Bruns celebrates Christmas

Brunswick Heads woodchop turns 60!

The Bruns woodchop, held in Banner Park, celebrates 60 vears in 2020.

From January 15 to 18, there are 36 events for men, women and juniors in chopping, sawing, tree, relays and chainsaw competitions.

Organisers say, 'The carnival has attracted some of the best competitors in the world, including our own Australian representative team and axemen from the USA, Sweden and New Zealand.

'Aussie Laurence O'Toole, who had won the 2018 Stihl Timbersports World Championship, qualified to defend the 2019 title in Sweden but was just beaten for the title. Some of the Australian team members including Brad de

Losa, a Brunswick Heads favourite, Laurence O'Toole and Mitch Argent will be competing here.

'These three axemen, together with Glen Gillam and Brayden Meyer, formed the Chopperoos team and claimed their sixth world championship. Brayden also had success in winning the Stihl Timbersports world champion title.

'Two Australian titles are up for grabs, with a final on both Friday and Saturday night. The Tree Championship final will take place on Friday afternoon. There are seven finals on Saturday night, including the three man relay of underhand, standing and tree.

'The final event is the State of Origin NSW take on Queensland, who currently lead the 43 year competition with 23 to 20 wins.

'We encourage spectators to come along – there is no admission charged.

'Come along and cheer them on. Encourage the juniors along as they are most probably the next generation of competitors. We have many instances of generations of the one family appearing at Brunswick Heads'.

Organisers say that subject to the appropriate permits and weather on the night, the annual family fireworks will be happening at Banner Park on Saturday January 11 from 9pm.

Developer wins costs against Council over large Byron DA

A contentious large fourstorey mixed-use building proposal at 4 Marvell Street, Byron Bay is likely to go ahead after Council lost its court appeal against developer Scott Emery.

And as a result, the court have ordered that Council pay the costs of the appeal to the developer.

The decision may lead to increases in height and floor space ratio (FSR) within the CBD by other developers

seeking similar outcomes. The DA proposes a

24-room hotel, a ground-floor restaurant, rooftop pool and bar above two ground floor retail tenancies. A 18-car-bay basement is also proposed.

Commissioner J Duggan dismissed the appeal in the Land and Environment Court on December 17, which challenged a previous decision in July 2019 by **Commissioner Smithson** regarding questions of law.

Specifically it related to exceeding floor space ratio (FSR) and height limits as prescribed in Council's planning policy.

Commissioner Smithson considered at the time that the 'development will not create an adverse precedent given all of the circumstances of the case'.

In her judgment, she wrote, 'My decision in supporting the height breach should therefore not be construed as supporting four-storey development in the town centre, per se. 'I accept such an outcome



would not accord with the masterplan vision or expectations of the Byron Bay community as outlined in the masterplan'.

Council's legal representatives claimed the original decision by commissioner Smithson 'erred in law in the determination of the height objection, in that she did not form the necessary opinion required by cl 4.6(4)(a)(ii) in that she failed to form an opinion as to consistency with the objective in cl 4.3(1)(a) of the Byron LEP (the Objective).'

Additionally lawyers representing Council claimed 'by considering that the objective did no more than restate the need for compliance with the height control, the commissioner did not form the necessary opinion as to whether the written objection had adequately addressed the matters as required by cl 4.6(4)(a)(i).'

Furthermore, 'The commissioner erred in law in the determination of both the height and the floor space ratio (FSR) objection in that she was required to make separate and distinct findings pursuant to cl 4.6(3) (a) and (b) and contrary to that requirement the

Commissioner conflated those requirements.'

The owner of 7 Marvell Street has proposed a similar development, with a three-storey building made up of 29 one and two-bedroom hotel rooms, a swimming pool, health spa and shops.

In responding to Council's appeal, commissioner J Duggan said, 'While the commissioner's reasons are in some respects not sequential and/or with some looseness of expression, the reasons when read as a whole, without an eye for error, discloses the reasoning and the findings of satisfaction required.

Loose language

'Of particular significance to this finding is that the commissioner expressly found that the height objection met the requirements of cl 4.6(3) at [141].'

While admitting the 'unfortunate loose language' adopted by commissioner Smithson in her previous judgment, commissioner J Duggan accepted that the 'building was designed such that the non-compliance with the height standard would be largely imperceptible.'

A local philanthropic organisation has announced 33 not-for-profit organisations will benefit from grants in 2020

Ballina-based Northern Rivers Community Foundation (NRCF) say the donations provided by its members 'are invested year after year.

'Only the profits are given away each year in the form of grants.

'Our grants touch on issues such as people's right to health, employment, higher education, happiness and creative expression, and the challenges of living in a regional community.

While the 2020 grant recipients are located across the Northern Rivers, Byron Shire not-for-profits that will benefit from cash donations included The Buttery, Liberation Larder, Byron Youth Service, Byron Herb Nursery, Bangalow Men's Shed, Zero Emissions, Bangalow Koalas, Brunswick Valley Landcare and Byron Youth Theatre.

Byron beneficiaries

Rehab organisation The Buttery will receive \$7,200 for its Youth Connection: Early Intervention Program for At Risk Youth; 12-20 yearolds with substance misuse, behavioural and/or mental health issues.

Liberation Larder will employ a trained social/ mental health care worker at a cost of \$9,000. They will 'work on the street and surrounds of the Byron Bay Community Centre [and the] Fletcher Street Kitchen where nourishing meals and fresh food is made available to the homeless people in need'.

Byron Youth Service will receive \$5,613 to upgrade defunct sound and PA equipment at its Byron Youth Activity Centre (YAC).

Additionally, 'two intensive workshops will support ten atrisk youth to develop skills in sound production, DJ mixing and event management. An additional 200 young people will access performances and events supported by the mobile sound resource'.

Byron Herb Nursery will spend \$4,700 of grant money, 'To construct a secure storage area for mowing and gardening equipment.

'The Herb Nursery's new gardening business employs local youth at disadvantage

to provide garden maintenance services for people living with a disability in the Northern Rivers region. Supported by James Frizelle Charitable Foundation.'

Bangalow Men's Shed will receive \$5,125 to build a nursery walkway/wheelchair access ramp.

'This will facilitate the inclusion of a wide range of persons in activities important to many, especially those unable to participate in other shed activities. Supported by James Frizelle Charitable Foundation.

A grant to Zero Emissions of \$5,500 will go towards a 'planting day and free Regenerative Agriculture workshop at The Farm in Ewingsdale.

'Zero Emissions Byron aims to reduce Byron Shire emissions to zero by 2025 to combat climate change. Drawing carbon into trees and the soil are key solutions'.

Bangalow Koalas will use \$4,770 of grant money for a project to connect koala habitat and rainforest remnants in a wildlife corridor.

This will 'enhance, protect and conserve habitat for EPBC Act and BC Act threatened species and ecological

communities including vulnerable koalas and critically endangered Lowland Rainforest of Subtropical Australia'.

Brunswick Valley Landcare will receive \$10,000 for a regenerative agriculture project to connect high school students with farmers and Indigenous practitioners. 'Drought resilience and soil and food health in farming and food production are now key social issues.' Supported by Yulgilbar Foundation, this project will also receive matched funding from Stone & Wood.

Byron Youth Theatre will use \$6,000 of grant money for an original theatre production called How on Earth? which will focuss on the 'complex issues of eco-anxiety and ecological despair.

'Byron Youth Theatre will consult with local and national ecological, health and wellbeing organisations to create an original production focusing on the complex issues of eco-anxiety and ecological despair. The production will be performed at local schools as well as providing a public forum'. For more information visit www.nrcf.org.au.

The evolution of Artificial Intelligence (AI) is a development that could have a profound impact on our lives in coming years.

It is this unpredictable future that is the subject of a new documentary, Machine, showing at Byron's Brewhouse Theatre on January 24.

The documentary peers unflinchingly into the future and considers both the positive and apocalyptic potential of AI.

The co-producer of the

Ciggi waste reduction campaign wins award

A campaign aimed at reducing litter in the Byron Shire, especially cigarette butts, has won an award for Community Waste Services at a recent NSW Local Government Excellence Awards ceremony.

Byron Shire Council staff say the Butt Free Byron Shire campaign has seen a 78 percent reduction in cigarette butt litter over 12 months.

Council's waste education and compliance officer, Kate Akkerman said the Butt Free Byron Shire campaign was a team effort, involving Positive Change for Marine Life, Byron Bay life guards, the National Parks and Wildlife Service, the NSW Department of Primary Industries, North East Waste and Reflections Holiday Parks.

'This award is not just

Council's award - it belongs to all our partners, especially Positive Change for Marine Life, which, for 12 months, co-ordinated monthly data collection at litter hotspots around the Byron Shire,' Ms Akkerman said.

'This was a multi-faceted campaign that was only achievable because Council received funding of \$100,000 from the NSW Environment **Protection Authority Litter** Prevention Grant under their Waste Less, Recycle More, program,' she said.

'The Butt Free Byron Shire campaign involved the installation of 123 Enviropole butt bins in the Byron Shire, the implementation of a smoking ban on our beaches, and an increase in litter enforcement.'

Have your say on new holiday letting regulations

With plans for short-term rental accommodation (STRA) now open for comment until January 30, a local residents group is urging support for a 90 day cap across all residential zones.

Council proposes that for most of the Shire, it will become permissible to holiday let homes for up to 90 days per year. Holiday letting for 365 days a year is proposed for beachfront areas of Byron Bay, most of Belongil, and all of Wategos.

If approved by the state government, a new definition of short-term rental accommodation will be inserted into the LEP 2014 dictionary.

Victims Of Holiday Letting (VOHL) convenor Doug Luke says, 'Byron Shire is sinking under the highest number of Airbnbs per head of population of any location in the world. Council estimates forty per cent of all houses in Byron Bay, and eighteen per cent of all houses in the Shire [are Airbnb let]. The numbers have grown 13.5 per cent in the last year'.

Luke says the NSW government has invited Council to apply for a 90 day cap for STRA in most residential zones. 'If you do not want

a holiday let next to you for 365 days a year, then VOHL urges all residents to use the interactive mapping to make a choice, fill out a few questions and make a submission.

'Our preferred position, for over ten years, has always been that planning law should be applied by Council to all STRA in Residential Zones where it is still a prohibited and illegal activity without development consent. However, VOHL has taken the pragmatic position, and supports the 90 day cap.'

VOHL argues that it would be much fairer for the 90 day cap to be applied equally across the Shire without exception for so called 'tourist hotspots,' where there are still a large number of permanent residents living. 'The Shire's approved

B and B operators have complied with a very detailed DA process requiring considerable fees and charges. Holiday let owners applying for a DA should follow a similar process for the sake of fairness and safety.

'VOHL agrees with the draft planning controls, particularly the proposed Council organised Registration Scheme. This aligns with the NSW Local Government Association's position. In contrast. the NSW Coalition government's position that registration should be organised by the STRA industry is akin to putting the fox in charge of the henhouse.'

Public liability

'For registration, Council will need to check that the number of bedrooms listed

abides by the current DA. VOHL is aware of illegal conversions into extra bedrooms.

'The NSW Department of Planning, Industry and Environment (DPIE) has advised that STRA owners would need to purchase public liability insurance for Registration. VOHL suggests that a minimum of \$20 million cover would be appropriate.

'VOHL agrees that all STRA will need to comply with fire safety standards under the Building Code of Australia and The Environmental Protection & Assessment Act 1979 regulations.

'The DPIE said that all STRA would require hardwired smoke detectors in every bedroom and hallway, and, exit lighting. Council has stated that non-hosted STRA on bush fire and flood prone land will require development consent.

'The DPIE has said that an STRA on bush fire prone land with a Bushfire Attack Level of 40 or Flame Zone is unlikely to receive development consent. The Rural Fire Service advised that the safety risks are too high'.

Man charged with break and enter

Police say a man will face court this week charged with several alleged break and enter offences in the Byron Bay area.

The police report says that at about 9.15am last Saturday, police were called to an apartment complex on Lawson Street, Byron Bay, where they spoke with a 28-year-old man.

During a person search, police allegedly located a knife and items believed to have been stolen from a caravan park site on the same street earlier in the week.

Following further enquiries, police attended a park reserve on Gilmore Street, Byron Bay, where they located a makeshift campsite and found a number of items alleged to have been stolen from several break and enter offences in the Byron Bay area.

The items located included clothing, laptops, electrical goods, jewellery, handbags, suitcases, goggles and other household items.

He was refused bail and will face Lismore Local Court on January 6, 2020.

Troy's Story and the death of a Planet

There are people that you meet in your life that change who you are or who you think you could be.

Troy Planet was definitely one of those people for me.

He had a magic way with people that transcended the everyday. Being with Troy was never pedestrian, it was always an experience. Sometimes a show – always funny, insightful, and energetic - his brilliance just made the rest of the world seem dull.

On December 23 while dining with a friend, Troy Planet made his way back into the galaxy when he suffered a heart attack and died suddenly, at 54.

He leaves behind three children, his smaller Planets: Epiphany 23, Oliver 19 and Arcady 16.

And there's a host of family and friends who are shocked, and deeply saddened by his sudden passing.

But Troy was always dramatic.

Never someone to linger. He knew how to make an

entrance, and it appears, a dramatic exit.

Larger than life

Troy Planet was larger than life. Not many people can change their last name from Smith to Planet and get away with it. But Smith was never the right moniker for a man like Troy.

And like the celestial body after which he named himself, Troy had a powerful gravity that pulled you into his orbit.

He attracted everyone - men, women, old, young, rich, poor, from conservatives to conspiracists – all were welcome at his table.

I was 25 when I met him, and for me, coming to Byron and finding home here has a lot to do with meeting Troy and becoming part of what Byron was in the early 90s.

It was an amazing place. Troy was an integral part

of a vibrant creative time in Byron Bay.

A founding member of the Australian Theatre Company with Daniel Roberts, audiences fell in love with this open faced boy with the



broad smile and ridiculous talent. His chubby genius reminded so many of what it must have been like to be in the presence of Belushi.

Troy had that same surefooted agility and grace denied most bigger folk.

He could sing, play the guitar, he could write songs and plays and movies, and wow could he act. His talent for vocal work saw him later become Sydney's

most sought after voice-over artist. You may have never met him but you sure would have heard him.

But wow he was funny!

He was funny like no one else I have ever met. Troy had this searing intelligence and candour and a wildly Robin Williamesque ability to distil an idea before your eyes that had you gasping for air.

He was chaotic and undisciplined and so charismatic

that you'd overlook his inability to wash up or put anything away.

That was just Troy. He was a force of nature. If you'd seen his rendition of Mortadella man where he ate his own face at the dinner table, you'd forgive anything too.

Our three day dinner parties (did I mention he was also an insane cook?) were these rolling soirees of performance and conversation and politics and hedonism.

With his then partner Mahoganny and our young daughters, these were truly some of the best days of my life; Troy instigated the kind of community and laughter that went deep into the core of your being. Not many others know how to navigate to that place.

Byron connection

Although Troy returned to Sydney to live with his family 15 years ago, he maintained a genuine connection to Byron and surrounds.

In fact, more recently he was working as a writer and producer and he'd been back just a few months working on a project.

So Vale Troy Planet. What a shining light you are. A role model for others to be their most magnificent and extraordinary selves.

It's hard to believe he's gone, but that vibrant Planet is now the shining star he always deserved to be.

There was only ever one Troy Planet.

Bangalow organisations to receive federal funding

Three Bangalow community organisations will receive federal grant funding, says federal Labor MP Justine Elliot.

They are the Community Children's Centre, the Country Women's Association and the Bangalow Men's Shed.

Mrs Elliot says, 'Bangalow Community Children's Centre will receive \$10,000 towards maintenance and repairs under the Stronger Communities grant program'.

She says the children's centre has been the sole day care centre providing support for families of the local and surrounding communities for over 30 years.

Terrorist organisations up for review

The re-listing of four terrorist organisations is up for review, say The Parliamentary Joint Committee on Intelligence and Security (PJCIS).

All four listed terrorist organisations are of Muslim faith, and specifically adhere to an extreme Sunni religious ideology.

Two are al-Qa'ida, one located in Yemen in the Arabian Peninsula and the other in 'Southern Asia.'

The other two Islamic State organisations listed are located in Libya and in the Sinai Peninsula.

According to UK government funded broadcaster the BBC, members of the two sects of the Muslim religion – Shia and Sunni – have co-existed for centuries and share many fundamental beliefs and practices.

Shia and Sunni

'But they differ in doctrine, ritual, law, theology and religious organisation. Sunnis make up approximately 90 per cent of the world's 1.5 billion Muslims, and regard themselves as the orthodox branch of Islam.

'The key difference between the two sects is that Shias believe [Muhammad's cousin] Ali is the rightful successor to the Prophet Muhammad as leader (Imam) following Muhammad's death in 632.


'Shia Muslims are in the majority in Iran, Iraq, Bahrain, Azerbaijan and, according to some estimates, Yemen.

'There are also large Shia communities in Afghanistan, India, Kuwait, Lebanon, Pakistan, Qatar, Syria, Turkey, Saudi Arabia and the UAE'.

Saudi Arabia, on the other hand, is majority Sunni Muslims. The 25 known terrorist organisations, most of which pursue extreme Islamic religious ideals, are listed on www.nationalsecurity.gov.au.

Waste management – have your say

How should Council deal with waste over the next 10 years and beyond?

A draft waste management strategy, Towards Zero – Byron Shire's Integrated Waste Management and Resource Recovery Strategy 2019 – 2029, outlines a plan that has the aspiration of sending zero waste to landfill in the future.

Team leader of Resource Recovery, Danielle Hanigan says the vision for the stratto be a practical document that guides some exciting projects over the next 10 years,' she said.

According to staff, the strategy details four main objectives: 'Empower the community to increase avoidance, reuse and recycling; Optimise and enhance solutions to recover, treat and dispose of residual waste; Work with the business and the tourism sector Council will encourage the community and businesses to support the circular economy by purchasing recycled content materials and ensuring reuse and recycling are the preference over single use items.

Another focus of the strategy is to investigate solutions to recover, treat and dispose of residual waste – which is waste that is unable to be reused, recycled or comappropriate for our community, supports existing diversion, recycling and organics systems and produces a positive outcome for our environment,' Ms Hanigan said.

'This sort of investment is beyond the capacity of Byron Shire and we are working closely with other councils in the Northern Rivers and Mid North Coast to investigate the feasibility of long-term regional solutions for waste, with sustainable waste management identified as a key priority for our region,' she said. The draft Towards Zero - Byron Shire's Integrated Waste Management and **Resource Recovery Strategy** 2019–2029 aims to realise a number of significant projects both locally and regionally that will see the sustainable management of waste for many years to come.

Ms Hanigan says, 'The strategy outlines the direction to achieve this vision through best practice waste avoidance, recovery and management. It's certainly a big aspiration, but our community is very engaged with our waste programs, and there is an expectation that we continue working towards innovative solutions. 'We want this strategy to reduce waste to landfill and explore circular economy opportunities'; and 'Support and lobby State and Federal Governments to facilitate change in waste outcomes'.

Circular economy

'We need to work on avoiding the creation of waste in the first place, and this means our focus will be on educating and empowering the community to reduce their waste footprint through avoidance, re-use and recycling,' Ms Hanigan said.

Farewell to an Australian hero, Bill Ryan

David Lowe

One of Australia's foremost environmental activists, Bill Ryan, has died in Sydney at the age of 97.

Bill was part of the legendary Kokoda campaign during World War II, in which Australian troops finally stopped the southward advance of the Japanese Imperial Army in appalling, mountainous conditions. Wounded in action in 1942, Bill later returned to fight in New Britain.

After the war he worked for the PMG, and later Telecom Australia (now Telstra). Bill's son Colin also worked there, and both were involved in the struggle to improve workers' rights.

Bill struggled with PTSD and depression for many years following his military experiences. He was painfully aware that the sacrifices of the war did little to improve stark situations of injustice at home and abroad.

A lifelong and active trade unionist, Bill was also

wondered.

Using a specially modified computer, Bill was able to stay on top of the latest science of global warming.

He wrote letters and lobbied politicians. When that got nowhere, he joined civil disobedience campaigns to actively do something about the climate emergency, putting his own frail body on for climate action is a small inconvenience.'

Bill came to particular prominence during the struggle to save the Leard Forest from coal mining.

Activism history

But he was also tossed into the Hunter River alongside Josh Fox while supporting the Pacific Climate I got to know him in the fights to save Gloucester from unconventional gas and coal mining, and to stop Santos in the Pilliga, but Bill was an integral part of innumerable campaigns, most of which came under the banner of climate change.

He couldn't remember how many times he'd been arrested. His concern for envi-

No free camping, say Council

With illegal camping being an 'enormous problem generally in the Byron Shire' Council say they have a message to all people who think they will be able to sleep in their cars or vans in carparks or on residential streets this holiday season – if you can't pay, then don't stay.

Acting General Manager, Phil Holloway, said Council's Enforcement team will not be on holidays this festive season, rather, staff will be working seven days a week targeting illegal camping.


'Our cars are equipped with licence plate recognition technology which means an infringement notice can be sent directly to the person who owns the vehicle.

'There are 15 legal camp grounds in the Byron Shire and information about their locations is widely available on the internet and at the Byron Visitor Centre.'

879 complaints

Holloway says from January 1 2019 to December 18, 2019 there were 879 complaints from residents to Council relating to camping.

Holloway adds staff will also be doing patrols at Broken Head and Seven Mile Beach Road.

ronmental and social justice powered all that he did. His gentle humour, integrity and passion moved all who met him. As Bill put it, 'People

who are producing these fossil fuels and having them burnt throughout the world, they're the enemy.' Politically active throughout his life, Bill was a proud member of the NSW Greens. Bill leaves behind two proud sons, two grand-children and three great-grandchildren.

Miracle marketing man not up for job

ur Pentecostalist prime minister may have been a little disappointed by Christmas. No wise men showed up bearing gifts - ScoMo probably didn't need a lot of frankincense and myrrh, but a bit more unearned gold would always be handy, although declaring it as a foreign donation might be a bit awkward.

And hordes of caring worshipful shepherds did not flock to his side – as usual, he had to make do with his usual army of mediocre minders and slippery spin doctors.

The ever-reliable choir of angels from the Murdoch press sang his praises as they always do, but even they could not muster much enthusiasm for tidings of great joy, hallelujahs and hosannas were a bit sparse over the festive season..

They will not desert him, of course - he is their man, at least until a more effective candidate comes along, preferably one even further off on the lunar right. But after a year of gaffes and dithering, even they are being forced to acknowledge that Scott Morrison is not the messiah.

And on the other side of the ideological divide, it has become clear that he is not just a very naughty boy, either – he has now been revealed as a dangerous incompetent, an opportunist populist combining policy vacuity with a reckless opportunism and a political tin ear.

He has already done real damage to the body politic in sins of both commission and omission, and there is plenty more to come, because Morrison is utterly unrepentant - he thinks he can talk his way out of anything, so there is no reason to believe that he has any interest in becoming a serious prime minister.

No leader with an ounce of caution or integrity would have surreptitiously left the country in a time of national crisis. To then express regret not for his uncaring arrogance, but because he knew Australians were anxious that he should return, was so vain and delusional to defy reality.

Australians were not and are not anxious, pining for his presence; they were and are angry about his uncaring negligence.

And the excuse that he could not hold a hose did not help. A number of

them have had to learn the hard way and heck, how hard is it anyway? Even Tony Abbott can do it. Perhaps it is time to check whether Morrison can tie his own shoelaces without help.

The lack of empathy is compounded by the silliness – and nothing has really changed since one of Morrison's first captain's calls, his counter-productive demand to move the Australian embassy

in Israel from Tel Aviv to Jerusalem.

He was talked out of that one, and presumably was similarly persuaded to limit the fallout from his latest gaffe by returning to Australia as soon as he could find a suitable flight – it was not clear whether he was waiting for an upgrade to first class for himself and his family.

And his return, rather than being celebrated near and far as he apparently expected, was greeted with resentful indifference, a mood which is starting to settle in over an electorate which was hoping for rather more than the inertia which has gripped the government since the last election.

It has now become obvious that Scott Morrison is simply not up to the job – that the miracle had failed.

This is not really surprising; he wasn't up to his last job either, having being fired as head of NSW Tourism.

But there was hope, although not an expectation, that new leadership might cut through the malaise which bedevilled five years of the dysfunctional coalition.

Instead, Morrison has only coasted on the result of his unforeseen and unlikely victory.

He had not prepared an agenda for it, and it has shown - indeed, it now seems that he is not really interested in agendas, even if he is capable of devising one.

He has been labelled a transactional prime minister, as opposed to a conviction prime minister, but even that is

selling him too high; Scott Morrison is the archetypal reactive prime minister, bereft of vision, immersed in adhockery and negativity.

Even in the bushfire crisis it showed; for days, even weeks, Morrison insisted that everything that needed to be done was being done, both the professionals and the volunteers were getting all the help that they required.

But in the wake of his aborted vacation, he belatedly responded to Anthony Albanese's plea to at least offer more paid leave for his commonwealth public servants out in the field.

Which, of course, left the problem of the weary volunteers who work in the state and private sectors.

Morrison urged employers to do the same for them, but it might have been smarter to have set up a deal in advance.

But that would have taken planning, putting forward a sensible and considered program, something of which ScoMo is manifestly incapable.

Like Tony Abbott, he has no real concept of public administration - he is only confident when he is attacking his opponents.

And so far it has more or less worked. He has spent the best (or worst) part of a year living on the kudos of his election win, and his quiet Australians remain quiescent, either content with his schedule of masterful inaction, or resigned to the fact that this is just the way it is, there is nothing they can do about it and it's not worth trying to change it.


He is still obviously acceptable to the electorate, but the there are signs that the early gloss is wearing thin, and that Albanese, though a long way from being embraced, is showing the beginnings of being seen as a viable alternative.

Christmas provided a little welcome rain – probably Morrison, Barnaby Joyce and their fellow evangelists even believe that their thoughts and prayers were effective, but there is a long way to go.

The current fire season will come to an end and at least some of the angst will abate, but there are two more fire seasons to be negotiated before the next election.

And by then pleading to the heavens, and slagging off at Greta Thunberg, is unlikely to be enough.



bins. We have the shameful distinction of being the fourth highest wasters of food in the world.

Besides burning an average of \$1,026 from the average household's budget, food in landfill decomposes anaerobically, producing methane, a greenhouse gas 28 times stronger than carbon dioxide. Additionally, the CSIRO have estimated that cattle alone are responsible for 48% of enteric methane emissions and 6% of Australia's total greenhouse gas emissions.

The impact on animals is far worse. Land clearing is putting 28,000 animal species at risk of extinction within the next 25 years. That land is cleared to provide grazing or grains for hundreds of millions of cows, sheep, pigs and chickens who live in appalling conditions, packed into sheds or branded or castrated without pain relief, before being crammed into trucks for the long ride to a terrifying and often agonising death.

Arable land could be used far more efficiently to grow plant-based food for humans, and to regenerate forests, which act as natural carbon sinks. Studies have shown that a meat-based diet requires far more energy, land, and water than a vegan one

Even now, it's still hard to get that this big old world is a speck of dust in the universe, and it's just as hard to get that eight billion of us living our tiny lives on Earth's surface could have collectively changed the behaviour of the entire planet, dramatically, over the course of a couple of hundred years.

But we have. We didn't mean to fuck it up, but that's exactly what we did. We invented machines that converted energy that was lying around doing nothing into energy we found useful; for example burning petrol to keep 1,200,000,000 vehicles in motion as of this year.

And we made chemicals that kill bugs and weeds, and others that help plants grow, and we have sprayed these chemicals over vast areas of land to grow crops to feed animals so we can eat them.

Only a very few people understood 200 years ago that these fuels and (later) fertilizers, once they pass through a car or a cow, become airborne in the form of carbon dioxide and/

or methane. And all those carbon molecules in the atmosphere enlarge a blanket of gas that every year allows less of the sun's heat to bounce off the Earth and back into space.

The heat accumulating under the carbon blanket is now creating disasters all over the globe, and it will get worse every day unless we can stop it.

An awareness that we are members of an ecosystem on a relatively small planet has been beyond our collective consciousness - until now. But now that houses are burning down and coastlines are eroding all over the planet, that awareness is spreading like, well, like wildfire.

That's the good news, being spread most effectively by teenagers. The bad is that we have just a few decades to think together, and act together to save our species, which will require some huge failed projects to be abandoned; such as most religion, wars, private property, profit-hoarding, and male domination, for starters.

and images showed us what a million privileged people already knew from their libraries and billions of others knew in their gut: that the American military, shielded by propaganda dressing invasions up as democracy, had routinely committed appalling crimes against humanity - including its own citizens – in pursuit of its real agenda, which was the spread of raw and rampant capitalism.

Living in the Pyrocene

(and a few apocalyptic summer reading suggestions)

s one of many bushfire refugees in Australia and beyond this year, I was faced with that classic question – what do I take and what can be left behind? A houseful of stuff and a small car are very different sizes, but when time is short, it's amazing how it sharpens the mind, and the Tetris skills.

Turns out, not much is really necessary, or even desirable when it comes down to it. Being human, quite a few sentimental things of no practical use during an apocalypse found their way into the car. A few books. Also lots of ones and zeroes on hard drives of various sizes. Pretty much everything else was excess to requirements.

This is something more of us are learning as we move into this new reality, which has been predicted for some time, but not many expected would arrive so soon.

But what should we call this over-cooked era? Anthropocene has been suggested (or Anthrocene, as Nick Cave prefers) – the age when humans are the main drivers of everything that happens. Then there's the under-sevens favourite, Plasticene. You only have to walk along a beach anywhere in the world and see the colourful detritus of our species to understand that one.

For me though, the one that takes the cake (a bombe alaska, naturally) is the Pyrocene, or the age of fire. That's what international fire expert Stephen J Pyne calls this era we're living in, and after 29 books on the subject including *Fire: a Brief History*, he should know.

Burning stuff (especially fossil fuels) got our civilisation cooking with gas, made a lot of people rich, and now

there were a huge number of potential suspects, people with criminal records for fire-related crimes.

Having caught their man (probably), the police and courts then had to find their way through a mind more labyrinthine than Barnaby Joyce's expense account.

The reader is left wondering who was really responsible. Was it the person who lit the match? Was it the society who threw that person aside? Was it the ecology that had evolved to demand fire? Was it climate change?

Speaking of ecology, there's been much talk recently about the need for fire regimes in this country to be based on ancient Aboriginal land management principles. The best book on the subject is probably Bill Gammage's The Biggest Estate on Earth, which makes a persuasive case that Europeans have completely misunderstood the way fire works in this country, since day one, and is a great book to read in conjunction with Bruce Pascoe's bestseller and Bolt-stirrer Dark Emu.

While not perfect, the previous human custodians had a deeply complex relationship with fire and the landscape, which appears to have been sustainable for tens of thousands of years. Unfortunately it's not as simple as bringing the old ways back. Much knowledge has been lost (or destroyed, to be more accurate), there are far fewer big trees than there used to be, biodiversity has been sacrificed, there's industry and houses all over the place, heaps more people, and much less rain, in part because of all of the above.

People who hate trees will use any excuse to destroy them, and these blame games are taking place in the context of increasingly longer (soon to be infinite) bushfire seasons, with less money for fire fighting, more reliance on already-stretched volunteers, less safe time for prescribed burns, no moisture in the trees and no water in the dams to put the fires out.

Meanwhile the mining industry waits in the wings, like a hungry crow, while the landscape is still smoking. After helping bring the problem into being, they stand to be the main beneficiaries.

How big should the future economy be?


A nyone who has never studied economics would be excused for the common-sense belief that the economy cannot grow forever, but those who have been indoctrinated with an economics education know otherwise.

The standard model of economic growth that they learn is independent of resources, so, they believe, there is no limit to an economy's size. Sound strange?

The key point to toppling this dogma is knowing that the economy is a real thing, requiring real resources to increase the amount of real products and services. Those real resources exist as either matter or energy, and they come from the environment, which can only supply a limited amount for the simple reason that the Earth is finite.

So, despite what economists and the politicians they influence tell us, there is a limit to how much the economy can produce in a given amount of time.

So how big should the economy be? While there is no simple answer,

as a sub-system of an ecosystem, the economy must at least remain within the biophysical limits of its parent ecosystem. Otherwise, just as a parasite kills its host by extracting too many resources, so too will an economy collapse when it draws out too many resources from its host ecosystem, killing both in the process.

To highlight the ecological consequences of a growing economy, consider the above diagram.

World ecosystem

As shown, the economy grows into ecosystems, degrading their services as it does so.

Ecosystem services are

broadly defined as things that ecosystems do which benefit humans. For example, providing an ozone layer and stable climate, recycling nutrients and breaking down wastes, among many others. They are the fundamental object of sustainability; because if they cease functioning, no society, much less any economy, will survive.

We are now living in what Daly calls a 'full world'; that is, one full of people and all of our stuff.

What do climate change, biodiversity loss, plastics in the ocean, the hole in the ozone layer, and a slew of other ecological aberrations have in common? They are all a result of our growing economy.

Ecological decline

The series of reports Australia: State of the Environment, published every five years, and arguably the most comprehensive account of the state of the Australian environment, identify growth of the human population and the economy (which are closely related) as the prime cause of our ecological decline.

Locally, the Byron Bay bypass is just one example of the conflict between economic growth and ecological sustainability.

Anyone who has spent at least a couple of years in Byron Shire can see that it is growing; both in terms of the number of people living here, and those visiting, as well as the economic activity conducted here. This growth is endorsed by the NSW state government in its North Coast Regional Plan 2036, and its Growing Local Economies fund has provided close to half the money for the bypass. Of course, the bypass runs through wetlands where a number of threatened species live, including the Mitchell's Rainforest Snail, the Common Planigale, and Black Bittern. This thereby reduces the ecosystem service of providing a habitat for these and other species, since they will not live on or near the bypass, which is probably true for most humans too.

While proving that economic growth will cause catastrophic dysfunction of ecosystem services is probably impossible for one specific case, the precautionary principle suggests that limiting growth for the economy as a whole would be wise.

This is the conclusion of the IPBES (the biodiversity and ecosystem services analogue of the IPCC). In their recent Global Assessment report, they note that about 1 million species are threatened with extinction, many within decades, and suggest 'steering away from the current limited paradigm of economic growth'.

Yet in Australia, as with all other countries in the world, economic growth is set firmly at the centre of solutions to issues as diverse as poverty, unemployment, and even environmental degradation.

A prudent response to these issues would include a re-evaluation of the growth economy, and replacing it with its counterpart, the steady-state economy.

The steady-state economy is one with a constant, or mildly fluctuating, human population and stock of human-made things. In addition, the levels at which these two quantities are held steady are sufficient for a good life that is sustainable into the future, and the rate of matter and energy flows maintaining them are kept as low as possible.

There is no question that the growth economy must end, it is only a question of how. Those reasonable and caring would like the transition to be smooth, rather than abrupt.

hen I was a kid there was no such thing as bottled water. Water lived in the tap. Everyone drank tap. You turned it on, and water came out. It still does apparently. You'd put it in a glass. Or a cup. Or you filled up an empty cordial bottle and bunged it in the fridge. You didn't buy water at the shops.

If someone had told me that the annual revenue in Australia from bottled water in 2019 was going to be in excess of US\$988 million I would have said you were nuts – that's like selling air. If you can get that in a bottle and find a way to get it to market it's probably the next product boom.

Water for all

How have we allowed corporations to commodify what should be a common and shared resource? Water flows through aquifers, into creeks and rivers... it falls freely from the sky – so how has it become one of the most profitable products on the market?

There's a reason Coca-Cola sells water – it's not because they're into health products, it's because they're into healthy profits. Water is very very lucrative.

It's not hard to market a product that is essential to human survival.

Drinking bottled water can cost you around \$346 per year, but if you'd used the same amount from the tap, it would have been 42 cents for the same period. The profit margin on bottled water ranges from 50–200 per cent. A \$2 water bottle costs about 5 cents to make. That leaves a 4,000 per cent mark up.

World wide the bottled water industry generates more than \$13

billion in revenue each year. The estimate to solve the global water crisis is just \$10 billion. That still leaves the greedy corporations a tidy \$3 billion.

And the bottle...

Did you know that 90 per cent of the cost of bottled water is the bottle itself? So basically, every time you buy bottled water you're just paying for the plastic bottle. And 80 per cent of those bottles never get recycled. Most of them go into landfill. In America alone, every year, more than 38 million water bottles end up in landfill.

It takes three litres of water to create one litre of bottled water. It takes 24,000,000 litres of oil to make the billions of bottles. Those bottles which take up to 1,000 years to break down.

I haven't even got started on the ludicrous importing and exporting of bottled water in countries that already have bottled water.

Dreams in bottle?

So why do we drink bottled water when our water is safe to drink? Marketing. It's not the water we're drinking – it's the marketing. We have somehow been convinced that the water in plastic bottles is better for us than the water from our taps.

Words like 'spring' and 'Fiji' create the expectation that we are purchasing plastic bottles of glorious purity. But did you know that 1/3 of bottle-water samples, when tested, showed some contamination? Contaminants like: benzene, mould, kerosene, tetrahydrofuran, fecal coliform and other bacteria, sanitiser, elevated choline, styrene, algae and glass particles have all been found in bottled water. Yep glass and shit. I'd be staying away from that natural spring – it sounds more like someone's done their bottling in a pub toilet.

This means bottled water is not purer or safer than tap – quite the opposite. Some bottled water actually is tap water that has been put in a plastic bottle. In fact Aquafina was one brand that was identified as coming from a 'public water source' just like your plain old tap water does. Apparently they give it a little extra filtering!

Far from being healthy, if you store water in plastic bottles for 10 weeks it contains a chemical that can disrupt human hormones. Do you know how long that water you're drinking has been in that plastic bottle?

So if you want to do just one thing for the environment that's quick and easy, and has a massive impact: stop buying water in plastic bottles! It will also save you money. It's time to drain the multinational water-bottling cash springs. Shops could simply sell glass bottles and offer taps for refill everywhere.

New year's resolution

Here's a new year's resolution we should all make: never buy water in plastic again. You want to be an environmental activist? Then you need to tap and go!

NO ANIMALS WERE HARMED BY THESE **JOKES: HUGHSIE THE COMEDY VEGAN**

Dave Hughes doesn't have to perform stand up. He's probably one of the busiest people in the business - on radio every morning, a TV personality and host of Hughesy We Have A Problem, but every year Hughsie still finds the time to create a new comedy show for the festival circuit. He doesn't do stand up because he has to, he does it because he wants to.

'You still have to be able to take risks. I love the thrill of creating a new bit of comedy more now than I ever did. I never want to be not able to find a new bit. Performing stand up comedy is my fun.'

While stand up comedy offers an atmosphere of camaraderie, there is often a feeling of competition between acts - of wishing you'd come up with that joke first or the act before you didn't 'kill it' so hard. Working as the host of TV shows where you want everyone to be as funny as they can has changed the way Dave views himself and the work of others.

'When you are a host you want everyone to be funny. You don't have to be the funniest person in the room. There is no reason you can't be like that every day. I mean if you could find that attitude of approaching life like you are the host, then how much more relaxed would life be! I gave that talk to kids at my wife's school - she's a teacher. Be the host of your own life...' says Dave, who's certainly expert at hosting his own! The January shows at the Brunswick Picture House see Dave develop some of the ideas he riffed on his breakfast radio spot.

'I write notes down every day and especially doing radio when its based on me mining my own life, and those notes that you write down become like gold. It's not until you take it to stage that it becomes stand up - you work with it and say let's make it into something - I have to write bits every day; what's funny about daily life, doesn't get

less funny - it's just that you don't see it, or you don't notice.' Noticing is essential to the craft of comedy.

So when it comes to mining his life Dave Hughes has a whole new mindset to riff on. You see, Hughsie has just become a vegan.

'I watched Game Changers and it made a lot of sense to me. There are all these people banging on about saving the world, but still eating meat. Albert Einstein said the answer to saving the planet was to eat a plant based diet. People love to protest, but won't do anything.

'In my limited 8 weeks as a vegan I noticed that, as a vegan, you are definitely in the minority. I'm thinking of doing a vegan only show...'

Making your material about who you are today is what keeps Hughes' material fresh.

'Some comedians are doing the same routine from 1997 – might be why you're not working... you can't pretend the 2000 Olympics was last week mate...'

No matter how successful he's become, Dave Hughes still has that down-to-earth larrikin charm that we all fell in love with. Smart, insightful, self-deprecating, Hughsie is definitely the host of his life. Why not be on his show - or at least in the audience?

THE SETTING SON

You'd think that you'd get used to your kids leaving home. But you don't. Every time one of them leaves it's as heartbreaking as it was when the first one went. This time it's my fourth kid. My only boy. This morning I crawled into bed beside him and started crying and told him not to leave me. What a loser. He kindly comforted me and told me I'd be ok. He doesn't know that. But I will be ok. Eventually. I need to throw a few tantrums first though. Eventually this painful letting go thing will pass.

I felt his bony 6'4" body next to mine and wondered what happened to that little boy with the bright yellow hair and the crinkled smile. I can't see him. I miss that sweet little boy. The little boy who had to be near me. For the first 12 months of his life he'd only sleep if his body was in proximity to mine. I spent a year just holding him. Then he slept in my bed until he was 7. Apparently it's called attachment parenting. I'm glad it's got a name. I thought it was the kind of lazy parenting I did because I could never set boundaries with my children. I breastfed them for so long that when I did it in public people looked away in disbelief. Eleven's not too old is it?

It doesn't feel that long ago. I can still remember him clinging to my leg. Insisting I pick him up and carry him. I'm really crying now. I'm morose this morning. I'm crying because I don't want to let him go. I feel like he belongs to me. I made him. He can't go. It's why mothers can be so toxic. Especially mothers of sons. It's hard to lose this sense of authorship over my kids. They're books I may have attempted to edit, but I didn't write their stories. I sure tried to though.

But every story I wrote for them they'd erase and write their own. And now my son is up to the part where you don't need your mother anymore. The bit where the mother stands at the door and waves goodbye to the boy she made in her body. I remind him how big he was. Five kilos. The biggest birthweight baby they'd had in Randwick Royal Women's in the year he was born. It was like landing a prize fish. Everyone wanted to see the big baby and the champion mother who'd birthed him in just over an hour. He was overdue by ten days. Back then *he* didn't want to leave *me*. He was induced. Then finally, when he did leave, it was quick and it was violent.

Like today. He was going to have a gap year – a year at home with me, working and then travelling. Like the overdue baby, he was going to kickback in the womb. Mentally I hadn't started the letting go process because he wasn't going anywhere just yet. But his plans suddenly changed, and he's going to Melbourne Uni which means moving to Melbourne. Apparently.

It's like the violent induction all over again. He's leaving in the next week. On Christmas Day he sorted his clothes. He cleaned out his cupboards. I'd been asking him to do that for years. Now I don't want him to. I want to take everything that doesn't fit him – the stuff that belongs to the boy he was and shove it back in his cupboard. The soccer clothes he's outgrown, his school uniform, the dumb skater boy T-shirts. I wanted to make myself a nest from his discarded items and lie in it. Breathe in the boy that is no more. I'm not ready to put that boy

CLAIRE TURNS HER BROKEN HEART INTO ART

Research says that the arts are good for our mental health, but what does an artist do when they no longer find joy in their chosen field? Three years ago, local artist **Claire Atkins** signed up for her first music lesson as a form of therapy to recover from a broken heart.

'I was dealing with a whole bunch of grief. My dad and two close friends died suddenly and in quick succession, and it paralysed me, creatively speaking.

'Music kept suggesting itself, which was strange because I couldn't play an instrument! I was quietly terrified by that, and so I started small with the uke,' she said.

According to Claire, weekly ukulele lessons resuscitated her creativity, and unexpectedly inspired her to write and record her soon-to-be-released debut EP.

Under the tutelage of local singer-songwriter **Kathryn Jones**, Claire learnt to play the ukulele, and within 12 months was writing and performing her own songs. In 2019, with her teacher's encouragement, she sent her songs to producer and sound engineer **Paul Pilsneniks**, renowned for recording artists Angus & Julia Stone, Powderfinger and Silverchair.

'Hearing Claire's demos I felt that these beautiful tunes would really shine with some additional instrumentation and production, so we brought together some amazing local players to guest on her songs.

'What we ended up with is her stunning debut EP *Eternal Return*. Any music-listening aficionado should keep an ear out for this body of work in early 2020,' Paul said.

The album's title track was inspired by Nietzsche's philosophy of eternal return that proposes the universe and everything within it has been recurring and will continue to recur in the same pattern infinitely. Claire says reliving heartbreak is not an attractive prospect, but she's also confident of music's power to transform hardship into something unexpected and beautiful. California's shimmering psych-folk melody-makers **Allah-Las** have unveiled their full run of Australian tour dates for 2020, following from the October announcement of their slot on Brisbane's impressive Nine Lives Festival. This time around, Allah-Las will be touring their acclaimed fourth LP, *LAHS*, released October 2019 via Mexican Summer. But that boy is gone. This boy is leaving me. On Boxing Day he sold his car. He's ready. He's excited about the next chapter of his life. I am too, I just wanted that extra year with him. This is what we work towards – creating independent young people ready to take on the world. He's hard working, focused, creative and kind. He is a really nice person. He's talented. He has great friendships. He is confident. He's going to be ok. So I close the fourth door on that part of being a mother. Of reading him bedtime stories, of clipping him into his seat belt, of kissing his forehead goodnight. He'll be back on holidays. A voice on the phone. A friend on Facebook. My Charlie. My glorious Charlie. Oh god, I'm going to miss him. Hey, I just thought of something – can I come too?

'In a strange way, I'm grateful for life's challenging times, and if it wasn't for them, I may never have strummed a chord or written a lyric. That difficult period drove me to music and it saved me. And it's my best work,' she said.

THE BLISS OF BREATH

Christabel Zamor is an expert educator and a pioneer in ecstatic breath and movement. My passion for ecstatic dance and embodiment lives on in Breath of Bliss in the ecstatic dance portion of each ceremony.

What are you doing at Starlight?

I'm thrilled to be sharing two Breath of Bliss angelic ceremonies at Starlight on January 4 and 5 where we will dive deep into activating our angelic DNA with connected breath, movement and sound. Every ceremony is different – and in these two I will be supporting participants in anchoring a vision of how they can become bridges between heaven and Earth in 2020.

WITH AUSTEN, THE JOKE'S ON US

Every January, **Austen Tayshus,** the legendary white pointer of Australian comedy makes his way to Byron Bay. It's his favourite show of the year. 'It's a smart crowd' he says. And he's right. Not everyone is going to 'get' a Tayshus show. But Byron, he reckons, does. And that, he believes, is the point. Austen likes to make people think. Push them to the brink of their comfort zones. And sometimes – way over the edge.



It's why he's such a fierce figure in the Aussie comedy scene; a scene where many comics and promoters are terrified of him. Austen, aka **Sandy Gutman** doesn't play safe. He doesn't suck up to venue owners. And he certainly doesn't stroke the ego of other performers or promoters. In a landscape where comedy tends to lose its edge because of the corporate need to be mainstream and to be commercially successful, Austen Tayshus still doesn't give a rat's. He is a lone wolf. Smarter, funnier, and more experienced than anyone else in Aussie comedy. But be warned. He's also a lot more dangerous. A Tayshus show is not for the faint-hearted!

There are few comics with the tenacity and killer instinct of Austen Tayshus. The comedy superstar who first came into being in 1981 has the ability to take a room hostage just with his tongue. He's the closest thing the Australian Comedy scene has to its very own Bill Hicks. Topical, dangerous, irreverent – he's the high priest of satire; unflappable and relentless. Every Austen show is unique. He has the ability to weave current politics, what's happening in the room, philosophy, anthropology, religion, sport, and let's not forget the Pope, into one gag.

Tayshus is a man of controversy. There is no subject he won't dissect. Uncomfortable, confronting, but always illuminating, an Austen Tayshus show is both comic and cleansing. He doesn't need you to like him. In fact he'd probably prefer if you didn't. He is joined by **Mandy Nolan** for a whirlwind 2020 tour.

Known for its alternative culture, there is a strong leaning towards sustainable and ethical practices. Every Friday there is a bustling Farmers Market from 7am to 11am under the grand and elegant trees of the Mullum Showgrounds. As well as produce, you can buy a variety of breakfasts or gifts and listen to live local musicians. There is also a community market that has local arts and craft, textiles, bric-a-brac and great food stalls. This market is on every third Saturday of the month, next to the Brunswick Valley Historical Museum.

After a wander through town you may want to sit under the shade of a tree at one of Mullumbimby's parks alongside the river, or book a therapeutic appointment to really, truly and deeply relax back into yourself.

Mullumbimby is a gateway to the hinterland and ten minutes to the beach - some say Byron is just the eastern suburbs of Mullum and that this little town really is the Heart of Byron Shire.
