Youth discarded by state, fed govts

The alarming trend throughout wealthy western countries to axe essential services that assist the most vulnerable is now hitting Byron Shire.

For 26 years, Byron Youth Service (BYS) has run programs, courses, events and activities which have nurtured talent and provided life skills for young people.

With a meagre budget and dedicated staff, they have supported the area's young adults by offering alternatives to binge drinking and drugs.

They have provided mentorship and guidance.

But funding cuts by both state and federal governments now threaten their ability to provide these services.

'We are now in crisis time,' says youth worker Deb Pearse, 'and it's down to the wire?

One of Deb's many jobs is running five groups a week, both for boys and girls, out of The Cottage in Mullumbimby. She says because of government funding cuts, she is the sole worker at The Cottage, where she provides individual support and case management, runs programs and activities and liaises with the school, families and the community.

'At The Cottage I try to work with other agencies as much as possible, but it's hard. There are lots of changes and restrictions happening, so we all have to work our way around them to actually do what we do.

'I take drug and alcohol sessions with all my groups, with an Intra

worker from the Buttery outreach service, and Tweed Sexual Health Service for sessions on sexual health.

'Ideally we would love to have the funding for co-facilitators; it has been the most productive model until this year. All groups also have a meal together at The Cottage; this adds to costs but is essential for participants who, more often that not, haven't had breakfast.

Street Cruise reduced

Outreach program Street Cruise provides early prevention and assistance for young people on Byron's streets where binge drinking, vandalism and violence may occur.

And while young people, police, businesses and the community generally speak highly of the service, it has been reduced to just a Friday night service. Deb says, 'Our best model for this program is a Friday and Saturday night service, as well as during festivals, holiday periods and special events.

So what else has been lost?

According to Stephanie Sims from BYS, Links to Learning is gone, which included hospitality, events management and fashion courses.

They were funded by the state government. Stephanie says, 'They were aimed at kids who were not working or at school.

'They were accredited and they were free.' Another vital service which is about to end is the federally funded Youth Connections. Deb says, 'Youth Connections worked with young people at risk continued on page 2 >

Diesel train plan meets opposition

Sunrise residents in Byron Bay say they have significant concerns with plans to run a World War II heritage diesel train from the North Byron Beach resort into Byron's CBD.

Among those concerns is that it will be an exclusive service for the operator's patrons, owing to only a two-way station being constructed.

The soon-to-be restored train will be operated by Elements Of Byron, a new boutique villa resort which is being developed on the North Byron Beach Resort at the end of Bayshore Drive.

The rudimentary website for

Elements Of Byron claims the resort will be Byron's 'first world-class beachfront resort.

The Echo previously reported that the 3.4km railway project will come in just under \$1m, according to the resort's manager Jeremy Holmes.

At the time he said the 100-seater two-car currently being restored is, 'Technically not light rail, but is regarded as lighter than normal rail.

A one-way passenger fare will be approximately \$3, and the project is expected to be completed later this year. In December 2013, Council

voted unanimously to support the project, which is under state government jurisdiction. It also gained the support of Trains On Our Track (TOOT). And with the physical work expected to start in August, Elements Of Byron recently posted a letter to residents in the area.

Frequency of service yet to be determined

It stated that frequency of the service is yet to be determined; however, will be based around demand. continued on page 5 ►

of disengaging or who have disengaged from school. It helped through the provision of activities, girls' and boys' groups, case management, referral, liaison, school and family support, individual support or any matters pertaining to enhancing their quality of life.

Additionally a similar federally funded program called Youth Enterprise will finish after its funding runs out at the end of June. 'Youth Enterprise provided programs for young people struggling to remain engaged at school or out of school and interested in learning new skills through Trail Blazers, creative catering, creative girls' group, Rock the YAC, SNAP photography competition, and assisted them with work placements.'

Buildings at stake

Deb says, 'The buildings are under threat in the sense that if BYS closes its doors and can no longer operate, I can't imagine anyone is going to let either of those building sit empty for long.

'Council own The Cottage, so it would go back to them, and the state government owns Byron's Youth Activities Centre (YAC).

'A few years ago, they tried to zone The Cottage as residential and we had a bit of hooha to keep it. Currently I have a lease there until 2017, but we have to have the funds to keep running programs.'

Learn, earn or go hungry

Deb explains that similar services help young adults at risk, many of which have been slashed or merged. 'Under the "learn or earn" policy, young people receive nothing if they're not at school, alternative education or working. Byron Emergency Accommodation Project (BEAP) has merged with the Tweed Family Centre and now operates differently. 'But it only takes those who are over 18 years old.

'The Youth House has also been "absorbed" into the Tweed Family Centre, and now only has two beds they can use. It used to be five.

'And it's a very slow turnover and is in Ballina. There are no rentals there at the moment.

'As for support, there are BYS workers, school counsellors, Reconnect (which also covers Ballina these days, I believe) and then there are professional counsellors, psychologists and psychiatrists, which most people can't afford.'

Options if leaving home

'If kids leave home really there's nothing, especially in the north. They mainly couch surf. Links to Learning is finished, Youth Connections is finished and Youth Enterprise will finish its funding at the end of June. They were all great programs.

All in all it's a sad and sorry picture; even young people who are at risk and unsupported financially at home find it very hard to get benefits. Usually I have to advocate strongly for them just to keep them safe.

'All the workers that are left in any of the services are working so hard for the same or less money. BYS are down to three core workers. That's bad... we have to work our arses off let me tell you. Luckily I love the kids, I love my job and I really don't want to lose it.'

And luckily, a crowdfunding effort is underway to raise funding for The Cottage and Street Cruise.

Major sponsors such as successful local businesses or philanthropists are urgently needed to step up to provide the cash to ensure essential programs can continue, and that young kids at risk have a safe place to go.

Triathlon brings in the crowds, traffic delays

While glorious sunshine greeted more than 1,000 people who took part in the Byron Bay Triathlon on Saturday, long delays, lack of signage, dangerous driving and seemingly uncoordinated traffic control were just some of the complaints The Echo received about the event.

Bangalow and Broken Head roads were closed in both directions for almost four hours to enable the 20th-anniversary event to go

ahead, with just short stints for local traffic to cross.

Just four police were scheduled on to provide escorts for a host of needs, including a wedding party, sporting teams and a doctor, despite the event attracting 1,100 participants.

Echo video reporter Sharon Shostak said she saw a few incidents as temperfrayed drivers attempted to escape the maddening traffic.

'One man tried to do a Uturn in an already-crowded street as soon as it was opened for traffic, which simply created another roadblock that jammed up traffic further,' she said.

But Byron Bay Triathlon organiser Mike Crawley told *The Echo* that road closures were an inevitable part of any such event, and that ultimately the residents just had to get used to it.

Mr Crawley said his organisation abided by its traffic management plan, which had been approved by Byron Shire Council, and the traffic management was done by a 'reputable business' [JHA] not by the SES.

Mr Crawley said that ultimately the pain produced gain for Byron Bay and its residents, or at least its businesses. 'The event generates a significant number of tourists for the weekend and the week prior and a sizeable economic return for the overall Byron Shire. That's proven through external research that's conducted every two years.'

Resort's diesel train plans raise concerns

They wrote, 'Once we start operating we encourage residents to contact us to suggest operating times that would be suitable to them?

Some fencing of the track will be undertaken, and the train will be 'relatively quiet at the speeds it will operate... There will be a suburban whistle used at Kendall Street level crossing.

Project manager Jermey Holmes confirmed with The Echo that pollution levels were not submitted as part of the DA to the state government, and that a storage facility for the diesel fuel, 'is yet to be determined.

He says the train will travel 'between 10 and 60km/h [as there will be] different speeds at different sections of the track.

No formal submissions

As for public submissions for the overall project, Mr Holmes said, 'There was not a formal public submission period as a part of our state government application.

'We understand that consultation is a two way street. Our public information sessions - private site tours for the general public - were extensively advertised in July and December 2013. The community came and met with me and Peggy, asked questions and gave us feedback, both written and verbal.

'Our newsletters and website make it clear that we need to hear feedback to improve our operations. Our contact details are readily available, as are we?

Residents' group formed

Meanwhile Lee Cass spoke on behalf of a recently formed residents' group which aims to inform residents about the rail.

'This train service will affect everyone,' he told The Echo.

'There may be problems with diesel particulate contamination, owing to the old technology 1940-1970 diesel motor.'

Also Mr Cass claimed that contrary to the resort's claims, the frequency of operation has been indicated to him by management as two trips per hour, 8am to 10pm, seven days per week from Sunrise to Byron.

'This equates to 48 trips per day,' Mr Cass said. 'This is quite different from two trips per day in total, prior to the track's closure in April 2004.

'They certainly didn't take a survey to ask residents what use of a train they may need because there has been very little community consultation.

'That is the proof there has been little community consultation.

'Any business that was providing "public rail" would have pages of consultant's findings on the viability of a rail system. Usage and then a timetable would be high priority. They have not done this because the rail is for transport for the resort and bistro customers, not

for residents of Byron Bay.

The Elements Of Byron have, however, provided to *The Echo* a community consultation 'log' of newsletters, media releases, an advertising schedule, public meetings and extensive media coverage. But Mr Cass remains unconvinced.

'There will be noise from steel wheels on steel tracks, noise from braking on steel wheels, noise from horn warning every 15 minutes at the Kendall Street crossing and noise from the diesel engines. The dirty diesel will have to be stored somewhere too.

'There is no mention of EPA rail operations guidelines in a current DA which is only about rail platforms and buildings.'

He also says that community consultation has been inadequate. 'The meetings held were just to tell us what they are going to do and were not about giving feedback. This is being marketed as community transport; however, this is actually about transporting patrons and guests from their private property into town.

Won't relieve traffic

'There are only two stations planned: one their end and one in town. I can't see locals using this service as the distance is too short, and the price will be too high for families to use.

'This won't relieve Byron's traffic congestion one bit.

As for the recent letter to residents, he says many likely to be affected didn't recieve it from the resort.

'Many people don't realise what is being planned,' he says.

Lighthouse to get LED lighting, spruce up

Renovations are underway at the Cape Byron Lighthouse, and will involve removing the existing paint from the inside of the lighthouse and repainting the exterior walls.

Undertaken by The Australian Maritime Safety Authority (AMSA), the painting works are expected to be completed by early June 2015.

AMSA say they will also be upgrading the light source of the lens to a modern LED (light emitting diode) after painting works are complete, as part of a trial.

The AMSA press release says, 'Incandescent lamps have been used in lighthouses across the country for many years, but they are being pro-

gressively phased out and replaced by LED lights.

'The 1,000-watt lamps currently used at Cape Byron and similar lighthouses are becoming increasingly difficult to source and are not cost effective.

'The use of the LED light will reduce power usage and maintenance needs at the

lighthouse owing to increased longevity and reliability.

'A suitable aid to navigation for mariners will be maintained and the original heritage lens will be kept operational.

'While the works are in progress, the inside of the lighthouse will be closed to the public.

Further drug charges laid against bikies

In the wake of last week's Lismore symposium on the drug ice, two alleged Rebels bikies will face further charges of manufacturing methylamphetime (speed and ice) in the Lismore Local Court on Tuesday, July 7.

The extra charges were laid by officers from Strike Force Badim, which was formed in 2014 by investigators attached to the Richmond Local Area Command drug unit.

They are tasked to investigate the alleged supply of methylamphetamine by outlaw motorcycle gang members in the region.

A 34-year-old man, and Rebels OMCG Ballina chapter president, was charged with manufacturing a large commercial quantity of a prohibited drug and supplying large commercial quantities of a prohibited drug.

A 47-year-old man was charged with manufacturing a commercial quantity of a prohibited drug. Both men remain in custody.

Since late 2014, police say they have executed ten search warrants and arrested and charged seven Rebels members, as well as one associate. To date, police say Strike Force Badim has made 13 arrests.

And as a result of the Lismore ice symposium, a working group has been formed and will draw up a submission to the National Ice Taskforce meeting in Lismore on May 19. The Echo understands the group has been promised \$200,000 to implement a four-point plan aimed at limiting the availability of the drug, reducing its impact

Between two worlds

Australia, once known as the lucky country, has aspired to become the smart country, but has been hamstrung in the process by recent federal governments, albeit with the support of an electorate which seems to fear getting smart as well.

We have some of the smartest scientists in the world, particularly in the fields of solar cell technology and medicine, but we had education (sic) minister Christopher Pyne holding science infrastructure funding hostage to his higher educational reforms being passed. How smart is that? Fortunately pressure from the scientific community and the public forced him to backflip, which has often been the case with government proposals over the last few years.

We hang between two worlds. The world of the past represented by political adherence to old-school energy resources and a brighter world which has the technology to tackle the impacts of climate change through renewable energy.

Whether or not we will succeed is a moot point. There are so many variables in climate systems that some scientists believe we have gone beyond the tipping point. However, the only sane option is to have a go at it.

It doesn't help that the prime minister's business adviser believes climate-change talk is part of a UN conspiracy and that the government attempts to set up a 'climate consensus centre' at the University of Western Australia headed by a man whose climate scepticism – rather than a search for consensus - is founded upon dodgy information. In fact Bjorn Lomborg has been described as 'a performance artist disguised as an academic': http://bit.ly/lomblast.

The step from an old world to a new world will be painful, not least because of the extreme weather events which will accompany it. As old industries decline, workers will find themselves out of a job and there will be civil unrest unless governments are smart enough to implement retraining programs for entry into the sunrise industries. The Industrial Revolution of the 18th and 19th centuries provides dramatic evidence of the tumult caused by technological and social change.

Multibillion-dollar industries may become stranded assets. While our major parties and the relevant unions argue over 'poles and wires', the citizens might abandon poles and wires altogether and, with the help of solar cells invented by Australia's smart scientists, go off the grid with a battery pack from Tesla or Siemens.

In times of great change it is individual and community resilience which help make that crucial step between two worlds. At a local level we have the tools to accomplish that step. Now all that remains is for the rest to this potentially smart country to find the necessary courage to vote for politicians who see the way to the future rather than back to antediluvian self-interest.

Whatever the popular economic mood is, then he is against it. The bulls are roaring?

They must be sedated. The bears are slumbering? Time to stimulate them.

If the country is booming, if wages and profits are soaring and unemployment is down, there is a risk of rampant inflation, so the treasurer needs to inject a note of caution, even of gloom. But if things are down, with spending and investment constrained and recession a possibility, then the treasurer must be determinedly optimistic, predicting silver linings and good times just around the corner.

Hence Joe Hockey has spent the last few weeks exuding ebullience, however much it has forced him to grit his teeth in doing so. But in the last week his exuberance has got the better of him; as so often with the Abbott government, he has overdone it and drifted into self-parody.

When the Reserve Bank once more cut interest rates, bringing them to almost unheard-of lows, Hockey was cheering at the news. Bouncing into a press conference, he adjured the punters that this was their opportunity: borrow, invest, spend, spend spend! There were green shoots sprouting, and the now the fertiliser was being spread.

Immediately the stock market tanked, and Woolworths announced that it was laying off a raft of employees, and this was hardly a surprise. Next day, the Reserve Bank spelled it out: far from being good news, the interest rate cut was an attempt to stave off impending collapse: growth was declining and was predicted to get lower, and unemployment was rising and

At the time of the last election - and how long ago that seems - Tony Abbott declared a desire to become known as

the infrastructure prime minister, opening up vistas of new projects throughout the wide brown land. In fact, the infrastructure building that was going on has basically stalled; just about the only things that are actually being built are the projects the previous Labor government initiated. All Abbott has done is to re-announce some of the ideas proposed by Anthony Albanese, and even those have been confined to roads, mainly around the major cities which is, of course, where the votes are - short-term political promises.

An ambitious agenda to persuade state governments to sell off their own infrastructure and replace it with sparkling new models has also come to very little: the jewel in the Liberal crown, Victoria, fell and the East-West connection trumpeted by Abbott before, during and after the last election was shelved



on the reasonable grounds that it had never been subjected to a cost benefit analysis and what examination there had been had denounced it as an extravagant and uneconomic folly.

The only silver lining is New South Wales, where Mike Baird is pressing on with his plans, to be financed through the thoroughly unpopular policy of flogging off the poles and wires of some of the electricity grid. But that will not even be the subject of legislation until August, and if it gets through - which is likely but not certain - will then have to find buyers and contracts before planning begins.

It will be many years from fruition - Abbott's legacy, if he in fact claims it, will be politically posthumous at best.

The voters are not mugs; they know things are grim, and they hardly need the Reserve Bank to confirm the fact. The Bank itself is verging towards the desperate, playing what is probably its last rate-cut card in the hope that finally consumer confidence may return, the Sydney and Melbourne housing bubble finally comes under control and the stubborn Australian dollar declines to what it considers acceptable levels.

So far there has been absolutely no sign of any of these happening; which puts it all back on jovial Joe Hockey and his budget. It will not, cannot, turn the economy around; but that is not its aim. The hope is only that it will provide a bit of political breathing space, that the majority of those who are polled will decide that perhaps, just perhaps, the government is not really quite as hopeless and horrible as they have thought for more than a year, and that Abbott might indeed deserve another chance and that even Hockey, for all his buffoonery, can be tolerated - or, if not, that he can be decently uncoupled from his prime minister.

The alternative, the bornagain sugar daddy Scott Morrison, has emerged as an almost acceptable alternative - and as a result, there is possible salvation not only for the government, but for Abbott himself. If there is to be another leadership crisis, which there almost certainly will be unless the government is declared a popular success, it will be in a very different context from the one that prevailed in February. Malcolm Turnbull, still unacceptable to many of his colleagues, has now been joined, if not surpassed, by both Morrison and Julie Bishop.

The contenders are divided, and this is seriously good news for the incumbent.

Add in the steady but remorseless decline of Bill Shorten, looking more and more like a cardboard cutout of an alternative prime minster, and it has to be said that things are starting to look up. Talk of an early election, in spite of the worries about the economy becoming still more dire next year, are almost certainly a furphy; the government is still a long way from genuine recovery.

But even if the Reserve Bank can find no green shoots, perhaps Abbott and his colleagues finally can.

So pour on the fertiliser and never mind the smell. If the winds strengthens a bit, it just may go away before the punters go to the polls.

In the year 2015, how can the NSW Government allow the RMS to destroy these sites and propose a highway deviation straight through the middle of Ballina's largest and most important wildlife corridor and a nationally significant koala colony? If there was no other option available then I could understand, but in this case, the RMS have never investigated widening the existing highway between Broadwater and Wardell, even though it's the most direct route, would cost less money, and avoid the koala colony and Aboriginal

land beside the existing highway against all other factors (environmental, economic, cultural/social). While the owners of cane farmland adjacent to the highway can be generously compensated for any loss of land, our wildlife corridor (koalas) and Aboriginal sites can never be replaced or compensated.

The Deloitte Access Economics Report of 2011 states that 'Australia is now the most intensive user of road freight in the world and has the least energy-efficient road passenger transport among members of the International Energy Association (DFAT 2008 and prime minister's task group on energy efficiency 2010).'

A national government report in 2014, 'The bottom line on energy efficiency,' says, 'Rail freight emits 75 per cent less greenhouse gas emissions per tonne of freight moved compared to the road freight transport sector.'

Truth revision

In reply to Mizzi (Letters, May 6), the UN report into last year's Gaza blitzkrieg confirms that 20 rockets were found in three vacant UN-WRA schools. However, Mizal Ban Ki Moon's statement deploring the fact 'that at least 44 Palestinians were killed as a result of Israeli actions and at least 227 injured at United Nations premises being used as emergency shelters' and the fact that Israel refused, again, to co-operate with the UNHCR.

Under international law, an occupied people have the right to defend themselves by armed force (but not to attack civilians). Israel denies it deliberately targeted civilians but Breaking the Silence has published the testimonies of 70 soldiers who fought in Gaza. 'They were told.... every person that you see on the ground in neighbourhoods that you are about to enter, you are supposed to shoot and kill him or her.' ('Soldiers tell of "shoot to kill" orders', Sydney Morning Herald, May 5).

According to the UN, Israel killed 2,314, including more than 500 children, and injured 17,125. At least 19,000 homes were completely destroyed and 100,000 have been left homeless. When will we see the alleged rocket damage to Israel?

Yotam Feldman's film The Lab exposes Israel's weapons industry which pumped \$7.5 billion into the economy in 2012 and makes Israel fourth for global weapons sales. Its key selling point is that these weapons have been tested on Palestinian guinea pigs and therefore, if the Palestinian/ Israeli conflict ends, Israel will lose money. In WWII both Japanese and Germans conducted medical experiments on their captives; today Israel is doing the same thing, but for profit!

Putting the Stone in Stone & Wood

Cast your mind back to the recent state election night. While most people were either enthralled by, or desperately avoiding, the political coverage, friends, family and suppliers of Stone & Wood were treated to the festivities of Stone Day: a night of friends, food, and beer with a ceremonial fire.

With the weather still quite warm, the fire was not there simply for comfort or aesthetics, but as part of the brewing apparatus.



Buried beneath the hot coals were a dozen stones. The stones are a key tool in creating the local brewery's

winter varietal, Stone Beer. Once the stones are red hot they are added to the kettle filled with the mash of 11 different types of malt. The stones rapidly speed up the boil, heightening the malted tones and caramelising sugars to the surface of the stones. This process produces a rich, balanced finished product with earthy, fruit and nut flavours, leaving you with the lingering caramel bitterness that makes this beer perfect to complement the cooler

weather.

Stone Beer was launched last Saturday at The Festival of The Stone in true Stone & Wood style. The doors to the brewery were cast open and the community was invited to celebrate and taste this special brew while raising money for the Northern Rivers Community Fund.

Stone Beer is now available in bottleshops and venues all over the country but it is a limited release, so be sure not to skip this Stone.

YOUNG PEOPLE TAKE DRUGS ON STAGE

Ice use has been a hot topic in the media in the last twelve months with health professionals and educators all grappling with the challenge of how best to address illicit drug use with younger people. Byron Youth Theatre have used funding from Nortec Employment and Training Services and the Northern Rivers Community Foundation to create *Altered States*, a show that attempts to tackle drug use head on. Director Lisa Apostolides and the Youth Theatre tackled some questions about their upcoming show.

Why did you decide to do the show on illicit drugs?

We always ask our audiences to fill out evaluation forms after watching our performances. From those we could see that many young people wanted us to do a piece on drugs. There is also a community concern about ice use, which was evident at the Community Matters discussion held in Mullum last month.

What were the key messages or stories that you wanted to communicate?

If you are going to do drugs, which most young people will do at some time, then know the consequences, what you may be getting into, look after each other and know where to get help, know you can call an ambulance without the police being involved. We also want to impress the importance of human connection and the environment we create for ourselves, how we live our lives, what we do with them. One article we came across in our research talks about the 'age of loneliness' and how it is easier than ever before for people to become disconnected. We also want to communicate that parents and community members need to be role models if they want to change the culture of drug use. We're not blaming or shaming anyone but the intention is to bring awareness, because you can't expect young people to not try drugs if people in their immediate community are showing them it's okay to do so.

Why do you think so many young people use illicit drugs regardless of the messaging from the broader community?

Young people are curious; they want to experience new things, especially things that are forbidden and that make you feel great (if only for a short while). It has been the same way for eons. I think young people see through the facade of adults telling them not to do things that they do. It's pure hypocrisy! For some young people they use drugs to 'numb out' from stressful life situations, avoidance of pain, grief and sadness; for others it may be peer pressure or simply monkey see monkey do!

What are the issues that face young people in our shire in regard to drug use?

There's plenty available! Whether it is getting backpackers to buy you cheap booze or being able to get weed from an older sibling or parent, or buying pills from dealers at school for the party on the weekend.

The old excuse 'the kids are bored because there isn't much to do in rural areas' doesn't cut it any more because there are heaps of great things young people can get involved in around here. We do, however, live in a drug culture, not just here: everywhere. Somehow much of it has become so socially accepted that we never question doing things differently. How many people can imagine having a party without booze?

What is great is coming across more and more young people who are not interested in getting 'wasted' on any drug. They have already come to realise that nothing outside of yourself can make you happy, take away your sadness or complete your life.

- but there is a bond established between the lovers that is impossible to deny. It is a captivating performance from Chaplin - her character carries most of the drama's weight – but Robertson and Eastwood are good too. Love demands sacrifice, as Ira says, looking back on his years with Ruth. It is whether or not we are prepared to make those sacrifices and overcome our own blinkered pursuits that determines our lives' paths. The period pieces are expertly handled, as is the grit and grunt of the rodeo. If the ending is schmaltzy it is nonetheless perfectly appropriate and satisfying.

At what point, I wonder, did 'a cappella' stop meaning 'singing without instrumental accompaniment'? This frothy frippery concludes with the 'A Cappella World Championships' in Copenhagen, at which contestants from around the globe compete with the support of bass, synthesisers and drums etc - a veritable wall of sound! But let's not quibble... The Barden Bellas are an all-girl group of college singers with a long and prestigious history. After three years of being the best on the circuit, the current crop disgrace themselves through a 'wardrobe malfunction' at a performance in front of the Obamas at the Lincoln Center and are ostracised from the circuit for their poor show. The only way back for them is to shine in Copenhagen. Beca (Anna Kendrick) has ambitions beyond graduation; Chloe (Brittany Snow), the most senior member, doesn't want to let go of these golden days; Emily (Haile Steinfeld), the newcomer, wants to write songs; and Amy (Rebel Wilson) is the fat Australian who almost steals the show.

It is a pleasing development, without doubt, that Hollywood would put an actress of Wilson's proportions in a leading role in a teen flick, but when so many of her gags are based on getting a laugh out of her fatness, the 'liberating' aspect of the casting is somewhat tarnished - and there are moments when Wilson herself, ebullient though she always is, seems to be aware of this. But again - let's not



quibble, for despite the slim storyline and its predictable resolution, there is a lot to like in Elizabeth Banks's confident directorial debut. An actress with a natural gift for humour, Banks's double act with co-commentator John Michael Higgins also adds an element of necessary satire as the pair get away with some hilariously un-PC jokes about the boy-girl team from the Philippines, the Koreans -'nobody cares about them' - and how 'you won't win because you're American and everybody hates us'. Even Snoop Dogg is not out of place and the music and choreography is terrific.

WHAT'S IN A MEMORY?

A group of three exhibitions explore that very question from three varied and unique perspectives this May at The Northern Rivers Community Gallery (NRCG) in Ballina

AqX by Grayson Cooke is an artscience project about memory and forgetting; a multisensory digital art experience featuring time-lapse macro-photography of negatives being chemically destroyed.

The mixed-media works form an archipelago, a cluster of islands, symbolic of the connectedness of humanity and nature.

Kate Hallen's evocative works in Fight // Flight investigate the psychological landscape experienced by a soldier's returning from battle to civiliar life and the resulting tension that emerges as post-traumatic stress. Kate's works force the viewer to contemplate the sinister and often hidden complications of war. On first impression, the dark colour palette appears to be a graceful streamlined marine bird diving for fish, but later it transforms into a torpedo bearing down on an unseen target.

The AgX project is a powerful and thought-provoking reflection on how photography works as a form of external memory. AgX is chemical shorthand for silver halides that are the light-sensitive compounds constituting the celluloid image. Silver halides are historically implicated in personal and collective memory - and could be viewed almost as the DNA of the modern archive.

The Passing by Skye Baker presents a series of contemporary drawings that focus on the geographical and psychological boundaries within the island form.

CSIRO solar shines on Cyprus hill

CSIRO scientists have designed and installed a solar field in energy research in Europe.

As most of the country's electricity is currently generated using oil, harnessing the sun's energy through solar-thermal technology is an attractive option for Cyprus.

It could also power energy-intensive desalination plants used to tackle perennial water shortages.

Cutting edge

'This project was a big step for CSIRO as it's the first time we've deployed this cutting-edge technology outside of our own backyard,' CSIRO solar research leader Wes Stein said.

'It's also the beginning of an exciting collaborative research program, having signed a MoU to undertake joint solar research with the Cyprus Institute.

'Our high-performance heliostats have a unique design that is well suited to the rugged terrain on Cyprus's south coast, allowing them to operate very efficiently.

user more control over the intensity of the solar concentration.

'They also feature a low-cost design, which allows them to be installed more affordably.

Professor Costas Papanicolas, president of the Cyprus Institute, said solar-thermal technology had enormous potential for sun-rich countries such as Cyprus.

'Like Australia, Cyprus is blessed with an abundance of sunshine, so increasing the penetration of solar energy is an attractive option both in terms of energy affordability and lowering greenhouse gas emissions,' Prof Papanicolas said.

> It took CSIRO, with local help, five weeks to construct the solar-thermal field, which spreads out over a half-acre plot of land at the south of the island, on a hill overlooking the Mediterranean Sea. Consisting of 50 heliostats, the heat generated by the field could bring a two-litre kettle to the boil in less than five seconds.

Expansion planned

This is a suitable size for the Cyprus Institute, the country's premier research institute, to conduct their research, with expansion planned for the future.

The experimental facility will be initially used for demonstration purposes by the Cyprus Institute, with a view to longer-term commercial use of the technology in Mediterranean islands and the Middle East.

The Cyprus Institute has been and will be an ideal partner for 'They are smaller than conventional heliostats, which gives the CSIRO as it is a research organisation with a similar ethos to turn new ideas into commercial products,' Mr Stein said.

'By working collaboratively through exchange of ideas and researchers, and now with common solar concentrating research infrastructure, we can accelerate the deployment of this technology and make big inroads in reducing global emissions of carbon dioxide.'

Solar-thermal tower technology uses many mirrors (heliostats) that accurately track the sun, reflecting light towards a receiver on top of a tower and heating a fluid.

Sea-water plant

The hot fluid is subsequently used to drive a turbine for generating electricity and, in the Cyprus Institute research, powering simultaneously a sea-water desalination plant.

Thermal energy can also be stored relatively cheaply compared to other technologies, improving potential for large-scale power generation regardless of when the sun is shining.

CSIRO's solar-thermal team have set a number of records in the past 12 months, generating pressurised air at 880°C and supercritical steam in research projects.

To satisfy European legislation, 13 per cent of Cyprus's total energy consumption must be derived from renewable sources by 2020.

Paving paradise: In a matter of minutes last Thursday, Council had all the trees chipped in the centre of its carpark next to the Poinciana Cafe in Mullum, prior to resurfacing. (Three weeks of dust and noise.) We have it on good authority the trees were the Coolamon (*Syzygium moorei*), Mullumbimby's protected floral emblem. Council's director of infrastructure services, Phil Holloway, said open carpark works are exempt development under the *SEPP (Infrastructure) 2007* so Council didn't require a DA. 'However, an independent ecological assessment was undertaken for options on keeping the sick and dying trees,' Mr Holloway said. 'A total of six trees will be removed and as four are Coolamons, a compensatory planting with 40 new trees is part of the works program.' A compensatory planting program is part of Council's Biodiversity Conservation Strategy. Five Peanut Trees will be planted at the carpark. The Australian Tropical Rainforest Plants website notes that Aborigines in northern Queensland crushed leaves of the Peanut Tree and applied them to wounds. See more at http://bit.ly/peanuttree.
