Scarrabelotti's restaurant DA for sale after being approved

Within weeks of a development application (DA) approval for an exclusive restaurant bordering Scarrabelotti's Lookout, owners Paschal vGrenquist and Yuuka Shibasaki have listed their 11 acre property for sale.

Apart from the yet-to-be-built restaurant, the land located at 784 Coolamon Scenic Drive comprises dual occupancy homes with 'resort style pool'.

Staff recommended - and a councillor majority supported - access for the 40-seat restaurant to be via the public lookout, despite concerns from neighbours over increased traffic and amenity impacts.

It also puts into question Council's policy of dual occupancies, which was to support affordable housing. The policy has increasingly been used instead to expand wealthy property portfolios.

Community use conflicts

During the DA exhibition, neighbours argued that using part of the lookout area for restaurant parking - which was contained in the first iteration of the plan – was inappropriate because this land was donated by the Scarrabelotti family for community use.

Greens Council candidate Duncan Dey was critical of the

agreed plans to 'embellish the lookout (which is located within the road reserve) as it provides access to the restaurant site'.

He said, 'In other words, the traveller will arrive, not knowing much about property boundaries, and probably get the impression the lookout belongs to the restaurant'.

'Assuming the restaurant is permissible in the "7(d) Scenic Escarpment" zoning of the property, access should have been arranged at its northern end instead of through the guts of the lookout, which was donated to us, the public, by Frank Scarrabellotti'.

West Byron saga before courts, again

The opposing sides in the battle over the West Byron mega housing development on Ewingsdale Road are flexing their legal muscles, with preliminary court proceedings set to commence next month.

Having had their development application for the controversial project refused by the Northern Regional Planning Panel (NRPP) late last year, Villa World Byron Pty Ltd has appealed the decision in the Land and Environment Court (LEC).

There are two DAs for the proposal – the other is by Site R&D. who are a consortium of 'local' landowners. Their LEC battle is looming after their DA was refused by the NRPP, and they initiated court proceedings before the decision was even handed down.

Should Villa World successfully overturn the NRPP's decision, it would pave the way for the development to go ahead.

The first stage of the pivotal case will begin on August 20 when a compulsory conciliation conference is held on the site of the proposed development in Ewingsdale.

Closed to members of the public, the conciliation hearing is expected to see Villa World (which is owned by Tower Holdings) put forward a new proposal that is reduced in size and scale.

Facing Villa World in the hearing will be Sydney law firm Marsden's, who will be receiving their instructions from Byron Shire Council.

Those locals who submitted a formal objection to the proposal received letters last week inviting them to apply to address the

'Residents who objected may have the opportunity to inform the Court orally of their concerns in relation to the development,' the letter said.

'The presiding commissioner will have discretion as to whether the residents may speak.

Those allowed to speak will not be allowed to stick around at the conference because it is strictly a conciliation between the parties.

Council's policy regarding the number of speakers at such conferences is to 'provide for the just, quick, and cheap disposal of proceedings'.

It further states that the number of persons speaking on-site should be limited to a maximum of six, with preference given to those residents directly affected by a proposed development.

If there are contentions that extend beyond the immediate area of the site, such as impacts on the character of the area or wider traffic implications, then a representative person raising this contention should make a submission on-site.

Residents wishing to speak are asked to register their interest via email to Adriana Kleiss: akleiss@ marsdens before August 6.

They will then be contacted about who is speaking.

The Villa World DA (No. 10.2017.201.1) seeks consent for a subdivision of the Ewingsdae site into 282 residential lots, construction of roads, acoustic barriers and retaining walls, and other associated infrastructure works. It also includes concept plans for the creation of a new road between Ewingsdale Rd and a new light industrial estate.

Dunoon dam proposal meets resistance

Since Rous County Council put its Future Water Project 2060 on public display two weeks ago, the revival of the concept of a second dam on Rocky Creek, near Dunoon, has sparked debate across the Northern Rivers.

Rocky Creek supplies water to four surrounding Shires, including Byron. The exception is Mullumbimby, which is supplied from Council's Lavertys Gap Weir.

The recently formed **Dunoon Dam Proposal Action** Group already has almost 300 members on Facebook.

Léandra Martiniello is an Arrernte woman and Dunoon local who is an organiser with the group and opposes

She contacted The Echo to address some of the points made by Rous County Council Chair Keith Williams in his recent interview.

Indigenous graves

Cr Williams told The Echo that he acknowledged there are concerns about Indigenous heritage issues and environmental impacts, and says he expects discussion.

In terms of the Indigenous heritage impacts, there are scar trees and graves in the area that would be affects by the new dam, and 18 sites have been identified so far.

Cr Williams said that attempts to reach out to the relevant people, including Mickey Ryan, have so far been unsuccessful, but Rous Water was serious about addressing these issues via its Reconciliation Action Group.

the key issues we need to resolve,' he said, 'and we have to resolve it directly with people. It's about being genuine in that process, and saying: "if this is the best solution for our community, for our long term water supply, will you allow us to do this?"

Cr Williams said that with a background in environmental studies, he's 'not a big fan of dams' and doesn't think they're a solution for a lot of things, 'but in this circumstance, it makes sense'.

But Ms Martiniello said, 'if Rous is serious about reconciliation, they would not be continuing the destruction of living Widjabal culture, implicating themselves in the war on sacred sites that is rampant across the continent'.

Ms Martiniellio is also concerned about the risks to biodiversity.

'There are numerous threatened plant species in the flood area, which will not survive. These species should be protected under the EPBC Act (1999)'.

Yet Cr Williams said the dam proposal wasn't his first proposed dam. He told The Echo that, 'Keith is misplaced when discussing environmental flow. Dunoon Dam, with enviro flow legislation - though twice the size of Rocky Creek Dam – will have only half the yield'. Dr Recher would also

like the underlying growth issue (which is driving the need for a second dam) to be addressed.

'As for potable [water], Rous is just accepting the squeamish non-scientific nonsense,' said Dr Recher.

'Science says recycled sewerage using membrane technology means it is first class drinking water. Get over it, people. Recycled sewerage or a \$250 million dollar dam?'

Retired Byron Greens councillor Richard Staples responded to Mr Williams' comments about the new dam by saying, 'When I was in the Chair at Rous, I pushed hard for more emphasis on demand management, rather than ham-fisted supply-side solutions.

'A reticulated supply (say from Rocky Creek Dam) could, indefinitely into the future, be used more as a drought reserve than a mainstream supply, if most people collected their own water.

'But there would be no big contracts - how boring!

'The proposed Dunoon/ Channon Dam would store some three times as much water as Rocky Creek Dam,' Mr Staples said.

'This will allow - in fact require – massive urban development in the County District, to pay it off.'










Tallowood Ridge estate's change of plans prompt resident concern

Will the remaining old growth trees and vegetation in Mullumbimby's Tallowood housing estate be preserved, or are they destined for the mulch heap?

That's the question facing the rapidly expanding estate on the town's western fringe.

A group of concerned residents calling themselves the Friends of the Mooibal Spur (FOMS) - named after the informal walking track that climbs the Tallowood ridge – have sent an open letter to Byron Council imploring it to protect the remaining trees on the track and the other pockets of vegetation on the estate.

'The subdivision and development of the Tallowood Ridge housing estate were originally approved on the strict proviso that this walkway and its vegetation were left intact and in public hands', the letter states.

'Unfortunately, broken promises on the part of the developer, and less than rigorous public scrutiny by Council (partly as a result of continual personnel changes), have resulted in the boundaries of lots being drawn so as to encompass significant old growth trees, a number of which have since been felled by the private owners.'

They claim that Council and the developer failed to allow public access to the ridge walk in any of the subdivision stages that have been approved so far, and that the developer appears

to have actively sought to prevent this access.

The residents also fear for the future of the remaining forested areas on the estate.

They say that the developer, Eric Freeman, made a verbal commitment during a Byron Council meeting to place these areas in an E2 zoning to ensure their protection, but has so far failed to keep his promise.

They now want Council to make sure this promise is kept.

Developer responds

But the developer, Eric Freeman, strenuously denied the claims. He said the residents had not pointed to any specific examples of old growth trees being felled in the letter, and pointed out that in one recent case where an old tree was felled, the owner had obtained permission from the Council.

Regarding access to the ridge walk, Mr Freeman said that there had originally been a plan for a concrete bikeway along the ridgeline, but this had been cancelled by Council after its consultants found evidence of koalas living there.

'Nonetheless, there are numerous points in Tallowood Ridge where the public is able to access the ridgeline, and we have not made any effort to prevent walkers from accessing the ridgeline, which is a 20m wide unmade public road reserve in the care of Council', Mr Freeman said.

In relation to the E2 zones, Mr Freeman said that none of



Patchs Beach entrance closed, police crackdown

The Patchs Beach 4WD entrance in South Ballina is now blocked, but continuing bad behaviour from some beach visitors further south has led to a police crackdown on 4WDs.

Twenty infringements have been issued for dog offences and for driving in dune areas, by Richmond Valley Council Rangers.

Police have conducted over 30 random breath tests and licence checks, and issued infringements for negligent driving. Two drivers were also caught fishtailing and driving at high speeds near children on the beach.

Stephen Totterman from Coastal Defenders Network at Empire Vale said in a letter to Ballina Shire Council that closing the Patchs track is not enough, as 4WD vehicles will still access the beach from north and south.

Local resident Megan Ward said, 'It is no longer acceptable in our community and beyond to have one of Ballina's greatest natural assets, South Ballina Beach, destroyed owing to the

excessive and dangerous 4WDs and other destructive human activities, such as illegal camping and roaming off-leash dogs.

Endangered Pied Oystercatchers

Ms Ward has launched a petition to protect the local Pied Oystercatcher population and other endangered species that nest and live on South Ballina Beach.

The petition calls for 4WDs to be banned from the beach and an in-depth ecological study to be conducted.

Ballina Shire Councillor Keith Williams told *The Echo* he was pleased to see the h. Photo Garry Fenton4WD entrance to PatchsBeach closed, and said it's

Cr Williams said he's more optimistic about the future of the Pied Oystercatchers now, but there are still major challenges for the threatened species while the damage continues.

'The decline has been substantial already, and that's what you worry about.

'We're down to probably 10 per cent of what was nesting there previously,' he said.

'There's a caravan park that advertises itself as "Come bring your dog here", even though it's surrounded by National Park.

'The fact that the state government agencies control most of what's been going on down there, that's been the most frustrating thing. You just can't get them to act. So it's been taking a long time.'

Govt to develop walking hinterland trails, camping

Plans for 'World class recreational facilities' in the Tweed. Byron and Lismore region to boost both the NSW visitor economy and community wellbeing are rolling ahead, say NSW Department of Planning, Industry and Environment.

National Parks are developing the Tweed Byron Hinterland trails, which 'will create high quality naturebased visitor experiences focusing on a signature walk from near the village of Uki to Minyon Falls in the far north NSW hinterland'.

According to www. environment.nsw.gov.au, 'The project will see new sustainable visitor infrastructure in the Wollumbin, Mount Jerusalem and Nightcap national parks and Whian Whian State Conservation Area'.

A multi-day walking track is proposed, to link Tweed Shire, via Mount Jerusalem National Park, to the visitor

area at Minyon Falls in Nightcap National Park.

A campground near Unicorn Falls, located approximately 15 kilometres southeast of Uki, is also proposed.

The \$7.35 million project is expected to be delivered in stages, over a four-year period, with final completion expected in 2022.

Additionally, plans of management (PoM) for local reserves have recently been adopted by the NSW

planning minister.

They include the 875 hectare Tyagarah Nature Reserve, the 10.5 hectare Ti Tree Lake Aboriginal Area (between Suffolk Park and Broken Head) and the 110 hectare Broken Head Nature Reserve. The Inner Pocket Nature Reserve PoM has also been adopted, and covers approximately 220 hectares in the Brunswick River catchment, 10 kilometres west of Brunswick Heads.

Support for natural burial grounds sought

Zenith Virago from the NSW Charity, The Natural Death Care Centre, is seeking support from those wishing to be buried in a Byron natural burial ground.

Ms Virago says, 'A diverse and committed group of people came together last year to explore the possibility of creating a natural burial ground in the Byron

'A notice of motion was passed by Council last November, and they are committed to fulfilling the communities' wishes in establishing a natural burial ground for the Byron Shire'.

Doing death well

Ms Virago says, 'As a community, the Byron Shire is a trailblazer in doing death well, and reclaiming our

legal rights, and our social rites to create ceremony and body disposal methods that are part of our lives.

'Did you know you can build your own coffin, and keep the person at home for up to five days after they die on a cold plate, and then bury them on private land, if it meets Council's policy?

'These are a return to the old ways of doing things, a

global movement, a place where people could be buried in a simple or cardboard coffin, or in a shroud.

'There are hundreds of natural burial grounds all over the world, and with our minds and hearts on the global climate crisis, this is a much more sustainable way to go'.

Bruns chamber rejects mayor's paid parking rhetoric

Further to last week's story on the possible introduction of paid parking in Brunswick Heads, the town's Chamber treasurer, Kim Rosen, clarified that she is not the president.

Further, Mrs Rosen said workshops were only held between the consultants and Council, 'certainly not with stakeholders'.

She also refuted the Mayor Simon Richardson's 'sweeping statements' that Council has done everything the Brunswick Heads Chamber asked for.

She said, 'Yes, the Chamber had every right to ask Council to undertake an economic assessment.

'Especially as the Roads and Maritime Services (RMS) required Council to consider any impacts of paid parking on businesses and visitors, and residents also'.

'94.4 per cent of businesses in the CBD are

worried that paid parking will impact their business. They have very good reason. One current Brunswick Heads business owner lost his previous job when paid parking came to Byron Bay.

'Another Brunswick Heads business owner saw a 35 per cent downturn in trade for his Byron Bay business.

'Data elsewhere backs up these impacts. Loss of trade equals loss of jobs for locals.

The community has a right to consistent methodology and accurate data. This is not what we have had.

Data up to scrutiny?

'At the February 27 Council meeting, Cr Cameron said, "Get the data and make sure you analyse it properly. Make sure that data stands up to scrutiny".

'We couldn't agree more'. According to the No Paid Parking Group, the data

provided in the EthosUrban Economic Assessment doesn't stand up to scrutiny. 'We can cite many examples of inaccuracies, omissions and opinions that were passed off as data', said Mrs Rosen.

'Council asked the Economic Assessment to provide details of the number of visitors versus locals.

'They didn't.

Time for compassion

'It's a time for compassion, not for delivering yet another blow to our small business sector and our community who are very nervous about the future.

'No-one knows with any certainty what the next year will bring'.

Mayor Simon Richardson says he will be pushing for paid parking - apart from his fellow Greens councillors, he has the support of independent Cr Cate Coorey.

Tales of business trading in COVID-19 times

While Byron Bay clearly had extra people on the streets last week, there were other areas of the Shire that also swelled in numbers because of the school holidays.

The Bangalow Chamber of Commerce reported that there were plenty more people in town and the businesses were prepared.

'It was a cautiously optimistic vibe that we were happy to see,' said James from the Chamber.

'While business is coming back to usual, there remains an unequal distribution compared to pre-COVID-19 times.'

It was a mixed bag in Brunswick Heads, being different from business to business, from day to day, and from morning to afternoon. 'One cafe is even different from another, and one retail business is different from another', said Brunswick Chamber treasurer Kim Rosen.

'I have been out and about in Bruns every day this week,' she said. 'It looks like its quite busy in the CBD block from 10am till 2pm, but by 3pm, the town has gone dead. That's because most businesses seem to be trading with reduced hours, presumably to cut down on staff costs. One retailer was telling me today that people are not buying up big'.

Peter Winter from Bruns News said there are definitely more people about in these school holidays, but they are only buying trinkets.

'They are just not spending. But it doesn't surprise me. Unfortunately, theft has skyrocketed in the last fortnight. I can't see us making a profit this side of Christmas'.

Meanwhile Gary Deller from the Happy Dolphin Cafe said it's been busier than he thought it would be for the July school holidays. 'But it's still not enough to be sustainable without JobKeeper. Without it, I'd be closed. I just don't know what will happen'.

Michelle Beggs from Print Rescue, also in Bruns, said last week they were flat out printing border passes.

'I was especially busy on Friday; however, that on its own will not pay the bills. The federal government help has been a business saver, and while we are busier now than April or June, I worry for the unknown from October once the help ceases. The town has been very busy, there have been a lot of grey nomads waiting for the border to open, as well as school holiday visitors'.

Ms Beggs said, a thing to remember is that while you may see people queuing, it's because the cafes and restaurants are not seating people to capacity. 'Inside the bakery there are only three people allowed at a time – so I would question whether they are making the huge profits it would appear.

Lennox Head appears busy too, with Chamber president Zain Peart saying there appeared to be a lot more people in town.

Over in Byron Bay, Chamber of Commerce president, Todd Sotheren, said Byron definitely has been looking a lot more like it's old self over the past couple of weeks.

'It'd definitely up on what would normally be our "off-season" in winter. Understandably, people from further south – particularly Sydney, who have been cooped up in lockdown for months now – have flocked here, with restrictions easing'.

Mr Sotheren said Byron is particularly attractive given that most people are travelling by road, rather than air at the moment. 'Byron is about as far north as you can go, before running into the closed QLD border.'

Jenelle Stanford from the Mullum Newsagency is also the Mullumbimby Chamber of Commerce president.

Jenelle said the recent \$80 million lotto win had helped increase the numbers at her business, but there were also a lot of holiday makers. 'It's sort of back to normal. There are no parking places. We're all doing the social distancing, and abiding by the amount of people you can have in the shop'.

Hotels fined over giving free booze to gamblers

He told The Echo, 'The industry is predatory, and they encourage their venues

No easy path with this virulent pathogen

While New Zealand declares itself COVID-19 free this week, Australia, particularly Victoria and now NSW residents, are bracing themselves for fresh cases of the virus. If there are to be local cluster outbreaks owing to asymptomatic or symptomatic visitors, it will presumably start to emerge shortly.

New Zealand's strict eradication regime – which even included locking down the construction industry – appears at this stage a better outcome than Australia's containment plan.

Yet eradication on a smaller island with fewer people was going to be more achievable.

The example no one wants to follow of course is the US, where states such as Arizona and Florida continue to buckle under sharp increases in the number of cases.

And Sweden's experiment of allowing the virus to run its course 'has become the world's cautionary tale', according to the New York Times.

Any pretence of this pandemic vanishing anytime soon quickly evaporates the more scientists understand about the virus.

Long term immunity after infection could be lost in months, a King's College London study has recently suggested.

According to www.health.gov.au, 'COVID-19 is a new disease, so there is no existing immunity in our community'.

Yet infectious disease expert and Professor of Medicine at the University of Virginia, William Petri, wrote in academic website *The Conversation* that in a 'tiny percentage of cases - maybe 1 in 100 - the immune system naturally eliminates SARS-CoV-2 from the body [SARS-CoV-2 is the virus; COVID-19 is the disease]. This is very encouraging for vaccine development'.

A vaccine of course, could be years away.

And because it's all still unfolding, the accuracy of clinical study results may well change over time.

For example, there are early indications that blood types may have a role in the contagion. The risk for individuals for Type O blood appear to be significantly lower than other types, says Columbia University. It's a similar outcome to a previous Chinese study.

Former New Zealand prime minister Helen Clark is the co-chair of the World Health Organisation's Independent Panel for Pandemic Preparedness and Response. She told Dr Norman Swan on the ABC's Health Report this week that another pandemic could be around the corner. Another coronavirus 'may not be as far away as one would think', she said.

So if you prefer science over punditry, you would be suspicious of Murdoch's media mules, who campaign for complacency.

It's worth asking whether Australia wants to be like America at this time? Murdoch's media mules have much more influence in the US than they do here. Every bit of misinformation and seeding of doubt slows down the collective effort to get a handle on this one-in-a-100-year disease.

Ambitious vision needed for second virus wave

f this isn't the dreaded second wave of COVID-19, it will do until the real thing comes along.

Which leads immediately to the question: are we ready for the second wave of economic stimulus we will need to ameliorate it?

And the answer is, unfortunately, almost certainly not. For weeks, months, Scott Morrison and Josh Frydenberg have been assuring us that JobKeeper, the boost to JobSeeker, and all the rest of them, are one-off programs, strictly limited and temporary.

But this thinking was predicated on the idea that coronavirus was also a one-off, a limited and temporary infection that could be contained and shut down within a maximum of six months.

As we have seen, not only in Victoria, but around the world, this was far too optimistic. COVID-19 is roaring back in all its former ugliness - perhaps even worse.

In recent days, ScoMo and Josh have been making conciliatory noises about tweaking some of the more vocal claimants for assistance – notably in tourism for a bit longer than they anticipated.

But with virtually an entire state in lock down and the smashing of revenue that will entail, something considerably more ambitious will be required.

And if the second wave spreads across the borders of the cabbage patch state, a likelihood that only the incorrigibly sanguine think can be avoided, our resident miracle-worker ScoMo will need to find a few handy rabbits to produce from what his trusty assistant Josh has shown to be an absolutely empty hat.

Frydenberg, as ever, is reassuring. Promising full economic support for his home state; whatever that means.

But encouraging words will not be enough, and it is clear that he, in common with just about everyone else, has been caught short by the speed and virulence of the new outbreak.

Premier Daniel Andrews acted decisively and drastically, locking down nine housing commission blocks and their 3000 victims, but the infection rate continued to accelerate.

Almost immediately he upped the ante to more than five million across the Melbourne metropolitan area and

But his initial reaction smacked of unprepared panic. As deputy chief health officer Paul Kelly (the one who does science, not music or pomposity) pointed out, the towers were like vertical cruise ships – sealed environments in which close contact was inevitable; petri dishes in which the virus could flourish.

So it did, and Andrews was stuck with the problem of what to do with the mounting toll when the first lockdowns of five days (nowhere near the incubation period for the disease) had elapsed.

Gladys Berejiklian appeared almost paranoid, switching from staunch opposition to the border closing to draconian implementation where Victoria was concerned. Mungo MacCallum

But the problem solved itself.

The internees in one tower remained in solitary, but the others were allowed to join their fellow inmates in limited detention, under the less onerous restrictions.

Meanwhile the rest of the country was similarly bemused. All the other states and territories reacted with various degrees of alarm, and all took steps to effectively isolate Victoria.

In NSW, Gladys Berejiklian appeared almost paranoid, switching from staunch opposition to the border closing to draconian implementation where Victoria was concerned.

She had her reasons; between them, the two big states cover well above half the total economy of Australia.

If the second wave crosses the Murray, and similar shutdowns need to be imposed, the consequences will be horrendous.

And for Morrison, after days of muted self-congratulation over the country's relative success in suppressing the pandemic, the back down will be at least equally embarrassing.

The September cut off of government aid must now be considered inoperable, but the alternatives are hard to come by.

Morrison, always the marketeer, is talking about the old standby of tax cuts, bringing forward the measures already legislated.

But this knee jerk reaction, if it eventuates, will be far too little and too late. The cuts Morrison is pondering involve just a dollar a week for low incomes, and would not start until July next year.

If genuine help for consumers is to be tried, a big hit, like that devised by Kevin Rudd and Ken Henry, the one that kept us out of recession over the Global Financial Crisis, would be needed.

But Morrison can't afford one, and in any case it goes against his instincts he has always been more interested in boosting the supply side.

So perhaps more company tax cuts will be on the table?

But that too would involve considerable lead-time to be even marginally effective, and time is what Morrison and the rest of us – have not got much of.

Tax cuts, if they are on, will presumably not be announced officially until the October budget, although it is a safe bet they will be strategically leaked well before then.

But in any case, the real action will have to be on July 23, when the big reset is due, and Frydenberg has promised a review of how we are going so far. The spin, of course, is that we are right on course, the economy is looking a picture, that business will be humming back before you know it.

The truth, however, is likely to be more than somewhat less rosy.

Frydenberg is resigned to preserving some form of assistance – cautious, targeted, and of course temporary.

But sooner or later he will have to face the crunch. Whether COVID-19 persists or not, either the stimulus must continue indefinitely, and to hell with debt and deficit, or it will cut off; risking closures, bankruptcies, unemployment and prolonged recession.

Even The Australian is gloomy at the prospect. Drawing breath (through a mask, we hope) from the constant lambasting of Victoria in general, and premier Daniel Andrews in particular, the national daily unleashed its editor at large, Paul Kelly (the one who does pomposity, not science or music) to offer a different diatribe.

Under the heading 'Recriminations splitting our unity when we most need it' Kelly chided that divisions were a threat to economic recovery.

Presumably Kelly does not read his own paper. Well, who can blame him?

Asking for trouble



The Pilliga State Forest is the largest temperate woodland west of the Great Dividing Range, covering more than 500.000ha. It is one of the most bio-diverse areas of Australia, and home to many vulnerable species of fauna and flora. It was recognised as one of Australia's biodiversity hotspots in the early 2000's owing to its mixture of coastal and inland species.

Very importantly, the Pilliga Forest also lies in the southern recharge zone of the Great Artesian Basin.

Santos' Narrabri Gas Project seeks approval for 850 CSG wells in northwest NSW

Gas is in the air again. The northwest of NSW is preparing for the unfolding of a giant gas field, from the far Queensland border to Dubbo. The first of seven

stages will be the Narrabri Gas Project, with 850 wells in the Pilliga State Forest.

With excessive emissions, pollution of rivers and aquifers, the annihilation of green belts, of flora and fauna, and the degradation of farmland

these giant gas explorations will affect the health of entire communities.

With the Narrabri Gas Project comes the push for the 830 kilometre Hunter Gas Pipeline from Roma to Newcastle. The pipeline is conditional on the development of the Narrabri project.

Together, these projects will cost about \$3 billion.

Lie of gas shortage

We are being told that gas is critical for domestic energy supply. A curious urgency surrounds the gas projects desperation to fast-track approvals.

Conflicting with the insane cranking up of NSW gas production, the Newcastle GasDock import terminal promises to rescue NSW from an alleged 'gas shortage' by covering 80 per cent of NSW's annual requirement with imported gas.

The liquefied natural gas (LNG) facilities in Port Kembla have been approved to ramp up import capacity to supply NSW with 75 per cent of its total market need. That's 155 per cent coverage of demand for gas flowing into the state from outside suppliers. This makes the injection of natural gas from domestic sources obsolete.

Further, WorldOil reports that Australian exports of LNG are flooding the global market with a substantial surplus.

Food supply danger

The gas industry drills tunnels that destabilise the surface, and it leaves behind abandoned wells and wastewater ponds. The area of northwest

NSW is one of the most agriculturally productive areas of Australia. The Great Artesian Basin (GAB) is the stable water resource that supplies these farming communities. Without the GAB food production in Australia is in jeopardy.

Contamination is guaranteed and spills are inevitable. 'Produced water' from fracking is toxic and contains levels of salt that harden the soil and stop plants from growing. Rehabilitation of exploration sites like the Bohena 4/4L kill zone (already contaminated) in

the Pilliga is not achievable. Hazardous chemicals in ground and surface water are already poisoning the life around them.

Burning bores and bubbling rivers are proof of methane entering water reservoirs to a degree that is hazardous to health and a fire risk. This is environmental vandalism.

Health problems

Wells and pipelines leak. The flares propel fugitive emissions, with up to 250 different toxic chemicals. One of them is radioactive caesium 137.

Residents living near gasfields complain about serito the wells, and children are disproportionately affected by neurological problems and cancer.

Iconic natural areas are under threat. Development in the Pilliga forest threatens extinction for the vulnerable Pilliga mouse, and other locally threatened species, such as koalas, wallabies and the wedge-tailed eagle.

This issue is so life-threatening that every concerned citizen feels the injustice of flawed decisions by politicians, which are a slap in the face for their constituents.

Wherever you look, community groups have sprung up in response to the CSG risk, actively defending their livelihoods, homes and families.

In spite of all this, the **NSW Planning Department** has recommended, and approved Santos' application for the Narrabri Gas Project. The proposal has been referred to the Independent Planning Commission (IPC) for final approval. Submissions close 31 July. Paid parking – should it be in Mullumbimby and Brunswick too?

How can Council be trusted when every time paid parking (PP) in Brunswick Heads is discussed we are faced with a different set of guidelines? We started with full time metered parking, and when that was proven to be unnecessary it became periodic PP in December, January and Easter. Now it seems to be weekends and public holidays.

Imagine the confusing signage we will have to contend with. It's just a pretext to get those meters in, so that eventually they will be in use all year round, as that's the only way they will be financially viable.

This is despite the fact the TPS report from two years ago stated that parking in Mullumbimby is a far bigger problem, and suggested that a review of parking meters in Bruns be put on hold for five years. The Ethos Urban report was based on questionable figures, and acknowledged the harm meters could do to local jobs, which Council have chosen to ignore.

This is not a Council who cares about thousands of signatures from petitions [against PP], or our village atmosphere. It's purely a money grab.

Has anyone studied the effects of paid parking on businesses in Byron? How was turnover affected in the short term, after 12 months, or two years?

If my experience is typical, businesses could do better after paid parking than before. Living in Mullum I rarely shopped in Byron before paid parking because it was too hard to find a park.

Since paid parking came in I shop more frequently in Byron because I can usually find parking near the shops I want to visit.

If others, like me, are shopping in Byron more often than before, maybe paid parking has increased takings or, at least, not adversely affected them.

The same thing happens in Mullumbimby. I regularly end up shopping in Woolworths after driving around town looking for parking only to give up and go where

I always find a spot; Woollies' car park. Shops in town benefitted more than usually from my shopping during the COVID-19 lockdown because parking was much easier to find (but now we're back to doing circuits).

Reliable information about the effects of paid parking on Byron Bay businesses would be useful for making informed decisions about paid parking in other parts of the Shire. Does anyone have the data?

UNDERSTANDING SIMON – 49 Shades of Grey –

Occasionally during a Council debate the Mayor will deliver a little homily to illustrate his profundity. It's as if he believes that once you see the logic behind his wisdom you will agree that the development under consideration must go ahead – just as his mates on the staff have recommended.

Underneath the surface flim-flam what Simon is really doing is shoring up his resolve, and that of his three trained monkeys, by justifying in advance his intention to yet again let down the local residents who voted for him. The National Party love him and can't believe their luck. From the Mayor's point of view it doesn't matter where the adulation comes from, as long as there's plenty of it. A hug from a grateful bulldozer driver is still a hug.

Simon's mental gymnastics have left little pockets of pissed-off neighbours all over the shire such that 'Greens' has become almost a dirty word. It's true that individual objectors can be simplistic, uninformed, hostile and resistant to change but that's not an excuse to dismiss them wholesale and to substitute platitudes that serve only to further Simon's amazing self-belief.

The subject of the particular debate quoted from below was the proposal on March 28, 2020 to build a restaurant in Coorabell and to use Scarrabellotis road reserve next door for parking and access. I won't here go into specifics except to say that the staff report on which councillors rely for information was on this occasion the most sub-standard I've experienced.

Simon:

"I'm not close-minded, I'm not close minded because when you are closed minded, you stop thinking and you stop being open to a new idea. So, bring some new ideas, let's see.

"As soon as you start saying it's this or that, life's black or white, you start looking like a fool, because there's grey and as soon as you're a little bit wrong, you're totally wrong. When you start putting things into one box or two boxes. Life isn't quite as simple as that. Especially certainly when you have kids, you know life's not quite as simple as what we think... therefore, let's play in the grey, let's acknowledge there is some grey here and see what can come of it and jump into our own little colour pot if we need to but at least we can say we sought and tried to find a reasonable outcome. I've got no idea what that's going to look like but I'm open to the conversation."

Obviously, according to Simon, every development proposal is a matter of compromise and negotiation; planning law is all but irrelevant. And when a proposal is "grey", one is obliged, apparently, to vote in favour of it.

There seems to be no glimmer in Simon's mind that planning law itself is the product of very lengthy "conversations" and many compromises, and is itself full of grey areas where individual outcomes may quite legitimately differ from case to case. To further dilute those laws is not within Council's legal power except by changing the LEP.



Simon's views as expressed are quite insulting and disrespectful to those who disagree with him. Far from being closed-minded, most councillors weigh up a variety of factors and considerations before deciding which way to go. There is no "grey" button, only "Yay" or "Nay". The decision-making world is digital, not analogue. The rejected developer can always come up with a better proposal.

To imply that councillors who are opposed to a particular development take that position because of some intellectual or emotional deficiency is presumptuous. It's good to be openminded; but it's a problem when you can hear the wind howling through the empty canyons.



Having absorbed Simon's approach as revealed above, I wondered how it fits in with:

- a) Greens policy at a state and federal level
- b) Simon's own election promises last time round

I put my question at the 21 May meeting. Though it was recorded in the minutes, Simon used a flimsy pretext to avoid providing an answer. However Jan Barham as a fellow Green, thought an answer was required, so Simon came up with the following gem:

"As I represent the whole community of Byron Shire it is the whole community's needs and the needs of future residents that guide my decisions. State and Federal political party policies have no binding power over my decision making and do not influence my decisions on local matters. I am first and foremost a Byron Shire local, making local decisions with the local impact in mind.

"As a Greens member, I hold the four principles dear..."

"Representing the whole community" is straight out of the Textbook of Excuses & Copouts.

Note that no answer has been provided regarding consistency with Simon's election promises.

Simon doesn't say what the four guiding principles actually are, but extrapolating from Council's performance under his leadership I'd take the following punt:

- 1. endless development
- 2. love of authority
- 3. capitulation to greed
- 4. disguise the future in glossy brochures

Back in 2014 we fought hard to keep Metgasco out of the Northern Rivers. Let's support the people of northwestern NSW to keep their area gasfield free.

Artistic debate

Ron Curran raised concerns about the state of public art in the Byron Shire (Letters, 8 July). He raised two questions regarding Arts Northern Rivers' (ANR).

I currently sit on the Byron Shire Art Panel (BSAP) as a representative of ANR with seven other members. They contribute their time, talent, and expertise voluntarily.

Regarding ANRs' 'effectiveness as a consulting body', they provide: Regular consultation with all tiers of government to advocate for regional arts development. Our most recent advocacy has facilitated a \$10 million dollar boost to the Regional Arts Fund; Fundraising to provide \$15,000 in small grants to support local creatives affected by the

pandemic; Securing an additional \$65,000 funding for our Aboriginal arts program; A \$90,000 grant for a creative recovery project with the Rappville community devastated by recent bushfires; Last week we secured funding to support emerging and early career musicians as COVID-19 restrictions ease.

These are just a few examples. I would be happy to have a longer conversation with Ron on what we offer.

Regarding BSAP - the tenure of community representative roles on the panel match the cycle of local government elections. Following Council elections, expressions of interest are called to fill these roles.

Ron, given the passion you feel about the state of public art in the Shire and your deep concern for the arts and cultural sector, I suggest you consider submitting an expression of interest (EOI) to join the panel.

Hope for a Sunrise?

Sunrise Estate residents concerned about increasing development infill and resultant street parking issues, should approve of Byron Shire Council's proposed amendments to 'Character Narratives DCP 2014 Locality Chapters'.

The amendments recognise Sunrise's 'leafy streetscapes with wide grassy nature strips... contributing to the streetscape and habitats for koalas and other native fauna'. Also: 'It is important that future infill

development complements the low scale character...'

The amendments recategorise Sunrise from a 'Transitional' to 'Subtle' area. The difference seems important. Transitional areas are earmarked for change, with medium density development. But 'Subtle' areas should expect development 'complementing the existing form – likely to be incremental with many of the existing elements remaining'.

Those preferring the latter Sunrise development submit your approval of the amendments via the BSC website before 24 July.

Not just Mullum pool

No it wasn't Byron Council's budget cuts that put the \$50,000 upgrade of Mullum pool on ice. The money that could have been used was spent on the \$2.1m redevelopment of Railway Park, Byron Bay.

The mayor publicly informed the community that the \$2.1m came from unallocated paid parking money. But it didn't. After going through council's budgets, and three emails with Council, I got the actual source of the \$2.1m spent on Railway Park. It came from existing allocated council funds, held by Council, that were allocated to be spent on the Byron and Suffolk catchment, and on Shirewide community facilities.

Railway Park's redevelopment used (in part) Council funds of \$442,000 held for Shire-wide community facilities, \$35,000 held for Shire-wide disability access ramps, and \$170,000 held for civic improvements, including Shire-wide disabled access facilities.

The \$50,000 to initiate solar heating for all-year-round opening of the Mullum Pool, a new children's pool, a rehab pool, and pool

access for all abilities, could have come from those funds. I believe the \$50,000 funds for the Mullum Pool upgrade (and the remaining \$2,050,000 that could have been spent on other community infrastructure and facilities) have all been sacrificed to spend on dolling-up Railway Park and to further progress rolling out the development changes in Byron Bay's Masterplan.

Funding choices

'The ABC is [officially] on the endangered list' – so began, with dramatic exaggeration, a recent *Soapbox* in *The Echo* (1 July) – a wonderful revelation of the capacity for the use of loaded language.

The ABC is given (not, be it noted, earns) over \$1 billion per year. It is thus a pensioner (some pension, eh!), not a wage earner. Like all pensions, it should cut its suit to match its cloth.

The ABC is not suffering 'cuts', or even a 'freeze'; it is receiving more money each year (not as much as it had hoped for). No money has been taken from what it had. A cut is a reduction in what one has, such that one is left with less than one had before. This is defiantly not the case with the ABC.

Consider some figures: in 2018/19 the ABC was given (did not earn) 1,046 million taxpayers dollars; in 2019/20 the ABC was given (did not earn) 1,062m taxpayer dollars (an extra \$16m). This financial year the ABC will be given (not earn) \$1,065m taxpayers dollars (an extra \$3m); in the next financial year it will be given (not earn) an extra five million taxpayer dollars, a total of 1,070m.

When I started school, admittedly over 75 years ago, such figures would have mandated that I consider using the word 'increase'.

The problem at the ABC could be seen as a result of the spending of other people's money on something else, where value and cost becomes a matter of 'who cares?'.

In any case, as is evident by the figures above, anyone who uses the word 'cut' is either wilfully ignorant, shamefully dishonest, or confoundedly stupid.



on our property had cameras and they were musicians. If they weren't filming, then they were playing. Everything in *The Show* was in arms reach, like Headland and Jez Mead.

'I loved seeing my close friends, neighbours and family transform themselves into a multi-faceted creative unit.

One of the bonuses of *The Show* for Tex has been introducing his audience to some of his favourite musicians.

'All the musicians I have on *The* Show have been around for years. They are incredibly talented, but they don't have a huge profile. It's been a pleasure introducing them to my audience who are really embracing them.'

In *The Show*, Tex steps up as host, something he admits is 'the toughest part.'

'I am getting away with it... when we started out, we had the music and the chat separate. I had the couch set up, a bit like Parkinson. We worked out we could chat with the musicians in the context of playing a song. It seemed to be the most natural way to do it.'

Sometimes what really makes a show like *The Show* so interesting are the mistakes – or watching someone as competent and in charge as Tex Perkins take on something that he finds a bit challenging. He's even leaving in some of his mistakes!

'In episode one, when I was interviewing Murray, I got stuck on the word "contemplative". My brain kept saying, that's wrong, the word is "contemplate". I got stuck for nearly a minute... I could have cut it out, but I thought, let's leave

The Show is understated, and stylishly shot. It's like this rare opportunity to sit and watch what amazing musicians do when they hang out together. It has a relaxed natural feel, but the music is incredible, and the vision is pretty bloody good too.

'Our underlying philosophy was that we wanted to show something easy on the eye - we had two smoke machines – the whole show is glued together with smoke and reverb!' laughs Tex.

So far Tex and his crew have made three episodes of *The Show*, with the fourth one going to air at the end of the month. This month's guest is Lucie Thorne.

'She's a total one woman troubadour' says Tex. 'It's just her and her electric guitar and her stories. We got her to play by herself after she played on a bunch of my songs. She fit with me perfectly – I want to do more stuff with her. It's not what you would expect out of a female harmony with me.'

Evan lands on his feet at the New Brighton Farmers Market

New Brighton Farmers Market was one of the first places Evan Anderson visited when he came to the Byron Shire as a traveller in his early 20s.

'Within the first few days of arriving I somehow landed here,' he said.

On that day he met stallholder Amir Zikhron, founder of Baraka Foods, who gave him his first local job, selling dips at the market.

Nine years later, Evan, originally from California, is back. This time with his own certified organic produce stall, Kennedys Lane Farm.

Since those early days selling dips, the plant ecology graduate has been busy getting his hands dirty in a whole host of local share-farming ventures, as well as helping to educate others about ecologically-sound farming practices via local group Hungry Earth Agroecology.

Now, he's part of a new share-farming arrangement with Myocum organic farm, Kennedy's Lane Farm, where he and his small team are growing a variety of seasonal certified organic produce for the farmers markets, including garlic, ginger, root vegetables, herbs, leafy greens and certified organic eggs from free range hens on the farm.

Evan, and partner Bethanie, who also works on the farm, are at the stall each Tuesday selling their produce direct to the public.

Healthy soil is paramount at Kennedy Lane Farm, says Evan, and they use practices such as cover

intensive companion planting that involves planting a diversity of crops close together in the same bed.

'We're able to maximise space and time, we can grow a lot more food in that space and reduce tillage on the soil.'

Evan says seeing the success of this method has been incredibly rewarding, and feeding people with this sustainably grown produce even more so.

'The biggest thing for me is just getting food to the community.'
