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One mob... surviving and thriving

'Jingi Walla! Hello!' echoed across town on Monday as hundreds of tourists and locals gathered at Main Beach in Byron Bay to celebrate the survival of the Indigenous people of this country. It was smiles and the sense of being together rather than apart as visitors relaxed to watch ancient Australian culture first hand and to eat an all-Aussie snag.

Protests about the invasion of this land were held across the nation, but the local mob took a different tack in what has become a joyous

annual Australian Day celebration known as Survival Day. In Byron it was a time to sing and dance, listen to some didge and guitar and get down like a goanna and kangaroo.

The event, as always, was inclusive of all people in Australia and all people from Indigenous groups in this sunburnt place with performances from black fullas from across the nation represented during the Welcome to Country, delivered by Nigel Stewart.

At almost 86 years of age, local elder Aunty Dulcie Nicholls still manages to attend events with her family and she enjoyed a sausage and the show from one of the shade tents set up on the foreshore as her clan enjoyed the salt water and summer breeze.

Celebrating survival

Arakwal woman Delta Kay said that January 26 is a day of mixed feelings for Aboriginal people but that it is about choices, and looking at it from a different point of view goes a long way toward reconciliation. 'We choose to celebrate what is important to us: our cultural survival.

Delta says that the day is also a success because of the local support from Byron Shire Council, the reconciliation mob and Byron NPWS.

'The feedback from locals and visitors was fantastic', said Delta. 'And our reconciliation stall was a very busy part of the event and very helpful as it is important to educate people on Aboriginal issues.

Other activities on the day included basket making, banner painting, a sausage sizzle and the traditional shapeshifter dance, much loved by the jarjums and their mums and dads.

NBN rollout yet to include shire

While the nationwide rollout of high-speed internet continues, any plans for Byron Shire are yet to be announced. The federally owned National Broadband Network, or NBN Co, has been tasked with the job, which has been described as 'the largest infrastructure project in Australia's history.

According to www.nbnco. com.au/maps, no town or village throughout Byron Shire is yet earmarked for fixed-line NBN, something which an NBN spokesperson confirmed. Residents in rural areas can expect a fixed-wireless NBN service at some stage, according to NBN Co's website.

The NBN Co spokesperson added that the construction schedule is expected to be underway by mid-2016. 'Ultimately no-one misses out as the NBN will be made available to every Australian family and business by 2020?

Fixed line v wireless

Under a new deal between telcos and NBN Co last December, federal communications minister Malcolm Turnbull said there will be a 'shift to a multi-technology NBN'.

Previously, Labor had committed fixed wireless and satellite technology to cover regional and remote Australia, as well as fibre to the premises (FTTP) in urban areas.

The Echo understands the Abbott government's shift to a multitechnology mix means the NBN will incorporate Telstra's and Optus's hybrid fibre-coaxial (HFC) networks as well as other fibre solutions, such as FTTN (node) and continued on page 2 \triangleright

 continued from page 1 FTTB (basement) for multidwelling units.

Considered much more superior - and without Electromagnetic Radiation (EMR) – a fixed 'fibre to the premises' connection in Byron Shire can only be found at the new Tallowood estate in Mullumbimby. It is expected there will be fixed-line fibre for towns and villages where it is possible to do so.

North Byron Parklands in Yelgun also has fibre optic cabling in place, which was installed ahead of the recent Falls Festival. A spokesperson

told The Echo, 'This was an arrangement that was made in partnership with North Byron Parklands, Falls and Splendour, so Telstra coverage at North Byron Parklands is first rate for Telstra mobile users using 3G/4G.

Telcos winners

At the time of the new deal, 'About \$30 billion' would be saved on the NBN rollout, Mr Turnbull said. He claimed it would 'bring forward its completion by around four years, compared to the previous fibre-to-thepremises rollout.' But according to Crikey's Paddy Manning, Telstra and Optus were the winners in the new NBN deal, not the public.

He said, 'The householder will bear more of the final, unpredictable cost of getting from the street into the home, but at least they will have an upgrade path to pure fibre to the premises. Not so the millions of homeowners who will be stuck with souped-up hybrid fibre-coaxial (HFC) and no upgrade path to fibre to the premises at all. Ironically, the richest third of Australian homes may end up with the inferior network.

What's Ray Darney planning now?

After ten years at the helm of planning for Byron Shire, Ray Darney has retired from Council.

It's a position which influences how towns and villages are improved and rural landscapes are either preserved, managed or developed. So apart from general manager, it's the most important job in any shire council.

Prerequisites of the job include negotiating with developers and/or a formidable team of legal and planning experts as they – presumably – try to get their way. The job also requires giving councillors advice, drafting policies, overseeing planning staff and scrutinising development applications of all shapes and sizes. And no planner is an island; the NSW government's policies and advice must also be taken into account.

Inner sanctum

To mark the retirement of Mr Darney, I was granted a parting interview. I was ushered into the upper intestine of Council staff HQ, and straight away he's cracking gags about the media and the buffer that exists between journalists and bureaucrats.

We sat in his office, which probably has the nicest water feature outside any window I've seen (in this Shire, anyway). Sitting across the table, it occurs to me that many developers have sat here.

'There was one developer,' he reminisces, 'with something written on his hand. I couldn't see what was there but he kept glancing at it. He seemed quite tense. After the meeting, I asked another planner in the room if he saw what was written and he said it said "stay calm"!'

For most of his tenure, Mr Darney worked under a Greens-dominated Council which successfully resisted the sorts of mindless over-

development that other areas experience. Longtime residents will remember the nine-year sewage moratorium which halted development throughout the shire after population and tourism pressures literally threatened to explode the sewage treatment plants. And on the flip side, under-development in the shire has also put pressure on housing supply (high rents, house prices) and infrastructure.

Reservations

So what represents responsible planning? Mr Darney says he's happy with the way Tallowood estate in Mullum turned out 'Eric [Freeman, the developer] did a good job', but has reservations about West Byron.

'It hasn't got a lot going for it in terms of town planning,' he says of the controversial large-scale estate proposed just west of the town's CBD.

'It will take a lot of engineering and flat areas such as that are harder to develop', he says. Mr Darney did concede that the Sunrise estate, located opposite, had the same issues.

West Byron's proposed density appears to be at issue,

too; he adds that the Sydneybased NSW Planning Department that approved its rezoning is yet to confirm with him how the stages will be rolled out and why there are medium-density lot sizes conflicting with their policies (LEP and DCP).

'I'd like to see more diversity in West Byron than what we've seen,' he says.

As for a generally planning strategy, he said the shire should provide for one per cent growth, based on what he says is 'history and demographics.'

Housing

'Ideally, visual amenity is preferred for new estates,' he says, and cites Bangalow as another good example of town planning with its rolling hills and pastures.

And what of affordable housing? He shows me a recent affordable housing DA proposal for Ocean Shores, and adds that the only affordable housing in the area is probably the unapproved rural properties. As for his crowning achievements, he points to the local environment plan (LEP), development control plan (DCP) and the recent holiday letting and rural secondary

dwelling policies.

So how did Mr Darney come to be in Byron? He says, 'We moved up from Bowral in the southern highlands of NSW to be closer to family and have worked for 40 years in local government, primarily planning.' His wife Margaret works at the Ocean Shores primary school and they have three daughters and one son.

Balance

'I thought Byron Shire would be a challenge, but found it wasn't that different,' he says. Similarities with other regions include the 'lock the gate' mentality, where the balance needs to be struck between 'those wanting to provide for development and the existing residents' wishes'.

Mr Darney's plans now include golf (he's also keen on cricket) and home renovations. But he may not slip completely from public life; he says in the future he might help rural landowners resolve unapproved dwellings.

How Mr Darney's replacement influences the current majority of councillors, who appear to have no regard for strategic local planning and are pro big development, is yet to be seen.



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Ewingsdale proposal still in Council's court

Byron Shire Council's planning director has confirmed that councillors still have the power to approve or reject a contentious development proposal for Ewingsdale, despite having previously sent it to the state government for a gateway determination.

geries and a shopping mall adding to the traffic pressure along Ewingsdale Road, has been hotly opposed by existing Ewingsdale residents.

'Gateway'

Council planning director Ray Darney told *Echonetdaily* that the department of planning had introduced the so-called gateway system as 'a methodology to more precisely deal with rezoning ap-

plications which were taking, in the government's opinion, too long.

He said the process sees the state giving Council requirements for the applicant to address.

Council then seeks feedback before making a final determination.

Byron Council voted last year to place the controversial development on exhibition for a second time after

residents claimed the initial community consultations, run by the developer, were inadequate.

Mr Darney said that if Byron Shire Council decided not to proceed with the proposal 'the applicant would have to approach the state government and, in my opinion, start again.'

New climate change projections for Australia released

CSIRO and the Bureau of Meteorology last Monday released climate change projections for Australia that provide updated national and regional information on how the climate may change to the end of the 21st century.

CSIRO and Bureau researchers confirmed that most of the changes observed over recent decades will continue into the future.

'There is very high confidence that hot days will become more frequent and

hotter,' CSIRO principal research scientist Kevin Hennessy said.

'We also have very high confidence that sea levels

will rise, oceans will become more acidic, and snow depths will decline. We expect that extreme rainfall events across the nation are likely to become more intense, even where annual average rainfall is projected to decline.'

Ocean Shores residents oppose Telstra tower

A core group of Ocean Shores residents is expecting many more home owners and parents to rally support behind a campaign to stop Telsta building a 31metre phone tower within 500 metres of homes and schools.

Ocean Shores Tower Action Group (OSTAG) will host a public forum at Ocean Shores Primary School Hall at 6pm on Thursday January 29 to outline what it sees as the dangers of a phone tower on the proposed site between Flinders Way and Player Parade. Guest speakers will outline some of the risks posed by the tower, which include health risks from electromagnetic radiation, increased fire risk, increased exposure for school and pre-school children and negative impact on land values.

According to OSTAG spokesperson, Ray Musgrave, the public meeting will offer a



schools. It has a "preference for a distance of at least 500 metres" from the boundary of a school. I'm sure parents will want to take this just as seriously as the Department does.'

Other options

Several other possible locations have been suggested to Telstra. OSTAG is concerned that the review of alternative sites has been conducted by Telstra, rather than by an independent body. 'While we accept the need for improved communication, there is enough scientific evidence of potential adverse health effects for our community to call on Telstra to find a safer location well away from houses and schools,' Mr Musgrave said. 'Unlike mobile phones, phone towers emit radiation 24/7. If you live, work, or go to school close to one of these towers you'll be exposed to a constant dose of electromagnetic radiation.

Byron woman killed in fall

Police from Tweed/Byron LAC are preparing a report for the coroner after a 26-year-old Byron Bay woman died in an accident at a rural property on Tunnel Road, Billinudgel, on Sunday afternoon (January 25).

Witnesses told police that, at about 3.30pm, she attempted to use a flying fox that had been erected on the property but, after travelling only a short distance, fell seven metres from it to the ground.

The woman sustained serious injuries to her upper body. Resuscitation was commenced on her but she died at the scene.

The woman's name has not yet been released.

Submissions to the committee considering the 'Let's Fix the Whistleblowers, Journalists and Pirates for Good' government rort, also known as the Telecommunications (Interception and Access) Amendment (Data Retention) Bill 2014, have now closed.

According to the government website 129 submissions had been processed by the beginning of this week. About a dozen are from police and security forces salivating at the thought of warrantless surveillance of the populace, another dozen are from watchdog groups and most of the rest are citizens registering their opposition.

Spawned by the notorious grub Brandis and his murky security agencies, the bill seeks to retain the metadata relating to your electronic communications and make them available to all kinds of creatures who scuttle in the dark.

Spooks admit that access to metadata has not prevented any acts of terrorism, so the real reason for the bill is to prevent the proper examination of government by making whistleblowing difficult and dangerous, and by cowing any journalist who wants to write about incompetence or corruption within the security agencies. (Or for that matter any government department: as The Guardian discovered last week, directly reporting on asylum-seekers instead of repeating the immigration minister's spin leads to the AFP investigating your sources.)

Another aspect of forcing internet providers to collect information on us is to appease the foreign monopolies who arbitrarily charge Australians much more for downloads than their other customers, and then cry'intellectual property theft' if you try to level the playing field.

Increasing unnecessary controls on citizens, as this bill seeks to do, is for the benefit of power-hungry spy organisations, greedy corporations and scrutiny-shy politicians. It is setting up police-state mechanisms which could be used to stifle people's free speech, rather than protect their physical safety.

There are public hearings in Canberra on Thursday and Friday this week. This bill is an evil piece of work and the more citizens who tell the government so, the better!

WorkChoices ghost stalks the land

t's back!!! After more than seven years in exile, the malign spirit of Work-Choices is once again stalking the land.

Actually it never really went away: Tony Abbott said repeatedly that the policy was dead, buried and cremated but somehow its stubborn ghost has remained unlaid.

Abbott has himself mused, unwisely, that WorkChoices was not all bad. His right-wing warriors have been more direct; in the parliament, in the business community and in the media they have spruiked for at least some aspects of it to be resurrected. And for the unions and their allies, the mere mention of the words 'labour market reform' is enough to raise the spectre in its fearsome entirety.

The boss of the Productivity Commission, Peter Harris, knows the monster he has unleashed: he insists that he is interested in busting the myths, and that WorkChoices has been done in 2012 - although its demise really came straight after the 2007 election. 'We're not here to do it again,' he insists somewhat plaintively. 'We're here instead to examine the effectiveness of the system in terms.'

Well, perhaps: but the immediate reaction of the players was that if it walks like a duck and quacks like a duck, it is unlikely to resemble a pet budgerigar. Indeed, it is far more probably a predatory vulture in camouflage.

And it must be said that the Commission's own items for consideration tend to confirm the view. At the top of the list are the minimum wage, penalty rates and unfair-dismissal laws. Let's face it, would be remarkable indeed if the Commission's review recommended increases in the rates of the first two and the untrammelled retention of the third. And beyond them is the threat of tinkering with enterprise bargaining and the furthering of individual contracts. This program is potentially very radical indeed; if it is not literally WorkChoices, it is a bloody good imitation of it.

According to the employers, this is as it is meant to be. And many, if not most, con-

servatives agree: it's a no-brainer. Cutting wages and conditions leads to more jobs, end of story.

Well, up to a point; taken to its logical conclusion this chain of reasoning leads to universal slavery, thus providing work for all, whether they want it or not. But not even the free-market zealots of the Institute of Public Affairs are advocating that - at least not in public, not yet.

There has to be a recognition that the jobs do not entail abject poverty, and this has been the view in Australia since 1907.

In that year Justice Henry Higgins in the newly formed Commonwealth Conciliation and Arbitration Tribunal laid down what he termed the basic wage as 'the normal needs of the average employee regarded as a human being in a civilised community'. And, importantly, he emphasised that this was not to be determined on the profits of the employer.

In those days it was taken for granted that the average employee was a man with a non-working family. These

days the minimum wage of \$18.70 an hour is not generally considered sustainable, to use one of Abbott's favourite words, to support a whole family without a second income or supplementary assistance. Nonetheless, the pressure is on to reduce it further.

And as for penalty rates in 2015 people eat and drink, shop and pay for entertainment all week and on holidays; why should the employers have to pay their workers extra to accommodate them? True, it

works for the customers but that is just the point. The customers go out at weekends and holidays because they can - because those are their days off. The vast majority still work five days a week; they include most factory workers and office workers and just about all students.

Clocking in at weekends and holidays is not the norm, and is not likely to be for a very long time.

Those who are required or choose - to work during those hours expect to suffer a disadvantage, and therefore expect compensation. Abbott thinks this is unreasonable: 'If you don't want to work on a weekend, fair enough; don't work on a weekend,' he advises somewhat smugly. But it isn't as simple as that: in many businesses both big and small the staff are expected, demanded, to follow the rosters set by the boss. And if they don't, my way or the highway. This applies particularly to so-called 'permanent casuals', who have no choice at all.

Abbott complains that the Melbourne hotel in which he stays has closed its dining room on Sundays because of penalty rates. Well, perhaps if the owners don't want to pay to open on Sundays, fair enough; don't open on Sundays. And it is worth remembering that the profit share of the economy continues to rise with or without penalty rates. Abbott can choose from plenty of other establishments to indulge his culinary preferences.



Queensland election - Campbell Newman was not amused) until the Commission's deadline in November. Then Abbott and his ministers will have to decide what to do with it, and on present indications it will not be pretty as they seek a new mandate in 2016.

If they squib it on the recommendations, they will be excoriated as gutless by business and its factional warriors, but unless Abbott have regained a lot of political capital in the coming year, they will have no choice: the alternative would be a reprise of Howard's suicide pact of 2007. And in any case, running dead would probably not help; when it comes to election promises Abbott has form, and Labor will constantly tell the voters that he has another hidden, savage agenda ready if he is re-elected.

Abbott has, belatedly, redeemed one pledge from 2013: he has set up the Productivity Commission inquiry. And this may well turn out to be yet another promise that will end in tears and recriminations.

The rail study did not even include the 4.5 million regional tourists in its modelling and is simply not credible, so it's a bit rich for Mr Page to be claiming rail does not meet the community's needs.

Again Mr Page falsely claims the rail study was 'independent'. That is certainly what the Nationals promised; however, after community uproar over the very limited terms of reference, Mr Page

However, the number of koalas killed on the road is only part of the problem; associated koala mortalities increase the catastrophic impact of construction.

At the landscape level, koalas are displaced. Vegetation clearance results in koalas spending more time on the ground and therefore increases their vulnerability to predation. There's also the ever-present risk of disease, the stress of displacement often triggering clinical chlamydia and sometimes retrovirus. Once the upgrades are operational, koala road-kill regrettably continues and the highway itself is a barrier to koala movement. Friends of the Koala acknowledges that research into the design and implementation of environmentally sensitive roads and other linear infrastructure is ongoing. It has to be said, though, well-informed ecological assessments at the out-

set minimise the chances of understating the importance of some areas for koalas.

While koala populations were well known and their importance intuitively understood by some, nothing had been published.

The science is well documented now. Indeed, it may not be possible to meet the federal minister's conditions of consent relating to the koala. RMS is between a rock and a very hard place. EDEN AT BYRON

Beat the Heat. Keep your garden looking great in the heat. Herbs such as rosemary, oregano, marjoram, thyme and basil don't really care how hot it gets. Coriander and dill will go to seed more quickly in summer, so plant them in semishade.

Loose-leaf varieties of lettuce are more heat tolerant than hearting ones, so plant mignonette or oak-leaf types. Grow them in semi-shade, and replant every few weeks to ensure a continuous supply. Mulch herbs and veges with lucerne - it feeds the soil as it breaks down

'Eat dirt and bless it'

An app a day

'Oh, Oh, Oh merry Christmas - weight... there's more!' If you're anything like me, you'll have some extra kilos on after the silly season - it's inevitable, and even though I eat to work, December and January hold particularly dangerous times for my waist. This year, I did two things to research away the fat - I turned to the internet and I found an app to guide me and a paleo evangelist who knows a lot about the popular lifestyle diet.

First it was the app store that provided me with a kilojoule counter that's about to make a difference in my losing the unwanted flab. Myfitnesspal is the app to download. It's free and a comprehensive knuckle slapper that keeps me muzzled and off the emotional eating roundabout (and that's just my job). I've been using it now for two weeks and my goal weight is approaching rapidly. With or without technology for help, the notion of using a special diet, a calorie/ kilojoule counter or an eating philosophy, the likes of the 5:2 diet, to maintain weight, balance and health, is a popular one.

Personally I feel that most dietary neurosis is just that. To me, it's consideration that's vital - how you consider something will affect you the premise of your belief. More information comes flying out of the internet than we need in any one day. We're told by experts that this and that may cause this and that and the resulting knee-jerk reactions are, at times, bias, and unfounded.

One of the simplest philosophical statements I've heard in my lifetime is 'eat dirt and bless it'; in a food sense, it means if you think it's good for you - it will be. Conversely, if you think it's evil, well... you get my drift. I apply this saying to many things in my life – after all if you're creative then you can create and draw things to you that you don't need just as easily as those things that benefit you.

a skewed perception of this lifestyle diet as I found out recently. It has a big following and, like all popular subjects, it has its critics. I went hunting, hoping to gather a little bit of extra knowledge on this diet.

Irena Macri is a full-time recipe developer, cookbook author, amateur food photographer and a self-proclaimed web geek. When not travelling the world or hiking

through the bush, she could be found in her small kitchen in London or Sydney or in a local cafe typing away the latest post. This is the introduction to Irey (as she likes to be known) that you'll find in the opening paragraphs of her globally popular website, eatdrinkpaleo.com.au.

I had the pleasure of meeting with the champion of paleo foods in person recently in a local cafe in Brunswick Heads. She's currently in Australia promoting her new book, the Eat Drink Paleo Cookbook.

Irey started her website Eat Drink Paleo in 2012 and has gone from strength to strength with the concept diet. 'The website was my opportunity to provide inspiration and tools to people who want to achieve better health and wellbeing through paleo primal nutrition and lifestyle. I also wanted to showcase the diversity of the paleo diet, using fresh produce and flavours inspired by many cultures and cuisines; and to help unleash that magical passion in the kitchen,' Irey said.

Paleo has recently received some damming press regarding its basic principles. Irey has the good oil from the pro side of the paleo debate on why she believes these detractors are getting the idea twisted a tad.



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That the caveman died young

Irey: 'We don't know exactly how long the caveman lived. It's more a case of environmental issues, death by accident, dangers of this time, etc. Paleo is not about mimicking the caveman. The name, as a derivative of the term Palaeolithic, confuses the issues and people at times. It's really about taking cues from our hunter-gatherer ancestors. It looks at the ways that we thrived during this period, what we ate and the lifestyle; that knowledge, combined with the latest research and studies, then forms the basis of the paleo diet.'

That paleo is a fad Irey: 'As a movement, it's

been around for the past ten

years. People have been eating paleo for years – it's a new nutritional pillar. Omnivore, vegetarian, vegan, raw food, and paleo - it's lifestyle choice. People who learn about paleo generally are in it for the long haul. People adapt it and tailor it to suit their needs, as it is flexible. In all dietary systems there are the purists, the police, and the extremists. It's easier to follow the rules, the framework - but those folk that are smart take bits and pieces from the best things available in life.

TRAVEL

That it's always low or no carb

Irey: 'Much of the time it is lower in carbohydrates but this is by default. There are still plenty of carbohydrates in the paleo diet. Active folk of course can eat more carbs rather than someone who may be sedentary and therefore require fewer carbs. My partner and I don't really worry that much about this; we have some occasional rice and other things that we think we would like to eat. it's a no-brainer really.

That paleo dishes are bland and boring

Irey: 'I spend a lot of time creating fresh and beautiful recipes that are nothing like bland or boring, and if you don't believe me then you can see for yourself - go to my website. I have more than one hundred creative colourful and tasty recipes waiting to correct this misconception.'

That paleo is nutritionally deficient

Irey: 'Like the saturated-fat debate, misinformation regarding this primary dietary principal has been recently exposed as quite wrong – we need fats; paleo concentrates on nutrient-dense foods, foods that are less inflammatory. The result is that you end up absorbing more nutrients from your foods as your gut health improves and is in better condition.

'Variety is the key to nutritional balance and any diet that's heavy and one-sided will naturally be unbalanced. Too much of anything is not going to be great, while mod-

eration and variety are the ticket.' she added.

Getting grilled on where to eat

People often ask me where they can take their visiting friends and relatives for a good meal around town. Locals too are looking for unusual digs to eat in and enjoy. There are so many options – some close, some a drive – but when it comes to eating out, for me, a night out is always going to be helped along with some fun stuff added.

Recently I discovered that the popular staple of Brazil, the churrasco barbecue, was being served on a Friday night and right under our noses in Byron Bay. This is fun dining in the true sense of the word. It's entertaining, it's all-youcan-eat, it's particularly good here and it has energy about it. Where? The Belongil Bistro - but don't take my omnivorous Aussie word for it - I invited a Brazilian national along to do the critiquing and to get me up to speed on this Latin American fiesta.

First a little bit of background on the churrasco itself. In Brazil, churrasco is a term that simply means barbecue (similar to the Argentine, Uruguayan, Paraguayan and Chilean) and originating in southern Brazil. It uses a variety of meats - pork, sausage and chicken which, in this case at the Belongil Bistro, is cooked on a purpose-built machine that uses charcoal, commonly known as a 'churrasqueira' - a barbecue grill, with supports for spits and skewers.

Rescue, rehabilitation, release

There's nothing like a good bit of irony – if you know me,

Lift me up

you'll know that I love the twist in a phrase, the double entendre. When I recently tried the meaty goodness of this churrasco barbeque, my plus-one was a marine biologist, Ivan Gentil, also indigenous to Brazil. While hungrily smiling at a gigantic skewered chunk of picanha (every Brazilian lad loves this flagship cut of meat), Ivan told me that he's involved in the rescue, rehabilitation and release of animals caught up in the ever-growing sideeffects of human habitats. I couldn't help but giggle at the paradox of this scenario. I thought to myself that he could do a whole day's work simply by refraining from eating his country's signature

favourite – the Churrasco. All jokes aside though, that's what he does for a crust; my job, on the other hand, is to discern what foods are good and what foods are great and who to waste those precious kilojoules on.

Belongil Bistro has really got it going on here on Friday nights. If you hate exciting energetic atmospheres, and really despise quality, wellcooked meats and seafood, and can't abide a fun service; if all-you-can-eat menus give you the heebie-jeebies, then don't read any further...

For all others; you should try this concept immediately.

Not an ideal 'meet' for everyone

I need to state clearly that this is not a good choice for a vegan or vegetarian to make. Although I had some of the best vegetables I've had offered me in a long while as part of this churrasco, the

set \$49 per head cover price, however, would irritate anyone who wasn't an omnivore. The value on offer here you can't refute, though. It's a relief to relax and have the good stuff keep coming without the constraint of price and decisions that require too much brain drain. Skewers of Jacks Creek grass-fed rump nicely salted; Bangalow pork; skilfully cooked lamb; chicken wrapped in bacon; king prawns; all basted in interesting glazes; skewered kranski and some wonderful side dishes to complement the whole affair.

According to my Brazilian guest, this churrasco was well researched and presented. The side dishes he went on to say are very authentic with the things a Brazilian demands, such as cassava chips, black beans and fried bananas, that we like to have at these barbecues. The Picanha served here is fantastic and if it weren't on the menu, it wouldn't be a proper churrasco, he added.

Christian Poulsen – no novice

I've had a fabulous breakfast at Belongil Bistro too and love the atmosphere and the come-as-you-are feel of the place. The owner, Christian Poulsen, is an industry veteran and is clearly no novice where the ins and outs of Byron Bay and the hospitality industry are concerned. After looking after St Elmo in Byron Bay for a year and a half and influencing its menus and service, the owners of St Elmo asked that he do another project for them (which I'm writing about in these very pages): he was asked to create Targa cafe/restaurant. The brief was to create a traditional Italian eatery from

the ground up, he said. This all went well and appears to be working soundly for its current owners too. The next move was over to the Beach Cafe as operations manager for a year before seeking to open his own place. This gig now is solely his. Belongil Bistro has a tasteful fit out. The decor, the style, the textures - rough, colourful, tactile - all come together to create a comfortable setting in what could be an otherwise pedestrian looking building.

'A customer of ours suggested the idea of a churrasco barbecue in Byron; there's a wave of popularity for this style of dining going on at the moment. So, I started investigating the idea, taking all the good things out of the concept to use here. We began looking for a machine that used charcoal for the purposes of the barbecue – which we found. All in all we wanted to acknowledge the traditional elements of churrasco and at the same time incorporate the things we do really well – our repertoire. The picanha cut we've taken from the Jacks Creek rump and we use other quality meats the likes of Bangalow pork etc – being mindful of where our produce is sourced, Christian told me.

Meeting expectations

This sort of concept dining is at the difficult end of the service spectrum. It involves a smart and intuitive staff to get the courses returning to the punters in just the right amount of time. While we enjoyed the food here, the service was extremely competent. 'There is no pride without dignity,' Christian

told me, and added, 'expectations work both ways, so I like all my customers to know that if we make a mistake then we pride ourselves on the opportunity to rectify that mistake. We take comfort and satisfaction from our customers' comfort and satisfaction; it's one of the core priorities at Belongil Bistro.'

If you're an omnivore with a big hunger, then make no mistake, this churrasco at the Belongil Bistro is the bomb.

Just desserts

Sometimes I'll crave a sweet treat, a pick-me-up. This is when I go looking for something special to blow the kilojoules on. So, if it's just dessert, firstly you need an eatery that's fine with your walking in and ordering their dessert menu. Apart from any good dessert made from chocolate and a really well made crème

brûlée, tiramisu would have to be one of my favourite sweets. It literally means 'to lift me up' and, when made well, this is exactly what it does light, whipped mascarpone and coffee flavours - yum. I've eaten this Italian staple in some snazzy settings - Buon Ricordo in Paddington, with Armando Percuoco's recipe. I've had it down at Beppi Polese's famous restaurant, Beppi's in East Sydney, and I've tried countless variations of this fluffy, moist delight.

A sweet reward from Targa

There's only one example of tiramisu that I believe, so far, surpasses them all. I've ordered tiramisu at the Targa cafe restaurant in Byron Bay three times now and each time was separated by months and every time it was sensational – my expectations were met without fault.

The Targa tiramisu test

Silvana: 'Firstly, the coffee [at Targa] here is as good as the coffee I drink when I'm in Naples. My tiramisu I've been making for more than twenty years and the Targa tiramisu is absolutely fabulous and by far the second best I've

tried - of course mine's the best. I love the flavour of the sambucca they use in theirs definitely a great example of this dessert.'

Tiramisu literally means 'to lift me up' and I just love eateries that can do this to me. I know that if I need a pickme-up, I can race into Targa for a glass filled with joy.

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BIG ALBUM FOR A LITTLE PROVINCE

AFTER FIVE YEARS OF PLAYING TOGETHER, LOCAL LADS **A LITTLE PROVINCE** HAVE RELEASED THEIR DEBUT SELF-TITLED ALBUM.

Band member Rohan Orenshaw believed the recording process very much reflected the band's work ethic – spontaneous, energetic and prolific. 'There wasn't any primary vision to begin with,' he said, 'because we are always jamming – at least one or two times a week. We come up with songs and on the album we ended up choosing a collaboration of the songs that we think work best live.'

Recorded over four sessions at Brisbane's

Studio 108 with producer Adrian Moriconni, the boys approached each session a lot like their jams.

'We were lucky that when we got to the studio a lot of things happened on the spot! I guess it was a bit of spontaneous magic!'

While three of the four members of A Little Province hail from Bellingen, it wasn't until they moved to the local region that they hooked up and started playing together.

'Three of us were from Bellingen Shire and one from sunny coast,' said Rohan, 'but we didn't really know each other that well in Bello. We all came up here for uni in Lismore and started jamming and it happened, and then we got more serious with the gear and then it evolved into Little Province.'

The band have developed a pretty dynamic musical relationship.

'If anyone of has a riff or a line or a lyric, we get in the jam room and jam around it and then put structure around it; other times we jam and the song comes out! It's definitely unpredictable; you get in there and bounce off each other.

Abe the drummer will stop the feel or drop it down and build it back up. We have a lot of natural drops. It's kind of what defines our music.

'After five years of playing together we have definitely got used to each other's styles of playing.'

Rohan plays electric violin and electric mandolin. 'My melodies soar,' admits Yosir's guitar. 'I have my stand-outs and lots of harmony melodies as well.'

Yosir plays guitar and is responsible for so much of the chunky rhythmic melodic guitar

that is the backbone of the whole sound of A Little Province. 'Drummer/singer Abe – well he's just really angelic – he has that sort of energy that I don't know how to explain – but he's a bit of a spectacle, the drummer/singer is such a wow factor and he has such a great voice. And Rhys Edwards is the guy from the sunny coast; he has a good ear for all music in general and apart from that when he is on stage he does these crazy big moves, rocks in front of the crowd... you've got to see him!'

The self-titled album has been 18 months in the making and is a testament to how hard A Little Province has been working. It is complete with all the idiosyncrasies we have come to expect, including inspiring lyrics, undeniable dance grooves, and complex melodic tapestries that work.

music – I am all about setting a new tone, to be part of the current day. That's part of my goal, just doing my interpretations of what I have learned from other musicians.'

One of Trombone Shorty's greatest teachers has been Dr John. Not everyone has one of music's greats sitting on their porch.

'Dr John was a great friend of my grandfather Jessie; he is like an uncle. He comes over to my grandmother's house and I have a chance to play with him. He tells me a lot of stories about my family members before I was born. No-one approaches music like him – he embodies New Orleans even with his language; sometimes he says stuff and I don't know what he's said!'

The trombone is an unlikely instrument even for the most likely musician. 'It's one of the most difficult instruments to play,' says Troy. 'You look at a guitar and you can put your finger on a fret. With a trombone it was always challenging because there is a slide and you have to be very accurate to not create a strange sound. For me that is intriguing and I guess when I am playing that's where the magic is – when it becomes spiritual, when my body, my hand and my mind become one. Music is its own language.'

is a very very soulful city. Music is the heartbeat. I think it's unique because it's a place where we celebrate and have fun. We celebrate life, and everyone here just says Hello to me when I walk down the street. You can drive down any street and see people playing music. Every five blocks there is some type of music being created. I can't put what that feels like into words, but I am so happy to be part of

In fact there's this breathtaking image of him as a little boy in a parade full of adults playing a trombone thats probably double his size. For Troy this is normal.

'In New Orleans we have a lot of musical families!' he says. 'If I hadn't played music I would have been an outcast. My brothers are musicians, my cousins, my grandfather; they would all be round the house playing music and jamming and I'd be playing sounds. When music is that dominant you are always interested.'

New Orleans seems to inspire this type of musicality. 'There's always a kid in the street marching,' says Troy. 'New Orleans that. Nothing takes them down here. No matter how poorly people are doing, New Orleans is the realest place you will have ever been. Here life is life and we want to celebrate it. Everyone here has a story!'

Troy fronts Trombone Shorty & Orleans Avenue, a funk/rock/jazz/hip-hop band. His newest album, *Say That to This* was released in 2013 and features funk/jazz elements of New Orleans.

'Basically what I am trying to communicate is the good times playing in the streets and all the rhythms that I have heard, from my playing with Dr John (a family friend), the street parades, and everything that I am falling into now – you can hear the timeline through my Trombone Shorty is a featured musician along with Orleans Avenue at **Bluesfest** this year. WILD

In popular culture, the road trip (or in this case, hiking trip) is synonymous with a journey of self-discovery. The road that Cheryl Strayed (Reese Witherspoon) follows, on her own and on foot, is the thousand-mile Pacific Coast Trail.

Based on Strayed's memoir and written for the screen by the prolific Nick Hornby (who has a knack for getting to the heart of the matter), Jean-Marc Vallée has followed up his *Dallas Buyers' Club* with a film that takes compassion as its guiding star and finds battered but unbowed spirit in the warts-and-all portrait of a woman coming to terms with how she got to be the person she is.

Still raw after the break-up of her marriage and devastated by the loss of her mother, Cheryl sets out on her trek not even certain within herself what her goal might be – other than to make it to the end. Drug use and promiscuity had neither eased nor exacerbated her longing, so it is in the great outdoors that she seeks solace.

Her story is told in frequent flashbacks, the most significant of which reveal her childhood and the close relationship that she had with her doting mother (Laura Dern) – some of the movie's most touching moments are when Cheryl, fretful and exhausted from her exertions, feels the presence of her mother, literally and in the form of a fox. We are forever enmeshed in our own history, and it cannot be rewritten. Learning that we might be able to accept it without regret and understanding that resignation need not be defeatist is a reward of infinite bounty.

Witherspoon is fantastic in a role that is both emotionally and physically demanding, Vallée's choice of music – Simon and Garfunkel's *El Condor Pasa* and *Homeward Bound*– adds incredible poignancy to Cheryl's solitary, inner exploration, while Yves Bélanger's camera captures some breathtaking images of the US west coast hinterland. A gem of a movie, in which Cheryl discovers that 'you can never prepare for the expected'.

UNBROKEN

I missed Angelina Jolie's *In The Land Of Blood And Honey* (2011), but if it was

as bad as reports suggest, this second effort might at least get a tick for being an improvement. Otherwise, it is fair to say that it's on the nose as well.

Louis Zamperini (Jack O'Connell) was an American Olympian. He ran at the 1936 Berlin Games, joined the Air Force when WWII broke out, crashed into the Pacific with the rest of his bombing crew and, as a prisoner of war, endured inhumane treatment at the hands of his Japanese captors.

The Coen brothers, noted for their often quirky (if not to say indulgent) stories, are two of the four credited screenwriters, but one can only surmise that they were out to lunch when the script was being drafted, for it is jam-packed with every boy's own horrorshow cliché – and then some.

The opening sequence, of an air fight, is brilliantly shot, but then we get the standard time jump to Louis's youth (for a minute I thought I was watching a re-run of *Forest Gump*), followed by a terribly long Act 2 in which Louis and a couple of other survivors are adrift in a dinghy, and then the even longer incarceration in the PoW camp. The shark-infested former is drearier than the actual experience must have been and the latter is just one cruelty after another. Talk about sadism – Watanabe (Takamasa Ishihara) makes ISIL and Boko Haram look like the Muppets on a picnic.

By the time poor old Louis was receiving his umpteenth whack in the head with a bamboo truncheon, I wanted to cry out 'enough, Ange! Enough!' And that's all there is to it. If there is any surprise at all, it is that Ishihara is a handsome young man who in another movie might have been the 'good Jap'. With 2015 being the centenary of Gallipoli, we can only expect more of this dumb and ugly exploitation of the tragedy of war.

A PLACE OF DREAMS

Place of Dreams is an exhibition of paintings and monotypes by **Robert Ryan** that runs until the 4 February, 2015 at **Lone Goat Gallery** in Byron.

The title references the very 'idea' of Byron Bay. For those who move here – the search for a better, less complicated life. However, even the most simple things are surprisingly complicated upon closer inspection. For example, the painting Subdivisions No. 2, in its size and detail, symbolises the controversy, passion, and political intrigue dominating the debate about the West Byron development.

Great effort has been made in representing each house and its occupants in an individual way reflecting the diverse demographic of the north coast. Songlines are in danger of being obscured, which is a sober reminder of the challenges faced by the original people.

This exhibition is a visual response to the general zeitgeist of the times, and in some cases, a relaxed reminder of just how good it can be simply living here.
