### Oversize Bangalow tourist proposal before Council

Plans for a \$1.3 million rural tourism development in Bangalow that is double the size of what is usually permitted, have angered nearby residents, and drawn a recommendation of refusal from Byron Council staff.

The owner of 72 Lawlers Lane is proposing to build 12 self-contained cabins clustered around a central recreation building that is designed to cater for future rural functions and events.

Five of the cabins would have their own swimming pools, and the site would have a new internal access road with bus turnaround.

The Development Application (DA) for the site, which is owned

by 'Mr M Mamone', is due to come before this week's Byron Council planning meeting for assessment.

Council staff have recommended that councillors refuse permission on multiple grounds relating to the scale of the proposal, and its impact on the character, amenity, and future agricultural uses of the surrounding area.

#### Excessive in scale

'The proposal is considered excessive in scale and fails to comply with Council's adopted planning controls that generally limit rural tourist accommodation to no more than six holiday cabins per property,' Council Planner, Ben Grant, said in his report, contained in the agenda to this week's Council meeting. 'Twelve tourist accommodation cabins, in combination with a large recreation building (and a potential future function centre), is of a scale that cannot be reasonably managed by the principal owner living on the property, and is likely to have an adverse impact on the character and amenity of the surrounding area if approved.'

Mr Grant found that the size and scale of the development was inconsistent with two key local planning policies, the Byron Local Environment Plan (LEP) and the Byron Development Control Plan (DCP).

This included the amount of excavation and fill required to make the owner's plans a reality. 'The excessive scale and

## Resilience NSW increases flood risks for residents

As two locals choked up, there was uncomfortable foot shuffling by Byron Shire Mayor, Michael Lyon, a spokesperson for Resilience NSW, and an engineer who worked on the flood report for the Mullumbimby pod site.

They told the homeowners that their home will experience increased flooding in the future because of the works Resilience

NSW is currently undertaking.

They were the owners of one of 13 properties nearby (11 identified in the report), that were finally told – after months of

asking – that their worst fears had been realised.

They were told emergency housing for flood-affected 'locals' being put in place at Prince Street, Mullumbimby, would negatively impact their home, making the flooding worse for them in the future.

Two of these properties will now have increased above-floor flooding as a result of the fill.

In the February flood, the residents escaped the rising flood water in their house and found safety with a neighbouring family whose property was just above the floodline. They were then rescued by friends in a boat.

The SES had told them they didn't know when they could rescue them, and suggested they climb on the roof – but there was nowhere safe to put a ladder as the water flowed through and around their house.

They said they have been 'moving, moving, moving', between family and friends since the flood, and recently secured a rental as they wait for their house to be gutted and rebuilt. They were hoping to move back in at the end of this year, or the beginning of next year, before their insurance support runs out.

'What are we going to do?' they asked the mayor.

'We feel sacrificial. We pay our rates... Why was the study done after you put in the fill?' - A Mullum resident, affected by the pod site 'We've been out of our house for nine months' they said. 'We understand that people need housing, we are one of those people. What

are you going to do to make us feel safe? You've made it worse.

'We know you know this. We feel sacrificial. We pay our rates, we've always been in front. Why was the study done after you put in the fill?'

This was a key question throughout the past nine months from the local community.

'This community has been asking for the impacts since it started. Council, everyone else, told us nothing. They just went and filled it up', said the homeowner.

'I've only been part of the project for three months, but I acknowledge the lack of communication,' said the Resilience NSW spokesperson.

'We've been working closely with Cr Michael Lyon, [GM] Mark Arnold, and engineers. We wanted to make ► Continued on page 2

► Continued from page 1 sure that Council was aligned with us because some people are impacted.'

'We looked at a number of options,' said the engineer.

'Cross draining, swales etc. Our intent was to manage and mitigate an increase in the flood level. We have looked at up to 25 different designs.

#### Unable to mitigate

'We have tried to mitigate and we haven't been able to. There are two homes that will have an increase in flooding. There are several that will have a decrease. That is why the report took so long to release.

'About a month ago, the options were selected by Resilience NSW and Council. Option A was preferred. A solid fill pad just above the one-in-100 year flood level.'

The Resilience NSW spokesperson responded to questions over when the decision was made to fill the site, when the original discussion for housing on the site had centred around removable pods and caravans.

They said, 'The fill was originally put on the site for stabilisation... It was done in parallel to this report.'

The Resilience NSW spokesperson said the lease for the site was two years, and could be extended to five years if needed.

They said if the fill was to be removed in two or five years, as required under the

licence conditions, the risk to the current residents would be significantly reduced; but questions about removing the fill at the site remained unanswered.

Cr Lyon said that there had 'been talk of houses and other purposes here for 20 years.'

'One of the consequences is that there are up to 85 properties that are better off in the context of future flooding, in terms of their properties – they might not want the fill to be removed.

'Those conversations [regarding future removal of fill] are not for right now.' 'We are pretty gutted,'

said the homeowner. 'We feel like we are being sold down the river. We've ended up being sacrificial.' 'I've been pushing for the

release of the flood report for a while,' said Cr Lyon. He then said, 'My suggestion to you is to lobby the government and ask them to cover off on that liability on those two properties. That is a minuscule amount in the context of their budget. I don't think that is a lot to ask for, that they accept liability in a future scenario.'

#### Mayoral Minute

Councillor Duncan Dey, who was at the meeting at the request of the homeowners, suggested to Cr Lyon that they join together to put a formal Notice of Motion (NoM) to Council, on behalf of the 11 properties whose flood levels are being increased, to inform the state government that they should compensate the people without them having to go to court.

Cr Lyon has now put forward a Mayoral Minute for Thursday's meeting, asking that: 'Council advocate to the state government on behalf of the two properties impacted by above floor flooding by the temporary housing works in Prince Street... [and]

'1) Cover them for future liability for damage to their properties in a flooding event that was caused by the works.

<sup>•</sup>2) Consider them for a buyback under the Resilient Homes program'.

#### Lead fears

In related news, assessment around the potential for lead poisoning, owing to the disturbed soil on the site, is still unclear from government agencies.

Land managers of the site, Transport for NSW (TfNSW), have told *The Echo* that part of Lot 2 DP1121508 and Lot 2 DP223650, which is under lead contamination assessment by the EPA, 'has been excluded from Resilience NSW's licence area'.

'Transport for NSW has provided copies of all environmental assessments and investigations completed in relation to the land.

'Resilience NSW must undertake its own due diligence and any assessments/ investigations in relation to the land to ensure it meets their requirements.

'Resilience NSW is to implement all required controls to ensure the site is safe'.

► Continued from page 1 density of the development, combined with the extensive excavation and filling required for the building pads, access road and bus turn-around bay will result in a built form that is not complementary to the rural character or environmental attributes of the land.

He noted that the developer was invited to amend the application but, 'did not take up that opportunity'. The concerns of residents, contained in 20 separate letters of objection, echoed those of Mr Hunt.

They also raised the issues of excessive traffic generation, noise, safety and security, and the impacts on wildlife and a nearby drinking water catchment.

Overall, staff and residents both expressed the opinion that approving the development would set an undesirable precedent for future projects in the rural areas of the Byron Shire.

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## Bayside donga village shrouded in secrecy

Resilience NSW, a corporate arm of the NSW government, continues to dodge questions around the lack of procedural fairness afforded to Bayside residents in Bruns, who will soon have donga-style villages next to them.

So far, very little detail has been announced, other than the village will house floodaffected 'local residents' for up to three years.

#### Increase in numbers

Residents in Bayside were alerted last week via a letter that the village planned for Torakina Rd and Kingsford Drive will now expand to house around 119 floodaffected local residents for up to three years, and a land leasing arrangement has been exchanged with Oniva Pty Ltd.

Oniva and the Kollective are the developers behind a contentious 39-bedroom boarding house mixed use DA that was opposed by neighbours.

While the developers went straight to the Land and Environment Court at the first opportunity, rather than going through the Council approval process, councillors eventually agreed to the revised DA in April 2021.

Previously, Resilience NSW said they were only seeking land that was Council or Crown managed.

Resilience NSW were asked, 'Like all of these pod villages [in Byron Shire], there was no option given to the residents of the location, there were no assurances given around due process as occurs in a normal DA, who the flood-affected people are, who will manage any potential issues, and why residents should trust the process given it has been a shambles from the start'.

'How has this been undertaken in good faith?'

#### Good faith?

A Resilience NSW spokesperson replied, 'We are continuing to work to establish temporary housing sites on the limited land available that isn't at significant flood risk, and is located in close proximity to the communities they would service'.

'The temporary housing site at Brunswick Heads was identified following a comprehensive review of all suitable land in the area, in consultation with Byron Shire Council.

'We have entered into a leasing arrangement with Oniva Pty Ltd for a temporary housing site at Torakina Rd and Kingsford Drive to accommodate approximately 119 flood-affected local residents.

'This will enable the Excelsior Circuit portion of the site to remain as green space for the entire community.

'It is anticipated that each temporary housing site across the Northern Rivers will be in use for two to three years.

'We will continue to do everything possible to provide medium-term housing solutions to flood-affected residents as they recover and rebuild.'

Byron councillors will, this week, decide the fate of the latest stage of a major development proposed for Federal - a tourist accommodation business valued at \$2.76 million.

As commercial interest in the village continues to grow, the new owners of Peabury Farm on Binna Burra Road have proposed building six one-bedroom cabins, a swimming pool and an additional car park on the site.

This is the second stage of the development, following stage one, which includes a 60-seat cafe and a 23-space car park.

The North Coast's biggest day of garage sales - Second Hand Saturday - is bigger and better than ever this year, say organisers, 'with not one, but two main event dates on Saturday November 19 and the following Saturday, November 26.

Council's Resource Recovery Strategy and Engagement Council staff have identified a number of issues with the proposal.

This includes the developer's plan to help manage traffic movements on the site by building a roundabout at the intersection of Binna Burra Road and Federal Drive, which pre-empts traffic movement plans being developed as part of the creation of a Federal Masterplan.

However, staff have recommended that councillors approve the plan subject to a series of conditions that would need to be met before a single brick is laid.

Council Planner, Patricia Docherty, said, 'The proposal raises no significant issues in terms of environmental impacts which cannot be

managed and the site is considered suitable for the development.'

The proposed conditions are unlikely to please many, if any, of the 16 Federal residents who submitted letters of objection in relation to the plan.

#### **Beyond** capacity

The residents expressed a range of concerns, and asserted that the operation would place unsustainable pressure on Federal's infrastructure, including roads, parking and rubbish, which was already beyond capacity.

A recent Rural Fire Service (RFS) exercise in Federal highlighted the need to increase static water supply for the village.

## No guarantees with Bangalow Bowlo amalgamation, councillor warns

A local group of residents have warned of 'Unlimited pokies, Sydney ownership and minimal sporting club support' if a large entertainment corporation amalgamates with the Bangalow Bowling Club.

Club members will vote on the proposal at 11am, Sunday November 13.

Keep the Bowlo Local group spokesperson, and Byron councillor, Asren Pugh, is urging Bowlo members 'to do their homework before they vote on November 13 on the proposed amalgamation with Norths Collective'.

'We know it's an emotive issue. We all love our local Bowlo, and want to see it succeed, but we need to make sure we've all read the MOU [memorandum of understanding] for the proposed amalgamation.

'Sure, the proposal might sound good on face value but it's important to read the fine print.

'Our beloved local Bowlo would be owned and controlled by people 600km away in Sydney.

'Norths will own all land and buildings from day one.

'The number of pokies will increase to ten and up to 15 after three years. And after ten years, they can put in as many as they like - who knows how many they'll squeeze in!

'Sporting clubs are likely to be way worse off, with no guarantees on ongoing funding and support.

'Quite frankly, there are no guarantees with any of it. There is a "get out" option for just about every clause.

'We could see the Bowlo sold off after as little as three years and developed into something else entirely. 'Once it's gone, it's gone

forever. 'What we are proposing is an alternative - one that doesn't rely on pokies and keeps it in local hands.

'The alternative is clear - local management, less, and then having no pokies, retained community asset and a three-step plan to fix and maintain.


'We will stabilise within six months, then within 24 months embark on a pathway to profitability, and finally steady state and capital improvements within five years'.

Proponents for the amalgamation with Norths claim the club's future would be more financially secure under Norths' management.

In July, the club's Vice President, Atosha Clancy, told The Echo, 'The financial situation has deteriorated since we were advised by the accountant in January to seek other options. The Bangalow Bowlo now sits on the edge'.

Atosha added, 'Personally, I can't see how the club will exist in another ten years without a massive (\$3M-\$5M) injection of capital'.

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## 3D home-printing emerges from The Pocket

Steve Rosewell was using his 3D printing skills to create nesting boxes for endangered birds when the idea for a new way of making tiny homes came to him.

Having spent 22 years working with 3D printers, he had observed many attempts to use the rapidly evolving technology in house construction, and had been largely unimpressed.

But the success in creating new homes for endangered species gave him the idea of doing things in a different way.

'The biggest issue I have with most 3D house-printing being done around the world is that people are not printing houses, they are just printing rough walls,' said Mr Rosewell, who runs Studio Kite, located in The Pocket.

#### Printed off-site

'Then, all the other specialised trades are still required, I believe a couple of good block-layers could beat these concrete printers on speed, accuracy, and cost.

'So I've chosen a different route, where the house is printed off-site as a more

accurate shape using recycled fireproof plastic. It's completely rendered with a cement-based render.'

The result was a concept tiny home called 'Jindi'.

Named after the Bundjalung word for bird's nest, Jindi is a 32m<sup>2</sup> tiny home designed with a selfsupporting arch structure.

The structure is 3D-printed from recycled ABS plastic with glass reinforcement and fire-retardant additives.

'After building this first house, I can see so many ways to improve not only the process, but also the practicality of the small house as a nice place to live,' Mr Rosewell said.

'Pursuing this process, I believe the costs for a building will plummet and the need for highly skilled labour will go down with it.

'A car costs \$50,000, and is insanely more complicated than a small house. I think building houses in a more streamlined way, like printing or assembling factorymade sections, is the future, and will give us more time to go out and plant trees.'



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
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
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## Plans on exhibition for former hospital site

Redevelopment of the former Mullumbimby Hospital site has taken a step forward with Byron Council publishing a preliminary vision, objectives and design principles for community feedback.

The Draft Site Strategy and *Urban Design Protocol* can be viewed at Council's website, and feedback is welcome until November 14.

'This is a rare, flood free 4.4-hectare parcel of remediated Council-owned land that is near the town centre and close to everything,' Council's Place Planning Coordinator, Andrew FitzGibbon said.

'There is potential to deliver somewhere between 100 to 129 dwellings on this site and supporting community infrastructure.

#### Mostly residential

'The next step is to move to Planning Proposal stage to amend the land's zoning and other development controls to enable housing.

'Under the draft strategy, the majority of the site (60 per cent) will be used for residential development, including a mix of housing types and tenures.

This includes housing that is affordable, accessible and appropriate for older people across a range of income levels. It will also include housing that is affordable for 'households with very low, low, and moderate income levels'.

There will also be a multipurpose facility with spaces for consultation and the potential for work, education, gathering and recreation spaces, and a cafe, all of which is intended to support residents and community, and encourage social connection.

The Draft Site Strategy and Urban Design Protocol, together with input and feedback from the community, will provide the basis for Council's drafting of a Planning Proposal and DCP amendments in 2023.

Mr FitzGibbon said the current consultation phase was about engaging with the community on how the vision, objectives and design principles applied to the site.

'This check-in is just a first small step in a very long process of consultation with the community to ensure we deliver the very best outcome in line with community expectations and needs,' he said.



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## Historic Billinudgel school book reprinted

A book chronicling the Billinudgel Public School's first 100 years has been reprinted, and will be launched by the authors on Sunday November 27 at the Billinudgel Pub, kicking off at 2pm.

Billinudgel Public School 1893–1993 The First One Hundred Years contains historical photos and personal memoirs of former students, teachers and community members during The Great Depression and World War II, along with accounts from more modern times.

Co-author, Terry Timms, says, 'The book grew into much more than a collection of historical facts about the school's establishment'.

'The book acknowledges the original inhabitants as the original educators before the arrival of the "Cedar getters" who preceded the "selectors" and the village and the school.

'The history of the village of Billinudgel, the surrounding areas and the stories of its people past and present help make the book fascinating reading.

'Students at Billinudgel Public School in 1993 had their views on their school,

the proposed new school, and what school could be like in a hundred years recorded and documented in the book.

'Some of these same students now have their children or grandchildren currently attending Ocean Shores Public School.

'As well as amazing historical photos of Billinudgel and surrounding areas, student enrolments from 1920 to 1977 and class photos going back to 1905, the

book contains cartoons by Stephen Axelsen depicting historical tales in the book.

'The book was originally very well received, and has long been out of print. But now, thanks to the support of former Ocean Shores Public School Principal, Martin Gill, it is back in print with one hundred copies for sale with proceeds going to Ocean Shores Public School'.

He says the reprint reproduces the original centenary book, written and compiled by Harvey Gardiner and Terry Timms in 1993, with the addition of new Introductory remarks by Terry Timms, Martin Gill, and Spencer Jones, along with another aerial photo of the area by Bill Mills, which highlights the changes and developments in the last 29 years.

## Reconstruction Corp finally announces its plans

There was frustration in the air as Lismore residents last week listened to Northern **Rivers Reconstruction** Corporation's (NRRC) leader, David Witherdin, provide the initial detail on the Resilient Homes Program.

The Resilient Homes Program and the Resilient Land Program are the state and federal governments' response - so far - to the devastating February/March floods. \$800 million has been put forward to fund the two programs, which seek to facilitate quick land release across the region for housing and house buybacks, house raising, and house retrofitting.

'We will start with properties that are at the highest risk, those that are most likely eligible for the buybacks,' explained Mr Witherdin.

They are predicting that there will be around 2,000 offers to buy properties in the highest risk areas,

approximately 2,000 offers to raise houses and another 2,000 offers for retrofitting.

#### 6,000 homes

'The program of works will touch about 6,000 homeowners,' said Mr Witherdin. 'There are exceptional

circumstances at all levels and this has been built into the eligibility criteria. There will be situations that we haven't thought of yet.'

Buybacks will be offered at the pre-flood valuation of the property.

House raising is up to \$100,000. Above that cost,

the homeowner and government go 50/50.

As for retrofitting for flood, \$50,000 will be on offer per home. Beyond that, owner and government are to go 50/50. Examples of retrofitting are lifting the wiring, putting in hard wall and floor coverings.

Responding to calls for more transparency, and questions on why they have yet to release detailed mapping and other documentation, Witherdin said, 'There is not an easy in/out – there is a detailed, sophisticated and robust assessment process

that can't be simply determined with a map. This was announced a week ago and today is the first community session here in Lismore'.

'We are aiming to have outreach, and people will start receiving texts in mid-November. There is a call centre set up, and case managers are ready to go'.

Eight months down the track after the flood, the crowd expressed frustration with the lack of detail.

Some said they are still living in limbo, and had spent significant amounts of their own money to get houses to basic living standards while they wait for the government response.

'Full transparency is required here. People are selling because their mortgages are foreclosing,' said one member of the audience.

## Alstonville plateau mooted for 'small' hospital

Hopes for new private health service buildings and a new water security project on the Alstonville plateau in the Ballina Shire's hinterland were revealed at Ballina Council's ordinary meeting last week.

Suggestions of a new private hospital on State Significant Farmland [SSF] between

Alstonville and Wollongbar had been touted by independent Councillor Rodney Bruem on social media, and were brought to the meeting during public access when a developer representative gave a deputation.

Karl Mayoh said he was from commercial construction company Erylyan Pty Ltd and had spoken with a Sydneybased surgeon interested in building a new, relatively small, single-level hospital. Mayor, Sharon Cadwal-

aware of ideas for a new 'water security project' on Council-owned land next to the Alstonville Industrial Estate.

The mayor, also deputy chair of the region's water security authority, the Rous County Council, said the project would likely be a partnership between the two councils.

#### State Significant

The ambitious development ideas were declared as part of a hotly anticipated

debate over whether to add the 23 hectares of State Significant Farmland (SSF) to the Council's list of Strategic Urban Growth Areas [SUGAs].

Councillors were first presented with a revised SUGA list leading up to August's ordinary meeting, and deferred the vote until after a briefing, before revisiting it at an extraordinary meeting held earlier this month.

A last-minute effort to overturn the subsequent vote to include the SSF was defeated last week.

'Without additional funding, the economic and social harm caused by this emergency will only get worse'.

Cr Turley added, 'More than 220 natural disaster areas have been declared across NSW this year'.

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## Lex Luthor buys Daily Planet

fter acquiring Twitter for \$44B. the world's richest individual is now trolling its users, and removing people's accounts he doesn't like.

Elon Musk is a 51-year-old trustafarian, born to a wealthy South African emerald mining family.

While deleting user accounts, he claims that he wants to bring free speech to the social media platform. Last week, staff across the planet who moderate hate speech and racism were sacked.

The entire Human Rights Twitter team was dumped on November 5.

In his first week he has also threatened advertisers and amplified and empowered crazy people.

Twitter is actually very influential and useful. It's not just politicians who project their policies - or the journalists who critique them; scientists, artists, comedians, academics and business leaders are highly engaged in the global conversation.

Musk calls himself 'Twitter Complaint Hotline Operator' on his Twitter handle, and replies to messages every few hours, according to his timeline.

He is also the CEO of Space X, Tesla, Starlink and Boring Co.

Given he spends so much time on Twitter now, it appears being a CEO isn't a very demanding or important job.

Perhaps his account is run by bots? It makes sense given his interest and investment in Al.

There's the Musk supporters, of course, who will prefer Elon Musk to Mark Zuckerberg (owner of Facebook/Meta).

'At least Elon gets high', tweeted



Tommy Chong, of the famous Cheech and Chong comedy duo.

Back in April, Musk tweeted how important it was that the platform remain politically neutral.

Then, on Tuesday, he told his 115M followers they should vote Republican in the US mid-term elections.

Previously, he said he's always voted Democrat. Imagine looking at the current US Republican Party, and deciding that *now* is the right time to get behind them?

It all looks like what happens when an individual gets unbridled, unchecked, untaxed power.

From the outside, it seems he operates without much focus, and plenty of ego.

Imagine what \$44B could do for world hunger.

He was asked to do something on that last year by the UN, but didn't.

To give a sense of scale, his purchase of one website outstrips the 2021 Gross Domestic Product (GDP) of countries such as Mongolia, Sudan, Afghanistan, Yemen, Madagascar, Nepal and Armenia.

What's close to the approximate cost for his Twitter splurge is Libya's GDP for 2021: \$41.88B (US).

He has a fortune of \$195B, and he appears well on the way to overtaking Iraq's yearly GDP of \$207.9B. Hans Lovejoy, editor

spirational political parties are judged on how they deliver dreams. Vision politicians are judged according to how many of their visions turn out to be mirages.

The task is much harder for the ALP at a federal level than a party like the modern Liberals, who have no apparent aspirations apart from making rich people richer, and making poor people feel guilty for not being rich.

If their recent budget is anything to go by, Labor also has the wellbeing of the wealthy at heart, but it was elected promising to address a long list of other issues.

Their website says, 'Labor will deliver a future where no one is held back and no one is left behind.' So who is being held back and

left behind, so far?

Certainly not the big fossil fuel companies, whose \$40 billion of subsidies have remained sacrosanct, in spite of Labor talking big on climate change.


Greens leader, Adam Bandt, says Anthony Albanese simultaneously has his feet on the accelerator and brake pedals when it comes to climate, but from here it looks like gas, gas, gas.

Giving more support to renewables is not going to do anything significant to address the climate emergency in isolation.

Consider Labor's plans for the NT, with billions of public money earmarked for the gas industry there, even though these companies are already reaping unprecedented windfall profits owing to the international situation.

Here in NSW, gas development in the Pilliga will also be accelerated, according to Labor **Resources Minister Madeleine** King, whose statements would be consistant coming from any government of the last ten years, and ignore both the science and the stated wishes of local farmers and traditional owners.

Also, never mind that this area is currently underwater, along with vast regions of south-eastern Australia, owing, in part, to the spectacular greed and stupidity of



the fossil fuel lobby and their political enablers.

Meanwhile, energy prices at home continue to skyrocket, as most of our fuel is exported to enrich the small group of multinational companies who exploit most of this country's resources.

That's if you have a solid home at all, as an increasing number of us don't.

Labor has promised to do something about this, saying it intends to build 'one million new, well-located homes over five years from 2024' - if the private sector comes to the party.

Meanwhile, interest rates and inflation continue to rise, and one problem may not solve the other.

In terms of foreign affairs, traditionally an ALP strength, Minister Penny Wong moved quickly to shore up relations in the South Pacific and Europe, after an insular decade.

Yet Australia still has no clear role in the world, apart from being the deputy sheriff of a fading empire. The US facility at Pine Gap is being expanded, with no local oversight, and there will soon be B-52s in Darwin, unfortunately, not the 'Love Shack' and 'Rock Lobster' variety, but with nuclear weapons.

There are more swings and roundabouts in other areas.

While the prosecution of the lawyer of whistleblower Witness K has been abandoned, there has been no public progress with Julian Assange's imprisonment.

We are edging towards a federal ICAC in Canberra, but much of its important business appears likely to be conducted behind closed doors, and there has been zero movement towards addressing dirty political donation laws.

In Tanya Plibersek, we have a new environment minister who appears to at least know what the

word environment means, but when she went to Tasmania recently, she refused to visit the Tarkine wilderness, but instead visited the miners intending to damage it.

Some asylum seekers have been freed, but most of the underlying policies that led to their imprisonment remain.

The Indigenous Voice to Parliament appears destined to become another political football.

Live animal exports continue, despite promises otherwise, and seem to be well down the government's to-do list.

In terms of the big picture, prioritising business interests over human needs and science looks set to continue when it comes to most ALP health. education. tax and employment policies, while the dangerous myth of endless economic growth as the solution to anything and everything remains entirely unchallenged.

While many of Labor's problems, and a worsening international situation, can justly be laid at the feet of the preceding government, it cannot be said that the new government has lived up to its promises, so far.

There is plenty of room for improvement.

But most of the people in Cabinet at least appear to care.

As the man of a thousand hats fades into the rearview mirror, consider the revelations of week one of the Robodebt Royal Commission.

No matter how disappointing the Albanese Labor government might ultimately become, it's hard to imagine they could possibly be as bad as the government that produced and sustained this illegal and hare-brained scheme for five long years, until the whole, cruel catastrophe came crashing down. The only possible way is up.

Two weeks ago I took my sixyear-old grandson to Tallow Beach. We were strolling through the 'no dogs' area and enjoying the sight of so many terns and gulls, when we came upon a wallaby, leaping about in circles in the whitewash waves.

I had never witnessed this before and at first we thought it was enjoying itself. It soon became clear that it could not find its way out. It was blind and its hind quarters had been savaged.

A handful of people there were concerned about its welfare; WIRES was called. A young dad with a boogie board managed to shepherd it out of the water where it would certainly have died of exhaustion.

Sadly, it was ultimately euthanised, owing to the severe shock and trauma from its injuries and blindness. This blindness is caused by a stress reaction to being attacked and is not reversible.

The WIRES volunteers said dog attacks on birds, wallabies and other wildlife on the beaches and in the adjoining bush are becoming more frequent as dog numbers increase in coastal areas.

I am not the first to complain, but am wondering

if there is a way for the community, visitors, travellers and our young people to become more aware of the serious loss of our native fauna and the importance of responsible dog ownership.

After witnessing the event, my six-year-old grandson said, 'When I grow up I'm going to be a wildlife rescuer'.

Perhaps it is time for some united action and creative thinking to put a stop to this slaughter, (also a serious issue on our roads). Happy to be involved in any way that is useful – I am open to suggestions.



• Continued from page 17 diverse residential areas' and 'significantly facilitates future growth'.

The 'route options' study does not discuss the *Bike Plan* data and consultation. The *Bike Plan* objective of responding to 'existing use and demand' is replaced with an objective to 'attract... opportunities for tourism'.

We can ill afford expenditure of scarce cycleway dollars to be diverted from priorities that actually meet the daily transport needs of residents. Mullumbimby and Brunswick have cycling to work rates four to five times higher than the regional average. Add to that all the non-work reasons residents commute and it is clear that the priority must be to existing use and future residential growth in the southern route.

Expenditure on a rural northern route with no existing use will leave safety risks in the southern route unaddressed and cyclists increasingly exposed. Timeconstrained commuters are unlikely to add significant time and distance to their journey and for most the northern 'trail' will be too far away to access. ## Call for support to transition 1,000 jobs in NSW logging industry

A recent report Transition support for the NSW native forest sector, by Frontier Economics (FE), into the NSW native forest logging sector has highlighted that it is time to support the transition from forestry to plantations.

The overall downward trend in logging native forests in NSW was accelerated by the impact of the 2019–20 Black Summer fires, which led to a significant decrease in the capacity of the forests to sustain the current levels of logging. This was highlighted by the Natural Resources Commission's (NRC) report in 2021 that stated timber harvesting needed to be suspended 'for at least three years in extreme risk zones'.

The FE report, released at The Vanishing Koala Conference on the weekend, on behalf of World Wildlife Fund Australia (WWF-Australia) 'calls for a just transition from forestry to plantations, that engages industry, along with climate scientists and eminent ecologists'.

'NSW is the second largest producer of logs harvested from native forests in Australia. Victoria and Western Australia have made commitments to transition out of native forest logging, however NSW is yet to do so,' states the report.

'The FE report makes it clear that we would be far better off economically if we stopped logging public forests,' explained North East Forest Alliance (NEFA) spokesperson, Dailan Pugh.

According to the FE report, recent analysis by the Australian National University (ANU) and Frontier Economics has shown that in just the South Coast and Eden areas, ceasing native forest logging would produce a net economic benefit of approximately \$60 million, while also reducing net greenhouse gas emissions

'Frontier Economics' estimate that a generous government-funded structural adjustment package, including for the 1,000 affected workers, would only cost \$302 million.

'Just stopping logging is likely to be beneficial to the NSW budget [too], though inclusion of the wider natural capital benefits to the economy from increased carbon capture and storage, tourism, water production, improving threatened species habitat, and mental health benefits make ending logging of public lands of real and lasting economic and environmental benefit to the people of NSW.

'A 2021 study by the University of Newcastle found that protecting 175,000 ha of State Forest between Coffs Harbour and Grafton as the Great Koala National Park would, over the next 15 years, generate additional regional economic output of \$1.2 billion and create more than 9,800 extra full-time jobs compared to logging.

'Under the NSW Koala Strategy the NSW Government proposes paying \$3,353 per hectare to buy 15,000 ha of private properties over the next five years. By this metric, protecting the more than 300,000 ha of potential high quality koala habitat in state forests is worth over a billion dollars, and is essential if we want koala populations, as well as greater gliders, yellow-bellied gliders, ganggang cockatoos, glossy-black cockatoos and a host of other species, to recover from logging and wildfires.'

could reduce supply by up to 90 per cent.

'The expected reduction of wood supply from the Eden subregion is 40 per cent and 35 per cent from the Tumut subregion.

'The impact on the North Coast has been less severe, but there is expected to be a 20 per cent reduction in wood supply.

'The NRC reports that the loss in wood supply is undermining the viability of a number of hardwood mills, including those in Nowra and Narooma. The NRC reported that 74 people have been stood down as at March 2021.'

NEFA are calling for a commitment from the NSW government to 'immediately commit to a truly independent cost-benefit assessment of the logging of public native forests, with the principal aim of building on the work of Frontier Economics in developing a fair and equitable structural adjustment package for affected workers and communities'.

'If they [NSW government] continue to refuse to, we call upon the NSW Labor Party to commit to immediately undertaking such a review should they win government at the next election.


'The need for such a review is supported by the September 2022 recommendations 4, 5 and 19 of the NSW Upper House Inquiry into the long term sustainability and future of the timber and forest products industry for a cost-benefit assessment of public native forests and development of strategies to support workers and communities transition away from [the logging of] native forests. 'In light of our current extinction and climate crises taxpayers cannot afford to go on paying to log animals' homes and cut down trees essential for storing and sequestering carbon on public lands any longer, the time for action is now,' Mr Pugh said.

'By stopping logging of public native forests we can redirect the immense public subsidies [for logging] into assisting affected workers and communities [to] transition, while realising real economic and environmental benefits from avoiding CO2 emissions, increasing carbon storage, increasing tourism, increasing water yields and restoring habitats of threatened species, such as the koala,' said Mr Pugh.

#### It is time to end the 'War on Drugs' and allow life-changing treatments for depression, PTSD and anorexia

n Mullumbimby, Byron Bay and the Northern **Rivers Rainbow Region** drugs have been debated and experimented with since the hippies moved here in the early 1970s. Discussion on the healing and life-changing properties of psilocybin (aka magic mushrooms) DMT, LSD, ecstasy (MDMA) is par for the course here, but on 17 November at the Byron Theatre you can truly get your head around the science with the keynote presentation on psychedelic therapies by Professor David Nutt, the Head of Neuropsychopharmacology at Imperial College, London.

This is not about enjoying a few pretty colours flashing through your mind, this is about the science of helping people who are in desperate need. People who are suffering from longterm treatment-resistant depression, PTSD, anorexia, anxiety - people who have

been denied help for years, or their entire lives, because of the 'War on Drugs'.

'Fifteen per cent of people with depression and anorexia kill themselves. 1,000 people a day commit suicide,' explained Professor Nutt.

'There are no sensible arguments as to why we've denied people access to these life saving treatments. It's perverse, it's sadistic.'

During the 1950s and 60s there were 1,000 clinical papers relating to psychedelic drug use and Professor Nutt says they were able to use that data to demonstrate the safety of using these drugs in medical trials.

'Psychedelics have had really bad press,' he pointed out, saying that the 'War on Drugs' really evolved because of protests against the Vietman War.

'The War on Drugs took them [drugs] on, not because they were harmful, but because people who were using them were opposing the war in Vietnam. This

is a hangover from the anti-Vietnam War protests. They couldn't ban the war protests, but they could ban the drugs that people who were protesting were using, like LSD.

'They didn't care about the consequences. It was absolutely thoughtless -40,000 patients, there were 1,000 clinical papers from 1953 to '67 – and all this was ignored.'

#### Revolutionary

Professor Nutt said he didn't go into the study of psychedelics thinking he'd be studying depression but was interested in the neuroplasticity of the brain.

'We have virtually nothing to treat these patients and the use of psychedelics gives us an alternative treatment.

'Two trials, of a single "trip" for patients with treatmentresistant depression, overall had better outcomes than current treatments. They got significantly better on a single dose. It is actually

One of the biggest challenges for Australian research is the 'tension between the Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) and state legislation,' explains Professor Nutt, and this is a key reason for his visit to Australia. Currently psilocybin and medical grade MDMA, when used as part of therapy in medically controlled environments, are classed as 'Schedule 9 (Prohibited Substances)'.

'We still have the problem [that] it is an illegal drug, even a single molecule is illegal. We need to downgrade the medical use to "Schedule 8 (Controlled Medicines)".

This is supported by an independent inquiry 'which confirmed the conclusion that these medicines were safe and well tolerated by patients when given in a medically controlled environment,' say Mind Medicine Australia (www.

Every country needs allies, however, as a free and democratic country, why don't the people of Australia decide who builds facilities on our land and not the defence department? I did not hear one mention of either of these two facilities by our political representatives prior to the last federal election.

We have been constantly told by previous governments that, 'We will decide who comes to this country'.

Then let us decide, surely, who builds nuclear targets in this country!

I believe that this is a nationally important issue that all Australians need to be concerned about and have a strong voice for the future of generations to come.

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
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

The three measures of buy-back, wet-proofing and house-raising are actions listed in the Shire's Floodplain Plans as already adopted over the last decade.

The measures will help us keep our community networks intact - people will be able to stay and to live and work in a safer world. This will make properties more affordable, by making them less liable to flood damage. It's a form of 'betterment'.

I want to shout out to all the amazing people who lobbied for this over the last eight months, despite many themselves being heavily impacted by the 2022 flood events. That includes individuals like Sasha Mainsbridge, Bec Talbot, Noelle Maxwell and Svea Pitman who took the time and had the composure to explain to authorities how to houseraise or wet-proof, and what the hurdles were (funding being the biggest of those).

It includes our state MP, Tamara Smith, who pushed the case for us in Macquarie Street. It includes many residents' groups representing towns like Mullumbimby, Brunswick Heads, Ocean Shores, South Golden Beach, and New Brighton.

A big thanks to Byron Shire Council staff and councillors, who listened to residents and also lobbied hard.

We will all be watching to see how adequate the funding is. The nominal 2,000 properties in each of the three categories will not likely cover all those flooded across the Northern Rivers in 2022. We may have to keep lobbying...

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
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
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## You have a lawful right to protest – so why are the police intimidating protesters in their homes?

hat happened to the right to protest? That is the question being asked after police targeted Blockade Australia protesters before the International Mining and Resources Conference (IMARC) in Sydney. Former NSW Magistrate, David Heilpern, told The Echo that there were a range of concerns with this type of behaviour from police, especially as Australians have a lawful right to protest.

'Over the last week police have undertaken an exercise in harassment and intimidation of people who participated in climate protests during the month of June this year,' said a spokesperson for Blockade Australia in November.

'Police across the continent, under the directions of New South Wales' Strike Force Guard, have turned up at the homes of dozens of activists in the last week. People in Queensland, the ACT, Victoria and New South Wales have been subjected to these visits in relation to past protests (with Blockade Australia) and an unrelated [planned protest at IMARC]'

Strike Force Guard was set up in response to the Blockade Australia protest mobilisation at the Port of Botany in March this year, and since then has worked to shut down protests from other groups like Fireproof Australia and now Blockade IMARC.

Blockade IMARC planned a protest against the

International Mining and Resources Conference. The conference is normally held in Melbourne, but this year it was held in Sydney after vears of protests outside of the Melbourne-based conference saw it move north.

Blockade Australia and Blockade IMARC have no connection, other than both groups being majorly concerned about the climate and ecological crisis, they say.

One of the people who received visits from the police in Newcastle said. 'This is a frightening precedent. Police are going to the homes of dozens of people and are telling the people who live in those homes that if they attend a protest they will be arrested.'

#### Lawful right to protest

'The reports of actions by Strike Force Guard are deeply concerning for four main reasons,' said Mr Heilpern.

'First, lawful protest is (by definition) legal. There is a constitutional right to freedom of speech, and

attending at a mining conference and holding a placard and voicing your concerns is not illegal, providing notice has been given. The police ought not be trying to deter people from protesting.

'Second, one would have thought that the police would have better things to do. Maybe they could pay as much attention to domestic violence offenders and illegal logging as to those wanting to protect the planet by protesting against mining.

#### Overkill

'Third, the police should not be seen to be taking sides in what will become increasingly common standoffs between polluters and saviours. Why not warn off the mining companies and tell them to use Zoom if they are really worried about public safety and disruption? After all, the protest is just as legal as the conference,' he said.

'Finally, this is bullying. To have armed police knocking on people's doors who have previously attended protests because you think they might go to another protest (even though they are thousands

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of kilometres apart, and run by different organisations) is designed to intimidate and scare. It is overkill, overreach and overdone.'

People within Blockade Australia have recorded all the instances of police intimidation over the last week and are working with human rights organisations to push back on this infringement upon the right to protest.


'Australia, and in particular New South Wales, cannot be called a democracy if the courts, government, industry and police are all working together to squash protests against the climate crisis in the same year that most of the east coast has gone under water in unprecedented floods at one point or another,' said a Newcastle Blockade Australia protester.

#### Protest 4 November

Approximately 50 protesters gathered on Friday 4 November, despite police activities, outside the International Mining and **Resources Conference that** was hosted at the International Convention Centre in Darling Harbour.

Blockade IMARC spokesperson, Maddox Gifford. told The Green Left, 'We see through the greenwashing that IMARC and the participating mining companies are trying to sell us'.

'We know we shouldn't sacrifice land, water and life to continue hugely unsustainable lifestyles fuelled by greed and competition. We have a better vision for the world.'

The claim that Norths Collective will increase poker machines is not explained. The MOU has been negotiated so that the number of poker machines can only increase to a maximum of 15! This is less than what is already at the local hotel.

Having the ability to self-determine its future is all very well if there is a club but pointless if the club has closed down and the land sold off, which is where the KTBL group is leading us.

I cannot believe you printed information provided by an anonymous 'resident'.

The Murwillumbah Bowlo was taken over by Murwillumbah Services Club, it was this club that closed Murwillumbah Bowlo down. Norths were not involved and did not sign any MOU with the Murwillumbah Bowlo. Norths have never closed a club down!

Shame for publishing lies. The MOU between Norths

and Bangalow Bowlo is a legal document, a huge amount of work has gone into it by the board and management and it is 28 pages long and someone has picked out a couple of points to suit their propaganda.

The MOU is a good resolution for Bangalow Bowlo, at least we will have a club to go to.

If you believe some of the propositions put forward by KTBL then please read the MOU, all of it. There are a lot of guarantees, plans and financial aid in this legal document.

The KTBL have no legal documents, only fancy words and unsupported dreams. **Gerry Swain** 

A total takeover is dressed

up as an amalgamation!

Concerned members of the Bangalow Bowlo have been waiting anxiously for the legally binding MOU that would determine the fate of our club forever. The 28 page MOU has now been released.

Fifty per cent +1 members will decide, on Sunday 13 November at 11am, the fate of a club that has been in community hands for 112 years.

Sadly, the MOU is full of legal weasel words, vague terms and evasions. The assurances that are still being made by Norths ('Securing the future together' Byron Shire Echo, 2 November) come with escape clauses like Norths having 'an intention to preserve, and where possible enhance' the club, by 'reasonable endeavours'. Community support opportunities will be 'explored' by Norths.

As for the much-vaunted investment in the building, Norths commits to 'maintaining' the building and to undertake 'necessary' upgrades that are 'financially viable'.

The bowling green gets renovation on an 'as needs basis' at the 'absolute discretion' of Norths. Even the obligation to fully insure the building comes with the caveat that adequate insurance is 'available on reasonable commercial terms'.

Claims about local management are simply not reflected in the MOU.



Overall management of the club will be by the Norths CEO (cl 3.3), The Board of Norths will be the Board of the Bowlo (cl 3.5), Norths must make decisions in the best interests of Norths at all times (cl 3.7). The Advisory Committee is 'subject to the control of Norths at all times' (cl 5.15). The bowling sub-clubs will be 'created' by Norths (cl 5.6), are subject to the 'control and direction of Norths', all their funds are the property of Norths (cl 5.17) and any expenditure must be approved by Norths (cl 5.19). Even the holding of bowling events are at the 'absolute discretion' of Norths.

The local sporting clubs don't actually have much certainty about sponsorships beyond the amounts payable in the first two years. After that, sponsorship amounts are 'reviewed', and the sporting clubs will have to enter into undefined 'sponsorship agreements' if they are to get future sponsorship. After two years, the minimum amount payable to the clubs is that received by them immediately before the MOU was signed. Norths knows full well that payments in 2022 have been at a historic low coming after two covid restricted years.

On the flip side, Norths gets complete ownership of prime land conservatively valued at \$5 million (less about \$500,000 in debts)! They can build accommodation for their members and their guests during the term of the MOU.

Our community gets the scourge of more pokies from three to ten straight

away, rising to 15 in ten years, and no limits after that! That equates to millions of dollars in gambling revenue taken from our community just in the first ten years. Whatever Norths does actually spend on the Bowlo will be dwarfed by what we will have given them in property, redevelopment opportunities and gambling revenue. After the ten-year term of the MOU there are no binding guarantees. Norths can sell the property, redevelop the land, or operate the club in any way they wish. Say 'No' to this dud deal.

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

# The empty journals of complex women

'This is going to be the first of many journal entries'. I read this on the first page of a moleskin diary. It is the only entry. It belongs to my daughter. I am cleaning through boxes of stuff my girls have stashed in the cupboards. These unwritten journals are a feature. There are pink satin hard-covered diaries, soft velvet notebooks, handmade paper journals, and business-like little black books. It makes me smile because I have the same approach to my journals. Tens of books with one or two entries carefully made, and then abandoned. This moment of hope and intention - and then acres of nothing. Who is this girl who has slipped from the pages?

It's like this fragile heart was captured, and then disappeared into the ether, and all we have as evidence is this dusty book. There's a sweet sadness as I pack these books away. I recognise this feeling, this secret longing... this broken promise. It smells like distant smoke. It lives in me. This desire to tell all; coupled with a desire to reveal nothing.

There are two types of people: Those who journal, and those who don't. As much as I want to be someone who journals, it appears that I am not. Nor are my daughters. We start strong, but we fade fast. The journals are always started in a point of exit from sadness, when there's a sense of a need for solemn confession to change a pattern. Perhaps this inability to commit to a journal, to commit truly to one's own path of self-discovery is a sign. Or perhaps we were bored, or busy, or scared... in denial. Or perhaps we changed the pattern so fast a second journal entry was not required.

It's not procrastination. I don't have writer's block. I have no problem with writing. I create thousands of words every week without fail. I do however struggle to journal. Perhaps the procrastination or the block lies deep within. Or maybe I have no inner life worth mining? No secrets left to uncover

I wonder who that woman is – the one who picks up her unlined notebook and details her day. The one who captures her dark thoughts on paper and leaves them by the bed, finding solace in spilling her secrets. She who has something to say and says it, or has nothing to say and says it. How does she find her way to the page time and time again? And how can she bare to leave her soul on the dresser, unattended?

Doesn't she know that people will look? Doesn't she know she will be discovered? Or is that what she wants? Are all people who journal 'missing' – waiting to be found? Maybe I don't journal because I prefer the freedom of being a missing person.

How do journal writers be unselfconscious? I don't think I've ever started a journal without being conscious of being discovered. Of someone picking up a book I've previously hidden, and then forgotten, and finding a piece of me that I had recorded and lost. I have seen what happens with journals;



they get found. Some even get published posthumously. What an awful thing to do to someone. Do dead people get embarrassed? It's a betrayal and a rare delicious intimacy, all at the same time.

I'm holding these diaries that belong to my daughter and I desperately want to read them. So few entries, it would take half-an-hour, tops. But I can't. To go further would be a betrayal. All I allow myself to read is the space unwritten.

Ironically the absence is more revealing than a filled page. It calls me back to my own silence. The unwritten page has spoken.

This morning I started a new journal; a small satin book sewn with tiny pearls. It felt too beautiful to write in. Like nothing I had to offer would be good enough. I sat for half-an-hour looking at the blank page, I wrote 'This is going to be the first of many journal entries', and then I hid it.



its fabulous, often quirky Japanese food served up in pretty surroundings, utterly free of pretension, with small groups lounging outside on the grass and children playing happily. It's back to serving dinners now two nights a week, all the more reason to envy those Federalites who don't have to navigate the narrow twisty country roads in the dark to reach it.

All the more reason, too, to be thankful for the Japanese Kitchen's presence at the farmers' market. I am chatting to Takayuki, chef and owner, whose easy warmth and humility are so evident in the beautiful food his team dispenses. His affection for the farmers' market, where it all began – before Doma, before Qudo in

a little. 'It's why I want to get back to working there', he tells me, citing less sushi and more breakfast-style dishes as some of the changes. More, then, along the lines of those brown rice sushi cones. ## Capiche – Fine Italian dining on Ballina's Lighthouse Beach

Capiche is a new player on the Northern Rivers scene, having opened in April 2022. They are enviably positioned atop the Ballina Surf Club, with an awesome 180-degree view overlooking East Ballina's Lighthouse Beach. The brainchild of the team behind Bang Bang restaurants, Capiche was created first and foremost with a love of the panoramic ocean vistas that the location boasts.

Because of the two-level layout, there are no tables down the back where all you see is other diners - I don't think there would a table where you couldn't glance up and see the beach. As co-owner Nicholas Simpson says, 'the wrap-around ocean views, and the chance to have a venue poised directly over the beach was too good an opportunity to turn down. Beautiful food in beautiful places is our mantra, the rest came from there. There are so few restaurants in our beautiful

slice of the world where you can enjoy a meal and a wine while right on the water. So, we really are lucky to have found a place where you can do exactly that.'

Chef Ben Warriner has created an Italian menu that well and truly does the location justice. 'It's all about food prepared with integrity, fun and heart. In trying to capture the spirit of the sea, the menu walks the line from delicate to decadent and everything in between.'

You'll find ingredients such as wild boar, local cheeses and charcuterie and of course, fresh Ballina prawns. On our visit the fish of the day was swordfish. I hesitated because my experience of swordfish, even in some celebrated restaurants, has been a dry, hard fish. The waiter seeing my hesitation, said that they did seafood really well. And indeed, the swordfish that came out was moist, so much so that it had trouble staying on the fork! Cooked over coals with salsa Siciliana and pistachio burnt

butter this was a fantastic dish. Still on the seafood, the BBQ octopus was another tender, juicy winner.

The vegetarian Stracciatella: creamed buffalo cheese, pickled zucchini, chive, and leek was delicious, and the Woodgrilled Pumpkin, radicchio, sage burnt butter had wonderful multifaceted flavour that went well with the Italian white from the drinks menu; which has a good range of wines by the glass as well as bottles. Often roast pumpkin just tastes like pumpkin, but my vegetarian partner said this was the best he'd had. While the menu at Capiche is a bold one, there is something for everyone, with plenty of classic Italian favourites, authentic woodfired pizzas, some fun bits for the kids and, apparently, a killer tiramisu.

The fit out is reflective of the Bang Bang sense of style, but with a fresh Mediterranean twist. Soft edges, alluring curves, sandy whites and Burgundy reds bring



both comfort and sophistication to the former Lighthouse Beach Cafe location. Yet the view, of course, remains the hero.

For the avid morning beach-goer, the Capiche Kiosk will be a welcome surprise. A perfectly made Old Quarter Coffee, a fresh pastry or some house-made sweets sounds like a great way to round out a walk or a surf on Lighthouse Beach.

We visited for Sunday lunch and the place was full. Nicholas says, 'the response from our guests has been



really heart-warming. It seems the Shire has long had a desire for just what we're offering. A new, fresh outlook in a place that we all love. ## Lightbulb moment inspires beer documentary

'I'm 29, and all through school I've watched videos of the polar icecaps melting,' says James Toohey, 'and I knew a bit about regen farming. But when I saw Damon Gameau's film 2040, the bit about regen really struck me, it was like a lightbulb moment, it really resonated for me.'

James runs a creative design studio in Sydney, and customarily makes five-minute videos for clients, but he seems to have become a passionate advocate for regen agriculture over the course of making a new documentary about the beer industry. 'So, I guess like all, particularly younger, Australians I'm quite climate conscious, and we make choices about solar power, recycling etc', he says, 'but when I heard about this project to make regenerative beer, that segment of Gameau's film came back to me, and I realised this was something that could make a huge difference, not just in the beer industry but to the behaviour of ordinary people, like me'.

more I thought about it, the more interesting it became to me. Beer is totally connected to Aussie culture, and we're all a bit climate-conscious these days, making choices about how to reduce our impact with solar panels, with recycling etc. But two years ago, when I heard about Stone & Wood's plan to make a regen beer, I realised it could have a real impact'.

The main inputs to the beer industry are grain, hops and water. Grain, in particular, is often grown as a monoculture, with grains from many different farmers then travelling long distances to be mixed together in silos. The grain (mostly barley or wheat) is then transported to a facility where it's roasted to become 'malt', which the brewer then mixes with yeast and hops to make beer. In Whitton, in the NSW Riverina region, Voyager has set up Australia's first on-farm malthouse. As they grow the grain on smaller allotments, practically within view of the malting facility, food miles are reduced. But more importantly, this process means that they can keep the grain separate, so you can see the grain from each farmer. All the grain in the regen beer

comes from regen farmers, who rotate 'cover' crops to improve soil temperatures and the soil biome – both important to soil health.

'The resulting beer is not only sustainable, but also regenerative,' continues James, 'it's not just taking CO2 out of the atmosphere and contributing to soil health, it's actually contributing to reversing climate change. In fact, the more we focused on the issue, the more Stone & Wood realised that they could expand this more broadly throughout their range'.

In addition to making a range of purist 'regen' ales and beers, Stone & Wood are going to try and make 70 per cent of their products feature regen hops and grain, James says. Obviously, Stone & Wood are just part of a much larger group of companies, but if it works for them, the regen strategy can be expanded within the group. Not every hops or grain farmer is 'regen', so they need to be educated and brought along. For James the documentary is part of a process of educating consumers about what the damage is (from, for example, monoculture

grain-growing practices) and that it doesn't have to be that way – that you can choose brands that are regenerative, making a choice that is healthier in the short term and in the longer term it's better for soil health, and creates biodiversity within the soil.

In addition, the documentary describes how the process of change creates new opportunities. At Whitton, instead of using fossil fuel to roast the grain they use biochar, which is in turn made from the discarded crops of other farmers in the Riverina, e.g. nut waste. By turning away from fossil fuel, this created a solution for another problem (waste crops) that no-one was even attempting to solve. This can make a huge impact in the beer industry, says James. 'When Voyager were looking at their sustainability, they'd done a lot of obvious things like solar power, but changing from monoculture grain to regen grain cut a further 50 per cent of emissions. This could be very significant if the whole of

Australia moved to this.'


In an exclusive interview from Houston, Texas last week, *Seven* caught up with co-founder and the drum in the brass, Lumar LeBlanc to talk about music, Metallica, and red beans and rice.

#### You and co-founder Derrick Moss are two percussionists and you started a brass band. How did that happen?

'The original group was the offset of Harold Dejan's Olympia Brass Band – we were blessed to be the junior band to that band. So while we were playing their music under their tutelage, we were able to start playing our music. We started playing music of our generation with the folk in the hip hop and gospel [scenes]. We didn't want to disrespect them, so we thought 'We've got to have a different name when we're doing that' – it was on a totally different level.

## How does it feel to be a percussionist in amongst all that brass?

It's great! The drums, as you know, are the heartbeat – that's what makes the heart move and get the blood pumping. And all of the rest – accompaniment with the trumpets, trombones and the saxophones and sousaphone – it just makes a massive piece. We have been playing drums our whole life – all of us actually have been playing instruments, our whole life. And that combination is unique. It's exciting. We've become very innovative with it – down to different techniques that we use, but it still is authentic – real beats, and that's what I think definitely separates us from others.






## Do you think people have low expectations of a 'brass band'?

I think they do. Yeah, I think that they look at it more as an authentic, special commodity. Especially being from New Orleans, they kind of look at it as an extension of the culture, rather than something to take seriously like Nirvana or the Beatles. But, we've been able to turn it around and, as you saw, we played with Metallica and other bands because of the way we approach the music and the style. Early on, it was a hardship. We had to even get to where we weren't in the street anymore – no parades. And then from there, we were able to go to the stage. And then on a stage it was a challenge, but we were able to get people to respect it there also.

#### What does it feel like to be able to share your experience of the way you see music with other people, for example, Metallica, who have a totally different approach?

Oh it's exciting. You couldn't imagine the energy that comes out of a formation like that. What we found when we collaborate with other musicians, who love and who are serious about their craft, like Metallica, all of the formulas and instruments kind of just become one. And we look at each other as artists. And the mentality and the vibe from the heart and



soul, which is most important, begins to connect. It speaks to the level of musicianship. That can have a determining factor in the success of the collaboration also, when we're able to listen to their music and appreciate it and master it to the point where we could give it back to them in a respectful way. When two serious groups of musicians connect, they're not looking at us as a brass band, and we're not looking at them as a rock band – we're just one band. With all our collaboration we've had no problems at all. We've always been able to have the respect and the vibe.

#### What inspires you?

Oh, my goodness. Personally I'm a very spiritual person. I look at my music and I look at my drum as one connecting spirit extension of me lovely. Artistically, I'm inspired by so much. I love lyrics. It can be from Sade, to Jay Z, Beyoncé to Diana Ross – I love lyrics because I like the message. I write a lot of poetry. I write a lot of rap music. So those things inspire me. Obviously the drums do too, but I'm inspired by a lot of things at heart. I love – I just love – Louise Armstrong, Coltrane, Miles. Yeah, I love those people.

#### I heard that red beans and rice (a traditional Creole dish made on a Monday and we spoke on Thursday) is your favourite food?

I love it! I want some right now. I can eat that every day! (Laughs a long time...)
