and I think what you have to be careful about is that it doesn't become too obsessive.

I guess the thing that for me that is critical is that I find a way to use my creativity in a positive fashion and take into account all the things that are around me and all the relationships I need to sustain. I have kids and grandkids and they are terribly important to me; and I have a new partner in my life, and I have to be careful that I take her concerns and her needs into account. She is still working and doesn't travel with me as much as she'd like, as much as I'd like. You know you really do mellow as you age; I am less guarded when I am writing.'

Mike reflects on the difficulty that men of his father's generation and even himself and his brothers have had in learning to connect and express themselves.

'There is a song on my album from 2011 which is called The Heart of the Matter, which is about the reluctance of the men in my family to voice what was really going on for them. Men didn't talk about their feelings. I have two brothers, and we all should have been better I guess, but at times haven't been.

One is a lawyer and the other one is a judge leading the royal commission into child abuse. All successful men that have become better with age... I watch the way my daughter's partner father their kids and I see things changing... although I do think there is still a way to go.'



SHARE HOUSE DREAMING

THERE IS NOTHING QUITE LIKE LIVING IN A SHARE HOUSE.

In fact I think it would also be true to say that you don't really know a person until you have lived with them and, for many of us, shared accommodation was the place where lasting relationships have been both formed and destroyed.

Topology are the ensemble in residence at the Brisbane Powerhouse and since their beginning in 1997 have released eleven albums, performed award-winning concert series, and have embarked on world tours. Topology are innovators, and have come up with a unique way to tell the story of five characters living in a share house – through music. All music. The story is told without words.

Topology comprises John Babbage on sax, Robert Davidson on bass, Bernard Hoey on viola, Therese Milanovic on piano and Christa Powell on violin.

According to Christa, this isn't just a musical composition.

'We think of it as theatre and dance; the music does tell the story. It's not overt, and of course there are no words. An audience member said it was a live-action silent film without its being, of course, film. The music tells the story – you get all the emotion and the story from the music, so you choose your own emotional reactions and the music guides that.'

For an ensemble who work closely together, it wasn't hard to create characters, especially when you were brave enough to use your own character defects as your template.

SHARE HOUSE THIS SATURDAY AT THE BYRON COMMUNITY CENTRE. 7PM.

'There are five characters and Topology have been together 17 years,' says Christa. 'In the story we have been living together for the same time, and we've created characters based on ourselves; we are co-dependent and haven't been able to move on. We're in our 40s but behave like we are in our 20s. Rob, who is the master of double entendre, can't find a job; he works on the tollway, and he is terrible with women. Therese is the house hippy, yet she secretly eats meat; and she is a bit desperate so has a crack one night at Bernard, who is oblivious to everyone and who drinks and smokes and accidentally sets the house on fire when he falls asleep and the cigarette burns the house to the ground. John, who writes music, and is secretly in love with me. I am a fashionista who takes no notice of John because I am obsessed with my shoes... there's an eviction, a real estate agent (the sound man) who evicts us - and there's a fire!'

So what was the impetus for Topology to create an instrumental opera set loosely in the 70s?

'We have always thought of getting away from dots on the page, away from the traditional way of performing chamber music. We wanted to take one step forward and communicate. We felt that straight chamber music wasn't always the best way to communicate.'

When it comes to genre, Topology sits outside the box.

'Genre has been a problem for us the whole time because no-one can pigeonhole us!' says Christa.

The show is directed by Annie Lee, of the Kransky sisters, so it's no doubt that this is an extraordinary show where innovation collides head-on with sensational music and humour. 'The share-house concept resonated better than I thought' says Christa of the first few shows in Brisbane. 'When I came out of the theatre, people came out and were raving about how hysterical it was.'

So how do musicians manage to tell a story of share housing without speaking – and be funny?

'We are playing and often we aren't standing. We may be sitting on the couch. There are some scenes where we are playing and sleeping, one scene at 4am where we are all asleep playing, lying on the couch, or lying in our rooms – the sleep scene, which turns into the nightmare scene because the house is on fire...'

In *Share House* the couch is the centrepiece of the action.

'In one scene I am lying over the back of the couch with my head falling behind the couch, and playing like that is really hard. I think for audiences though that you look beyond the playing, you get caught up in the story where you look past it.'

For *Share House*, Topology have developed yet another suite of intriguing collaborative relationships, this time a unique cross-cultural and mixed-media collaboration celebrating the works of ten incredibly diverse artists from Brisbane and the Philippines to create artwork inspired by music from the album. The artists were given individual tracks to inspire artworks in their chosen medium, and the results are diverse, from painting and sculpture to tattoo design and jewellery.

Further expanding on the community spirit of a share house, the commissioned artworks will be auctioned off with 100 per cent of proceeds going to Habitat For Humanity Philippines to rebuild homes devastated by the recent Typhoon Haiyan, while fans of Topology's creative canon will find recreations of the individual pieces within the album sleeve of *Share House*.





and discouraged, Gretta decides to return to England. Dan (Mark Ruffalo) is a oncewas record industry legend who has been sacked by the company he helped establish. They meet in a bar and a star is born. Actually, it's not quite as simple like that, for Carney, an insider, is more concerned with observing the clash that occurs when the integrity of the artist is confronted by the pragmatism of business.

There are plenty of digs at the music industry (Mos Def is a treat as the bean-counting CEO), but they are without vitriol, the understanding being that god and mammon have always made their compliant compromises. Knightley doesn't so much adopt a character as bend it to her will, making the character herself. She has mastered the art and is perfectly suited to a role such as this. Ruffalo, a warm and cuddly actor, is equally comfortable as the dishevelled loser who, because he has never lost the passion for what he does, will pull himself up by his bootlaces. None of which counts if there aren't any tunes that get inside your head, and in this there are plenty, both originals and standards - none better than Stevie Wonder's For Once In My Life (the scene with Ruffalo and Knightley dancing to it is fab).

It's not unlike *Music and Lyrics*, but for one major difference. Here the emphasis is not on the romance – though the 'will they or won't they?' tease is a steady undercurrent. Instead, it's about the joy of making music. Ebullient, sexy and smart.

STILL LIFE

Nobody can wear a sleeveless grey jumper like Eddie Marsan the garment might have been invented for him. As the overlooked littleman, earnest and honest but with no self-esteem, he is without peer at the moment. If you remember him opposite Helena Bonham Carter in the lovely Sixty Six (2006), you'll appreciate how his ability to portray stubborn but submerged dignity is perfectly applied to role of John May, who for twenty two years has been tracing the next of kin of those who have died friendless and alone.

His davs numbered as a council employee; John is left with one last case to solve who was Billy Stoke? Where are his family and lifetime associates? A loner himself, John learns that Billy was a bit of a lad, neither good nor particularly bad, and not in the least bit mourned by those who recall him. Belatedly the scales are lifted from John's eyes – he begins to open up as Billy's history helps him understand his own peculiar isolation.

But there is only so far Marsan can go with deadpan passivity and what might become a film that is sucked into torpor is illuminated and warmed by the candlelight of Joanne Froggat's appearance as Kelly, the daughter Billy abandoned when she was just a little girl. Like John, she is a solitary, 'invisible' person. Uberto Pasolini has made one of those quiet, unobtrusive movies that manage to be about everything that most star-studded megablockbusters rarely get to within coo-ee of – which is to say Pasolini has meditated on what it is to be human.

The last scene is quite overwhelming – in a restrained, non-showy way, of course. I should have seen it coming, but Pasolini has built his story on what is withheld. He leaves its theme to be eked out by May as he meticulously delves into his subject's otherwise unregarded but unique background. We need to be seen, to be known, and John May's diligence ultimately earns for him the saddest triumph.



MRS BROWN'S BOYS D'MOVIE

Do you remember how last week I suggested that *Sex Tape* might prove to be the worst movie of the year? Well – hold the phone! Another one has come in even lower! The only positive thing that I can think of to say about this excruciatingly awful piece of copper-and-kettle Irish gormlessness is that it more than thoroughly lives up to its cringeworthy trailer.

The film, I'm told, is a spinoff from a hugely successful television show - I am not familiar with it, which proves, if nothing else, that ignorance can be bliss after all. Brendan O'Carroll plays Agnes Brown, a fruit-and-veg stallholder at a street market in Dublin. I've never really understood the appeal of middle-aged men in frocks. Even Edna Everidge – notwithstanding Barry Humphries's scintillating wit - is beginning to appear embarrassingly anachronistic. Unlike Dame Edna, O'Carroll's alter ego is a smoking and swearing heroine of the working class. She takes on the Big End of town to campaign against crude Russian investors whose development plans have no place for Agnes and her fellow street vendors. Helping Agnes are her idiot family and the members of a school for blind ninja students - yes, blind ninja students. Benny Hill might have been able to get away with it in a five-minute sketch... but really?

Do the distributors who determine what cinemas will screen to their punters take it as a given that we who live outside the major metropolises are complete hayseeds with the intelligence of gnats? And, more to the point, surely there are any number of wannabe writers and directors in Oz who could come up with something as woeful as this. Why do we need to import such crud? I was so mortified by this movie's bone-headed stupidity, so dispirited by its insulting banality that I could not even muster the will to walk out.

Unemployment rising, youth 'cast adrift': ACOSS

The Australian Council of Social Service (ACOSS) said last Friday the sharp rise in unemployment is disturbing and highlights the risks posed by current federal government proposals that strip away supports and payments for people struggling to find paid work, especially young people.

'The latest unemployment figures expose the folly of policies that cast young people adrift without income support for six months and make them search for 40 jobs a month,' said ACOSS CEO Dr Cassandra Goldie.

'The reality is that it's becoming increasingly difficult to find work, not easier. In many parts of the country, the has largely ignored cost-effecjobs simply aren't there. There are less jobs available to young people now than there were before the GFC six years ago.

'The starting point for policies that work to reduce youth unemployment is the transition from school to paid work. Dr Goldie said.

Young people are not getting the career advice and support they need at school, and schools are not well connected with local employers and support services. The Youth Connections program is providing that support, but in the same budget that cuts unemployment payments for young people, that program lost its funding.

'ACOSS welcomed the recent announcement of wage subsidies to give long term unemployed young people a foot up in the tough jobs market. Wage subsidies in regular paid jobs are much more effective than working for the dole.

'However, the government tive proposals that are widely viewed as likely to help, such as the joint recommendations from the Business Council of Australia, the ACTU and ACOSS Alliance on how to remove barriers to employment,
