West Byron developer Agnew selling out?

A major player in the controversial West Byron development appears to be pulling the plug on his holding just days before the council's Development Control Plan (DCP) for the subdivision is due to go on exhibition.

Prominent Sydney CBD property developer Terry Agnew bought a sizeable portion of the project early last year from failed local property company Crighton.

If sold, he looks set to make millions of dollars in profit just for sitting on the land for a matter of months.

Mr Agnew's company Tower Holdings has refused to comment on the issue but a sizeable advertisement appeared in last Saturday's *Sydney Morning Herald*, with a bird's-eye view of the land for sale, which appears to be his holding. In May this year, Mr Agnew was spruiking the high prices of Byron land and this is echoed in the ad, which reads 'Byron Bay median house price is now \$966,000.' The ad says the parcel potentially contains allotments for '300 – 450 dwellings'.

800 houses max

Meanwhile the DCP for the development will go on exhibition early next month, with Byron Shire Council approving some smaller lot sizes, dual-key and co-op developments.

But the council has ruled out holiday letting in the new suburb and says that a maximum of 800 blocks will be allowed.

Council has come under considerable fire for failing to oppose the development, which was approved by the state government in November last year.

Mullum campaign to save hospital land kicks off

A public meeting launched its campaign last Thursday to rally support for keeping the Mullumbimby Hospital site in community hands.

Around 100 locals attended the town's civic hall for the meeting, organised by the Mullumbimby Hospital Action Group, to hear the various options for the site when the hospital is vacated early next year.

Construction of the new Byron Central Hospital is in full swing; it is set to open in March next year, leaving a vacant site and buildings at Mullumbimby. But locals fear the site could be sold off for private use and the community, which has for around 100 years given much money and fundraised for hospital facilities, will miss out.

Plans to demolish

While health authorities say no decision has been made on the future of the site and that the public will be consulted, the proposal to demolish the old hospital building, and newer maternity and accident/emergency wings, has many alarmed.

The health department says it

wants to use the money from the sale of the site to pay for the asbestos removal and demolition. But some members of the action group say asbestos contamination is not an issue and the contentious plan is just an excuse to tear it down to make the site more attractive to investors.

Others would be happy to see the site eventually used for affordable aged-care housing or a similar facility, perhaps a crisis centre for domestic violence, and some youth or disability services.

All options are on the table and the group is urging locals to get

involved and to sign a petition that will soon circulate.

Former carpenter Alan Wilson attended the meeting and told *The Echo* it would be far cheaper to fix the roof of the accident/emergency building than to 'knock the whole building down just to remove the asbestos'.

Mr Wilson did the carpentry work on the A&E extension to the hospital in 1988 when asbestos was first discovered in the roof of the original hospital building, which was opened up to connect to the A&E wing.

'The asbestos was fine. It was

sprayed onto the underside of the tin roof as they did to insulate buildings from the heat and cold back then,' he said.

Cheaper to fix roof

'It's contained in the roof with two ceilings below. The first ceiling stopping the asbestos is the original made from plaster of paris, and after the asbestos was discovered, a second false ceiling was put in made from gyprock.

'It would be far cheaper to fix the roof as is than to knock the **continued on page 3** ►

Ewingsdale Seniors edges closer

Remember the massive seniors' development proposal surrounding Byron Central Hospital that residents fear would double the size of Ewingsdale?

Well, it's shuffled along at last week's Council meeting after Cr Rose Wanchap's amendment was supported by Crs Ibrahim, Cubis, Woods and Hunter.

Proponent Belbeck Investments are predictably keen to develop the land, which would include supermarkets, cafes, retail and seniors' housing.

The five-strong voting bloc ignored Cr Basil Cameron's motion aimed at allowing 'consultation with the Ewingsdale community,' through

rural land use and residential settlement strategies, which are yet to be completed.

Instead, the proponent was asked to draft a development control plan (DCP), 'along with a basic concept plan in consultation with Council².

A draft voluntary planning agreement (VPA) was also requested to cover Council's traffic studies and legal costs.

Debate became emotional over the lack of senior housing availability. Cr Di Woods, who is 70, explained the difficulties in securing aged-care housing. She said she has seen other locals having to pack up and leave Bruns for small apartments in Tweed. 'We desperately need something like this', the chamber was told.

Cr Chris Cubis also argued in favour: 'This is not an investment property,' he said, 'it's a bonded investment.'

But Crs Spooner and Richardson argued the decision should be based on merit, not emotions.

Cr Spooner said, 'Developers and councillors make better decisions when planning strategies are tied to community expectation.'

A point was made by Cr Dey that the proponent could plonk a seniors' development there already. It appeared to be a sobering moment, which was verified by staff.

Crs Dey, Richardson, Cameron and Spooner voted against the motion.

Bruns high-density DA rejected

A development proposal for eight serviced apartments and a manager's residence for 40 Mullumbimbi Street, Brunswick Heads, is back with the developer after Council rejected it on its potential to impact neighbours. Issues raised by neighbours at last week's Council meeting included over-reaching boundary lines and high fences. Resident Robert Rosen told the chamber it would impact on their amenity and there was 'no consultation' before the DA was lodged. An amendment put forward at Council's meeting last Thursday was voted for by Crs

Dey, Richardson, Spooner, Cameron and Ibrahim and voted against by Crs Cubis, Woods, Wanchap and Hunter. Cr Cubis said he believed

that his fellow councillors 'seem to be nitpicking personal preferences on a certain DA,' and that the current DA should be approved; however, Mayor Richardson disagreed and replied that a delay was necessary in order to get the best outcome for the entire community. The mayor said, 'I think it is worth potentially delaying something a few weeks to see if we can get a better outcome for the community and particularly the affected neighbours?

Railway station to go ahead

Despite some strong opposition from residents who may be affected by a rail service from Belongil to Byron's CBD, Council voted to approve the construction of two railway stations and a storage shed at last week's council meeting.

► continued from page 1 whole building down just to remove the asbestos, said Mr Wilson.

Action group member David Bradbury is one of the few voices who does not favour the demolition, saying the asbestos threat behind it does not warrant knocking all buildings down.

Rehabilitation facility wanted

'Personally I'd like to see included some drug-addiction facility, because there is nowhere in the shire other than the Buttery (a great facility but has long waiting list for locals to get into) for drugaffected young people to go,' Mr Bradbury told *The Echo*.

'The ice epidemic is only going to get worse. We need a local facility where addicts can detox and get serious hands-on counselling and stay a while as they sort themselves out,' he said.

'It's horrific out there for

young people struggling with drug addiction and nowhere to go, he said.

'Ultimately whether the hospital stands or falls is for the community to decide. And what to do with the building or land after that should be a democratic community-based decision, not for Macquarie Street or senior Lismore health bureaucrats.'

Mr Bradbury is cynical about the future of the site.

'It has taken us forever to get the new Byron hospital, so why would the state government build us a state-of-theart old-folks home or shelter for women victims of domestic violence?

'To destroy a perfectly good building now which has rooms and wards and toilets and showers all working – and in good shape – is irrational in my book.

'The hospital was originally built so it could take a second storey I'm told – so it has solid foundations. 'The building could be


modified and it could be up and running within a short time.

'Local builders and tradies who now travel to Sydney for work could be employed to renovate the existing building.

'The asbestos card was used to argue the Mullum Civic Hall, and we were told

that it should be totally destroyed and to start from the ground up.

'Fortunately, that idea was dropped and we have an internal guts of the Civic Hall which still serves good purpose with the sense of heritage and past generations who built it?

How I learned to stop worrying and love council meetings

Kubrick's brilliant 1964 political satire Dr Strangelove depicts the Cold War fears of a nuclear apocalypse between the USSR and the US.

Does this have anything to do with sitting uncomfortably numb through inane rhetoric and silly decisions by the councillors-in-charge on a Thursday?

Perhaps not, but Council apocalypse has a nice ring to it. Oh for simpler times. Before Crs Ibrahim, Cubis,

Wanchap, Hunter and Woods were wrecking the joint, their right-wing contemporary Ross Tucker would have just said: 'let the staff do their job.'

Tucker led the right-wing faction in the last term of Council, and was a believer in generally accepting staff recommendations.

And when you ignore staff advice - like this lot do - it produces 'legal uncertainties'.

Resort wants to save environment

Speaking of interference and uncertainties - Cr Sol Ibrahim's enthusiasm for 'coastal protection works' now extends to providing potential passage for the \$100m Elements of Byron resort to 'reinforce and stabilise' the Belongil creek edge around the estuary opening.

Yes that's right - another project aimed at tinkering with sensitive coastal ecosystems is on the table.

It's in an effort to 'save the littoral rainforest' which we are told by project manager Jeremy Holmes is being washed into the sea.

As the land adjoins both their private property and

Council-managed land, they sought Council support in moving towards a coastal protection project.

While staff were unsupportive of the application, that didn't stop Cr Ibrahim from whacking up an unexpected and lengthy quasilegal-looking motion that said the top experts in the field - the NSW Coast Panel - should consider it.

'It's quite possible it may fail,' Cr Ibrahim said at one point during his reading of his lengthy amendement.

During debate, the mayor said how ironic it was that there had been new-found respect for the coastal panel, with the inference being that Cr Ibrahim's team didn't appear to be interested in the panel's advice on the Belongil wall project/fiasco.

Cr Duncan Dey then asked if there was more information provided by the applicant other than two diagrams and a letter of request to council, to which staff said no.

Cr Di Woods was the only other councillor to speak in favour, and said it was 'extraordinary' that staff didn't support the idea, given that 'as a council, we are in favour of protection of high conservation environments.'

With sincerity she continued: 'Why wouldn't we bend over backwards and say, "We hear that you want to protect that ecologically endangered area?" We have seen what they have lost... why wouldn't we

jump through hoops to make sure there is some protection to stop the rest of it from eroding away? This [motion] is only about getting our consent – I think we should do it anyway. Why should someone else have to do it for us?'

Cr Dey said in conclusion, 'The way to protect anything is not to interfere with it. In this case it sounds great - it's a high-conservation area and we will protect it by putting a wall in, but the reality is that it evolved over tens of thousands of years. It relies on having a sand face with Belongil Creek.' He said the worst part of this proposal was potentially giving credit to the idea that locking nature down and interfering with it is good management.

'It just isn't. I don't want anything built there. Why lead the applicant astray and let them think we want it to go ahead?'

Crs ignore court

And finally it's no surprise that the Belongil five councillors knocked back - without debate - a mayoral minute, 'That Council cease all works on the construction of the Interim Beach Access Stabilisation [Belongil rock wall] works until the completion of the impending court proceedings concerning these works, due to commence in October.'

The pitch for coal

Australia's worst and most forgettable prime minister once said, 'Coal is good for humanity'.

Being the worst PM ever meant that whatever he touched turned to poo, and so it appears with coal. As we know, it gets a beating. Coal is losing its share price value as well as the public relations battle.

But an argument for coal was presented last week by BHP Billiton's 'president coal', Mike Henry, at the American Chamber of Commerce lunch in Brisbane.

He began by saying he is, 'acutely aware of the risks associated with climate change and the need to mitigate greenhouse gas emissions.' Sounds fair and reasonable. Surprisingly he supports science and a price on carbon, unlike the recently dispatched neanderthal Liberal PM.

Henry then explained the difference between the two broad categories of coal: one is 'thermal or energy coal - the kind used in electricity generation and cement making."

'And the other category, metallurgical or coking coal - the kind used in making steel. BHP Billiton produces both, with a weighting towards steel-making coal.

Phew - so fewer eggs are in the dirty-energy coal basket.

But then we learn that 'thermal coal is expected to continue to play an important part in meeting the world's energy needs well into the future. Particularly in Asia...

One wonders if that is because the industry is heavily subsidised? So while Henry believes the 'overall market share of coal may decline, the outright cost competitiveness of coal, as well as the substantial existing base of installed infrastructure, means we can expect to see demand support for decades to come.

You would think his speech would offer insights into how the narrative could be won or what vital information the public are missing.

But no. After admitting that, 'in the court of public opinion, the "no coal" camp has been more effective, there was nothing left to add other than being more unified and involved in the debate.

Regardless of Henry's lack of a convincing argument, it's worth thanking coal for its contribution to our standard of living.

Joyce was, we are told, threatening to break the coalition agreement, to lead his troops out of their long-established partnership with the Liberal majority.

But where would they go? Hardly to Bill Shorten and Tanya Plibersek and the longreviled Labor Party.

Their only refuge would be to the crossbenches, they would almost invariably vote for Turnbull's legislation anyway. But in doing so they would have to abandon all their perks; the subsidies, hand-outs and pork-barrelling that placate the





A cattle feedlot is an extreme example of what is wrong with agribusiness. Having been assaulted by the stench of one from an altitude of 5,000 feet, I don't think the operation below was either concerned with animal welfare or climate friendly. Growing grain to feed to animals which don't normally eat it is a waste of time and resources (most notably water) and very carbon intensive. If these were the only source of meat, then maybe we all should be vegans.

Cattle in our area are largely well cared for, eat grass, don't need extra water (at least in our current climate) and are humanely killed for meat. As for chickens, they are very bad at maths and are unaware they have eggs stolen from them for human consumption. If a free-range producer stipulates 1,500 hens or fewer per hectare, then you can be pretty sure of happy hens.

However, if you have

personal moral reasons for not eating any animal products, fine. Just don't expect the majority to follow along.

In our country the most efficient producers of protein are our emblems – the emu and the kangaroo. They thrive on native grasses. The original inhabitants of this country have known this for thousands of years, but Governor Phillip and Co decided to introduce exotic grasses and hoofed animals. This works okay in high-rainfall areas but is largely a government-funded loss-making venture west of the divide.

Nearly all the world's commercial fisheries are in crisis or decline so protein for an increasing population will probably be sourced from the land. If, as PETA would like it, we all convert to veganism, then massive amounts of land would have to be sown to such crops as soybeans which would cause large habitat loss for native fauna.

There are ethical reasons for going vegan, but the ecological ones are dubious. The fact is that people are going to continue eating meat for a good while, so they may as well be sourcing it sustainably – roo and emu.

Terry Pratchett, Jane Austen, and literature

In TheConversation.com Annie Coral Demosthenous argues for the literary merit of Discworld

ast month in The Guardian, with a piece headlined Get Real. Terry Pratchett is not a Literary Genius, literary critic Jonathan Jones claimed Terry Pratchett's books should not be read because they are not literature:

Everyone reads trash sometimes, but why are we now pretending, as a culture, that it is the same thing as literature? *The two are utterly different.*

Jones informed us that he hadn't read anything by Pratchett because his time was better spent reading Jane Austen.

In presenting Pratchett and Austen as polar opposites, Jones made certain lazy assumptions about both the nature and function of literature that deserve to be challenged.

Jones's article irritated many, and has drawn criticism for reinforcing an elitist and exclusionary definition of culture, based on the assumption that there is a singular definition of 'literary' fiction independent of the reader's individual experience of either life or reading.

Yet the definition of 'literature' is changeable, and inextricably linked with fashion. As the author Christopher Priest has pointed out, works now considered classics were not necessarily defined as high culture when they were written, and works considered literary when published do not always survive over time.

Priest also observes that many classics began life as popular publications - the story of Americans waiting at the wharf to discover the fate of Little Nell springs to

mind. What is missing from this debate is direct engagement with Pratchett's work and its relation to literary high culture.

So what is high culture? And what do we mean when we call something 'literary'? According to Jones, 'actual literature' is 'harder to get to grips with than a Discworld novel, but it is more worth the effort'.

As this definition is not particularly helpful, let us consider some characteristics commonly considered 'literary': the elegant and adventurous use of language, engagement with themes of universal significance, inventiveness of style, defiance of genre classification.

Jones accuses Pratchett's prose of being 'very ordinary', missing Pratchett's delight in locating the extraordinary within the ordinary: his writing is simultaneously clear and complex, much like Austen's. Both are masters

of aphorism; compare for example:

It is a truth universally acknowledged, that a single man in possession of a good fortune must be in want of a wife. (Austen, Pride and *Prejudice*) to:

The presence of those seeking the truth is infinitely to be preferred to the presence of those who think they've found it. (Pratchett, Monstrous *Regiment*)

Both are wry observations of human nature, and both make the reader stop and think.

Pratchett seldom allows language to exist unchallenged; words are stretched and twisted by new and surprising contexts, opening the reader's eye to the arbitrary relation of signifier and signified, often eliciting surprised laughter.

The Truth (2000), the 25th Discworld novel, reflects on the meaning of 'truth' and people's propensity to look he sets them up to be defor it, structured around the aphorism that 'a lie can run around the world before the truth has got its boots on'.

William, a compulsive truth-teller, sets up the first newspaper on the Discworld, and discovers that the truth is hard to find. He is horrified when readers assume everything printed in the paper is true, assuming 'otherwise they wouldn't let them put it in.

The novel concludes with the statement that 'nothing has to be true for ever. Just for long enough, to tell you the truth'. This challenges readers' assumptions about objective truth, but positions it as ephemeral rather than non-existent.

Pratchett's writing style is economical, elegant and adventurous. In The Truth, he takes the same approach to chapters as Joyce takes to punctuation in the final chapter of Ulysses (1918): he doesn't use any. Instead, a multitude of episodic narratives fit together like scenes in a film, jumping between characters, location and time without losing the narrative thread.

The Truth begins by tracing a rumour flying through the city of Ankh-Morpork: 'The dwarfs can turn lead into gold'. As different characters hear the rumour (alchemists, wizards, thieves, the dwarfs themselves), the image of both city and world emerges. The rumour, like a panning camera, stops when it reaches William.

Pratchett's work is often underestimated because it is classified as 'genre fiction' rather than literary fiction. Yet Pratchett's relationship with genre is complex and adversarial. He does not reproduce genre stereotypes,

constructed, or at least affectionately mocked.

Rincewind, the original Discworld hero, is represented as completely un-heroic: a cowardly wizard who cannot do magic, or, indeed, spell the word wizard. He is joined in his adventures by Cohen the Barbarian, now old, toothless and suffering from lumbago, who nevertheless is still a more successful hero than Rincewind.

Austen often flirts with genre in a similar way. Northanger Abbey (1817) is a mock-Gothic romance, which satirises the stereotypes of Gothic fiction by reproducing them and then allowing reality to intrude. The novel begins with a discourse on Catherine's unsuitability as heroine, listing the characteristics one expects of heroines and locating their absence in Catherine.

When visiting Northanger Abbey, Catherine goes looking for manifestations of Gothic tropes, and is disappointed at every turn: the hidden papers she finds are laundry receipts, the old Abbey has been restored and redecorated, and her loveinterest's mother was not murdered, after all.

Austen's novels are no harder or easier to read than Pratchett's; both use wit and satire to carry out social critique, and in both cases people who don't find them funny tend not to enjoy them.

Reading Pratchett, like reading Austen, requires commitment, and a willingness to look under the surface.

ON THE FA

There's nothing worse than being told you're too fat. Especially when you're a 19-year-old girl who weighs just 57 kilos. That is what Swedish model Agnes Hedengard's modelling agency told the waiflike beauty when they told her if she wanted more work she'd need to 'shape up'.

With a BMI of 17.5 Agnes is actually underweight. (Healthy BMI is 18.5–24.99) So what is going on with an industry that is telling an already underweight girl she needs to be thinner? No doubt Agnes is not the first model who has been told she's got a 'fat arse' and then embarked on a full-scale eating disorder. An eating disorder that will make her a candidate for osteoporosis, anxiety, depression, severe nutritional deficit, organ damage, and if she loses control completely - death.

A lesser-known fact about Eating Disorder is that it has the highest mortality of any mental illness. But hey, on the upside, while she's dying on the catwalk, while her bones are crumbling inside her beautiful skin and her heart is in constant arrhythmia, she'll be earning some good coin. She may only live to 28 because she'll have a heart attack. but at least she would have had a good earn. And she will be a role model for all the other girls who will want to be dying too – just like her. Aspiration to Expiration - what a callous industry.

Thankfully 'fat' Agnes isn't going to take this lying down. She's been taking photos of her disgustingly gorgeous tiny butt and posting it all over the internet. Agnes has admitted that she has developed an eating disorder trying to meet

the demands of her industry - but she has also been outspoken in the media and outed her industry for its dangerous and socially culpable attitude toward young women's bodies.

And it's not just models. Every time a modelling agency or a fashion designer tells an underweight girl she's too fat, the fashion industry is directly responsible for all those young women out there who aren't models who then suddenly look at their normal bodies with disgust, and then bolt to the bathroom and purge their last meal. They are responsible for those girls who pinch the flesh on their thighs in disgust and think curves are to be obliterated - not celebrated. The fashion industry might as well be supplying the razors for the girls who cut themselves in episodic disgust.

Karl Lagerfield has said that 'only fat mummies object to thin models'. Well, this fat mummy doesn't have a problem with naturally thin models; it's the industry's penchant for skeletal disordered women that bothers me. Every time I look at Lagerfield's creepy head I don't see an artist, or a designer; I see a serial

killer. And he's not alone. The fashion industry is full of them. I'm surprised they don't cast for catwalk shows at their local palliative-care units.

How ironic is it that the fashion industry, which is so dependent on the female dollar, is powered by people who hate women? If underweight girls are told they are too fat then healthy-weight girls must by definition be obese. And there I was thinking that 'body dysmorphia' was a condition developed by people with eating disorders owing to their delusional mental state. It had never occurred to me that in the fashion industry that is a marketing strategy.

Using women with eating disorders to promote ideals of beauty in popular culture is causing extreme harm to our young women. In France you can be jailed for using super-skinny models. French president François Hollande introduced this as a response to the 40,000 people (mostly women and girls) who suffer from the condition. Models have to present a health certificate showing a BMI of at least 18. The MPs there made it illegal to condone anorexia. Photos that alter the bodily appearance of a model

for commercial purposes must carry a message that it's been digitally altered. If you break these laws you could end up in jail. That's how seriously the French are taking it. Pretty impressive for the runway capital of the world.

The fashion industry's defence is simple: they say we want super-thin models. They say we don't want to see curvy women on catwalks. They say they reflect desire rather than create it In an era where we are bombarded with images on virtually everv device we use that argument doesn't - sorry about the pun - hold weight. The industry, not we, writes the fairy-story. So maybe it's time we found some new 'writers' to create an exciting and inclusive story, where girls like Agnes aren't told they're fat. We could stop buying their clothes.

That was how Melbourne Ska Orchestra was born, with an album making its way into the world back in 2013 garnering two ARIA nominations! The Echo spoke with Nicky Bomba about this dynamic outfit headlining Island Vibe at North Stradbroke Island 30 October-1 November.

What was the inspiration for getting a 26-piece band together?

We were celebrating the 40th anniversary of ska and wanted to do something big. Lots of horns, lots of fun, lots of great tunes and a big bucket of mayhem.

We tried to set a world record for how many horn players we could get onstage... it wasn't really official but I think we achieved it on that night.

How does it make the musical style even more exciting?

Well when you have the soundscape of an orchestra the possibilities are endless, coupled with the diverse cultural influences that exist within the band and the musical history, it's really just up to the imagination where you want to go.

What are the major challenges? How hard is it to get everyone to rehearsal?

Logistics and finance are the major missions, catering when we record, accommodation, transport, etc. We have a great team behind the scenes that know the mechanics behind this ramshackle train.

Surprisingly, to date, there's been no major train wrecks! Rehearsal... hmmmm... they usually happen at sound checks!

What is the thrill of being part of such a big dynamic outfit?

The energy onstage is something to behold. When you have a group of like-minded musicians all on the same page, combining their effort to make a night really work, it's like a fun-filled rollercoaster ride.

How do you work up a piece – do you, Nicky, take the lead and build it through?

Usually we all write things separately then bring our ideas into the collective pool and see what shakes. We are capable of turning things around quickly, capturing the essence of a song. Some songs take longer but we try to accommodate everyone's ideas.

THIRTEEN YEARS AGO A BUNCH OF MUSICIANS DECIDED TO HAVE A CRACK AT THE WORLD RECORD FOR THE LARGEST NUMBER OF HORNS ON STAGE AT THE SAME TIME PLAYING SKA-SKANK.

We had 20-odd ideas for the latest album and they all came up sweet. Tell me about your latest single release Satellite - how it was written, and how you nailed down the sound with the orchestra...

I was jamming around (writing/ playing) with my loop machine and a baritone guitar. I've been experimenting with hybrid rhythms and different ways to approach the engine of a song.

This particular groove and progression stuck out as being energising and fun, trademarks of the orchestra. I envisaged Pat, Steve and me having separate verses to showcase the different vibes and keep the attention high. The bridge was reminiscent of a classic English beat vibe and the bass was inspired by Janelle Monae's Tightrope. Barry added some love to the horn theme and Dorian made some great spicy suggestions to add excitement. The song was originally a lot longer but it's quite common to trim the fat and condense the ideas to get real punch for a 3-4-minute listening experience. We headed into the studio for a preliminary session with the loop template as the starting point then added extra ideas once we got the meat and potatoes sorted. It was a totally fun experience. As with every track, we dissected some more to essentially make it strong and consistent with unexpected twists; the clip being awesome was the icing on the cake.

Do you encourage players to be theatrical in their presentation? Being part of an orchestra how does a player 'claim their moment'?

When performing live we all have a sense of theatre but it's more a collective approach. There are solo moments of course but these work in the context of the song and the journey as opposed to players struttin' their stuff. We don't take well to inflated egos in this group.

Did you ever expect the Melbourne Ska Orchestra to build such an enthusiastic following?

Our philosophy is to make the best music we can, enjoy ourselves and share the love. I still think we have a long sweet road to travel to reach the point where we can become self-sufficient

Most orchestras or bands of this size are usually subsidised. We're obviously chuffed at the good vibes heading our way but complacent minstrels we are not. What do you get out of your

involvement? The joy of captaining a wonderful musical ship where, for the most part, we are one big happy family. There's a lot of love in the band

What should we expect for your performance at Island Vibe?

MULLUM MUSIC FESTIVAL PATRON HARRY ANGUS CONTINUED THE FESTIVAL'S COMMITMENT TO MENTORING YOUNG TALENT WHEN HE VISITED CAPE BYRON STEINER SCHOOL MUSIC STUDENTS THIS WEEK.

Mullum Music Festival patron Harry Angus visited Cape Byron Steiner School music students this week.

Previous under-15 Youth Mentorship winner Mali Biggin-Johnson was part of the fourperson band Children of Moscow (their dads are in Dustyesky Russian Choir) who received an hour-long consultation with Harry about their performance, songwriting and musical arrangements. Mali at 16 is the guitarist and vocalist for the group who have a gig at this year's festival; she was joined by fellow band members 17-year-old Felix Abercrombie, and 14-yearolds Paddy Swain and Mali's brother Luca.

Children of Moscow played Harry a selection of their material that included a few select songs along with original pieces. As a foursome the group showed incredible musicianship, with band members playing guitar, banjo, uke, drums, bass guitar and sax as part of their song arrangements.

Angus was generous and enthusiastic in his engagement with the young band who benefitted greatly from his input. 'It's about being natural onstage,' he told the kids.

'Often it's about being the best actor! There are a few things you can do to make your own performance artistic'.

As a fellow horn player, Harry offered Felix some advice.

'When you come in to play your part you want to give people the sense you are about to play right before you do, you want people to see you. You step up and come in with something dramatic. It's about a tone. It's a sound, and if you get it right everyone goes Wow! You can feel it in the room. One of the best things about horns is that you don't need a microphone; you have the ability to play to the acoustics of the room. To do that you actually have to listen to the room to get the tone right.

For songwriter Mali, who penned Short Term Memory, Harry had some excellent advice.

'A lot of people make the mistake of singing a happy song happily and a sad song sadly, but when you step up and sing a song you have written, you want it to be like the first time your wrote it. 

WATERS ON THE

Roger Waters, co-founder and primary songwriter of Pink Floyd, fuses the epic and the personal in Roger Waters The Wall, a concert film that goes well beyond the stage. Based on the band's ground-breaking 1979 concept album, this could well be called a concept film: it's a state-of-theart show that dazzles the senses, combined with an intensely

personal road trip that deals with the loss Roger has felt throughout his life owing to war. From the biggest worldwide tour ever by a solo artist, Roger Waters The Wall is an event movie like no other. An immersive concert experience, a road movie of Waters's reckoning with the past, and a stirring antiwar film, it is a truly breathtaking cinematic experience, giving fans the ability to experience the tour seen by more than 1.5 million fans across North America, more than one million fans across Latin

and Central America and more than one million fans across Europe. Following the concert is a unique opportunity to see Roger Waters reunited with his Pink Floyd bandmate Nick Mason in The Simple Facts, an unscripted conversation in which they also answer questions submitted by fans from around the world. Roger Waters The Wall is playing in select cinemas worldwide on one night only: Tuesday 29 September. It will screen at Palace Byron Bay Cinema at 8pm. Tickets \$18-20.

DOCTOR PROCTOR'S FART POWD

The better kids' flicks never fly very far from the realms of the bizarre and surreal. Neither do they usually mire their tales in politically correct ambivalence. And so it is in the case of this upbeat and shamelessly cute tweens' dramedy from Norway (which must surely earn a gong for best title of the year). Long-haired, lanky Doctor Proctor, an oldfashioned nutty professor, has inadvertently created a powder that induces fabulous but thankfully odourless blue-gas flatulence in all who consume it - the introductory poem, featuring a cat that licks up some of the stuff, will have youngsters squealing in delight. The magic powder falls into the hands of Lise and Bulle (played with effortless charm by Emily Glaister and Eilif Hellum Noraker), two misfit children who will use it to counter the malevolence of the dictator who rules the land - a cartoon combo of Mussolini and Hitler - and his twin sons, bullying brutes out of the Tweedledee and Tweedledum mould. There is also a really scary subterranean anaconda to deal with in a screenplay based on a story by, of all people, the Scandi-noir crime master Jo Nesbo (a fan of the book mercilessly trashed the screen adaptation on IMDb - check it out if you enjoy a no-holds-barred bucketing).

Stylistically, director Arild Fröhlich's film most closely resembles The Grand Budapest Hotel for its rollicking pace and candy-coloured, rigidly composed visuals - the protagonists are rarely out of centre frame in a perfectly symmetrical picture. Ginge Anvik's music perfectly complements every scene without boisterously taking over the show and, best of all for young viewers who might not have the patience to stick with 85 minutes of subtitles, the adventure is seamlessly dubbed into English. There is a little bit of subtle social commentary along the way as well as enlightening shots of Oslo and its surrounds, but what the movie is first and foremost is a lot of fun. And let's face it - who doesn't like a good fart joke?



Sometimes cinema is simply not big enough to fully embrace its subject - and there is no bigger subject than Mount Everest. It's all well and good for the Marvel clowns to tool around the globe with their super powers, but when it comes to reality, even when enhanced by CGI, the camera can still struggle. In 1996 a New Zealand commercial climbing outfit embarked on an ascent of Everest with a handful of clients. Tragedy awaited. The summit was reached, but on the delayed return to base camp the group was overtaken by a violent blizzard. Icelandic director (how appropriate) Baltasar Kormákur spends a lot of time introducing us to those who will make that fateful climb. Led by Rob (Jason Clarke), they include a gung-ho Texan (Josh Brolin), a Japanese woman (Naoko Mori) who has conquered the highest peaks of the six other continents, and a fellow who attempted it last year (John Hawkes). Rob joins forces with another guide (Jake Gyllenhaal looking like Rasputin) and the significant ones left behind are Rob's pregnant wife (Keira Knightley) and his business partner Helen (the always-clammy Emily Watson doing a parody of the Kiwi accent).

Kormákur is oddly at pains to show most of those assembled as party animals who spend the nights before the final push to the top getting hammered in their flapping tents - Gyllenhaal seems to be rarely off the turps. Shot largely on location in Nepal, the logistical challenges would have been enormous, but Kormákur and his cinematographer Salvatore Totino admirably capture the fierce inhospitality of the environment. At times, however, when the going gets tough, I was uncertain of who was who as the figures trudged their way through ice and snow that virtually obliterated their identity. It's an exhausting movie that never quite attains the heights of its endeavour or comes to grips with the question of why people attempt these things in the first place. The team photo at the end, taken in 1996, if now de rigueur, is touching nonetheless.




