Police officer charged over 2018 Byron police bashing

One of the officers involved in the arrest of a teenager in the Byron CBD last year has been charged with common assault.

NSW Police this morning issued a statement saying that an officer had been charged over the incident and would appear in court on 2 December.

The teenager was arrested by four officers in the early hours of 11 February last year in Lateen Lane.

The laying of the charge follows an investigation into the incident by the Law Enforcement Conduct Commission, which referred the matter to the NSW Director of Public Prosecutions (NSWDPP) for advice about whether charges could be laid against the officer.

The Commission found that the officer engaged in serious misconduct by applying 19 baton strikes to the young person. It made no adverse findings against the other officers involved in the young

person's apprehension.

On Wednesday the officer was issued with a Future Court Attendance Notice, and he will now appear in Byron Local Court on 2 December.

NSW Police has previously indicated that the officer is no longer serving in the Byron region.

'He is now performing duties at another command,' a NSW Police spokesperson said.

The extended delay in deciding whether or not to lay charges in

relation to the incident has drawn widespread criticism of the NSW DPP, and the system more broadly.

'The young person... and the community are entitled to know, in a timely manner, where the accountability lies in relation to this incident... and whether the officer involved will be prosecuted,' the secretary of the NSW Council for Civil Liberties (NSWCCL) Therese Cochrane said.

The NSWCCL described the delay as 'unacceptable' earlier this year.

Climate change, insurance and you

Flood and fire are no strangers to either the Byron Shire or the Northern Rivers. As the dry conditions continue and the climate emergency news keeps rolling in, people are looking for ways to understand what is taking place and how to respond.

'The Sixth Assessment Report by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC), released on 25 September, presents a disturbing assessment of the effects of climate change on the world's coasts and oceans,' said Barry Sammels, the Chair of the Australian Coastal Councils Association (ACCA).

Risks for local government areas (LGA) across Australia have been categorised in the report *Climate Change Risk to Australia's Built Environment* with analysis provided by Climate Risk Engines. The Byron Shire has been identified as, 'Highly vulnerable to both forest fire and coastal inundation' ranking 13th nationally for fire and 11th for inundation risk.

In a detailed story by the ABC (https://ab.co/2pkv6Ji) the content from the report has been used to create an interface that identifies the number of potentially uninsurable addresses, based on the risk that each suburb faces. They predict that there will be increasing insurance costs that will see 'nearly 720,000 – or one in 20' uninsurable addresses in Australia by the turn of the century.

The prediction is that uninsurable addresses in Byron Bay will rise to 6.4 per cent or 439 addresses by 2100. Mullumbimby is



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
Reformer, redeemer, creator

Gagging community or protecting councillors?

Having the opportunity to speak during the public access period of Byron Council meetings is viewed as a God-given right by many locals. So when that right is eroded, even in a small way, there's a good chance the fur and feathers will fly.

In the past, a person could express their views on one agenda item and then speak on another item on behalf of a community organisation (such as a local residents' group they are a member of).

But under the new rule imposed at last week's Council meeting each individual can only speak once.

Thursday's meeting heard that the rule had actually been in place for the past two years, but that Council had effectively ignored it until recently when one or two community members allegedly began using it as an opportunity to repeatedly slag off councillors or the institution as a whole.

Former Byron Mayor and NSW Upper House member Jan Barham was less than impressed by the move.

Ms Barham said the change had been made quietly behind closed doors without any public consultation, or any notification to the community.

'I feel I have been limited and gagged on this and other issues,' she said.

'You should be disgusted in yourselves.'

The matter ended with Ms

Barham attempting to shout over the top of Mayor Simon Richardson as he repeatedly asked her to sit down.

'I'm going ask you to stop speaking or I'm going to have to adjourn the meeting,' Cr Richardson said.

'Oh, it's all about you, Simon,' Ms Barham replied.

She then stuck a piece of black duct tape over her mouth to symbolise being gagged by Council.

Ms Barham has since contacted *The Echo* saying that following more research 'the current code is invalid due to Council's failure to properly notify that they were changing the Public Access requirements. They did it in March this year, not two years ago and there were two councillor workshops on this issue but no information in the report or advertising of it.'

But the so-called 'gag rule' may not be around for much longer.

Greens councillor Michael Lyon said he supported a return to the old situation.

'It looks like there's a majority of councillors who are willing to go back to the way it was,' he said after the meeting.

'I see why people wouldn't want it that way because it's open to abuse from the people who just engage in Council bashing.

'But I believe that you make rules for a just outcome, and I think it's fair to allow a person to represent themselves as well as an organisation during public access.'

Volunteers recognised



The important role that the Tweed Byron and Ballina Community Transport (TBBCT) provider play in the community was recently recognised. They won the **NSW Community Transport** Service Provider of the Year presented in Sydney earlier this month.

'We live in a beautiful region, but transport is a major issue for many people who cannot access public transport, or are in a tight spot, need transport for medical treatment, shopping or social outings,' said CEO Phil Barron.

Thousands of trips

Over the last year TBBCT have assisted 4,075 individuals, provided 86,624 passenger trips and travelled just over 2.5 million passenger

kilometres.

'We have a wonderful team of dedicated staff and volunteers who are known for being friendly, safety conscious, respectful and culturally aware. Our team members go out of their way to ensure our passengers get to their destinations on time and with as little stress as possible. We estimate their donation of time and skills to the community, as volunteer drivers, bus attendants and in other volunteer roles within our organisation, provides at minimum the equivalent of \$2.5m in savings to our government,' said Mr Barron.

The award acknowledges the important work TBBCT does to support people who are isolated, vulnerable or transport disadvantaged.

► Continued from page 1 predicted to rise to 10.2 per cent, Brunswick Heads will be at 16.7 per cent, South Golden Beach will hit 54.5 percent and of New Brighton addresses it will be 78.3 per cent of addresses that will be uninsurable by 2100. This prediction is based on current addresses and doesn't include potential land release in areas like the proposed rezoning of southern Mullumbimby that may be flood prone.

But this shouldn't really be news considering the Climate Change Risks to Coastal Australia report from 2009 clearly identified that 'a mid range sea-level rise of 0.5 metres in the 21st century, events that now happen every 10 years, would happen about every 10 days in 2100. The current 1-in-100 year event could occur several times a year...'

'Up to \$63 billion [in 2009] (replacement value) of existing residential buildings are potentially at risk of inundation from a 1.1 metre sea-level rise, with a lower and upper estimate of risk identified for between 157,000 and 247,600 individual buildings.'

Mr Sammels, Chair of the

ACCA has said that the recent IPCC report represents a 'wake-up call' for all levels of government in Australia.

'We are already seeing the effects of climate change in coastal areas in the form of widespread coastal erosion, more frequent and severe extreme weather events and more frequent inundation'.

The report warns that the current rate of annual sea level rise of 3.6mm is projected to increase to 15mm a year by 2100. It also warns that under a business-asusual scenario, the sea level is projected to rise up to 1.1m over the next 80 years.

'But there is currently no national plan to address these risks, which will impact on coastal communities and their residents all around Australia. The nation urgently needs a comprehensive plan to deal with the climate hazards that lie ahead, for the sake of coastal communities and the coastal environment, and to defend the extensive public and private infrastructure and assets that are at risk.'

Wildlife and bushfires – time for action

The protocols for rescuing wildlife after a bushfire are in urgent need of review, with the lives of koalas and other creatures in the balance, the North Coast Environment Council says.

Council president Jim Morrison said it was likely that hundreds if not thousands of animals such as

koalas had been injured in the recent devastating fires, or were now suffering starvation or dying of thirst.

But there were few, if any, policies in place to help

Animal assets

'Human infrastructure, including plantations are counted as assets and extraordinary effort and

resources goes into protecting and saving them,' Mr Morrison said.

'We applaud the efforts of those on the front line, particularly the volunteers, doing this important work. But koalas, gliders, owls and the whole suite of native animals need to also be considered as assets and we need to have protocols and strategies in place for

protecting and rescuing them, and those protocols and strategies need to be implemented and resourced.'

Mr Morrison said a salient example of this was koala populations of Braemar, Carwong and Royal Camp State Forests.

Recently recognised as a stronghold for koalas with an estimated koala population of several hundred, they have now been devastated by fire.

'No doubt many of the koalas perished in the fire,' Mr Morrison said.

'Some will have been burnt or injured in other ways and in urgent need of veterinary attention. There will hopefully be others who have survived physically unscathed but are now desperate for food and water.'

'The longer it takes for people to be allowed in to the area, the more likely it is koalas will die.

'We recognise that safety is a primary consideration, but surely there are methods and equipment that can be deployed to find and save injured wildlife?

'If we collectively cared enough to develop the tools we could make a difference.

Bike and PAMP plans approved

After extensive community consultation and feedback and a few hiccups along the way, the Bike Plan and PAMP for Byron Shire was passed at last week's Council meeting.

It had hit a road block to approval at the previous month's meeting when

community groups raised concerns over the need for more information to make the document accessible. They also raised concerns over the classification of strongly supported community bike routes, including the one to Shearwater Steiner School, that was left as uncategorised.

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Lainie Anderson from the Shearwater Bike Path group spoke during public access at last Thursday's meeting and reminded councillors of the significant community 'support for the shared pathway with over 8,500 signatures and more than 75 letters of written support by residents of Left Bank Road'.

At Thursday's meeting all the uncategorised bike routes were brought into at least category C and the Shearwater route was placed as a category B. They also confirmed that they would look at including the recommended route from the Main Arm Bike Group on Durrumbul Road.

'It's been a very comprehensive process with more than 700 survey responses, and approximately 150 attendees across the five workshops,' said Council's project engineer Daniel Strzina.

'With these plans finalised and adopted, we've got a clear path forward.

'Having quality plans in place with such a high level of community input and support also gives us a much greater chance of attracting State and Federal grant funding, so a huge thank you to all who were involved!'

The work of the Bunyarra Culture Collective, a group of First Nations women, will be featured at Mullumbimby's Ingenuity sculpture festival that will run in conjunction with the Mullum Music Festival (MMF) from November 14.

The first stage of the sculpture Elevate, designed by artist Ellen Ferrier, will be ready to launch at the opening of the second annual Mullumbimby Ingenuity sculpture festival on 13 November. It is inspired by the view of Mount Chincogan from the town of Mullumbimby.

Themes of global warming

The Bunyarra Culture Collective women, who have been working under the guidance of local artist Anne Leon, have created a series of hand-painted pennant flags, to be installed at the upcoming sculpture festival. Each flag will contribute to telling the story of the Aboriginal perspectives of global warming and its impact on the Earth and all of us.

'The (world's) elements are out of balance and our artwork will represent our journey from harmony to chaos and back to balance again. Working with colour and symbolism to reflect traditional storytelling elements combined with modern medium and vibrant colours of silk painting, this collaboration will explore the global crisis of our lifetime, said the Bunyarra Culture Collective

This will be one of the 30 artworks exploring environmental, political and spiritual matters to challenge the viewer to think outside of the box.

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Byron's controversial Railway Park reopening

will see Byron's refurbished Railway Park reopened and there will be some great features. However, the work on the park has not been without controversy as the site was initially re-designed without the Byron Environment Centre's (BEC) rotunda.

The alarm was raised when, without consultation, the Byron Shire Council (BSC) began removing trees at the park without informing the community or following Council procedure. The BEC had received a notice of eviction from the rotunda from BSC the previous week.

GM and Mayor's public apology

This was then compounded by the claim of Council's then general manager Ken Gainger that the Byron Bay Masterplan Team (BBMPT) had 'provided community feedback "that the BEC kiosk in Railway Square would best be located elsewhere," (www.echo.net.au/ byron-mayor-gm-apologiserailway-park-fiasco).

This was forcefully denied

by the co-chair of the BBMPT Donald Maughan leading to a public apology from both **GM Ken Gainger and Mayor** Simon Richardson.

At the time Mayor Richardson told The Echo, 'the Masterplan leadership team were thrown under a bus.'

No more of the trees were removed and the BEC continued to fight for a spot for the rotunda in the new re-designed Railway Park; in which they had been a feature and attraction, covered with local indigenous art, for 17 years. The rotunda was eventually allowed to remain in the park on the northern edge though this does not guarantee BEC a permanent home in the rotunda.

Big park reveal

Several million dollars, plenty of community angst and months of work later and the park is ready to be revealed to the community.

Included in the design are 11 artworks, created by five Arakwal Bungjalung artists, that have been sand-blasted into concrete as part of a new public art installation. They will be featured in exposed concrete in the footpaths on the western side of the park.

The art explores themes including sacred sites, tools and weapons, the practice of lore and culture, and Arkawal

'This is one of the biggest public artworks that Arakwal has been involved with, and it is extremely special to have it featured in the centre of Byron Bay,' lead artist Nickolla Clark said.

Local 17 year old Shanti Kelly-Torrens said being involved in the design process was extremely special for both herself and her

'My artwork is titled Nathungulli (Julian Rocks) and the line work represents the landscape and rock formation at this site, which is incredibly important to my people, the Arkawal people,' Ms Kelly-Torrens said.

'To see our beautiful designs that we drew by hand now permanently featured in Railway Park is so rewarding for all of us,' Ms

Illegal child strip searches: a result of failure to train police

The misuse of strip search powers by police is being investigated by the Law Enforcement Conduct Commission (LECC). Last week, evidence was heard specifically in regard to strip searches on children between 10 and 17 years old, at Splendour in the Grass 2018.

According to a statement read to the commission, a sniffer dog came and sat next to a 16 year-old girl, which then led to a strip search. She was told to strip and squat and was not provided with parent, guardian or trusted person as required by law. No drugs were were found. In fact no drugs were found in 90 per cent of searches conducted at Splendour. Seven of the searches involved minors.

Sam Lee from the Redfern Legal Centre was at the inquiry and spoke to *The Echo* saying that, at the hearing, it was clear that the police didn't have a clear understanding of the laws around strip searches.

'It really summed up that police are in a legal vacuum with little to no guidance to know the law of strip searches that should be applied on the ground,' said Ms Lee.

'2019 was the first time a procedural manual was supplied that touched on strip searches. It is clear that police don't understand what "serious and urgent" means, and that they don't understand what "reasonable grounds" actually means and how they can be met.

'A sniffer dog by itself is

not reasonable grounds for a search. Across the board, sniffer dogs appeared to have been used as the sole grounds for a search.'

Ms Lee went on to say that the police were potentially breaching the Law Enforcement (Powers and Responsibilities) Act (LEPR) by directing action – including coughing, squatting and parting of the buttocks.

Not paying off

According to local Byron Youth Service (BYS) worker, Deb Pearse, who was interviewed on Bay FM's Community Newsroom last week, the inquiry has revealed that an 'enormous amount of police resources were not paying off'.

'What we're doing doesn't seem to be working, so we need a new approach.'

However, having worked closely with local police she had seen first-hand some of the challenges they are met with on a daily basis. Byron Bay Chief Inspector Matt Kehoe had been 'great over the years', she said but 'like everyone else, they're overworked.'

Strip search fail

Greens MP David Shoebridge said that the NSW police's personal search program is fundamentally failing. According to data provided by the Police Minister 76 per cent of personal searches following a sniffer dog indication find no drugs. He says that police have advised that 99.5 per cent of sniffer dog indicated searches failed to find sufficient drugs to bring either a supply or 'deemed supply' charge.

'The NSW Police are routinely humiliating people with their aggressive searches and their own data proves that these searches are fundamentally failing to reduce drug supply,' said Mr Shoebridge.

'If any other part of the government had a program that failed three-quarters or two-thirds of the time, then it would be scrapped.

'Strip searches are often highly traumatising and, as the evidence before the ongoing LECC inquiry proves, regularly carried out illegally by police who don't understand the law.'

Cultural issue

The hearing is supposed to be reporting by the end of the year but according to Ms Lee they are still gathering information.

'Police are not well educated or informed of the laws around the strip search of a child between the ages of 10 and 17,' said Ms Lee.

'The hearing left the impression that there was no acknowledgement by the police that these strip searches are upsetting and traumatic, and should only happen in exceptional circumstances.

'It can't just be blamed on individual officers – without looking at the overall culture of the police force, the legislation and guidance to police,' she emphasised.

'The best outcome would be a review of the legislation, and changes that require police to obtain a court order before a strip search of a child.'

Ms Lee said that there needs to be a policy change in the police force in regards to strip searches and a reduction in the number of sniffer dogs at festivals in general.

Empowering people who are a little, or a big bit, different can be a huge challenge but for brothers Nathan and Simon who have started Byron Care Farm it has been about supporting their sister

Take control and create the world you want

The climate emergency has been hitting the headlines for a while now and it isn't something that can be ignored, no matter how hard the current crop of Australian leaders are trying. The cry of alarm is coming from around the world as examples of communities being devastated by fire, flood, cyclone and melting permafrost

So what can people do? This is the question that is being discussed at a free workshop in Bangalow this Sunday 3 November by Brisbane based environmental lawyer and cofounder of the Australian Earth Laws Alliance (AELA), Dr Michelle Maloney.

'It is not just about climate change – there are many ways that we live in Australia that are unsustainable,' she said, speaking to The Echo.

'The underpinning

structures that uphold the current system focus on endless growth on a planet of limited resources. Industrial society is showing that it has failed in its relationship with the living world. So the question is - how do we transform our society so we support, rather than destroy, the living world?'

What can the environment support?

The workshop is two hours long and it helps people to re-think human governance systems and economic activities. She says that we need to turn human settlement patterns on their head and start from an understanding of what we need to do to have healthy bioregions and ecosystems.

'We need to look at nature first and determine what it can support,' said Dr Maloney. 'Is it a desert, rainforest, coastal region?

How do we live, work and play here, in this place, so we can live here forever?'

She says that the shift needs to be made at all levels including conventional approaches to how we manage our legal, economic, education, political and ethical aspects of our lives. 'Our current economy and settlement patterns force nature to fit to our activities by shaping and destroying it,' she points out. 'We need to re-think how we live in the world. We need a significant transformation. I believe we can transition to happier, fairer economies, while also restoring and maintaining environmental health.'

No super for councillors leaves them vulnerable

Should our Byron Councillors and Mayor be getting paid more? Your instinctual reaction may be to suggest that they're getting paid too much already.

But did you know, that unlike like anyone else who works in the local government sector, mayors and councillors don't receive a single cent in superannuation?

Perhaps unsurprisingly, the majority of Byron's councillors believe they should receive super as well as a pay rise. All but two voted to lobby the relevant state government ministers to request just that at last week's Council meeting.

For the record, councillors currently receive \$20,288 a year and the mayor gets \$64,300.

'It's a privilege and an honour to serve on Council. but I don't think we should be penalised,' Greens councilor Sarah Ndiaye said.

'Those of us who are not independently wealthy and have to work as well as serving on Council are basically being discriminated against,' she said.

'Wherever we go, we're engaged by people from the community who want to talk about their particular local

Mayor Simon Richardson said that he and the other councillors were regularly on the receiving end of bullying,

intimidation and insults from the community.

'We get really good people who, when asked "Why don't you go on council?" say, "Why on earth would I want to do that?".

But Cr Alan Hunter voted against the motion.

'This is a job that isn't for wimps,' he said. 'I can hear the community saying "I'm not going to pay you anymore - I don't think you're worth what you're getting

'If you measured our performance in terms of the number of potholes we've filled, which is what a lot of people judge us on, I don't think we'd come up roses.'

'No amount of money is going to make us any better.'

Replanting Byron one tree at a time

Around 140 people turned up for a community tree-planting day at a private property in Ewingsdale last Saturday to launch Zero Emissions Byron's (ZEB) latest endeavour: RePlant Byron.

'RePlant Byron aims to plant 1.8 million trees in Byron Shire to accelerate our transition to zero emissions by 2025,' said ZEB Chair, Vicki Brooke. 'Once established, that will draw down 15 to 20 per cent of Byron Shire's carbon emissions and help to restore habitat and ecosystems.'

On Saturday 2,403 seedlings from Firewheel Native Nursery went in the ground previously prepared by Rossco Faithfull and the crew from East Coast Bush Regeneration. Some of the happy planters were seasoned volunteers, others were first-timers ranging in age from toddlers to octogenarians.

Purchase of the seedlings was funded by the Koala Home Restoration program, with NRMA Insurance and managed by Community Volunteers Australia. 'While many landowners are keen to restore habitat on their properties, the cost of planting and maintenance is high, so this donation is a great help,' Vicki added.

Volunteers were keen for the next planting day but ZEB said they need to wait until it rains. 'We can't plant any more trees until the

drought breaks, as there's not enough water to keep them alive,' Vicki said.

Student activist Mia Thom was strident in her support of the RePlant project. 'This is a crucial day!' she said. 'Our actions mark the antidote. Taking positive action on climate change flies in the face of a government who refuse to take action. This is the time to make powerful change.

SCU's Dr Kevin Glencross, a long-term forest replanter, regards Byron as 'one of the great hubs of biodiversity on the planet', pointing out that 'we are the custodians' along with elders such as the hoop pines.

Protesters highlight Tradelink links to Adani

Anti-Adani campaigners held a protest at the Tradelink plumbing store in Byron Bay last week, urging locals to boycott the company over its connection to the controversial Adani coal mine.

Tradelink Plumbing Centres are owned by Fletcher Building, a New Zealand company currently bidding to supply construction materials for the Adani Carmichael mine.

The protesters ranged

from families with young children through to 97-yearold Kokoda veteran Bill Ryan.

The protest was part of nation-wide actions over the company's bid to work for Adani.

Ben Pennings, a spokesperson for Galilee Blockade, said most Australians did not want the Adani mine to go ahead and called on people to boycott Tradelink until Fletcher Building 'gets out of bed with Adani'.

'Thermal coal will become the asbestos of the future,' Mr Pennings said.

'Every single company with a retail brand, including banks and insurance companies, have listened to the public and dumped Adani.

'Industrial contractors have retail brands too. Fletcher Building want to provide key construction materials for Adani but risk the reputation of their brands like Tradelink and Laminex.'

cancellations were generally owing to poor weather conditions such as high winds and swells, and occasionally because of shark sightings.

'We can't charge people for tours that get cancelled owing to bad weather,' Ms Livingston said.

Her counterpart at Go Sea Kayak Byron Bay, Kurt Tutt, said his company had been forced to cancel 35 per cent of tours over the past six months.

'It's 195 cancellations a year and it's starting to push into an area where we're struggling to maintain feasability,' he said.

Byron Mayor Simon Richardson said he supported increasing the number of tours to support the operators, which had a 'soft footprint'.

'The influences on their business can be out of their control as they're at the whim of mother nature,' Cr Richardson said.

'It employs locals and has very little impact on anyone else.'

Councillors voted unanimously to support the proposal for a variation to the operators' licences to allow for one additional sea kayak tour each day during overlap of NSW and Qld school holidays, during April and October, and for the whole period of 26 December to 26 January.

If you were dying, what do you think you would regret not doing? In 2012 *The Guardian* reported that a nurse recorded the top five regrets of dying patients. 'I wish I'd been busier' was not among them.

The top five regrets were: 1. I wish I'd had the courage to live a life true to myself, not the life others expected of me. 2. I wish I hadn't worked so hard. 3. I wish I'd had the courage to express my feelings. 4. I wish I had stayed in touch with my friends; and, 5. I wish that I had let myself be happier.

I'm going to try to remember to get off the computer, put down my phone and take a look around me. Taking the time to just sit on a random bench in a park gave me a moment to unwind and observe the world. It allowed me to disengage and notice the little things I'm so often far too busy to see.

Framing the guilty: Uluru deniers, banksters, Dutton's spies

ast week, a panel on TV discussed how Australia's First People can get recognition for being our land's custodians for 60,000 plus years, and how they can get a permanent voice in running the nation. This was on The Drum on the ABC so a 'progressive' perspective had the numbers. Everyone agreed that it will be really hard to squeeze approval out of parliament and to win a referendum, even though most Australians support those goals... because Scott Morrison, Barnaby Joyce, and dozens of their ilk keep saying no, as in no voice, no meaningful referendum.

It took two years and a thousand indigenous delegates from 13 regions of Australia to write a 'frame' for discussing recognition, called The Uluru Statement from the Heart, and while the panelists nodded reverentially in its direction, they didn't use it as the frame for their discussion; unconsciously perhaps, they used the coalition's. The Uluru mob are proposing an agreement between governments and First Nations and 'truth-telling about our history' and they invite us to walk with them on this. No demand re the constitution or for a third chamber in parliament, nor for a new flag or anthem, and yet all these smart and pleasant people on The Drum focused on how to coax the nay-sayers over the line.

The Liberal bullies and the Murdoch-Costello press have jammed their frame around this issue, and it boils down to 'we will decide what you can have, and it's probably going to be bugger-all'.

In this case the specific bullies include Morrison, Barnaby Joyce, and the loudest shock-jocks, but the fact is, that in Australia today the coalition government frames every debate with the general rule being: Everything will be decided by Boss Morrison and the Appropriate Minister.

That hasn't worked out well with energy policy – because we still don't have one; other than polluting our best agricultural land, inland water tables, and offshore marine environments, in order to ship fossil fuels to countries on the other side of various oceans, yielding vast profits to super-rich rentseekers like Gina Rinehart and Clive Palmer. Our energy bully is the perennially menacing-looking Angus Taylor

– yes, the Liberal rep who last month got *The Telegraph* to print a fraudulent accounting document slandering Sydney's mayor. Angus doesn't understand the maths of global warming either.

Take another big issue of our times: cyber-security versus privacy, and 'terrorism'. The Morrison-Dutton gang has proposed new laws that parliament and the commentariat are to discuss entirely inside the frame drawn up by professional paranoids: cops from local levels, up to the Federal Police, plus security types at ASIO, ASIS, the Signals Directorate and a few other branches of Home Affairs whom they've snuck in to keep our enemies and our citizens guessing. Paranoids-in-chief are Peter Dutton, attorney general Christian Porter, and Scott Morrison. Their frame is really simple; We decide – and no one asks questions.

Mike Seccombe warned us in last week's Saturday Paper that Dutton's troops have 'an algorithm capable of scanning the biometric data of almost every citizen of the country, held on a single central government database. Where we are all potential suspects, all the time.' And as Bernard Keane at Crikey correctly added, 'there's a bipartisan refusal even to engage in the kinds of debates over national security laws that Americans take for granted'. Our bullyboys don't want to be bothered with rights.

All of this is supposedly to protect us from terrorists - and China. Note that our national security behemoth didn't stop Labor Party politicians from accepting \$100,000 cash from a Chinese property developer, nor did it twig that a Liberal house member is a long-standing member of at least three

organisations managed by the Chinese Communist Party. Nor did they read the public posts of the Christchurch mass murderer, who was an Aussie, who could have hit a mosque in his home town of Grafton. But reading posts on 8Chan or about QAnon might turn up a few violent white men, even including a few friends of the Prime Minister.

How about banks and banking? More talking heads and 'national economics writers' are looking at the Royal Commission recommendations, and discussing options that we know won't happen. Bankers won't become more empathetic, their promises more honest, or their behaviour more honourable - and reorganising them with new rules, like less vertical integration, won't make the daily struggle for the legal tender any easier for many of us.

We could have a People's Bank, or 'industry' banks modelled on the superannuation funds that involve unions, which have out-performed all the private funds. And let's support credit unions, co-ops, and online social banks - like Bank Australia and MeBank which operate for a fraction of the costs of banks housed in bricks and plastic. Put a People's Bank branch in every post office, instead of portals for the profit-driven banksters.



Byron Shire will be in the vanguard of progressive road safety policy for the nation, and I envisage visitors going home to tell their friends







Be aware of the Byron Shire Draft Residential Strategy 2019 (DRS)

Home-owners in Sunrise Beach Estate and South East Byron Bay Town should be aware of the Byron Shire **Draft Residential Strategy** 2019 (DRS) - especially how future infill development may impact their neighbourhood.

The DRS has created 'Residential Character Narratives' (DRS pgs 77-81) to determine how infill development could be implemented to accommodate the expected increase in housing required in the Shire over the next few decades. 'Sunrise Area E1', or

'older Sunrise', is described as 'original homes... typically brick and tile, well set back from the street with relatively large lots and lawn areas'. It has 'a distinctly different character' to Area E2 (Habitat) and Area E3 (Arts & Industry Estate).

Suffolk Park has been divided into Area D1 (East) and Area D2 (West).

Byron Bay town has been divided into Area A (Town) and Area B (South/East).

Areas B, D1, and D2 have all been described in terms of a mixture of original

detached houses on large lots, and semi-detached low-rise developments – as has Sunrise Area E1. But they have also been attributed with some 'leafy' qualities that Sunrise Area E1 is devoid of.

The DRS then creates 'Character Categories' which it uses to map a future infill development strategy. Two Character Categories are relevant to the above Areas (DRS pg 82):

Subtle: small clusters of low rise medium density complementing existing

form - likely to be incremental with many of existing elements remaining.

Transitional: earmarking an area of change incorporating pockets of low rise medium density...

How the area will look and feel in the future is likely to evolve, and in some cases notably.

All of Sunrise Area E1 and Byron Town Area B have been mapped 'Transitional' (DRS pg 82). All but a few blocks in Suffolk Park Area D1 and a strip in Suffolk Park Area D2 are mapped as 'Subtle'.

Presumably this mapping anomaly is created by the narrative that, when considering future development in Suffolk Park, 'it is important that future infill development... compliments the low scale character and natural landscape qualities of this area' (DRS pg 80).

It's perplexing that Sunrise Area E1 and Byron Area B are not afforded the same consideration. Like many proud home-owners in our neighbourhood, we have spent significant time, effort and expense renovating,

extending, and maintaining our property. It's alarming that future infill development should impact the 'look and feel' of our local community 'and in some cases notably'.

A strategy is important to accommodate expected future residential growth in Byron Bay. But the impact of growth on existing neighbourhoods could be ameliorated if planned infill developments are more evenly distributed.

Further commercialising our much maligned and misunderstood kangaroos and emus places them in further peril.

Firstly, you cannot farm kangaroos or emus. Kangaroos are extremely sensitive, more so than deer, and can't be herded, penned or corralled. Secondly, surprise surprise (to most Australians) they do not breed in drought.

Wish I could say the same for our species. The in-pouch joeys will die within weeks during a severe drought and at-foot joeys will die within a

few short months.

Most importantly to those meat eaters, it takes approximately 120 kangaroos to gain the same amount of edible meat that you would get from one cow...YES, just one cow.

To genuinely save the planet, go veg/or vegan. I bet the amazing Greta is? Most of the meat from our iconic species is tough and inedible.

Female kangaroos produce only one joey annually in good times and are slow to reproduce, contrary to popular mythology. Most at-foot joeys will not reach adulthood, and the facts are such that on average,

one female macropod will only produce ONE full grown 'joey' into adulthood.

The commercial kangaroo industry has reduced the weights of adult kangaroos considerably, and thus red kangaroos are now killed at approximately only two years of age. Hardly time to reproduce.


We are already witnessing regional extinctions. The NSW Govt has already changed correction factors (counting methods) several times to favour commercial interests rather than alerting the public to some serious declines in populations.



What's old is new again – does history repeat?

If Byron Bay's Railway Park is an example, well yes - history does repeat.

One hundred years ago in 1919 on 9 September, the Northern Star ran a story on page 8 advising that the NSW State Railway Commissioners and railway inspectors visited Byron Bay to inspect the developing railway facility that linked to the expanding port facilities at the jetty.

During this visit the railway people met with the town council representatives. This was to discuss the need for increased railway sidings to reduce congestion around the beachfront port (jetty) facility.

They also talked about the need for a bridge over the road across the rail line at the Lawson St rail crossing, to prevent the considerable traffic delays when shunting was occurring, and to do something about the condition of the swamp area between Jonson St and the railway station - saying that if it was filled in, it could not only improve the health of

the town, but also enable the building of 'a pretty little park' that could be used by travellers while waiting for

Assurances were made that if the railway department did the right thing and filled the swamp, then the community would provide seating and shade trees.

Shortly after this, in October of the same year, a call to action was made by the Byron Bay Improvement Association. Mr Walker, who ran the Walker rail siding at the beachfront, suggested to use the continual build up of sand at the top of Jonson St. to fill the swamp area at the railway station. He suggested using a light rail tram line to transport the surplus sand so that the town could build its 'pleasant little park' and if the community rallied it could be completed within five years.

Then on 31 December, the Northern Star reported that at a public meeting, Mr G.F. Gibson asked the community to unite to help build a 'beautiful little park' on the land adjacent to the railway station which had recently

been filled by the railway Department at a cost of eight hundred pounds.

This 'little park' could be made splendid for the town's people if they would do their part and provide facilities which would be much availed by the community. He suggested if the various sporting clubs would run a 'queen' competition he was sure a large sum of money could be raised to get the job done. And so it was.

However, the story goes a little bit further back than that, when in 1912 the Northern Star newspaper reporting on a Byron Bay Council meeting stated that Cr Armstrong made an urgent call for action to fill the swampland between the Railway station and Jonson St, which could be used to 'build a pretty little park'.

He is the same Mr Armstrong who was involved with the building of the first jetty, the mover to get the railway to the bay, the formation of Norco, and the building of the lighthouse (he was a real doer our Mr Armstrong.) Does this sound familiar?

Fast forward to 2019 Byron Bay. Traffic congestion at the beach front, but this time not enough sand around; traffic held up getting into town at the intersection of Lawson and Jonson Streets; the poor state of the railway park and the congestion around the bus interchange at the railway station.

Well, the first development of the 'pretty little railway park' took seven years from conception in 1912, to action and completion in 1919. Our second attempt to reinvigorate our 'pretty little park' commenced three years ago, and it is to be opened on 2 November 2019. The players are the same Council, State Rail and the Community - under the guise of the Town Centre Master Plan team.

You could say we are getting better at cooperating as a community, though some people may disagree.

Like we always say, 'the more things change, the more they stay the same'.

Flying foxes happy online

Two enterprising Mullumbimby residents have come up with an ingenious way of helping local flying foxes suffering from the effects of the drought and habitat loss.

Felicity Grace and Megan Kearney have designed a flying fox feeding station using little more than a Hills Hoist and a few coat hangers.

Located on Left Bank Road between Tristan Parade and the Steiner school, the feeding station essentially recreates a food tree for the ailing mammals.

Soft fruits such as apples and pears are threaded onto coat hangers and then hung from the Hills Hoist where bats can safely and easily land and eat the fruit.

'Fying foxes are starving due to the lack of food from drought conditions, and the loss of rainforests on the east coast of Australia,' said Ms Kearney, who works for Vitality Vet in Bangalow.

'They're really important pollinators for our rainforests so we need them to have healthy populations.'

Ms Grace called on nearby residents to lend a hand.

'We're going to have some bins here [with fruit in them] and we'd like you to join this project and help feed the bats', she said.

According to Byron Council, many flying foxes are returning to their regular roosting areas after their winter migration, but the prolonged dry weather means many trees and plants have not produced the flowers and fruits that the mammals rely on.

Peter Boyd, Council's Biodiversity Project Officer, said flying foxes couldn't go without food for too long and it appeared this was resulting in an unusual number of dead and sick flying foxes being found.

'We are also seeing some flying foxes in trees that they would not normally be in, and they seem to be weak and trying to gain strength before they fly back to their roosts,' Mr Boyd said.

He advised locals against trying to pick up sick or injured flying foxes.

'WIRES volunteers are experts in this area,' he said.


He also said that Greyheaded and Black flying foxes were the key pollinators and seed dispersers in our bush.

'Without flying foxes there would be no food and shelter for our koalas, no habitat for our native birds, and no forests to enjoy,' he said.

'Flying foxes often get a bad rap in the community, but they are native animals and their place in the ecosystem is so important - we need to look after them.'

Council is continuing work on its Flying Fox Improvements project, supported by a grant from the NSW Government's Environmental Trust. The project is improving the condition of vegetation in flying fox camps at Bangalow, Byron Bay, Suffolk Park and Mullumbimby.

XR: a non-violent, disruptive climate action group

xtinction Rebellion (also known as XR) is the non-violent, disruptive climate action group demanding that governments across the world take immediate action towards the threat of climate change. XR wants citizens to know the facts about the unprecedented international climate emergency that the world is in the midst of.

The organisation is just beginning to build momentum in Australia, with the launch of its 'Spring Rebellion' entailing a series sit-ins, and die-ins, alongside activists burying their heads in sand across Sydney beaches. However, the group has been growing in size and presence across an array of countries and cities including New York, London, Amsterdam and Berlin.

Jonathan Doig, a software engineer working in research at UNSW and an arrestee at a recent Extinction Rebellion protest in Sydney said he joined XR because other modes of protesting were failing and the world cannot wait.

'I've been active on climate action since 2007 when I started the Sutherland Climate Action Network. I met with our local MP. Scott Morrison and briefed him on climate science, together with an academic, who had actually lectured Morrison on climate science during his undergraduate science degree. His only question was "how long until the poles melt?"

'We asked him to speak up about the climate emergency, and he ignored us'.

Extinction Rebellion was cofounded in 2018 by Roger Hallam and Gail Bradbrook. The movement that originated in the United Kingdom began with one hundred academics signing a call to action. This call to action launched a series of blockages and the occupying of an array of sites across central London. Citizens of London were not only engaged by the group but more importantly by the immediacy of their message, allowing the movement to grow within the



UK. The XR group began to spread internationally, describing itself as a 'non-violent civil disobedience activist movement'. The group's emphasis on 'non-violent' action follows a line of successful protests ranging from The Salt March led by Mohandas Gandhi in the 1930s to John Lennon and Yoko Ono's 'Bed-In for Peace'.

The guiding principles of the global group emphasise the importance of remaining a peaceful movement, including 'We avoid blaming and shaming – we live in a toxic system, but no one individual is to blame' and 'We are a non-violent network – using non-violent strategy and tactics as the most effective way to bring about change'.

Globally the group uses the logo of an hourglass in a circle, with the circle representing earth and the hourglass representing the fact that time is running out for many species, including humans.


Whilst the specific objectives of XR are tailored to each country, the guiding principles are universal. The demands of Extinction

Government must tell the truth by declaring a climate and ecological emergency, working with other institutions to communicate the urgency for change.

ACT NOW

Government must act now to halt biodiversity loss and reduce greenhouse gas emissions to net zero by 2025.



The extinction symbol represents the threat of holocene extinction (or sixth mass extinction) on earth; the circle represents the planet and the stylised hourglass is a warning that time is running out for many species.

BEYOND POLITICS

Government must create, and be led by, the decisions of a Citizens' Assembly on climate and ecological

The group is gaining traction not only for its public disobedience tactics but also the series of arrests and the police brutality that activists have been subjected to. However, XR emphasises that it 'welcome(s) everyone and every part of everyone' and within this, acknowledges that not everyone is

willing to be arrested and that this is okay. Their guiding

values further enforce that all citizens who believe in the demands and principles of XR are allowed to act in the name of XR.

Christine Freels, a former strata manager and now a fulltime climate-action activist spoke about XR's principles, stating:


'XR is the best chance we have to get the necessary changes. XR welcomes everyone, and everyone can play a part in saving our future. We owe it to our kids and grandkids to give them a planet they can survive on.'

'I have adopted grandchildren: Alex is almost 2 and Ava is 4 weeks old. It breaks my heart to think of what is facing them if we don't act. I want to be able to tell them that I was part of saving their future, not part of the problem'.

'I am proud to be revolting.'

Extinction Rebellion now has the challenge of exercising their inclusive values and maintaining their global presence to ensure their demands are met. XR is working to engage people from a diverse range of backgrounds, to unite together towards the shared urgency the planet requires.

The movement is now holding '100% family-friendly events' in a further attempt to demonstrate that all are welcome and that this crisis transcends barriers of age.





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

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Turns out the best things in life aren't things

hese days being extremely rich has become rather cool. Social media is saturated with images of 'successful people', and we are constantly bombarded with stories of self-made multimillionaires and billionaires, who went from being nobodies to somebodies.

The message is: if you are smart and hard working enough, you might be able to join the club. Then, and only then, will you be worthy to leave the world of ordinary humans and enter the realm of the demi-gods.

Wealth seems to provide, not only material rewards and pleasure, but an elevated status, respect, admiration - and even a sense of being loved: your name is remembered, your presence noticed, you are heard and ministered to.

However, what truly makes us happy is not the amount of stuff we possess, but safety, and to truly love and be loved – things that don't require a big bag of cash and, in many cases, can't be bought

We might know this already, but for some reason many of us still cling to the dream that wealth will make us happy.

So let's break this down. We don't need to be extremely wealthy to feel, and be, safe in the world. Knowing that we will always have a roof over our heads, food on the table and medical care, is enough to satisfy our basic need for safety.

Studies have shown that happiness in Australia actually decreases after someone's income reaches \$159,000 per

year. Interestingly, that figure is higher here than anywhere else in the world.

I think it says a lot, that many of us are able to flourish in the simpler pleasures of existence, earning barely a fraction of that income.

The truth is, that if our basic needs for food and shelter are met and you have a bit of extra cash for toys and experiences, then you have the material requirements for happiness.

However, it seems that, in a society that depends on people telling themselves that they need to collect the diverse badges of wealth to justify their value as human beings, wealth has become a means, not only to receive love in the form of respect and admiration from others, but also a sense of self-worth.



This is despite the fact that the opposite seems to be true.

Rather than bringing meaningful connection, money simply attracts sycophants and hangers-on.

Studies show that as you become richer, you are actually less able to connect with other people. Several papers suggest that wealth suppresses empathy, which is one of the foundations of connection.

One study reveals that rich people are less able to feel compassion towards children with cancer, and another shows that luxury car owners are less likely to stop for pedestrians than those who own cheap cars.

I would like to suggest that, considering the true origins and psychological impacts of being wealthy, it brings no personal, soulful gains at all.

In fact it is destructive.

Research has shown that being wealthy has a significant environmental impact. Wealth, and the obsession with attaining it, are feeding the rampant consumerism that is destroying the planet. It doesn't matter how much you recycle or which so-called sustainable

diet you chose. If you have money, you spend it, and your attitudes have little bearing on the amount of resources that your lifestyle consumes.

However, like it or not, we have wealthy people in our community.

Some might argue that we should just take it from them, but I think a more realistic approach is to think long and hard about the true personal responsibility that comes with being wealthy.

For far too long, we have relied on the excuse that the system rather than the individual, is responsible for wealth inequality.

The simple fact is that inequality comes down to individual human beings and the decisions that we

You might not think there's anything wrong with accumulating

wealth, but there is clearly something wrong with keeping it all for yourself.

You might say that a police officer or a soldier has no choice but to abandon their moral conscience even in the name of an unjust law, but the wealthy clearly do have a choice, and a powerful one, about how to spend their money.

There is an opportunity for the wealthy to meet the responsibility (response-ability) that comes with the power of having a positive impact on the world.

It starts with the person standing right next to you, the person living in your street, or the people in your family or community who haven't had the same opportunities that you have had. From there, we can tackle the biggest and most challenging issues that face our world.

By choosing to ignore your responsibility to do good, you are wilfully choosing to keep others deprived, and to squander resources that could be used to have a genuinely positive impact on people's lives. Why not give people something to genuinely love and respect you for?

So let's all take a cold hard look at the morality and respectability of being wealthy, and the consequences of our silence, our apathy, our actions, choices and even our desires.

What's our trusty government doing about the climate catastrophe you ask?

Australia likely to be alone using Kyoto credits to meet Paris emissions targets

Much of Australia's emissions reduction policy depends on a deeply flawed carry over credits that other countries have forgone owing to their dubious logic. In a Senate estimates committee Department of Environment and Energy officials have admitted 'We are not aware of other countries that are intending to use carry over. Just Australia'.

Emissions reduction policy dependent on make-believe tech

Australia's emissions reduction policy relies heavily on assumed reductions that will be made from technologies that don't actually exist yet. In the same estimates, DoEE officials were unable to provide details of much of the technologies that the projected figures were based on. Greens Senator Sarah Hanson-Young summed it up: 'You're not serious. This

is a third of your emissions reduction policy and you can't tell me what technology improvements you're banking on in order to produce this outcome?'

DoEE deputy secretary Evans responded 'When we produced the document and gave the advice to the government, it is a general concept of technological improvements that will happen over time. If we were able to make them specific, we would have done that.'

The campaign directly addresses the absence of safety standards for 97% of mobile phone users globally, including children and pregnant women. to protect children by minimising EMF exposure levels in an increasingly wireless tech environment.




Take a trip to Tenterfield...

If you're bored in the Shire and looking for a Sunday drive, then take a hike over the range to Tenterfield and support the town that's doing it tough.

Established in 1851 and with just 2800 residents, the heritage town is a classic spot to visit and drop some coin. While famous in the 70s for Peter Allen's hit song *Tenterfield Saddler*, more recently Tenterfield has become well known for copping some of the state's most devastating drought, its dire water shortage and the Mt. McKenzie bushfire.

Just last week however, the town has seen a glimmer of hope with the strike of a new waterbore. Elated, the mayor has announced that the town is open for business and is encouraging visitors to come and enjoy the shire. Last week, local Coorabell farmers Ken and Jean Wadsworth did exactly that, taking a fun road trip there to show some support over the range. They said, 'While the town is doing it very tough, the community showed us amazing hospitality and had many smiles to share'. They added that there are many beautiful outdoor activities; hiking, biking, horse-riding, and golfing – as well as a number of museums, and great places to eat!

Coincidentally, on the same day the Mt.
McKenzie fire started, 6 September 2019, a
passionate couple opened up their three-yearin-the-making dream, a traditional German cafe
named Rosenhof. Obscure? You could say that,
but there is a strong vein of German heritage in the
New England area, as well as a lot of history in the
house itself; The original homestead (built in 1858)
was the home of the first NSW premier and home

to Australia's first surviving quintuplets. It was also Tenterfield's first bank and it is now heritage listed. Christian and Kirsten, originally from Frankfurt

Christian and Kirsten, originally from Frankfurt and Föhr, run the place in accordance with German

tradition and the food goes well beyond the stereotype of schnitzel and beer. They make their own rye bread, Laugen bretzels, cakes and biscuits and grow their own food, or source food from around the region. Traditional German wheat beers, pilsner, cider, homemade ice-cream, Weisswurst, and the best Dutch cream potatoes you'll ever taste can be found at Rosenhof, not to mention the warm hospitality and stunning garden surrounds. 'We wanted to revitalise this amazing heritage property and turn it into a place that shares the story, and serves food we love, in a way we like it', says Christian.

The independent brewers

An enthusiastic and decidedly independent crowd gathered last Saturday afternoon at Stone and Wood's Byron brewery, in fact, at independent brewers throughout the nation, for the inaugural Indie Beer Day.

Of course, independence means different things to different people. It might mean financial independence for some individuals. In the media, independence means that you choose to run stories, or not, because you want to, rather than because some external government body or corporate structure tells you to.

Independence for brewers in the Independent Brewers Association (the IBA and yes, you can still be in an association and be independent) means that they are 'owned and operated independently and value authenticity, localism and the communities built around them'.

The Indie Beer Day event is the initiative of the IBA with the goal of recognising the importance and diversity of independently brewed beer and the industry's contribution to communities. It's also important that people speak up for their local, and favourite, independent brewers, as pubs often allocate their taps, under pressure from the big boys, so that independent brewers don't get a look-in.

For Stone & Wood they feel free to run their brewery and their business in the direction that they, as a team, want to take it, free from instructions from external entities and large trade shareholder schemes.

Their team really is 'local' – 80 per cent of their team have shares in the company and the company invests in its staff through personal and professional funds and childcare schemes as well as returning profits to the workers.

In addition, the brewer also has a foundation



that raises money for local charities to ensure the strength of the local community as a whole.

As a result the whole event had a really nice vibe. Because the Byron brewery is used for pilot batches, I got to try a couple of beers you wouldn't normally see, and my favourites were the Bellini (a sour beer, nothing like the sweet cocktail unless you count the hint of peach), and A Day at the Races (another sour beer, possibly named after Queen's first entirely self-produced album – if you were thinking independently). It was a beautiful day and we were drinking beer with free snacks, so I'll definitely be back next year!



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What can bees teach us about cooperation?

They've been around for more than 22 million years, maybe in some ways they're more evolved than us newcomers, modern humans, with only 220,000 years on Earth.

At Byron Honey they want to know how we can translate principles of swarm intelligence (SI) into their work practice. SI concepts are also used in developing artificial intelligence and in the context of cellular robotic systems. In a beehive 50,000 bees live successfully and productively in a selforganising structure.

At Byron Honey some of the scientific findings on this topic have been transposed into key principles posted on the wall in large letters, and they boil down to such simple things as; Seek Diverse Solutions, or Create groups with mutual respect and shared interests or Love each moment as it arises

or Developing emotional intelligence: what would it feel like to walk in the other's shoes?

Byron Honey managing director Horst Tietze says that they draw from research by Daniel Goleman on EQ and insights gained in Tibetan Buddhism such as the four immeasurables of compassion, loving kindness, empathic joy and equanimity.

'We use the term 'Byron Honey Hive Intelligence' to reflect our aspirations. We are encouraging periods of silence by abstaining from small talk to develop mindfulness, yet we encourage singing and laughing during production to build social cohesion. It's not uncommon at the end of the day for the entire team to fall into a shared dance to the tunes of Xavier Rudd or Black Eyed Peas. Another posting on the wall as guiding principle reads: 'The most important Hive quality: having fun together the

natural way - singing, dancing, laughing', he says.

Byron Bay Honey is a registered trademark, the company is fully HACCP approved and one of the oldest raw food businesses in the Shire. 'What started as a cottage industry on a local back porch has turned into the largest regional honey distribution company', says Horst. 'Initially we supplied only health food stores, green grocers and smaller supermarkets. Through sheer grit and determination, we acquired much coveted vendor contracts supplying five DCs for more than 500 Woolworths and IGA supermarkets since 2005.'

'We see ourselves as an incubator to test

assumptions made by swarm intelligence in real life. What will workplaces of the future look like? Ralph Waldo Emerson believed all things are divine and said: 'All life is an experiment. The more experiments you make the better.' His spirit resonates with us at Byron Honey and is captured in each jar of honey you purchase at the store.

'And on 9 November we're having a dance party to celebrate our 25th birthday, a proof that hive intelligence is alive and well, and the future has already started in the Shire.'






BIG IDEAS TINY HOUSES



More than an architectural movement, the tiny house movement is a social movement that advocates a simpler lifestyle that is more environmentally aware and less reliant on the extravagances of modern life. This is not to say you can't still have a little bit a luxury. You can have a completely off-grid tiny home whilst basking in an interior that delivers a minimalist, Scandinavian design and still have all the bells & whistles when it comes to appliances.

Some might be wondering, what's the difference between a tiny home and a granny flat? Some tiny homes could be considered granny flats, but not all granny flats are tiny homes. The main structural difference would be that most tiny homes are built on a purpose built trailer - making them mobile and subject to road rules in terms of weight and size. If you ask a tiny home owner, however, they will probably tell you it's the philosophy that's the main difference. And I would have to agree. The intention of tiny homes goes so much deeper than just having a secondary dwelling or small mobile home.

Often, when people go to turn their big ideas of tiny living into actionable steps, they get lost when it comes to the rules and regulations around it. This can be a bit more difficult as there is not a universal law. Each local council will have their own regulations around tiny houses and granny flats, and you need to be mindful of the approvals and design requirements of existing State Government and local council planning controls.





Byron Shire Council has a 'Tiny house fact sheet' (available at www.byron.nsw.gov.au/Services/Building-development/ Do-I-need-approval/Development-and-Building-Fact-Sheets)

However, it would be well worth talking to council staff and your own planning consultants to make sure you understand local compliance before commencing your project.

Tiny dwellings can be designed and built using sustainability/ eco-principles and provide affordable housing whilst minimising the carbon footprint.

They are emerging in varying forms and locations, such as granny flats (or secondary dwellings) to complement existing housing, groupings of dwellings in established urban areas, converted sheds and beach shacks on larger, isolated properties, and in mobile caravan formats.

If you've got all the rules sorted, you may want to widen your search for inspiration, or even to pick up a trick or two that veteran tiny home livers have picked up along the way. The YouTube channel Living Big In A Tiny House, run by New Zealander, Bryce Langston, is another fantastic resource that takes you all over the world, exploring tiny homes and meeting their owners; from right here in Byron Bay to the deserts of New Mexico, from the rainy Pacific Northwest to, of course, the beautiful landscapes of New Zealand.

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
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
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CLARE BOWDITCH MY KIND OF GIRL

Often we see successful people and we think that they've never struggled. That somehow their lives were easier than ours. You could be mistaken thinking that about Clare Bowditch talented, articulate, beautiful. She's a woman who knows how to command a stage.

'I think a good 20 years has allowed me the luxury to process' laughs Clare. 'It's [writing] not a magic wand!'

In writing this book Clare tells the story of her warm and connected family, who faced tragedy when her sister Rowie developed an illness and died. Clare was just 6 years old when this happened and it's clear in her memoir, and in her reflections, that grief and guilt are tightly intertwined. Clare was aware of this and so worked with a therapist at the time of writing to support the more complex trauma.

'I speak of the nature of memory and how it is built up of sights and sounds. I took writing this seriously. Often I didn't know if I had a memory, or I had been told a story or seen a photo. Learning is circular. To love Rowie, I had to let go of my guilt, so I could let her go.'

'In informing identity we are natural storytellers and we want to belong to a clan. We have shared stories, and we want to tell the truth - to allow for ambiguity and memory, and in the process of writing

this, I had to rely on back-up from my beautiful family.'

In Your Own Kind of Girl, Clare traces back her sense of exile from her own body when, as a little girl, a boy said she was too big to be a girl. This was a defining moment for her when she suddenly sensed her 'wrongness'. Even though she was only young, it was the seed of what later became an eating disorder where she fluctuated from thin to fat, experiencing the attention throughout with extreme discomfort. Connecting lovingly to her physical presence in the world is a struggle that Clare openly shares with readers. As a woman, it is profoundly reassuring to know that someone else has felt like that too. Even with body-positive parenting and role models it can be hard to give children a robust love of themselves.

'We have half a chance for giving our sons and daughters a framework for loving their bodies, but they are up against a world where they don't always fit - sometimes I am thin and sometimes I am fat - and it's fine whichever I am.'

This is a heart-breaking, wise and at times playful memoir. Clare's own story told raw and as it happened. A reminder that even on the darkest of nights, victory is closer than it seems.

With startling candour, Clare lays bare her truth in the hope that doing so will inspire anyone who's ever done battle with the inner critic. This is the work of a woman who has found her true power – and wants to pass it on.

At 21 Clare had a profound realisation about the way she was feeling. 'I realised that it was the story about myself that caused the panic and anxiety. From the moment I knew that, I knew I would recover. I knew that this was a book I was going to write - but I felt like I needed to let time pass so I could slowly, slowly tame my inner critic – so I could pass on what helped me, so that people know they are

not alone with their complex grief.'

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WHITE SHAME

White people have a lot to be sorry for. Our pale-skinned privilege is the passport I and many others use to glide through life. We see this as our birthright. Every day our pages are stamped with unquestioned approval. We may pass through. Career doors open easily, people smile on the bus when we sit next to them, landlords happily hand us the key to their homes, banks approve our mortgages, police don't do a car search when they pull us over for a random breath test, shop assistants don't follow us when we're browsing, and when we're gathered in a park with our family having a few beers, no one slinks past in fear. It's just a barbecue with some Aussie larrikins, not a mob of 'drunk abbos'.

I have two black sisters – beautiful, strong women who haven't had the easy passage through life that I have. They've experienced racism, whether overt or institutionalised, their whole lives. When I was a little girl I once refused to walk to school with Shirley because I got teased for having a black sister. I crossed the road. My grandmother found out and I got the back end of a wooden spoon. I love her for it. I still feel ashamed that I crossed the road.

White people cross the road every day – we take no responsibility. That's our shame. It's a white-washed world. White people, predominantly white men, control the narrative around culture and identity. They decide when it's Australia Day. They decide that celebrating nationhood, on the day of white invasion shouldn't offend. After all, isn't everyone 'Australian' now? They also define what 'Australian' is. They decide when it's Sorry Day. They decide what to say sorry for.

It's 2019 and Ken Wyatt is the first Indigenous Australian to hold the position as Minister for Indigenous Australians. White men congratulate themselves for that – but why has it taken so long? Previous title holders have been people like Mal Brough and Philip Ruddock – just a couple of names in the long list of privileged white men (and women) entrusted with representing the interests of Australia's First Nations people.

In Queensland, until the mid 1980's it was still an offence to be in the company of Aboriginals for what was deemed an unnecessary length of time. Indigenous imprisonment rates are almost twice those of the non-Indigenous community. Indigenous life-expectancy is more than a decade less than non-Indigenous. The story of the trauma of the stolen generations was, in turn, stolen by politicians like Kevin Rudd who nabbed himself a Martin Luther moment with the Apology to Australia's Indigenous people. His hero status eclipsed the content. White men congratulating themselves for having the courage and compassion to say 'sorry'. So how many have embraced the content of that apology? By the crowds gathered to climb Uluru last Friday, on the last day the rock could still be legally climbed – I'd say not many. It's clear Pauline Hanson's statement 'Our country is not based on Aboriginals' is both offensive and true. The Anangu were given Uluru back, 34 years ago, and that's how long it has taken for them to enact 'no climbing' as a law for all at this culturally significant site. The hordes of (nonindigenous) people who turned up on the last day showed what absolute disregard many have for the cultures and heritage of Indigenous Australia. Pity we can't be immunised against White Entitlement. We're morally repugnant. A global embarrassment. I suggest we start a movement, in an attempt to repatriate all the harm and hurt we've caused. It would be like Black Pride, but we could call it White Shame. Billboards around the country could show Pauline, stuck between the rock and her hard face. We could also appoint an Indigenous person as Minister for White-Fella Affairs. Just one portfolio mind you. White Shame Day could be every day, but I have the perfect date – 26 January!

SOCIALIST ACTION MEETS MANPOWER

It started as a bit of a joke – a bunch of mates singing Russian folk songs. Their first repertoire was about three songs. Since then, the men of Dustyesky have been raising the vodka bottle, and the roof, with performances at festivals around the country – and of course Mullum Music Festival. *The Echo* spoke with Andrew Swain, the choir director...

Legend has it that the idea for Dustyesky came about after too many vodkas with Glen Wright, Mullum Music Festival Director, who was looking for a Russian Choir for the festival back in 2014 and, being a 'ratbag' with a love of vodka and Russian folk songs, you committed yourself to organising just such a choir. How much truth is there in that story?

Of course comrade, there is this thing called 'truth'. Even leaders of powerful nations in all their great wisdom have difficulty defining this. In Dustyesky we prefer to focus on 'details', and as such, you have many excellent details, especially the bit about 'legend'. And I would like to clarify that there is no such thing as 'too many vodkas', and I do not so much 'organise', unless that is correct English word for herding cats?

Is it true that not one of the choir members, not even you, the organiser, speak any Russian?

There it is again, that word – truth. We have many true Russian friends and very handy access to Google translate.

That being the case, what was / is it about Russian folk songs and communist anthems that piqued interest for you and your Mullumbimby comrades?

The great and powerful songs and anthems of the Soviet Republic do more than just pique interest. They sweep you off your feet and consume your heart with passion! Through the songs we sing, we find spirit and comradeship, joy, tragedy, and a portal to the unspoken unity that binds us together as humans.

Nowadays you have played at more than just the Mullum Music Festival. Where else have you and your choir performed?

Our collective has had great opportunity to travel your fine country. We have sung in Melbournova, Bondi, Brisbynh and the marvellous Bellingengrad to name a few, plus little festival called WOMAD. And we go back out to the sticks again, at end of year, to sing at little village of Woodford.

Legend also has it that you have received quite a bit of interest from Russian Media. How did that come about, and what did they think of you guys way over here in Australia singing their national songs – without any understanding of, or connection to, their language or their country?

Is not legend – is true! We have been on Russian TV all over the land. They go crazy for us! Maybe they don't sing songs so much any more, so when they hear us sing *The Sacred War* they get all fuzzy-feeling like snuggling up to grandma's beard when they were babies.

Has anything come of talk of Dustyesky touring Russia one day?

If Edinburgh Festival is in Russia, then yes, we are going to Russia.

You guys are once again singing at Mullum Music Festival this year 14–17 November, What can people going to the festival expect from your performance?

Beautiful hairy men deliver songs as powerful as the Volga river, as light as the touch of permafrost on the tundra, and cheeky as Putin's budgie in smugglers.



FIESTA TIME!

For the past 14 years, the Byron Latin Fiesta has brought the Latin Love to town. And it's happening again – celebrating our vibrant Latin loving community – with invited teachers and dancers and people who just can't stop moving! Festival Director, Sky Blue, spoke with *The Echo*.



What are the highlights for this year's Latin Fiesta?

International artists, Kim & Geo, are coming all the way from Canada to teach and perform Bachata and Mambo. Two fantastic live bands: Bachatame, Australia's only 100% Bachata band, playing on the Friday night; and El Timbon, a 12-piece Cuban Salsa and Timba band, playing on the Saturday night. The addition of lots of Brazilian Zouk due to local interest and popular demand and, for the first time ever at the event a Tango Milonga on the Sunday evening.

How has the program changed and grown since your first year?

It has changed and grown a lot and will keep growing and changing. When the event started back in 2006 we hosted local and national artists only, after a few years we added the international element and increased our reach with national artists, bands and DJs. It started as a three night and two day event, and then we added a pre-party to make it a four night event, plus after-parties to cater to everyone's hunger for social dancing. The number of dance workshops has doubled, and the event now has 40 workshops over the weekend, plus master classes, and an immersion workshop. We added a beginners' hub to entice more first-timers, or those new to dance to attend. And, for this year we have added a Tropical Pool Party and a Tango Milonga!

Tell me about the Latin community here...

In the Byron Shire the main Latin groups are Sassy Salsa, run by Daniela, the Latin Dance Collective run by Leyla & Robert, Wild Things Zouk run by Joe. I believe the rhythms capture you and take your soul on a journey; they can help to take your troubles away when you get lost in the dance moment, and it's also good for fitness. Latin music such as Salsa and Reggaeton is upbeat and energetic, while Bachata or Kizomba for example is a bit more mellow and sensual. So people can be drawn to the energy, the connection and more.

Who is attracted to Latin dance? Can anyone come along? Do you have to know the dance styles already?

People from every different culture you can think of, and all age groups. Dance is universal and anyone can be

attracted to it. Everyone can learn to dance. If you have not had dance in your culture or upbringing you can still learn, you just need the desire and the will. At festivals like the Byron Latin Fiesta it's a good idea to try out some beginner dance workshops if you are new to dancing, you might be surprised where it takes you.


Can you tell me about some of the classes?

WINNERS AT BYRON BAY FILM FEST

The 2019 Byron Bay Film Festival (BBFF) came to a spectacular close with the announcement of the winners of the BBFF Best Film Awards.

The event, now in its 13th Year, attracted entries from all over the globe.

BBFF Director J'aimee Skippon-Volke said, 'Whilst our programme featured a number of the strongest Australian titles to be in the festival circuit of 2019/20, we have decided it is important to bring BBFF back to the roots that independent festivals were born from. It is for this reason our nominees are made from independent films that are not represented here in Australia by local distributors. This allows our awards to support these filmmakers as they continue on the festival circuit, and bring more attention to the work they do.'

The winner of both Best Film and Best Docu**mentary** was the powerful and enlightening In My Blood It Runs which offers a rare and compelling insight into the life of 10-year-old Arrente and Garrawa boy, Dujuan. The audience was moved to laughter, tears and horror as they watched Dujuan navigate his role as both a traditional healer; and child beholden to the Australian education system.

The Winner of **Best Dramatic Feature** was taken out by Australian filmmaker Josephine Mackerras whose debut feature, Alice addressed a host of ethically fraught questions around society's relationship with prostitution.

After writing the film in English, Ms Mackerras decided she didn't want to wait any longer for funding, or to deal with the restrictions of the Australian Film Industry.

Ms Mackerras got the script translated into French, shot the majority of it in her own apartment, using her son and other first-time actors - who gave astounding performances - and delivered a finely tuned debut. Alice previously took out the SXSW Grand Jury Prize.

The Winner of **Best Experimental Film** was Continuum 01 – South in Self Exile. The visual and sonic essay drew mixed responses from the audience, leaving few people unmoved.

Directed and produced by Byron Bay landscape artist Jack Bailey the film was described by some as, 'Mesmerising, like nothing I've ever seen before,' whereas a vocal minority caused controversy amongst the otherwise appreciative audience.

The locals award for **Best Byron Film** went to **Angus McDonald** for *Manus*.

This short film shows the plight of refugees who have been detained on Manus Island in PNG by the Australian Government for the past six years.

Ms Skippon-Volke said, 'The Byron Film category is awarded to a film that encapsulates the spirit of our region and the strength of our local filmmaking talent. Human rights is an important issue to our community and Angus is an artist who uses his gift well in highlighting these issues.'

Brothers Jack and Peter Thompson also received an award honouring them for their work supporting and boosting the Australian Film Industry.

The announcement of the winners was followed by the Australian Premiere of *The Cave* - Tom Waller's dramatisation of the rescue of the Wild Boars football team from Tham Luang Cave, in northern Thailand.

Mr Waller was in attendance to introduce the film, saying 'I'm really excited to be showing the film to an Australian audience here at the Byron Bay Film Festival. It was a remarkable story of ordinary people, who became heroes.'

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
FREE COMEDY AT THE BIG GIG

Jessica Pressler admits, while writing the article, that her main subject known as Rosie – didn't always tell the truth. And although this is a true story, it is hard to gauge how much of it is true, if based solely on the article.

The film focuses on the exhilarating manipulation of the Wall Street brokers, and the high-flying life that the theft enabled the strip

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


