

Council warns critics to tone it down

A crackdown by Tweed Shire Council on speakers at its monthly community access sessions has been slammed as an attempt to stifle criticism and free speech.

Council has drawn flak for the move by its corporate governance officer to write letters to three speakers from the last access session, warning them about making any future 'derogatory remarks' or allegations during their presentations.

The move follows recent attempts to limit the Greens councillor Katie Milne's speeches in council meetings down to three minutes, a move which spectacularly backfired when it was found to be illegal (see story page 3).

Meant to intimidate?

The community access speakers, regular critics of council on environmental issues, reject the claim they've been derogatory of councillors or staff and fear the letters were meant to intimidate them from further criticism and curb their freedom of expression.

But council's corporate governance and public officer, Neil Baldwin, said he was only trying to make the speakers 'who have been there a number of times' aware of the 'requirements' of council's code of meeting practice and to what was or wasn't acceptable.

Uki resident Menkit Prince said she was shocked to receive the letter saying 'council must be getting sick of hearing us, it seems they are really clamping down on our freedom of expression.'

The environmental campaigner said she may have upset councillors by her passionate speech pleading for biodiversity protection and sustainable practices but didn't think there was anything wrong with the criticism.

'I have heard far worse things being said to councillors at community access in the past. I find this clamp down very mysterious. Are Tweed councillors incapable of reflection on their performance? Are they completely closed to what the community is thinking and feeling?' she said.

'At the end of last year, council banned signs, masks and angry outbursts from the gallery audience. Now they are banning free speech at community access. It follows on from their blackout media policy where councillors can be censured for releasing information that is not already in the public domain, especially if it does not make them look good.'

Mr Baldwin told *The Echo* he had not been under any direction from councillors or the general manager for the move. He said it was not a 'strange departure' from normal business practice to make speakers at access sessions and workshops aware of the requirements but agreed it was the first time such warning letters had been sent out.

Previously at access sessions, the mayor has pulled up speakers if he thought they were going too far or being offensive.

Mr Baldwin said there were 'aspects' of the speakers' presentations which were unacceptable and that it would have been 'awkward' to stop them while they were 'making their point'.

The speakers were thus warned by letter not to make further 'allegations that any resident, member of council staff, councillor or other person has acted improperly'.

'In my role as public officer I have to be fair to everyone to ensure proper process is followed,' he said.

Team Koala campaigner Jenny Hayes told media that a letter she received had made her 'too scared to get up and talk again' at access meetings.

Tweed Tourism and TEDC up for tender

The work carried out by the Tweed's ratepayer-funded tourism and economic development groups will be opened up to commercial competition after a Tweed Council decision last week.

The two organisations, Tweed Tourism, which runs the shire's two visitor-information centres employing scores of volunteers at Murwillumbah and Tweed Heads, and the Tweed Economic Development Corporation (TEDC), have received annual council funding to the tune of over \$400,000 each.

A call last year to combine the two groups and save funding was scuttled by a majority of councillors.

Last Tuesday, council voted unanimously to adopt the staff recommendation for tenders to be called for the work done by both groups, following legal advice as a result of a recent review of both groups, which concluded it was mandatory to invite tenders for the delivery of tourism and economic development services.

Several councillors sit on the two groups' boards and concern was also raised this week that if the two groups now wanted to tender for those services, they could be legally blocked because of conflict of interest rules.

Mayor Warren Polglase said councillors on the boards of the two groups would have to step down as

a result of the legal advice.

The review, undertaken by the Centre for Local Government at the University of Technology, Sydney, said there were advantages of council assuming a more active role in setting the vision and strategic direction of tourism promotion and economic development.

It also said that by tightening up accountability and probity requirements in a new contractual arrangement, council would go a long way in addressing issues such as transparency.

'The same level of scrutiny and engagement is not required of corporations to deliver what is a core function of council,' the report said.

Park warning plan approved

Tweed councillors have unanimously approved a plan to notify caravan and manufactured home park residents by mail of proposed developments on adjacent properties.

The vote last week followed a workshop late last month by councillors to decide the best way of notifying the shire's estimated 35,000-plus park homeowners of any development which could impact on their lifestyle, a process long enjoyed by other residents

The new policy means staff for the first time are required to forewarn park residents of developments planned around their homes or even in their parks. Park residents say the changes put them on an equal footing as other home-owners in being able to object to anything which may have a major impact on their amenity, including over-shadowing, noise and privacy.

Chinderah-based Cr Kevin Skinner sought the changes after residents of the Tweed Heritage Caravan Park complained they had been left out of the loop about a nearby four-lot industrial subdivision which will create a new road and destroy a natural waterway next to their park. As a result, the park owner was the only objector to the controversial development.

School upgrade welcomed

St Joseph's Primary School in South Murwillumbah has been transformed with the addition of two new classrooms, a multi-purpose centre, an undercroft and new admin area under a federally-funded upgrade officially launched last Friday.

The school chose the feast day of its patron saint, St Joseph, for the official opening of the \$925,000 refurbishments and joint unveiling of a plaque by Richmond MP Justine Elliot and the Catholic Bishop of Lismore, Bishop Geoffrey Jarrett.

Mrs Elliot said around 38 apprentices and tradespeople were involved in the project which was funded under the Rudd Government's Building the Education Revolution (BER) initiative and was the first of many in the region to be officially completed.

The program has come under fire due to alleged rotting by contractors and shoddy workmanship of buildings at some schools, but officials at the opening ceremony at St Joseph's were full of praise for the federal government and its funding and for their project being 'on time and on budget'.

The director of Catholic

Schools in the Lismore diocese, Dr Anne Wenham, asked Mrs Elliot to thank the government for the 'unprecedented funding for our school'.

Dr Wenham said the government could be 'assured' that the funding at the school and throughout the diocese was being 'spent prudently, wisely, professionally and efficiently to refurbish and construct facilities that will support the provision of high quality Catholic education now and into the future'.

A former student at the school, Bryan Sharp, 44, of Murwillumbah, who started in kindergarten in 1971, a year after the school opened, said it was a very proud day for him.

'My kids Linden, Kohan and Neisha also attend the school and my wife Cheree is a teacher's aide so it's obviously a milestone for the school and the fantastic work the government has done in funding this for our children's children,' he said.

Council's time-limit plan backfires

A controversial move by Tweed councillors to limit their speeches at council minutes to just three-minutes has backfired after it was found to breach state government rules.

The plan, spearheaded by Cr Dot Holdom at February's monthly meeting, was withdrawn at last week's meeting after councillors were told state government rules on council meetings set the time for speeches at five minutes.

Critics of the move say it was aimed at muzzling outspoken Greens Councillor Katie Milne who was blamed for causing meetings to run late by raising so many environmental concerns.

Council's corporate governance manager Neil Baldwin told councillors they were unable to reduce the time limit as the state government rule set the limit for speeches at five

minutes. Councillors can however vote for an extension for the speaker.

The proposed curb on speeches had sparked an outcry from council watchers who described it as draconian and Cr Milne attacking it as 'another clampdown by Cr Holdom on questions and participation in democracy'.

Cr Milne said last month that the reason she often spoke out was because no other councillor stood up for the huge issues the Tweed was facing with massive development projects in the pipeline set to change the face of the shire.

'To limit me to five questions on these big issues is just madness. Yes, I do talk a lot in council meetings, but I resent the fact that workload is left to my shoulders and I have to ask all the questions myself,' she had said.

Code overhaul plan

Meanwhile the council is considering a plan to overhaul its controversial conduct review panel and the way complaints against councillors are handled.

At last Tuesday's meeting, councillors deferred adopting the updates to the rules till it holds a closed-door workshop on the issue.

The new rules include a secrecy provision banning councillors from revealing what goes on at the panel's hearings into complaints over code breaches as well as restrictions on the role of 'support persons' such as a lawyer or friend, who would not be allowed to speak for them.

Cr Katie Milne, who was last week censured by her colleagues for breaching the contentious council code of

conduct over her handling of anti-rally donations for court costs, has previously slammed the secret workings of the conduct panel and is believed to have recently refused to sign a confidentiality agreement when facing the panel.

The updates tighten up confidentiality clauses. In one, a person subject to a complaint would first have to sign a 'confidentiality undertaking' if they wanted the complaint in full, otherwise only the 'substance' of the complaint would be provided.

Historic fig tree to be axed

An historic fig tree at Byangum southwest of Murwillumbah is set to be chopped down in the next couple of weeks after a second arborist found extensive rot in the tree had undermined its stability.

The 110-year-old tree (pictured) had been condemned for removal after a Tweed Shire Council arborist report late last year found the rot could cause heavy branches to fall onto the nearby Kyogle Road and was a safety hazard.

The second report, by a Gold Coast arborist, also recommended chopping down most of the small-leaved fig, commonly known as a strangler fig, due to its poor health. It recommended removing 'all branches, limbs and canopy structure of the tree back to a five-metre stump', retaining native vegetation at the base of the tree.

The tree was planted by one of the Tweed's early European pioneers, Harry Hatton, a blacksmith, who planted it as a seedling to mark the birth



of one of his sons in the late 1880s.

Descendants of the Hatton family and other locals, including the Tweed Heads Historical Society, had protested against removing the tree, with some suggesting that if it had to go, an historic plaque should be erected and another fig tree planted in the same spot.

Council's recreation services manager Stewart Brawley ac-

knowledgeed the importance of the tree, saying 'no-one likes to see a tree of this age and historic value removed but the reality is that the tree is in a poor condition and represents a danger to passing motorists on Kyogle Road'.

'The good news is that Council has managed to strike seedlings from cuttings and seeds at the Council nursery so the tree can live on in a sense,' he said.

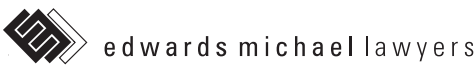

Rates warrior fights on

Tweed Heads accountant Terry Sharples's long-running legal battle to derail council's seven-year-rate plan is set to continue despite his failure last week to convince the NSW Court of Appeal to order his case to be reheard.
He says he now plans to take his fight to the High Court where he will seek leave to appeal the Court of Appeal's judgment and decision to award costs against him, believed to be around \$100,000.
The appeal court rejected Mr Sharples's appeal against a Land and Environment Court judgment which found that the Local Government Minister had the right to approve the council's application for seven consecutive rate hikes of up to 9.5 per cent, starting in June 2006.
The judge agreed with Mr Sharples's claim that the council had misled ratepayers about the true impact of the plan by not making it clear the increases would compound each year.
He also found the council's public representations about the costs of the rate hike were capable of misleading and in fact had misled some people, and because of this the council's community consultation process was flawed.
But in a crucial finding which sunk his case, the judge found none of this mattered because the council was not under a legal obligation to follow departmental guidelines when seeking ministerial approval for special rate increases.
Council last year voted to pursue Mr Sharples to pay the \$258,000 legal bill which it racked up during the Land and Environment Court hearing.
Mr Sharples, whose case in the Land and Environment Court was bankrolled by long-standing council critic Stephen Segal, made national headlines when he took legal action which resulted in the political demise of One Nation founder, Pauline Hanson.

A Tweed football club is getting behind a program aimed at reducing binge drinking and anti-social behaviour on and off the field.

The Bilambil Jets Rugby League Football Club is the first club to commit to a family-friendly sporting club lifestyle by signing up with the Australian Drug Foundation's Good Sports program, supported by Tweed Shire Council, to implement practices for the better management of alcohol issues.

The program has more than 3,300 participating sports clubs across Australia. Evidence has shown that community-based sports clubs contribute to alcohol problems by accepting and promoting excessive drinking and providing inappropriate role models for young people.

Jets president Peter Rigney said the club, which has up to 90 players, had last year begun a similar program to curb anti-social behaviour by players and spectators and as a result, it was awarded level 1 accreditation in the Good Sports program this year.

'We don't tolerate misbehaviour and we discourage our kids from getting involved in binge drinking or drugs,' Peter said.

'We don't have a problem at the club, but we figure that if

we keep a lid on it, we won't get a problem, we want families to come to our games and they don't want to see drunken or loutish behaviour.

'We have a good junior base here, they're our best asset, so we want to try and encourage them. It's not just about keeping the players under control, but lifting awareness of the problem.

'We're a family-oriented club and the only way to get the mums and dads and grandparents involved is by good crowd behaviour, they don't want to hear swearing and see loutish behaviour, it's not just a football issue but a social one.

'If we set an example for our young ones, that good be-

haviour will filter through the whole whole club and its support base.'

Tweed Shire Council's recreation services manager Stewart Brawley said council strongly supported creation of family-friendly environments and the promotion of inclusive social activities.

Mr Brawley said the NSW government, especially the RTA, and several Local Government Associations, backed the program in partnership with the Australian Drug Foundation.

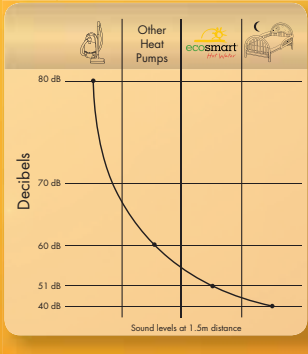

Caring for old folk

The North Coast Area Health Service (NCAHS) has produced 'The Care Of The Older Person 2010-2015', its first area-wide aged care plan, and it can be downloaded in PDF from www.ncahs.nsw.gov.au/aged-care. The plan recognises the need to escape from institutionalised thinking about institutionalised care, and to bring aged care back into the wider community.

According to the NCAHS, whose area runs from Port Macquarie to Tweed Heads, the proportion of our population aged 65 years and over is 18 per cent, compared to the NSW average of 14 per cent. This percentage is expected to increase to 23 by 2016, compared to 16 statewide. Obviously there will be a strong demand on already over-stretched services – and, incidentally, a bigger market for entrepreneurs in this age bracket. The federal government at least understands the need for increased funding.

The NCAHS plan lists seven priorities in aged care: care of the older person in the inpatient setting; care of the older person in the community and partnerships with community care providers; partnerships with General Practice; partnerships with Residential Aged Care Facilities (RACFs); promoting health in older people; workforce; and coordination and collaboration. Critically, the priority of 'promoting health in older people' needs to be preceded with promoting health in young people so that they are not physical wrecks by the time they reach their fifties.

Seven seems to be the magic number. As the NCAHS plan notes, a meeting of Australian health ministers in July 2004 identified seven key principles to be addressed in the provision of aged care services. One among them which stands out is 'unnecessary admissions to hospital and extended hospital stays of the frail elderly are avoided'. This already distresses older people and we also see younger people with degenerative diseases stuck inappropriately in high care units for old people. Pain management – and that elephant in the room, euthanasia – is also likely to become a bigger issue. According to Professor Michael Cousins, who spoke at the recent National Pain Summit (www.painsummit.org.au), the management of pain in Australia is shockingly inadequate. Search 'painful reality – patients let down' on the ABC's 7.30 Report website for a fascinating interview with Prof Cousins.

A free kick for Kev's inner masochist

The results in South Australia and Tasmania were hardly what Kevin Rudd would have chosen; a large swing against the Labor Party could never be called welcome news, even if the wash up in South Australia at least was a lot better than the pessimists had feared.

But in the end the damage was more psychological than psephological. In both states the issues were very much local rather than federal and Rudd himself took no real part in the campaigning – nor for that matter did Tony Abbott.

A change of government in Tasmania may make the task of negotiating health reform more difficult, but in any case ending the blame game was already proving far harder than had been anticipated. In the end, having another Liberal Premier to help carry the can for failure might even be a political plus.

And in any case, there were more immediate concerns. It took a while, but the whacking in the polls for which Kevin Rudd had been pleading finally arrived last week.

It was a highly selective whacking: Rudd's satisfaction rating fell to just 48 per cent, with 41 per cent dissatisfied – his worst ever result. Comparable figures for Abbott were 47 and 38; this meant, said his breathless cheer squad, enthusiastically led by *The Australian's* Dennis Shanahan (who else?) that Rudd's net satisfaction rating at plus 7 was now lower than Abbott's at plus 9.

Why, you could even say that Abbott is more popular than Rudd. Well, you could, but this would ignore the rest of the Newpoll, which pointed out that Labor is still on track for a comfortable election win and Rudd is still preferred prime minister by 55 per cent of vot-

ers, as opposed 30 per cent for Abbott.

But Rudd could now feel vindicated. Unfortunately, far from satisfying him, this taste of punishment seemed only to have stimulated his appetite. The masochist in him decided to wind up the parliamentary session by giving Abbott a giant free kick, and Abbott, declining to play the sadist, took it gleefully.

government's failures, he took the opportunity to neutralise one of its more damaging lines, the one about how he as minister had ripped a billion dollars out of the hospital system. In fact, as Abbott pointed out, on his watch the commonwealth had increased its funding; the catch was that the states had increased theirs more. Thus the commonwealth share fell from

It is not clear which of the tactical geniuses infesting the Prime Minister's office thought that inviting Abbott to address parliament on the subject of health reform was a good idea. The reasoning, if it could be dignified as such, was presumably that health was Labor's strongest area, its preferred battleground, and this was where the government should concentrate the action.

True, but health was also one policy area where Abbott could claim both experience and expertise. He had actually been health minister for three years, and while he mightn't have been a particularly brilliant one, he at least knew the tricks and traps of the portfolio.

And more to the point, Abbott is a performance politician, one who revels in the limelight. Inviting him to take the stage on his own terms was never going to be a good idea. In the event it was a minor disaster.

Not only did he deliver a melodramatic rant about the

As a result the media generally judged him the loser on the day. But like a punch drunk fighter he demanded more, and set up a full scale debate on the subject with Abbott on national television.

The outcome of the Community Working Group and its final recommendation probably come as no surprise to anyone. The Clarrie Hall Dam option was seen as the least damaging of the four options presented, and provided a massive amount of water, probably enough to last a century; Clarrie has enough water to make it to 2035 at its current capacity, and its volume will be trebled by the wall raising. federal court to order the federal government to consider its responsibilities towards protection of the environment.

Katie undertook this action in August 2009 on behalf of concerned Tweed residents who formed the grassroots No Rally Group (NRG). The court awarded costs to the rally's highly paid legal team. Resident groups are raising money to cover those costs and to engage lawyers for future efforts to protect our beautiful Northern Rivers region from such inappropriate developments.

receptions, boxing matches and other functions promoted for the region's early settlers.

The modest structure in Ambrose Brown Park had no pretension to architectural significance, nor to historical importance in the conventional sense. Congratulations to those dedicated community volunteers behind the Caldera Institute for Sustainable Community Development. Congratulations also to all levels of government, including Tweed Shire Council, for getting behind this community-based initiative.

I attended the launch of the Caldera Institute at Tyalgum on Saturday. It was a great af-

ternoon full of positive messages and hope. Even the mayor, Cr Warren Polglase, of whom I have been known to be critical, was there and spoke on the challenges of sustainability. I sat there waiting for him to speak. Had he, like St Paul on the road to Damascus, seen the light?

Unfortunately, in his speech he recognised only one of the three key areas of concern, the economic impact. It was 'same old, same old' from the old warrior. It is also this same Cr Polglase who, along with Cr van Lieshout (also at the launch) and Cr Youngblutt, signed the notice of a rescission motion to overturn the council's decision to ask the state government to seek a 'sustainability review' of the Kings Forest and Cobaki Lakes developments.

It was left to former mayor Max Boyd to point out that Tweed Shire Council has a Sustainability Centre at Chinderah, a point that obviously had bypassed the current mayor. Maybe it was established by the administrators after the council previously led by Cr Polglase had been sacked for having too close links to developers.

There seems to be a level of tension between a number of the elected councillors, the council staff and the local community on this and many other issues.

Thank goodness that bottom-up, community-based initiatives will have a far more sustainable impact than short-sighted, navel-gazing, would-be politicians.

Trains for jobs

Trains On Our Tracks (TOOT) welcomes 'Centrelink Jobs Expo' at Goonellabah as a meeting place for employers and job seekers, but TOOT is very aware that lack of transport options is often the main

barrier to job seekers finding employment in this region.

Job seekers and employment agencies tell us that they have vacancies and people for those jobs, but they simply can't get there.

Centrelink's motto says 'Giving you options' – and that's exactly what people here need in terms of transport. Many job seekers simply don't have access to their own private transport.

The Casino-Murwillumbah train line is the spine of a public transport system that links most of the towns and villages in our region, yet it sits idle thanks to government inaction. Getting trains on our tracks would give jobseekers and employers better choice.

TOOT calls on the state government to establish commuter rail services on our line. Federal members Ms Saffin and Ms Elliot need to take a leading role in solving chronic transport issues in the region.

Ms Saffin's proposal for an Integrated Regional Transport Plan has yet to get started, let alone yield any results for north coast residents.

Job seekers are tired of the federal-state 'blame game' and just want to work.

The federal government is funding transport projects on the Gold Coast and elsewhere in our region, yet existing rail infrastructure goes unused.

Feathery gardeners rule the roost

Gardener, fertiliser, farmer, entertainer – the chook is one hell of a backyard asset. And as far as pets go, it's about as sustainable as they come. Your chook will not eat native birds, harry livestock or freak out the neighbour's child. (Unless the child has alektorophobia, fear of chickens, the kind of phobia filmmaker Alfred Hitchcock capitalised on so well.) It ranks up there with the Pacific Blue-Eye, a native, mosquito-eating fish, as the home gardener's best friend.

I'm new to the world of chooks, and regret I spent so many years without knowledge of these home entertainment units. We have three golden-brown Isa Horns, which I think is a cross between the Leghorn and the Isa Brown, and one white Sussex. One of the Isa Horns is a rooster and our neighbours have been tolerant of his crowing at sparrow's fart – so far. You don't need a rooster to get eggs, and you don't really need a rooster as garden ornament. Some of them can be pretty aggressive, but our little fellow is a charm. He shows the girls where the food is, points out good (and bad) nesting sites and issues warnings when he thinks there is danger.

Speaking of danger, your chook can get injured or killed like any other pet. Welcome to Planet Earth. You might even kill the chook yourself if you're interested in its meat. To protect them from dangers other than yourself, you need a dog-proof, cat-proof, fox-proof, snake-proof house they can be locked into at night. It also helps if it's mouse- and rat-proof to keep the vermin away from the feed, though if you have an eastern brown snake in the neighbourhood it will knock off the rats for you.

The upside of chooks is that they will give you fresh eggs, fertilise your soil and aerate it by scratching, and forage for caterpillars and other garden nasties – they even eat stink bugs! The downside is that they will dig up your new plantings if they're not protected and crap all over your deck if they're not deterred with water or kept inside a wire yard. We often find ours sitting in a row on the outside sofa, and they're deeply offended if you want to intrude on their space.

Above all, chooks are complex, sociable creatures which like to forage far and wide – keeping them in a battery cage is a crime against nature. Any gardener who wants entertaining companions while they work need look no further than the chook.

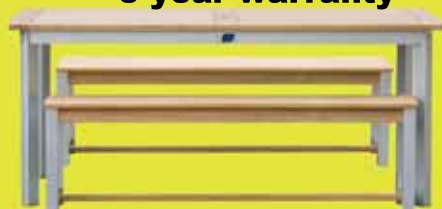

With the \$3m World Championship match in Sofia between Viswanathan Anand and challenger Veselin Topalov only a month away, Topalov's manager Silvio Danailov has upped the psychological pressure on Anand. In a recent interview with the French magazine *Europe Echecs*, Danailov expressed his displeasure at Anand's refusal to put a 'no draw offers' clause in the match contract and declared that his player would refuse to reply if Anand offered Topalov a draw. 'I understand there are some old players who don't want to work; they like to offer draws, but this is finished. In professional sport, we cannot do this.'

Danailov, whose off-board antics almost torpedoed the 2006 'Toilet Wars' world title match between Topalov and Vladimir Kramnik, has a track record in asking his charges to forgo routine civilities over the board. In 2008 Danailov instructed Topalov's second Ivan Cheparinov to refuse to shake hands at the start of a game with English GM Nigel Short. (Short had apparently said something in an interview to offend Danailov.) Cheparinov was forfeited for his rudeness without a move being played, although on appeal Cheparinov gained a replay, which he also lost.

In preparation for the 2010 world

title match, Danailov has clearly decided that Anand's age – 40, five years older than Topalov – is fair game in his attempt to gain a psychological advantage for his player. 'Anand, he is resting on his past success,' said Danailov late last year. 'He is almost not playing now. It is difficult for him to keep the pace of the younger players. At his age there is not much energy.'

Danailov has also accused Anand of 'not lifting a finger' to help find an Indian sponsor for the match and even accused the amiable Indian of planning dirty tricks in the match to be played on Topalov's home soil in Bulgaria: 'Anand's team will make everything possible to require unfulfillable conditions during the negotiations for the match, in order to make us nervous.'

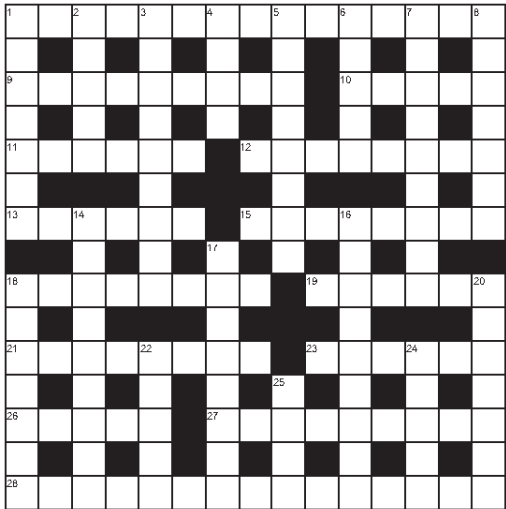
Mild-mannered Anand, whose manager is his equally amiable wife Aruna, is outwardly unconcerned by Danailov's pot-shots but there is no doubt something of a siege, us and them, mentality in Team Anand.

Many believe Anand made a serious mistake in accepting a match in Bulgaria, where Danailov has seemingly unlimited influence and support, but Sofia's multi-million dollar bid was the only one on the table.

Anand may be treating his title defence in the lion's den as his greatest challenge, but a recent survey of top players found that few believed Anand would prevail.

Bill Jacobi

Bill is doing what every musician dreams of - he's a full time player. I'll let that sink in for a moment. As every musician knows, the existence of a humble troubadour usually hangs together on a knife edge with a string of gigs and a 'day job' or, God forbid, the dole. Far from being reliant on a menial and unfulfilling job, his weekly wage is derived from doing gigs and performing; the thing that most musicians savour the most.

As a largely self taught songwriter/guitarist/bassist, he's been playing for over 30 years. 'As a self managed musician, you need some business nous and good communication,' he says. 'It's liberating when you can do it all yourself. The key is playing what you want to hear otherwise it's meaningless.'

So how did Bill find himself up here?

'I have been living up here for nine years,' he says, 'originally from the Blue Mountains.' While on tour with Floyd Vincent, Bill found a special affinity with the north coast region. 'After seeing this place, I hated going home, and there seemed like a lot of gigs and an easier pace of life up here. There is work, and you have to hustle, but you have to do that anywhere. The great thing about this area is that it's a country drive to the gig instead of sitting on Paramatta Rd (in Sydney).'

Bill bought land in Uki and built a low impact straw bail house five and half years ago. So what is the demographic

like up here?

'It's generally an older demographic, but it's a wide range also,' he says. 'A lot of places want to hear original material, which is heartening. I play songs that I love, and by in large it's my own material.' For his solo act, Bill uses stomp boxes, open tuning and a lap slide to create his rootsy sound. His influences include Dylan, the Beatles, the Stones, Joni Mitchell to Miles Davis, the Necks, Felice Brothers and Lucinda Williams.

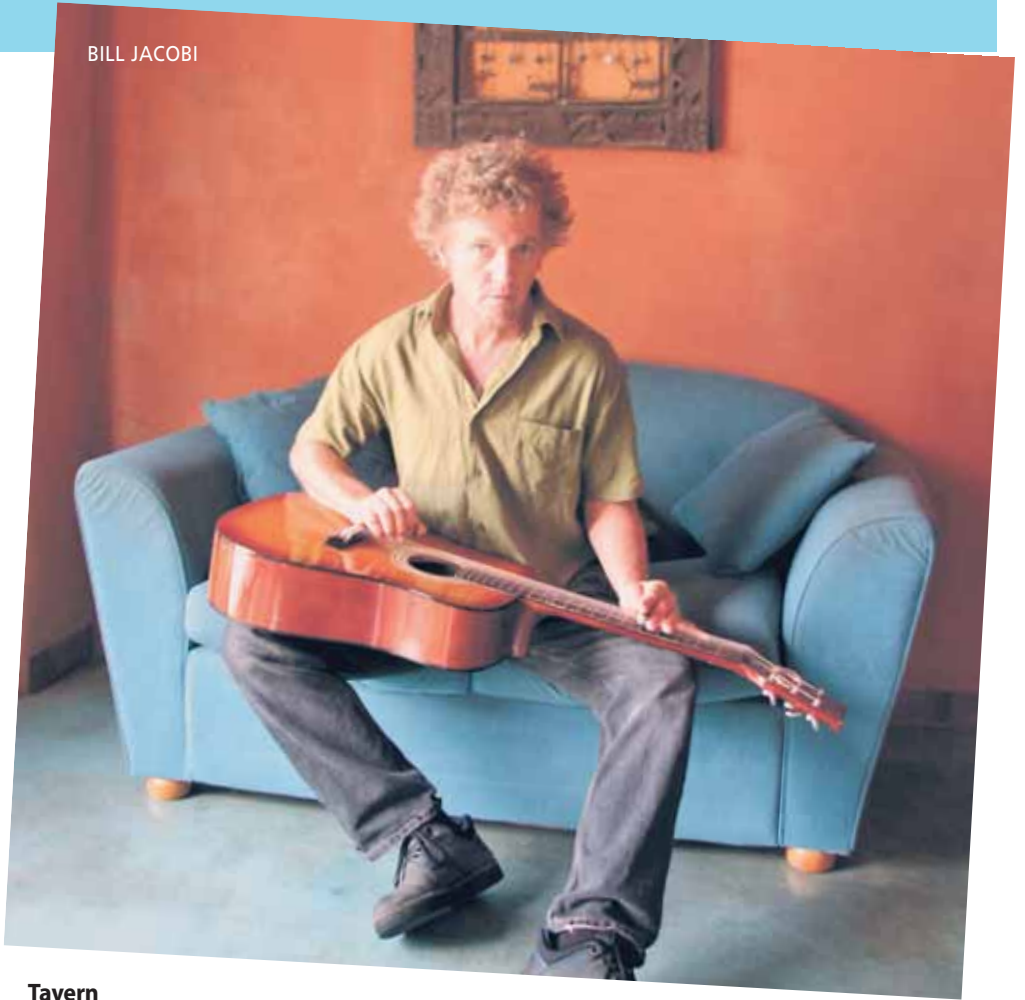

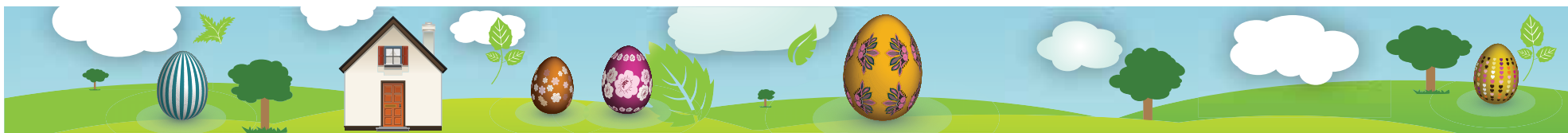

Mekong Drift and Landscape and Memory

Mekong Drift and Landscape and Memory are two fascinating exhibitions which open this **Friday at the Tweed River Art Gallery**.

Mekong Drift is an exhibition by artists Karlee Rawkins and Marc Renshaw, who spent three months following the Mekong River through Cambodia, Laos and Vietnam during 2007. They travelled by boat, motorbike, auto rickshaw, bicycle, kayak and bus collecting imagery, photographs, drawings and experiences to inform their work on return to Australia. It's a colourful exhibition of photographs, sculpture, collage and paintings that document and reflect on that journey. The artists focus on the significance of the river and how it has affected the mythologies and cultures of South East Asia. They were also influenced by the turbulent, sad histories of the places they visited, and the resilience of the people. 'I hope to create a sense of vulnerability in these paintings,' artist Karlee Rawkins says, 'of myself as a traveller and how I felt, of the people of these countries and the land and animals under threat of deforestation and development.' Marc Renshaw was more inspired

by images of street life: 'I was attracted to the many hand-made signs that were used for everything from public signage to business promotion. The naïve production and quality became an endearing feature in the sometimes challenging environments we found ourselves in.' In contrast, David Kas has created a series of ethereal drawings of landscapes from his memory and imagination to produce 'Landscape and Memory.' The delicate charcoal and pigment works in this exhibition have a dreamlike, mystical quality. The atmospheric and magical effects of light and darkness play a key role, emphasising the dramatic, and the ability it has to make the ordinary sublime. 'To me, the landscape as genre is imbued with qualities of the divine and the picturesque,' David Kas says. The Mekong Drift and Landscape and Memory exhibitions officially open this **Friday March 26 at 6.30pm at the Tweed Heads Gallery**, and are on display until Sunday May 2.

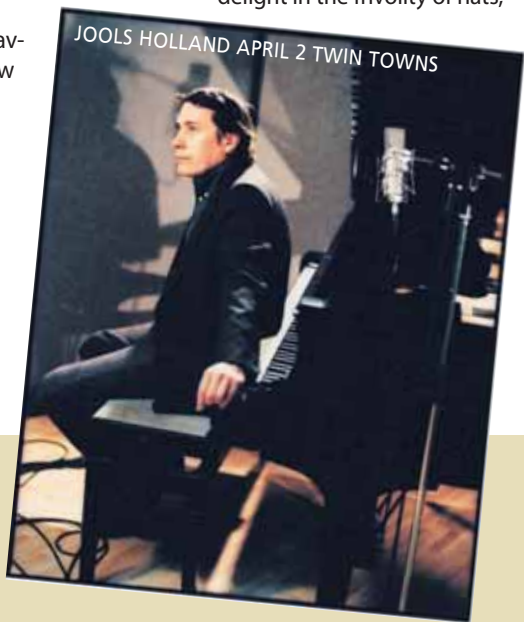

Home construction in NSW on a roll, says treasurer

NSW Treasurer Eric Roozendaal has welcomed the latest official housing data showing more growth in home construction in NSW.

'NSW again leads the states - this time in the growth in the number of homes starting construction for the December 2009 quarter,' Mr Roozendaal told the NSW Parliament.

ABS data show that housing starts in NSW jumped by 16.5 per cent for the December 2009 quarter (seasonally adjusted) compared to the previous quarter. This is higher than any other State.

The national average was up 15.1 per cent for the same period. Queensland increased 13.3 per cent and South Aus-

tralia 8.7 per cent, while Western Australia went up only 2.3 per cent.

Key recent housing sector data for NSW showed that construction activity grew by 2.4 per cent in the December 2009 quarter - better than Queensland (down 0.7 per cent) and better than Western Australia (up 0.4 per cent). NSW saw \$8.9 billion in construction activity in the last three months of last year.

NSW residential building approvals grew by 3.4 per cent for January 2010, and grew by 94.8 per cent compared to the same time a year ago.

On a trend basis, construction work done in NSW has now risen for nine consecutive quarters.



Half a million houses short by 2020: HIA

Despite Mr Roozendaal's optimism on NSW construction increases, the Housing Industry Association's inaugural 'Housing to 2020' report finds that if current building trends persist, then Australia's cumulated housing shortage would reach 466,000 dwellings by 2020.

HIA senior economist Ben Phillips said that 'Housing to 2020', which focuses on future housing demand and the number of dwellings required in meeting this demand, highlights a current housing shortage that already numbers over 109,000 dwellings.

'The reality in many regions and cities in Australia is that affordable, well-located land is not available or abundant,' Mr Phillips said. 'Furthermore, planning restrictions, higher taxation on new housing relative to existing dwellings, labour shortages, and onerous regulation biased toward new housing all add to the problem.'

'If we don't get a comprehensive supply response to the accumulating housing shortage

then the lack of affordable and appropriately located rental properties will only worsen, while pressures on existing home prices will continue at an undesirable rate, placing avoidable upward pressure on interest rates.

'A lack of skilled labour is an emerging threat to the much needed housing supply response. A second round resources boom this decade will draw heavily on an already tight labour market.'

'The \$90 billion worth of resource projects on the books is expected to demand an additional 136,000 direct and indirect jobs. This labour will need to be housed, adding additional pressure to the supply of labour and materials in non-resource regions.'

Housing to 2020 provides the first estimates made

of Australia's housing shortage at a Local Government Area (LGA) level.

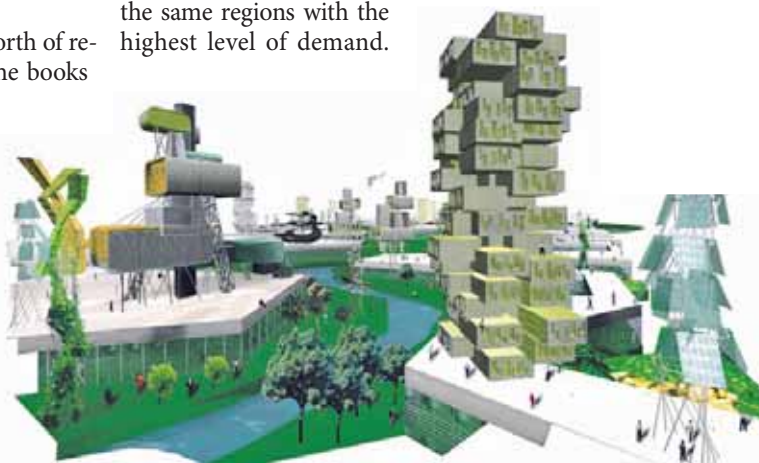
'The report finds that shortages exist in just under half (295) of the 669 LGAs across Australia,' Mr Phillips said. 'The majority of the shortages can be found in and around metropolitan Sydney and Brisbane.'

'It was also found that many of the LGAs with the largest housing shortage are also the same regions with the highest level of demand.'

Again, it's the growth areas in the greater Sydney area and in South East Queensland where demand will be among the highest in the nation.

'Current construction levels in most high demand areas are simply not sufficient to meet the needs of a fast growing population.'

Schools Program Manager. 'It's also really important to change the mentality that helmets are ugly and 'uncool', and giving students a chance to tell us what is cool and to give us a design that they would wear'

A winner from each region of NSW will be chosen to receive a new bike and helmet along with a presentation for their school on road safety and the correct way to fit a helmet. An overall state winner will also have his or her design produced into a helmet that will be available to purchase Australia wide.

Councillors' censure of outspoken Greens Cr Katie Milne last week for mishandling an anti-rally donation prompted a media flurry, with mayor Warren Polglase telling ABC Radio that councillors should put the issue behind them, which is magnanimous of him considering his own involvement in the vote to slap her down. The censure came after repeated and widespread apologies by the Greens councillor as soon as the mistake was pointed out. Most people saw it as trivial and *Backburner* is told that even one councillor had earlier been heard to describe it as 'not a hanging offence'. A fellow Greens councillor in Byron Shire put it more subtly, saying it was like the other councillors telling Cr Milne to 'sit up straight'. No wonder some say council's the best free entertainment in town.

A concert/supper show in Murwillumbah's Catholic Hall last week to aid Haitian earthquake victims raised \$1,111 with 240 people attending. Members of Murwillumbah Philharmonic Society, Mt St Patrick College and Primary School as well as the Chillingham Singers were all in fine voice for the night. One of the organisers, Leo Kelly, whose late wife Bernadette started the fundraising concert series years ago, said the result was outstanding given that natural disasters 'seem to occur more often these days, it's not like there's one every six or 12 months, there's been a major disaster somewhere almost every month lately so people are called on to help more often'.

Tweed MP Geoff Provest wants locals concerned about the lack of police or crime rates to get along to a rally this Sunday, March 28, at Cudgen Leagues Club, starting at 9am (DST). He says the government 'is still not listening on the need for more Tweed police' and that

deputy police commissioner David Owen's 'snub' to Tweed police during his recent tour of the region and a lack of action since the police minister's recent visit to the Tweed Heads police station bore that out. Mr Provest said the deputy commissioner had 'famously' told the ABC *Stateline* program in February that Tweed police were 'over resourced' and that the region's youth gang crisis was only 'a perception in the community'. The MP says the only way to get the message across is for a major demonstration of people power.

The interview will cover aspects of Fred's collaborations with some of the iconic names in Australian art, including Brett Whiteley, John Olsen and Judy Cassab. Members of the audience will also have the opportunity to ask questions.

Longtime magistrate on the Tweed and north coast, Nicholas Reimer, has retired after almost 20 years on the bench. Mr Reimer is the oldest magistrate to serve in NSW, and the first to take advantage of the change to the magistrates retirement age from 65 to 72 years of age, an amendment Mr Reimer himself campaigned for in 2003. Last Saturday night, a dinner was held at Ballina for Mr Reimer, organised by the Far North Coast Law Society, with over 100 local solicitors, court staff and official guests there to farewell him. Mr Reimer said law had been a part of his life for well over 50 years and he was still coming to terms with retirement, adding he had always loved the sea and looked forward to spending more time on his boat fishing. He began his career as a magistrate in Sydney before coming to the Northern Rivers 10 years ago. It's estimated he sat through around 12,000 hearings and adjudicated on 50,000 sentences during his career.
