

A three-year-old Wedgetailed eagle had its first taste of freedom in almost six months when it was released by carers into the wild at Cudgera Creek on Tuesday after it was rehabilitated for an injured wing.

The eagle was rescued by Tweed Valley Wildlife Carers (TVWC) last July on a property at Cudgera Creek and had been rehabilitated at Currumbin Wildlife Sanctuary since then.

'She was found by locals struggling to fly, she seemed to have a dislocated shoulder, so we looked after her for a couple of days then rang the Currumbin Wildilife Sanctuary as they have proper facilities and enclosures for rehabilitating raptors', TVWC president Helen Joakim said.

'As she couldn't fly, she could not hunt for food, and the eagles are the top of the food chain, so that they have to be fit when they're released, so call 02 6672 4709.

would have starved to death or attacked by dogs or other animals.

Sanctuary animal trainer Luke Chigwidden, a TVWC volunteer himself for several years before joining the sanctuary, released 'Miss Toby' as the eagle is known, before an enthusiastic group of locals and wildlife carers on Tuesday morning, using a dead rabbit as a lure to keep her fed and in the area where she was last seen with her male partner and till she is strong enough to hunt.

'This one was lucky in that her wing was not permanently damaged, injured wings are a big problem for birds of prey because as soon as you do any damage to them they're out, flying and fitness is most important for their survival, Luke said.

all the birds around here were harassing her, she they can chase their prey and scavenge.

'We've had a surge of injured raptors brought into the sanctuary recently, the end of spring and start of summer is the peak season because that's when all the offspring are leaving their nests, we had 30 Brahminy kites in recently.

'Australia Zoo is sending us all their raptors, as we have a new facility designed for them with a large enclosure so they can fly around, he said.

Ms Joakim said TVWC could only dream of having such a purpose-built facility to care for the many birds of prey brought in.

'We've rescued four eagles in the past few years in the Tweed Valley including a sea eagle and we really need a proper shed for the raptors,'

Councillors' expenses to be revealed?

A bid to hide councillors' expenses from public scrutiny appears set to come unstuck at this month's council meeting.

Greens councillor Katie Milne is expected to win majority support for a push to re-instate a list of councillors' individual expenses traditionally published in an annual report.

Senior council staff quietly axed the list following the return of the new council in September last year after the previous council was sacked in 2005 and administrators appointed.

Chinderah-based councillor Kevin Skinner blew the whistle on the change when he described expenses being claimed by some councillors on their trips away as 'exorbitant'.

'I just don't think it's necessary for all the councillors to be going off to these things all the time,' he complained, adding he had attended just one.

Although he did not name names, he told the last council meeting there should be a limit on the number of councillors attending conference and seminars and that they provide a report for those who didn't attend.

'Warped view of reality'

Council's corporate services chief Troy Green says it was decided to publish an aggregate list of expenses because listing them separately would be too complicated and 'would give a warped view of reality'.

This was because the figures included the wages of the mayor's and councillor's personal assistants for the first time as well as the distance travelled between each councillor's home and council offices.

Total costs racked up by councillors in the nine months to June 30, not including their meeting fees, was \$86,295, including nearly \$25,000 spent on conferences and training

Cr Skinner jumped on the lines which ban them from obtaining frequent flyer benefits for council-paid trips and for putting their hands out for attending political fundraising functions.

It's unclear how much councillors can charge for accommodation and meals but they must accord 'with the Tax Office allowance guidelines, and Mr Green says all claims are strictly audited.

It's gone from cheers to tears within a few weeks for Hastings Point developer, PDK, after a court ruled that three-storey buildings were not appropriate for the tiny village.

Murwillumbah TAFE visual arts student Helen Luna, pictured with her sculpture called Big Mac, asks that question with her work on display at the Tweed River Art Gallery as part of the local TAFE student exhibition called Surface/Big Bag which ends this Sunday (December 6).

The work is a mixture of foam cups, carbon, cow manure, soil, water and photographs.

'We are now freely given nutritional value information on most of our food, but there is very little information about the environmental costs of the food we eat,' Helen said.

'A Big Mac can be broken down to major components of growing the beef, wheat, lettuce etc and transport.

Tweed Shire Council is again remove the fencing or lodge Creek which Mr Elliott wants seeking the removal of part of a fence which threatens wildlife and blocks access to fishing and swimming spots along a Hastings Point creek.

Developer Walter Elliott Holdings reinforced the chicken-wire fence with barbed wire several months ago and installed a caretaker to conduct daily perimeter patrols to ensure it's not breached.

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

'I call Australia heaven on earth, it's like my journey coming to the promised land. I've been given huge support in Lismore and am also a Living Book there but it's my very first time here and it's beautiful,' she

Sarah, a part-time library assistant, said she has been involved in the living book program half a dozen times in Lismore, Nimbin and Byron Bay and learns about life in Australia much quicker than she ordinarily would.

'Most people are interested in my culture and country which I left 10 years ago, I still stay in touch by email with friends there though as it's now relatively peaceful.

'I love the idea of a living book and find it fascinating as you get to ask many questions and you get to know about your reader, I've also picked up a fair bit of the local slang too.

'I feel the program, helps people appreciate people from different cultures much more. I've met a father who has taken care of his disabled son all his life, there is so much love there, so much dedication

'You don't judge people as you see them, it's good to get closer to people and see if you can make someone smile. I wouldn't have survived here without the warmth, love and care from the locals I've met, it's not about coming to Australia and simply getting a better life.'

What's to hide?

Tweed Council's secrecy over details of councillors' expenses only helps to erode public confidence in its commitment to transparency and open scrutiny of its deliberations and activities, all paid for by the public purse.

Its new rule and media policy to hide away a list of councillors' individual expenses traditionally published in an annual report is totally unnecessary and every excuse so far given for not doing so has been lame. Throwing another veil over what should be a simple exercise in public accountability is another step back to the bad old days which led to the previous council's sacking in 2005 after an inquiry by Professor Maurice Daly. In his report, he criticised the council, ironically then led by current mayor Warren Polglase, over its lack of openness and how the public's perception of corruption was encouraged by that secrecy.

Councillors choosing to keep such details under wraps risk accusations of rorting the system, as it's a well known fact of life and politics that some pollies are tempted to do just that. We don't suggest this is actually happening here but the temptation is there if expenses are not scrutinised by the public. Who knows what's been spent on what by whom and whether it's appropriate? We won't ever know unless we see the details, but as it stands, all councillor expenses are detailed mostly as a lump sum and noone's the wiser.

Council staff and some councillors' reasoning for publishing an aggregate list of expenses rather than listing them separately is that it would be too complicated and 'distort reality' due to the inclusion of the wages of the mayor's and councillors' personal assistants for the first time as well as the different distances travelled by councillors to work.

Sure, just because a councillor keeps expenses down to a minimum and doesn't claim much by not being on committees and not going to conferences or not talking for hours on the phone, doesn't mean that councillor is the better performing residents' representative.

Conversely, one who joins every committee, travels to heaps of conferences and claims as much as possible may not necessarily be working harder than the others. So in this way the figures can be a little misleading, but that is still no reason for not publishing the details to allow members of the public themselves to assess each councillor's performance.

Much of these expenses are claimed for attending conferences and functions all over the country, an activity also criticised by one councillor. The criticism is supported by the fact that most councillors don't even bother to report back on what they learned or provide some sort of useful link for ratepayers here to the particular event. In neighbouring shires, some dedicated councillors provide fascinating presentations and written accounts of the conferences they attended in order to keep their councils abreast of the latest developments in all spheres of local government activity. People have the right to ask what they get for these trips on the public payroll. Again, it's about accountability.

Women and the world

Not surprisingly, women are usually seen as the nurturers of society, so it's good to see an all-female three-way contest for the federal seat of Richmond. This could be earlier than expected next year, with the biggest single issue at stake being what to do about man-made global warming.

But already we have inaction and political ideology getting in the way. The Nationals' Tania Murdock will no doubt toe the party line which is stuck in the middle ages and does not believe in global warming. The Liberals' Joan van Lieshout is no better, also espousing the troglodyte view of her party that any attempt at an emissions trading scheme (ETS) will simply be another big tax. Then there is Labor's Justine Elliot who refuses to get behind local campaigns to restore rail services and plan for future rail links in a bid to remove greenhouse-gas emitting vehicles from our roads. Not much nurturing so far.

The seemingly endless chain of correspondence from James McKenzie (most recent in The Echo of November 19, 2009) further conveys his confused interpretation of history and of Tweed Aboriginal people. In the interests of a balanced debate his letters warrant the following response.

James states that all history books of the Tweed are false, especially with regard to any identification of Mt Warning with its Aboriginal name, Wollumbin. James is aware that the Murwillumbah National Parks Office, through the Department of Environment, Climate Change and Water (DECCW), recently commissioned a research report to collate all available historical information about the mountain and its meaning for Aboriginal people. The report was prepared for the 'Wollumbin Consultative Group, a forum of the region's Aboriginal people that includes Harry Boyd and is chaired by DECCW.

The first recorded attempt to climb the mountain was by Robert Dixon on June 20, 1840, some four years before the first permanent European settlement on the Tweed. The first recorded successful ascent of the mountain was by Frank, Louis and Arthur Nixon on April 17, 1868. The brothers were accompanied by two Tweed Aboriginal men, named Nelson and Maloney, and it is interesting to note that almost all of the early recorded ascents of the mountain included Aboriginal guides, until the construction of the walking track up the mountain in 1894.

However, after collating all available research information, including the reropean historic record before corded speech of now deceased Aboriginal persons, there is one overwhelming conclusion: Wollumbin (including the variety of written and spoken forms) is the culturally appropriate identification for Mt Warning.

Despite being provided with a copy of the report and an opportunity to discuss its content James continues to assert that history is wrong, and only the mountain on his family's property should be called Wollumbin. His crusade has escalated to claims of bias, intimidation, and threats of legal action for any who oppose his views.

History can be difficult to interpret, we can deny it, and we can fabricate it, but we can't change it.

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Let's get this straight: there is no serious debate in scientific circles about the reality of anthropogenic climate change. If like me you are not an environmental scientist, you must rely on what is printed in *Science* or Nature or any peer-reviewed journal specialising in atmospheric or climate science. If that's too hard, at least read New Scientist rather than Andrew Bolt. In the places where scientists work and publish, the consensus is clear and hardening: if we don't address the problem immediately there will be catastrophic consequences. In the right-wing media (which means most of it) there is a barrage of 'scepticism' that has risen to a crescendo in recent months and drowned out the informed view that action is imperative.

The origin of most of this opinion-bending is no mystery. The fossil fuel companies have spent millions on PR campaigns, dodgy websites and political lobbyists promoting junk science, just as the tobacco companies did when combating the link between cigarettes and cancer. (This is not another conspiracy theory: the money trails are clear.) The onset of the global financial crisis also helped their cause.

ut it would not work without our human need to believe that climate change isn't happening. Apparently the older we get the greater this need for denial becomes. A recent survey in America found that a majority of respondents did not believe global warming is caused by humans, and also showed that people over the age of 65 are much more likely to take this view. Young people cannot afford to be so cavalier: they will be around to see the results of inaction.

Most of the people denying the science, or arguing that there is still professional debate about the issue, are not equipped for serious discussion. They adopt what Richard Dawkins in another context ◀ The Liberal Party's climate subcommittee interrogates a scientist.

called the 'Argument from Personal Incredulity'. It goes something like, 'As a retired school teacher I find it impossible to believe that human beings have the capacity to affect the climate, so change cannot be happening.' And if it is, it must be down to sun spots, volcanoes, orbit wobble or whatever else takes the uninformed fancy.

Often these opinions are derived from religious conviction. Environmental values which contradict the paradigm of the universe being created solely for human use and profit incite powerful antagonism in those whose religion is of a legalistic cast.

Lifestyle drives the treechangers and seachangers

roperties in the shires of Tweed and Byron on the NSW north coast continue to attract good prices because of one main factor: lifestyle. House sales continue at \$50,000 to \$100,000 above the NSW median price as retirees and cashedup escapees move in and take advantage of the rural hideaway or the beachside retreat. It is a trend not likely to reverse too soon.

The National Seachange Taskforce (www.seachangetaskforce.org.au) has its eye on the bigger picture caused by this trend. While it notes that over the long term, 'population growth in non metropolitan coastal communities has fluctuated, and is expected to continue to do so, in line with broader socio-economic trends', a number of factors suggest 'that a significant level of population growth in non metropolitan coastal areas of Australia will be sustained

'These factors include the imminent retirement of the "baby boomer" generation, and thus a sizeable new market for high amenity retirement destinations. Secondly, the global economic shift from "Fordist" (or manufacturing based economies) towards less location dependent information, service and consumption based industries represents new opportunities for relatively accessible regional areas characterised by high levels of amenity (Elbersen 2005). Thirdly, the growing flexibility of work practices (associated with new telecommunications technology), is

allowing some work-ers to relocate to smaller centres along the coast or rural hinterland (Stewart 2000).

So there's no time like the present to invest in real estate,

with increasing demand for north coast properties likely to return to prices to higher levels despite further interest rate hikes.

For the Tweed hinterland and coast, and to a lesser extent for Byron Shire, population and economic growth is tied to the socalled 'East Coast Growth Corridor', which takes in the Gold Coast and the rest of the rapidly growing South-East Queensland.

Consultants Tourism Roi see the Tweed and Gold Coast economies as 'inextricably linked; with projections suggesting that by 2016 the region's combined population

will reach 750,000. This regional economic growth zone is at the epicentre of Australia's East Coast **Growth Corridor, allowing Tweed** businesses to have ready access to a significant projected consumer market of more than four million residents.' This would indicate that investment in industrial as well as residential properties looks bright in the next ten years, always assuming that the right property is selected.

There are other reasons for investing soon – once interest rate rise are taken into account. As the **Urban Development Institute of** Australia (www.udia.com.au) has pointed out in its recent 2009 State of the Land Report, demand for housing is increasing with natural population growth, changing household formation rates and historically high levels of immigration. The cities are suffering most from undersupply, but given the coming influx of treechangers and seachangers, plus planning restrictions that seek to preserve the natural environment which makes the north coast attractive in the first place, we will no doubt see the market becoming tighter.

Cyclists are being warned: never ride more than two abreast, not to travel in packs of more than 20, wear bright clothing and leave your MP3 players and mobile phones at home. In the regions, cyclists gamble with their lives, especially on unprotected cycleways alongside highways and major roads. We also doubt two abreast could make it across any of the Tweed or Northern Rivers road bridges which are notorious 'pinch' black spots where the cycleway or pedestrian access is either non-existent or too narrow for comfort. Two cyclists have been killed on these bridges in neighbouring Byron shire in the past two years.
