No community input with major development

It's emerged that a recent decision to approve an \$8m private hospital DA on Ewingsdale Road and McGettigans Lane by the JRPP was made without any community representation.

The Joint Regional Planning Panel (JRPP) comprises nine panels that determine large-scale developments across NSW and approve almost 100

per cent of applications before them.

The Northern JRPP, headed by former National Party MP Garry West, will soon be deciding upon the contentious West Byron suburban/ commercial greenfield development. The debacle throws into light the lack of any community input with

large developments across NSW. While elected councils determine

all development applications below \$20m, unelected JRPPs decide on DAs estimated over \$20m as well as specialist DAs under \$20m, such as medical centres.

The private hospital proposal by Melbourne-based developers comprises medical and specialist consulting rooms, a day theatre, pharmacy, 12 overnight-stay units, cafe and basement and ground-level parking.

Last week JRPP chair Garry West dismissed questions by The Echo regarding how increased traffic from

the hospital will be managed.

One of the local representatives on the JRPP, mayor Simon Richardson, does not support the decision and told The Echo he resigned from the panel owing to the 'inherent flaw' of not being able to speak publicly to the JRPP on contentious developments while also being a panel member.

It's a perennial question for the Byron Shire: how do we funnel some of the tourist dollars that flood the region each year into infrastructure for the community?

A bed-tax plan has been knocked down by the state government more times than Rocky Balboa, and any proposal for new parking meters invariably has locals reaching for their placards and pitchforks.

But Greens mayor Simon Richardson believes he may have come up with a solution - a voluntary visitor fund (VVF).

It isn't the first time the idea of a visitor fund has been mooted, of course. In 2014, Council ran a trial in which visitors to two of its caravan parks were asked to make a voluntary contribution, but received barely enough to buy a round of chai lattes.

But the new plan – to be voted on at this week's Council meeting appears to be different.

Instead of giving tourists a choice about whether or not to cough up a contribution, it will simply be added to their bill if they are staying with an accommodation provider who has agreed to be part of the scheme.

The providers will be asked to sign up to the fund, and in return will be able to promote themselves as 'good corporate citizens' using an online video and booklets created by Council.

Mayor Simon Richardson describes the JRPP process as 'non-democratic and it was established to be so.'

Failure to appoint

Despite the mayor's resignation from the panel, Council staff and the JRPP failed to ask community panel replacement David Brown to attend last week's meeting.

Brown, an urban planner, told The Echo, 'I was appointed to the JRPP at the last (August 22) Council meeting. I was not invited to the McGettigans Lane [and Ewingsdale Road] meeting.'

So who observed last week's JRPP meeting? Ewingsdale Progress and Public Hall Association vice-president Lindsay Wootten told The Echo that he attended, along with longtime resident and immediate neighbour George Flick.

The Echo also confirmed the manager of the Bright Side Medical Centre in Bayshore Drive also attended, but they declined to comment.

Wootten told The Echo that 'The meeting was not well publicised,' that the 'pro-

cess was unfair,' and that he believes the local medical fraternity do not think this facility is needed.

Yet Wootten said his association is 'not against development of this lot.

'However, the view of the association is that this development is too high and too large overall for the size of the lot. The lot is in a very prominent position and with three storeys it is likely to dominate the view from surrounding areas.

'There should also be buffer zones between the development and surrounding lots.

'In addition, the development will exacerbate the already very poor traffic situation at the intersections of McGettigans Lane/Quarry Lane and Ewingsdale Road and increase the danger to road users. There are frequent

accidents in and around the intersections?

Cr Paul Spooner (Labor) told The Echo that the state government needs to undertake a review of the operation and conduct of the Northern JRPP. 'The recent approval of the Ewingsdale Road Private Hospital demonstrates the lack of planning controls that local councils like Byron Shire now have in NSW?

He said, 'The Ewingsdale Road Private Hospital approval demonstrates if a developer keeps knocking on the door of the state government they can eventually expect to get an approval. This particular DA has been to the JRPP three times over the last 12 months.

'Each time, it was recommended by Council staff for refusal primarily owing to concerns about traffic management at the intersection of Ewingsdale Road and McGettigans Lane.

'Why is the state government allowing a panel to progress without local representation?'

Questions to MPs

The Echo asked NSW Labor MLC Walt Secord, 'If elected at the next election, will your party commit to abolishing the JRPP and returning large decisions like this to democratically elected councils? If not, why?'

The Echo also asked, 'Given this recent decision lacked even basic community input and will exacerbate traffic, how can Byron Shire residents have confidence in this unelected planning panel?'

Secord replied that he broadly supports the JRPPs but said, 'There is growing concern that the Berejiklian government has stacked out the Joint Regional Planning Panels (JRPPs) with Liberal and National party-affiliated individuals across the entire state?

Local NSW Nationals MLC Ben Franklin has previously told The Echo he supports JRPPs.

Currently the seat is held by Greens MP Tamara Smith, who claimed the long-held Nationals seat after MP Don Page retired in 2015.

Franklin said, 'I have passionately advocated from inside government for the best interests of our local area and I am proud of what I have been able to achieve, hand in hand with the local community.'

He added he 'was not planning to do this, but have been convinced to do so after repeated requests from local residents and community organisations.'

Microgrid for Byron's Arts & Industry Estate

Enova Community Energy announced Tuesday it will build a microgrid in the Byron Bay Arts & Industry Estate as a pilot project to encourage locally generated, stored and distributed power.

The \$30,000 grid, which will be funded by the state government through an \$85 million program for cleanenergy projects, is expected to involve 20 to 30 participants, and will take place over approximately two years.

When finalised in October 2020, Enova hopes it will lead to the formation of a wider, self-sufficient microgrid for the entire estate.

Enova Energy MD Tony Pfeiffer said, 'Community microgrids such as this are the way of the future.

'The Byron Arts & Industry Estate Microgrid is the first of what we hope will be many self-sufficient electricity microgrids Enova helps to roll out.

NSW premier attends launch

'We aim to develop a model that can be replicated by communities across NSW and ultimately Australia – starting with industrial estates and similar commercial areas, and eventually residential areas'.

Flying in for the announcement at Enova's Centennial Circuit offices, NSW premier Gladys Berejiklian said the

\$30 million program would enable communities across the state to build their own local clean-energy projects.

A further \$55 million would help the private sector develop and accelerate clean-energy technology for regional communities, such as pumped hydro.

'Tackling high energy costs is a top priority for our government and this significant investment puts further downward pressure on energy bills for homes in regional NSW,' Berejiklian said.

Energy and utilities minister Don Harwin said the government was 'lowering barriers for investment for the emerging energy projects

d of tomorrow'.

Participants in the pilot will have individual devices installed to measure power inputs and outputs.

The resulting data will help work out a new pricing structure based on sharing locally generated power.

Unique tariff

Mr Pfeiffer said one of the aims of the pilot was 'to work out just how much cheaper it is to use local renewable power sources rather than bringing electricity from afar'.

'Eventually, the microgrid is likely to enjoy its own unique tariff structure, where new prices are set to be more attractive than current pricing.'



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

NSW premier met by West Byron protesters

A limousine delivering NSW premier Gladys Berejiklian to a media conference in Byron Bay on Tuesday had to pass through a barrage of West Byron protesters.

This reporter was not so lucky, being blocked by police until eventually escorted into the conference by organisers.

The brouhaha was ostensibly to launch Enova Energy's microgrid in the Byron Arts & Industry Estate, with government financial support (see separate report), but it also coincided with the bid by northern NSW parliamentary secretary Ben Franklin (Nationals) to contest the state seat of Ballina at the next election.

As soon as the launch was over, the premier was peppered with a range of questions, from West Byron, koala habitat and rental affordability to her position on the challenge to PM Malcolm Turnbull.

She managed to carefully sidestep most of it, but there was one point on which she was clear: she believed sitting Ballina MP Tamara Smith (Greens) has been 'ineffectual' in the role, meanwhile lavishing praise on Mr Franklin

who was standing beside her. The premier also revealed she did not believe the West Byron development would go ahead as currently planned, attempting to sheet home the blame for its approval to the former Keneally government.

'I appreciate the concerns about the West Byron Bay development that's been unfortunately an ongoing issue for many years. I understand the independent planning process will now seek resolution of that matter,' she said.

'I completely support the community's concerns, as does my parliamentary colleague [Ben Franklin] about over-development. There's no doubt the scale of that development is beyond what the community's expectations are and I'm always very active in speaking up against things that I see are too big to impose on the community – and I think that is one of them.

'I'm very pleased to say that when these concerns have been raised in other parts of the state, the independent planning process has actually put a stop to these major overdevelopments.'

Bed tax ruled out

Responding to a question from BayFM presenter Jim Beatson on bed taxes, premier Berejiklian said she had had 'a fantastic discussion with your mayor about those issues of... short-term accommodation and rental

accommodation'.

'Obviously the locals need to be supported, especially during those times of the year when many tourists come to Byron but you need that right balance.

'We discussed some really positive opportunities today, which both Ben and I will be taking forward.

'There are lots of other opportunities instead of putting a tax on people,' she said.

Asked about how she felt going into the state election in the shadow of a federal leadership spill, the premier said, 'What we need to do as a government is always focus on our citizens'.

'I think the office of prime minister generally speaking is one that has diminished over the last decade.


'Nobody wants to see a constant change of leadership. It does concern me and disappoint me – and I think that's a community sentiment.'

But the premier stopped short of stating her support for Malcolm Turnbull, saying only, 'I always defer on those matters to our federal colleagues. It's not for me to add to the commentary.'





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


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

The opportunity to run, or take a stroll, up Mount Chincogan is coming your way for the second year in a row.

After a 16-year hiatus, the Chincogan Charge was started up again last year by the Mullumbimby Chamber of Commerce. It creates a once-in-a-year opportunity to run or walk to the top of the iconic local mountain.

Mullumbimby Chamber of Commerce president Jenelle Stanford said, 'The tug-of-war has a \$200 prize for the winning team that is sponsored by Mullumbimby Removals and there are up to six teams that can enter the competition.

'The winning team will automatically qualify to enter the Mullumbimby Agricultural Show later this year.

Mullumbimby residents are famously suspicious of chain stores setting up shop in their town.

As the great War on Woolies demonstrated, locals will go to considerable lengths to keep corporations out.

So it isn't surprising that the arrival of a Linen House outlet on Mullum's main street ruffled a few feathers.

But according to the owner of the new Linen House store Scott Duncan, the company is anything but a heartless multinational.

'It's a family-owned business started by my parents in 1993 and we're all still involved in running it,' Mr Duncan says.


'We take our social and ethical responsibilities very seriously.

'All of our factories are regularly audited for working and safety conditions and we encourage and reward them for running staff education programs.'

Holiday letting legislation passes NSW parliament

As expected, a new law passed in NSW parliament last week that aims to regulate the holiday letting industry.

Yet it comes incomplete, with major elements such as proposed changes to the SEPP (state environment planning policy) and a code of conduct still to be finalised.

The Fair Trading Amendment (Short-term Rental Accommodation) Bill 2018 was voted in by the coalition and had bipartisan Labor support, along with minor parties except the Greens.

Those who have council approvals, for example bed and breakfasts and motels, claim they have been ignored throughout the process. Part of the reforms would allow regional councils to limit letting to a minimum of 180 days.


Greens Ballina MP Tamara Smith said, 'The Liberal/National government's one-sizefits-all attempt at addressing short-term rental accommodation will not ease the pressure on Byron Bay and cities that are at risk of becoming overrun by de facto hotels,' she said.

'A boom in short-term, make-a-quick-buck rental accommodation is already changing the character of Byron Bay and making it harder to maintain and build community on the north coast.'

Powers to police

During parliamentary debate, local MLC Ben Franklin (Nationals) spruiked the law and told the chamber, 'NSW Fair Trading will be given powers to police online platforms and letting agents.'

While there was no explanation of how that would

work, there was also no explanation by Franklin as to how an exclusion register would work, whereby 'hosts or guests who commit two serious breaches of the code within a two-year period will be banned for five years.'

Yet he did say those who have sought council approval for holiday letting had very valid and reasonable concerns.

'Operators who have done the right thing should not feel they are being punished for doing the right thing, particularly in a community like Byron Bay.' Yet again, Franklin offered no comfort other than a 12-month review, something that approved operators say will be ineffective after the damage is done.

The Echo asked minister for Innovation and Better Regulation Matt Kean (Liberal) what details are available on the code of conduct and whether its 30-strong committee is stacked with holiday letting representatives.

He replied, 'The Shortterm Rental Accommodation (STRA) code of conduct advisory committee has representatives from a range of organisations, not just holiday-letting industry representatives.' 'The Advisory Committee includes STRA platforms, professional associations, industry associations, property owners' associations, strata sector organisations, and also Local Government NSW and the Tenants' Union of NSW.

He said, 'The development of the code has just begun, and the advisory committee process is only one element of the development of the code. There will also be consultation with key gov-

ernment agencies, and once a full draft of the code has been prepared there will be further community and industry consultation.

Geoff Wood, an approved accommodation operator in Byron Shire, said, 'We have a message for Mr Franklin unfortunately 12 months will be too late - many or most approved operators will be extinct by then as they simply cannot compete on such a massively unlevel playing field. And we also ask - what will this be a review of? Because nobody in the state government has ever consulted with the approved accommodation industry in the first place?

Thrown under a bus: approved ops

Wood continued, 'We are outraged that our own state government has thrown approved operators under the bus. We have a DA which, overnight, is now not worth the paper it's written on.

'We are reaching out to all approved accommodation operators from across the state to join us at www.Facebook. com/NSWApprovedAccommodationAccord.'

Shark net trial abandoned by govt

The third shark net trial for the five beaches across the north coast has been abandoned following the significant decline in public support.

It's prompted calls from Sea Shepherd and the Greens for nets to be banned across the state.

During the course of the two shark net trials, community support for nets halved from 52 per cent to 26 per cent of Ballina residents.

The controversial shark nets were installed at Lighthouse, Sharpes and Shelly beaches at Ballina, as well as at Lennox Head and Evans Head over the summer of 2016 and 17.

Ballina Shire's deputy mayor Keith Williams (Labor), who has been leading the charge to rid Ballina of the nets for the last two years, celebrated the news.

'The final nail in the coffin was the news that the nets had killed twice as many dolphins as they had caught target sharks in the second trial, said Cr Williams.

'After that, even the staunchest supporters of nets realised that something was seriously wrong.'

Other shark-management strategies will continue; up to 35 SMART drumlines will continue to be trialled daily, from Lennox Head to Evans

Head, weather permitting, until mid-2020.

Drones continue

Trials of helicopters and drones for aerial surveillance, and VR4G listening stations, will also continue.

Greens member for Ballina Tamara Smith welcomed the decision and said, 'I will continue to ask the NSW government to invest in sharkspotting and drone programs for surfers, since they are the ones who are at slightly more of an infinitesimal risk of a shark encounter.'

'We know from countries like South Africa that shark spotting with eyes on the beach and with drone technology work to keep people safe by warning them to get out of the water if a shark is spotted. Shark nets give no warnings.

'I assisted in bringing Cape Town Shark Spotters to Australia and I helped fund the shark-spotting feasibility study at Wategos Beach with Sea Shepherd, which came back as highly viable.

'Local volunteer group SharkWatch proved that shark spotting with drone technology can work on north coast beaches - it just needs funding to survive.'


She added she has been pushing for shark spotting and drone technology, which is supported by scientific evidence, since day one.

Visitor fund tabled in Council

➤ continued from page 1 star resorts to backpacker hostels – and the concept of the community getting a couple of extra bucks from each booking is wholeheartedly supported.

'There are a few we're expecting to put their hands up straight away'.

The contribution from tourists will range from \$1 to \$5 per booking, depending on how much they are spending. It's hardly a king's ransom, but the mayor believes it will add up to a significant contribution.

According to modelling undertaken by Council staff, the VVF could reap \$220,000 in its first year.

Staff predict there would also be an upfront cost of \$140,000, including the cost of 'branding' (\$50,000) and hiring an officer to administer the scheme.

Cr Richardson said that the money raised through the scheme would be used for highly visible projects such as building new playgrounds, boardwalks and change rooms.

'I think it's really important that people see where the money goes because if they find it hard to see the benefit they will be less motivated to stay involved or support it,' he said.

'We also plan for the money to be spent where it's raised. So if businesses in Brunswick Heads contribute \$5,000, that money will be spent on a project in Brunswick Heads.'

Admin costs

Under the proposal, Council would manage the trust account and distribute the funds to various projects.

A steering committee made up of industry and community representatives would undertake promotion and marketing and bring in members from the local accommodation industry.

These members would ultimately decide how the money was spent.

'It would essentially be a "pay to play" situation,' Cr Richardson said.

'The industry indicated that from the administration point of view it's easier for Council to do it rather than reinventing the wheel by creating a whole new administrative apparatus.

'But when it comes to decision making Council will have just as much say as the other

fit accommodation providers?

In the 'staff comments' section of the report accompanying the proposal, Council's director of sustainable environment and economy Shannon Burt noted that there were potential financial risks associated with the scheme.

'The potential risk to Council is the unknown amount of revenue that will be raised and potentially not being able to cover the administration costs of the program,' Ms Burt said.

'Also, there is still a lot of work that needs to be completed around the collection methodology and the auditing process (and the somewhat lack of transparency).

'The Economy and Sustainability team would work through these issues with the appointed executive officer.'

Cr Richardson acknowledged there was a risk involved. 'But the simple fact is that we need to find some way of getting money from visitors to put back into the community,' he said.

Nothing to see here

It's been a big week of undermining democracy, trust and the powers of locally elected councils by the NSW coalition government (and NSW Labor).

But that's okay, the NSW premier was in town to remind us that her government cares about power prices (see page 3). Except that around 100 residents turned up to let her know they don't like the idea of West Byron, which made it a bit of a spectacle (see page 5).

The visit was timed to give local NSW MLC Ben Franklin (Nationals) maximum push on his bid to become the Nationals candidate for this electorate (Ballina) at the 2019 state election.

So do we trust his Liberal-Nationals government?

Here's what this govenment just allowed to happen: Last week, the Joint Regional Planning Panel (JRPP), a hand-picked unelected panel that appears to have little oversight, approved a private hospital on a very busy road. It came without any community representation. Apart from the increased traffic it will produce, this appears a very flawed decision. Under the JRPP's 'determination and statement of reasons' (available on the their website), the panel claim: 'The development will provide the necessary specialist and surgical facilities for the region.' No supporting evidence on that claim is given. West Byron is the JRPP's next decision.

Both Franklin and NSW Labor's Walt Secord support the role of this panel, which demonstrates bipartisan support against giving local communities a say on how and what they develop.

In political science, there is a theory of being inside and outside the tent, meaning the tent contains those closest to the most powerful politicians and bureaucrats, while all the rest like the 99.9 per cent – are outside. Those inside the tent have been looking after themselves since the beginning of humanity, and it's not cynical to point out that those interests are unlikely to change any time soon.

Franklin places himself as someone who can 'work within government' to get results. He's an inside tent guy, in other words. So what are his achievements in the last three-and-a-half years? His press release lists 'securing funding and support for numerous local organisations like the Hope Haven Women and Children's Refuge in Ballina, to saving the old Mullumbimby Hospital site and the public land at Suffolk Park.'

Another achievement was the 'revolutionary Surf Life Saving drone program, which has since led to a new approach to keeping both swimmers and surfers safe on our beaches.'

Other achievements might include pushing compliance costs of holiday letting onto Council while offering no guarantee Council's finances won't be adversely affected. Another might be voting for anti-protest laws that favour mining companies and not residents who are affected by CSG operations. Another is voting for land-clearing laws that are destroying high value biodiversity and are contributing to climate change.

There are lots of achievements if you dig enough.

Yet Franklin is such nice guy! It's true, he is. Absolutely. But policy matters much, much more. Mostly it's a question of whether you believe Franklin can change the toxic culture within the tent, or even better - explain the decision making within the tent to the public. Alas, it's unlikely. It's like the movie Fight Club.

You don't speak about the tent once inside it.

With more awareness now than ever, political stage acting is being put to more scrutiny. As an informed voter, the hypnosis and spin is less effective. The trust in political solutions is diminishing because it's the same politicians who made the problems in the first place.

The problem with probability obsession

limate change is now reaching the endgame, where very soon humanity must choose between taking unprecedented action, or accepting that it has been left too late and bear the consequences.

Those are the challenging words from Prof Hans Joachim Schellnhuber, for twenty years the head of the Potsdam Institute for Climate Impact Research, and a senior adviser to Pope Francis, German chancellor Angela Merkel and the European Union.

In the foreword to a new report, Schellnhuber says the issue now 'Is the very survival of our civilisation, where conventional means of analysis may become useless?

The report, What Lies Beneath: The understatement of existential climate risk, was released last week by the Breakthrough National Centre for Climate Restoration.

Schellnhuber describes climate warming as an 'existential risk, and says the report highlights crucial insights that may lurk at the fringes of conventional policy analysis but that have a new resonance in today's circumstances, 'A unique situation with no precise historic analogue' in which 'the level of greenhouse gases in the atmosphere is now greater, and the Earth warmer, than human beings have ever experienced.

He says it is hardly surprising that a trend towards 'Erring on the side of least drama' and an understatement of risks has emerged in the work of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) after delivering their five Assessment Reports over

the last three decades.

This he attributes, in part, to the statistical 'probability obsession' of orthodox science, where repeating the same experiment on an object many, many times can identify the likelihood of various outcomes.

He says that if this were applied literally to climate warming: 'Strictly speaking, we would have to redo the Industrial Revolution and the greenhouse-gas emissions it triggered a thousand times or so, always starting with the Earth system in its 1750 pre-industrial state. Then calculate the averaged observed outcome of that planetary experiment in terms of mean surface-temperature rise, global biological productivity, total number of climate refugees, and many other variables. This is a nonsensical notion.

Schellnhuber argues that calculating probabilities makes little sense in the most critical instances, such as the methane-release dynamics in thawing permafrost areas or the potential failing of entire states in the climate crisis.

Rather, he says, we should 'identify possibilities, that is, potential developments in the planetary make-up that are consistent with the initial and boundary conditions, the processes and the drivers we know.'

This calls for a new approach, with less emphasis

on climate models in endless runs, and a new focus on such methods as scenario planning, where the consequences of a number of future possibilities, including those that may seem highly unlikely, but have major consequences, are evaluated.

This way, he says, 'one can overcome the probability obsession that not only fantasises about the replicability of the singular, but also favours the familiar over the unknown and unexpected.'

As well, according to Schellnhuber, when researchers come up with an entirely new thought, experts tend to reflexively dismiss it as 'speculative, which is effectively a death warrant in the academic world.

This in turn means that 'scientific progress is often driven from the periphery, or occasionally, by eminent personalities whose seniority is beyond doubt'.

'This does not at all imply that hypotheses need not be vindicated in due course, but out-of-the-box thinking is vital given the unprecedented climate risks that now confront human civilisation.

The proximity of such out-of-the-box events was brought home by the recent publication of the *Hothouse* Earth paper, in which sixteen scientist, including Prof Schellnhuber, warn that even hitting two degrees Celsius of warming might flip the climate system into a mode of carbon-cycle feedbacks that take climate warming beyond any human capacity to rein it in.

Schellnhuber concludes that it is 'all the more important to listen to non-mainstream voices who understand the issues and are less hesitant to cry wolf. Unfortunately for us, the wolf may already be in the house.

What Lies Beneath analyses why:

• Human-induced climate change is an existential risk to human civilisation: an adverse outcome that will either annihilate intelligent life or permanently and drastically curtail its potential, unless dramatic action is taken.

• The bulk of climate research has tended to underplay these risks, and exhibited a preference for conservative projections and scholarly reticence.

• IPCC reports tend toward reticence and caution, erring on the side of 'least drama, and downplaying the more extreme and more damaging outcomes, and are now becoming dangerously misleading with the acceleration of climate impacts globally.

• This is a particular concern with potential climatic 'tipping points', the passing of critical thresholds which result in step changes in the climate system. Underreporting on these issues is contributing to the 'failure of imagination' in our understanding of, and response to, climate change.



Writing grant applications for Brunswick Heads Marine Rescue Unit for much of the past decade has made me acutely aware of the stringent conditions imposed by granting authorities.

Properly responsible granting bodies should, and do, require explicit, clear, detailed information about any project BEFORE granting public moneys.

Such information would be: the nature and need for the project; who benefits; the identity and qualifications of the management personnel; measurement of successes or failures in the project's devel-

opment and progress reporting; but, most importantly, a detailed, explicit budget and timeframe.

Vague, generalised statements such as 'the money will be used to upgrade our communication equipment' or 'the grant will be used to repair salt-air damage to the radio tower' would render an application worthy of the bin. It answers none of the detail required to justify public funding.

I am completely astonished to read that our federal government has granted \$442 million to the Barrier Reef Foundation in what seems a total vacuum of information


about how it will be used. Not only astonishment gets me; I am simply disgusted.

Tallowood promises

Identified by Arakwal elders as culturally and historically significant, part of an Aboriginal walking track from Koonyum Range to the coast goes through the Tallowood Ridge development in Mullumbimby.

In the original concept plan, recognition, and a commitment was made to preserve this important track, which is koala habitat



and a wildlife corridor.

On the plan it was named 'The Shelter Belt'. Diminished in name, in status and in reality, this heritage track has been pillaged. Obscured by fences, neighbours' washing lines and kids' playground equipment, trees have been cut down to feed fire pits instead of koalas.

Who is meant to be taking care of this walking track? This public reserve is meant to be a thoroughfare and yet there are no signs explaining its significance.

The incursion has been gradual, with each stage of Tallowood cutting further into the ridgeline, land recontoured with stone walls supporting the engougement. Roads replace the wildlife buffer zone.

I have a particular affection for this track with its magnificent sweeping views from Wollumbin to Mt Chincogan along Main Arm Valley. Now the ridgeline is fast being consumed by Mcboxes. Byron Shire Council will

soon assess Tallowood development stage seven. This is an opportunity to call for preservation of what's left of this important open space to nourish body, mind and soul. **Deborah Lilly**



The same is true of all sustainable practice; nurturing the earth and society can be massively less costly than our current non-nurturing ways and the resultant abundance is a basically free huge bonus.

We have all the information we need to create sustainable development models for the global mass market in the 21st century. It could be a rapidly growing economic, social and environmental repair kit.

The window for **catastrophic Trump madness** approaches

wo years ago, with the US presidential election just weeks away, I wrote in *The Echo*, 'Trump is whipping up rage among his hardcore fans, screaming that the election is rigged and will be stolen by Clinton and "the establishment".

'Will there be fighting in the streets?' I asked. 'Trump has exhorted his followers to go to the polling stations and give Hillary supporters hell...Candidate Trump is outrageously disparaging about women, and anyone else who isn't like him. No-one knows how many men are not admitting to pollsters or their wives that, behind the polling booth curtain, they're going to vote for the big creepy guy.'

As it turned out, not much street fighting happened on election day, and afterwards Trump fans had no reason to fight because their guy won the electoral college with 52 per cent of male votes and 41 per cent of females.

Now, two years on, liberal media giants the *New York Times, Washington Post, Time, Newsweek,* CNN, MSNBC et al are pumping out fear and loathing in their editorials about President Trump like I've not seen over the 50 years I've been reading them.

The former head of the CIA accuses him of treason, Republican senator John McCain calls him a disgrace, and former FBI director James Comey says he's morally unfit to be president.

And still Trump's polls remain at about 47 per cent approval, 52 per cent disapproval, among the 58 per cent of Americans who vote. And new research shows that Trump's win was mostly because voters vote for their party's guy, and today Trump is still the Republicans' guy and the Democrats don't have a candidate yet.

The real threat to the president is the growing number of powerful people who want him out of the White House. The biggest funder of Republican candidates, Charles Koch, recently criticised Trump's tariff and immigration policies as 'divisive' and said he was damaging America, to which Trump replied that the Kochs 'love' some of his policies, including tax cuts and conservative picks for federal courts, while their trade policies are driven by a desire to 'protect their companies outside the US from being taxed.' Insofar as the Koch fortune is presently being

spent on politics, it's going toward electing Republican members of Congress, and state governors and legislators – not to Trump or his buddies.

Other right-wing funders, plus a growing number of Republican candidates, are looking for ways to disassociate from Trump: they can see that some of his fringe supporters – women with college degrees for example – have had enough of him. Believe it or not, 14 per cent of 'educated white women' voted for him in the 2016 election.

Meanwhile, the investigation into Russian interference in the 2016 election has triggered indictments of 12 Russians and ongoing court cases against several top Trump aides. Trump says it's all a liberal conspiracy, but his previously faithful attorney Michael Cohen has over 100 tapes of the buffoon-in-chief saying things he says he never said.

And as that legal noose tightens, Trump has ramped up his attacks on the media, exhorting his followers to the brink of physical attack on CNN reporter Jim Acosta. 'The press,' he shouts, 'is fake, fake, disgusting news' and the journalists in attendance are 'horrible, horrendous people' [https://www. theguardian.com/media/2018/aug/03/ trump-whips-up-crowd-anger-as-hevilifies-media].

So what about that question I raised two years ago: will there be fighting in the streets? There might be, in three months time if the November elections yield a Democrat majority in both the House and the Senate, exposing Trump to impeachment. He would do just about anything to stave that off, including inciting his rallies to widespread violence, declaring martial law, and/or launching missile attacks on Iranian nuclear facilities and military targets.

In late 2016, journalist Andrew Buncombe interviewed Trump biographer Tony Schwartz for the UK *Independent* newspaper, and wrote: 'Asked how the president might go about undertaking [instituting martial law], [Schwartz] said many of Mr Trump's supporters were police, members of the border guards force and the "far right wing" of the military.' That's probably expanded now to include many not so far-right military and cops, plus legions of gun-toting rent-a-cops, plus a lot of guys who just love the Trump macho-American-man worldview.

Thom Hartmann, a TV and print commentator, recently raised the possibility that the current Congress might grant Trump powers never before given to a president, for example, to suspend the 2020 presidential elections, if enough people were in the streets protesting against him and enough rightwing open-carry armed thugs turned out to confront them.

If Trump wants an excuse to declare war or martial law, there's a brief timewindow for him to do it: if Democrats win on election day November 6, he could be mad enough to give it a go before January 6 next year, when the new Congress convenes and could at least try to stop him.

Where to for Byron? The next bit of the bigger picture, regarding the Railway Park rotunda saga, will be played out at the 23 August Council meeting. Council's Cultural Policy, Homeless Policy and Protocol, Public Art Policy, commitment to supporting the environment, and recognition of the Shire's Aboriginal heritage appear to have all bee sidelined for a transition of Railway Park to niceness, with a big dollop of extra commercialism.

In the 1970s the first big forest protests in the world marked this region as special, and put protection of the environment on the table and into government and business practices for the first time in history.

This Shire's passion, acknowledgement, and respect for Aboriginal people and their heritage of this land drove strong community support for them to pursue Indigenous land use agreements and Native Title.

From campaigning for the Byron Marine Park to saving the fig trees beside the pedestrian crossing in front of Railway Park to the CSG, West Byron and Adani campaigns, the Byron Environment Centre (BEC) has been there. And there in Railway Park for 16 years, in an unauthorised occupation to save a structure that was proposed to be bulldozed. Lennox fig facts

Ballina Shire Council has issued a fact sheet on the Castle Drive fig tree at Lennox Head that is nothing more than selective propaganda with many untruths to justify their original decision to remove the tree.

There is only one property -No. 7 Castle Drive – where cracks have occurred in the driveway and the screen walls attached to the main house structure. There is no cracking to the main house structure, which is built on piers, and the cracks were caused by movement of these external screen walls away from the main house. These cracks were more cosmetic and the building was never structurally unsafe. Poor construction was a contributing factor to the building movement.

The pictures of roots under the driveway clearly show them not penetrating the house structure. The driveway has been replaced with a thicker, reinforced concrete slab paid for by Council. A payout was also made to No. 9 to fix the uneven paving in their garden.

The house and the tree can coexist. The arborists recommended concrete or steel root barriers, which are cheap and effective. The owners refused to allow a root barrier one or two metres inside their street boundary. This can be verified by the four engineers' reports and the four arborists' reports given to Council.

The legal case used by Ballina Council to justify their decision Michos v Botany Bay City Council made it mandatory to install a root barrier and PVC drainage pipes and did not require removal of the tree. Ballina Council public risk policy is not affected - only their advice that their insurer would not cover future damage to this house.

Council used advice on Aboriginal Cultural Heritage from outside Aboriginal community representatives and council staff to justify their limited submission to the Office of Environment and Heritage.

tree buttress roots, but instead employed a pest exterminator company to euthanase the bees.

Planting of 'mature native species' is a naïve statement and this can never replace the history and life given freely by this tree for 200 years. The cost of this tree removal, community disruption, equipment, staff, police, security personnel and council resources will far exceed the cost of fixing a few cracks in a driveway and screen walls apart from the damaging social impact and destruction of the neighbourhood environment.

Our advice from all professional sources has always been that the house and tree can co-exist – they are not mutually exclusive.



New short-term holiday-letting regulations

The NSW Government has announced a new a regulatory framework to govern the short-term holiday-letting industry. Short-term holiday letting has rapidly expanded in recent years owing to the growth of online booking services such as Airbnb and Stayz.

The regulatory framework is designed to ensure that local communities continue to gain from the economic benefits of short-term holiday letting, while protecting neighbours from antisocial behaviour. The new framework will include new planning laws, an industry code of conduct, and new provisions for strata scheme bylaws.

Planning laws

New planning laws will allow short-term holiday letting under certain conditions. If the host is present, they can use their home for shortterm holiday letting all year round as exempt development. That is, they do not need to submit a development application to their local council.



If the host is not present, for all areas of NSW outside Greater Sydney a residence can be used for shortterm holiday letting up to 365 days, although councils outside Greater Sydney will have the power to decrease the 365-day limit to no less than 180 days per year.

Code of conduct

A mandatory code of conduct will be introduced that will apply to anyone involved in providing or using short-term holiday letting, including

hosts, guests, online platforms, and letting agents.

A strike will include any behaviour that unreasonably interferes with a neighbour's quiet and peaceful enjoyment of their home.

The code will establish the 'two strikes and you're out' policy. Hosts or guests who commit two serious breaches of the code within two years will be banned for five years. Platforms and letting agents will not be permitted to offer services to anyone, or any dwelling, that is listed on the exclusion register. Failure to check the register before taking on new customers may result in significant penalties of up to \$1.1 million for corporations and \$220,000 for individuals.

A strike will include any behaviour that unreasonably interferes with a neighbour's quiet and peaceful enjoyment of their home.

The Code will establish a complaints system. Complaints will be independently assessed and approved by the commissioner for Fair Trading.

NSW Fair Trading will have powers to police online platforms and letting agents. The code, its enforcement, the compliance system, and the register will be funded by industry.

What about strata schemes?

Strata-scheme management laws will be amended to clarify that bylaws can prohibit short-term holiday letting, but only for lots that are not a host's principal place of residence.

That is, if a host is genuinely sharing their home, they will still be able to use a spare room for short-term holiday letting, and will be allowed to let out their principal place of residence while they are away on holidays.

NSW Fair Trading will also develop guidelines to advise owners' corporations on how they can use other existing strata laws to help deal with short-term holiday letting.

When will the new framework start?

What about strata schemes? Strata-scheme management laws will be amended to clarify that by-laws can prohibit short*term holiday letting, but only* for lots that are not a host's principal place of residence.

The NSW parliament passed the government's short-term holiday-letting reforms on Tuesday 14 August. The new framework is expected to start in 2019.

The code of conduct will be developed in consultation with government agencies, and industry and community groups during 2018.

The reforms will be reviewed a year after they commence.




French film festival





Fox on the Run

There's a cosy little Asian street-food place called Foxy Luu's, in the Woolies carpark, that does tasty eat-in or takeaway. The decor is fun and funky Asian and the food is freshly made from an across-Asia menu. Still relatively new on the Byron scene, owner Utku, also known as Max, says he has listened to the locals, adopted more Byron values, and has made some positive changes at Foxy Luu's. 'Byron has a well-established community with a strong and distinct voice, which we love hearing and responding to. There is a high consciousness here that teaches us to be and think more ethically and sustainably. both in our personal and business lives. We love interacting with the locals and opening our ears to new ideas about food, and environmental awareness. Thanks to suggestions from our regulars we are now recycling as much as possible, we've reduced waste, replaced plastic with biodegradable options, and also we are offering more vegan choices just to name a few.' Doing a favourite Byron experience of grabbing some food and watching the sunset from the beach can now be done with a clear conscience, a satisfied belly and a happy palate.

The food at Foxy Luu's has always had a focus on nutritious and healthy offerings, another Byron convention. Max expands: 'My partner Leilani, also the head chef at Foxy Luu's, studies Nutritional Medicine. She was adamant about making as much as possible from scratch, and bringing in nutritious broths and fresh bao buns... We also love finding ourselves in conversations with customers about healing practices, local and global ecological matters, art and music; this happens much more than elsewhere! We definitely love becoming a part of the furniture here."

Because the dishes are freshly made from scratch, using fresh herbs and produce, they have plenty of crunch, juice and flavour. If you meet Utku you will find a warm, friendly guy who is up for a chat. He says, 'We want to communicate with and understand locals... food is what we do and we also want to offer something to the fabric of the town.' Foxy's also sponsors a couple of local community organisations.



Another request from locals was for more vegan options, so Foxy's now has a vegan version of their Bento Box called Byron Bento Bites. which is a tasty selection of bites from different Asian countries. One of the most popular dishes at Foxy's is the nourishing Chicken Bone Broth. There is now a vegan ramen soup as well as other different vegan dishes. As well, the soups come in a generous bowl size or cup size and, owing to customer demand, Foxy Luu's offers reusable soup cups

At Foxy Luu's you can take your taste buds on a journey across Asia. The menu options include Vietnamese rice-paper rolls, Taiwanese Bao buns, Japanese edemame, Indonesian gado gado, just to name a few... and you can finish with a French fusion of coconut



and passionfruit panna cotta. Additionally, the menu is always changing (this isn't just restaurant rhetoric - it actually does), so there's always something new around the corner. The Yum Cha Hawkers Degustation has been so popular that it has moved from a weekly menu option to a daily one; Utku teases that it the cheapest degustation in Australia!

The food is reason enough to visit Foxy Luu's, but their focus on community and sustainability makes you feel good about supporting this business, who, as Utku says, 'want to be in tune with what Byron stands for and positively contribute'. 
schoolies and more,' says Mitchell. 'When we have the opportunity to support our community, we definitely step in.'

Celebrating good food... and cake

Liz Jackson, caterer and pastry chef, gives a hint of her training as a scientist when she speaks of recently trialling hemp as a food. 'I had never used it, so I experimented,' she says.

Liz's metallurgy career in her home town of Wollongong was short lived once friends discovered Mullumbimby. 'They said how fabulous it was - and how cheap!' After throwing her possessions onto a train, Liz drove up the coast with six friends. 'And the dog, the cat, and the whole catastrophe. I just wanted out,' she says.

The group bought 111 acres in Upper Main Arm, backed by a cliff and dropping away to valley and sea views. 'We were among the very first influx of hippies,' Liz says. 'We'd wear a lap-lap only so we could carry a joint.

The group were essentially town kids experimenting with a different way of living. 'We blundered along, trying to be farmers. It was an old banana plantation and there were a few avocado trees,' says Liz. 'My first foray into selling food was avocado vinaigrettes.'

The group built a house by hand before gradually going separate ways. Liz satisfied her own need for change by working as a ship's cook for two years, including with her preschooler daughter, Tara. 'We were very enterprising,' Liz says. 'We'd make prickly-pear pies and barter them with trawler fishermen for prawns and fish."

On returning, Liz started catering for touring musicians, including international Bluesfest acts and musicians. Liz catered for Bob Dylan on tour in Ballina in the late 90s. 'He gave me a certificate saying it was the best food he'd had on the whole tour!'

The certificate graced the wall at Luscious Foods (in the Byron Arts & Industry Estate), which was Liz's business from 2000 till 2013. A double knee replacement that took longer than expected to heal signalled the need for further change. Liz sold Luscious Foods to Zohar Flantz, the current owner, and now runs Celebrations Catering, offering catering for dinner parties and small conferences, as well as cakes for cafes, weddings and private orders.

Liz also volunteers with Liberation Larder, coordinating the menus and volunteers for more than 600 meals each week. She also does 'food

rescue', including from the recent Splendour festival.

Despite being a self-confessed 'TAFE dropout' Liz values education and continues to do pastry-cheffing short courses to ensure that her specialty cake list, featuring mouth-watering options such as Hazelnut Mocha and Moroccan, and Almond and Pistachio with fresh mint and orange-flower syrup, is up with trends. 

FIVE YEARS AGO BETHANIE JOLLY LOST HER PARTNER IN AN ACCIDENT. HE WAS A BEAUTIFUL MUSICIAN WHO HAD LONG ENCOURAGED BETHANIE TO SHARE THE MUSIC SHE HAD BEEN CREATING SINCE CHILDHOOD. HIS DEATH TAUGHT HER SOMETHING QUITE PROFOUND, AND IN THE PROCESS BETHANIE HAS FOUND HER WAY AS A MUSICIAN. SHE TALKS WITH *THE ECHO* ABOUT HER NEW ALBUM WOO ME FROM MY SLEEP, LAUNCHING AT THE DRILL HALL THIS SATURDAY WITH AN ACCOMPANYING ART SHOW BY BETHANIE.



What was the concept for the album *Woo Me from My Sleep*? Where did you draw your influences?

The journey since the death of my partner has been the biggest and most profound, and in some weird way I am grateful for it all. The depth of the grief and struggle, the sheer height of the love and the joy when it came and everything in between has felt like this great journey across such a wide expanse of human experience, revealing undiscovered parts of life and myself. I feel like we can sleep through life, or we can let life's experiences, however wonderful or challenging, wake us up. *Woo Me from My Sleep* is an invitation to life – a poetic way of saying 'Dear Life, bring it on!' After all, who knows how long we've got?

Why did you choose to include paintings?

As Joni Mitchell said, painting and songwriting is 'good crop rotation'. It allowed

me a fuller expression of what I was trying to get across. Music is just like another colour to choose from. Painting with music and singing with colour make sense to me. Doing one without the other would be like seeing a beautiful view and not hearing the birds.

Tell me about the recording. Where did you record? Who with?

I recorded with the legendary Jordan Power at Inky Studios in Byron. A friend of mine told me that if I was going to record with anyone it had to be this guy because he's the best. To be honest, I was a bit nervous about asking him, because he's worked with so many amazing artists, like Xavier Rudd and Angus Stone, and who am I? I honestly could not have picked a better human for the job! Not only did I come out with an album that sounds more beautiful than I could have ever imagined, I also scored a wonderful new friend. It was also such a treat getting to work with the incredible musicians who came out of the woodwork to play on the album – Peter Hunt on trumpet (Kooi), Bobby Alu on Samoan log drums and other magical nic naks, Matt Bone on double bass, Ben Wilson on banjo, Kara Mallory's vocals, Robbie Farrar on cello, Will Chance on congas, Benny on guitar (Benji & the Saltwater Sound System) and of course the beautiful singers I've called the River Stone Choir. I'm still pinching myself!

How do the songs change and evolve from recording to the live show?

My live performances vary quite a bit, depending on who is around. I often play solo, but I love sharing music with other musicians more than I love ice-cream. I love how much the songs can vary depending on who is adding their own zest to them. It keeps the songs alive. So it depends... but this is definitely the first time these songs have experienced so many beautiful musicians all at once. It's very exciting.

What should we expect for your live show?

For me, this show feels like the pinnacle of this huge 12-month journey. Many of the musicians who played on the album will be joining me and we are very lucky to have Peter Hunt and Chris Mallory opening the evening. I will also have the *Woo Me from My Sleep* painting series displayed for the first time, in which the paintings reflect lyrics from each song on the album. I think it will be a very special evening that celebrates the coming together of all things good and worthy in life – journeys, music, art and damn fine community.

URGE FOR THE GURGE

Formed in the mid 90s, Regurgitator rose to become one of the longest-standing Aussie bands of its generation, though it didn't begin as planned, as you would have thought.

When asked about the initial inception of the band original member Ben Ely said, 'It's funny that this band is the one that we're still playing in. When we started Regurgitator it was our side project. We were all in other bands (Pangaea, Zooerastia, Brazilia), mostly crossover metal type stuff, prog rock etc.'

'Regurgitator was a breakaway from that stuff, to an easier, experimental, more fun format where we were just open to trying out new sounds and taking on things we liked from all the other forms of music that we were hearing all around us at that time in the early to mid 90s.' That same format of absorbing music they like, then playing around with it to make it their own continues today. 'Music and the music scene has changed so radically since we started and there's a continual supply of sounds, formats inspirations that pop up and that we can absorb and regurgitate in our own style,' says Ben.

Even though they have been consistently in the musical landscape for almost 25 years, Ben says they've never really felt like they were part of any one scene or the 'music' scene really at all. 'All these different styles and movements have come and gone and we never really fitted in with any of them. We're more like the socially awkward kid up the back of the class not really included in anything and happy to do our own thing and not get too involved with what everyone else is doing. Even in the 90s scene we were always kinda outsiders just creating our own music from sounds or things we liked and used that to make up some new stuff.'

EVERYONE IN THE KINGSWOOD

WHEN I SPEAK WITH FERGUS LINACRE OF KINGSWOOD HE'S JUST TOUCHED DOWN FROM LA. EVEN THE 8-HOUR DELAY AND THE EXTENDED SYDNEY STAYOVER HAVEN'T DAMPENED HIS SPIRITS; HE'S ALERT AND INTENSELY POSITIVE AND FULL OF ENTHUSIASM FOR THEIR UPCOMING LP LAUNCH.

Kingswood's latest musical offering was conceived after months locked away in studios in Sydney and Melbourne, and then cooked up in Nashville where they made their first record.

'We flew to Nashville and finished off four or five songs,' says Fergus, who is full of praise for engineer and producer Eddie Spear.

'He was the engineer on the first record, and co-produced the second one. He's an English guy and he's hilarious. He lives in Nashville, and we went to Blackbird for a bit, and to Sound Emporium. We had a wonderful time; we were literally singing yesterday until the last moment before we left for our flight!'

Nashville has a certain musical magic – a city famed for country but now calling musicians from all genres, making it a very exciting place to be. 'We love it – it's starting to feel like a second home for us,' says Fergus. 'The studios are really nice. It's nice to get out of Melbourne so you don't have the distraction of your friend's birthday or other events. When you are recording it's good to focus on the music alone. When we are there we will wake up and walk around the lake and talk about the song and then go into the studio. We go out and have drinks after recording all day but we talk about the music. It is nonstop; you are completely immersed in it so it's a good way to be... you can just sink your teeth into what you are doing.

This latest release sees Kingswood take a bit of a departure from the style of the previous two.

'I think we are already changing our style. It just happens. We don't want to be a band that just does the same thing. I think there is pressure to make the same record again, that's what works, and our first record was like Queens of the Stone Age stoner rock; the second was experimental arty late Beatles style; and to be honest this one is like Michael Jackson! It's dancey, and we might be giving a bit too much away!'

As part of their national tour Kingswood are really looking forward to getting their feet in some good clean Byron Bay sand.

'We love coming to Byron. There is always an atmosphere of a holiday. I guess because it's a beach town and it has a festival vibe, it's a creative town, and it's also an excuse to just go there. We take a few days off. Byron is excellent. We love the people at the Northern, and hey, it's becoming movie-star capital!'





top of a mountain range. I was blown away by the power and intensity of electronic music, and proceeded to buy as much as I could on vinyl afterwards, then DJing at local raves and festivals in the years to follow.

When did you begin to produce your own music? How did that come about?

The very first self-produced electronic track happened 17 years ago, in 2001. My parents' friend had given me a program called Reason. And I spent any spare time making little electronic dub, hip-hop, and drum'n'bass beats. It was just a random hobby, so would finish maybe one or two songs a year on it.

What piece of equipment do you love the most?

Right now I'd have to say my Prophet 6 synthesiser by Dave Smith Instruments. It's a beast and I use it all the time. All the synthetic sounds on my song *Ginger Lizard* were made with this synth.

MAMMA MIA! HERE WE GO AGAIN

I love Abba's greatest hits. With gorgeous harmonies and irresistible melodies, they are perfect little gems of pop music. They were also enough to sustain a hugely feelgood movie (and I don't use the adjective as a snide pejorative) in 2008, but could the songs left over do the same again, I wondered? The problem has been solved by simply recycling the classics and supplementing them with a few neglected but not unworthy 'B-sides'. Richard Curtis is prominently listed among the writers, so you know you are in for a big dollop of cheesecake, but you can also rely on being drawn into a carefully crafted, cleverly balanced script. The story is split between Sophie (Amanda Seyfried) establishing her hotel on the Greek island where we left off last time, and the amorous adventures of her mother as a young woman (Lily James) on her way to that same island in 1979. An opening party is being prepared at which Sophie's three possible dads and the girls with whom she first partied in Greece will be reunited, but a pall is cast over the event when she splits up with her boyfriend Sky (Dominic Cooper). Cue One Of Us, a song that, though unfamiliar to me, fitted the moment like a glove. Context counts for everything in musicals and the Benny Andersson/Björn Ulvaeus compositions are slotted in as precise accompaniments to the mood of Contraction of the



the scene - even Cher singing Fernando at the end works (can you see her face move? I couldn't). Because it is all about mother and daughter, the blokes are relegated to support status, but Pierce Brosnan is easily believable as the father who comforts Sophie when she needs a hug. For all its bounciness and effervescence, however, its joyous choreography and candy-coloured cinematography, it felt to me that the film was underpinned by sadness - a sort of Proustian melancholy in remembrance of 'le temps perdu', which, despite myself, I found extremely moving. It's adorable - and better than its predecessor.

Without anybody really noticing, something we hoped had been vanquished by the cultural and social enlightenments of the last century has found a new, strident voice. Through the agency of America's conniving baby/man president and the likes of our own sub-humans, Peter Dutton and Fraser Anning, racism is again on the rise with, incredibly, white supremacists believing that they are its victims. Spike Lee's latest joint is an uncompromising and provocative reminder that turning the other cheek when confronted by such depravity is no longer an option. 
Jews, spicks, faggots'. Invited to attend the next meeting, he sends fellow officer, Flip Zimmerman (Adam Driver), in his place. The cruel ironies of 'identity' have Stallworth acting undercover among the Afro-American followers of Kwame Ture (aka Stokely Carmichael) while Zimmerman must deny his Jewishness in order to be accepted by the Klansmen. It is from Zimmerman's eyes that the scales fall - 'I had never
