Mobile wildlife hospital launches

A star-studded cast of locals, from Tex Perkins to Luke Hemsworth, attended the launch of the mobile Byron Bay Wildlife Hospital last Thursday at the The Farm in Ewingsdale.

There was excitement in the air as everyone gathered around a a purpose-built semi-trailer mobile hospital that aims to assist native animals in need of specialist care.

Lennox Head vet, Dr Steven Van Mil, who is CEO of the project, said that the project was conceived about two years ago before the devastating bushfire season.

Last year, the unprecedented Black Summer fires tore through the east coast of Australia, killing nearly three billion animals.

Following the fires, there were calls from environmental groups for more effective, on the ground, approaches to help animals affected by the fires and other impacts of climate change.

Dr Van Mil highlighted the fact that the Currumbin Wildlife Sanctuary was seeing around 4,000 animals a year, and that there was a 'critical need for a dedicated wildlife service' on the north coast.

At the launch, the project's founders spoke to their vision that this is only the beginning for the mobile wildlife hospital, with plans to create a more permanent space in the future. They said that this could serve a dual role as a hospital as well as an educational facility where locals and tourists can go to learn more about wildlife and their

conservation.

After the launch, the mobile wildlife hospital travelled to a site next to Island Quarry on Ewingsdale Road, Byron Bay, where they have been given a penny lease by a local landholder, Adam Bennett-Smith.

Site yet to be approved

However, concerns have been raised in relation to the current environmental protection zoning of the site. A Council spokesperson said that, 'Access to the land from Ewingsdale Road is dependent on the section 138 application now lodged being approved - this includes both Council and RMS/TfNSW approvals. A development application is to follow for the use of part of the land as [the home to] a mobile Wildlife Hospital'.

Telstra ignores 5G opposition

The controversial roll-out of Telstra's 5G network across the Shire has taken another step forward, with the announcement of a new proposed installation in the heart of Byron Bay.

As opposition to the upgrades continues to boil, the telco announced its intention to upgrade its existing mobile tower on the corner of Fletcher Street and Williams Lane in last week's advertisment in The Echo.

That announcement also invited the community to make written submissions in relation to the plan.

Yet the submission process has been criticised as a token gesture rather than genuine consultation, with Telstra yet to answer questions from The Echo regarding the degree to which community submissions are taken into account.

8 Acacia St site approved

5G opponents have expressed anger and dismay at the latest proposed installation, which is the eleventh proposed 5G upgrade in the Shire.

'Byron Bay PS is just 300 metres from this tower,' safe technology activist Rinat Strahlhofer said.

'Of all the 11 proposed 5G upgrades, five are within a 500m radius of a school or child care centre, which goes against Department of Education policy'.

The group that Ms Strahlhofer co-founded, Northern Rivers for Safe Technology, is also continuing its fight against the proposed

5G upgrade in the Byron A&I Estate, which is within 500 metres of a pre-school and childcare centre.

This is despite the fact that Telstra told the group on November 10 that it intends to go ahead with the upgrade, ignoring hundreds of letters of opposition.

Landowner of the tower site, Andrew Simmons, is yet to reply to Echo questions around community concerns. According to a land title search of 8 Acacia Street, Mr Simmons is co-owner with Peta Sarah Llovd-Harris.

The Echo also asked to confirm whether the Simmons family are still part of Site R&D, which is the 'local' landowner consortium pushing to develop West Byron against considerable public opposition.

Meanwhile, Ms Strahlhofer said a movement was building among school communities who opposed upgrades that were in close proximity to educational institutions.

'Periwinkle [pre-school], Cape Byron, Busy Kids, Byron Public are now informing parents to help hold a vigil to ensure no technicians come to upgrade the towers to 5G,' she said.

'Telstra are in for a PR nightmare - if their technicians and equipment show up in Byron, a red alert will be sent out and concerned parents and concerned community members will take to the streets to prevent this upgrade.

'Protecting our children and community is more important than faster [internet] speeds.'

P&C concerned over losing sportsfields to TAFE

Parents at Byron High School are concerned that TAFE NSW may be considering building a learning centre on the school's playing fields if its plan to locate the facility in the Byron Arts & Industry Estate falls through.

The issue emerged at last week's Byron Council meeting when the Secretary of the school's P&C, Sarah Aldridge, spoke during public access.

'I believe you're aware that TAFE is looking at building a connective learning centre on the playing fields at Byron', Ms Aldridge said.

'The P&C are yet to find anyone who thinks this is a good idea.

'The school and P&C welcome a TAFE in the Shire, and the increase in use of facilities it brings. We do not believe, however, that it should be at the expense of the school's sporting facilities'.

It was more than a year ago when TAFE NSW first expressed an interest in building a Connected Learning Centre - a digitallyfocused facility specifically

designed for those learning in regional areas.

Previous Council meetings have heard that TAFE's preferred location for the centre is a piece of Council-owned land in the Byron Arts & Industry Estate known as Lot 12.

It appears that this option remains firmly on the table, as evidenced by a motion in relation to Lot 12 passed by Council at last week's meeting.

That motion, which formally selected a company as the preferred option for management of Lot 12, made specific reference to TAFE as a future tenant on the site.

It made the deal with TAFE a priority in negotiations over the site, and requested a report from Council staff on the issue.

However, last Thursday's meeting heard that, in addition to its discussions with Council to build a facility on Lot 12, TAFE NSW has been quietly scouting out the Byron High School site.

This included flying a team up from Sydney, and a meeting between the head of TAFE and Byron High School's principal.

Located at 18 Pioneers Cres, Bangalow, the development is estimated at nearly

Childcare/brewery

According to the revised DA. available on Council's website, the koala hospital component has been dropped and now includes a childcare centre.

A letter of objection by Bangalow Koalas president Linda Sparrow outlines her concerns, including a 'grossly inadequate flora and fauna assessment'.

She writes, 'If Byron Council is serious about protecting our koalas and other threatened species, they should not allow something that belongs in an industrial estate to be located within a koala corridor, with koalas crossing the property'.

Local team aims to build recycling centre

A group of local recycling enthusiasts received a muchneeded boost to their efforts last Thursday, when they received \$17,500 at the Southern Cross Credit Union (SCCU) office in Mullumbimby.

The money was awarded to the Precious Plastics Northern Rivers initiative, as part of the annual Southern Cross Credit Union community grants.

The money will go towards purchasing the equipment necessary to shred, melt and remould certain plastics for a variety of uses. It's proposed that artisans will be able to use the materials.

Financially viable

Tim Winton-Brown, a member of Precious Plastics Northern Rivers team, believes making this a 'financially viable solution, rather than just a charitable enterprise', is crucial in securing the future of the project and projects like it.

'We want to create something that doesn't just help the environment, but also something that truly gives back to the local community and can support itself'.

The team of locals originally met online through the Precious Plastics global network. The worldwide

not-for-profit organisation is where environmentalists, engineers and entrepreneurs can connect and access all the necessary blueprints and networks required to create localised recycling centres that produce high grade recycleable plastics.

Currently all kerbside recycling within the Byron Shire is delivered to the Lismore City Council Regional Materials Recovery Facility, where it's sorted and sold to international and local buyers. This can be expensive, time consuming and can often result in many recyclable materials laying around for extended periods until an appropriate buyer is found.

The local Precious Plastics initiative hopes to skip over these issues by creating a more direct pathway between producers of waste and local creators, where prices and deals can be negotiated directly.

Milk bottle focus

The team has already begun to focus their efforts on milk bottles, which they say are in abundance in dumpsters behind the area's countless cafes and restaurants. Despite advances in automation, most sorting of recycled materials is still done by hand, requiring expensive labour which reduces its price competitiveness.

For now, the team are hoping that they can secure a location and get the facility up and running in a bid to inspire more Australians to take recycling into their own hands.

Byron's natural burial ground moves closer

Land adjacent to the Brunswick Valley Sewage Treatment Plant (STP) just outside Mullumbimby will be investigated as a possible site for Byron's first sustainable burial ground.

The decision to explore the Vallances Road site for this purpose was passed at last week's full Council meeting, nearly a year after a group of community members made a passionate address to Council on the issue.

Natural burial is a sustainable way of committing those who have died back to the earth without the negative environmental impacts of conventional burials, or cremation.

It typically involves the deceased person being buried in a biodegradable coffin, casket or shroud, without the use of any chemicals such as embalming fluid that might inhibit the ability of the soil to break down the body.

Small, flat, stone markers typically mark the area where a body is buried, thus minimising any changes to the existing ecology. 'For years, dying people have asked me when we're going to have a sustainable burial ground', Zenith Virago from the Natural Death Care Centre told the meeting during public access.

'They and others want this option, because it's a continuation of living a sustainable life. This was, and always will be, the original form of burial'.

Under the motion, moved by councillor Michael Lyon at last Thursday's meeting, Council will identify areas within the Vallances Road site that are suitable for the burial ground. including consultation with the traditional owners of the land, and the potential layout of the grounds. While all councillors voted for the motion, a number noted that different uses for the site were already under consideration, including affordable housing.

Plan of Management

The site is already subject to a Plan of Management process, and this will continue.

Di Hart, a local resident who has campaigned for the natural burial ground, told



Former mayor hits back at developer claims

Former Greens mayor and NSW MLC Jan Barham has refuted comments by developer Brandon Saul around a 'fundamental error' that led to staff applying a zone label change to the Linnaeus Estate.

Last week's *Echo* report detailed how Council's planning staff changed the 'zone label' on a 111 ha parcel of pristine and rare littoral rainforest between Broken Head and Lennox Head.

Ms Barham maintains a label zone change to mix use benefits the landowner, given the community were not made aware of the change.

Ms Barham told *The Echo* that some of Mr Saul's comments last week 'misrepresent the history of the error and the current proposal'.

She said, 'Mr Saul states, "Neither Council, the original developers, or the current owners sought a rezoning".

'Yet in February 2015, a report to Council indicated that it was the applicants who sought to rezone and seek Community Title (CT) rezoning. They also raised the zone label as a problem and sought rectification.

'Council rejected the request for rezoning at the time, but agreed to rectify

the zoning label, which was Education, and according to them, prohibited.

'Mr Saul then goes on to say, "The proposal that is currently under consideration is a very modest eco/health retreat that would actually reduce the built form currently approved, and is not tied to either the zoning issues, or the CT process".

'Yet the current tourism proposal is absolutely tied to the zone change. Prior to the Mixed Use Development label being applied, the zone only permitted education use.

'In relation to the modest built form of the proposal, it's unrealistic to state that the new proposal would reduce the built form currently approved. The proposal seeks to transfer the development rights from 11 approved accommodation units, that were limited in size to deliver 33 cabins that sleep two people each, but the size, hasn't been stated. We all know from experience that developments grow over time. Start small and then expand has been the usual.

[']My complaint to Council also addressed other consent issues, including the fact that some cabins were built in the erosion zone, the size of the buildings, whether the required conservation work had been undertaken, and the approval given by Council in 2013 to replace eight camping sites with five large accommodation units and the failure to construct the new on-site wastewater system'.

New to site

Mr Saul replied to the claims, telling *The Echo*, 'I'm only new to this site, so I really can't talk with any authority as to what has and hasn't happened in the past'.

He said he was 'not without empathy for Jan's concerns', and that what 'happened in the past are quite likely well founded'.

'That said, my research shows the current owners actively sort an MO to CT conversion (in accordance with Council's rural land use strategy), but did not request the current Mixed Use zoning'. He also added that, 'I may be wrong, but I suspect even Jan will be pleasantly surprised when [The DA] is lodged'.

He added, 'It really is very modest in both scale, form and character, and will provide sympathetic long-term management of what I think we all agree is a very special site'.

Council is urging residents to plan ahead for evacuation this year, and have ready planned emergency accommodation during severe weather conditions.

Last year, evacuation centres for residents escaping bushfires were relatively hassle free to set up, say Council staff, but with the COVID-19 pandemic and its consequent restrictions, Council is hoping the community will plan ahead, so to render community evacuation points unnecessary.

It's also hoped that the Northern Rivers will remain COVID-19 free, by avoiding large gatherings.

The Tweed Byron Local Emergency Management Committee says it has been working hard to implement arrangements that will keep people safe from both natural disasters and deadly contagions. The committee's chair, and Tweed Shire Council's Local Emergency Management Officer, Doreen Harwood, says residents should 'Start the conversation today about where you, your family and those you care about, including your pets, would go during an emergency'.

If you need to evacuate during a disaster, register online at www.register. redcross.org.au, or listen for the Evacuation Assistance Hotline, which will be broadcast at times of crisis. COVID-19 screening precautions will take place.

To avoid being stuck in your car in the middle of a bushfire or tropical storm, and then in a centre that only provides for very basic needs, plan ahead and make arrangements for accommodation where your whole family, pets included, can stay together during a highly stressful and potentially dangerous situation, as well as staying COVID Safe.



Support available for isolated mums

Being a new mum is not always what the ads for nappy wipes would have us believe.

Mostly, it's just not glamorous, particularly for brand new mums.

But a local service is helping by providing support to navigate early parenthood.

A free service called Support For New Mums is encouraging pregnant women and mothers with babies in the Byron and Tweed shires to reach out if they need emotional support.

The volunteer-led, not-forprofit is based in Murwillumbah, and was established in 2019 to complement existing community services. They provide free home visits to women in their third trimester, or with babies, who are experiencing isolation.

Support For New Mums founder Deb Hunt is hoping that mothers will reach out to the service.

'A lot of mothers find themselves feeling alone without a support system, which increases the pressures of parenting', says Deb.

'Asking for help can take courage, so we encourage women looking for emotional support to contact us and start the process – our

team are ready to help'.

'We try to relieve a bit of this pressure by visiting mum at home, affording her space to shower, care for herself, finish jobs around the house, and just relax'.

The organisation has 30 trained volunteers – all of whom are mums themselves. Currently they are visiting 20 mothers in the region, many of whom have partners that work away or live away from their family.

Support For New Mums recently re-launched their service, with a grant from the Northern Rivers Large Grants Program 2020, which invited Northern Rivers not-for-profits to apply for a share of \$100,000 to boost social and environmental projects in the region. Run by the inGrained Foundation, a not-for-profit founded by local independent brewery Stone & Wood, the six successful applicants were announced in July.

'With the grant from the inGrained Foundation we have been able to advertise the group in the Tweed and Byron communities, as well as train more volunteers who nurture and provide mums with the support they need to feel great within themselves and care for their baby'.

Car accident in Goonengerry results in serious injury

About 6.20pm last Thursday night police were called to Mafeking Road, Goonengerry after a silver Commodore station wagon left the roadway and hit trees.

Detective Chief Inspector Matt Kehoe said the 42-year-old driver sustained significant injuries to his head and upper body. Police from Mullumbimby, Byron Bay, the NSW volunteer Rescue Association and the Rural Fire Service attended the scene. 'The driver was stabilised at the site and the Westpac Rescue Helicopter was called to take him from the scene,' said Detective Kehoe.

Speed, drugs, booze

'Police are continuing to investigate the circumstances of the accident but believe that speed, drugs, and alcohol were all involved,' he said.

'If anyone has any dashcam footage in or

around Repentance Creek or Goonengerry from around 6.20pm Thursday November 26, please contact the Byron Bay police Crime Stoppers: 1800 333 000 or www.nsw. crimestoppers.com.au.

'It is important to remind people that taking drugs and alcohol and driving are a bad combination,' said Detective Kehoe.

He added, 'Police will be out in force over this busy summer period.'

Julian Assange's father on tour, Dec 11, 13

Julian Assange's father, John Shipton, has recently returned from his son's extradition hearing at the Old Bailey in London and is embarking on a tour to talk about his son's plight.

Assange exposed war crimes and human rights violation by the USA and its allies in their wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Because of this, he is currently the victim of British injustice in Belmarsh High Security prison, where the COVID-19 virus is currently running rampant.

He awaits extradition to the USA, where he may be sentenced to 175 years for some of the greatest pieces of journalism of the twentyfirst century.

The implications for journalism everywhere are deeply disturbing.

The Espionage Act charges

that the USA is seeking extradition for are all about journalism: Assange's crime is, was and has always been his courageous journalism.

While 12 people were massacred in the collateral murder video, none of the perpetrators have been prosecuted.

Meanwhile, the whistleblower and her publisher have been relentlessly hounded for a decade: Chelsea Manning attempted suicide in prison, while Assange's family have been shocked by his deterioration.

Although Assange is an Australian, not a US citizen, the US has pressured its

Draft media and communications policy unclear

A motion adopted by councillors at last week's meeting (Cr Cameron voted against) will soon see a draft *Communications & Social Media 2020 Policy* put before the public for comment.

Under '4.4. Legal proceedings' it reads: 'Council staff, the Mayor and councillors will not make any public comments on matters where Council is involved, or potentially could be involved, in legal proceedings'.

The Echo asked staff, 'How will refusing to comment on anything regarding legal proceedings benefit the community? For example, given West Byron is before the courts, why shouldn't the community be aware of how those proceedings are unfolding? If approved, won't this limit the community's understanding of issues that directly impact on them?'

Also, regarding '4.2. Media Inquiries' the draft policy reads: 'Media inquiries should be sent to the Media and Communications team and staff will co-ordinate the response in a timely manner'.

The Echo asked staff, 'What is the definition of "timely manner"?'

Staff yet to reply

Council staff are yet to reply to those questions. Aspiring mayor for the

2021 local government election, Duncan Dey, told *The Echo*, 'I will be making a submission to the policy that a clause be added along the lines of: 'Now that Council no longer publishes public notices in print media, it continue to inform client states into misusing their legal systems to corral Assange for ten tortuous years, asserting its imperial right to prosecute and punish any journalist who dares to reveal its war crimes.

Failed to protect

Meanwhile, the compliant Australian government has failed to protect its citizen, Julian Assange.

The 'No Extradition! Bring Julian Home' tour will be at the Mullum Civic Hall on December 11 from 7.30pm, and at Byron Marvell Hall on December 13 from 4pm.

Both events are presented by BayFM and the Mullum event will be live streamed by North Coast Events.

A Nimbin event is planned for December 8.

'During COVID-19 [lockdown], support agencies have told us they'd seen a definite spike; cases have risen,' said Dave Harmon.



Lennox pooch owners to wait on beach access

The decision on how to manage dogs at the Lennox Head Surf Club Reserve have been deferred until the December Ballina Council meeting, following another briefing, and further consultation with the surf club.

At last week's meeting, dog enthusiast Josh Brown supported new recommendations for dog management at the Reserve, and offered the services of dog owners to help with fundraising for the work, 'to make it a nice space for people with dogs on lead and for non-dog people further south.'

Cr Keith Williams (Labor) spoke in support of the motion to enlarge the dog

exercise area near the surf club, which he said 'arose out of residents concerns about the "walk of shame" between the two fences to access the dog beach.'

He said there was frustration at the lack of facilities for people with dogs going to and from the dog beach, and currently nowhere to sit down and socialise with other people.

1,000 signature petition

Cr Williams said a petition in favour of change had achieved 1,000 signatures in two weeks, showing significant support from the local community and local dog owners.

The new plan would provide a wider permanent path, and make it easier for dog owners to comply with signage, as well as providing access to coffee for dog walkers.

'Separating people from coffee is never a good idea,' he said, 'especially early in the morning when the dog walkers are there.

'Let them access coffee, everyone is calmer then!'

Cr Sharon Cadwallader requested a twelve month trial, which Cr Williams agreed to, but Cr Phillip Meehan objected to as a 'waste of operational time'.

Cr Cadwallader said the reason for a trial was the controversy surrounding dogs near the surf club,

particularly since the closure of the old dog access path from further north.

'Statistics don't lie,' she said. 'We are above the state average on incidents with dogs'.

'This year we have had 76 dog attacks, 83 penalty infringement notices, and 178 dog collection requests, along with many other complaints. These are pretty high stats,' said Cr Cadwallader.

'I get it, people like to exercise dogs, come back and have a coffee. But we do get that conflict of space at the moment'.

Following more debate, Mayor David Wright used his casting vote to delay a decision until the December meeting.

Let's talk pork!



Have you been put over a barrell? One full of pork?

Pork barrelling has emerged again in the news, this time in state politics.

And it is worth having a closer look, given it appeared to influence the 2019 federal election too.

Put simply, pork barrelling is where certain electorates are favoured by politicans with cash (grants, infrastructure projects etc) to curry favour.

It's nothing new – The Rudd/Gillard government had its Regional Development Australia Fund. The Howard Government had its Regional Partnerships Program. The Keating government had a Community, Cultural, Recreational and Sporting Facilities Program. The most brazen is of course the Morrison government's Community Sport Infrastructure Program.

According to SMH (Nine), NSW Premier, Gladys Berejiklian said last week that pork barrelling is 'not illegal', and 'part of the political process'.

Her comments came after it emerged the allocation of the \$250 million Stronger Communities Grants fund favoured Liberal and National Party electorates.

Despite being legal, it is embarrassing to be found out; her office shredded documents at the centre of the inquiry into the grants fund, which were later recovered by her office.

It's questionable though, how ethical the practice is, given it is essentially a bribe.

Are we being well governed if politicians buy the elections? Yet electorates such as this - the Ballina electorate comprising Byron and Ballina shires – have benefitted from pork

barrelling. A very ambitious Nationals MLC seemed to have convinced

his political masters in Sydney that showering us in funding promises would get him the job. It didn't at the last election, but that doesn't seem to have discouraged him.

Pork barrelling is a form of control that politicians shouldn't have over voters. The governing elite already have way too much power over everyone else.

And they will always want more, and MORE.

Fun fact: The NSW Nationals leader, John Barilaro, proudly calls himself 'Pork Barilaro'.

Let's go one further - the likes of Barilaro are PIGs - People In Government. You can tell a PIG because their skin is ham coloured. The complexion and weak bone structure of pork barrellers is a result of a lifetime in office spaces and meetings. And the only way to deal with porkers is to send them to the abattoir at election time.

Govt upsets largest trading partner

• t may be a statement of the bleeding obvious, but a face off with the People's Republic of China would not be a good idea.

From any perspective - military, economic, political, simple weight of numbers - Australia cannot hope to compete on a level playing field with our dominant neighbour. And to pretend that somehow we should be seen as equal partners, as Scott Morrison is apparently urging, is a dangerous delusion.

At best, we can never be more than a client trader - keen to deal with whatever China is willing to buy from us, and what we are desperate to buy from it.

So when our Deputy Prime Minister Michael McCormack trots out the old line about 'China needs us as much as we need them', it is not only silly but provocative. Apart from being demonstrably untrue, (Chinese investment in Australia has fallen from \$16 billion to \$2.5 billion since 2016) it is a feeble attempt to give our most important customer the finger in particularly fraught times.

So it behoves us to tread with caution, and when Beijing warns us to back off, kiddies, it cannot be dismissed as just a bit of diplomatic chit chat, however much the backbench crazies might wish it to be.

Nor is it simply what Morrison calls a list of 14 grievances, more of the same old demands over things such as Huawei and a COVID inquiry. The complaints go deeper, to what is obviously seen as a conscious anti-China agenda on the part of the Australian government.

Ominously, China's foreign ministry is now using the word "enemy" in communiqués to and about Australia. But Morrison seems to think this is more of a challenge than a threat.

His response remains that we are a sovereign country, our standards cannot be compromised, and we can bluff it out.

But Beijing is not just unrepentant, but positively proud of its relentless imposition of totalitarian rule on its hapless citizens.

Detention without trial or charge, forced labour, strict censorship, repression of minorities and the politically incorrect, physical and mental torture are the norm. This cannot be condoned.

But, around most of the world, it can be and generally is ignored. And there are times when it is better to be tactfully silent than to shout futile defiance.

No one is suggesting we lower our standards, which may not be impeccable but are obviously far less abusive than those of the Chinese, the most tyrannous regime on the planet.

But our own record is hardly beyond reproach and the Chinese are not averse to pointing this out. They have already targeted Australia's failure to redress the inequalities across the Indigenous community, and now of course, they have extra ammunition with the highly convincing evidence of Australian war crimes in Afghanistan. This is not the best time to assume the high moral ground.

That does not mean that we have to negotiate on our knees. But as we have been repeatedly told, the relationship has to be managed with care. Respect is essential, and an acknowledgement of the manifest power imbalance.


Last week, in Tokyo, Morrison tried to secure an alliance of resistance with the Japanese Prime Minister Yoshishide Suga, and has been offered support for his stand by United States heavy hitters like Marco Rubio. Our departing emissary, Arthur B Culvahouse Jnr, has provided a farewell cheerio. But all this only underlines Australia's own impotence.

So when Morrison scrabbles for purchase, declaring that Australia's actions should not be interpreted through the lens of the strategic competition between China and the United States, Beijing hears another message: 'China noticed Prime Minister Morrison's positive comments on the global influence of China's economic growth and China's poverty alleviation efforts,' a Foreign Ministry spokesman noted approvingly.

Tribute received and accepted.

And this is precisely the dilemma; Beijing obviously thinks we do have a choice and we have got to make it. We are either with them or against them - sitting on the barbed wire fence is not an option.

There is a lot of history in this. The Jade Empire has had a couple of centuries of having sand kicked its face by the colonial bully-boys of Europe, but now, if it is not quite yet the toughest kid on the block, it is bloody close to it. Time to kick back. And giving Australia a gob full is



entirely appropriate - even karmic. China's own resources - economic, innovative, even spiritual - have been ruthlessly exploited by invaders. With Australia depending on China to do the exploiting and pay the bills, there is no better time to turn the screws.

So the news comes through that some 80 Australian coal ships have been held up indefinitely at Chinese ports. Owing to 'environmental concerns', explains Beijing, in what is no explanation at all. And there may be an element of that, but no one in Canberra doubts that this is really all about ramping up the political pressure. And the same applies to the wine tariffs, imposed in retaliation for improbable allegations of dumping.

Morrison is looking for the old comforters: rules based trade, nuance and accommodation, latitude and room to move. But his pleas are becoming more frantic - methinks he doth protest too much.

'It's as if Australia does not have its own unique interests or its own views as an independent sovereign state,' he implored.

'This is just false. And worse, it needlessly deteriorates relationships.' Well, not to the Chinese it doesn't. That's just the kind of relationship they like - the one where they win.

And let's be honest, the relationship has seldom been entirely amiable. China has been seen as more of a threatening than a friendly neighbour. Long before it was rechristened during the cold war as The Red Menace, China loomed large over our future. There was always the fear that the teeming masses to the north would engulf us by the sheer force of gravity.

And the Chinese themselves? Mysterious, inscrutable - and therefore sinister overtones of an undercover regime under the iron rule of the evil genius, Dr Fu Manchu.

Or perhaps his successors; the current suspicion of hordes of cyber-hackers hidden behind secret vaults, tirelessly sabotaging and subverting Australia and its diplomatic allies has gained considerable purchase.

Inherent racism? Almost certainly. And this will be just another problem for Morrison as he tries to reframe a confrontation that he may wish to end, but his antagonist is happy to pursue to its inevitable conclusion.

Mungo has told us that owing to ill health, this will unfortunately be his last column for The Echo.

When will we see young families being able to access the home market again?


Certainly not until wages grow and wealth distribution become more reasonable. Then, young owner-buyers may get a chance to buy a home for their family.

Overdevelopment on MOs and CTs?

Having worked as a planning consultant in Byron Shire for the past 40 years I am mystified why Council planning staff 'are pushing to prohibit dual occupancy and secondary dwellings on approved multiple occupancies (MO) and community titles (CT) in rural areas' (Echo 18 November).

Over the last ten years Council has allowed dual occupancy or 'granny flats' in urban areas to allow increased population without additional land take in urban areas.

The dwelling density on MOs is controlled largely by the proven ability to demonstrate the responsible disposal of waste water, manage traffic, noise and bushfire planning.

Sixty plus years ago NSW planning law allowed for a greater residential dwelling density in rural areas. Prior to that NSW had adopted British planning laws of 'Urban' and 'Non-Urban'. That is, you were a farmer or you lived in town. The allowance of a greater residential density in rural areas has allowed for a 'living in nature' lifestyle that an increasing number of people in Byron and the adjoining shires enjoy.

I am mystified to understand on what basis Council planning staff would move to limit the lifestyle options available to their constituents. The term 'overdevelopment' means what? Is this a state government directive or just a bunch of 'townies' dictating how we should live?

They profess to be a green council, which allows for a diversity of lifestyle in the way we interact with nature and community. Let's not be pushed around by bureaucratic influences from Sydney. As a council engineer/planner boss of mine said to me 40 years ago, 'We do things differently up here'. Vive la difference.

Managing Byron's beaches

■ In *The Echo* (11 November) I challenged the opinions by prominent environmental campaigner, Dailan Pugh, that long-term erosion plus global warming and rising sea levels are the primary cause of Byron Bay's current erosion problems.

An article on the Clarkes Beach event in *The Conversation* (https://bit.ly/33vvV32) last week corroborates this. The Griffith University scientists outline what they call the Headland Effect and its impact on our beaches.

No mystery here to the keen surfers who have tried to surf The Pass this year or to the longboarders getting wonderful surf off the Cape and Little Wategos. The Clarkes Beach dune blowout was most definitely not caused by climate change or long-term sea-level rise.

Byron Shire's beaches have now largely stabilised after the onslaught of the '60s and '70s but a strategy for their annual management is urgently required to meet short-term challenges which occur with regularity after each East Coast Low.

In 2006 and in 2016, our Council declined to adopt a beach nourishment program to protect our beaches. Fair enough, Council did not have to adopt the gold-plated sand bypass pumping option from Tallow Beach. I'm pleased it did not as, if we believe Professor Goodwin's recent assessments, the numbers relied on vastly overstated the amount of sand required.

But, there are other proactive options that are cheaper and more effective in dunal management. These alternatives should have been pursued by Council and the state government.

There appears to be an obsession amongst some on Council that any efforts at preservation of our public beaches and the protection of public amenity for all must be resisted if some private party benefits. This ludicrous position stymies all attempts by the staff to fix the problems we face.

Dredgers have been working off the Tweed Coast and the lower Gold Coast beaches for years carrying out remedial, storage and dune forming works. The Tweed River Sand Bypass has been working successfully for two decades. There has been beach protection and nourishment at Kingscliff and Duranbah. The growing expertise in placing dredged sand has led to the support from beach users, with ongoing consultation a big part of the planning and operation.

If it's good enough for Tweed Shire under current NSW coastal legislation, there should be no impediment to the state government requiring a similar proactive response in Byron Shire.

So here is my plea to you, Dailan: When residents come to discuss problems on our beaches, please don't label those of us who do not agree with you as climate change deniers. I am happy to bow to you on all matters of forest conservation. But when it comes to the beach that I live on and which I observe daily, I prefer to follow the science.

I agree that if we have no action on climate change,

there may be a sea-level rise of one metre by 2100. But, there are close to 5,000 of my fellow Byron Bay residents who are not quite ready to pack up their bags and move to Casino just yet. To the toddlers being daily pushed in prams to the Lighthouse, that represents at least another 75 years of good surfing. I doubt somehow they are planning any retreat either.



ustralia, as a nation, is at a crossroads. The COVID-19 pandemic has exposed our many frailties and brought them to the front of our consciousness. But rather than view these vulnerabilities as an existential weakness, we should be looking more broadly towards how we can adapt. For too long, we have been stuck inside our comfort zones. The pandemic and subsequent recession have dragged us, kicking and screaming, toward a distinct inevitability: Change.

Indigenous Australians are no different. We too, must welcome change for the betterment of our people. Too often we are distracted by political grandstanding and media indifference towards our very existence. Our treatment is Australia's greatest shame and until Aboriginal people can advance economically, socially, and culturally, Australia as a nation will never become whole.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people have always been able to adapt. For more than 60,000 years we have seen off enormous challenges: like climate change, rising sea levels, and colonisation. Throughout all this, we have managed to maintain our culture and connection to our homelands. This has been made possible through the overarching connection we have to each other.

Future challenge

As one elder once told me; 'Australia is like one big spider web. Our stories and our histories are all connected. We are all one people'. Indigenous and

non-Indigenous Australians alike must acknowledge this interconnectedness as we forge a shared history into the future.

But what is the way forward for Indigenous Australians? Is it through changing the lyrics of the national anthem? Or hanging our flags in parliament house during NAIDOC week? Whilst these would be nice gestures, they will not change who we are or where we have come from. Sometimes, when you look too hard for a solution, you miss the answer sitting right under your nose.

The solution is us. Our customs and our languages that our old people fought so hard to preserve. The longest continuing culture that can be found on planet Earth. So unique, so powerful. These factors have been the very essence of our survival. It is now time to consider how we can transition from simply surviving invasion, to thriving once more.

It is easy to see our disadvantages. Unfortunately, for many of our people, we lack

the economic foundation required to step out of this disadvantage. This has been brought about by many factors directly attributable to our past treatment: Stolen land, stolen wages, stolen children, suppressed languages, suppressed cultures. We have had everything taken from us. However, if we can only identify the problems, how do we generate solutions? We cannot continue to look backwards as a means of moving forward.

A future grounded in history

History is important and I am in no way diminishing the significance of Australia healing through truth sharing and recognising the wrongs of the past. In fact, I welcome such initiatives and wholeheartedly support the efforts being made in these areas. What I am saying is that modern problems require modern solutions.

Indigenous Australians need industry. This is something that we have lacked in modern times. Our people have forever been hardworking and innovative, but this has been stifled. Industry not only generates income, but purpose. A reason to endure and take risks. A reason to move forward and find opportunities. The foundation of such industry must be our culture.

This is evidenced in places like North Stradbroke Island where the Quandamooka people have managed to achieve something incredible. Through tourism and innovation, they are not only making advancements economically, but also through strengthening and valuing language and custom. Traditions that lay dormant for decades are once again reappearing from the ashes of colonisation.

Indigenous Australians are not going to disappear. Whilst, to some, we remain an inconvenience, we continue to adapt and survive in a changing environment. It is time for us to take the next step in our adaptation by crossing cultural barriers and finding a foothold through our own industries.

Our greatest asset is ourselves. We must take heed of our ancestors and their willingness to preserve their own existence. Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people will play a critical role in the economic recovery of this nation. It is time for this nation to invest in our knowledge, and together we will indeed advance Australia.

Seed savers are getting together for a local seed saving and exchange

E ver since March of this year, with the COVID-19 pandemic response of lockdowns and the fear it has elicited, there's been a run on seeds at seed companies.

It seems everyone went mad around toilet paper, dogs and seeds!

It's a new take on Leonard Cohen's amazing lyrics:

Everybody knows that the boat is leaking, everybody knows that the captain lied. Everybody's got this broken feeling, like their father or their dog just died.

We in the West are just two generations from living on the land, so some deep, primal knowing and recognition must have been at play, that seeds are one of the most important ways we can help ourselves survive in an uncertain future. And gardens have sprung up everywhere, one of the upsides to this latest calamity.

Dogs were snatched up for companionship and comfort. Toilet paper too – I think the media had something to do with that.

One of the downsides, besides the growing death rate of, mostly, people over the age of eighty, and loneliness and isolation for the others, is the relentless and continuing centralisation of practically everything, and we're all being pushed into the internet portal, one of the tools of surveillance, where once again the biggest corporations make trillions stealing business from all the small

businesses around the world, forced to shut down owing to the pandemic.

Once again prophetic words from Leonard Cohen:

Everybody knows the dice are loaded, Everybody rolls with their fingers crossed. Everybody knows the war is over, Everybody knows that the good guys lost. Everybody knows the fight was fixed, the poor stay poor and the rich get rich. That's how it goes... everybody knows.

After WWII, there was an agenda to get people off the land and into cities, and a relentless takeover of land and resources by giant corporations, aided and abetted by the governments in the West, which made these agribusiness corporations even bigger and more powerful. Now, what's being stolen from the people are all the seeds; through the science of genetic engineering. Corporations claim they are improving crops – engineering them to yield more, to be more drought tolerant, pesticide and herbicide resistant etc. This, so corporations like Bayer-Monsanto et al can patent the seeds so they become their property, and farmers can no longer save seed but have to buy it, year after year.

Freedom to save seeds

What's really happening is theft of the human commons by giant agri-chemical corporations, who now own seventy-five per cent of all seed companies worldwide.

And as Vandana Shiva says, 'If farmers don't have the freedom to save their own seeds, how will the rest of us have that freedom?'

By putting seeds in the soil, with water and some nutrient in a certain climate, the growing plant will automatically, naturally adapt and, generation by generation become drought tolerant all by itself. Organic, heirloom seeds are the best seeds to use, to produce strong, resilient plants. This is what humans have done for the past ten thousand years, and an enormous quantity and diversity of seeds have been cultivated and passed down through the generations in every country. This is part of the power of de-centralisation, otherwise known as localisation. This gives us all the freedom to grow our own food, and have real food security and practise sustainability. This is one of the most basic freedoms we have, and multinational agribusinesses are trying to take it from us.

Byron Hinterland Seed Savers (BHSS) and Byron Seed Share are planning to have a seed saving event at the Mullum Farmers Market on Friday 11 December, 8–10.30am.

Byron Seed Share (byronseedshare.org) is a website offering at least forty perennial food plants, that local people have cultivated and are willing to share with those who sign up to be members.

Paul Crebar will be in attendance and will talk about the benefits of being a member of Byron Seed Share.

Rasa Dover, founder of BSS, will be on hand to help people identify seeds, and will be sharing the seeds she has.

I will also be there to share knowledge of how to save seeds with anyone who wants to know. See you there!

Call to halt new logging in bushfire impacted areas of NSW

More than 60 per cent of North Coast forests and 80 per cent of South Coast forests were burnt in the 2019– 20 Black Summer fires. Since that point issues around the management and logging of these and other forests have been highlighted and 'the *Guardian* has revealed that the Natural Resources Commission (NRC) will likely be engaged to conduct a review to "consider the standards that should be in place for forestry operations after bushfires."; said Independent NSW MLC Justin Field.

Mr Field has called on the NSW government to give an undertaking to NSW coastal communities that new approvals for logging in the state's badly burnt public state forests will not be approved until a review by the state's Independent NRC is completed.

'It's one year to the week since the devastating Currowan fire took hold on the South Coast. The community always understood business as usual wasn't possible after the fires but the politics has been slow to move and a lot of damage has been done,' said Mr Field.

'This review is a political fix to try to find a circuit breaker in what has been an escalating public conflict between John Barilaro's department and the NSW EPA (Environmental Protection Authority). The NRC

disagreement.

'In part this review is in response to numerous EPA stop-work orders and investigations into breaches by Forestry Corporation under the burnt forest logging rules.

'I am seeking an undertaking from the government that new approvals for logging in bushfire affected forests will not be granted until we've seen the outcome of the review,' Mr Field said.

'The review comes after a public dispute between Deputy Premier John Barilaro's Department of Regional NSW and the NSW EPA over the "site specific operating conditions" the EPA had put in place to minimise environmental damage of burnt forest logging,' says Mr Field. Ballina, Tamara Smith, told *The Echo* that, 'The Greens oppose logging in native forests on a good day, let alone after catastrophic bushfires and the subsequent destruction of wildlife and biodiversity on an unprecedented scale in NSW last summer.

'I and thousands of environmentalists begged the government to send in ecologists after the fires last summer, not loggers, but they did anyway.

Death of species

'The idea that with 1.7 degrees of global warming already locked in that logging of native forests is even on the table is the kind of environmental vandalism that future generations will study as pivotal to sealing a fate of extinction for koalas and platypus and countless other species,' said Ms Smith. 'I hope this review reignites the conversation about a transition away from public native forestry. We can reimagine a much more positive future for our public forests as critical ecological and recreational reserves and create a transition plan for the timber sector,' Mr Field said.

All water options on the table for Ballina?

The Dunoon Dam wasn't officially on the agenda at last Thursday's Ballina Council meeting, but that didn't stop a heated discussion breaking out on the subject in a motion about water efficiency.

In a personal deposition, Bianca Urbina from Water Northern Rivers Alliance said she supported extra water efficiency as an essential part of a resilient system, that does not depend on rainfall, unlike the proposed Dunoon Dam. She said the dam idea was shelved in 2012 because of the threat to endangered species, rainforest and cultural heritage, and nothing had changed since.

'Please take an active role in taking the decisions,' she said. 'Stand next to 92 per cent of the community across the region who refused the dam.'

Ms Urbina urged councillors to look at the All Options on the Table report from Water Services Australia, and said it was difficult to make her case with no one in the room making eye contact.

What to do about lost water?

When the related motion came up for discussion, all the councillors agreed that too much water was being lost, with a need for more

smart meters and fewer leaks.

Cr Cadwallader said there was a need to identify and replace ageing meters and displayed a graph which showed water losses in the Ballina region of 18.5 per cent, equating to \$1.2 million in Rous County Council (RCC) water charges.

She said a strategic plan was needed, especially because most of Ballina was built on sand, making leaks hard to detect.

Cr Jeff Johnson said he supported the proposal of a plan to improve the performance of the water supply network before returning to the Dunoon Dam proposal, which he described as an expensive waste of money, designed to cater for an unsustainable increase in population.

RCC Concerns

Cr Nathan Willis said he was happy to support the efficiency motion, but had

'real concerns' about the structures in place around Rous County Council.

He said that in regard to the Dunoon Dam, it was clear that Rous had become highly politicised and that he would like to see a move away from the water structure set in the 1960s with Rous and look to the best interests of Ballina.

Cr Keith Williams, who is also the Chair of Rous Water, said every councillor would have received the All Options On The Table report via Water Northern Rivers.

'The serious risk we face is a changing climate which is going to result in extended and unprecedented periods of drought,' he said.

'We do need all options on the table, more efficiency, how to save every drop.'

Dangerous fantasy?

Cr Williams said that the current Rocky Creek Dam represents just over one year's water with no rain,

with 10 per cent being used each month at the height of the last drought.

'The idea that we're going to suddenly find lots more water is fantasy. Dangerous fantasy.'

Former councillors oppose dam

Late last week, there was another twist in the Dunoon Dam saga with four former Rous councillors writing to RCC to 'pause its pursuit of the dam at Dunoon.'

The letter said, 'Between us we have 29 years of experience on the County Council (Simon Clough 4 years; Duncan Dey 4 years; Ros Irwin 8 years, 2 as chair; Richard Staples 13 years).

'We are writing because we believe that Rous is moving in the wrong direction to provide water security by pursuing the Dunoon Dam option. If Rous were to go ahead with this dam, we believe this would be a failure of governance by not ensuring a resilient water system in a hotter. drier climate.

'As former councillors we know that committing to a \$2-3,000,000 Environmental Impact Statement is tantamount to approving the dam project.'

Lake Ainsworth vandalism

After ongoing vandalism problems at Lake Ainsworth the use of hidden surveillance cameras to catch offenders was discussed at last week's Ballina Council meeting.

Deputy Mayor, Sharon Cadwallader, said Friends of Lake Ainsworth have continually cleaned up broken glass and dealt with the residue of burnt Koppers logs around the reserve for the last six months.

She explained that the logs contain chromated copper arsenic, and 'a tiny bit of ash can kill adults, harm animals and poison water.'

Cr Cadwallader said volunteers shouldn't be left to clear this material up on a regular basis, which is often done early in the morning, with the wider community unaware of the magnitude of the problem.

Cr Nathan Willis said he was concerned about surveillance and Council purchasing additional equipment.

'The best way to handle this issue is to have volunteers and police working on it,' he said. 'How does it help for Council to do a report?'

The initial motion in the business papers included the idea of hidden surveillance cameras to catch offenders. but this was watered down in the final motion, to instead

call for a report on management issues and investigate the use of a special vacuum machine to remove broken glass in park areas.

Cr Phillip Meehan asked if people are picking up broken glass virtually every day, does that mean people are burning and smashing things at the lake every day?'

Council staff responded by saying the Lake Ainsworth area was not unique in its problems, but there were many complaints about glass around the BBQs in the northern section of the reserve, and people not always taking their waste with them (there are no bins there, or truck access, since the removal of the road).

Mayor David Wright said, 'What we've got is a fantastic area. I wouldn't take the BBQ away from that end just because there's some damage.

'We need to enforce the no alcohol rule or if we do have some, we need to have no bottles,' said Mayor Wright.

Cr Keith Williams, who seconded the motion, said, 'This is being brought to me on at least a weekly basis, I'm getting phone calls about glass down at the lake.'

Vital Alsar remembered at Las Balsas anniversary in Ballina



Exactly 47 years after three balsa rafts arrived in Ballina from Ecuador, there was a gathering by the Richmond River on the weekend to mark the voyage and remember its captain, Vital Alsar.

The Las Balsas voyage was the longest raft voyage in human history, and was completed without any loss of life, sailing under a white flag of peace. Captain Vital died in September, but family and friends of the crew attended via livestream, balsa raft, and the specially built structure at the Ballina Maritime Museum which protects it.

Tony Gilding from the Macadamia Castle read a statement from former 60 Minutes journalist Ian Leslie, who took a rubber ducky out to meet the rafts when they first entered Australian waters.

Mr Leslie remembered Vital Alsar as a great adventurer and explorer. 'He takes

'My brother, you fell in love with the sea. She was your great love, all your life, even as far back as your childhood. You used to say that we shouldn't fear the sea. We have to love her and respect her as we do our mothers. And you loved her so much that you shared

performed a song in Spanish which the crew used to sing on their voyage.

Las Balsas ambassador Fern Robichaud, originally from Canada, told *The Echo* that thinking back to his arrival on the raft in 1973, he said his biggest memory was how green everything was.

Looking back on the recordbreaking voyage, he said, 'In a way it's probably a bit of a dream, you think oh, did I actually do this?'

Was the idea of crossing the Pacific on a raft terrifying, when he first stopped and thought about it? 'I probably didn't stop and think enough about that!' said Fern.

and Las Balsas ambassador and former crew-member Fernand Robichaud was there in person.

Ballina's Deputy Mayor, Sharon Cadwallader, told The Echo, 'It was such a big thing for the history of Ballina, how important it was.'

Mayor David Wright remembers the rafts arriving in Ballina and said, although 'it was thrust upon us' and not planned (the rafts were supposed to go to Mooloolaba, but got stuck in a southerly current), 'I'm just so pleased they came here. It's iconic.'

He said the people of Ballina were very proud of the surviving his place beside the giants of human adventure, Magellan and Columbus, Armstrong and Amundsen. They challenged our notions of the time, our understanding of the nature of the planet Earth,' said Mr Leslie.

'Vital's spirit of adventure, his warmth, and refusal to submit against nature's forces was a powerful lesson to take with me forever.'

ARE FARMERS THE NEW HIPPIES?

The face of the environmental movement is changing. For years those of us who stepped forward against big business or government were discredited by being called 'hippies' or 'tree huggers' or 'professional protesters'. Pre the climate crisis conversation, pre raging fires and crippling drought, a love for nature and a drive to protect and respect her positioned you as an enemy of the State; as someone who was taking jobs from working families. You were positioned as someone whose ludicrous beliefs were so at odds with the corporate machine and the drive into development that rather than being, by literal definition a 'true conservative', you were just a filthy anti-establishment fantasist. A radical.

Last week I travelled into Western NSW where I saw the evidence of a whole new breed of radicals. They're called *farmers*.

Driving through the agricultural lands outside of Gunnedah I was struck by the abundance of protest signage. This was jarring. I could feel the narrative changing as quickly as the countryside I drove through. It is one thing to hold an antimining sign in a city street, it is quite another to see FARMS NOT COAL on grain silos. The only structure on the horizon emblazoned with a very clear message from our farming community to our government. And this was not the only sign. On the drive into Gunnedah they became more prevalent – farmers of the region using their paddocks as a place to protest. I guess it's all you have left when your submissions to the NSW Independent Planning community transformed into a mining service centre.

In this region, two major coal and gas projects have been approved – despite a massive outcry by local farmers: The Whitehaven Vickery coal extension in Gunnedah (that will increase disturbance to the area by 20 per cent) and the Narrabri Gas Project. When your federal government has declared that our nation's post-COVID economic strategy involves the endangering of our country's food bowl in the great gas recovery, it's no surprise that 22, ooo plus submissions are going to go unheard. When submissions to regulatory bodies fail, all that is left are the paddocks of your farm. I've travelled the country as an MC for Stop Adani protests, I've attended rallies, I've made my own submissions around our outdated energy policy, but it seems energy 'security' and big corporate interests win out over food security every time.

It seems our government is prepared to sacrifice sustainable farming systems, well-managed natural resources, and any pretence at policies that enhance farming productivity rather than reducing it. Yes, mining in our farmlands *reduces* productivity. It empties our food bowl, rather than filling it. What is the point of having secure energy when our bowls are empty? What are we heating? The LNP warchest?

The relationship between the land and our life is coming to the fore. In these farming communities recently stricken with drought, who see more drought on the horizon, the one resource that will determine their survival or demise is water. It's the damage to ground water supply that they are most concerned about, and the fact that they will be left short of water. Many remarked that even before the drought, ground water supplies were disappearing. Mining and farming do not mix. A Boggabri farmer reflected that when farmers were hit hard during the drought, and when it came to conserving water supply, at no time did the local coal mine consider producing less coal.

'We don't send them up' says Nolan, 'we just take the format and bend it a little to make it fit. The real CWA are staunch. They bake it and we shake it!'

What surprised these newbie witches was how many women and men - wanted to join. They wanted to belong to an aberrant dis-organisation... with an anthem, their own queen and a secret handshake! One of the commitments the women had was to reclaim the more meaningful pagan days on the calendar with celebration and gathering. 'At a time where we are distanced, it feels important to be coming together [politically] now more than ever before.' Last month the Country Witches hosted their Bealtaine shows. There was so much power in the room, and the full moon added to the potency - with everyone loving aligning the witch within with the witchy calendar. So they couldn't let the summer solstice pass by without more 'serious' witching.

The actual summer solstice falls at 9:02pm on Monday 21 December, but there will be plenty of vibe around the entire weekend to let broomsticks fly on the solstice wind. Expect the unexpected, and all that you have expected from your co-founding witches thus far; with five cranking hot shows of humour and heart, challenge and change.
