Railway Park set to become first masterplan project

Plans for an 'informal amphitheatre' in Railway Park in Byron's CBD, along with other improvements, will be tabled at this Thursday's Council meeting.

Along with additional seating, parking would be reduced in front of the railway station, while the children's park would be removed and the existing toilets relocated to the north western entrance area.

Paved areas would also be created that 'promotes gathering while maintaining tree health.'

No consultation

Yet the notice of motion (NoM) to endorse the 'Railway Square Landscape Concept Plan' by Greens mayor Simon Richardson has been overshadowed again with claims of improper process and lack of consultation.

Managers of the Byron Environment Centre (BEC) rotunda in the park are angry that the mayor's NoM claims BEC consultation 'has also been undertaken.'

And within the maps provided by the mayor in the agenda, it states that 'consultation is required for the possible relocation [of the BEC rotunda] within the park'.

BEC members Nino MacDonald and John Lazarus told *The Echo* they 'met in good faith with Council last Thursday but were not responded to with good faith in turn.'

'Before meeting with BEC, Council had already printed up Thursday's Council agenda. It included a report on development in Railway Park and stated that consultation **continued on page 3** ►

Saddle Road residential rezone proposed

Senior Council staff have defended the removal of a report from the upcoming Thursday agenda on a planning proposal for Saddle Road, located on the ridgeline between Brunswick Heads and Mullumbimby.

The applicants are the Dalys (Bruns Eco Village), the Borrodales, the Hayters, the Hamblys and the Bashforths. According to BEV's Kelvin Daly, the proposed area to rezone residential is 112 ha 'gross' and 52 ha 'net' that would facilitate 475 homes. The landowners have also proposed that 20 per cent of the total area (not including BEV) would be retained by Council for affordable housing.

Director sustainable environment and economy Shannon Burt told *The Echo* she 'formed the view that it would be appropriate to allow a further period of consultation between planning staff and the proponents and the objectors before the report was put before Council and it was therefore withdrawn from the agenda for the December 14 meeting.'

The staff report and planning proposal was provided to *The Echo* by Matthew O'Reilly, president of the Saddle Ridge Local Area Management Planning Association Incorporated (SRLAMPA), and was obtained via a freedom of information request.

He says while 21 neighbours are not opposed to the development, they believe it should be assessed through a residential strategy and other assessments. A signed petition also claims they were were not offered procedual fairness that would allow them to assess the planning proposal before Council considered it.

NORTEC evicts small businesses from incubators

More than a dozen local businesses have been left reeling after NORTEC abruptly terminated the leases of all the small businesses in the three small business incubator sites located in Byron Bay, Mullumbimby and Goonellabah with only six weeks to move over Christmas.

NORTEC has stated that 'The Byron Bay and Goonellabah sites will be sold.' The Mullumbimby site is not owned by NORTEC.

'I've just finished setting up a couple of weeks ago,' said Jake May of his graphic design business at the Byron incubator site.

'I feel absolutely robbed,' he told *The Echo*. 'They promised me I could have it (the space) for three years and there was no indication that it wouldn't be available for three years.'

The process to rent the incubator site involved interviews with NORTEC and 'they expected me to be committed to the business and the incubator,' explained Jake.

Bangalow pay parking needs parking study 'per the RMS requirements'

Local NSW Greens MP Tamara Smith has questioned Greens mayor Simon Richardson and his supportive councillors' decision for pay parking in Bangalow.

At a rally held Saturday morning, the Chamber of Commerce said ignored studies and flawed surveys led to councillors' decision to roll out pay parking.

Ms Smith told the rally via a letter, 'I am sorry that you have had to take to the streets in order to have your voice heard... Well done for coming out to have your say and I am sorry that I can't be there with you.

'I am urging Byron Shire Council to do a parking study for Bangalow, per the RMS requirements, which have nothing to do with revenue raising. In fact, revenue raising is not recognised by the NSW government as a valid reason for introducing pay parking.

'There are too many unknowns at this stage, the true impact of introducing pay parking in Bangalow is not clear, and the case to introduce it in the terms set down by RMS has not been made.

'The precautionary principle seems very appropriate at this time – if we are not sure of the impact, then let's not impact.'

Exertion of will

Meanwhile, the town's chamber president Jo Millar told the gathering, 'This whole process is a classic example of the exertion of political will over the proper processes that we have a right to expect from our Council staff and our elected representatives.

In reply, Infrastructure Services director Phil Holloway told *The Echo*, 'Council's rationale for pay parking has always been, first and foremost, that it serves to improve parking turnover and access to local businesses.' 'Pay Parking schemes are a combination of time limits and the application of a charge to park and are aimed at improving access to available parking.

'Pay parking is a means of imposing a level of self-enforcement by changing driver behaviour to increase the availability of spaces to meet parking demands in the area.'

Police numbers disputed

A reduction of 33 police officers in the Tweed-Byron Local Area Command has promoted Labor to ask Tweed MP Geoff Provest (Nationals) to explain why his government had overseen the reduction.

Labor say that NSW Police data indicate that since February 2012, the Tweed-Byron Local Area Command has suffered a reduction in police numbers by 33 police officers.

NSW Labor leader Luke Foley joined federal MP for Richmond Justine Elliot and shadow minister for the north coast Walt Secord to send a joint press release on Monday claiming that in 2012, Tweed-Byron LAC police numbers were 198, but under the Berejiklian government, those number have dropped to 165.

New station

They say the drop in police numbers has occurred despite the official opening of the new Tweed Police Station and promises by Nationals Tweed MP Geoff Provest to increase police numbers.

Mrs Elliot called on Nationals Mr Provest to 'stand up to his Sydney-centric Liberal-National government, which is spending \$2.5 billion on Sydney stadiums instead of police officers in the Tweed.

Nationals reply

Nationals Tweed MP Geoff Provest is chair of the committee on law and safety.

He told *The Echo* that Labor were quoting old figures.

'We announced Friday that Tweed will get five new probationary officers and that 400 new police are expected to join the force soon. I'm hopeful that some of those will be stationed in Tweed.'

Additionally Mr Provest says four new water police will soon be stationed in Tweed Shire, and they will command a 52-foot boat capable of a 100km range.

When asked about the lack of police stationed in Mullumbimby, Mr Provest said he wasn't aware of that, but would take it up with the local area commander. 'Policing has changed over the years,' he said. 'There is more mobile policing with highway patrols for example. Also, the crime rate is at an all-time low, and there is also an 87 per cent conviction rate, which indicates the police are doing their briefs well.'

Ready to roll on solar this Sat

The much-anticipated Byron Bay solar train will be officially launched this Saturday, December 16.

Everyone is welcome to the grand opening, commencing at 11am at The Sun Bistro on Bayshore Drive. Public train rides from the North Beach platform on Bayshore Drive will run from 12.30 till 5pm, with live music and celebrations throughout the afternoon at The Sun Bistro.

The train service will travel between the North Beach precinct, which includes the Byron Arts Estate and Sunrise Beach community, to the newly constructed station behind Simmo's garage.

Byron Bay Railroad Company Development director Jeremy Holmes said, 'We searched the country and found a dilapidated vintage train, restored it, and are now powering it with a 4.6-billion-year-old power source.'

'We partnered with the incredible Tim Elderton from

Lithgow Railway Workshop to restore the train and to oversee the solar conversion along with our other partners Nickel Energy and Elmofo. Local rail industry expert Geoff Clark has been guiding the project and helping to navigate the complex regula-

tions and safety requirements. The project has been achieved with no funding or financial support from government at any level, say or-

ganisers. The train seats 100 passengers and has room for luggage, bikes and surfboards.

The 3km journey will cost \$3 for adults with concessions for children.

► continued from page 1 with BEC had informed the report. Nothing could be further from the truth. The BEC has not been consulted with on the Railway Park development proposal, which will come before Council on Thursday.

'BEC considers, and has advised Council in the past, that any development of Railway Park should go through a plan-of-management process to facilitate broad community input. It is unfortunate that [as] the first step to re-

solve issues between BEC and Council, that BEC has had to lodge a complaint to force the removal of a reference to the BEC from next Thursday's Ordinary Meeting's Motion concerning the development of Railway Park.

Not discussed

And while the mayor claims in his NoM that 'The design has been discussed and is supported by the Byron Bay Town Centre Master Plan Leadership Team,' leadership team member Dr

NVITAT

Mary Gardner told The Echo that they did not discuss the future of the rotunda at last week's meeting.

In reply, Cr Richardson said the rotunda, 'will not move if the BEC wish for it to remain where it is?

But that assurance have not been accepted by Mr Lazarus.

He said, 'The BEC has not been consulted on this park plan, and does not endorse this plan, and considers the masterplan process as a developer's Trojan Horse that has blindsided the community and the good community members of the masterplan committee.'

Mr Lazarus ends with, 'Rescind the adoption of the masterplan and bring back democracy to Byron Shire Council.

The rush to get started on the project could be owing to 'the requirement of the NSW Government Tourism Demand Driver Infrastructure program, where 'moneys for the first stage of the works [must] be expended by April 20, 2018.

Acting NSW auditor-general Ian Goodwin says, 'It is pleasing to report that all cluster enti-

ties' financial statements received unqualified audit opinions for their June 30, 2017 financial statements?

'They suggested that I talk to my boss to leave my job and have a full-time commitment to this business - so that's what I did.'

Another small business that had taken the chance to get started at the Byron incubator site is Jarrah Hustler's hair salon business, set up a year ago.

'I'm screwed,' she said. 'I can't get a new space arranged, a DA approved and fitted in six weeks. I said to them I have \$20,000 to put into this business - am I guaranteed it for three years? They said, "Yes you can have it for three years unless you break your lease". I thought as it is a government-funded business that it wasn't going to screw me over. I would have been better off not going through the NEIS scheme?

Similarly, Goonellabah business owner Mary-Anne Meginess told The Echo, 'They handed me the eviction notice in a folder that had "creating opportunities and inspiring futures" on the front. I don't feel supported or inspired. This is not nurturing - it's disgusting.'

It is not only the small

businesses who are angry at the decision to sell the Byron and Goonellabah sites.

Outraged

Business Incubator & Innovation Australia board members, Amanda Kenyon and Garry Bargh, who originally helped develop the small business incubator sites are outraged that NORTEC are selling the community assets.

'An awful lot of hard work from the community went into building these,' said Ms Kenyon.

'They represent 20 years of hard community work and millions of dollars?

The Ballina site, that NORTEC sold last year, and the Byron Bay site were handed to NORTEC when they merged BETC (Ballina skills and development centre) and Tweed-based TTEC in 2007.

'All these incubators were funded by a combination of community assets and cash from the sate and federal governments,' said Mr Bargh, who was the BTEC manager at the time the sites were being being developed.

'When the merger took place in 2007 the understanding was that these commu-

nity assets would remain in the community in trust and managed by NORTEC.'

Legally, NORTEC are within their rights to give only one week's notice to the businesses at the sites and business operators were only ever given verbal confirmation of longer tenure.

Both Kenyon and Bargh believe that the sites should be handed on to an organisation that has the expertise to continue to provide business incubation support and development in the same way it was previously given to NORTEC.

No expertise

'They admitted that they don't have the expertise to provide the support and the last couple of years they have done nothing,' said Kenyon.

'I've offered both the current and previous co-ordinators help to run these places properly - free - and they refused. Now we find they are flogging them off. It's robbery of the community.



Spike in unvaccinated pre-enrolments requests

Local preschools have been inundated with calls from the parents of unvaccinated children trying to enrol their kids in care before tough new vaccination rules come into effect on December 31.

Staff at a number of preschools say dozens of parents have been attempting to pre-enrol their children for 2019 and beyond, in a bid to avoid the new rules, which will mean they can no longer register as 'conscientious objectors' to vaccination.

But the preschools have had to turn away almost all of these parents because of their enrolment policies or long waiting lists, leading, in some cases, to angry, emotional interactions with staff.

'We have been inundated since the government made its announcement about the new policy,' said one local preschool educator, who asked not to be named.

'They're upset, angry, and desperately trying to get their children in.

'We've even had pregnant mums ringing up trying to get their unborn children in.

'We have to say "no" because we can't do that. It's been very emotional.'

Since January 2014, childcare centres have been prevented from enrolling children who are considered unvaccinated by the NSW government unless their parents have registered as conscientious objectors, or the child has been granted a medical exemption.

However in September this year, the government amended the *Public Health Act 2010*, putting an end to conscientious objection for new enrolments. It effectively

stops children from entering the preschool system if they have not been conventionally vaccinated.

The conscientious objection option remains open until December 31, allowing unvaccinated children who will reach preschool age next year to enrol if they can get a GP to complete the form.

However, some parents of younger children have been attempting to enrol their children in 2019, 2020 and beyond under this option.

While a handful of parents appear to have been successful in this, most have not, either because preschools are prevented by their enrolment policies or they are already full.

Local mum Ziv Asher tried to enrol her two-year-old at Mullumbimby's Shearwater preschool before the cut-off date but was unsuccessful.

'It basically means that he can't be enrolled in preschool,' Ms Asher said.

'It's very disappointing, because I think preschool is important – it's where kids start to learn some important values like sharing, and where they get to interact with other kids.

'I think it's a bit sick to discriminate against little

you can send an e-card – bearing a remarkable photo by local photographers – to a loved one via their email inbox. children and to discriminate against parents on the basis of their health choices.²

Ms Asher acknowledged that there were many parents in a more difficult position than she because they could not afford to quit their jobs to care for their kids full time.

Parents whose children have not been conventionally vaccinated have already been ruled ineligible for Family Tax Benefit A and the Child Care Rebate by the federal government.

'I'm hoping that we can get together to support each other as a community by creating our own little programs for our children,' Ms Asher said.

'This is a call for the community to get together and take on the role of looking after each other's kids.'

Periwinkle

Meanwhile the retiring head of the Periwinkle preschool in Byron Bay, Ellon Gold, said it was a serious concern that the school could 'no longer be open to all children'

'The importance of early childhood education is thoroughly researched and welldocumented.'

'Early childhood education is about walking with parents through those important early years, but some of those parents will no longer have access to us,' Ms Gold said.

'We've walked for many years with parents who have made all choices [about vaccination] and we've had a very successful community.

'I think it opens up the question of how undervalued parenting and a parent's own intuition about their child's well being is.'

Ms Gold said there appeared some confusion among some parents about the enrolment laws.

'We always enrol children for 2018 in 2017 – that's our normal practice,' she said.

'We can't enrol children to come to pre-school after 2018.

'As I understand the law we cannot enrol unvaccinated children to come to pre-school after January 1, 2018.'

NSW Health

The director of Communicable Diseases at NSW Health, Dr Vicky Sheppeard, said that technically, a NSW preschool could enrol an unvaccinated child under the conscientious objection option for 2019 or 2020 if the enrolment was completed before December 31 this year.

However, she said this was entirely dependent on the individual preschool's policies and practices.

'A preschool could allow an enrolment in those circumstances but only if it was consistent with the preschool's own practices,' Dr Sheppeard said.

The stories of the stolen generation that young performers Hunter Mains and Kiahn Ladkin heard from their elders have inspired their own dance, 'Spirit Sister,' in honour of the stolen generation.

'The girls have been dancing together for many years,' said Kiahn's mother Melissa Ladkin.

'They have been working with [Indigeneous dance group] Rekindling this year on Bundjalung country, which is the youth program from Bangarra dance company. Kiahn has also worked with Rekindling in Sydney for four weeks performing at State Dance Festival and the NSW Arts School Spectacular.

Hunter is Wiradjuri, and artistic director Kate Histon of their dance school, Byron Dance Dynamics, asked the girls to open their shows for them.

The girls then asked Delta Kay, from the Arakwal people, for permission and guidance to choreograph their own piece dancing on Arakwal land.

'They have always done Welcome to Country since they were at school,' said Melissa.

'Delta gifted them some ochre and painted them up before their shows.

'Delta was our special person of honour on the night and Delta was very moved by their dance and proud of their beautiful opening with acknowledgement to country.

Local MP arrested at QLD Adani mine site

North coast Greens MLC Dawn Walker and NSW Greens mining spokesperson Jeremy Buckingham were arrested on December 6 by QLD police after taking part in a blockade of the Adani Carmichael coal mine rail construction site at Belyando, 270km west of Bowen.

The MPs were arrested at 6.35am, along with a dozen other climate activists, and charged with trespassing unlawfully on a place of business. Ms Walker said, 'It was a

very important day for me, stopping work on the Adani mine and being arrested with climate activists who understand the importance of preventing this destructive project from going ahead.

'I was proud to stand with traditional owners who have said "no means no" to Adani, and made it clear they will not be surrendering their

land and water to this coal corporation.

'Although this mine is miles from anywhere, the eyes of all Australia are on it. We have travelled days to get here but believe many more will follow.

'I'm appalled by the way this project is tearing Indigenous communities apart and offering a sub-standard agreement to traditional owners for their land, with little economic opportunity.

'On every level Adani's controversial mine does not stack up,' she said.

Non-violent direct action

Greens MP Jeremy Buckingham added, 'Greens MPs have a proud tradition of participating in peaceful, nonviolent direct action and we stand with all those opposed to this crazy coal mine?

Significant Council projects delivered: GM

Road reconstruction, recycling, flood recovery and roundabouts were significant projects delivered in the last financial year, says Byron Shire Council's outgoing general manager Ken Gainger.

Mr Gainger, who recently announced his resignation owing to health reasons, said the operations of Council 'go well beyond the traditional areas of rates, roads and rubbish?

'In 2016/17 we completed ten major road reconstruction projects and resealed a total of 13.5km of road but we also made significant im-

- Council lobbied hard for government support and was successful in its applications for natural disaster funding for the repair of Council infrastructure and Disaster Recovery funding for affected residents and businesses.

'We also developed the Rural Land Use Strategy, which has since been adopted by Council.

'This is an important document that tries to find the balance between development and preserving our villages and districts and our rich and beautiful farmland?

around two million tourists, Mr Gainger said.

'Pay parking is going some way to providing some revenue from tourists, but Council continues to lobby the NSW government for answers to this problem, which is not going away.

'Council was awarded a special rate variation (SRV) which allows us to invest specifically in infrastructure such as roads and bridges, areas that historically have been chronically underfunded.

Lennox Head Moreton Bay Fig tree removal sparks protest

A large and well established Moreton Bay fig tree on Castle Drive, Lennox Head, has been saved – so far – from being cut down by Ballina Shire Council.

Resident Jenny Grinlington told *The Echo* that Ballina Council approved the removal without any community consultation and only advised neighbours to be 'patient' while works were happening on Monday December 11.

Independent Ballina councillor Jeff Johnson told *The Echo* that it could be up to 200 years old and he was shocked to learn that fellow councillors had voted for its removal.

Cr Johnson says he was unwell and could not vote at the last meeting when it was before Council.

'This issue has been before

Council around four times and was often discussed in a confidential session. I have always voted against its removal.

Cr Johnson says Ballina Shire Council's general manager has told him the tree will now not be removed this week, and the matter will be discussed at Thursday's Council meeting. An urgent rescission motion will be lodged by Cr Johnson to try to save the tree. He said, 'The property owner is somewhat responsible for this... there is a building under the canopy of the tree. I think this decision was driven by Council's insurers, who may have said to councillors: "We are not going to cover Council". It probably spooked councillors.

Neighbour Jenny Grinlington said, 'How long will it be before every shred of our local Big Scrub heritage has been eliminated? This is a sorry Christmas gift for our community.' Ms Grinlington believes a neighbouring property owner – not affected by the tree – threatened Council with legal action unless it was removed.

Animal cruelty charges dropped

Animal cruelty charges against two men accused of killing ten chickens and torturing a pig at Nimbin's Djanbung Gardens last December have been dropped.

Reece Parke and Bradley Presbury appeared in Lismore Local Court last week after magistrate Annette Sinclair adjourned their hearing part-heard on August 30.

It was alleged the men killed ten heritage chickens and tortured 'Polly' the pig at the permaculture gardens on December 13, 2016.

Mr Presbury's solicitor Tracey Randall told the court the prosecution had failed to provide her with some evidence in the case and a recording of a key witness was not disclosed to the defence.

Frustration

During the hearing, Magistrate Sinclair expressed her frustration at the progress of the matters, which she thought would be ready to progress after a four-month adjournment.

After multiple issues with the admissibility of evidence during the hearing, the prosecution formally withdrew their case owing to insufficient evidence. Relieved supporters at the court said both men's families had been abused for 12 months since the allegations were published in the media.

Police are no closer to finding out who slashed Polly's snout and injured her internally, or who decapitated the heritage chickens with a stolen sickle.

Bring a cushion and popcorn

At just 690 pages, councillors may well be breathing a little easier grappling with this Thursday's agenda, which will be discussed and voted upon at the Mullumbimby Chambers from 9am.

So what, in part, can the intelligent and discerning public expect? Presumably the councillor majority will ignore, oops, sorry 'note,' 2,055 signatures calling for them to 'Rescind the motion to implement paid parking in Bangalow.' And similarly, councillors will likely 'note' 1,828 signatures which ask to defer any consideration of Brunswick Heads paid parking until the TPS Parking Management Strategy is implemented. While these matters have been dealt with already, that's a lot of ignored voices. Bangalow residents even took to the streets on Tuesday, occupying the spots of the proposed meters to disrupt the commencement of work.

Moving on, one of the more contentious issues facing Council is how to deal with a handful of residents in Broken Head's Seven Mile Beach Road who seem to want a public road for their own use. There's a whacky suggestion in the report (not by staff) that a gate be erected.

Rocks now prevent parking along the narrow dirt road, and while the intention is to allow emergency vehicle access and prevent the everincreasing illegal camping, the present situation is clearly inequitable.

So staff have suggested an 'action plan for wider community consultation' with a \$20,000 budget for 'concept infrastructure planning investigations and surveys for road upgrades and investigation of traffic calming options.'

Staff say in the report, 'Seven Mile Beach Road is approximately 5.22km long and is unsealed for 4.8km... a very approximate cost to upgrade the unsealed 4.8km section would range from \$2.4m to \$3.1m.'

Should this be extended to become a Broken Head bypass? What would the neighbours think...

Moving on – a zero-emissions aspirations for Council operations was adopted in March 2017. So how are they placed currently?

Total emissions by sector are made up by landfill (41 per cent), sewage treatment plants (34 per cent) and general electricity (19 per cent). There is also fleet (4 per cent), street light electricity (2 per cent) and bottled gas (0.1 per cent).

Hilariously, emissions have actually gone up in the last year since the new left-leaning councillors were elected. It's only a slight increase; however, moving from '25,500 tonnes to 26,300 tonnes of equivalent carbon dioxide (t CO2e).'

Staff say in the report, 'At this stage it is impossible to accurately project the reduction path without the Emissions Reduction Strategy being written and key major projects defined and timelined.'

Thankfully there is one in the wings.

There is also a breakdown of \$76,982,457.27 worth of cash that Council has invested in credit unions and banks, 56 per cent of which is not invested in fossil fuels. According to staff, 32 per cent is invested in fossil fuels, while 12 per cent has an unknown status.

Heard of a Byron Energy Action Tank? It may be a while off, but staff have diligently prepared a report scoping how Council could create innovative projects that promote renewable energy.

For example, there is the proposed Brunswick Valley – Sustainability Centre (Valances Road), where 'A comprehensive management plan has been prepared for the entire Councilowned land parcel, including ground-mounted solar and [the] potential for a bio-energy facility.'

No love from PM after marriage victory

M alcolm Turnbull may not have wished to appear churlish last Thursday after the final vote on the same-sex marriage bill, but he had no choice: that was his job.

So rather than following the parliament to embrace bipartisanship after the long and tortuous procedure, he had the obligatory swipe at Bill Shorten.

Shorten, he declared, had just played politics – the previous government had done nothing, then the opposition leader had opposed the original plebiscite and then the voluntary survey, and now wanted to claim a share of the credit. Which was, of course, entirely Turnbull's own.

Well, actually the Howard government of which Turnbull was a member had legislated to destroy even the possibility of gay and lesbian marriage, and had dismissed Tony Abbott's idea of the plebiscite as an absurd cop-out, and had then been dragged kicking and screaming to it by the Nationals and his own right wing determined to scuttle the idea.

He then ran with one of the nay-sayers, Peter Dutton, to propose the voluntary survey as a device to buy time, in the hope that the issue could be quietly put to bed either through a win by the mythical silent majority the religious right assured him were waiting to clobber the concept through a campaign of lies and confusion, or, if a Yes majority eventuated, it could be discredited through a small turnout and a discredited process.

Thus while Shorten and his allies were out on the hustings, our prime minister effectively ran dead: he said he and his wife would of course vote Yes, but it was a decision for the people, not the politicians. And when he had no choice but to allow Dean Smith's bill into the parliament, he embraced a few

discriminatory amendments and abstained from rejecting others – anything not to offend the conservative rump, now revealed to be a very substantial minority of the electorate.

Not much to boast about, and still less to accuse Shorten of being devious over the whole business.

But if Turnbull was determined to drizzle on the rainbow parade, it was the College of Cardinals in *The Australian* who really ramped up the thunderstorm. Page after page

was devoted to whingeing about insufficient privilege for those who profess to be religious in order to safeguard civilisation as we know it.

Pope Paul the Kelly, in imminent danger of disappearing up his own fundamentalism, preached the infallible truth that after all, same-sex marriage was really a side issue, almost a distraction. What mattered was that the faithful – well, the Christians, actually, and of course primarily his fellow Roman Catholics – must be protected from the tiresome necessity of having to obey laws they didn't like.

The cheering, singing and jubilation that greeted the final vote in parliament was not a unifying moment – it was in fact a sign of the deep divisions within society (or at least the Liberal party room, which he apparently imagines to be the same thing) and if there wasn't division now, he was ready to unveil his sacred chainsaw to make sure it would fester. The totally unnecessary review of religious freedom (as Kelly insists on calling his theocratic model) foisted upon Turnbull by the religious right was now to be the new battleground, and if Phillip Ruddock and his fellow commissioners did not deliver the discrimination and preferential treatment the Catholics wanted, well, the con-

sequences would be profound. Kelly did not actually threaten that they would burn in hell for all eternity, but the implicit warning was clear enough. This

Kelly's fellow religionists were not quite so extreme; Archbishop Dennis Shanahan was at least prepared to admit that politics, and even secularism, has its place, although it had to be subordinated to the demands of the holy mother church. So he will have to rely on Turnbull's oft repeated declaration: 'I just want to reassure Australians that as strongly as I believe in the right of same- sex couples to marry then even more strongly I believe in religious freedom.'

As we have seen over the saga just completed, this is not exactly reassuring for the godbotherers, especially since, as always with Turnbull, there is a loophole: 'Religious freedom is fundamental and it will be protected in any bill that emerges from this parliament." The bill that emerged was the unamended Dean Smith bill, for which Turnbull finally voted. So we must assume that he feels he has fulfilled his obligations.

This, of course, infuriates Kelly, Shanahan and the rest of the Curia who constantly complain about what they call the manifest inadequacy of the current many exemptions that shield believers (both genuine and opportunistic) from the hardy light of legislation that most Australians accept. Shanahan is still fighting, hoping and no doubt praying for Turnbull to return to the fold, although Kelly appears to have all but given up – he is only a step away from pronouncing anathema and excommunicating the prime minister forever.

What they refuse to accept is that Turnbull's beliefs, while possibly sincerely held at the time, are always more than somewhat pragmatic: as he memorably said only a few days ago, 'government policy remains the same until it is changed.'

The hard fact is that Turnbull's beliefs are, as Graham Richardson once remarked rather more directly, whatever it takes: specifically whatever it takes to survive within the party room and, that attained for the moment, to secure political advantage – to attack his opponents, most importantly Bill Shorten.

And now that Shorten has attempted to outflank him again, this time by writing to clerics of various hues to discuss their concerns, Turnbull will have to become even more agile in the noble art of ducking and weaving. But it was, his backers insist, a terrific week for him – the best in ages.

Which does not augur well for the remaining 50 or 60 until the next election.

For most of this year, we struggled with Council to create timely communica-



NORTEC tosses local businesses out of the nest

NORTEC has announced that they are getting out of business incubation and putting their resources into other business development.

The reason they are doing this is they don't have the expertise to run the incubators.

Following the merger of BETC and TTEC in 2007 NORTEC took over the management of the incubators, previously managed successfully by BETC since 1996, with the opening of the first smallbusiness incubator in Ballina.

A network of regional incubators followed with the Byron incubator built in the industrial estate in 1999. The Mullum incubator was established at the site of the Community College and another incubator at Goonellabah.

These incubators were recognised as a unique model of incubation in Australia, the majority of incubators in Australia are in large cities, and the BETC network was recognised with international awards.

Two key components of incubator management are the

provision of business support and advice on a weekly basis and that tenants only occupy the incubator for two to three years, giving new businesses an opportunity to become established. Feedback is that these key components have not been provided.

All these incubators were funded by a combination of community assets and cash from the state and federal governments. The majority of the funding came from the federal government. After completion of a contract period the assets were owned by the community organisation.

When the merger took place in 2007 the understanding was that these community assets would remain in the community in trust and managed by NORTEC.

If the incubators are sold, for millions of dollars, this will not be looked upon favourably by the community or government. It is highly unlikely that the government would give a large amount of money to another organisation if the assets are then sold off.

A solution would be for NORTEC to hand the incubators over to an organisation prepared to take over their management. If this is not done the sale of these valuable assets will be seen as nothing but a cash grab.

Once sold these buildings will no longer be incubators but just another real estate development.

The Ballina incubator was sold by NORTEC in 2016.

a property in an E-zone. In an E2 zone you may not be permitted to build a granny flat (secondary dwelling.)

Others who, instead of regenerating their land have kept it cleared and been zoned as 'rural', have no restrictions placed upon them.

In one case a local was shocked to discover that an E2 zone is proposed for his entire five-acre block. The building of any new dwelling (either primary or secondary) is prohibited on land zoned E2, leaving him with nothing but a rates bill, and a block of unusable, unsaleable land.

The other bone of contention is that of 'existing use.' Landowners will only be permitted to continue the activities that have been taking place over the past two years. If you had been considering a change of use from, say, cattle grazing to growing bananas, this is not permitted. Implications for landowners are: (1) this limits opportunities for diversification, and a more stable income, (2) land left fallow for more than two years can no longer be farmed at all, and (3) resale value of the land is greatly diminished owing to the restrictions. Now, before people start tub-thumping about how farming shouldn't be allowed in the region at all, the fact remains that you can't inhibit continued on page 16 ►

E-zones fail in this regard as there is no plan with regards to actively expanding and protecting biodiversity on private land: there's no planting program, funding for revegetation. 'Biodiversity protection' is meaningless when not backed up with resources.

I wish to correct information contained in the *Northern Star* article on the shark net protest.

They stated that the 'meshing program saw 36 target sharks trapped in the nets in the 2016/17 financial year...'

This is incorrect, according to the data summary of the first trial's results on the official DPI website. The official statistics on the DPI Summary advise: Nets: Total species caught: 275; Target shark species caught: nine; Total non-target animals: 266.

Data for significant examples of 'non' target species caught: Four dolphins; one grey nurse; eight loggerhead turtles, three green turtles. Target species represented three per cent of total animals caught. Percentage of animals released alive: 47 per cent.

Smart Drumlines: Total species caught: 39; Target shark species caught: 36; Total non-target animals: three:

Data for significant examples of target species represented 92 per cent of total animals caught. Percentage of animals released alive: 97 per cent.

Wildspace – Co-creating a new Learning Community is the prize

Mandy Nolan

Educator and learning activist Juli Gassner says our modes of teaching are outdated and set children up to consume and compete, rather than to engage and cooperate.

'If we as parents and teachers understood the damage we can do to our children's precious lifelong relationship to their learning journey by starting on the reward/punishment cycle, none of us would give another sticker, certificate or prize. Not for reading, gardening or sitting just right.'

Praise is harmful

Gasser is an advocate of the belief that praise is harm-ful to children.

'The greatest tragedy is that we think we're doing a kind and responsible adult act by praising. But all we actually do is remove children's deeply innate sense of knowing and their internally motivated passions for a life of learning.

'Let's not be frightened' she says, 'of the curious questions and unexpected pathways and growing passions of our children. Let's consider, instead, each as a gift. Let's trust the unique journey each is here to explore. What a diversely rich mosaic of life we could live in – like a food forest in which all that naturally grows can freely and abundantly do so. Sounds like a healthy community doesn't it?'

Community space

Juli Gassner is one of the three educators heading up Wildspace, an exciting intergenerational learning space that endeavours to deliver what's missing in mainstream education – not silo learning into age or merit groups. People come to Wildspace to learn from each other and to engage in the sharing of ideas and knowledge, creativity and critical thinking.

This is not a school. This is an alternative learning space for the whole community.

'We thought why not set up a learning place to have the crossover of the 16-yearolds and 70-year-olds listening to each other. We have had 20–70-year-olds participating. The project is about elders holding the young and the young inspiring elders,' says Juli.

Wildspace is located at

the space that was previously known as Shearwater's Preschool (Main Arm Road, Mullumbimby). She is joined by Pawel Slotwinski and Henry Coleman pioneering Wildspace – a model she believes could exist in communities all around the world.

At Wildspaces, critical thinking, creativity and collaboration are key.

Pawel says that 'part of critical thinking is that you can see something from different levels of your whole person. You can come from a body level, feeling, rational, and part of critical thinking is acknowledging that all of them are valid. We try to have experiences that try to touch the different levels of education. We do gazing, where we just look into each other's eyes, and we go into big-picture activism. People come here because they find something that connects with them.'

Wildspaces has a fluid program and event scheduling that appear to have more of an organic rather than 'formal' foundation.

'There is something different every day,' says Juli.

The current model has grown out of a concept that Pawel and Juli pioneered in Sydney where they offered people the opportunity to come and sit together, cook a meal and engage in learning.

Sunday film night

Sunday night film screenings at Wildspace offer the chance to engage in discussion about the film themes . 'It's a classic way of teaching critical thinking,' says Pawel.

Pawel believes that Mullumbimby is the right fit to pioneer Wildspaces.

'We were looking for a community that was open to a project that doesn't fit a box very neatly, but we wanted a community that needed us a little bit. We are preaching to the converted, and it is a sticking point, but we decided that to set up for success we had to find an alternative community that would embrace our concept.'

Julie believes that it's important to start in a community that is closely aligned with your values.

'My friend Helena Norberg Hodge says the mistake people often make is trying to convert people who don't have common beliefs. If you start with people who have some shared beliefs, you can become a role model for the next community. It has to start from a point of strength.'

Wildspaces is funded entirely by donation and is dependent on community support.

'When people walk in the door we ask them to think how they are placed in the financial world,' says Gassner.

'If you are financially valued we like you to think about the price society pays you and donate in accordance.'

They are setting up a Go-FundMe project to help with funding the program. Find out about Wildspace at wildspace.net.au or on Facebook. All community welcome!

How nuts are his mates?

And now, in this post-Harvey Weinstein era, comes the ultimate threat, the apotheosis of political correctness, its name is 'ending the patriarchy'. This must be slain with monstrous lances of the hottest steel by a mighty warrior, and buffoon Trump is their man.

Who are the world's best collaborative problem solvers?

Global problem solvers are in high demand and a new study by the OECD showed that 15-year-old girls outperformed boys in collaborative problem solving in every country around the world.

Cirls shows a set a siting



across the school curriculum,' said OECD secretary-general Angel Gurría.

Students who access the internet or social networks outside of school score slightly higher than other students while students who play video games outside of school score slightly lower in collaborative problem-solving than students who do not play video games. Fostering positive relationships at school can benefit students' collaborative problem solving skills, especially when involving students directly. Schools could organise more social activities to encourage this, as well as provide teacher training on classroom management and tackle bullying, the report concluded.

Girls show more positive attitudes towards relationships, meaning that they tend to be more interested in others' opinions and want others to succeed,' said Andreas Schleicher, director of the Directorate of Education and Skills at the OECD.

Schleicher also notes that 'strong academic skills will not automatically lead to strong social skills. Part of the answer lies in giving students more ownership over the time, place, path, pace, and interactions of their learning. An-

other part of the answer can lie in fostering more positive relationships at school and designing learning environments that benefit students' collaborative problem-solving skills and their attitudes towards collaboration.'

The first ever assessment of collaborative problem-solving skills aims to help countries and economies see where

their students stand in relation
to their peers in other education systems. Students in 52
countries completed this test
in addition to the main OECD
PISA 2015 Survey on Science,
Mathematics and Reading.
'In a world that places a
growing premium on social
skills, education systems need
to do much better at foster-

ing those skills systematically

Bay Smokehouse

TheGoodLife

It's not every day you win a silver medal at the Sydney Royal Fine Food Show, but to win one in your first year of production is an amazing feat.

The Bay Smokehouse's Smoked Fish Rillettes was the product that turned the judges' tastebuds; they declared them 'Innovative with an excellent flavour'.

Made with local and wild-caught smoked fish, blended with organic raw cashew cream and topped with Grumpy Grandma's extra virgin olive oil, the fish dish is inspired by the French-style paté, but with a Byron Bay twist.

Head smoker Damien Curtis says he sources all of his fish from local north coast fishermen between the Tweed and the Clarence, focusing on the oily species that are full of Omega 3 and great for smoking. 'I traditionally smoke the fillets over a mixture of native hardwoods and nutwoods sourced from local woodworkers, in old-fashioned smokers shipped over from England."

Damien, who currently only sells at farmers markets, says he launched The Bay Smokehouse at the beginning of the year, focusing on bringing wild-caught smoked fish to the Shire. 'I'm trying to get people away from the farmed smoked salmon from Tasmania that is becoming increasingly unsustainable and full of antibiotics and orange colouring.

Damien grew up in Paris; he says he was surrounded by delicious food and ate at many French restaurants. 'I spent a lot of time in England in my youth, eating smoked mackerel and kippers for breakfast. I've always been passionate about food and cooking, but was always just a home chef. 'This business has given me the opportunity to experiment and share some delicious oceanic creations.'

Butcher Baker Beer

The name might be Butcher Baker but it's a third 'B' - beer where the dream started for the couple who returned to the region of their childhood to open a business.

'It's what we were doing with our social life,' says Paul Coughran, speaking about his and wife Amanda's interest in craft beers and boutique breweries.

Paul and Amanda attended Mullumbimby High (four years apart) before meeting properly while working in London. 'We weren't quite done with city life,' says Amanda about their choice to live in Melbourne on returning to Australia. They started bakery cafes, including railway station outlets. After having their first child, they increasingly missed their big families and hatched a plan to move back to the Byron region.

including inhouse smoked pastrami and lamb. This aspect of the business is both homage to Paul's butcher/dad as well as Paul's subsequent love of meat.

Vegetarians are not forgotten, with options in each of the menu sections and flavoursome vegetarian/vegan sides on offer. I tried the Sweet Potato Latke side, a delicious cross between a hash brown and a rosti, served with sour cream and applesauce.

Butcher Baker is open evenings on Fridays and Saturdays, including a happy hour-and-a-half over 5-6.30pm offering \$5 schooners. Takeaway is an option for the whole menu and functions bookings are welcome.

There is a strong local team of chefs, with Rob Theaker being lured back from the US to head up the kitchen team, and Mitchell Peters, who completed his apprenticeship at Harvest. Rob's signature Cauliflower Bites (with black tahini and dukkha crust served with sunflower pesto), and Mitchell's signature Beef Ribs (Thai style) proving extremely popular.

New owners at **Poinciana**

Adam James and Lara Broauer from Mullum's Punch & Daisy have now moved across town to take over the iconic Poinciana Cafe. Adam will be partnering in the kitchen with Jerome Clarke, former head chef at Byron's Roadhouse, to create a menu that's 'local, fresh and simple - doing the classics really well'. Meanwhile, Punch & Daisy will be passed on to its longtime head chef.

When they found that the place that is now Butcher Baker was available, the plan was sped up. 'At that time, it was Helix but everyone still tends to refer to it as the Old Utopia,' says Amanda.

They tweaked the space, which is gorgeously roomy and includes an elevated lush green view from the back. 'We overhauled the bar, allowing for draught beer and cider,' says Paul. 'Hendrix & Harlow created

new furniture, upping the seating to 70 people."

Butcher Baker is a cafe/restaurant/bar that is also available for private functions. Though it is not a bakery, bread is a strong presence on the menu, made by Paul onsite. Though it is not a butchery, meat features strongly in the menu



Unsurprisingly, the drinks menu is nearly as long as the food one. Beers include Stone & Wood, the Burleigh-based Black Hops, and Currumbin's Balter. A small but carefully selected wine list, a full bar, and organic sparkling sodas are alternative options.

So, when you think of Butcher Baker, add Beer into the name to give you a sense of what to check out. I've also got a nursery rhyme on the tip of my tongue – I wonder if there are any plans to start selling candlesticks too?


Three Blue Ducks Blueberry Encounter



I don't think he could have seen how that vision could have spawned what should be the most culturally appropriated choir in the country, but has fast become embraced for its celebration of culture. You see these 28 men dressed like working men have found their way into the hearts not just of Mullumbimby, but the world!

Finally the Soviets' plan for world domination is realised, by the unlikely gathering of dads from Mullumbimby. They don't even speak Russian. But man, can they sing it!

Mark Swivel is the spokesperson for Dustyesky. Not because he speaks Russian; because he's the best at pretending he is actually Russian. Let's not forget what actually creates the magic that has seen the guys on Russian news! 'We love singing the songs,' he says. 'We love having an excuse to get out on a weeknight to have a beer and sing songs. It's a men's shed without the tools. You can chat and sing these amazing songs. It's 28 blokes really going for it. It's actually really risky to sing 4-part harmonies. We are generally ordinary blokes with decent voices, so it's a challenge to try and pull it off.'

You might be surprised to learn that not everyone in Dustyesky is a great singer. It's not about that.



good company over a beer,' says Mark.

The group who started out singing three songs have now developed an hour-long show, one which they presented recently on invitation at the Bondi Pavilion with the Russian Ambassador in attendance.

'At the show I welcomed him and his wife – at least I assume it's his wife! He seemed to laugh. He stayed for a drink. A whole lot of diplomats turned up, including the consul-general from Sydney and heaps of Russian people and friends and family.'

Like opera singers who don't speak Italian, Dustyesky don't speak Russian, but they can certainly sing it. In fact they sing it so well that they found themselves on a Moscow news channel. Men singing Russian songs in Mullumbimby making news in Moscow. It's kind of ridiculous if you think about it, but wonderful at the same time.

The Russians love Dustyesky almost more than we do. 'Russia is copping a hiding in the world today,' says Mark. Their reputation is shot and the psyche is beaten up. When Russian people listen to us on the web they are hearing people celebrate a culture that they love. We thought we would get found out singing Russian songs and pretending to be Russian and that there would be complaints. It happened at exactly the same time as cultural appropriation became a big issue. We are going balls out not caring one bit about politeness or courtesy of serious choirs. Russian people see us singing Soviet songs and folk songs and sacred songs and it spins them out. It's like tripping for a Russian person, and because we sing well enough and we love what we are doing and there is humour and we respect the songs we get away with it!'

They do more then get away with it; turns out they are celebrated for it. Dustyesky have been invited to perform their hour-long show at Womadelaide this year. With real musicians. The best in the world. The irony of that isn't lost on a bunch of blokes who meet on Tuesday for a beer.

Dustyesky will be singing for the Mullum Neighbourhood Centre Xmas Fundraiser on Tuesday 19 December at the Brunswick Picture House.

'Mullum is home,' says Mark. 'It has incubated the whole Dustyesky thing. The best way to pay a little back is to respond to this sort of request. We get asked to do all sorts of stuff but we perform right next to the Neighbourhood Centre at the music festival and we rehearse across the road. We are keeping the love in the block. Mullum spawned us.'

Dustyesky sing it up at the Brunswick Picture House. Don't miss it. They'll bring the house down for sure.



Who were the players you took into the studio? How did the music change and evolve over the recording process?

We co-produced the album with Ben Last and Avishai Barnatan, drawing on their strengths in the realms of sound design and composition. We had our core players, Jason Karabash, Brook Rees, Elvis Callaghan, and Rebekah Ray, and were joined by some of the best musicians of the area, including Cye Wood, Yohai Cohen, Pete Wilkins, Tahir Qawwal, Avishai Barnatan and Shai Shriki.

The biggest evolution and change came from the electronic and rhythmic elements. The acoustica were pretty much prepared.Each song was a journey, some more effortless than others. There were tracks that we wrote the rhythm section three or four times before arriving to the place that was 'right'. It was a real challengebuilding beats, layered with multiple percussion instruments, and doing so in a way that didn't take away from one another.

Was there much difference between the concept of what you started out with and the finished product? How open do you negotiate that gap between maintaining a vision and being an open channel to new ideas?

The finished product is better, more rich than the initial vision. We were really organised. Lots of reference tracks, massive spreadsheets, creative workshopping that we would talk through for hours upon hours about how the track would evolve and what elements would support that. Every night we would review the day's work and note everything that needed tweaking for the next session.

As we worked, we had an agreement to try everything out before discarding it. At times there were four producers in the studio so you can imagine that there were moments where we well and truly went off on a tangent. With music, art in general, you have to be open to making mistakes. Some of the best outcomes come from that. Andit is one of the most

John Butler Trio plays Bluesfest: The Thrill Ain't Gone

WHEN MUSICIAN JOHN BUTLER STARTED OUT HE THOUGHT THAT HE COULD 'CARRY A GUITAR AND AMP AND A SWAG AND THAT I WOULD BE LIKE A ROVING, GYPSY MINSTREL AROUND THE COUNTRY, A ROVING FERAL GYPSY MINSTREL'. IN A GUESS THAT'S KIND OF WHAT HAPPENED. BUT BUTLER DON'T BUSK NO MORE. HE'S IN DEMAND ON BIG STAGES BOTH HERE AND INTERNATIONALLY.

Butler is a committed environmentalist whose passion for action finds its way into his music. Bully is the single off his new album and it talks about the paradigm between the community who want the same thing: opportunity, respect, dignity, clean air and clean water. But there is the other side. 'The industrial kind of megalomaniac, eco-cidal, kind of reich, kind of corporate world that seems to be killing the planet,' says Butler. 'I find the energy to be quite bully like, and if there is one thing that seems to be the biggest threat to the world and to the environment and to the community, and to humanity and the planet, it's this bullying-type mentality. It gets what it wants at any price and I don't like that. I don't like that kind of headspace or that energy that it could push good people around to get what it wants and I'm not into it.'

Butler believes that although we're reaching some critical points in our environment, that the people's movement is making progress.

'When anything comes to a head,' says Butler, 'things get extreme. You have the fossil-fuel oligarchy that are getting more and more desperate to have their drug, which is fossil fuels. They are more and more desperate for their fix than they have ever been because their



fix is running out, both in social currency and in real time. The actual resource is running out. So as any junkie, as they get weaned off their junk, they get more and more desperate and more and more aggressive. And so you are seeing that. What we lose looks like the problem is getting worse but at the same time I just read something that by 2030 in Western Australia more than 40 per cent of the energy is going to be renewable.

'So more than ever I think people are wanting to do things the most logical and easy way possible and the most logical and commonsense way to go about living on this planet is sustainability. If we actually fund the right technologies, we will create more jobs and the energy will be cheaper than ever, which is what people want.'


John Butler is looking forward to returning to Bluesfest for 2018, something that has significance for this blues and roots and people-power-infused artist.

'The first time I got to play Bluesfest in 2000 I though this is it. I thought I had made it and I still feel that way. I feel like that every time I get to play Bluesfest. I go, I feel okay. This is a big deal. Woodford and Bluesfest, it was 20 years ago, to get those gigs as a budding young musician was like the holy grail in many ways; it still is, so I am still so stoked to be part of the lineup, and to be one of all those many great musicians who hold the presence of that audience onstage and to be part of the community and to be part of that legacy is a thrill that never fades.

ONLY THE BRAVE



With he bushfire season upon us ('the country is a tinderbox' is Australian journalism's equivalent of the 'first swallow of spring'), this timely movie reminds us of the sacrifices that firefighters make to keep safe our lives and homes. The shorthand character reference for the guys with whom we are about to spend the next couple of hours is provided by Acca Dacca's ball-tearing It's A Long Way To The Top' (say no more - RIP Malcolm Young), and followed by a cracking joke about the Mount Rushmore monument ('she thought it was naturally formed'). Testosterone is soon running rampant as Superintendent Eric Marsh (Josh Brolin) and his municipal crew, including greenhorn ex-junkie Brendan McDonaugh (Miles Teller), strive to be designated 'Hot Shots' (ie, a fully professional team that works nationwide). After qualifying as such, in the summer of 2013 the Granite Mountain boys find themselves on the job and battling the the fast-spreading Yarnell Hill (Arizona) inferno. This true story (of which I was entirely unaware) is built on the camaraderie of the men involved, a strong sense of community that is eked out by director Joseph Kosinski and the depiction of old-fashioned courage in the face of danger. The film is intensely masculine, but that need not be to its detriment. If Mavis (Andie MacDowell) is little more than the lesser half of Sheriff Steinbrink (Jeff Bridges), Brolin's wife Amanda (Jennifer Connelly) is given much more time and consideration. A 'horse-whisperer', she is childless and increasingly chagrined at the sacrifice she has had to make in her personal life to support Eric's total commitment to his job. It is the sort of movie that has you wondering from about halfway 'who will it be that gets killed?' Eric? Brendan? The loyal deputy? The ladies' man? The climax was (for me) unforeseen and, because of the genuineness of all performance, it was immensely moving. Check it out - it's much better than the super-hero fluff.
