Affordable housing dispute over?

It appears a long-running dispute over a Mullum affordable housing DA will be resolved via a conciliation conference between developer Koho and Council.

A Land and Environment commissioner visited the Stuart Street site on January 24, which gave an opportunity for residents to make their case against the development.

But at this stage, Koho has told *The Echo* that they have agreed with Council's proposed consent conditions. Previously Council staff had recommended a ten-unit design for approval, which was initially approved by Council.

However, after a number of rescission motions it was finally refused.

At the November 17, 2016 meeting, the mayor used his casting vote - with an absent Cr Cameron - to approve the development and to delegate authority to the general manager to enter into a conciliation agreement.

While it's unlikely to appease residents calling for its outright rejection, Koho director Adam Bennett-Smith said, 'After receiving a concise list of facts and contentions prepared by Council-appointed planning and heritage experts, Koho was able to respond with a revised design consisting of eight units with density reduced to comply with the Byron Shire LEP without relying on a density bonus afforded under the Affordable continued on page 2 >

Child saved from drowning

A toddler was revived after almost drowning in the Brunswick Heads river by the quick actions of an English visitor, who also happened to be a nurse. Witness Victoria Carrington told The Echo that last Tuesday January 17, 'Nigel Smith had swum across the Brunswick River, near the bridge and children's park'.

'On his return lap, each time he raised his head from the water to take a breath he noticed a tiny girl moving down the stairs from the play area to the water.

After seeing her step into the water and disappear from sight, Mr Smith swam to her and dived to the bottom to frantically search for her.

'No-one else on the shore appeared to have noticed, he told Carrington. 'It took some time before finding her... lying motionless on the bottom, about two metres from the surface. After being brought up, she appeared unconscious... Smith moved his hands to her ribcage and she suddenly shuddered and came to life.'

'As a further demonstration of our genuine commitment to affordable housing in the Shire, Koho has agreed for these units to remain affordable in perpetuity rather than the minimum ten years required under the Affordable Housing SEPP.

'It is our hope that this gesture demonstrates affordable housing through inclusionary zoning, an idea that has been championed by councillor Paul Spooner and supported by the mayor, is most certainly possible. We look forward to the matter being resolved via conciliation, rather than a costly contested hearing

which I believe would not be in the best interests of Council, Koho, or the ratepayers.

'As a Byron-based designer and investor in permanent rental housing for key workers, the team at Koho is very excited to contribute to increasing the supply of highquality, well-located affordable housing in the Shire.'

More for PAC to do: AG report

A commission which oversees major developments in NSW has been unable to demonstrate to the Auditor-General (AG) how statutory obligations are being met with every decision reviewed.

But AG Margaret Crawford wrote in last week's report that decision-making processes for major development applications in recent years have improved, along with 'improved probity measures.'

'More can also be done to improve transparency in decision making and the public's perception of the independence of Commissioners,' she wrote.

The Planning Assessment Commission (PAC) is independent from the NSW planning department, and determines major developments, provides advice, reviews and conducts public hearings.

Claims over solar-run train challenged, again

Residents have again questioned whether a planned solar-powered rail service will be realistic.

Byron Bay Railroad Company (BBRC) plans to run a rail service from near the Sun Bistro on Bayshore Drive into Byron's CBD, and is expecting to begin the service in April.

Belongil Action Group Association (BAGA) and the Sunrise Progress Association (SPA) have told *The Echo* that it engaged a 'specialist environmentally sustainable design engineer' to assess the validity of the claims the train could be solar powered.

A statement by the group says their expert, Chris Trayes from Enertec, a mechanical and electrical consultant, says that 'energy saved from the solar panels and the regenerative braking is a "furphy" if the train operated 100 times per day.

'We have used this figure as the basis of Mr Trayes' calculations because of the developer's verbal confirmation to representatives of BAGA during a meeting in October 2016 that the train could operate up to four or five times per hour if the demand required it (ie more than 120 trips per day). However, for the purpose of these calculations we will base the figures on 100 trips per day.

'Mr Trayes estimates that, at best, the solar panels and regenerative braking system will only account for 35–40 per cent of the total power required, and that the rest of the power will come from the diesel engine that is installed in the train. However, in reality, if the system is less than ideal in its construction and maintenance, it will only contribute 25 per cent.'

But Elements of Byron resort general manager Jeremy Holmes, who is overseeing the train project, told *The Echo*, 'We do not intend to run the train 100 times per day. There simply will never be that level of demand. What we have proposed is a return hourly service initially, which is 28 one-way trips.'

'Byron Bay Railroad Company will shortly publish more details regarding the solar conversion, including further technical explanation, via byronbaytrain.com.au.'

Amalgamation reversal welcomed

A commitment by newly appointed deputy premier John Barilaro (Nationals) that forced council amalgamations in regional NSW would be now unsupported by his party has been applauded by the peak body representing the local government sector.

In a statement last week, Barilaro said it was time to draw a line in the sand on local government mergers, and reminded the Liberal Party that the coalition agreement was 'a blank sheet of paper'.

Local Government NSW (LGNSW) president Cr Keith Rhoades AFSM said, 'the strong statement made it clear the deputy premier had not only heard but understood the community during his recent tour of regional electorates.'

Cr Rhoades said, 'These communities are absolutely irate about forced amalgamations, and the proof was obvious at the Orange by-election.'

He reminded the coalition of current unpopular amalgamations, including Sydney and Shellharbor 'who don't want to be forced into a merger with Wollongong,' and Port Stephens and Newcastle.

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




Mayoral thoughts on holiday lets

Further to last week's interview with Greens mayor Simon Richardson, The Echo presents the second instalment - where is Council's holiday-letting strategy at?

There's no legislation to stop it; as much as Matt Hartley bangs on about it, there's actually nothing.

For example, Randwick [in Sydney] has about 3,000 holiday-let properties.

The state government isn't going to let us ban holiday letting even if we wanted to.

The precinct model was the fairest model I thought but there was no appetite by the holiday-let organisation, the victims of holiday let or by the state government.

So that was shelved.

I have a friend who holiday lets her garden flat at her Brunswick Heads home, but would like to bring it up to speed to long-term let it. She says holiday lets are a pain to manage.

She makes about \$20,000 a year for it, but it's the difference between living there and not.


And then there's \$5,000 for cleaning etc. She says if she made improvements with it, she could charge more for it. So there's that aspect.

There's another guy who owns and holiday lets a few 70s-style brick units also in Brunswick Heads. He's making \$40,000 on each of those units. That's very different from a garden flat.

Another friend lives in Byron, and he's holiday letting a unit in Kew [Melbourne].

He says it's easier for him to AirBnB than permanently rent. This a global thing and if we think we can stop it, we are kidding ourselves.

He's got mates who are buying house after house in Byron and then flipping them. [For example] they started by building a secondary dwelling at the back of

their house. That was so successful that he moved into that and rented out his house.

Destroying the suburbs

He then went on buy the houses around him and is doing the exact same thing with those homes.

My mate said to him, 'You are destroying this suburb. If you and your mates keep doing this no-one will live here.'

It doesn't register until someone says that... Another friend who is a

real estate agent says people are making \$150,000 a year holiday letting.

So when we are talking about holiday letting and housing stock, there are all these dynamics.

We are never going to stop holiday lets that are bringing in \$150,000 a year.

For someone from Sydney who buys a \$2m house on Lighthouse Road, they will holiday let it – and then, on average, they will stop doing that and move there in five or six years. That's what we know around the country statistically.

The horse has bolted on those ones and I can't see any way we can stop that.

But we've been told there's nothing stopping us from



managing holiday letting ie making someone register and then we charge say \$30,000 for a licence fee.

That amount could be split, for example, if it's your whole house, like AirBnB split it.

It could be \$20,000 for a home and a granny flat \$10,000.

So that person in Brunswick Heads who is nearly at the point of turning her granny flat into a permanent rental would do that, as there isn't the financial incentive for her to holiday let.

So all of those types of properties will go to longterm rent.

And that guy who's making \$40,000 in Bruns is only making \$10,000 or \$20,000. That might mean it's better for him to long-term rent the properties.

I pitched this idea to staff to look into this and see if we had jurisdiction to set whatever fee we want.

The state government has some control, but with things such as fees and charges, they had no control. So I asked if we could explore that.

Social interest

The report back basically said no, but as long as you can justify it - and one of the justifications was 'in the social interest'.

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That alone is enough.

But we are going to have to employ more planners to deal with holiday-let DAs; we'll have to employ more compliance people... I would argue we will need a big legal fund to defend ourselves.

Cr Richardson said that in the past, Council's legal challenges for holiday-letting compliance had resulted in a high cost to ratepayers.

We would choose the most obvious, irrefutable, tightest legal case. We would then take them to court. Twoand-a-half months in, before a judgment, they would withdraw and say they would stop doing it. We then lost our \$50,000 [in legal costs] and then we would try and do it with another one.

Two years and \$300,000 later, we had no finding... so we certainly don't want to go down that path again.

As far as legally proving a holiday let, we would need to actually pay staff to go and book a holiday let. You would then need to interview people coming in the next day.

Council's short-term rental accommodation (STRA) policy was sent to the state government by the previous council. What's happening now?

We haven't heard back from the government yet on our [updated STRA] plan, but we are hoping to hear in the next few months.

Previously, the state government rejected the 'three strikes and you're out' rule and a few other things in our plan.

As holiday letting regulation is already happening in other parts of the state, we don't expect any major issues.

Interestingly, two other councils were allowed to include the 'three strikes and you are out' rule but the state didn't agree for us to have it.



The NDIS rollout brings work opportunities: Byron College

The National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) rollout in northern NSW, scheduled for July 1 this year, means there will be employment opportunities for those trained in the area, according to Byron Community College.

Director Richard Vinycomb says, 'The Certificate III in Individual Support not only gives students the relevant qualifications, it also has a dual stream for anyone wanting to work in aged care'.

'This is a booming sector in the community services and health industry and there is continuous need from industry for more fully qualified people to work in the local facilities in the region.'

Vinycomb added, 'Our tu-

tors currently working in the industry and have up-to-date knowledge and contacts.

One aged-care graduate student, Liz Winter, said, 'I had no idea this choice would transform my life in so many ways. The course was well planned and led by inspiring mentors who had a wealth of knowledge, wisdom and experience. I got a permanent part-time position at a local facility that I absolutely loved. 'I was offered the job while

I was on work experience.'

Eligible students are heavily subsidised by the NSW government, says Vinycomb. The six-month course

starts on February 1.

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Councillor weighs in over spat

Cr Paul Spooner, who ran on a Labor platform for Council, has come to the defence of staff and Greens mayor, Simon Richardson.

Last week, The Echo reported on the division that had emerged between former Greens councillor Tom Tabart and the mayor, with Tabart claiming that governance was never the mayor's strong point.

Cr Paul Spooner told The Echo, 'While it's kind of amusing to see a Greens ex-councillor have a public stoush with a current Greens mayor, it also points to a problem with the Greens party - they often can't see the forest for the trees.'

'This Shire has much bigger issues to deal with than whether Simon is meddling in the day-to-day operational matters of Council.

'Deciding on an appropriate rate determination comes to mind.

'I would prefer Simon to be focused on the work of a mayor that really matters -"to be the principal spokesperson of the governing body, including representing the views of the council as to its

local priorities," (section 226, Local Government Act 1995).

'This includes representing our community priorities to both state and federal governments so that maybe, just maybe, we can get some things done.

'The day-to-day running of the council should be left in the hands of the general manager. That's what he or she is employed to do.

'For a mayor to get his hands dirty in this way will lead to staff confusion, resistance and policy inaction.

'Not the sort of outcomes our community elects its representatives to achieve.

'I have now watched Simon in his role as mayor up close for over four years.

'I believe we are lucky to have him as mayor.

'While I don't always agree with his priorities, I do believe he understands the proper role of mayor as leading the policy arm of Council.

'He understands the role of the elected body of Council is to employ and supervise the general manager - not do his iob for him.

Dedicated and experienced GM

'Residents should be comfortable in the fact that we have a dedicated, experienced GM who lives in the Shire and works tirelessly to ensure value-for money-outcomes from the rates you entrust him and his staff to work with.

'Unsophisticated criticism of both these guys' performance is like throwing marshmallow into the fire you just end up with a shrivelled gooey heap of nonsense.

'If you are in any doubt as to the proper roles of both the general manager and mayor, the Local Government Act 1995 should be your informed guide, not the disaffected views of an old Greens warhorse.

'Section 335 of the Local Government Act 1995 reads, 'The general manager of a council has the following functions:

'(a) to conduct the dayto-day management of the council in accordance with the strategic plans, programs, strategies and policies of the council.

'Section 226 of the Act reads, "The role of the mayor is as follows:

(j) to advise, consult with and provide strategic direction to the general manager in relation to the implementation of the strategic plans and policies of the council".

Water mining looms as next battle after CSG

A public meeting at Uki last Wednesday night revealed a groundswell of widespread discontent around the Tweed Valley over proposals for largescale extraction from bores of water which would be bottled and sold.

Uki Hall was packed with around 200 people who are against a controversial plan by a former state-government minister to extract water from a bore on his property to sell to a bottling company.

But locals from Dungay, Bilambil and Urliup also vented their anger at plans currently before Tweed Shire Council for contentious major water extraction in their neck of the woods.

Many at the meeting told several Tweed Shire councillors who attended that underground water supplies belonged to the whole community and should not be sold.

The meeting was sparked by the return of a development application, now before Tweed Council, by Rowlands

Creek Road property owner and former Labor government minister Jack Hallam.

His plan is to extract 24 megalitres of water a year from the bore on his property to sell it to the bottling plant.

The proposal is for up to three loads a day (six trips), six days a week from 7am till 6pm by large semitrailer tankers (2.5 metres wide, 28,500 litres capacity) to the commercial bottler and distributor.

The bore is licensed by the NSW Office of Water for 25-megalitre extraction.

Sold to Coca-Cola?

A resident told The Echo that 'This is about commercially extracting our water to enable the likes of Coca-Cola to bottle up in plastic, make massive profits at the cost of the environment'.

'Massive water tankers driving continually along quiet country roads, possible water shortages, more and more non-biodegradable plastic bottles and the shocking list goes on'.

Another said, 'Now that

the battle against coal seam gas mining in the Tweed has been won, is the next battle for residents and communities going to be "water mining"?

'It's going on right under our noses in Tweed,' she said, warning that the Urliup Road proposal of around 60 megalitres a year was 'equal to 60 million litres of water from the water table'.

What must this be doing to the creeks and springs that feed the surrounding rainwould think it would be doing more harm than good.



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Opportunities and issues for the most easterly chamber

High rents, high business turnover and the ever-increasing presence of franchises over local businesses are just some of the challenges that face the Byron Bay Chamber of Commerce.

Nonetheless, chamber president and realtor Gail Fuller sees this as an opportunity to bring communities together and work towards a mutually beneficial future for both Byron Bay and the broader Shire.

'We are trying to bring different chambers together. It's about picking up the phone and inviting them to events,' she said.

With approximately 150 Byron businesses as members, Ms Fuller sees the primary role of the chamber as 'a conduit to Council'.

'For example we had a call from some local businesses opposite Woolies about dust and dirt being raised from a site nearby that was affecting them and their customers. I called the general manager and within two days the issue had been dealt with.'

Over the years rents have risen alongside the popularity of the area, contributing to the high-turnover of businesses in the town. 'We are losing about 20 to 25 per cent of businesses a year,' said Ms Fuller. 'A lot of businesses are really on the bone. When you are paying between \$4,000 and \$10,000 a month for rent, it's a lot along with insurance, staff etc.'

Rental prices are also compounded by the significant franchise presence in the Bay.

'This is leading to a lack of diversity and the culture of Byron is disappearing because of it.'

For some of the franchise businesses having a presence in the Bay is more about brand recognition, so the high rental prices are worth the cost.

Masterplan

As part of the Byron Bay masterplan, there are smaller shopfloors being planned at the back of the Lawson Street car park. This idea aims to encourage more of the Bay's artisan community back into the town.

Leah Kapral, chamber executive officer, highlighted the fact that many of them have been pushed out of the main centre into the industrial estate owing to high rental prices.



future, Ms Fuller highlighted the need to create a range of opportunities – not just in hospitality – but for employment, especially for the youth in the area.

'We are definitely trying to get that engagement,' says Ms Fuller. 'We are looking at ideas for events, such as the best of Byron, to draw them together. From agriculture, retail, artisan and the industrial sectors, they need to get to know each other.'

Changing dynamic

The changing dynamic of the population is another element that needs to be engaged with. 'There is a large group in their 50s and 60s who are buying in from the major cities,' Ms Fuller says.

People who are just wanting to find out about what is happening in the town and region are welcome to come and participate in the chamber events, from the breakfast with the mayor to business after-hours drinks.

'We are planning to have a theme [at business after hours] and showcase awardwinning and successful local businesses. There are international businesses that are topping the world here in the industrial estate – let's showcase them. It is about business and community working together and learning together,' said Ms Kapral.

Straya day

Australia Day. Across a vast land with a multicultural populace, it means different things to everybody.

For many, it's a time to revel in nationalistic pride, get drunk, wave a flag and sizzle a sausage.

Yet for Indigenous people, it's Survival Day.

It's a reminder of the 1788 invasion by the British and the

subsequent program of genocide, segregation and assimilation. More than that, Survival Day highlights that the brutality and

dispossession are yet to be acknowledged formally. And while there has been some progress with land rights,

Constitutional recognition for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples is obviously the mature direction to be heading. Especially given this year also marks the 50th anniversary of the

1967 referendum that enabled Aboriginal and Torres Islander peoples to be 'counted in reckoning the population,' within the Constitution.

In late 2015, the Referendum Council was jointly appointed by Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull and Labor's Bill Shorten.

The council comprises a stellar lineup of Indigenous luminaries and former politicians, who claim they will 'build upon the extensive work' of previous panels and committees.

So far, the council have come to basically the same conclusion as previous panels and committees that existed years before them.

Their final report is planned for mid-2017.

Two changes to the Constitution are canvassed, which can only occur by referendum.

First is repealing section 25 of the Constitution. Currently that section allows a state to ban a race from voting - seriously.

The Council also suggest that Section 51 (xxvi) be replaced.

According to academic website The Conversation, Section 51 (xxvi) was included 'to allow the federal parliament to discriminate against certain groups on the basis of their race - for example, by restricting their freedom of movement, or by confining them to particular occupations.' Author and UNSW Law School lecturer Paul Kildea says on the conversation.com that, 'Even if the Constitution's two existing references to race were removed, the federal parliament would still have power to pass laws that discriminate against Indigenous people.

Meanwhile, there is debate within the Indigenous community over the merits of a treaty. Canada has one, as does New Zealand.

But what of a Bill of Rights? Despite many similar western democracies having them, that idea was eventually unsupported by the previous Joint Select Committee on Constitutional Recognition of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples in 2015.

That report reads: 'Bills of rights have been proposed in parliament but have failed, with attempts to introduce a bill of rights in 1944, 1973, 1982, 1984, 1985, 1988, 2000, 2001, 2005 and 2008 all failing to pass'.

With the minor parties holding the balance of power in the federal senate, it's worth looking at where they stand on Constitutional recognition. The Greens (nine seats) and Nick Xenophon's Next party (three seats) recognise Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples as the first Australians and support Constitutional recognition.

The Jacqui Lambie Network (JLN) are also supportive of Constitutional recognition and support the New Zealand model of 'dedicated Indigenous seats being established for Australian Parliaments.'

Derryn Hinch's Justice Party has no Indigenous policy on its website, but does advocate for equal rights, albeit in light detail.

One Nation (four seats), led by Pauline Hanson, have no policies on Indigenous people on www.onenation.com.au. Likewise, The Liberal Democratic Party, led by the extremely unpleasant David Leyonhjelm, do not mention Indigenous people on their website.

Breaking Baird with a Turnbull reshuffle

o the NSW premier Mike lems: both were resented by the Baird is gone - gone, but not forgotten, at least to his friend and fellow cornstalker Malcolm Turnbull, who has lost a trusted and dependable ally in the moderate faction of his factionalised state, as well as a personal friend.

The two have had their differences, notably over Baird's proposal to increase the GST and his government's insistence that the full Gonski funding should be reinstated, but the relationship has always been amiable and usually productive, even in the acrimonious atmosphere of the regular COAG meetings.

Certainly the prime minister has been effusive, praising the departing premier for his remarkable leadership and playing a great innings; the state and the nation, Turnbull enthused, owed the departing premier a great debt, and he was not referring to the financial one his own government has incurred.

As he showered Baird with good wishes there was no hint of insincerity.

But apart from his regret at losing the nearest thing to a mate among the premiers, Turnbull must be feeling more than a little conflicted, because the inevitable comparisons that will be made between the two leaders will not be in his favour.

The two had a fair bit in common: both rose from a business background, both were impeccably credentialed Sydney silvertails and both, after a relatively short time in their respective parliaments, rose quickly to the top.

And having reached the top, they were immensely popular: it appeared that they were untouchable, invincible, towering over both their own parties and lacklustre Labor oppositions.

There were, of course, prob-

hard right Liberal rump and some of the Nationals and both had to contend with minor parties who held the balance of power in their upper houses. But neither would have anticipated the plummeting in the opinion polls that left both their governments far too close to the edge for comfort.

Thus the similarities: but the big difference was the manner of their descent from the heights. In Baird's case it was being too

decisive: too many tough decisions, which in the end proved too radical for a conservative electorate to stomach. The obvious ones were the greyhound ban, the council amalgamations and the lock-out laws, but the fallout from the big infrastructure projects which followed the controversial sale of the poles and wires of the electricity grid did not help: the West Connex and light rail projects have produced hassles.

Too many ideas, many of them good ones, but implemented too quickly and without enough consideration. Shades, perhaps, of Gough Whitlam or Paul Keating - other short-term reformists that Turnbull sees as object lessons for political disaster if prolonged incumbency is more important than achievement. And for this reason, perhaps, Turnbull's fall was the opposite of Baird's - too cautious, too dithering, too reluctant to embrace the high ideals he promised when he was anointed.

In Baird's case it was all go; in Turnbull's it has been all waffle. And thus from both Macquarie Street and Capital Hill disappointed voters have drifted away, not necessarily to Labor, but to all kinds of snake-oil messiahs who offer the action – any action - they crave. Thus both Baird and Turnbull ended up surrounded by the Hansonites, the Shooters and Fishers, the Xenophonites, the Nileists and other equally absurd fringe groups which they must either ignore or placate, both seriously unpalatable options.

forgetful and still vulnerable Arthur Sinodinos will be otherwise unremarked, but the promotion of Ken Wyatt as our first Indigenous minister is at least of symbolic significance.

Wyatt succeeds on his own merits, but will always be suspected by the hardliners - he may remember the downfall of our first Indigenous parliamentarian, Neville Bonner, who was dumped from preselection by the warlords of the QLD Liberal Party many years ago.

In any case the shuffle is no more than a stopgap: there will have to be more to come, even if the real swamp dwellers like George Brandis and Peter Dutton are regarded as protected species. But Tony Abbott will remain pawing at the starting gates. Despite the ringing endorsement of Pauline Hanson and the continuing promotion by The Australian's Simon Benson, who is apparently moonlighting as Abbott's part-time press secretary, the former king remains unwanted - definitely more quondam than futurus. On that score Turnbull has been decisive. But it was not nearly enough to turn the continuing malaise into a successful week.

Turnbull may console himself with the thought that if he stayed up to watch, from a safe distance, the inauguration of the most loathed incoming president in American history, at least he is not the least popular leader in the civilised world. Yet.

I was, however, influential in the establishment of the (now tamed) Internal Audit Committee. The then GM managed to keep it inoperative for nearly two years before the staff internal auditor (on my instigation) found problems in the control and

management of the vehicle fleet.

Otherwise I was an active member of the Barham councils which achieved many breakthroughs, including being the model for NSW in coastal management (since trashed by state planning and our last council), establishing far-reaching environmental plans, maintaining the development moratoriums to force the construction of three new STPs, building the new sports complex, the Byron Library and much more. But overall we endeavoured (not entirely successfully) to 'hold the line' against inappropriate, and promote ecologically sustainable, development. The line has yet to be reestablished after the depredations of the Sol/Rose council, and the pressures have increased.

Local government in NSW is set up to be completely subservient to the state government; the sharp legislated divide between the elected body and the executive is problematic, considering that the LG Act designates the elected body as ultimately responsible for governance.

In general it does not work well and the corruption of councils such as Botany (staff) and Auburn (councillors) shows what can easily happen. It is naive to expect that all will be well if governance 'is not a major priority' for councillors.

Leaving nationalities aside, the bottom line on doof parties in the Arakwal National Park is that it is illegal to organise, run or attend such a party. Organisers can be fined up to \$15,000 and have equipment confiscated and attendees can be fined \$3,300.

If you light a fire, especially during a summer total fire ban, then that is a fine of \$5,000 (and that includes twirling fire sticks) and up to 15 years in jail if the fire gets out of control and causes major damage. That's before even taking lack of public liability insurance cover into account. The national park is owned and run by the local Indigenous people and this is totally disrespectful to them as well as local residents who are angry but also in despair over the constant parties and the trashing of the environment, which they then have to clean up.

Residents feel blessed to have a national park fringing the town and beach. 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

the UN, but what they fail to mention is that the UN also created Palestine and that Israel is the worst abuser of the UN in history, having over

100 UN General Assembly resolutions against them. Sudan is in second place with around 35. Why is this? Because for more than 50 years Israel has very brutally and illegally occupied the state of Palestine and subjected its people to horrific human rights abuses.

Indeed preceded by terrorist acts, it was established unilaterally, by the Zionistdominated 'People's Council' of the Jewish colonies in Palestine - concurrently with massive acts of conquest, dispossession and expulsion of indigenous Palestinians.

The way the UN works, the General Assembly could and did only recommend its Partition Plan to the Security Council, requesting that it 'take the necessary measures' to implement it, and calling 'upon the inhabitants of Palestine to take such steps as may be necessary to put this plan into effect'. But the Security Council did not 'take the necessary measures'. Nor did the 'inhabitants of Palestine' around 70 per cent of whom were Arabs, who owned over 80 per cent of the land, 'take such steps as may be necessary'. How could they have accepted such an inequitable plan that allotted almost 60 per cent of Palestine to a 'Jewish state'?

Burd also refers to the invasion of 'millions of Arabs' after the Zionist state was declared, ignoring the fact that the Zionists were aware of the Arab states' ultimatum that they would intervene, and declared their state nevertheless, confident in their own military superiority, and seeing it as a pretext for conquering more land than was allocated to them in the Partition Plan.

There are more lies in these two letters than space allows in this response. But Fast Bucks too can't be left of the hook for one thing: He writes that 'there are many Jews who would kill any Arab on sight, adding 'How sad it is that the Jews, of all people, would be so lacking in insight and empathy'.

No. Like many others, here Fast Bucks disseminates the basically anti-Semitic, but also Zionist, conflation of the nation of Jewish Israelis with 'the Jews', even though the majority of Jews in the world are citizens of other countries, and many of them, like myself, condemn the Zionist occupation of Palestine.


Simon Richardson states in The Echo (January 18) that

the ocean, would suggest we need to kill the great white shark or other sharks to feel safe to surf or go in the water. This anthropocentric view of nature, that it has to be controlled or destroyed, has contributed to the current environmental disaster we are in.

And what sort of example are they sending to the new generation of surfers and ocean lovers, just kill anything that is a possible threat rather than developing a relationship with nature and working with it? The shark netting program is a perfect example – 364 marine creatures died in NSW last year in these nets to satisfy humanity's fear of nature. The dead included dolphins, turtles, and endangered sharks. prefixed with Armstrong. Jones is solid, but evokes very little. Deep down, however, I am far from solid while evoking quite a lot.

So I changed my name back to my unmarried mother's. When I was thirtyish, I became Robert Dessaix. I'd grown into Robert and Dessaix fed fantasies of foreignness, with interesting possibilities in the final *x*. I may have been illegitimate, but in my name I deserved at least a touch of class, surely. The crazy thing about all these deaths is that there is no evidence that these shark nets, that are usually only 100 metres long, actually make people safer. Many of the targeted sharks were caught on the beach side of the nets as they were leaving. Besides, there are many non-lethal alternatives that are much more effective. Some people are being hoodwinked.

Last week while surfing in the Brunswick River mouth I utilised a technique taught to me by world-renowned animal communicator Anna Breytenbach. I sent a telepathic message to any sharks that may be in the area that I am their friend, I am not food or competition. with Joaquín Phoenix. For reasons best known to himself, Truman Streckfus Persons decided to call himself Truman Condom in French. Charles Bronson just knew he wasn't really a Bunchinsky – who is, after all? How Stefani Germanotta ever came up with Lady Gaga I have no idea, but it's brilliant, it says it all, whereas Germanotta says nothing whatsoever that you'd want to think about at any length.

No, Juliet, a rose by any other name would not necessarily smell as sweet at all. If roses were called scruggs, for instance, it might be all the same to a thrips, but people aren't thrips. TheGoodLifeBreakfast-LunchWrapping goodnessVegwith goodnessAus

If any of your new-year resolutions involved reducing your impact on the environment, this is the story for you!

You're in the kitchen doing one of the following: unpacking food from the market, unwrapping a block of cheese, making the kids' lunches, putting leftovers from dinner in a bowl or bringing in veges from your patch. What do you reach for to cover or wrap this food? A plastic bag or cling film? Likely, your answer involves something to do with plastic.

This was the dilemma facing Sherrie Adams a few years ago. With five children, the school lunch scenario was particularly significant and it was her dislike of plastic wrap that got her thinking about alternatives. She started experimenting and developed a method of impregnating cloth with beeswax. She started selling at local markets and quickly discovered that she wasn't the only one interested in a sustainable food-wrap option.

Though Sherrie never intended for her wraps to become a full-scale business, Honeybee Wrap was born and a mere three years later, the business has grown from Sherrie on her farm to selling via more than 300 stores nationwide and with export on the cards. Sherrie is rightly proud of how this unexpected turn has created jobs for locals: 'I've been able to give six women jobs,' she says. 'Everyone who works here is beautiful; we have a great team.'

'It all started from asking the question of how, as a large family, we could reduce our impact on the earth,' says Sherrie. 'It's also about food wastage; after all, food is expensive,' she adds.

The wraps are made from certified organic cotton, coloured with low-impact dyes then impregnated with beeswax. The result is a flexible wrap that seals around any shape, whether a bowl, block of cheese or a cut avocado. The beeswax means the wrap sticks to itself, so no other fastening is required. 'The heat of your hands softens the wax enough for the wrap to be malleable around whatever you are covering,' says Sherrie.

The advantages of the wraps are more than avoiding plastic. 'Beeswax has antibacterial and antifungal properties,' explains Sherrie. 'It has been used dating back to ancient times and we think of it as a food preserver – customers say that their food lasts 3–5 times longer.' Sherrie tells the story of recently finding shallots in the back of her fridge. 'They'd been there for about five weeks and

when I unwrapped them, they were not only still looking fresh but they were sprouting!'

Each wrap lasts around 12 months, longer with careful use. At the end, you can add them to your compost, fitting with the business's aim to be waste-free. The only waste created in the manufacture of the wraps are fabric offcuts, which are crafted into quilts and auctioned for charity by Bangalow Quilters and the Mullumbimby Hospital Auxilliary – so as well as your food, you can wrap yourself in a Honeybee wrap!

Australian cheese producer Bega Cheese, founded in 1899, this week bought Vegemite, along with other brands such a Bonox, from US-based international Mondelez.

Vegemite was invented in Melbourne in the 1920s when the Fred Walker Company hired a chemist to develop a spread from one of the richest natural sources of vitamin B – brewer's yeast.

However, when the paste emerged from the laboratory, sales of Vegemite

were lacklustre, with Marmite continuing to dominate the Australian market, and the name was changed to Parwill, which was also unsuccessful.

However, changing back to the name Vegemite, the owners persevered with limerick competitions, giveaways of Pontiac cars and other other marketing strategies. An official product endorsement from the *British Medical Journal*, and perceived scarcity after it was

issued in bulk to troops during the 1940s as a source of vitamin B, meant that it became something of an Australian icon, and 20 years after it first went on the market it became a staple in Austrlian homes.

The Happy Little Vegemites song, first broadcast on radio in 1954 and later on television, is known to many Australians however the brand hasn't been owned by an Australian company since the 1930s.

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

Even though we are sometimes faced with challenges, we should never lose sight of the bigger picture and certainly never give up on our dreams, whatever they might be.


What attracted you to telling this particular story?

'Emerald Productions are these three incredibly smart women who have made lots of short films that have won awards. All three met at film school after different careers. Authorities are concerned that the shark netting of some north coast beaches has created a bigger environmental threat than they initially expected.

With the netting of sharks, the area has experienced huge numbers of tourists. Some are even saying that this could be the beginning of a boom that could make the area unliveable for years to come.

'They're in plague proportions this year,' said one longtime Byron resident, who even reported some had been washed up against his screen door. 'If we hadn't installed the Crim

sure. They kept insisting they'd rented our place on Airbnb.' Byron Shire mayor Simon Richardson was against shark netting, because of what he describes as 'disruption to the natural balance'.

'Sharks are the natural predator of the tourist. There's nothing like an attack to keep their numbers down. If you take the sharks out of the equation, there's going to be an upsurge. Tourists are like cane toads they breed like wildfire and they seem to be coming down from Oueensland?

Mr Richardson said he did not want to go back to the old days

of 'tourist culling'

'We have to remember that tourists are people too. And even though they degrade our local environment by taking over our housing, parking in all our spots, surfing all our good waves and are the cause of major traffic hazards owing to their characteristically slow and clumping style of "impulsive" road crossing, they need to be coached into other areas where they are thought to be almost endangered. Like Grafton for example."

Mr Richardson thought that perhaps some sort of lure could be created in the form of cafes staffed by rude and surly Melbourne baristas. 'It's certainly worked here,' he said. In the absence of tourist predators such as sharks,

local councils are currently investigating methods that will keep the numbers down.

'You can't live in fear of tourists,' Mr Richardson said. 'You have to accept that the Byron Shire is a natural habitat for them and as a resident when you go out you really need to make sure vou take calculated risks. For instance, don't head into town on a market day. Don't go to the beach between 9am and 4pm. And avoid high-risk areas like Woolies. Basically don't live here.'

So what are some of the strategies being investigated? 'We have tried using spotters,' said Mr Richardson. 'But the problem is, we're just counting them, not controlling them.' In other shires drum lines have been cited as a more humane

Your all time blues hero is... Why?

FREESURFER 31-YEAR-OLD LAUREN LINDSEY HILL PREMIERES HER NEW FILM *PEAR SHAPED* AT THE BYRON BAY SURF FESTIVAL.

Currently sponsored by Billabong, Sanuk Footwear and Bing Surfboards, this self-confessed eco-feminist, environmental scientist, and one-time winner of the US Women's Longboard Championships has got behind the camera to shoot a comedic short about the over-sexualisation of women in surfing.

How did you start out surfing? How did you come to realise the dream of being a pro surfer?

I grew up on a little barrier island off the coast of Florida. My single mum was usually working two or three jobs at a time. I was home alone a lot and there wasn't really much to do, but there was water all around us, so surfing became my babysitter from a pretty early age.

I guess I was just lucky that I felt really strongly about surfing, so I put in hours and hours and hours in the water as a grom. And, because at that time there weren't so many women or girls surfing, and because I was a little surfer girl clone with blond hair and blue eyes, sponsorship came relatively easily and so I had the validation to keep dedicating my time and energy into this thing that my parents basically considered 'superfluous'.



Do you think women in surfing have a different ride, so to speak, from the guys?

There's still a lot of hesitancy to admit that women and men are different. As long as we're comparing, we're blocked from just celebrating difference. Can women mimic men's surfing? Definitely. But I think that, generally speaking, women surf differently, and sometimes with different motivations from what men have. Surf culture is still pretty much a sword fight, so most everything we 'understand' about surfing as a culture has been written, photographed or judged from and for a masculine perspective. I think we're in the process of fleshing it out, finally.

What are the challenges that you have faced, or experiences or attitudes that have shaped your view?


Being sexualised before I was even sexual, having to wrestle with low expectations about my ability in the water because I have a vagina, the condescension, not seeing things that I'm interested in or care about represented in surf media. Mostly the lived experience of surfing is all rainbows and dolphins, especially here in Byron, but there are these lingering sexist/ racist/ageist attitudes in our global culture whose times have come.

How are women in surf over-sexualised? How do you think this hurts the sport... and women wanting to engage?

There's this kind of double shift in professional women's surfing – you need to have the surfing ability, but then you're also expected to walk onto the beach and look like (and be) a model. It's similar for men, but the body type for a male athlete and a male model are more congruous than for women. There's this conundrum that some of the women grapple with: do you build up your leg muscles to get strong and be a powerful surfer, or do you want to have a thigh gap for 'lifestyle' shoots? You can't really have both to the fullest expression at the same time. Either your surfing career or your modelling career will suffer. The financial and social rewards favour the latter, exponentially.

It's not rocket science. When we show girls that the most important thing about being a girl is how you look, when we repeatedly show female athletes posing on beaches instead of surfing, we're regurgitating the idea of a passive, static womanhood (that often comes with a side of fuck-me eyes). I find it exceptionally boring.

I'd like to see more women included in the shaping of mainstream media – more female writers, photographers and decision makers. Equal pay for equal work would be nice, too.

Why did you decide to make Pear Shaped?

Surfing tends to take itself pretty seriously – and women's surfing has the added layer of sexiness to uphold. I wanted to counter the picture of female surfers as tanned, hairless and perfect, and acknowledge how wholly humbling surfing can be, especially if you're trying to do it in a triangle bikini top.

There is a great memorial – Strawberry Fields – in Central Park and Yoko Ono still living in New York and how they feel about her in New York City, his presence is still very strong... probably even more so in New York than in Liverpool.

Disney Studios may well be the butt of bearded hipsters' snide jokes, but if you are not afraid of being uncool you could do worse than check this out. The animation, it goes without saying, is superb - a joy to the eye - and the story is smart, contemporary and, with any luck, influential (there are lessons in it for kids and adults alike).

Set in Polynesia in the unwritten past and loosely based (I am assuming) on one of the Pacific's creation myths, it concerns Moana (voiced by Auli'i Cravhalo), a cute and feisty chieftain's daughter. To save her island from an ancient curse, she takes it upon herself to hunt down the demi-god Maui, who is responsible for her people's plight, and set things right. Maui is a tattooed boofhead with a penchant for a smart-arse one-liner, so who better to





speak the part than everybody's favourite tattooed boofhead, Dwayne 'The Rock' Johnson? I am a huge fan (I know, it's a terrible indictment of This Paper), but what I was previously unaware of is that Johnson has Samoan lineage, which makes his casting even more appropriate.

When Moana discovers that Maui is not as bad as his reputation, and that there are further challenges to overcome, they set off on her catamaran, with a chook (it got the most laughs from the kids in the audience) to vanguish demons together. The squabbling/cooperating routine between the pair is sit-com classic, but it is Moana who is boss - girl power has made huge strides in children's animation and if this latest example of it is not quite up there with the marvellous Brave (2012), it falls pretty close.

What doesn't work is the cheesy injection of Broadway songs into the action. They are out of sync with the gusto of what is happening on screen and compare pitiably with the pulsating rhythms and vocal harmonies of the islander numbers used. Otherwise, this is another example of a cartoon exhibiting a great deal more intelligence than many of the multiplex's movies for grown-ups.

How has stepping into the music of John Lennon on such a regular basis affected you?

It's a pleasure as a singer and musician to perform his songs because they are the sort of songs you don't normally do in a set. They're kind of specific John Lennon songs and I have got the legitimacy to do them... it's an absolute honour to do this and that's how I feel about it more than anything else. pid

What if John Lennon hadn't been shot – would he be such

At last, a movie that actually lives up to its PR hype... In our digitally connected world, it is almost impossible for us to imagine how it would feel to be lost, cut off absolutely from home and loved ones.

Five-year-old Saroo (Sunny Parwar) is left to sleep at an Indian railway station one night while his brother goes to work. He wakes up on an empty moving bogey and is unable to get off until it arrives at Kolkata. Surviving the perils of that city's teeming streets, Saroo gets lucky and is taken into an orphanage from where he is adopted by a childless couple from Hobart (Nicole Kidman and David Wenham). Twenty years later, as a young man (Dev Patel) studying in Melbourne, he is increasingly affected by his past, by the need to go back and find his real family - to rediscover the identity that he has never fully left behind. But there are no records of where he came from, no paper trail for him to follow - there is only the recollection of the water tower at the station where he last saw his brother.

Based on Saroo Brierley's book, the story is barely credible, but it is true, and director Garth Davis's telling of it pulls hard on the heart-strings without abandoning a close observation of his other characters' relationship with Saroo, though the love interest provided by Rooney Mara never really takes flame.

Shot locally and in Kolkata, the Indian scenes are by far the most vibrant - the opening sequence of Saroo and his brother pinching coal from a freight train is thrillingly executed, while the images of children swimming with buffalos and pilgrims at prayer by the Howrah Bridge are unforgettable - whereas those in Australia focus more on Saroo's brooding and ultimately urgent desire to find his way home. Patel is wonderful in the part - his Australian accent is perfect and maintained throughout - but as good as he and the support cast are, the movie belongs to Sunny. It is an extraordinary performance.

an enigma do you think? Does their need to be tragedy of sorts for us to truly appreciate genius?

No, I think the world of music and political discussion would be a much better place if Lennon survived. It's a shame he missed out on the internet because being such a great blogger and with Twitter he would not have let Donald Trump go up in arms, I'm sure of that.

In a few words, what is the essence of the show you and **Stewart D'Arietta present?**

I think of it as a trip inside Lennon's head at the moment of his assassination in the sense of his life swimming before his eyes, and that's the reason for its being a collage rather than a strict chronology of he did this and he did that.
