NBN Co's tower unwelcome

Residents opposed to an NBN tower close to their homes in Coorabell have been given assistance from Byron Shire councillors, who last week voted unanimously to ask that the tower's construction halt until it is proven all requirements surrounding the approval process have been met.

Specifically, NBN's full compliance 'with all applicable provisions in the Industry Code C564: 2011 Mobile Phone Base Station Deployment.'

Council are also requesting that meetings be held with neighbours who are 'visually affected by the tower and locations to minimise visual impact within the property explored.'

the area claimed there was inadequate consultation and that no other location options were provided.

A spokesperson from NBN Co has previously rejected those claims. Residents are also critical of Australian electromagnetic energy (EME) standards compared to other countries and the potential lack of independence of oversight bodies.

The motion by Cr Sarah Ndiaye (Greens) says that if there is no reply within a week from NBN Co, Visionstream and federal communications minister Mitch Fifield, then Council will 'commence proceedings in the Land & Environment Court for injunctive relief.'

Optic fibre more efficient

Council will also request 'consideration for access and utilisation of an optic fibre located at Coorabell Primary School for the delivery of NBN services to neighbouring properties.'

A review is also requested, 'of the process that determined wireless over the more efficient option of fibre optic cable... [that] will not outdate quickly and does not present any potential health risks.'

North Ocean Shores sportsfield opens

Residents in the north of the Shire have an early Christmas present from Council – a new \$2.3 million sportsfield.

Located on a corner block on Shara Boulevard, it features a premier grade soccer field, home and away changerooms, public toilets, canteen, referees' room and first-aid room. It's the first NSW sportsfield to be fully lit with LED floodlights, Council says, and one of the first in the country.

Staff also say the onsite building was designed with 'ecologically sustainable design principles'.

'The building has great airflow, natural lighting in the

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changerooms, and caters for all-abilities access and amenity.

Mayor Simon Richardson congratulated everyone involved in the project, including the community, sporting groups, local schools, contractors, councillors and staff.

He said, 'This is a longawaited and much-needed facility for the north of Byron Shire. We have no doubt that it will be well used by many sporting groups, schools and families.

Recognition

'Today's opening has only been made possible through [hard work and persistence] from residents such as Marc Patten and Ted Kabbout from the Shores United Soccer Club and local community representatives Kathy Norley, Angela Dunlop, Robert Crossley, Jan Mangelson and former councillor Di Woods.'

Byron Shire Council say they would also like to thank the following community organisations for their support in helping to deliver the longawaited field: Shores United Soccer Club, Ocean Shores Community Association, South Golden Beach Community Association, New Brighton Village Association, and the Ocean Shores, Main Arm and Pocket public schools.

'We're looking forward to watching a new generation of athletes thrive in Ocean Shores, Billinudgel, South Golden Beach and neighbouring towns,' he said.

The seven-hectare site was purchased in 2014 and is centrally located to service a number of local townships including Ocean Shores, Billinudgel, South Golden Beach, New Brighton and Brunswick Heads.

The final step is naming the field, say staff.

Byron Line back on track Dan's latest work

Mayor Simon Richardson's ambitious plan to bring both Northern Rivers Rail Trail and Trains On Our Tracks to the table over the disused railway was given a boost at last week's Council meeting.

Councillors voted to move ahead 'with the intent to illustrate to the state government a community-wide support for multi-use of the rail corridor within Byron Shire and to prepare for possible funding opportunities.' The motion aims to work toward an 'economic and social feasibility report.

Crs Spooner and Hunter voted against - Cr Hackett was absent. Northern Rivers Rail Trail's Marie Lawton told The Echo it is important to put the issue to rest ASAP owing to 'the possibility of parts of it being sold off as a disused asset.

Violence in the Bay drops 60 per cent

The Byron Liquor Accord (BLA) has welcomed a 60 per cent drop in alcohol-related incidents (ARIs) since 2012.

Figures from the NSW Bureau of Crime Statistics and Research (BOSCAR) show alcohol-related incidents (ARIs) have dropped from 4,277 in 2012 - above the NSW average - to 1,342 incidents in 2016.

'Everyone has stepped up and had a very positive impact,' said BLA president, Hannah Spalding.

Along with BLA vicepresident Loren Nowland, Mrs Spalding joined detec-

tive inspector Brendon Cullen (Tweed/Byron LAC) on Wednesday to announce the improved statistics.

It comes after a unified effort on reducing the impact of alcohol-related violence and antisocial behaviour, which peaked in the town around 2011.

Community effort

The BLA formalised its structure in 2012 and worked with the Byron Shire Council, NSW Police, the town's chamber of commerce, the Byron Youth Service and the Office of Liquor Gaming and Racing to come up with a range of strategies to tackle the issue.

Called the Bay Alcohol Action Plan, it introduced a range of measures that included 'a 1.30am lockout, a four-drink limit per person per serve after midnight, no double shots/ shooters/jugs of alcohol, no energy drinks with alcohol after 2am, ceasing alcohol service 15 minutes before late close, refusing entry to any person wearing the name of an outlawed motorcycle gang and not sell/supply cask wine greater than two litres.

Mrs Spalding said, 'There were a lot of new owners and licensees had come here by 2012. It took time explaining why they couldn't do things like double shots in Byron Bay.

Meanwhile Cape Byron Steiner School students and staff say they are thrilled with the wonderful results achieved in the 2016 HSC.

Principal Nerrida Johnson said there was an exceptional result of a 50/50 (100 per cent) for English extension 2, which is a 'perfect testament to a wonderful poetry submission by Jasmine Pierce, our top English student.'

'In a cohort of 25 students, there were 14 band six results (over 90 per cent) and 61 band five (over 80 per cent) results.

'Cape Byron students demonstrated outstanding results in drama, with eight out of the 12 students receiving scores of over 90 per cent.

'This was not surprising, with a group selected for On-Stage for 2016.

'Visual art results were extremely strong with two band six results on top of three nominations to Art Express earlier this term.

'Students also received band six results in English extension one and two, D&T and PDHPE.

'Most satisfying are the very many strong results in band five across all subjects.

'This demonstrates a strong cohort and excellent teaching and learning throughout the school, from K to 12.

Walker selected for Greens NSW seat

North coast local Dawn Walker has replaced Greens MLC and former Byron Shire mayor Jan Barham, who recently retired from NSW parliament.

The former federal Richmond candidate said she was chosen by a preselection process across the state, which was 'an internal ballot involving thousands of NSW Greens.

She said she was 'very humbled and excited to have been chosen to represent the NSW Greens,' and 'honoured to be replacing Jan Barham, who has been a tireless campaigner for NSW, especially the north coast.

Social justice

'I will stand strong against premier Mike Baird's creeping privatisation agenda, defend our community services and push for the greater protection of our environment, as well as advocate for urgent action to address climate change and an end to coal mining

and fossil fuels.

'I'm passionate about social-justice issues.

'Campaigning to save local health services, fighting cuts to single parents' payments, opposing privatisation and standing up to protect penalty rates has given me a deep insight into social issues affecting NSW.

Ms Walker says she started her working life as a young graduate recruit in

the Commonwealth Employment Service (CES), which was a forerunner to Centrelink. 'I was based in a heavy manufacturing region and saw firsthand the human tragedy of Christmas layoffs and ten per cent unemployment – poverty, inequality and human struggle.'

It is expected that Dawn will take her seat in the NSW upper house in late February 2017.

Balance of power in NSW upper house

There are two houses of parliament in NSW, and for laws to pass, they need to be voted in by both houses. They are the lower house (Legislative Assembly) and the upper house (Legislative Council).

Ms Walker will replace Ms Barham in the upper house, where there are 42 parliamentary seats. The political makeup of the upper house is 20 coalition members: 13 from the Liberal Party and seven from the National Party.

There are 12 Labor Party members, five members of the Greens, two members of the Shooters, Fishers and Farmers Party, two members of the Christian Democratic Party (Fred Nile Group) and one Animal Justice Party member.



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Spike in police attacks in Tweed/Byron region

Tweed-Byron police say they will adopt a 'zero tolerance' approach to attacks on officers after four people were charged over two separate offences against police in just a few days.

On December 15 at Brunswick Heads, police charged two females aged 18 and 40 with assaulting police after it is alleged that officers were

bitten on the shoulder and hit in the face.

Intoxicated

On the morning of December 18, two male offenders involved in separate incidents at Byron Bay were charged with assaulting police after one officer was kicked in the face and another was kicked in the legs. Police say both of these

incidents involved persons who were either intoxicated or suffering the effects of drugs.

Police say they will be out in extra numbers patrolling the streets of Byron Bay and surrounding areas during the holiday season, including members of the Public Order and Riot Squad to assist with any antisocial behaviour.

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Better to light one candle than to curse the darkness

Filmmaker David Bradbury explains his latest project

Last week in The Echo, I wrote about my visit to Standing Rock.

The footage I shot there will form part of a bigger new film, called The Darkest Hour ... is just before the Dawn, which was shot over my three months in America leading up to the presidential elections.

The Darkest Hour will try to make sense of how the Trump phenomenon won the day, but will also give rise to hope and life after Donald.

We all need to live with that hope and have a roadmap pointing the way forward.

Survival revival

Criss-crossing the US, I visited eight major cities and filmed in various rural areas.

I met many traumatised people, including veterans of the Vietnam, Iraq and Afghanistan military misadventures fought on behalf of oil and corporate America.

They were veterans living on the streets who came home unhinged.

They fought for the America dream. Or as Donald puts it, trying to 'Make America Great... again'.

I spoke to and filmed countless homeless people who had given up on the dream (or it had given up on them) and now struggle daily just to stay alive. For various reasons, they had given up trying to survive in suburbia.

I filmed musicians, philosophers, writers and prostitutes, drug dealers, oil merchants, beer salesmen, conmen and convicts. I was lucky to interview film director and my old friend, Phil

We then went to Standing Rock to see it all rush together on election day.

By the end of our trip, my shoulder and back joints ached from carrying my camera gear on and off planes, buses, trains, Ubers, dodging check-in staff because I could not afford to pay excess baggage.

I gave it everything I had to make this film, as I always do. I hope to finish the film in the coming months while it's still fresh in my head, so I can have screenings here and back in the US.

To do so, I need your help

mercial TV. ABC management is awash with business admin and marketing degree types, all at the expense of actual program makers.

Legal and hard-headed accounting types negotiate with

outsiders such as myself now. They have little regard for the traditions and culture of 'Our ABC' that trained me and countless other good journalists and program makers.

This is the dumbing-down effect.

Today, it's all about ratings and appealing to the lowest common denominator so the managers can justify to Canberra their highly paid jobs and perks based on viewing numbers, rather than fulfilling the ABC's charter to show

in the same boat.

Then there's footage shot at Roxby, BHPBilliton's uranium mine and the Lizard's Revenge protest. It aims to inform and highlight the folly of building a nuclear waste dump in SA.

Opening up more uranium mines to export to countries like India is just insane - they refuse to sign the nuclear-non proliferation treaty.

Pre-ISIS footage

I shot a whole film in Iraq in 2013 just before ISIS took over. This is rare footage captured before these cities fell into chaos and bloodshed.

ABC (Four Corners and Foreign Correspondent) rejected it.

My footage clearly showed why the US-installed government in Baghdad was hated and would fall. It showed why ISIS was coming.

The footage also shows the continuing horrible birth defects on newborn babies in Fallujah and Basra where depleted uranium was used.

Family operation

Filmmaking is costly - airfares, accommodation, food, hire cars, camera equipment hire, professional technicians in post production.

I keep my overheads down by being a one-man cameraman, shooting my own video and sound.

My partner Treena Lenthall comes with me with our seven-year-old son Omar, and we work together as a family team.

We bring the many hours of footage back to the edit room in Wilsons Creek where I then spend three to four months sifting through it all with an editor.

That is both enjoyable and angst ridden, getting it down to around an hour in length, finding the final structure of a very complex jigsaw puzzle of visuals, interviews, music, entertaining moments and even light humour relief. After more months' work the process is then finished by highly skilled technicians: sound mixers, film graders and graphic artists. These professionals, like the rest of us, have mortgages and kids, the need to put food on the table each week.



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Decline in public broadcasting

The ABC and SBS are no longer interested in funding these so-called 'radical' films. Our public broadcasters have been white-anted and taken over by Howard/Abbott appointees. The ABC and SBS are now run by economic rationalists and executives (failed hacks) who have migrated from commercial TV in Britain, NZ and Oz com-

what mainstream media will never dare show.

Films I've had rejected by ABC and SBS are gathering dust in my edit room in Wilsons Creek, eating away at my conscience because I am not able to give a voice to the voiceless. These are people who have trusted me with their stories in Aboriginal Australia, India and Iraq. And there's my own son's struggle with mental illness and drug addiction that we filmed, hoping to help others

Special rates variation steams ahead

Byron Shire Council all voted to forge ahead with a Special Rates Variation (SRV) at Thursday's Council meeting.

While the SRV is primarily aimed at fixing the Shire's failing roads and infrastructure, it comes with a warning from staff of amalgamation if assets are left to deteriorate.

Equitable

Following comments from the public - who were against the rise - councillors took around an hour discussing how the burden could be more equitable with tourist operators sharing more of that cost.

Staff told councillors that the initial application for the rise to the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) does not need to have a rate amount specified.

Councillors have asked for a staff report, which will include 'revenue-raising options external to a special rate variation.' This includes implications of a 'tourism levy, tariff or something similar' and its relationship to a Special Rate Variation.

Live and friendly for 35 years

The Rails has been a cultural mainstay in a town where businesses can change quicker than Melbourne weather.

The Rails Hotel in Byron Bay, aka The Railway Friendly Bar, has just celebrated 35 years under the ownership of licensees Tom and Cath Mooney.

Live music, seven nights a week, has been a big part of the pub's appeal, with legendary touring bands playing one night and locals the next.

Tom believes that in the face of ongoing affluence, we need to remember the town's working class origins.

'If you look at Jimmy Willing's backdrop, it was of an era when it was a more working class place.

'I miss the 80s when the industry closed down, and the surfers and alternatives came in... but they didn't want to change anything too much; the modern charge of newcomers want to change everything ... I think you should hold onto the heart of good things.

The key word in the business name is Friendly.

The Rails has long been the bar that locals frequent; they are appreciative that their quirky gathering place has changed little over the last three decades.

For people returning to Byron Bay lamenting how much the place has changed or developed, it's grounding to grab a beer at the Rails, and eventually someone you once knew will wander in.

It's a little bit like the bar out of TV's Cheers, except instead of Ted Danson we've got Tom Mooney!

A professional rugby league footballer in the 1970s, Tom played as winger for Manly-Warringah and South Sydney clubs.

When that chapter closed, he was ready to tackle a new adventure, so he and his wife Cath made the move to sleepy Byron Bay in 1981 before the term *sea change* was even coined.

In 1988, with two small children, Cath and Tom Mooney took charge of the Rails and the little pub found its feet.

'We wanted the kids growing up in the country.

This place is like the town I grew up in; back then it was a hard-working industrial town,' says Tom.

Industrial town

'Most people don't realise how industrial the town was back then. We had the meatworks, sandmining, the place was full of hard people, and it was like where I grew up in Wauchope.'

Tom and Cath's connection and understanding of

the importance of small-town communities that has seen the Rails get involved in some key projects.

'We started the rugby club back in 1982, and we've sponsored soccer, hockey... that's the sort of things pubs do in small country towns... but alas we're not a country town...

'It's still very much a family thing from our side,' he says. 'My son and daughter, (the babes in arms on arrival) Luke and Hannah, both work there and it's a family pub for the town. Lots of people used to bring their babies along to listen to the music; now those kids are 30 years old!'

The Railway Bar is one of Byron's most significant historical locations, with the first stationmaster being appointed in 1904, and the refreshment room being opened in 1908.

And while the trains are vet to return, the music and the beer continue.

Planning dept yet to explain how *Echo* story is 'inaccurate'

The NSW planning department has described last week's *Echo* story, *Planning dept at risk of conflict of interest: AG*, as inaccurate, yet has not explained exactly how.

The Echo ran the story on the NSW Auditor-General's recent report regarding conflict-of-interest declarations within that department.

But the department's cluster chief financial and operating officer, Simon Officer, told *The Echo* the headline was 'misleading because the department of planning and all agencies in the planning portfolio are 100 per cent compliant with conflicts of interest and secondary employment monitoring.'

The Echo stands by its headline, and quoted a passage from NSW Auditor-General's report to Mr Officer. It reads, 'Conflict-of-interest declarations and monitoring of conflicts need to be extended to contractors and secondary employment arrangements.

'Insufficient controls to identify and manage conflicts of interest could cause serious financial and reputational damage to an agency.'

Conflict of interest management

So how does the planning department manage potential conflicts of interest?

Mr Officer explained in his correspondence, 'The department requires all staff, including contractors, to declare any conflicts of interest and secondary employment as a condition of employment.

'These declarations are monitored as part of the department's disclosing interests and managing conflicts of interest policy, which provides a clear and transparent outline for identifying, assessing, declaring and managing conflicts of interest.

'The Auditor-General's report analysed the results of financial statement audits of the 28 agencies in the planning and environment cluster for the year ended June 30, 2016.

'The report findings recognise the need for smaller agencies in the cluster to adopt measures used by the department to ensure consistency of processes across the cluster.'

Ballina High School proposal on display

Public feedback on the proposed \$40 million new high school in Ballina is now being sought by the NSW Department of Education.

It aims to cater for 1,000 students on the existing Ballina High School site and will combine students from Ballina High years 7 to 12 and students from K–12 Southern Cross School.

The proposal includes the demolition of the majority of the existing Ballina High School buildings but retention of the existing Marine Discovery Centre, aquaculture building and existing sports courts. An existing 32-space sealed car park is earmarked for removal.

fortable in his skin. He wants to share knowledge, not hide it. All those politicians who vilify him simply want to maintain their power illusion. They look uncomfortable in their skin because they lack legitimacy and know it.

■ Be aware of the cognitive bias in all news outlets.

For example, Russia Today (RT) is a state-sponsored media network that produces good content about the US and UK, yet doesn't touch any of its own seedy mafia underbelly. Likewise the BBC (UK state-sponsored media) was accused in February 2016 by an inquiry of failing to act upon disgraced television personality Jimmy Savile.

Savile was well known within that organisation as a sexual predator yet no BBC journalist exposed him.

It's worth repeating that any organisation or individual will always protect their self-interest.

Be aware of doubt merchants. Destabilising reality is called 'gaslighting', after the 1938 play Gaslight.

It explores the theme of psychological abuse, where a victim is told false information with the intent of making them doubt their own memory and perception.

■ Stop being click bait and be more factually vigilant. There are browser exten-

sions that flag misleading and fake news websites. If in doubt, Google the name of the story with the word 'fake' or similar.

(Reasonably) trusted (US) sources for debunking fake news include snopes.com, factcheck.org and politifact. com. The ABC did have a fact-checking department, but that was axed in May 2016.

■ Subscribe to as many feeds on social media as possible that are repugnant to your point of view.

For example, what do the [Andrew] Bolt Report Supporters Group, the United Patriots Front, Cory Bernardi and One Nation really say?

Once you get past the vomitous attacks on anything that isn't like themselves, is there a coherent and factually supported argument?

It's amazing how aggressive online debate has become.

The more aggressive, the more it lacks self reflection. It's okay to learn from mistakes and share the process. Think like a lawyer, don't

act like one is a useful book by Aernoud Bourdrez, which aims to empower those dealing with 'conflict seekers'.

■ Lastly – be fearless.

Ask questions of those in

Developer and quarry fined

A Tweed developer and a quarry owner at Mooball have each been fined \$15,000 for breaching approval conditions.

Compliance officers from the NSW Department of Planning and Environment levied the fines after finding breaches during inspections recently.

Ramtech, the owner of Dunloe Sand Quarry at Mooball, was fined after fail-

ing to handle quarry waste products according to the requirements in its approval.

Fraser Drive Investments was fined after failing to obtain a construction certificate before commencing subdivision works in South Tweed Heads. The fine follows two \$6,000 penalties and an initial fine of \$15,000 issued to the same company for a separate breach.



Byron Shire Council has resolved to notify the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) of our intent to apply for a Special Rate Variation (SRV) in 2017. The increase amount will not be decided until February 2017.

As part of the process, Council's revised Integrated Planning and Reporting documents are now on public exhibition until 18 January. They include:

- Revised Draft Delivery Program 2014-2017
- Draft Strategic Asset Management Plan (General Fund)
- Draft Long Term Financial Plan 2016-2026

The above documents bring together Council's various strategies, plans and budgets to provide services, infrastructure and ensure future sustainability.

A SRV is part of our *Fit for the Future, Council Improvement Program.* Without a SRV, Council's 'Base Case', as detailed within the *Draft Strategic Asset Management Plan* and the *Draft Long Term Financial Plan*, demonstrates that Council will not be financially sustainable and the condition of assets will continue to significantly decline and fail.

Proposed Options

Three proposed SRV options were presented to the Byron Shire community during October and November 2016. The feedback on the options was collated and presented at the 15 December, Council meeting.

Option 1 - 7.5% Deteriorate (including rate peg)

- Additional \$10.78million over four years.
- Combined with proposed loan borrowings of \$6million over three years, Council will have a total funding pool of \$16.78million over four years to allocate towards asset renewal and maintenance.
- Over 4 year period, this reflects a 33.5% cumulative rate increase on general rates (ordinary land rate) - excludes water, waste and sewer.

Option 2 - 10% Maintain (including rate peg)

- Additional \$16.47 million over four years.
 - Combined with proposed loan borrowings of \$6millio

What have we been doing to improve our financial sustainability?

Through our *Financial Sustainability Plan*, we have:

- 1. Reviewed expenditure and revenue.
- 2. Implemented pay parking in Byron Bay town centre.
- 3. Reviewed assets surplus to requirements.
- 4. Undertaken an organisation restructure.
- 5. Developed a Strategic Procurement Roadmap.
- 6. Refinanced and early repayment of loans.

As at 30 June 2016, the cumulative outcomes of the Financial Sustainability Plan have yielded \$4.366million in current and future savings. The outcomes of the *Financial Sustainability Plan* are included in the 'Base Case' of Council's *Draft Long Term Financial Plan*.

What happens next?

You have until Wednesday, 18 January to provide your feedback. Feedback from the community will be reported to Council in early February 2017 and help determine what Special Rate Variation option will be submitted to the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) for approval. If successful, the increased general rate will come into effect from 1 July, 2017.

Base Case - Rate peg only (no additional rate increase)

- No increase above the rate peg (in early December 2016, IPART set the rate peg at 1.5%).
- Required expenditure will significantly exceed the current budget allocation.
- Increased significant failure of high risk assets that will not be fixed immediately; this will include potential bridges, roads and building closures.
- Based on the rate peg of 1.5% for 2017/18, plus an estimated rate peg of 2.5% each year for three years; the cumulative rate increase is 9.3% on general rates (ordinary land rate) - excludes water, waste and sewer.
- over three years, Council will have a total funding pool of \$22.47million over four years to allocate towards asset renewal and maintenance.
- Over 4 year period, this reflects a 46.4% cumulative rate increase on general rates (ordinary land rate) - excludes water, waste and sewer.

Option 3 - 12.5% Improve (including rate peg)

- Additional \$22.45million over four years.
- Combined with proposed loan borrowings of \$6million over three years, Council will have a total funding pool of \$28.45million over four years to allocate towards asset renewal and maintenance.
- Over 4 year period, this reflects a 60.2% cumulative rate increase. on general rates (ordinary land rate) - excludes water, waste and sewer.

Even Peter Mutton Dutton is regarded as a success, apparently for being the kind of one-dimensional thug who used to give the QLD Drug Squad a bad name. And along with Pyne, who talks a lot and does very little, few of the others have struggled to achieve even cursory recognition.

These are thy ministers, oh Malcolm; a true prophet would cast them down, but then a true prophet would never have elevated them in the first place. And short of a convenient asteroid, there is no prospect of swift obliteration; they will have to be naturally selected for removal individually, shunted off to the kind of cosy sinecures that are currently being prepared for George Brandis.

The problem is that there is something of a shortage of well-padded asylums for them all to go to. Alexander Downer is shortly to vacate his comfy chair in the Court of St James, but that, we are told, is already reserved for Brandis.

And in these straitened times the government cannot simply invent new diplomatic posts, as was the traditional method of ejection.

There are plenty of lobbyist positions available (the assumption of Labor's Stephen Conroy as a gambling czar is the most recent and egregious example) but the true grandees see hanging on to the public teat as their entitlement - and of course, would probably not survive in private enterprise anyway.

So it may well be that even if Turnbull has the will and nerve to try to move his ministry a few steps up the evolutionary ladder (a highly dubious proposition in itself) finding convenient places to accommodate them without serious disruption will prove impossible.

Just another prime ministerial dilemma: so much swamp, so little refuge.

2016: the year we didn't need

It was a shitty year. An *annus horribilis* if you like. 2016 started off with the death of David Bowie and got steadily worse. To make an arbitrary pick, we lost Umberto Eco, Marvin Minsky, Prince, Bob Ellis, Muhammed Ali, Bill Mollison, Fidel Castro and Leonard Cohen.

We have entered the death zone of twentieth-century achievers and must become accustomed to seeing a constant stream of checkouts. Alan Rickman, George Martin, Ronnie Corbett, Gene Wilder.

We might have expected to see Clive James, Jimmy Carter and Sean Connery go too, but thankfully they didn't. On the other hand Henry Kissinger got through the year unscathed; even Hell baulks at opening its gates for him.

The death of famous people is a cause for melancholy, where it doesn't engender a little schadenfreude. But 2016 was also a year of huge political upheavals and realignments.

Brexiting

Imagine, hypnotising a nation, persuading a great military power, the great military power, to open itself up to a greedy sociopath and his gang of orcs. The Flim-Flam Man himself may be in it for the money, but those around him intend to rip out the nation's heart, its decency and what's left of its institutional stability. New York City [AAP]

After 18 months of bitter, bizarre and sometimes barely believable campaigning, the race for the White House reached its climax in November with Donald Trump triumphing over Hillary Clinton in the US presidential election.

The UK provided the world with another WTF moment with a vote to leave the EU on June 23. The shock result that saw 52 per cent of the public support Brexit was a victory for then Ukip leader Nigel Farage and a humiliating defeat for then prime minister David Cameron. Cameron resigned on the spot and Theresa May took over after a bitter selection battle.

The main theatre of war was in Syria, where rebels in December reached a ceasefire deal to evacuate from eastern Aleppo in an effec-

tive surrender after nearly six years of brutal conflict produced a catastrophic humanitarian crisis. Islamic State found itself on the retreat in its Iraq stronghold of Mosul, but snuck in to recapture the ancient Syrian city of Palmyra while the focus was on Aleppo.

The mosquito-borne Zika virus, linked to the rare birth defect microcephaly, was the global medical emergency of the year. The World Health Organisation announced an international public health emergency in February and declared the emergency over in November after the virus had spread to more than 60 countries and territories. And on a happier note, the Refugee Olympic Team won a standing ovation and hearts around the world when they marched in the opening ceremony of the Rio Olympics in Brazil as independent participants.

Every September the entire French nation goes mad for grapes. September is the month of harvest - the Vendanges is a yearly ritual that every Frenchman is invested in, whether vintner, farmer, or not. Nearly every region in France produces wine, with some of the world's most famed wines coming from otherwise unassuming valleys scattered throughout the French countryside. Wine is

so vital that many families have a small plot of vines that they harvest each year. The grapes go to a communal neighborhood 'cave cooperative, where it is made into wine and redistributed according to the amount of grapes invested. Spending September at my childhood home in Languedoc-Roussillon, my husband Jacob and I were bound for a crash course in winemaking. It was inescapable. We passed by the ripe vineyards every day, the fields lush and fragrant, stretching in neat rows up the hillsides.

Ancient stone huts dot the fields, remnants from an earlier time, now used to house rusty farm equipment. We passed countless vineyards in the midst of harvest, often seeing the husband operating an automated harvesting machine while the wife sat on a folding chair among the vines, smoking a cigarette.

Every dinner party, every conversation, revolved around the famed Vendanges. People swapped experiences like merit badges, puffing with pride to share their stories of years past.

While most contemporary vineyards harvest their grapes with machines, the best wine, the really, truly expensive bottles, are made from handharvested grapes. A strange world, a world where helicopters are hired to fly low over the grapes and whisk away the humidity in the night air. – Read more at http:// bit.ly/trangrape

The other day while disembarking somewhere sultry, I found myself momentarily wondering if I was supposed to kiss the flight attendant goodbye as I left the aircraft. It wasn't lust, I was just confused about what was expected. Steaminess always makes me think it's Christmas.

I'm not against kissing as such. After all, we've been doing it for a long time. Are we at root indulging in a mastication ritual when we osculate? Grooming each other? Eating those we desire? Who knows? The point is that it needs to be reined in.

The Indians started it, apparently, as a cultural practice, with Alexander the Great

rather taking to it, as you might expect, after observing it at close quarters, popularising it further west where it caught on quickly. In 1896 we started kissing in movies, except, paradoxically, in India. Now everyone kisses everyone everywhere all the time.

In general, for centuries, you kissed equals on the lips, merely pouting cheekwards where there was some doubt about who was precisely who in the relationship. A knight might kiss a knight on the lips, but you would be foolhardy to follow suit.

These days, of course, nobody knows who is who in any sense of the phrase whatsoever. Terms such as 'equal', 'friend' and 'blood relative' have all been rendered meaningless, while 'intimacy' sounds like a line in women's lingerie.

I am just who I identify as being. Consequently, the kissing situation is in total disarray. Pop stars blow kisses and shout 'I love you all!' at the audience they cannot even see, acquaintances of any sex at all pucker up and plant a smacker on your face if you so much as drop in for afternoon tea.

At Christmas any pretence of restraint is thrown aside: second-cousins will kiss you, mothers at your children's school will kiss you, your hairdresser will kiss you, your dental hygienist will kiss you, the man you've just bonded with on the plane from Singapore will grapple you tightly to his bosom and kiss you – SPLAT! – right on your bearded mouth. It's bedlam. It has to stop. We need to bring back guidelines.

The French, who really know what they're doing in the mouth department, have rules about kissing. It's called *faire la bise*. Basically, it's right cheek to right cheek, then left cheek to left cheek, in total silence – no loud MWAH! MWAH! noises; even the internet warns against this particular faux pas.

A third kiss is mandatory around Nîmes and Montpellier. In Paris go for either two or four bises, never three. At the far end of Brittany one will do nicely.

A kiss on the lips implies intimacy of some variety. A thorough ravishing of the oral cavity (often known as 'a French kiss') implies a truly exceptional level of physical intimacy with exciting prospects.

Slobbering

In Australia every encounter is a grab-bag of possibilities. At Christmas, all it takes is one carol and a sip of something festive for someone you've only just met, someone who's just called you *dude* or *darling* or *gramps*, to start slobbering all over your face. As a rule of thumb, I'd sug-

gest two bises for someone you feel a certain affection for, lips to cheek for someone you love and lips to anything else according to passion or prior arrangement. Otherwise, stand clear.

From the way she's belting out the final, frantic lines of *Bésame mucho*, I don't think la Cubana would agree with me.

The science behind the smooching

In reality, kissing is nothing more than two people putting their faces together and exchanging spit. How on Earth did something so gross become so appealing? The act of kissing has developed to become advantageous to humans: if it didn't serve an evolutionary purpose, we simply would not do it.

So what's in a kiss? The scientific jury is still out on whether it is a learned or instinctual behaviour. What was the original concept for the band?

The original concept was basically McDuck saying he'd been writing some songs and asking the three of us to play them and that we be called Lake Street Dive and that it would slightly avant garde. So, I think, essentially, the concept was just to play songs, which was seemingly radical being that we were all in a jazz program that favoured free improvisation over playing 3-minute narrative pop songs.

What is your songwriting process? How do you work a song up for studio or stage? Everybody writes, individually, and then we arrange the songs together. We don't ever

been thoroughly road-tested, which generally means playing it live for a little while to feel how it breathes on stage. That will inform how we then record the song, although once in the studio we often change it up a bit.

How does your music translate to a live set?

Well, essentially, almost everything we do musically is about the live set. Putting on a dynamic, energetic show is where we've put most of our energy.

How hard is it to juggle your personal commitments and the band commitments; how do you all manage to make it happen?

Well, it's hard. Striking a balance between being a full-time touring musician and a human being with family and friends and such is something that takes diligence and dedication. We

all great friends who work hard to communicate our needs to each other and because we know the importance of living a life so you can write about it.

How important is touring? Where are the places you love going most?

In the current musical climate, touring is sort of everything. It's most definitely our bread and butter. More essentially though, playing live shows is how we figure out how to play the songs best. Getting that direct feedback from an audience is the greatest way to know if a song has impact or not.

What should we expect for your Byron show?

To dance and groove and hug your best friend during a slow sona.

Eve Jeffery

I love the smell of an election in the morning... not!

I don't get politics. I just don't. Okay? I don't understand the mechanics or the machinations, I don't know my senate from my double dissolution, from my hung parliament. I don't understand the greed. I don't understand the dishonesty. It's as simple as that.

My creative partner was born in Canberra. He lives and breathes the stuff. It's like second English to him. His disbelief in my uninterest borders on embarrassment. I think he sees me as a recalcitrant teen who wants to eat off clean crockery, but won't do dishes. Or cook the dinner. Or pay for the food. I frustrate him to the enth.

To me, election day wouldn't suck any less if there were free pizza and bourbon...

I did a drive-by of the polling booths at St Paul's Memorial Hall on Keen Street in Lismore at around 3 o'clock on a sunny Saturday afternoon, July 2 this year.

I was looking for someone. I saw Kudra Falla-Ricketts

out the front with a few of her young friends standing in the sunshine waiting for election day 2016 to end.

A special photo

I yelled out my window and asked her if she would still be around at 5.30 when I came back to commit my opinion to paper. (Yes, I was leaving it until the last possible second.) Apart from voting, I also wanted to get a photo, a very special photo, a very special selfie in fact. I finished my stuff and I went home and had a shower, put on some lipstick and made the trip back into town.

I got photos and interviews with Janelle Saffin and Kudra for *Echonetdaily* but before I headed inside to check my name off the phonebooksized list of enrollees, there was an important picture I wanted to take.

I stood next to Kudra and we both smiled up at my big lens while I snapped away until I had what I wanted. Kudra had to come to me weeks earlier wanting some photos for her campaign. Over the next months I saw that same smiling face in the images I captured staring back at me from newspapers and corflutes across the Page electorate.

At that first photo shoot she was fresh and brave and resolute and ready for battle, maybe a tad unsure of herself in front of the camera, but she did really well for a first-timer.

Politics?

We had a great shoot, the photos turned out well and she went her way and I went mine. But politics? Puh-lease.

I have no faith in the political system – I never have and I still don't. But that's not the secret. I also have never, and still haven't, enrolled to vote – of my own accord. That's the secret.

For years, especially in my work as an artivist where a lot of time I am fighting government authority, I have nodded and smiled and 'uhuh'd' when the subject of candidates and elections came up. Occasionally I have actually participated in the debate and frowned and added such gems as, 'all politicians are greedy wankers' and 'there is no such thing as altruism' and my personal faNot so much because she was so young but because it's a bloody business and, actually it was because she was so young.

I am not usually a believer in undervaluing youth; in fact I am the opposite – I really try hard to support young people where I can and give them a chance. My own daughters have done and created and achieved amazing things in this world – I know what kids can do. I always try to give young folk a go.

But when Kudra decided to run, I just thought it was an impossible win.

Then, she ran an absolutely awesome race. Every time I bumped into her in the street, at every event that I went where she spoke, I was very pleasantly surprised. She had courage of her convictions and just plain courage.

Caught!

The AEC finally caught up with me after 34 years and my plan was to just not do it – just not vote and cop the fine as my own little protest, because I don't believe those who sit in the seats are really what the people want. I think politics is evil. Psychopathic.

I think the government found me because I registered a new vehicle in Corndale (yes, all the departments seem to be having sex with each other these days). It was not long after that, before the election was even announced, that candidate junkmail began appearing in my letterbox. I had a sneaking suspicion that they busted me but I decided to just ignore it – head-in-the-sand and all that.

When the election rolled around my own personal protest was to simply pay what the government thought I owed it for not turning up on election day, or better still, going to court over it and giving them my very loud personal opinion of why I didn't feel I needed to vote.

But something changed over the weeks leading up to E-day, and I can tell you truly it wasn't my faith being restored in Australia's

parliamentary system.

My faith was restored in myself. In my ability to have faith. To feel faith. To trust that maybe there *was* some sort of future to hope for and it was about bloody time that I started practising what I preached.

That renewed faith wasn't in any party line. It was my faith in youth, the youth of our community, and the youth of the world. My faith that the young people will eventually see the stupidity of their elders' ways and my faith that what I always taught my children from when they were very young was true: it's important to respect your elders, but it's important to remember that they are not always good and they are not always right.

I didn't listen so much to what this young Greens candidate was saying; I listened to the way she was saying it. The way she spoke, the way she treated people, the way she related to those around her, the way she knew the world. The courage of her conviction was that there *is* a better future. This is not a future of my making, but a future of her making. Of their making. That was what I had regained faith in.

Faith

So I decided to put my name behind hers on the ballot paper.

Kudra, seeing your poise, your grace, your integrity (unless I missed some secret politician evil) and your absolute capability amongst a bunch of total bloody goons, changed my mind. I took up a purple pencil for the first time ever and marked the paper Green because of you.

I have every faith in you and your ability, either in 'power' or not, to help set this country aright. You and your generation will save us. Please forgive us our sins. I hope it's not too late.

But something changed Eve Jeffery is an *Echo* pho-

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The Zeitgeist Machine cometh: Online democracy is just a bit away, and not a nanosecond too soon

In 1964, in first-year Politics at Monash Uni, I had to write an essay titled 'Is a direct democracy possible?' Our professors wanted us to prove we'd read Plato, Mill, Marx, Burke, maybe Arendt or Jefferson or at least skimmed the study guides - and to conclude that giving every citizen equal access to decision making was so impossible that only tiny tinkerings were required to make our present system of representative government more perfect.

The future

But, being 19, I took the question seriously. Most of my learning back then took place in the student newspaper office listening to Damien Broderick, one of the editors, who was a voracious reader on the emerging topic of computers. He told me that, soon, we would be able to collect limitless data and compute it every way imaginable, and it occurred to me that if all voters could answer the day's questions, a central computer would be able to spit out an endless series of consensus answers to questions like 'Who should be allowed to marry whom?' or 'Should Australia generate electricity with nukes?'

We could also propose the next day's questions, since asking is as essential as answering. I called the big computer in Canberra 'the Zeitgeist Machine', and suggested we could all have electronic keys to prevent cheating. Small screens with keyboards would be all over the place, like phone booths.

My tutor was wrinkle-

browed by all this, which I assumed was because she still didn't know if I'd read Burke or Arendt. 'I don't know what to give you so I'm making it a B+,' she said with a nervous smile. Her name, I recall, was Michelle Grattan.

The zeitgeist

Today we have all the hardware and software that Damien said we would, and mostly we use it to facebook and twitter - but we also consume and produce massive amounts of political thought, news, and gobbledegook online.

Some believe we could now deploy the Zeitgeist Machine, though they mostly argue for gradual adoption of online voting, campaigning, and policy formation. The Online Direct Democracy Party is already up and running candidates Australiawide, and like the more nerdy group calling themselves, somewhat unfelicitously, the Flux Party, they aim to be elected to parliament in order to then vote according to decisions reached by their party members online. (Observa-

tion: the leaders and staff of both these Australian parties are almost all men.)

I called my invention the Zeitgeist Machine ironically, to suggest the inherent flaw in my utopia, namely, that while the spirit of the times, or zeitgeist, might be digested by a machine, power would remain with those who own the machine.

Things have changed since 1965, existentially. Now we have Bitcoin, built on blockchain technology, which spreads control and content among so many players that none can usurp the currency, or in the political version, the power. I remain sceptical, but I'm more sceptical about the future of representative democracy.

Since Thatcher and Reagan launched the corporate-sponsored campaign to disempower labour (the workers, not the parties) and all social and economic groups other than profitdriven corporations, western democracies have devolved from being severely flawed arbitrators of power to become enforcers of the will of whichever warlords of capitalism are ascendant.

Parallel govt

So – rather than create new parties to challenge the warlords, how about we build a platform on which our citizens create a parallel government? Start with writing the rules for raising issues and resolving them, then build toward the constant formulation of policies.

mob would initially have no power to implement its decisions, it could announce them, challenging the inhabitants of the 'real' power system to take notice, whether the issue be enormous like global warming, pretty big like the Trans Pacific Partnership, or small but fun, such as writing a national anthem that doesn't make everyone cringe.

The point of building a parallel system is to progressively subvert and subsume the present dysfunctional one, and seeds are sprouting in Spain via the Podemus party, in Argentina inspired by Pia Mancini, and by dozens of groups in the USA such as the Personal Democracy Forum, and its blog techPresident.

But I reckon we should get out in front of all these initiatives and start a real, living example of online democracy. Where better than in the Byron Shire? The council is almost all devoted to a people-run democracy, and

And even though this online thousands of our citizenry love gabbing on about every issue from Trump to potholes, so why don't we do it here and now? Actually, local Flux Party nerd James Wright is already working on it, and, for what it's worth so am I. Watch this space for further news..

> By the way, if you're thinking this is way-off-in-the-future stuff, consider where Bitcoin is right now: the central bank of Denmark is planning to issue a blockchain-based digital currency called ekrone as its reserve currency - and Ernst & Young (EY), one of the world's Big Four accounting corporations, gives secure digital wallet applications to all its employees at their headquarters, and accepts Bitcoin payments for all of their consulting services, amounting to around \$7.8 billion in 2016. It's happening in finance now - politics tomorrow.

Time for transparent algorithms in civic tech

the algorithms we create place around their biases or the the public interest before personal or corporate financial gain. Not every entrepreneur or technologist has to wear the label of civic technologist or social entrepreneur, but every technologist and entrepreneur who facilitates public debate has a responsibility to put the public before corporate profit. What could this look like? For Facebook, this might mean solving the heavily debated fake news problem at the expense of getting fewer clicks. For Fox News or the New York Times, it might

man responsibility to assure mean more transparency business goals that drive their reporting decisions. I have been sensitive to the effects of the public-engagement rules we are creating for a while now. SeeClickFix itself was created as an antithetical reaction to a design decision by government to make service-request communication opaque by default. A number of times, we've made decisions at SeeClickFix that favored the public interest over near-term financial gain. See more at http:// en.seeclickfix.com.

Facebook strengthens our filter bubbles. So does Twitter. So does cable news. This has serious civic consequences. All three of these organisations are civic technologies regardless of whether they put profit or public interest first. The algorithms and business priorities of private institutions have shaped our civic reality.

However, these organisations' algorithmic authority does not have to facilitate authoritarianism. As technologists we have a civic and hu-

Fire ants a flaming threat from the very near north

Fire ants are threatening northern NSW and central Queensland and the current eradication program is not up to the job, according to a recent government report. A senate motion by Greens senator Janet Rice forced the federal government to release an independent review of the eradication program revealing that it is failing to contain the fire ant threat.

'Red fire ants have the potential to do more damage that rabbits, cane toads, foxes, camels, wild dogs and feral cats combined,' said Senator Rice.

No action

'The minister has sat on this independent review since at least May of this year and has failed to take proper action. When the benefit will be at least \$25 for every \$1 spent, it's a no-brainer to take the necessary and cost-effective action to eradicate the red fire ant.'

The South American fire ants were first detected in Brisbane in 2001 and are believed to have been accidentally introduced, possibly via a shipping container from the US. The fire ant is considered a serious threat to the environment, agriculture, tourism and the outdoor Australian lifestyle as they inhabit open grassland area such as agri-

cultural fields and sports and picnic C grounds.

Known to prey upon local wildlife including frogs, snakes and ground-dwelling birds, the ants will clear the area where they nest of local wildlife and could cause the extinction of some ground-dwelling animals.

'They are highly aggressive, sting en masse and in high numbers,' said Andrew Cox of the Invasive Species Council. International studies reveal that

without an effective eradication strategy the overall impact on Australia's agricultural industry would 'result in a reduction in agricultural output of ten per cent for cropping, 20 per cent for livestock and 40 per cent for beef.'

According to the independent review of Australia's \$330 million fire ants eradication program this would have immediate effect on Queensland's Lockyer Valley and scenic rim farming communities where fire ants are already present in low numbers.

Fruit pickers and other agricultural workers would be significantly affected by the ant colonies. They can also cause the death of small livestock animals such as calves and lambs owing to the aggressive swarming and attacking nature of the ants. Where fire ants are located in paddocks farmers would be unable to graze livestock and would have the added costs of eradication of the ants in these areas, noted Cox.

Painful burning

The sting causes painful burning and itching in humans and in rare cases can cause a severe allergic reaction. 'If not eradicated, by 2030 fire ants will cost our healthcare system about 140,000 medical consultations and 3,000 anaphylactic reactions each year and possible deaths.'

A spokesperson for the minister of agriculture and deputy prime minister, Barnaby Joyce, said, 'The Agricultural Ministers' Forum has agreed with the findings of the independent review that eradication remains technically feasible, cost-beneficial and in the national interest.'

However, the deputy prime minister's office refused to take responsibility for not releasing the report stating: 'The decision to release the independent review report is not up to the deputy prime minister and is a decision for Commonwealth, state and territory agricultural ministers.'

The ants have been detected in Port Botany, southeast Queensland and the Gold Coast. 'This secret government report shows eradication is still possible and in our nation's interest but the time to act is rapidly diminishing,' Cox said. The report states that a ten-year treatment and surveillance program with a budget of \$38 million each year is needed to eradicate the invasion.

Headed for NSW

'The fire ant can be spread through the movement of soil, plants and hay,' said Cox. 'Naturally, they move about two kilometres per year. They could get to the border [of NSW] within five years and if they make it that far they will be there forever.'

'State and federal governments need to stop sitting on their hands while red fire ants threaten Queensland's precious natural areas,' said Australian Greens deputy leader and senator for Queensland, Larissa Waters.

'Get on with eradication already.'

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What the world needs now is a lot more oysters

Chugging up the Pumicestone Passage in the tour boat, all of us from the conference watched the bloom of jellyfish go by. The pale blue animals crowded the 35-kilometre waterway between the Sunshine Coast and Bribie Island. Also blooming was Lyngbya, large clusters of toxic blue-green algae. All these creatures take advantage of the mix of warm water, sunshine, sediments from deforested lands and runoff from urban and canal estates. They also thrive because a critical marine animal, once found in wild millions, is now missing. Oysters.

Back in action

The future of wild ovsters brings us researchers, activists and community leaders together. We're dreaming of once more seeing oysters living free for their full lifespan of some forty-odd years. We want to see them back in action. They, along with other bivalves such as mussels and clams, are phenomenal aquatic housekeepers. That's what the coastal marine world needs now more than ever.

Each adult oyster clears particles from a total of 7.5 litres in an hour. That's about 189 litres in a day. Content on less than half a hectare, 750,000 animals living en masse can filter 57-157 million litres of sea water each and every day. Biologists cal-

culated such a community extended over 166,000 square kilometres in the Chesapeake Bay would have filtered all the water once every three days.

In the course of filtering, each oyster sorts through every particle in the water. What they don't like, they coat with mucus and spit out. This falls to the seabed. They eat the rest: algae, larvae, eggs and hatchlings of fish and jellyfish.

Group sex

Over the year, oysters have regular group sex, releasing eggs and sperm during several spawning events. Over their lifetimes, they may change sex too. The young drift off and grow a little. Then, as tiny spat, they deliberately settle on shells in the oyster community or another favourite hard surface close by.

For thousands of years,

the Pumicestone Passage held hectares of 'bank' oysters across the shore and 'dredge' oysters in the subtidal depths. Their daily routines cleared the waters. Their existence provided habitat and food for fish, birds, sharks and rays and many other kinds of marine life. Some, like darts, known as 'oystercrushers', munched the adults. Others, like small sharks, cruised through the clouds of spawn gulping the caviar.

What became of these reefs of oysters, this living armoured 'skin' of the coastal sea? Political ecologists say that in Queensland, in New South Wales and all the rest of not only Australia but the whole world, a crazy idea infected humanity. Oysters were considered a commodity. Intensive commercial exploitation led to the collapse of oyster reefs and their communities.

Live oysters were sold by the sack or barrel, shipped all around the world. Shell was pulled up in great chunks to be burned to create lime for construction and agriculture. Without a trace of irony, in Australia this process was called skinning.

Great losses

Over 96 per cent of the reefs, with their habitat, food and water-filtering services, all disappeared in this economic free-for-all. Remember Chesapeake Bay? By the end of the 20th century, the losses of oysters were so great that filtering the entire bay once over took almost eleven months.

But for thousands of years before, people in many cultures held fast to another idea. Among the Joondoobarrie, as with the Bundjalung and other groups, the women and children returned shell to the edges of reefs for the

spat to settle. Over time, this in concrete forms, into coir task and other related work enhanced and extended oyster reefs. Although the people took and ate plenty, they also put back for the future.

Family income

The oyster commons were also important socially. Families had a universal basic income in the form of daily access to high-quality protein and vitamins.

Always handy for a feed, delicious raw but try covering some with a woven mat which is then set on fire. Oysters on the half-shell, opening exactly when they are perfect to eat.

Some early settlers in Australia appreciated the oyster commons and set aside small public oyster reserves for such outdoor meals. Brunswick Heads had a reserve at least into the 1930s and Ballina up to the 1960s. They're gone without fanfare. But in the USA, oyster wars were fought when such oyster commons were privatised.

We shellfish people see two great steps ahead. The first is to give back. Oysters were once free-living wild animals and can be again. Communities in Victoria and South Australia, in New Zealand, in New York City and Chesapeake Bay, are putting back oysters. Old shells set in gabion baskets, embedded

sacks or thrown down as a loose carpet in the subtidal zone are being returned to the sea. Sometimes shells are seeded with spat from an ovster farm or hatchery.

Oyster-techture

These projects create important jobs in local communities worldwide. Shocked by superstorms and hurricanes, New York and New Orleans are investing in 'oyster-techture': reefs a kilometre long that double as living shoreline protection.

South Australia is putting more than \$3 million into reefs to repair its natural coastal infrastructure. Bribie Islanders are experimenting with oyster gardens growing off the pontoons in canals.

The second step is open ended. The return of oysters will first benefit seawater and marine life. Then one day, when the bivalve housekeepers get on top of their work, people will have access to good local wild food.

Anticipating that time, we need to wise-up our citizens of the future. Humanity just might get a second chance to care for and share in a sustainable coastal commons.

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TheGoodLife Ilias The Greek

Food and family are topics that are often strongly linked, especially at this time of year, and even more so within cultures with strong food traditions.

Ilias Katsapouikidis, better known as Ilias the Greek, has seen this link grow further over the past month. Visiting his grandparents, two of whom are in palliative care, has brought many elements of his life into focus.

Ilias's story of connecting food and family is, in some ways, straightforward. He makes traditional Greek sweets and savoury dishes to sell at markets and festivals, as well as a few select stores. In everything he makes, there is a direct connection to his childhood in the far northwest of Greece (near Kastoria). In a village of only 250 people, everyone knew everyone and food was central to life. 'My grandmother would be up from first light thinking about what she was cooking,' recalls Ilias.'There'd be a pot stewing in the background, always yogurt brewing and filo pastry resting.'

His journey took two unconventional turns. The first was to Coober Pedy (via Adelaide after his whole family emigrated). As a young adult, Ilias followed his paternal grandparents on their quest to become opal miners. Ilias immersed himself in mining and the multicultural community. 'We lived underground and I was a member of the mine-rescue squad,' he says.'I got to see the dark and light sides of that life.'

Food featured strongly, supplementing the limited range of produce available in the remote desert location with a garden of olives, lemons, figs, capsicum, tomato and kale. 'We had the best underground dinner parties!,' llias says, recalling how his grandmother would eagerly await the miners' return in order to serve them tables full of homemade food, including dolmades, yemistes (stuffed peppers) and fassolia (green beans).

The dark side of mining hit Ilias literally when he was injured in a mining accident. 'I was at the bottom of a 25-metre shaft, about to light an explosive fuse, when everything went black,' says Ilias. It seems that a rock had fallen, knocking him out. 'Luckily I hadn't lit the fuse,' he says in a moment of quiet understatement.

This second unexpected turn brought Ilias to the Byron region. The accident led Ilias to become a yoga teacher and then discover the 'sweet medicine Sundance path', a shamanic practice developed by elders among the first people of northern America. This has altered his approach to life, food, business and family.

How does his traditional Greek family view

his shamanic ideas? 'They know I'm loopy,' says Ilias in a typical self-deprecating response, before adding: 'My calmness and solution -seeking is imperative, especially in amongst family drama.' His wry smile indicates just how dramatic Greek families can get, though he adds that there is also a lot of love within the drama.

The recent family drama has been the admission of Ilias's grandfather into palliative care. This is the same grandfather whom he mined with in Coober Pedy and the one who resuscitated him after the mining accident. 'I didn't realise at the time how much my accident affected him,' says Ilias. 'He's a warrior with a big heart and his blood pressure rose upon discovering me lying unconscious in his mine.'

Ilias visited his grandfather, or Papou, in order to fully

reconnect with him in this last chapter of his life. 'My intent was to bring love into the space,' he says, speaking of the laughs and stories they were able to share. 'It is a time of loss and grief but also gratitude and acknowledgement.' He reflects further, adding: 'After spending years searching for





elusive rainbow-coloured opal gemstones, I recently discovered that the real gem is within.'

Certainly there would have been lots of hugs. Ilias specialises in hugs, offering them freely at his stall at markets and festivals, which he is at most weekends. The same shamanic

ideals that guided him through visiting his Papou guide him in his interactions with all. 'The reason we do festivals is to connect with the people,' he says.

His customers certainly taste the beauty in his authentic Macedonian-style tahini halva and baklava. 'We make it with love – making awesome halva demands full presence,' says Ilias, giving credit to his production manager Matt O'Brien and others in his team, including the 'goddesses' who join Ilias in dressing in traditional Greek attire.

llias is moving towards a focus on savoury options, simply because his customers kept asking. Time was spent developing a way of making spanakopita (traditional spinachand-cheese in filo pastry) in a way that suits markets and festivals. 'Mum is famous in our family for making the best spanakopita,' he says. The outcome is a 'strifto', a coiled version that is easy to hold and eat in festival environments. Salt-and-feta balls are the other ideal option – great for sharing.

And sharing is what family and food are all about. For Ilias, family has been the flavour of the month, in all meanings of the word.

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An Everyday Bakery

It might have the word *Sunday* in its name but you do not have to save it for once a week. Nor do you have to dress up in your Sunday best.

The Sunday Sustainable Bakery is a bakery you can go to every day, though this doesn't mean it isn't special. Opened a month ago, locals and those from further afield are discovering their breads, pastries and croissants.

'This has been a night area for many years,' says owner-manager Conor Reid, reflecting on how the bakery is on the site of the previous Republik restaurant and is next door to *Abrakebabra*, an evening venue. The new look is definitely all about daytime: the space is light and bright, with breezy and accessible wide doors, outdoor seating and a coffee window open to the street.

The other part of the name is *sustainable* and this part is a huge focus for the business, with ingredients sourced locally to reduce food miles and produce varying with the seasons. The originally planned name included the word *organic*, but even though they strive to be as certified organic as possible, they also take into account food miles. 'A lot of organic ingredients for bakeries can only be sourced from as far away as India or Canada,' says Conor, noting that this is not ideal for either food miles or freshness. He goes on to say that great ingredients are able to be sourced locally.

Breads on offer include spelt, rustic-style and sourdough (made from a 14-year-old culture). Yummies on offer include a passionfruit tart prettily decorated with edible flowers,

brown-butter pecan pies, and the signature spelt blueberry and almond scones.

Pies, sausage rolls, spinach rolls and porkand-fennel rolls are all made onsite, by baker Matt Carey-Thomas. Breakfast specials include options such as avo-and-fetta smash (on great toast of course!) and 'secret' eggand-bacon roll (the secret is that nothing is fried).

Coffee is Moonshine, made by a team of baristas including long-time local barista Dan Wright.

Kids are welcome any day at Sunday Sustainable Bakery. Conor is father to two children, aged three and six, who happily test-rode the striking carousel horse that sits in the front window. Parents will be happy to discover that it works with the push of a button (no coins required).

Part of the 'sustainable' ethos is making sure that customers can sustain their bakerygoing. Pies and rolls are priced at only \$5 and kid-sized chocolate cupcakes (gluten free) are \$2.50.

The *Sunday* part of the name is yet to be fully realised, with the plan to offer Sunday sessions of live music and a charitable focus. These will kick off once regular business is bedded down.

So for now, every day is the same, but that's no bad thing at Sunday.

What is the one song that reminds you of growing up and why?

Little Red Corvette was on a mixtape of a friend of mine in middle school. We hit it off in homeroom, and started going to live shows and getting into trouble together, sneaking out of town, cutting each other's hair in the bathroom at school, and all of that. She had this mixtape that was punk rock and 80s stuff. We would play each other new tapes/CDs of bands we liked, but that mixtape was always the go-to. Driving around with nothing to do but blast this tape and harmonise to the songs together was one of our favourite things. We're still friends and those moments are just as important as a lot of the wild shit we did!

What is the song/s that get you on the dance floor every time?

If Al Jackson Jr or Howard Grimes or Phil Rudd played drums on it, I'm on the dance floor. Plain and simple!

What is the song that's always busted out when no-one is around? Why?

Tom Jones singing *It's Not Unusual*. Although I would play this with people around too. It's a catchy song, Tom Jones is a killer singer, and sexy as hell, and if you grew up in the Fresh Prince of Bel-Air era like I did, that song holds a special place. We all know the *Carlton Dance*!

Hannah Joy spoke with *The Echo*.

As solo artists, what was the impetus to come together as a band?

None of us had any friends so we started a band and now we each have a few friends.

How does it change the way your write songs?

There's a great collaborative dynamic where different ideas come together and create something special OR create tension (which then hopefully resolves and eventually creates something better).

How do you three write together, or work up a song from the get-go to the studio, or the stage?

We have a loose process. Hannah writes songs and starts recording parts, Tim comes in and makes a huge mess, and then we get Harry on the track to finish it off like a fresh coat

What are some of your highlights so far?

We've loved being on the road together! We feel super lucky to have been able to play music in different places along with some really great bands we admire. But in a more real, powerful way, some of the best highlights have been the different burgers we've eaten around the world.

What about the weirdest thing to happen at a gig?

We were playing at a venue where whenever Tim played a note on the bass guitar it would turn the wall light off so throughout the whole set the light was going nutso in response to his massive grooves.

What should we expect for your show at Falls Festival?

Seven songs at four minutes each and two minutes of banter and high kicks to take us to our 30-minute set time.

A welcome return to the screen by Hugh Grant saw him playing it straight as St Clair, the manager and doting husband of Meryl Streep's wannabe soprano diva. Based on a true story, Florence was a wealthy New York socialite whose unshakeable self-belief led



her, in 1944, to booking Carnegie Hall for a concert recital. That she was an awful singer allows for some hilarious moments - and Streep is fabulous at hitting the jarring, wrong note - but it's more about the sincerity of her endeavour and the devotion shown her by St Clair.

THE FENCER

This is a beautiful movie with an unfortunate flaw in its presentation. Spoilers aren't called spoilers for no reason, so it is baffling that the producers chose to inform the viewer through an introductory preamble what the state of play was for many Estonian men during the years of the murderous 'Uncle Joe' Stalin's ascendency in Moscow.

Endel (Klaus Härö) is a teacher in a frosty small town in Estonia (then part of the USSR). His passion as a younger man had been fencing and the kids in his care, at the instigation of gorgeous little Marta (Liisa Koppel), persuade him to give them lessons in the art. It doesn't go down well with the principal who, toeing the party line, believes that it is an unacceptably bourgeois pursuit. His suspicion of Endel is confirmed by news received from Leningrad – the secret police are looking for him. This might have been the mystery that drove the story, but (no) thanks to the opening credits, we know exactly why Endel is being sought. Not to worry – the film glows with the warmth generated by the relationship that grows between Endel and his pupils and later the love he finds with fellow teacher Kadri (Ursula Ratasepp).

Stories such as these – of devotion to a cause, of bucking the system – necessarily involve a daunting challenge. The children, though ill-equipped novices, have their hearts set on competing in an all-schools fencing tournament that is to be held in Leningrad. For Endel, the journey would be loaded with peril, but he understands that, despite Kadri's plea to stay, it is a moral imperative that he go (and it's a joyous scene when Marta and her friends get their first glimpse of the city from the train).

There are at first a lot of camera shots taken from behind Endel, following him through his poor, icy environment, and Tuomo Hutri's cinematography is finely textured and subtly coloured throughout, as is Tina Kaukanen's costume design (the kids' clothing is so 'real', but not studied). Based on actual events, Endel was a hero without a gun – it's a pity we don't see more of them on screen.

I'm not sure if this is the prequel to the sequel of instalment number four of the neverending story (yawn), or the sequel to the prequel... or am I getting it mixed up with *Star Trek*?

As the jolly explosions, destructions and mass killings went on (and on), recent footage from the carnage at Aleppo came to mind. What I remembered most curiously were all those families fleeing the turmoil looking so downcast – don't they know how much fun this sort of thing is? Or am I overreacting to the disconnect between suffering humanity and the pleasure so many cinema audiences mindlessly take in slaughter? Whatever – good luck to George Lucas, he's laughing all the way to the bank. And at this point I beg an indulgence – a man does his best all year, but with Chrissie activities in full swing and my absolute inability (through lack of interest) to get a handle on what was going on in this, I am forced to revert to the IMdB summary: 'The Rebellion makes a risky move to steal the plans for the Death Star, setting up the epic saga to follow'. Really? What I personally find most fascinating about these sci-fi movies is the art direction. It is always a combination of massive satellites and awesome hi-tech weaponry, talking robots (with an Oxbridge accent) and creatures on the street that are either weird and unnatural or escapees from the big biblical flick being shot on the next lot. And they are all thrown together (in the case of the *Star Wars* saga) in a dusty bustling Jetsons city with golden domes, a souk and towering Mayan pyramids.

It is a world of both holograms and medieval dungeons. As picture books go, it's hypnotic and dreamily childlike. Apart from that – well, there are attempts at humour that come off occasionally – the blind Asian 'grasshopper' guy, having his head covered as he is led away by baddies, says 'are you kidding? I'm blind!' Otherwise, the baby meerkats on Facebook are much more fun.
