Byron's coastal erosion sparks urgent meeting

Severe coastal erosion at Clarkes Beach and Main Beach has prompted Byron Council to call an urgent meeting with Crown Lands and other stakeholders to discuss ways of addressing the issue.

Clarkes Beach has been particularly affected by the erosion over the past three months, with tonnes of sand stripped away exposing a rock shelf beneath.

The beach is also littered with uprooted pandanus trees, and the eroded dune line is

now within metres of the Beach restaurant and cafe.

'I walked along Main Beach on Sunday morning and was devastated at what had occurred just in the space of the previous seven days,' Greens councillor Sarah Ndiaye said.

'To see one of the most beautiful beaches in the world gouged by the sea like that was shocking.

'On a big swell at high tide waves could potentially break over the embankment.'

Under an urgency motion successfully moved by Cr Ndiaye, Council staff will

convene a meeting of all land managers with responsibility for the two beaches.

This will include Crown Lands, who have primary responsibility for managing the site.

The purpose of the meeting is to discuss the impact of various coastal processes on the beach, and to explore potential options for management.

The outcome will be reported to the next available Council meeting.

One matter likely to be discussed at the meeting is the Lighthouse Road stormwater Continued on page 4

Mullum, Byron Bay rail with trail moves forward

The debate over the future of the Shire's decommissioned rail line flared again at last week's Council meeting, with councillors considering spending another \$200,000 on the dream of getting trains back on the degraded line.

With Council set to allocate further funds to the project at its next budget review, Councillor Alan Hunter unsuccessfully moved that the plan be shelved until a benefactor with deep pockets could be found.

'We need to stop talking about putting a train on the tracks until we get someone who's going to underwrite our expenses, or to pick it up and build it,' Cr Hunter said during an at-times fiery meeting.

'There's no way forward with the train it's just a sink-hole for money.

'What we do have is clear support for the bike and walking trail. There's support here, in other Shires, across the country and around the world'.

A report from Council staff tabled at the meeting recommended that further funds be allocated to the project to fund the development of a 'robust business case' and to determine the amount of work needed to make the line train-ready.

Private consultants Arcadis Australia have made a proposal to Council to undertake a structural assessment of the 12-plus bridges on the line using a 'digital methodology'.

The company, which has previously been hired by Council to work on the rail project, quoted \$200,000 for the work.

However, it has been suggested that the company significantly underestimated the number of bridges on the line, and that the cost of the assessment could be closer to \$500,000.

Byron Film Fest returns Oct 23

The Byron Bay International Film Festival returns in 2020 with a special edition hybrid festival to include select cinema screenings, a competition for independent filmmakers, and a unique virtual reality experience.

Screening at Byron Bay's Palace Cinemas and the Byron Theatre, the festival will run from October 23 to November 1.

Festival director J'aimee Skippon-Volke says, 'The 2020 festival will not be a business as usual event. Social distancing regulations will change the atmosphere and scale of what we deliver, but we're still going to roll out the red carpet and bring audiences the very best of world cinema and screen events'.

Apart from screenings, J'aimee says the festival will still include a competition celebrating the very best of independent filmmaking in 2020 and a special virtual reality experience at Byron's iconic lighthouse under a full moon.

Celebrity judges for the event include acting legend Jack Thompson, actor David Wenham, artist/filmmaker Lynette Wallworth, rising star

► Continued from page 1 diversion project – a Council-lead measure aimed at reducing the impact of stormwater runoff on the fragile coastal fringe.

Stormwater project

Councillors are scheduled to receive a briefing on this project at December's Strategic Planning Workshop.

Another issue that is likely to come up at the upcoming meeting about Clarkes Beach is the contribution of surface runoff and hard drainage systems to beach erosion.

Council staff said, in July, that they were in discussions with Crown Lands about what could be done to address the erosion issue.

'I know that staff have

been working on a number of things to help the situation,' Cr Ndiaye said.

'Unfortunately, we're not

the landholders in that area. But I do think the drains need addressing. This is happening at such a rapid rate, we need to be doing whatever we can. 'I don't think we can leave this to the last minute.'

Vale Richard Doggett

Macadamia farmer and local identity, Richard Doggett, was found dead on Friday after a farm accident at Numulgi. He was 72-years-old.

Richard was well known through both his association with the Richmond AFL club and as Chairman of the Australian Macadamia Society.

Officers from Richmond Police District say Mr Doggett's death is not being treated as suspicious.

The Richmond Club posted a message on their website: 'Richmond is mourning the passing of 1980 premiership General Manager Richard Doggett, who was killed in an accident on his northern NSW property'.

'Doggett had two stints as the Tigers' General Manager – from 1979-80 and 1986-88. He also served as the Club's treasurer in 1979-80.

'After leaving Tigerland the second time, Doggett had a stint as executive at Conrad Jupiters Casino on the Gold Coast. The Club sends its deepest sympathy to Richard's family and friends.'

The Australian Macadamia Society said they were devastated by the news. 'A kind, compassionate

and polite man to say the least'.

Northern Rivers Food Chair Pam Brook said her organisation is mourning his loss. 'Many in the NRF community will have met Richard at food industry functions and events, where he represented the Australian macadamia industry'.

'He was an active member and a great supporter of NRF industry initiatives.

'He was articulate, clever and well respected. He had the ability to bring calm and reason to any discussion. And above all, he was a gentleman. He always looked for the good in everyone', said Pam.

Councillors ignore Main Arm residents' over compliance blitz delay

Requests for councillors to halt an aggressive pursuit of unauthorised dwellings in Main Arm fell on deaf ears at last week's Council meeting.

Representing Main Arm Residents Association (MARA), former councillor and aspiring Greens mayor, Duncan Dey, requested councillors table an urgency motion during public access.

The suggested motion asked that Council 'cease hinterland action on perceived unauthorised dwellings'. The request further sought that if Council were to resume the program they 'do so only after considering public submissions on its Draft Unauthorised Dwellings Policy' and 'after resolving to adopt such a policy'. However, the request was

ignored, despite Councillor Michael Lyon acknowledging that the draft policy and letter was 'waffle' and that the current approach was 'not productive' and is 'scaring people' as pointed out by MARA representative Matthew Lambourne.

'The request went in writing to the councillors and the general manager and was repeated in public access, but was ignored,' Mr Dey told *The Echo*, following the meeting.

'It is disappointing that the councillors couldn't even pause the process until the public have had the first opportunity to comment on the policy, which should also outline the procedure that

\$500k in reports

'Already in this [term of] Council we've spent \$380,000. Now, just to get this new report done it's going to cost \$500,000,' Cr Hunter said.

But a majority of councillors disagreed.

Greens Mayor, Simon Richardson, moved that the original staff recommendation be put, and this passed by five votes to three.

'We keep hearing how expensive this is going to be, but no state government is going to spend tens of millions on a bike path [along the railway line] when most of the community doesn't want it,' Mayor Richardson said.

'The cost of upgrading it

to a bike path is similar to the cost of making it fit for a train shuttle of under 10 tonnes.

'The bike trail people have been quietly supporting this [bringing back the trains] because they know that getting a financially feasible vehicle on there first is the best way to go.'

The mayor's amendment reads, 'That Council considers a budget allocation at the September quarterly review to undertake further work on the Rail with Trail on the corridor between Mullumbimby and Byron Bay'.

Crs Hackett, Spooner, and Hunter voted against the amendment.

In favour were Crs Richardson, Martin, Ndiaye, Cameron, Lyon and Coorey. is already underway starting with the robo letters.'

Responding to detailed questions from *The Echo* on the policy and letter, Byron Shire Council staff again contradicted themselves.

At the previous Council meeting of September 17, Shannon Burt, Director Sustainable Environment and Economy, stated that the letter sent to Upper Main Arm residents was 'a show cause letter – not an

enforcement letter.'

Yet a Council spokesperson stated on September 28 that, 'The letter sent to residents was not a letter of demand or a show cause letter', leaving residents unsure of the implications of the letter.

'The aim of the letter is to initiate a conversation between Council and those landowners who may have unauthorised dwellings located on their property', the spokesperson states. 'Council's Enforcement team works on a wide range of matters and over the next 15 months its focus will also include unauthorised dwellings.

'Council's message to residents who may have unauthorised dwellings is to contact staff so any problems/issues can be clarified and resolved'.


NSW Greens spokesperson for Planning, Jamie Parker, told *The Echo* that while Council does have a legal responsibility in relation to safety of buildings and fire risk, 'It is clear that it needs a light touch. These [people] aren't developers'.

'What's clear is that there are many legacy issues. Following the Aquarius Festival, many people were following their hearts. Things need to be addressed on their merits.

'The community would hope they were being flexible – but making sure a building

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Rail trails for parts of north coast move closer

A bill to remove sections of the Casino to Murwillumbah railway line for rail trails/bike paths passed the NSW lower house (Legislative Assembly) last week.

To become law, it requires the support of the upper house (Legislative Council), which is still to vote on the bill.

The Transport Administration Amendment (Closure of Railway Lines in Northern Rivers) bill 2020 was supported locally by Geoff Provest, (Nationals MP for Tweed) and Janelle Saffin, (Labor MP for Lismore). Local Ballina MP Tamara Smith (Greens) voted against.

The bill 'authorises the closure of railway lines between Crabbes Creek and Condong, and between Casino and Bentley, and to retain the land in public ownership'.

Lease details needs tightening: Greens

Ms Smith told *The Echo*, 'The Greens are still hopeful of getting amendments passed in the Upper House that will really tighten up the leasehold provisions to ensure that public trusts have to be established to manage Rail Trails so that the broader community is truly represented over the longer term'.

'Elected councillors come and go, but a public trust with community representatives needs to be established.

'As it stands, this law means that councils could give tourism operators a 30 year lease to put a business in the corridor [and] that would confer property rights that would trump any other transport projects, and a

right that the community would be unable to challenge. We think this is unacceptable and it is at the heart of why we are opposing this legislation.

'If it's true that public transport or rail transport along the Tweed and Casino to Bentley rail corridors can be returned at any time, as the LNP and Labor are hanging their hats on, then explain to us, please, how exactly that happens once millions of dollars has been spent on rail trails built in the centre of the rail corridor?

'Who decides that the light rail project should trump the cycle paths and sets about to rip up millions of dollars in cycle infrastructure?

'The answer is nobody; it is a complete furphy, and we all know it.

'At least by mandating that public trusts should manage rail trails, those trusts can be the entities that actually oust the rail trail when a transport solution for the corridor presents itself.

'This law was literally in the public domain for five working days before it was passed and debated in the Legislative Assembly.

'For Labor to say that the community have had their say for years on this issue is political doublespeak. We wanted more time for the community to be able to engage with the actual law being passed, and we do not think that five days of two highly profitable and well used train services in the Northern Rivers in 2003.

'Both the Member for Tweed and the Member for Lismore spoke [in parliament] this week about wanting rail services in their electorates! But they were happy to sign off without close scrutiny on a law that will literally preclude rail from ever returning to their electorates.

'In Byron Shire, we have shown that you *can* have it all. You can have rails and cycle trails, and I commend Byron Council on their Byron Line project – extending the solar train line to Tyagarah.

'We will deliver a trail alongside light rail and prove that you can have your cake and eat it too.

'This law is a lost opportunity to look at public transport across the whole of the Northern Rivers, to demand more from the Minister for Transport and to deliver rail services and cycle trails'.

Nothing unexpected: Labor MP Saffin

Responding to the limited time the bill was examined, Lismore MP Janelle Saffin (Labor) told *The Echo*, 'My focus was on ensuring that the bill maintained the rail corridor in public hands, able to be brought back to train use without obstacles'.

'I negotiated two amendments with the minister, that strengthened this. These passed in the Legislative Assembly. The view I had heard many express was that the one-page bill contained nothing unexpected. 'The Legislative Council, as the house of review, will event' which 'enables the building of a walking and cycling path on the disused railway corridor in the Northern Rivers'.

'The legislation must now be affirmed in the Upper House of Parliament, and after that time the Tweed Shire and Richmond Valley Councils will be at liberty to commence the construction process. Ms Saffin jibed that there may be a throwing down of the gauntlet between the two councils in their race to open their prospective sections', said Mr Meers.

NRRAG: sad day

Meanwhile, Northern **Rivers Railway Action Group** (NRRAG) Chairperson, Beth Shelley, told The Echo, 'Nationals and Labor MPs mentioned the Tumbarumba to Rosewood rail trail as a role model for the Northern Rivers; however, there is a very big difference. Tumbarumba has 1,862 people, and Rosewood has a population of 214 people. They would like a rail trail to interest tourists in coming to their area. The Casino to Murwillumbah area has nearly 300,000 people and over 2.1 million tourists coming to Byron Bay alone'.

'The world-first Solar train is currently running at Byron Bay and Byron Shire Council plans to extend rail services, with a rail trail beside, throughout the Byron Shire.

'Since the ARUP [rail] report (estimated cost \$7 million/km), the Byron Bay Solar train was developed with repairs to 3km of the line, costing less than \$500,000 per km in 2018. In its first year it carried over 100,000 passengers. These are much greater tourism numbers than the proposed rail trails.

'This is a very sad day for our region. The repair of our railway would cost less than the repair of a single road of the same length, and yet the government has no interest [in deing col]



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is enough time'.

Ms Smith said Labor blocked an inquiry into the new law in the Upper House, despite the support of the Christian Democrats, The Shooters, Fishers and Farmers, Justin Field MLC, and the Animal Justice Party. 'It is very disappointing that such a radical change in public infrastructure in the Northern Rivers was not able to be fully examined by communities of interest. 'Let's not forget that it was Labor who robbed us

Northern Rivers Rail Trail (NRRT) secretary, Geoff Meers, described the bill's passing as a 'momentous [in doing so].

'They don't want to provide adequate rail services for the elderly or people without transport to get around in our communities. 'They have forgotten the reason for being a government, which is about creating equal opportunity for all people to have a reasonable quality of life. But as we've seen recently, elderly people rarely get the services they need and deserve in our society, and this is a terrible failure on our part'.

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Alstonville film studio fast-tracked by Ballina Council

Byron Studios is a step closer to securing the Alstonville Cultural Centre for filming purposes after last week's Ballina Shire Council meeting.

After a long and emotional debate, councillors agreed (6-4) to authorise General Manager, Paul Hickey, to enter into negotiations with Byron Studios for the use of the former Alstonville Leisure and Entertainment Centre (ALEC).

The section of the debate relating to the details of the lease arrangements was confidential.

Yet it emerged that there was virtually no public consultation prior to the decision.

Mayor David Wright told the chamber that everything had happened so quickly it was impossible to have any proper community

consultation.

Cr Phillip Meehan was an enthusiastic supporter of the proposal.

'I know there is sensitivity around the site of the ALEC, but we can't let this opportunity pass us by.'

He described the 'perfect storm' of events which has led US productions to be looking at Ballina and Alstonville since COVID-19, leading to a potential reinvigoration of Alstonville, which has been suffering with business closures recently. Cr Meehan acknowledged some people were worried about the lack of consultation, and the urgency of the process, but emphasised Byron Studios needed somewhere to shoot in November, and that only a 'small group of users' of the Alstonville Cultural Centre would be affected, including the library, who were 'happy to move'. Speaking against the

motion, Cr Nathan Willis said, 'I recognise that people need to pivot with COVID-19, but this is off the charts pivoting. I cannot support this.' His amendment to not license the film studios to use the Alstonville facility found no seconder.

Cr Ben Smith said he supported the idea of film production in the industrial estate which was a 'visionary positive thing' but was strongly opposed to the Alstonville proposal.

Describing it as a 'terrible lease agreement', he added he was shocked that Byron Studios were already advertising hire of the site when no decision had been made. Full story online at www.echo.net.au

South Ballina Beach Road closed for inspection

A popular road to the South Ballina Beach has been temporarily closed after it was deemed unsafe by the NSW Department of Planning, Industry and Environment,

Residents alerted *The Echo* to the unexpected closure on Thursday, which included a steel gate being erected. The gate has blocked traffic access over a kilometre from the beach. 'Many surfers and fishers use this road, and the closure will now impact on their activities', said one *Echo* reader.

A spokesperson for the NSW government's planning department told *The Echo*, 'Following the recent incident at South Ballina, and a number of close calls along South Ballina Beach Road, the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment commissioned a road safety inspection of South Ballina Beach Road'.

'The inspection indicated the training wall structure on which South Ballina Beach Road sits has deteriorated and is unsafe for general vehicle access.

'To address the immediate safety issue, the only practicable option to protect public safety is to close the road to vehicles until further assessments can be made. 'The Department provided information to the Ballina Shire Local Emergency Management Committee advising of the road safety inspection outcomes.

'Emergency service vehicles will retain access for emergency response'.

They added the temporary road closure is located approximately 1.3km from the beach access point.

'Access to the beach along the training wall will be maintained for walkers and cyclists'.

Catholic Church's residential DA knocked back

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The Catholic Church's attempt to rezone a nine hectare block of land near the motorway at Cumbalum, for 20 new residential lots, has been blocked by Ballina Council on noise and environmental grounds. Council was unswayed by a deputation from the developer and a noise expert, as well as 239 pages of technical attachments, submitted on behalf of St Francis Xavier Parish. Speaking for the proponent, noise consultant Jason Fox from TTM said the noise

issues were manageable, and that Council was being overly concerned. However Cr Keith Williams asked, 'Should we be approving rezoning when we know there will be noise issues on those properties, not just on upper floors or now and again, but consistent noise from the highway at ground level, not able to be remediated by sound barriers?' 'We should not be approving this,' he said. Cr Nathan Willis asked Council staff how what was being proposed for Cumbalum compared to existing

noise amelioration works at

Alstonville. Manager for Strategic Planning, Matt Wood, said terrain had a significant influence on whether noise barriers would work, and said retrofitting existing residences was quite a different matter to allowing new residences so close to a major road. Newly elected Deputy Mayor, Sharon Cadwallader, agreed with staff's recommendation to refuse the proposal, noting the unsuitable topography of the land and koala habitat mapping in the area.

to get worse with predictions of increased freight movements, including B triples, proposed for the motorway. Cr Jeff Johnson, who built his house in Cumbalum, agreed that there was already a lot of noise from the highway, saying it was 'quite shattering actually', even though he was a long way back from where the proposed blocks would be. 'I don't know how they would address the noise issues so close to the highway,' he said. Councillors voted unanimously to decline the proposed LEP amendment.

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She also noted that the noise problem was only going

Old Byron Hospital handed over

Byron's old hospital was transferred to an incorporated not-for-profit company at last week's meeting of Byron Council.

In a move conducted in confidential session owing to 'commercial sensitivities', the Council voted unanimously to grant a head lease to the Old Byron Hospital Pty Ltd for the next 10 years, with an annual rent of \$1,046,500 per year.

Old Byron Hospital Pty Ltd consists of the same group of community members who have been involved in the project since 2016.

They helped convince NSW Health to sell the site to Byron Council in late 2018 for \$1, and have been preparing the site for its new purpose as a community services hub. Old Byron Hospital Pty Ltd

will now have the power to decide which organisations are given leases to operate out of the Shirley Street site.

Byron Council have released three of the four documents from being confidential.

This includes the constitution of Old Byron Hospital Pty Ltd, and a draft of the lease agreement Council is offering to the company.

The draft lease between the Council and Old Byron Hospital Pty Ltd indicates that the company has agreed to a limited number of uses of the site, including an educational establishment, a health service facility, a retail facility selling food and drinks, and office facilities.

Lennox Head Cultural Centre revamped

Ecuadorian sailor who reached Ballina, dies

Car parking spaces to be repurposed for dining

Food outlets and other shops across the Shire will be able to use parking spots for outdoor dining and other business activities under a 'parklets' trial being conducted by Byron Council.

In a move designed to activate the region's main streets and boost the local retail sector during COVID-19, eligible businesses will be allowed to use some nearby street parking spaces between 5pm and 11pm daily for the next 12 months.

The trial, passed unanimously at last week's full Council meeting, will commence on November 30, and Council has agreed to waive the fees for businesses with a registered COVID Safe plan.

Cr Alan Hunter, who moved the motion at last Thursday's meeting, said, 'This is about supporting an activation plan, alongside the Mullum and Byron

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activation projects, where we make the main streets more pedestrian friendly, more liveable and more appealing'.

'It's not something that will be appropriate for every restaurant and business, but for some it will really work.

'This is something we can do with minimal costs at the moment to help our restaurants serve the visitor and help the visitor by making more tables'.

Parklets typically extend out from the footpath to the width of the adjacent parking space, and involve two or three parking spaces being put together.

They typically feature small outdoor dining areas, but can also be used to display clothing, art or any other retail items.

A number of other nearby councils, including Port Macquarie, Lismore and Tweed, have implemented parklets in their areas, or are considering doing so.

Council staff respond to greywater standoff with Ed Dept at Byron Bay Public School

Further to last week's story regarding the impasse with the NSW Department of Education and Training (DET) and Byron Council over a grey water system, Council's Manager Utilities, Cameron Clark, has provided more details behind the arrangement.

He told *The Echo* that in 2019, Byron Bay Public School approached Council asking if it was possible for recycled water to be connected to the school to irrigate its gardens and playing fields.

'As strong advocates of water reuse, Council staff met with school representatives, including the NSW Department of Education to discuss the project.

'Council then began the process of drafting a recycled water agreement with the school and laid necessary pipework to the school. 'This was completed in

November 2019, and is waiting to be turned on. 'Council has invested approximately \$20,000

for the installation of the infrastructure and it is also responsible for its maintenance, repair and replacement, to the point of supply, on the school property. We are also responsible for providing test results on the water quality and we have committed to testing the water every two weeks'.

Mr Clark outlined other Byron venues, businesses and parks where Council's recycled water is currently used.

'The recycled water is treated to an extremely high standard and must meet all NSW and Australian Health Guidelines', Mr Clark said. 'The school has requested it be able to access Council's recycled water and we have done everything possible to meet this request including a Recycled Water Use agreement [that] has been drafted and presented to Byron Bay Public School; DET states that the Recycled Water Use agreement can only be validly made by DET. Council responded that it is fine to change the agreement to be between the Department of Education and the Byron Shire Council. But, as the school is the participating land manager and has responsibilities regarding how the water is used, they will need to be included in the agreement as well'.

The Echo previously sought comment from the DET, but they declined to explain why the impasse has occurred.

Mayor yet to reply over improving large DA exhibition process

Greens Mayor, Simon Richardson, is yet to reply as to whether he will seek to improve the process which has resulted in public submissions limited to three weeks for Villa World Byron's latest DA exhibition.

Public submissions for DA 10.2017.201.1 close September 30, and come in at a file size of 817Mb. Nearly 100 lengthy and complex planning documents are included.

It is one of two massive DAs for urbanisation of low lying constrained and ecologically significant lands. The other DA is by 'locals', Site R&D.

Council staff confirmed that with other contentious DA exhibitions, late submissions will be received.

As developers took Council to court, negotiations between Council's Sydneybased lawyers Marsdens, and Villa World Byron, are held behind closed doors.

A statement from Council's media spokesperson said both parties (being Villa World Byron and Council), 'discussed the timing for the exhibition during the conciliation conference, and it was agreed that having regard to Council's obligations pursuant to the DCP and legislation, and the nature of the proposed amendments, three weeks would be sufficient'.

The reply continues, 'Council's Community Participation Plan (October 2019) sets out notification and exhibition timeframes for development applications. The Villa World subdivision DA (10.2017.201.1) falls under Level 3 being: Any development type with an estimated development cost of \$20 million dollars or more; Any development application that will be referred to the Joint **Regional Planning Panel for** determination; Subdivision that create 50 or more lots. 'Level 3 development has a specified timeframe for public exhibition of 21 days and that

is the period the amended Villa World proposal is being publicly exhibited'.

The Echo understands a court date for the hearing has not yet been set.

The Echo asked Council's legal counsel, Ralph James, 'Can councillors seek to improve the process by updating Council's Community Participation Plan and DCP to allow longer public extensions on similar large and significant DAs?'

He replied, 'Yes, based on the fact that the Community Participation Plan (CPP) is adopted by Council.

'The types of development you are talking about are categorised as community significant development – we have, for these types of DAs, a requirement for pre-lodgement consultation to occur as well as an extended public exhibition when lodged.

'There remains a need to balance the statutory assessment times under the Act, and assessment timeframe requirements set by the Minister.

'For this Council the balance has been set by the CPP requirements.

'The Community Participation Plan is adopted by Council (under the EP&A Act) [and], applies to planning functions and decisions of Council.

'While matters pertaining to the LEC fall outside this plan, it was, in the Villa World matter, used to inform the parties' discussions as to the

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

Superspreading the good news



Terrific news! Australia is beating this global virus back and lockdowns will soon be eased.

The economically crushing border closures are about to be lifted, and this week venues will be allowed more patrons.

It's the school holidays too, and local shops and markets will no doubt soon be packed with visitors.

The road into Byron Bay is back to being clogged, holiday rentals are up, and carpark spaces in Mullum, Bruns and Bangalow are again hard to find.

While Australia is doing very well in reducing COVID-19 transmissions, it's worth considering that we are still likely to be nowhere near any end point with the virus.

Being complacent and hygienically relaxed has led to France, Spain and the UK being hit hard again.

ABC reports that India is close to overtaking the US. Cases are steadily climbing in Iran, Iraq, Indonesia. Brazil and Mexico are also copping it.

Global deaths, according to the Johns Hopkins University tracker, are now around one million.

Meanwhile, back in Australia, JobKeeper payments are winding back. And Byron Shire, like all other regions highly dependent on JobKeeper, could soon face a bumpy ride.

Academic website, the conversation.com, reports, 'Australian National University calculations suggest JobKeeper and the boosted JobSeeker payment have saved about 2.2 million people from poverty'.

'JobKeeper will now fall to \$1,200 per fortnight for those who previously worked 20 or more hours per week and to just \$750 for those who previously worked less than 20 hours per week.

'The payment to people on JobSeeker and related benefits will fall to \$815.

'Beyond December, JobKeeper will fall to \$1,000 and \$650 per fortnight and the Coronavirus Supplement will end, returning JobSeeker to \$565.70 per fortnight'.

The ANU researchers who authored the story (Ben Phillips, Matthew Gray and Nicholas Biddle) say this 'will push an extra 740,000 Australians into poverty, lifting the total number in poverty from 1.1 million to 1.84 million'.

Poverty, defined in this case, is 'an equivalised household income of less than half the median household income'.

Surely the government, who work, ahem, for the common good, don't want this?

Govt self-interest above the national interest

t least the latest energy plan - the coalition's twenty second, and counting – is not all about gas. Last week the bumbling minister, Angus Taylor, breathlessly revealed that there are all sorts of goodies - hydrogen, energy storage, "green" steel and aluminium, carbon capture and soil carbon.

This scattergun approach, he claims, includes the best bets for a policy which will drive prices down and reduce emissions, very much on that order.

So we are not really talking about coal – except that we are, given that so called 'blue' hydrogen and carbon capture both intimately involve the forbidden fossil.

And we are most certainly not talking about renewables, which can bloody well look after themselves.

No, this is all about technology, the great wave of the future.

And, as we start to unpick it, a long way into a very uncertain future. Even assuming that Taylor's gamble pays off, we are looking at a good decade before we can hope to collect.

The only technology which is really going ahead is energy storage - batteries are becoming bigger, more efficient and much cheaper even as we speak, But ironically, the beneficiaries are far more likely to involve renewables than any iteration of fossils.

Hydrogen is possibly a goer, but Taylor is obviously thinking about it as so called "blue" hydrogen, a spin off from turning coal and gas into products like plastic with all the carbon emissions that entails. "Green" hydrogen, from the clean process of electrolysis of water, is much further down the years.

As are so-called "green" steel and aluminium, on everybody's wish list in about 2040 if we are lucky.

Soil carbon is an old idea of Tony Abbott's devised to satisfy Australia's targets at Kyoto. It can be useful for the farmers, but affects emission reduction only at the fringe.

Which leaves us the rainbow gold of carbon capture. It is not quite true that this is a proven failure - not quite. It can be done and it has been, on a small, basically experimental scale.

But after many, many years of effort, it remains horrendously expensive, totally unacceptable to industry and inapplicable to a serious attack on our climate crisis.

So Taylor's package has little to do with economics, in the short term, and almost nothing to do with emission reduction in any time frame you want to discuss.

But then, it isn't meant to - hence his refusal to talk about targets, unlike some more open and transparent regimes such as the People's Republic of China. The best Taylor can manage is a hope that we may get to zero emissions in the latter half of the century. In other words, we will do nothing for the next thirty years and start thinking about it some time in the following fifty.

Even from a party room resigned to the constant inanities of the this risible minister, this is too silly to accept.

However the conservatives will settle for a political fix, a policy whose only real purpose is to demonstrate that he has a policy. It will be dismissed by the international community and derided by the critics who have long despaired that the government might take notice of the science and take positive action.

But it will pacify the party room - well, most of it. The hardliners, like the coalobsessed Matt Canavan, have already made it clear cannot be wooed. He, like his arch enemy Malcolm Turnbull, thinks enshrining gas in centre stage is, as Turnbull bluntly asserts, plain crazy.

And there are others, less extreme, who have grave doubts that it can survive the scrutiny of the next round of climate talks, when the pressure will ramp up for tougher targets and more stringent measures. Energy policy #23 may be needed before the next election.

And there are other concerns. It is not entirely clear who was responsible for putting together the mish-mash Taylor delivered, but presumably there was input from Morrison's National **COVID-19 Coordination Commission** - after all, that is supposed to be its job. And it just happens that several

members of that commission stand to profit massively if the gas bonanza at the core of it goes ahead. The chairman, Neville Power - the previous CEO of Fortescue - is particularly vulnerable to the charge of conflict of interest.

This is in no sense criminal - at worst it can be seen as crony capitalism at its most blatant and cynical. But even if it were labeled corrupt, apparently that would not matter.

In an astonishing decision recently, the NSW Independent Commission Against Corruption (ICAC), a body previously regarded as a serious watchdog with a few teeth ready to chew on, told us that the widespread and bipartisan tradition of pork-barrelling was not illegal - no surprises there, we had long been resigned to that. But it was not even to be seen as corrupt.

Hang on. According to my Macquarie Dictionary, corrupt means 'dishonest, especially involving bribery' - the very essence of pork-barrelling in which undeservedly favourable treatment is meted out to certain groups of people in the hope of securing their votes.

To say such behaviour is not corrupt is not just a question of nit-picking or pedantry, it is a denial of reality. Such is the abysmal level of accepted standard of conduct that our current politics have now plumbed.

And this is the standard that Taylor espouses.

The national interest is at best secondary - if it can be spun as part of his policy agenda, it can sometimes be helpful, but it is not the real point.

What is vital is to look after your mates, and especially the ones who make lavish donations to party funds. Secure the base, and the baser the better.

And thus it is with the energy package. It has never been about emissions, or even cutting costs - the consumers have got used to the idea that any reductions in their bills are likely to be both temporary and illusory. Power, after all, is what the economists call an inelastic demand which has to paid for however exorbitant the charges.

And power is politics. Mao Zedung said power grew out of the barrel of a gun. ScoMo says it hisses through the valve of a gas cylinder.

A somewhat less compelling image, but a handy prop to replace Morrison's carboniferous pet rock in question time.

Tallowood Landcare

As residents of Tallowood Ridge community in Mullumbimby, we have the enormous privilege of living at the edge of a rare, remnant, old-growth forest.

Each morning we walk along the ridge, through this towering forest of brush box and tallowwood and it is alive with wallabies, gliders, birds, and koalas. We look north to Mt Chincogan and west along the range to Wollumbin, across the largest and oldest shield caldera in the world. It is a breathtaking, quietening, and humbling experience.

With this privilege comes a responsibility to care for and protect the forest so Tallowood Ridge Landcare group has been formed. Weeds are being removed and nesting boxes placed in trees.

The intention is to establish a publicly owned nature reserve along the ridge to ensure the long-term protection. Tallowood developer, Eric Freeman, has offered to gift the forest to Council, to ensure proper management in perpetuity. To date, Council has not agreed, and in the meantime some private landowners have removed large trees from the ridge.

In mid-October, there is a Council planning meeting to make approvals for the last two stages (8/9) in Tallowood Ridge Estate. As it stands, the forest is slated to go into the private hands of the Stage 9 Community Title landholders. Stage 9 is not adjacent to the forest, nor is there a guarantee that under private ownership it will be protected.

To ensure the integrity of the forest, and its ongoing care and protection, we ask that Council to take over the management.

Cruelty: refugee boy


Thank you for last week's excellent article about Angus MacDonald's portrait of Behrouz Boochani. Behrouz' book No Friend but the *Mountains* opened our eyes to the injustices and cruelties of offshore detention of refugees and asylum seekers.

I just finished reading Emma Adams' book Unbreakable Threads: the true story of an Australian mother, a refugee boy and what it really means to be a family, which reveals even more depths of cruelty and injustice to a refugee. This time it was perpetrated personally by Scott Morrison against a 16 year old Afghan Hazara boy who made it to Australia after his father was murdered by the Taliban.

As a refugee advocate, I thought I knew most things about Australia's deplorable treatment of asylum seekers and refugees. I didn't. Emma's story shocked me.

Emma and her family offered their home to Abdul who was in Immigration Detention in Darwin. Eventually they succeeded Continued on page 18

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

overty is an uncomfortable truth. Knowing you can intervene to change the circumstances of another human being's life is a privilege and a duty. In his book The Life You Can Save, philosopher Peter Singer argued that citizens of affluent nations are behaving immorally if they do not act to end the poverty they know to exist in developing nations.

This is upsetting. None of us want to perceive ourselves as immoral. But we are. I believe Singer's thesis can be pushed further. In this shiny coastal utopia we call home, filled with influencers doing yoga on the beach, celebs building mansions on hills, and real estate agents cashing in on housing values that are swelling like the bellies of Singer's malnourished children, then perhaps it's time we looked at what we should do to change. And I'm not saying Council. I'm saying us.

The rental stress in this region is out of control, and is about to make a whole tier of the community who previously occupied the lower rung of the rental market, at risk and homeless. Many of these are the unseen of homelessness; women.

Opportunism costs

Let me share three real stories from this community. I have changed their names to protect their dignity, but be assured, these are not fictional stories. This is the long-term social harm that occurs when the super privileged move to town, and our most vulnerable are left without options.

Meet Carol, she's 87. She's a widow who has been living in a rental in Ocean Shores for the last seven years. She still drives. She is still able to live independently. Her rental was \$350 per week. She lives upstairs and sublets downstairs so she can manage on her meagre aged pension. Her landlord has just served Carol with an eviction notice, and she is to vacate the property in the next six weeks. Clearly, with the going rental rates, a renovated house in Ocean Shores could lease for up to \$800 per week. Who would begrudge anyone a bit of free market opportunism? Isn't it what we all do? But all opportunism has a human cost. And I guess if we were to be truly honest with ourselves that is where it becomes immoral.

There aren't many options for Carol. She doesn't want to leave the area, because this is where she has made friends, it's where her life is,



social supports are. How does an 87 year old woman pick up and start again as a stranger in a new community with no support?

Invisible gates

Before you say what I hear many say – which is – 'move somewhere you can afford', consider what a community is. Consider how valid every tier of our community is to our overall social cohesion. That is what inclusive means. As soon as you say 'move out' - you are engaging in exclusivity, and we all start to live in a gated community. Except you can't see the gates.

So here are the options for Carol: She can go to the Tribunal and possibly get extended tenancy until January. Not an ideal time to be seeking accommodation. The reality is, who will lease to Carol? How can she compete, on the pension, against young couples who have moved from Sydney and who have offered to pay six months in advance? Because that is what's happening. Everyone I know who has got a lease recently has paid many months rent up front. Who among our more vulnerable community could afford to do that?

> There is an elderly priority wait list for the Housing Department once you are 80, but unfortunately we are so short of housing here that that's not an option for Carol. The only retirement village where she can rent at \$250 per week is in Murwillumbah, but there is a long waiting list for a room there too.

Carol's most realistic outcome at this point is going to be homelessness. She will have to live in her car.

Oh ves, there is the 28 days emergency temporary accommodation 'option'. But do you know how that works? It's five nights, and then you have to go back to your local office in Tweed with your signed leaseseeker document to prove vou are looking for housing. This continues until the 28 days is up. Then guess what? Nothing. There is nothing.

This is how a vulnerable member of our community, who has always paid her rent, who has done the right thing now ends up homeless. If we let this happen, we are immoral.

Can you step up?

She is extremely distressed. She is frightened. She feels her life has no meaning, that she has no

Someone must intervene. There are enough people in our region with enough money to pay for 100 Carols. Please step up.

Meet Sally. She's a hardworking single mother in her mid thirties. She currently lives with her two children in a one-and-a-half bedroom home. She's been living here for over a decade. She recently looked at a house in Newrybar that 245 people applied for. If she doesn't find something soon she'll have to leave the area. Her kids will need to change schools, she'll need to find work again, and she will be living somewhere without her social supports. Someone, please step up.

And then there's Bec. She's in her late 20s and has a full-time job in hospitality. She's a brilliantly friendly young woman with a talent for connecting with her customers. When she's not couch surfing, she has been living in her car. Step up.

Homeless slide

Housing stress is hard on the whole community - but it's particularly hard on women who become increasingly vulnerable as they slide into homelessness.

Government and Councils are hamstrung by funding availability, politics, and budget restraints. And generally progress moves far too slowly to make the necessary changes when we have so many people in housing stress.

Meaningful action

Right now there is an opportunity for the affluent private sector, and I especially mean the super affluent (you know who you are) new residents, like Chris Hemsworth, who love this place that so many of us have worked so hard to curate into something unique and amazing, to do something meaningful.

We call on those newer residents we've welcomed, like Chris and friends, who, simply by their presence have unwittingly had significant economic impacts on our postcode's desirability explosion. We call on you to really become part of this community by leading the way to create something ongoing for our most underresourced citizens. Imagine the story we could tell to the world if rich and poor could live together harmoniously in a connected community!

We need social housing for women like Sally and Bec. We need someone with a lot of money to do it now. We need a house for

Ron Cobb's cartoons on Australia, 1972 - all missing from the mainstream obituaries

merican graphic artist Ron Cobb drew dozens of powerful political cartoons in the 1960s and '70s, which were published in all the emerging alternative papers of the day, across the US and Europe. He also spent time in Australia back then and did a series of commentary drawings about us and our country, which were published in the countercultural monthly The Digger, of which I was co-editor.

Ron died last week and is getting that postmortem second wind of attention, but mostly for his later career as a superstar concept designer in Hollywood movies, including Alien (the first one, with Sigourney Weaver and the thing that pops out of John Hurt's chest), ET, and Back to the Future.

RCOBB


Last Thursday the Sydney Morning Herald ran almost two pages on Ron's sci-fi art, and never mentioned his acerbic political cartoons, even though some of his best were about Australia.

Cobb's cartoons featured impeccable caricatures and startling settings - rendered in an amazing variety of hatchings, cross and otherwise. He said he wanted to expose the brutal repressions of his government -Nixon's America - and of the ruling conservative culture of that period. His broadsides against his country's imperial ways still seethe with righteous anger.

In 1972, with the war in Vietnam at its peak, Robin Love of the Australian Union of Students invited Cobb to tour our universities, sharing the stage with another American dissident, troubadour Phil Ochs. Since their tour coincided with the launch of Australia's counter-cultural newspaper, The Digger, I

> how to get out of them. Ron Cobb and Robin Love got together back when the 1972 tour and The Digger were happening, and they stayed together through the intervening 48 years, living in Sydney and Los Angeles. They have a son named Nicky.

back, and stayed.



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
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invited Ron to draw some of his perceptions of Australia for us.

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



Fire & Ice is an exhibition about Iceland and climate change. Fire and ice are two words often used to describe Iceland, with its volcanos, Iava fields and glaciers. In October 2019, Northern Rivers artist Heather Matthew went to Iceland for an artist residency in the remote fishing village of Skagaströnd. She created handmade paper in glacier shapes and embedded pieces of fishing rope into them with red thread stitching to reference the red jackets of tourists walking on the glaciers. A week before she arrived in Iceland, a funeral was held for the Ok glacier which had lost its 'glacier' status owing to the effects of climate change.

Fire and Ice by Heather Matthew, inspired by walking the glaciers of Iceland and witnessing the impacts of climate change; on show at the M-Arts Precinct in Murwillumbah from today (Wednesday) to 13 October.

In October 2019, Northern Rivers artist Heather Matthew went to Iceland for an artists residency in the remote fishing village of Skagaströnd. She created handmade paper in glacier shapes and embedded pieces of fishing rope into them with red thread stitching to reference the red jackets of tourists walking on the glaciers.

A week before she arrived in Iceland, a funeral was held for the Ok (pronounced 'Awk') glacier, which had lost its 'glacier' status owing to the effects of climate change.

The exhibition will feature handmade paper lit up by coloured lights, like the lights she saw when it snowed. An Imagine Peace evening on Friday 9 October, as part of the exhibition, will coincide with the annual lighting of the Imagine Peace Tower in Reyjkavik, Iceland, on 9 October. Matthew attended this event in 2019 when a tower of laser light streamed into the stratosphere as a message of peace from Yoko Ono, John Lennon's widow. At the Murwillumbah event, there will be a ceremonial 'peace lighting' and singing.

Fire and Ice is on show at The Field, M-Arts precinct, Murwillumbah from Wednesday 30 Sept to 13 Oct.
