fails over bypass

A legal challenge by residents who will be affected by Council's Byron Bay Butler Street bypass looks set to be heard in court after a recent mediation conference failed to come to any compromise.

Council is planning to divert the Jonson Street main road to a bypass that would run past the Butler Street Recreation Reserve and markets, through a heritage conservation area of homes, through protected wetland habitat. The bypass would emerge at Mitre 10 at the end of Jonson Street.

Commissioner Maston from the Land and Environment Court attended a site inspection on Friday December 2 to hear the concerns from Butler Street residents as well as market stallholders association representative Gyan Purno.

Conduct complaint upheld by GM

While National Party-aligned councillor Alan Hunter seeks permanency for a large self-storage facility on his Myocum farm at this week's Council meeting, it's emerged that the former mayoral candidate has been found to have breached Council's code of conduct while also having an unapproved building on his property.

Former Council planner Ray Darney has submitted the DA proposal on Cr Hunter's behalf, which would see 30 shipping containers combined into three sheds and associated parking.

Staff have recommended approval, much to the disgust of neighbours, who have a long history of rejecting Cr Hunter's expanding business interests.

They have claimed staff have ignored investigating evidence they provided regarding breaches to the number of traffic movements allowed on the short Pinegroves Road.

So far, staff have declined to respond to The Echo on that matter, and remarkably those complaints are not included in the staff report.

But traffic concerns have been hosed down by staff, who claim, 'Based on accepted standards for selfstorage facilities, the proposed development... is likely to generate a maximum of eight vehicle trips per day.

And with all the other dwellings on the road, staff say, 'The proposed development will result in a total of 80 vehicle trips per day on Pinegroves Road, well within its design capacity.

Meanwhile, Council's general manager Ken Gainger has told Pinegroves resident Rebecca Chaffer on

Murdoch gets go-ahead to buy local media

The Australian Consumer and Competition Commission (ACCC) has approved the sale of the Australian Regional Media (ARM) newspaper titles on the grounds that a News Corp takeover would not 'substantially lessen competition' in the regional media market.

ARM, APN's media stable, comprises regional NSW and QLD titles including Northern Star, Tweed Daily News, Byron Shire News, Ballina Advocate and the Lismore Echo.

News Corp executive chairman Michael Miller, a former head of APN, unsurprisingly welcomed the decision.

ACCC chairman Rod Sims pointed out that reduced choice would occur in areas where ARM papers were currently in competition with existing Murdoch publications, such as Tweed Heads, where the Tweed Daily News competes with News Corp's Gold Coast Bulletin.

'Few concerns'

Mr Sims said that feedback from readers raised 'few concerns' and suggested there was 'not close competition between the paid daily QLD papers published by News and ARM.'

'The ACCC concluded that, overall, a sufficient range of local news choices and advertising options would remain available in these areas, with Fairfax and independent local newspapers in some local areas, competing online options, as well as local radio news,' Mr Sims said.

NBN Co rolls on with tower despite concerns

A dispute over adequate consultation for a proposed fixedwireless tower in Coorabell is just one of many issues residents face as NBN Co and Visionstream forge ahead in constructing the tower.

An NBN Co spokesperson told *The Echo* there was adequate public consultation for the proposed tower at 308 Coorabell Road.

Residents say otherwise. Meanwhile, a motion by Cr Sarah Ndiaye (Greens) will be tabled at this Thursday's Council meeting, and asks NBN Co, Visionstream and the minister responsible to halt construction until 'It is proven with certainty that NBN has fully complied with all applicable provisions' of the industry code.

Cr Ndiaye told *The Echo* that the NSW Department of Education mandates 'a 500-metre buffer between towers and schools.'

'It's interesting that that

same principle does not apply to residents, as it almost validates the idea that they are aware there is some risk associated with the presence of a tower. Apparently construction has started.

In the Council agenda, Cr Ndiaye says given numerous wireless and phone towers are planned throughout the Shire, this objection highlights 'a possible lack of understanding relating to the legal obligations of those parties involved'.

The NBN Co consultation report for the project is available at www.rfnsa.com. au/2479008 and says the area was always 'intended to receive a fixed-wireless service.'

It also predictably plays down concerns of electromagnetic energy (EME) health and safety.

► continued from page 1 October 7 that he found Cr Hunter had breached Council's code of conduct policy.

The breach occurred after Cr Hunter invited himself to a site inspection of Mr and Mrs Chaffer's home without permission – when they were away – to discuss with staff their secondary dwelling development application.

Mr Gainger told Mrs Chaffer that Cr Hunter will be required to 'attend an informal discussion' with him and require the councillor to undertake further conduct training.

Clear conscience

Cr Hunter told *The Echo*, 'My conscience is clear.'

'I declared a conflict of interest and didn't vote on it. My concern was for residents in the proposed new dwelling planned to be set back only three metres from trucks, machinery and other vehicles traversing the hill in a rural environment. However, Council determined that a conflict of interest existed, that a reasonable and informed person could perceive that I was influencing councillors to make a decision that would personally benefit me by attending the site meeting.

'I accepted the decision and the determination.'


The Echo asked staff why the word 'confidential' was watermarked on Mrs Chaffer's letter, considering there is no legislative requirement and it is in the public interest.


Council's legal services co-ordinator, Ralph James, replied, 'Information about code-of-conduct complaints, and the management and investigation of code-of-conduct complaints is required to be treated as confidential and is not to be publicly disclosed except as may be specifically required or permitted under the code, ie reporting outcomes to complainants,' he noted.

And lastly, staff have told *The Echo* Cr Hunter's unapproved building is part of a 'property compliance investigation'.

Cr Hunter told *The Echo* the need for approval for his relocatable cabin 'hasn't been established,' but he was 'continuing discussions with Council staff about how we meet any further legal requirements.'

Santos Organics takes on not-for-profit role

From its beginnings operating out of a panel van in the early 70s through to its transformation into a community-owned enterprise in 1983, Santos has strived to meet the needs of the local community through the supply of organic, bio-dynamic and locally sourced produce.

It hit a rocky patch about five years ago after the organisation became insolvent, but it's managed to work its way through this difficult period, implementing a range of changes that have brought the business back into profitability.

Following this successful turnaround, they have now decided to take things one step further and make Santos Organics a not-for-profit business.

'We haven't paid out dividends for around seven or eight years,' said general manager and newly elected Greens councillor Michael Lyon. 'Three years ago, we became a defacto not-for-profit business when we decided to reinvest in the business and community projects rather than pay out dividends.

He says becoming a notfor-profit company has been an ongoing process that has engaged shareholders, staff, the board and management,

and became the confirmed direction of the company in June at the AGM.

As part of this process, the company had to develop a charitable purpose to which they are required to commit a significant percentage of their profits.

'Enhancing our natural environment is our charitable purpose,' said Cr Lyon. 'We want to ensure that we give more than we take from our environment. We have done a lot of work to tidy up our governance structures.

Pulling themselves out of bankruptcy involved putting in place a strong board, who are able to provide regular and clear direction to the management team of Santos Organics.

\$150,000 for projects

Cr Lyon sees this as a positive aspect of the business as he now fulfils the dual role of Santos Organics general manager and Byron Shire councillor.

'There are very clear policies regarding any possible conflicts of interest that may emerge?

Over the next financial year Cr Lyon anticipates that they will have around \$100,000 to \$150,000 to distribute and are aiming to have the structure for distribution finalised for the launch of their not-for-profit status in February 2017.

Acknowledging the claim that some people feel Santos is an expensive place to shop, Cr Lyon pointed out that by removing the profit motive people know the business isn't just about profit for profit's sake; rather, 'by shopping here, people can know they are really giving back to community and the environment.'

Teenager charged over drug supply

A Byron Bay teenager appeared in court last week charged with 13 counts of supplying prohibited drugs, including ice, cocaine, MDMA, cannabis and heroin-laced pills.

Flynn Brown, 18, was arrested on Wednesday as a result of police operation that

began in August.

During a search at his home on Paterson Street, police allegedly located cannabis; methamphetamine and Viagra in the 18-year-old's bedroom.

A vehicle was also seized from the property, which police say was used in the distribution of illegal drugs.

Taskforce set up

The court heard that police were so concerned about his alleged activities they set up taskforce Strike Force ARB-DO nearly four months ago to target the 18-year-old, with officers engaging in several undercover drug purchases and intercepting 7,700 phone calls and text messages.

Police allege that Mr Brown had been selling drugs to fellow Byron Bay High School students, to locals and tourists in licensed premises, and to revellers at music festivals.

Proposed coastal law 'vague'

An adjunct professor at the University of Technology (UTS) and acting Commissioner of the Land and Environment Court has told The Echo the public should be aware of slated changes to the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979.

Prof John Sheehan says that, if approved, the proposal by the NSW planning department to change section 117(2)would give the minister 'extensive powers'. He's also expressed concern over changes slated for the State Environmental Planning Policy (SEPP). Both proposals are on public submission until December 23.

He said, 'The wording in the last part of the Coastal Reform \$117 direction [within the EPA Act] is vague.

The changes are part of the creation of a new coastal management framework, called the Coastal Management Act

2016, replacing the Coastal Protection Act 1979.

The Environmental Defenders Office (EDO) told The Echo they are reviewing the changes. '[T]he issue is not that this is out of the ordinary, but more that this type of discretion offends, and can undermine, strategic and consistent planning?



Saddle Ridge residents say they are gearing up to resist plans by Council to include them in future urban planning.

The Saddle Ridge Local Area Management Planning Association (SRLAMPA) say they recently made a submission to Byron Council's preliminary draft Byron Residential Strategy.

Its president Matthew O'Reilly says members make up 90 per cent of landowners and residents on Saddle Ridge and are strongly opposed to a

change to residential zoning. 'We feel passionately about keeping the Saddle Road rural and are gearing up for a long battle if the Saddle Road is retained in the draft Byron Residential Plan, to be a wide variety of threatened released in 2017.

Former Labor minister withdraws his Uki water-extraction plan

A controversial plan by a former state agriculture minister to extract millions of litres of water a year from a licensed bore on his Uki property and truck it for bottling has been withdrawn.

Word spread fast around the tight-knit village last week after Tweed Shire Council confirmed the withdrawal in its weekly newsletter. Scores of residents voiced their concerns over the plan, involving up to six semi-trailer truck movements a day, six days a week, from 7am till 6pm, at a public meeting near the property last week.

Jack Hallam, who was agriculture minister under the Wran Labor government in the 1980s, retired to his ten-acre property a few kilometres from Uki more than a decade ago. He has since transformed

Planning dept at risk of conflict of interest: AG

The state's peak body overseeing government departments, the NSW auditor-general's department, has highlighted a lack of monitoring surrounding NSW planning agencies and the conflict of interest that can arise.

The new report on planning and environment says both staff and government agencies are often not required to declare a conflict of interest that can affect the broader community.

Less than half of the government agencies overseen by the department 'require contractors to declare conflicts of interest prior to engagement, and just over half require staff to declare secondary employment arrangements,' stated the report. Recommendations include implementing specific measurement guidelines for the program aimed at reducing large-scale illegal dumping, which is run by the Environment Protection Authority (EPA).

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Firsthand account of Standing Rock

The gas-guzzling V8 towing a fishing boat picked us up at Bismarck airport, North Dakota, USA.

My 22-year-old son Bibi and I were making the pilgrimage to Standing Rock where history was being made. The chill of the November afternoon fading light hit us after the warmth of California, where we'd spent the last month of our travels. It was two days before a presidential election which was to rock the world.

Brent, the local Bismarck postie whom I'd never met before, eyed us up and down cautiously as we stood at Arrivals, suitcase in hand, camera and tripod, tent and subzero thermal sleeping bags.

As we drove the streets, there were only posters supporting Trump in front yards. None for the former first lady.

'Whatcha want to go to Standing Rock for?' Brent asked. 'They're burnin' cars and turning them over! The police have blocked the roads. We probably can't get through even if I did want to take you!'

I wanted to go and film at Standing Rock to witness with 'our mob', a struggle that transcends national boundaries, perhaps the defining battle that speaks to the age we live in: clean water and life versus oil and dinosaur-fossil-fuel technology dependence.

I wanted to see for myself the courage of the 'Earth protectors' confronting the multi-billion-dollar mad-dash pipeline linkup from north to south before the January 1 contract date expires.

Fracked oil from North Dakota, transported thousands of miles south to North Carolina, was to be shipped offshore.

And I wanted to be there for election day and the aftermath. The oil project sat stalled on the northern side of the mighty Missouri River, a water supply for tens of millions downstream and the rich agricultural heartland of America. Brent is 'mad' (his words not mine); Aunt Judy had given us his number when I'd met her the day before in San Diego while making a film among America's homeless. In all of the eight US cities we visited in our three-month trip, I saw them everywhere: camped under bridges, sleeping on concrete sidewalks, huddled up under blue tarps or tents and doorways.

The human flotsam of the failed economic policies (except for the mega-rich one per cent) of economist Milton Friedman and his infamous Chicago Boys. There's no trickle-down here for these tens of thousands of sons and daughters of America.

Instead, it's a daily mix of mental illness, drug addiction, sexual violation of women, police harassment and traumatised war veterans.

Highway 1806

Pink Floyd's The Wall echoed off the Dakota hills as Brent's pickup took us further south on highway 1806.

After 45 minutes' driving we saw flashing red and blue police lights ahead. We had to turn back and take another long route around as the road was blocked up ahead.

Burnt military trucks and razor-wire spread jack-knifed across the concrete bridge over the Missouri. A surveillance helicopter circled constantly over the sprawling Standing Rock camp in the valley below. Tipis and tents, pop-up camper vans and smoking fires with warm coffee in huge vats waited to greet us.

Bibi and I set up our tent as a line of Sioux Indian security guards meandered in on horseback, silhouetted against a flaming pink skyline Friendly neighbours helped us. A spirit of common purpose and co-operation was to feature in the coming days at Standing Rock as we all blended into one tribe. Even though we came prepared, the temperatures inside our tent were below zero. And we froze in our tent that first night, despite layer upon layer of blankets and clothes over us. It felt like being in a war zone again. Was it a modernday version of the American

Civil War? A line was drawn in the muddy sands of the Missouri River where two ideologically opposed forces faced each other. Neither was prepared to give an inch.

At Standing Rock, only one side was prepared to use violence. On one side were the National Guard: police dressed in black Orwellian uniforms, complete with batons and helmets, gasmasks.

Private security forces, some reputedly from an offshoot of war mercenaries Blackwater Security, with Alsatian attack dogs, had set upon protesters, kids and a pregnant woman.

A boy on horseback had his horse shot from underneath him. A young woman had her arm severed by a rubber bullet shot at close range. Uniformed thugs delighted in spraying mace into the faces of people from a metre away.

Water cannons doused people in the freezing cold of night.

US paramilitary vehicles were used on American soil against their own people.

They were backed by helicopters and light aircraft circling day and night, in constant surveillance of the camp. Was this a vision of the America we would see under president Trump?

going down to the river with the native American women to dip a special urn into the water and drink from it to empower or purify oneself. Or going over the river to confront Power.

I was excited to see a lot of young people in their 20s and 30s. I'd waited a long time to see generations X and Y, the millennials take up the challenge of trying to solve some of the major problems on Mother Earth that my generation of the 1940s and 50s has created.

Here they were, building insulated shelters for the winter to withstand snow drops of over one metre on the ground. They were digging in for what looked like the battle for Stalingrad.

A kitchen and mess hall, a preschool. Lawyers filled out forms for those about to go off into the direct action front lines to confront police and attack dogs.

Recently arrived recruits from all over America, Canada, France, Sweden, Denmark and Mexico were being instructed by a young indigenous woman in her 20s how to link arms and move forward towards police lines proclaiming the mantra, 'Water is life!'

At Standing Rock we woke on election morning to the shock reality. Donald was to be president. Around the campsite women shared a silent tear. On Facebook Hill, the only place to get a wi-fi signal, disbelief. With reluctance, on November 11, Bibi and I left our tent and sleeping bags, our blankets for others to use who would come in after us.

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Daily prayer

Every morning, the elders of the Lakota people and one hundred other native American tribes who had come in solidarity would gather to lead a circle of 'earth protectors' in mindful prayer. Calling out to the great creator. Around the sacred fire, always burning in the middle of the circle that one was not allowed to film out of respect. The prayers of the elders would set the course for the day, be it for protection or

Growing up in a transient Shire

It's been almost a year since former TAFE teacher Teeya Blatt took on the role as manager of the Byron Youth Service (BYS), a service she believes is perfectly positioned to provide programs for young people across the community.

'BYS has been around since 1987,' says Teeva, 'and the purpose is to provide services to young people throughout the Byron Shire, which includes entertainment and responding to their needs. The idea is to provide programs that come directly from young people. We have ten staff working directly with young people, so who better to address their needs?'

Currently most of the government grants are to maintain young people in school or to put them on employment pathways.

Ms Blatt identified a real need for the service to be able to respond to what she describes as 'the particular needs of Byron Shire youth with their home town being a festival or party destination.

Tourism issues

She believes that funding bodies are unaware of the tourism-related issues that affect local youth.

'I don't know if funding bodies would know, for instance, that the Byron Shire hinterland is the go-to destination for doof parties. There are particular stresses and distresses that come from living in a party-town destination.

'Young people here get the message of transience - not about how to build and maintain strong relationships. A lot of what we do here is about communication, relationship skills, respect; all of those things are what get sacrificed

or diminished in a transient society. If you are not going to see this person next week why do you need to respect them?

'All the stresses, high tourism, lack of housing, increased cost of living on family, those stressors get passed on from adults to kids.

Ms Blatt believes that this underpins a lot of the issues facing local youth, and referenced in particular an event where local youth became aggressive towards visiting schoolies.

She believes that it's hard to ascertain where that group actually came from, but the broader question is, 'What is happening for them where they are expressing themselves in an aggressive way?'

'If I had to guess I would think we are animals; we are territorial. Their sense of belonging is being threatened, and they are seeing our community put so much money and resources into out-oftowners and nothing for them?

Youth-initiated programs needed

There is a real need Ms Blatt believes for youth-initiated programs and forums to be running across the Shire.

'The idea shouldn't come from a funding body,' she says, 'it should come from young people'.

'We have lots of ideas; we've applied for lots of grants. The programs we want to get funded include the screening of regular outdoor movies, monthly alcohol-free dance parties, doof angels programs where young people are trained in first aid and how to identify crises so they can support young people in party situations.

'We have an idea for a first-offence referral where

young people get a warning for drug use from police and are immediately referred to a drug program at the BYS.

We also need activities in Mullumbimby and north of the Shire... barbecues, basketball games, movie nights.

'I did a survey of young people (years nine and ten) and they said they wanted to go on adventures.'

Ms Blatt believes our community has the resources to provide incredible opportunities for our young people.

'Imagine if the dive schools donated a dive, even a snorkelling session a week, or the trapeze places gave us vouchers for kids to fly every week, or even a martial-arts school came here and gave a free lesson every fortnight.

'Community members don't have to give money; there are so many skills and services they could offer,' says Ms Blatt.

BYS benefits

'The benefit of coming through BYS is the young people have access to a youth worker so that if there are any issues in their lives they will have the support...'

Currently the service requires \$120,000 each year just to keep operational.

'That's admin, project running costs, manager's wage, insurances, accountant, part of the frontline office person's wage,' says Teeya.

There are currently many businesses and individuals contributing to make programs, like Street Cruise that runs every Friday night, possible. 'That is a harm-minimisa-

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tion outreach that stays in Byron but does a cruise around.

'We provide food (pizza from Earth 'n' Sea) and water (from Captured Water) and advocacy where necessary. The Street Cruise will take

local kids home as far as Mullumbimby or Ocean Shores.

We operate 8pm till 12pm Friday nights and we want to expand this north of the Shire'. In order to fund new pro-

grams or to expand existing services, BYS requires donations.

Operational efficiencies

Councillors at this Thursday's meeting will decide on how to move forward with staff's proposed Special Rate Variation (SRV).

It's a tough and complex decision; without a SRV, staff say Council 'will have some difficult decisions to make concerning reductions in services, maintenance and facilities programs.'

This will include 'how to address increases to the annually reported infrastructure backlog, which are essentially roads.

If not addressed, Council could be considered as a possible amalgamation target, they say, if the government's 'fit for the future' benchmark is not met.

Staff claim that, as a guide, it costs around \$750,000 per kilometre to re-construct a section of road. Currently staff say the Shire's sealed road network is around 600 kilometres in length and 43 per cent of those roads are in need of reconstruction.

It's worth noting staff and the general manager (GM) came under fire for not providing the public with a consistent fourth 'no rate rise option' across all feedback surveys, be that online or printed. But the GM says that decision reflects Council's commitment to the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) and the local government minister that 'Council would submit a SRV to increase its rates yield'.

In other words, the government forced this council and others to raise rates, or risk amalgamation.

But providing the fourth 'no rate rise option' across all surveys gives confidence the whole exercise is transparent.

And this is an exercise in confidence. To their credit, staff have been willing to patiently explain and debate the reasoning.

There are many angles to this. For example, IPART's initial recommendations into a current review of how rates are applied by councils may see unimproved land values replaced with capital improved value (ie rates would be applied to the total worth of a property, not just the land value). This has support from the NSW local government peak body, though its approval and implementation are unknown. The potential result, says the GM, is that 'million-dollar mansions will pay more and modest residences will pay less, bringing more equity to the system.

As a ratepayer on a very modest income who does not own a holiday-let property, I cannot afford any dramatic rate rise.

I suspect many others in the Shire wouldn't be able to either. Many suggestions canvassed publicly that appeared worthy of investigation have been rejected by the GM, be it bed tax, tourism levies or an investment arm.

So before rates are jacked up to pay for roads, I would like to see Council's long-term independent auditor replaced and a new public forensic audit undertaken, with emphasis on roadworks.

Council should also first complete all their key strategies within their Council Improvement Program (CIP), which includes 'asset realisation', or the sale and development of land under Council control. This audit is still ongoing, say staff.

Let's also not forget 'efficiencies and strategic procurement savings,' which are also an ongoing component of the CIP.

In October 2015, neighbouring Tweed, Kyogle and Clarence Valley councils were deemed unfit for the state government's 'fit for the future' benchmark. But last month, the National Party – ie the NSW government - were flogged in the Orange electorate because they lied about forced amalgamations, among other issues. The urgency may be bubbling away, but it appears all avenues are yet to be exhausted. This has the whiff of austerity about it.

Negative growth mirrors negative policies

he constant refrain of economists who get it wrong is that we should never rely on just one set of figures.

And so when the September accounts emerged far worse that even the most pessimistic practitioners of the dismal science predicted, they hastened to assure us that once the entrails of next quarter's chooks had been assessed, things would be better.

And they'd want to be: the GDP collapsed from rising by 0.6 per cent in June to falling by 0.5 just 12 weeks later - a drop of over a full percentage point, the worst result since the Global Financial Crisis.

Various excuses were proffered: the weather, the timing of the arrival of some helicopters, and perhaps it was really all Western Australia's fault. And then there was the election itself, which had apparently engendered uncertainty and confusion rather than the jobs and growth promised. So we have negative growth; now for this week's news on jobs, or the lack of them.

Malcolm Turnbull managed to ignore the first three months of his narrow escape; this was no more than a bump in the road; he had other things to shuffle aside. But his treasurer, Scott Morrison, could not avoid comment, which he did initially by blaming Bill Shorten and the Labor Party for everything.

And his own solution?

A demand to get behind the government's program, a plea for a partnership with someone (presumably the crossbench) to join him in legislating company tax cuts.

Given that Treasury's own forecasts would add just one per cent, less than the drop in the last quarter, over the next twenty years, this was not the most enticing prospect.

But it appears to be the only the one he can think of – tear a

giant hole in revenue in the hope of a derisory return long after he and his colleagues are snug in their well-funded retirement homes

So perhaps fortunately the caravan moved on, to watch Turnbull in his customary position - denying his own previous promises and convictions, ignoring physics, economics and common sense in yet another futile grovel to assuage the insatiable lunar right of his party room.

Treasurer Scott Morrison initially blamed Bill Shorten and the Labor Party for everything.


In the process he threw the hapless Josh Frydenberg under a bus, forcing him to perjure himself in supplication for daring to hint what all the experts had told him – that it might be worth considering - only considering, mind - an emissions intensity fund in the electricity industry would actually provide a cheaper and more reliable method of dealing with the mounting problems of the sector than doing nothing - which is, apparently, the government's preferred option.

Even in the right's own terms this does not make sense: it is true that the wingnuts have their share of climate denialists, but the unpalatable fact is that the government, however reluctantly, is forced to do something about the international consensus that global warning cannot be ignored. Turnbull, Frydenberg and even such outliers as Barnaby Joyce have agreed that the Paris accords to limit emissions must be met.

So that being the case, it would surely make sense to do so in the cheapest and least painful way possible - the way all the

economists, the environmentalists, the government's own chief scientist Alan Finkel and even those within the industry concur. But not the coalition party rooms. Carbon tax, of course, cannot even be mentioned, as Turnbull trumpets.

ter now insists, can the merest suggestion of emissions trading. This is not rational - it is not even ideology. It is simple bloody-mindedness.





And in the end it is utterly counterproductive: electricity prices will go up, more than they need to, and supply will be threatened. And while Australia will probably meet its emission-reduction target in 2020, the prospect of making the Paris figure in 2030 is wildly impractical - unless, of course, this government, and incoming ones, are forced either to spend vast amounts of public money to overfund the manifestly inefficient mechanism of what is misleadingly called 'Direct Action', or more probably to see reason and return to market solutions like emissions trading. Hush my mouth.

And on this matter at least, it appears that our plastic prime minister is implacable. When the premiers met at COAG last week with a plea for a national agenda to end the state-based confusion on climate policy, Turnbull simply reiterated his or Tony Abbott's, or Cory Bernardi's - current policy: no carbon pricing, no emissions trading. No nothing. We will bumble along as usual.

But he has not been entirely

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idle. Yet another leak tells us that the government is set to ditch Abbott's signature Green Army – the bunch of youthful conscripts dragooned into an expensive make-work program to mask the real extent of youth unemployment.

The real Greens' Richard Di Natale said it was about time the Green Army was never an environmental initiative, which seems a bit harsh; some trees were planted, some weeds pulled.

But it led to few if any real jobs and will not be missed - any more than the rest of Abbott's absurd Direct Action plan would be if Turnbull ever had the ticker to pull the plug.

Once again it was a slap at Abbott which merely enraged the increasingly feisty pretender when what was needed was a killer blow.

And the other news on the environment front is that Turnbull is still considering a billiondollar loan to the multinational mogul miner Adani on mate's rates, although the company has already admitted that it doesn't really need it in order to dig up a large part of the QLD landscape and further endanger the Great Barrier Reef in the process.

Still, it would be a friendly gesture, so why not?

The hell with GDP.

In spite of all this Turnbull remains determinedly upbeat: innovation (although not, obviously, on environment policy) is still the key to everything, we must keep on keeping on, and sooner or later. Something will come out right.

It must, mustn't it? The law of averages says so, and that is one scientific truth Turnbull is still willing to espouse.

Of course in the meantime he risks being exposed as an unprincipled coward, a fraud and a poltroon. But that will be just another poll. And you should never rely on just one set of figures...

With a new council and a new committee per-

haps the problems will finally be addressed.


Common wealth

Countries where the effects of austerity, social policies and neoliberal economic policies have hit particularly sharply with devastating consequences over many years. Of course it has been austerity for the many and huge prosperity for the few.

We are seeing the political discontent fostered by these policies as people seek alternatives to the old norms. Policies also pursued to a greater or lesser degree by various governments over the last years in Australia with devastating effects in many areas. Witness the closure of the car industry, for example, the effects of which are yet to be felt.

Pilot programs have also been run or proposed in countries such as Kenya, Uganda and parts of India. A form of the idea was even proposed by Tom Paine during the American Revolution as he developed the notion of common wealth or agrarian justice.

In other words, the right of all citizens to have access to land or access to the products of the land as a natural right of humans to have the means to a reasonable subsistence. This translates in a contemporary context into the products of all technological advances in production both in agriculture and industry for the benefit of all.

The so-called 'commonwealth' has become 'privatewealth'. It needs to be returned to the commons if society is to survive at any level of decency and justice for all.

We all contribute to and create the monetary wealth one way or another via consumption taxes or income taxes. And equally importantly social wealth is created by the vast amount of unpaid work that is carried out in homes and communities.

Wealth needs to be distributed to all.

As traditional work patterns and access to the product of labour changes and slowly disappears, as outlined by Phillip Frazer, Universal Basic Income is a simple and elegant mechanism for achieving this.

Precious water lost to leak

We moved into a new house six years ago and I'm proud of the fact that since then we have only used 247 kilolitres of water. Growing up in the desert and then living on a boat for some years has made me totally resources-aware.

A few weeks ago a local plumber knocked on my door and said he thought we may have a leak in our water service. Our service runs from the street to an easement along a driveway through a neighbour's property until it meets our property and then into our house.

After a bit of digging the leak was found and the piece of poly pipe with a small hole (see picture) was replaced. We still have no idea what created the puncture but the plumber speculated that it may have been a sharp rock underground.

The plumber suggested that I contact the council and ask for a variation on our water bill due to leakage. Imagine my chagrin when a letter arrived from the council stating that the amount of water lost was 253 kilolitres or 2.8111 kilolitres per day at a cost of



water than we had actually used in the past six years!

As the meter only gets read every three months, it's possible that water had been leaking for a very long time without our knowledge. What's more, I was pretty surprised to hear from the person at the council that we were not the only ones who would be getting a bill for water leaks and that ours was not even large in comparison.

As a conservationist, it hurts me to think that so much treated water is being lost without some kind of red flag alert going up. It is simply left to the customer to make these discoveries themselves. should be demanding there be some better system for alerts. Just because the owner has to pay for the lost water doesn't mean that the council or the water supplier shouldn't be concerned.

Treated water is too precious a commodity to just be allowed to run down the drain. From now on, I'll be turning off all the taps at my house and checking the meter at least once every couple of weeks. And unless you don't care if you receive a water bill for extra thousands of dollars from out of the blue, I would suggest you do too!

Adani and the zombie jobs that just won't die

Australia is a nation on the move: 10,000 people are trudging towards the zombie jobs promised them in Queensland by Indian company Adani at its proposed Carmichael mine.

That job figure has our leaders falling over themselves to expedite approvals and throw one billion taxpayer dollars at Adani.

On December 6 Queensland premier Annastacia Palaszczuk, in the lead-up to a media gig in Townsville with boss Gautam Adani, was so excited she multiplied the promised jobs to 'tens of thousands' on ABC News 24.

There is a big, farting elephant in Ms Palaszczuk's office.

The 10,000 jobs are zombie jobs. They lurk year after year in Adani-generated publicity despite the true figure being 1,464. That's right, under 1,500 jobs according to Adani's own economic consultant, Jerome Fahrer of ACIL Allen Consulting, testifying in the Land Court of Oueensland in January 2015.

The truth does not deter Adani, its acolytes and main-

stream media from continuous repetition of the zombie figure 10,000.

'In dispute'

In the lead-up to the Tuesday Townsville announcement, a preview by the ABC's Leonie Mellor reported 10,000 jobs.

Having followed the issue for years, I was alarmed to see the fake figure emerge and emailed Ms Mellor, saying

the true figure is contained in the expert witness testimony of The Australia Institute, which can view here: http:// bit.ly/adanifig.

I don't know if she read my email, but Mellor went to air that night saying 'the exact number of jobs is in dispute, but ranges between 1,500 and 4,000.

Next day I almost choked as the 10,000 jobs were thrown up continuously by

the ABC as well as the Sydney Morning Herald, Huffington Post, Murdoch mouthpieces like the Courier Mail and pretty much the entire mainstream media.

Quality of advice

The zombie jobs were heavily promoted by Queensland resources minister Anthony Lynham, LNP opposition leader Tim Nicholls, federal resources minister Matt Canavan, former federal mining minister and now Queensland Resources Council chief Ian Macfarlane, Townsville mayor Jenny Hill along with local port and business organisations, PM Malcolm Turnbull, deputy PM Barnaby Joyce, and of course, Adani Australia head Jeyakumar Janakaraj.

I was left wondering at the quality of advice politicians receive.

Surely someone has informed Ms Palaszczuk of the Land Court case and the actual figure of 1,464? Don't Turnbull, Joyce and co have a team of public servants delivering frank and fearless advice?

The zombie jobs look even more shonky alongside the \$1 billion concessional loan being offered to subsidise Adani's proposed railway line from the mine to Abbot Point

Independent Australia's mining correspondent Lachlan Barker told me the loan translates out as \$683,060 per job. 'Outrageous,' he said. 'If Adani and Palaszczuk are so concerned about jobs, they could employ 1,464 people to work on farms or on reef conservation at the minimum wage in Queensland for a fraction of that cost.

Solar jobs

Meanwhile, freelance journalist Michael West points out: 'If that same \$1 billion of taxpayers' subsidy was to finance a solar project it would create 9,000 construction jobs.

Stack the zombie jobs up against real jobs associated with the nearby Great Barrier Reef, estimated at around 70,000. Jobs already threatened by this year's death of a third of the reef owing to global warming.

Emissions from what will be the world's largest coal mine will markedly accelerate climate change. Dredging for the Abbot Point port and heavy shipping through the reef will create further pollution.

As the elephant in Palaszczuk's office farts again and turns white, keep in mind Adani's railway line is of incompatible gauge with Queensland's rail network, making it useless for anything other than hauling coal wagons.

Adani has many problems between its coal dreaming and its hole in the ground.

Banks are steering clear of funding the \$22b project, which looks commercially unviable owing to structural decline in world coal prices.

India, destination of the coal and most of the profits, has large coal reserves of its own. India's PM wants coal imports phased out, and a future focus on renewables.

The Carmichael mine faces further legal challenges, including one from traditional owners determined to go to the High Court.

Farmers object to the government's gratuitous grant of unlimited free water to the miners, likely to deplete the Great Artesian Basin with colossal water extraction.

Blockades

Community groups such as Coast and Country and Lock the Gate have pledged to battle Adani on every front, including blockades on the ground if necessary.

What do our politicians, pushing so hard for Adani and Carmichael, expect to get for their efforts? The royalties and taxes are vastly overstated. There may be more junkets to India, fat political donations and cushy boardroom positions.

All on the back of the taxpayer dollar, environmental havoc and 10,000 zombie jobs.



I'm flying over verdant fields where neat fences separate the millet from the corn, the cannabis from the sunflowers. I like neat. Neat is nice. The corn and sunflowers wave in my slipstream like a chorus line in a musical. Food and medicine for all. Nature is nice.

Tucking my left hand close to my chest, I bank left, my shadow flitting across a lush paddock where four cows look up, their tails flicking contentedly. My forelock doesn't flick, despite my speed.

Go on, back to school, you young'uns, I say, expertly maintaining height and direction while gesticualting with one arm towards the school. And remember, I shout, stay away from social media.

I tuck my right arm to my chest, effecting a tight turn over the Cawongla Shoppe where old men sip layered lattes in glasses with low handles, and young women do line yoga in the sun.

The world is a gentle caring mother, looking after us, providing for us.

But... I hear a rumble. A disturbing sound, like danger. It's a growl. (Can't be nature; nature is nice.) It seems to be coming from Kyogle.

(Oh, that'd be right...)

I look under my left arm – the yogis and drinkers seem unperturbed. It was probably just wind (under my cape).

Looking at his current work, it's pretty clear that Noel is passionate about two things: biodiversity and extinction... and using the colour sequences that occur in the plumage of parrot species as a symbol in his abstracted blown-glass works.

'I have studied the range of colours in the way that parrots see them, which is mostly in the ultraviolet spectrum – unlike our own sight which is mostly in the infrared spectrum,' he explains. 'I also have an interest in the way the parrots' colours are reproduced in magazines and books, and how they are often quite different from how they look to our eyes in our reality.'

Living deliberately

Apart from some sniggering, you'll get the usual resistance to change along with those genuine folk who were casualties of teething at the beginning of this new endeavour.

Regardless of how it's panning out, we now have another eccentric and multifaceted experience to enjoy on our doorstep – The Poinciana (3.0).

To understand the vision new owner Monique Emilio has for this space, you'll need to empty your thoughts of old Poinciana Café memories. Now, take a deep breath. Are you sitting calmly?

To some, this is how you have to start a conversation about their old haunt. You'll hear, 'but we tried it and...', or 'l heard they're getting rid of the tree!' or 'it's so pretentious – I just want to order a hamburger'. Rest easy, nobody is touching the tree; its roots are old, but they're not going anywhere.

Endowed with a legacy from Mon's mother who has died, the tree is adorned with optical fibres 'to bring the tree light', Mon told me. The fairy-lit Poinciana is an icon and now a tribute to Monique's 'freespirited mother'. Yep, there are no toasties or burgers served here; Mullum has other eateries that already cater to these cravings.

You see, the notion that an iconic place such as the Poinciana is there for the locals is true only in that locals need to like what the place is doing – not what the place isn't doing. After all, new customers don't have history; therefore you either move forward or miss out on new possibilities.

Because nothing is, everything appears to be.

'I live my life deliberately,' Mon tells me.



'That's to say I'm responsible for everything I initiate and bring into my life. The Poinciana has always felt to me like it has a female energy and now it has a strong woman directing it. I feel comfortable with where the Poinciana will go from here.

I grew up in a large hippy community, so sharing food and entertainment is what I love and know. In keeping with this, we created a sharing menu and a list of what people love,' Mon said. A casual courtyard by day and a beer garden by night – check. A kitchen with experienced chefs – check. No plastic, ethical sourcing, cold beer on tap, organic wine, vegan options, talented musicians, free filtered and spritzig water. 'The list gets longer as suggestions roll in,' Mon added.

It certainly has a lot to offer: family-friendly alfresco dining and, considering the quality, has a well-priced menu that's finding its feet with the punter. There's uplifting entertainment in an airy setting. From 8am, seven days it's a coffee house serving a nice breakfast and lunch menu. The bar opens all day and is a relaxed evening setting in the latter part of the week. Add ex-Harvest head chef Kahlil Palazzos's new menu and the joint should be jumping (like the crickets just before they're served on his slowcooked pork belly).

Kahlil tells me he was mostly inspired by his 'hippy' parents while travelling extensively

throughout the world. He's truly had a grassroots education provided by some of the best culinary masters in Australia. His time working in the Rockpool, Paramount, Hugo's, Tetsuya's, Jimmy Liks, Balzac, Pier, Quay and Pilu (to name a lot), has put him in very good culinary shape. With roots down in the hinterland, he worked at the reputable Harvest Café in Newrybar. Now passionate about farm to table, Kahlil appears to draw inspiration from locally sourced produce, promoting farmers with ethical and sustainable practices.

Off the menu there's a selection of interesting dishes designed for sharing. Heavier dishes, such as prime slow-cooked rib-eye for a comparatively small \$28 pricing, top the menu. A generous serving of Yacutan roast chicken comes to table for \$24 – I know, right? So, like any good beergarden you'll find a happy hour, beer and drinks and good live local music. The Poincy is shaping up to be an argument for staying in Mullum or driving back into town when in the past you'd have to hold hands to contact the living past 8pm.

So, co-creating The Poinciana into a destination appears to be a credo rather than a cold-hearted business plan. Could this place be the social hub of Mullum? The jewel in the crown? We'll just have to find out, won't we?

How cold do you like your ice-cream? How about –196 degrees Celsius?

The use of liquid nitrogen in food and drink, a growing trend overseas, has inspired Space Bars Ice Creamery to create ice-cream by freezing it before your eyes. That is, if your eyes can see through the spacey and delightfully mesmerising cloud of vapour that results when the liquid nitrogen 'boils' once it is released into the air. It turns out that the liquid nitrogen method of cooling is perfect for vegan ice-cream. Coconut milk, the major ingredient in vegan ice-cream, is less naturally 'creamy' than cow milk. Liquid nitrogen cooling produces much smaller ice crystals than traditional freezing, meaning that the final product is smoother and creamier.

How it works is that Jahli and Kash make the ice-cream base the day before. Then, when you order, your selected flavouring is added to the base in a kitchen mixer.

The theatre begins when the liquid nitrogen is poured on top. It is super fun to watch!

If you are also curious, despite the above assurances that it is safe, please do not try using liquid nitrogen to make ice-cream at home! Instead, check out one of the markets and events that serve up spacey ice-cream.

The co-creators of Space Bars are business partners Jahli Eves and Kash Crabbe. They have managed to combine their shared interests (ice-cream and science) into a business that has just ticked over a year in operation after a long development phase. 'We did so many recipe trials!' laughs Jahli.

Space Bars also meets Jahli and Kash's shared philosophy of ethical and sustainable consciousness. This is expressed in several ways: their ice-cream is vegan; they use biodegradable cutlery and packaging; and they donate twenty per cent of all profits to local causes, such as the animal sanctuary Sugarshine Farm. But is it dangerous? You would be forgiven for thinking so, given that liquid nitrogen is used for things such as cryogenics and cooling superconductors but, when handled safely, it is not. Momentary contact with small amounts of the liquid does not result in burning, thanks to an insulating layer of gas that instantly forms when the liquid comes into contact with something as warm as skin. 'We do not use gloves or face shields as the nitrogen will only burn when it is trapped,' explains Jahli.

The two have done a lot of research and received training from the company that supplies the liquid. 'We're definitely the only people whom they service for food use,' Jahli says. 'A driver came to an event to try our icecream as he was so curious!' she adds.

The 6 Tastes

Ayurveda is a hard word to spell, but learning its etymology (the origin of words) has helped me find the right keys to strike. Ayu is from the Sanskrit word for life, and veda loosely translates as knowledge. The two are joined with an r to form Ayurveda - commonly referred to as the 'science of healthy living'.

My linguistics lesson comes from Dominic Gleeson, a man who lives a peaceful existence in Ewingsdale, complete with a view of the lighthouse from his garden, and studies Ayurveda in Byron Bay.

'What does this have to do with food?' I hear you cry. Ayurveda has everything to do with the plate of food I taste as we talk. Over a base of leafy greens, a pakora packed with vegetables and spices shares the plate with a warming dhal, a cooling yogurt with mint and cucumber, all topped with sweet pomegranate seeds. The dish is a delight of tastes, with so many spices that I stop taking notes after cumin, ajwain, turmeric, ginger, garlic, garam masala and chili.

This is the dish that Dominic serves at his market stall that he calls The 6 Tastes. The name comes from the food element of Ayurveda. The first three tastes are those we are perhaps most familiar with: sweet, sour and salty.



The other three are those that western diets tend to dismiss: pungent, bitter and astringent.

For good health, these tastes need to be balanced, a message that Dominic is keen to share. 'I want to teach people as best I can that the right combination of foods and tastes lead to optimal digestion and absorption, leading to longevity,' he says. Refreshingly, Ayurveda does not consider longevity just in terms of number of years. 'It's about having a long and healthy life,' Dominic stresses.

Dominic came to Ayurveda via naturopathy after realising that his lifestyle as a successful DJ in the UK was, in his words: 'not doing me any favours'.

He changed his lifestyle, partly inspired by becoming a father, in order to give himself a better life. 'My granny died at age 102 and was healthy until she had a fall, so it's in my genes,' he says.

Dominic started The 6 Tastes two months ago. 'I had an idea for a restaurant but didn't want to run before I could walk,' he says. The market stall has been a hit with punters. 'People know what's good for them,' he says of his growing loyal following. He has mainly

Fresh new Succulent crew

These days when a restaurant changes hands in Byron, there's often a crew of PR/ social-media managers, interior designers and menu consultants in the background, so it's refreshing to see Carmen and FC doing all the work themselves after taking over Succulent Café in Byron Street, Byron.

Carmen, who ran a wine and cigar bar in Beijing, met FC while doing her Master of Business at Griffith Uni. The two are schoolmates and business partners; as if starting a restaurant isn't demanding enough, FC has recently become a father for the first time - luckily for FC and his wife, his family has come to Australia to support them.

Succulent's location is off the main drag, near Byron Quarter and Centrelink, but it's built a reputation for daytime trade under previous owner Patrick. While retaining the western breakfast menu, the new direction is to add northeast Asian lunch and dinner. Visiting early in the morning, I tried an Asian twist on Eggs Benedict, a completely satisfying and bread-free alternative made deliciously with Japanese sushi rice.

Western-fused northeast Asian cuisine.

Succulent aims to meet the demand for healthy Asian food in Byron: no MSG, freerange chicken/eggs, organic ingredients. Gluten-free, vegetarian and even vegan options are available.

Experienced chef Jupil, who has come to Byron from the Melbourne Korean restaurant

Weekdays 11.30am-2.30pm there is a \$10-14 lunch special menu featuring such 'safe' dishes as dumpling (made inhouse by chef Jupil and the team), traditional Udon noodle, Donburi (Japanese dish of rice topped with salad) and Teriyaki chicken wrap. But there are more adventurous dishes for dinner such as the Signature sizzling plate (stir-fried

vegetables with choice of meat served on an iron plate), and some new fish dishes on the menu! The liquor licence is expected shortly for dinner (Mon-Sun 5.30-9pm; it's BYO for the moment).

One sure-fire winner is Japanese Karaage Chicken (chef Jupil also makes Korean style), comprising crunchy deep-fried pieces of marinated free-range chicken, a sort of Korean KFC (but better) that tastes particularly good with beer.

Kids may never want to eat takeaway chicken again once they have tried the half-chicken and chips (wouldn't that be a shame) or the lollypop-shaped crumbed octopus called Takoyaki pops.

Like many who come to the area, Carmen was a regular visitor to Byron before falling in love with the place and making the opportunity to open a business here. If you like northeast Asian cuisine, try the new Succulent Café on these warm summer days and nights. 3/8 Byron St, Byron Bay. Takeaway/private functions available. BYO. Open for breakfast Tue–Sun, lunch and dinner Mon-Sun (see above). Ph 6685 5711.

There is a whole lot more to the food side of Ayurveda than I have mentioned here. If you are interested, feel free to seek out Dominic (while enjoying his English accent) at one of his local events coming up. My knowledge of Ayurveda may still be rudimentary, but my fingers type out the letters with growing ease. Try a 6 Tastes meal on 23 December (Red Devil Park, Suffolk

Park, 3–9pm) and New Years Day (Mullumbimby Leagues Club, 3-9pm). www.bewellhealthy.com scene, is Korean, but can make the whole range of northeast Asian styles, so expect a 'change up' with the menu becoming even more interesting.





The Real Estate Institute of Australia (REIA) says that in the September quarter of 2016, housing affordability in Australia declined marginally.

It also showed that the proportion of the median family income required to meet average monthly loan repayments had increased to 29.5 per cent from 29.4 per cent in the previous quarter.

REIA president Malcolm Gunning said: 'The latest Adelaide Bank/ REIA Housing Affordability Report shows that while the proportion of the median family income required to meet average monthly loan repayments increased by 0.1 percentage points, it is still at the lower end over the last seven years'.

'Unfortunately, historically low interest rates were unable to offset the increasing size of mortgages, resulting in the rise in the proportion of the median family income required to meet average monthly loan repayments. 'Over the September quarter, affordability improved in Victoria, South Australia, the Northern Territory and the Australian Capital Territory. 'New South Wales remained the least affordable state or territory for home buyers. Tasmania had the smallest average loan size while the proportion of first-home buyers on the owner-occupier market was the largest in Western Australia.

THE WONDERBABE COLLECTIVE HAVE BEEN ARTISTS-IN-RESIDENCE AT NORPA FOR THE LAST TWO WEEKS DEVELOPING A NEW WORK CALLED THE ADVENTURES OF WONDERBABE -A LIVE STORYTELLING PERFORMANCE SET TO A THUMPING DJ SET, MADE FOR MUSIC AND CULTURAL FESTIVALS.

A young woman is disenchanted with her culture and her voice that there was a link for me between the ideas I had around as silent within it. After a brutal test of her social/sexual limits, she takes her politicised fury to its extremity and burns herself alive on New Years Eve in Byron Bay in an act of terrorism. It is a thrilling ride and a picture of young female sexuality in Australia that is so accurate the mirror is possibly too clean; it is hard to stomach even for the most open-minded of men, meanwhile young women often identify the story as the casual truth, one they carry with them always - which is perhaps the most shocking part.

The Echo spoke to writer/performer Kate McDowell.

What was the inspiration for your work?

By the time I'd already tried out a few ideas – I started with terrorism and racism - it was a time when I felt I was cracking because it was dawning on me that I had no political voice, that in every context I stepped into I felt powerless, and as someone with a revolutionary streak - wanting to be able to argue and debate and create change - realising that the culture I lived in had no space for my voice, it was shocking. At the same time I was trying to understand what it means to embrace the new wave of 'slut' feminism - to be entirely sexually liberated as a political act, and as a way of getting out of the loop of being affected by men and society's way of defining me.

How did you craft the narrative?

I began by writing a whole lot – scenes from events that had happened in my and my friend's lives as well as fictional scenes, mythical scenes, anything that came to me that could deal with what was making me angry, that could articulate how I saw the state of my culture. Then I began stitching these scenes together. It went through countless drafts and evolved immensely over the course of a year (the year I studied a postgraduate diploma of writing for performance at NIDA). What I realised as I was working through drafts was




terrorism and the way we demonise terrorists; I see them as people confused, fighting for something, trying to break out of oppression – and the struggle I see for women. So I amalgamated the ideas, and made myself a terrorist, and then I'd found my allegory, the frame from which to tell my story. I also realised through the process that I had been setting the story in everywhere except where I grew up - probably a spill-over of the Australian cultural cringe - anywhere is more interesting than home. My teacher Stephen Sewell encouraged me to write from my specificity; that's when the story really took off, when I was able to set it in the colours and smells of Byron, of this region, of the place that made me.

How difficult is it, do you think, for young people to speak about trauma? Why do you think it is important?

I feel young people don't want to complain. Young men and women want to be cool, and together and strong – and so often they work through their trauma in their own bubble - I certainly did. And when there aren't stories being told around them that relate directly to their experience, that aren't shying away from the truth, I think they can often feel like they are alone. I believe that storytelling has the power to show us the extreme version of our struggles, to see them in the context of the bigger picture, so we don't have to be so attached to the struggle personally, so we can place ourselves within a continuum and make more informed choices about our social and political life.

Why have you chosen epic poetry and allegorical text to express this piece?

Because we have been performing Shakespeare and Greek tragedy since forever - because we love to understand our moral dilemmas through heightened stories and heightened language – we love to be consumed by stories that are epic,

and tragic, and greater than ourselves. So I have written this story using the allegorical form and in heightened language to lift it out of the pedestrian - to make the life we live here, the struggle, the trauma of our small lives – epic. To make our struggle important. And to take us to a place of beauty and grandness, as a way of honouring the scale of the impact small events have on young people's lives, or anyone's lives. It's a form we don't see a lot of in new work for the theatre, especially in Australia, and I miss it here. In a secular world where we are moving away from organised religion and into a plethora of spiritualities, I think epic, grand stories that express something of our current moment in history, are important.

Have we become over sexualised and desensitised; how has this manifested in our young people?

Yes and no. We have become super sexualised and we see sex everywhere but, at the same time, I think many people are seeking something more real, something more connected, something that's harder to get. I know for me, in a world where I could choose polyamory, I feel compelled to try out that life, to be contemporary, to be as liberated as possible; I'm sure many other men and women feel the same way, feel the need to capitalise on the capacity to break out of old ideas about sexuality. But in many ways this is another trap for people who don't necessarily enjoy that life, who don't want to go down the rabbit hole of sexual extremes and who end up finding it hard to find a connection that is genuinely liberating for them, the kind of love that transcends all the politics.

I feel that young people struggle in a world where romance and suspense are harder to get. Where the story is taken out of it, where happiness in love relies so heavily on the physical. I think it manifests negatively when young men and women see love and sex without the care and the compassion. In many ways, we need to become more desensitised; sex education needs to be complete; young men and women need to learn about it from an early age, so that it's understood anatomically, properly, so that sex isn't a taboo anymore, and connection and genuine expression of love and affection can be important, over competitiveness of how far we go in our sex lives. That just drives people to see sex and relationships as a game to be won. And if it's a game, there will always be people who lose

We see it in the recent pornographic ring run by young boys in high schools trading naked photos of girls, playing a game of shaming the girls they pinned on their lists. The girls in many cases were complicit in being sexually engaged with the boys who were secretly taking their photos and then trading them online. These boys are trying to gain validity and control in their culture; the question is how do we teach these young men about their worth, about how they are loved by their community, outside of their capacity to destroy the reputation of the most desired girl. I think by desensitising them further, by making sex normal, then young men and women will be more liberated to make their own choices, without feeling under pressure to use sex as a social or political act of power.

What does young feminism look like? How has it evolved and changed, do you think?

It is completely eclectic. Everything from young girls posting almost naked photos on social media regularly as choice to make their sexualisation empowering, to the 'free the nipple' movement to enable female bodies to be not sexualised, to women fighting hard to be allowed to be significant and heard aside from their sexuality, following on from the work of second-wave feminists - trying to take that to its end, to equality; and then there are men and women fighting for emotional and motherly power to be recognised in a world where we still have a political system that shuts down any expression of emotion.

All the prongs are valid for the individual women, but ultimately we are still fighting against a culture that wants us to be quiet, and to be available, to be polite and sweet - while that's not all people in our culture who require this of women, it is certainly still the way it is is mainstream media.

Why do you think there is so much rage? Where does it come from?

The rage comes from being silenced and from being ignored.

What is the 'casual truth' that women carry with them?

That most women have been raped or assaulted. That most women feel that they are battling to find their voice and their place every day. That most women are constantly struggling culturally, politically, sexually, to find stillness and peace in who they are and how they are received and heard.

What is your background in theatre and performance?

I grew up training in performing locally in Lismore with Theatre Theatre Productions, then I went to study Writing for Performance at the University of Wollongong, and then at NIDA. I also grew up as a dancer and have trained in puppetry and physical theatre. I am primarily a writer, but like working collaboratively, crossing roles.

ENTERTAINMENT THE SENSIBLE ART OF FALLING FOR REMI



MELBOURNE ARTIST REMI AND MUSICAL COLLABORATOR SENSIBLE J ARE ONE OF THE FASTEST-RISING HIP-HOP ACTS IN AUSTRALIA AND ARE QUICKLY GAINING THE ATTENTION OF INTERNATIONAL TASTEMAKERS.

Able to whip crowds into a frenzy, at just 23 Remi Kolawole found his way to hip-hop and everything changed.

'I used to play piano,' says Remi, 'and it was classical and never appealed to me and then I met Sensible J; that was when things changed. I was at university at the time and was studying nursing.

'I had only been rapping for six months before I met J. The more I am in the hiphop scene the more I realise I have found a producer as knowledgeable and as talented; with the perspective he has on hip-hop and in music in general, it's a gift, I didn't really know any other way at that point; with time and age I realise how lucky I was.'

And that's no understatement, with the young rapper being touted as one of Australia's hottest properties by Billboard US. Perhaps it's his cultural heritage that gives Remi the edge. Australian born with Nigerian parents: 'I have a strange voice.' he notes. 'You can't understand when that is going to be useful. As a rapper it's an advantage and also something that you can't really learn. It definitely took me a while to be comfortable. When you hear your own voice back it's hard to hear it! The more I am in the Australian music scene I see how important Remi has something fresh to throw into the mix, a lot of it based on his unique perspective of home.

'I think that is something that is also very new to Australia – to have so many secondgeneration migrant children here who have these different rhythms and patterns in the voice around them; it adds a uniqueness. You have your Aussie-ness but you have your vocal tones from before.'

While his mum was totally on board with his career shift from nursing to hiphop, Remi tells how it took his father to understand that something like that could actually be a career here.

'My mum was happy I just found something I love - she has always been my biggest fan. My pop's originally from Nigeria; education was his way out of poverty.

It's a huge thing and it comes from not only success but a lot of pride, like most African communities, and that's where the butting heads began! He has now definitely come around though!

Remi believes it's the role of hip-hop to be edgy. He believes it's a little like comedy.

'The two have always been hand in hand,' he says. 'You have to break down the serious issues people need to talk about.'

'It goes as far back as Bob Marley; you have people who represent causes, who fight against things that you feel are wrong in your community, and only in rap you can break it down. In rap verse you can pretty well write a thesis on what you are feeling. You can't really do that in other artforms. I love that.'

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CINEMA REVIEWS




UP FOR LOVE

There are the grand passions that, in the dark, the big screen delivers in a calculated, perfectly sound-tracked tsunami of emotion – love and desire foremost among them. Overlooked, perhaps because it is so subtle and quiet, so everyday, is affection. This cheesy but adorable little movie has tons of that life-sustaining human connection. It's not quite 'beauty and the beast', but the hook that is designed to draw the audience in is that Alexandre (Jean Dujardin) is only four foot five inches tall. The girl he falls in love with – and their meeting, over the phone, is a brilliantly conceived and executed 'one-take' intro – is Diane (Virginie Efira), a tall, gorgeous blonde lawyer.

The film's strongest visual metaphor comes soon after, when the couple, on their first date, do a parachute jump from high above the craggy Provencal coast of France – the camera work is stupendous, the thrill of letting go breathtaking. Most extraordinary, however, is how director Laurent Tirard manages to make it all so believable, for the premise is far-fetched to put it mildly and the CGI at first only underlines the silliness of it. But this is where actors come into their own; Dujardin, who won an Academy Award for his portrayal of Valentin in *The Artist* (2011), leaves you in no doubt that Alexandre is a real bloke, and he does so entirely through facial expressions and dialogue delivery.

Efira's performance is similarly unforced as the young woman who, though she knows better, struggles to cope with the fact of Alexandre's unique physicality. The film is an obvious (and sometimes a tad overstated) reflection on the 'size doesn't matter' line, but it goes beyond that and with the lightest of touches explores the idea of integrity and the value we give it – as well as being true to her feelings for Alexandre, Diane, as a lawyer, must decide if she will defend a shonky client in court. It's a movie that gets better the longer it goes, with an exuberant dance scene. I loved it.





OFFICE CHRISTMAS PARTY

In these less than optimistic times, it is imperative that we be grateful for tender mercies. Having seen the previews for this, I anticipated with dread another gross-out in the style of *The Hangover* and *Bridesmaids*, so to say that it is not as bad as I feared is probably the highest praise I can muster for it.

There is a fart joke in the first five minutes, courtesy of Kate McKinnon, the 'other' actress who was so grating in the pathetic re-make of *Ghostbusters*, and there is a predictable indulgence in tits and arse – a dick, too, which has become almost ho-hum – but a reasonable story is threaded through the mire and held together by decent performances and a snappy edit.

Set in Chicago (the windy city gets nowhere near the exposure of New York, but it always looks

shiny and vibrant – with snow falling, it's beautiful), Clay and Carol (TJ Miller and Jennifer Aniston) are siblings at war over the running of their inherited IT company. Clay has always



been the slacker, so to win over a potential client who will save his branch of the business from closure, he organises a Christmas party that would make the Satyricon look like a teddy bears' picnic. The love interest is centred on the brainiac chick who is devising a whole new way of going online (Olivia Munn), and her boss (Jason Bateman, an affable actor who always gives the impression that he has just lost a pound and found a penny).

The gags are topical – the Uber driver (Fortune Feimster) is hilarious – and the language, if in not exactly wholesome, falls short of the execrable boorishness that now passes itself off as witty repartee.

As someone who is only partially addicted to cyberspace, it was a trifle sad to see the exuberance displayed when everybody had their signal restored after going offline, but this is one of those movies in which closing credit bloopers are mandatory – unfortunately, they're not remotely funny.

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

Winning this time means the most to me compared to last year as there has been such a big progression of the sport in 2016, Mono said.

'It's a unique design that works for me and we were




